





letter from the "Committee of the Professions", New York, New York regarding a donation and the use of his name for publication of a statement in the New York Times on May 22, 1966 calling open the United States Government to cease the bombings and all other offensive military actions in Vietnam.

SUSAN SONTAG is listed as an initial endorser of this statement.

The "New York Post" a New York daily evening newspaper in its issue of November 18, 1967, reflected that SUSAN SONTAG spoke at a program "From Dissent to Resistance" at a Vietnam teach-in at Columbia University, New York City, in November, 1967.

The "Village Voice", a New York City newspaper, in its issue of January 18, 1968, on page 1, column 1, reflected that SUSAN SONTAG signed a scroll pledging to counsel, aid, and abet any young man who wished to refuse the draft.

On February 6, 1968, JOHN R. Mc DONOUGH, Assistant Deputy Attorney General, turned over to Special Agents of the FBI a huge scroll approximately 50 feet long and three feet wide left abandoned in the Andretta Room of the Justice Building, Washington, DC by a five-man delegation of clergy and laymen following a meeting with departmental officials on February 6, 1968.

The scroll, dated January, 1968, bore the names and addresses of numerous individuals including that of the subject signifying that they would counsel draft refusal "to any young man who will not, because of conscience, serve as a soldier in this criminal war." The scroll states that the undersigned "will aid and abet him and make his welfare (their) concern until the war ends."

Also turned over to the Agents were envelopes bearing the names and addresses of the subject among many others indicating that they had contributed \$1 "in support of a draft resister".
"I wanted to aid and abet young men who refuse the draft. This war is illegitmate and our actions are legitmate."

The "Village Voice", a New York weekly newspaper, in its issue of March 14, 1968, page 27, column 1, reflects that SUSAN SONTAG would appear at a benefit for DAVID MITCHELL" on March 17, 1968, at Saint Clement's Church, 432 West 46th Street.

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The March 21, 1967 late city edition of the New York Times carries the information that on March 20, 1967, the Supreme Court of the United States declined without comment to review MITCHELL's appeal of a five year prison, sentence. U

The December, 1968 issue of Esquire magazine contains an article authored by the subject on page 131 entitled "Trip to Hanoi" which reflects that she spent two weeks in Hanoi in May, 1968 at the invitation of the Democratic Republic of North Vietnam. The article reflects that the subject considers herself an unaffiliated radical American writer "passionately opposed to the American aggression in Vietnam", and feels that the war has given radical Americans "a clear cut moral issue on which to mobilize discontent and expose the camouflaged contradictions in the system."

The subject states that her patriotism is the well spring of her opposition to American foreign policy and the interests of humanity demand that "a decent Americantoanymust be an internationalist first and patriot second." According to the subject, current American patriotism since World War II has been synonymous with bigotry, provincialism, and selfishness.

The article concerning her trip to Hanoi states that the subject, for the first half of her stay, experienced difficulty reaching a rapport with the Vietnamese; the differences of culture, manners, philosophy of life, as well as being guided around the country "by skilled bureaucrats specializing in relations with foreigners" was preventing her from taking a true picture, but in the second half of her trip, the subject states she began, Vietnamese behavior which "reflects the Confucian idea that both body politica and an individual's well-being depend on cultivating the rules of appropriate and just behavior.

The subject states the Vietnamese believe their country is and always has been democratic and they have a great respect for America, consider the American people their friends, but hold the present American Government as their enemy.

According to the subject, the adversities of the war have united the Vietnamese as never before. It has improved the moral level of the people, it has further democratized their society by limiting the material goods and restricting the social space available to them. It has deepened their love of country, However, she stated Vietnam is not the model of a just state citing the persecution of the Trotskyites in 1946, for a ble collectivization of agriculture in 1956, and recent brutalities and injustices committed by high officials.

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During her stay, the subject states she had interviews with the Minister of Health, Doctor PHAM NGOC THACH, the Minister of Higher Education, Professor TA QUANG EUU and Prime Minister PHAM VAN DONG.

The files of the Passport Office of the United States Department of State disclosed that SUSAN SONTAG was issued passport number 493282 on May 23, 1966, at New York for proposed travel to England, France, Italy, for the purpose of "tourism".

"The New York Times", a New York City daily newspaper, in its issue dated November 17, 1966, contained an article entitled "Russell Discusses His Plan for War-Crime Trial - He says He Has Prima Facie Evidence Against the U.S.," which reflected in part as follows:

The International War Crimes Tribunal, sponsored by Bertrand Russell, which plans to "try" the United States in the spring of 1967 on charges of war crimes in Vietnam, announced that it hoped to gain evidence "on the spot". The tribunal will be acting in a private capacity without any official endorsement. As an offshoot of the Bertand Russell Peace Foundation, it obviously reflects the left-wing leanings of the foundation and its funder, Lord Russell.

Joseph C. Goulden, of "The Philadelphia Inquirer", in an article appearing in that newspaper on March 12, 1967, in discussing the "prima facie" evidence to which Lord Russell refers, noted that it consists of U.S. press reports about civilian deaths in Vietnam and of the torture of Vietcong prisoners". The article describes the "evidence" as being "limited to selected incidents which made the U.S. appear heartlessly bloodthirsty". The article points out further that the tribunal ignores "the wider question of why the United States feels compelled to fight in Vietnam--a question which would put the civilian deaths into a more reasonable context".

Mr. Goulden, in the aforementioned article, in discussing the eighteen-member commission of the tribunal, described it as a "Who's Who of Uncle Sam-baiters, ranging from Black Power fanatic Stokeley Carmichael to Jean Paul Sartre, French writer-pnilosopher, and Gen. Lazaro Cardenas, who, while President of Mexico, gave refuge to Leon Trotsky."

International War Crimes Tribunal Organized by Bertrand Russell Foundation, London, England

The article continues and notes that "every member of Russell's handpicked jury is on record as denouncing both the U.S.'s presence in South Vietnam and her conduct of the war there."

In discussing Ralph Schoenman, an American citizen, described as doing the planning work for the tribunal in London, Mr Goulden describes him as having a "hatred for the U.S. that approaches the paranoid."

In connection with Russell Stetler, Jr., who is associated with the Russell Peace Foundation in New York, Mr Goulden describes him as an individual "who lost a Board of Education scholarship to Haverford College because of his activities as a Vietcong propagandist and fund-raiser at area schools."

The "New York Daily News," a New York City daily newspaper, in its issue dated April 30, 1967, datelined Stockholm,
April 29, contained an article entitled, "War Crimes Trial Opens
in Stockholm." This article stated, "British philosopher
Bertrand Russell began his International 'War Crimes' Tribunal
on Vietnam today with a recorded statement likening America's
actions in Vietnam with Nazi actions in World War II."

"The New York Times," in its issue dated May 11, 1967, on page six, under caption "Tribunal Finds U.S. Guilty in War," datelined Stockholmn, May 10, reported as follows: "Earl Russell's so-called International War Crimes Tribunal gave as its opinion today that the United States was guilty of the crimes of aggression and 'widespread, deliberate and systematic' bombardment of civilian targets in Vietnam."

On November 21, 1967, "The New York Times" carried an article indicating that a second session of the International War Crimes Tribunal convened that date at Roskilde, Denmark. Bertrand Russell was quoted as citing the purpose of this session as being the examination of "the extent to which America is already guilty of genocide" in Vietnam.



Her sister is Mrs. Judith Cohen, manager of the Lahaina Liberty House and the wife of Wailuku stockbroker Morris Cohen. Her parents, after numerous business and pleasure trips, settled in Honolulu a year ago. Sontag heads Nat Sontag & Associates, a marketing consulting and promotion firm.

VOGUE HAS proclaimed Susan Sontag One of the most celebrated intellec tuals in America." The New York Times has described her as a "super-intellectual." To Time magazine the is "the dark lady of the timed-in."

As an indication of the sort of crowd in which Miss Sontag might be found, columnist William F. Buckley Jr. once wrote of a famous party given by author Truman Capote:

"'Norman Mailer was there. And to back him was there was Arthur Schlesing ger, the redoubtable Galbraith, Walter Lippman, Drew Pearson, Norman Podhoretz - only Susan Sontag was missing."

Miss Sontag has written four books that few people have read and has directed two movies that few people have seen. But that's the way she likes it; she has said she writes only for "my close friends and other writers I respect" and she disdains money.

THAT LATTER trait is possibly the hardest for her father, a businessman, to understand, although he is woud of her independence. 'She'd rather write a \$50.

article for the Saturday Rewlow than a \$2,500 article for Esquire," Sontag said. "Esquire once offered her \$1,000 a week, for anywhere between five and eight weeks - and with first class accommodations all the way - to go to Europe to write a story about the Jet Set.

"Susan told them, 'Why don't you get a hack writer?'

"I asked her, 'How can you pass up eight grand?' "She told me, 'Dad, I made up my mind as a child never to do anything that 'wouldn't further my career, whatever that was going to be. This would just be eight weeks wasted."

From the time she was born I knew this was point to be a very special person." Mrs. Sontag said of her daughter.

BY THE TIME Susar E was 14, her high school principal in Sherman Oaks. Calif., told the Sontags that she already had read more books than her English teacher and that she was so advanced that school was doing her little good. Although they were dubious, the Sontags allowed Susan to graduate at 15.

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She whiled away one semester at the University of California at Berkeley, but was unimpressed. At 16 she entered the University of Chicago, graduating with a bachelor's degree after. three semesters.

Married at 17 to sociology professor Philipprieff, she ranved to the East Coast and at 18 was an instructor at the University of Connecticut. She was said to be the youngest university. teacher in the country.

Now, at 37, she is a broodlingly beautiful woman whose picture recently appeared on the front page of the New York Times along with Jean-Paul Sartre and Alberto Moravia as they and some 60 other international intellectuals criticized Fidel Castro's Cut an revolution.

ONE WRITER has said of Susan: "If there were any justice in this world. Susan Sontag would be ugly, or at least plain. No girl that good-looking has any right to have all those brains."

"As she was growing up," her father said, "she never was aware that she was beautiful or that she was brighter than other people. As for her brilliance, she thought only that she had a photographic memory that helped her."

Susan never was a "problem child," according to her parents, and she was given free rein while growing up. "I thought that anyone who was bright should do as she damn pleased," her mother said.

AS A CHILD, when she wasn't reading, Susan was at the movies. Anyone who remembers the movies of the 1940s will agree that few of them were conducive to genius, but this exposure to the film medium laid the grandwork for some of Susan's earliest professional writing and for her most recent career.

She has been a movie critic for the more literate magazines and more recently wrote, cast, produced and directed two avant garde films made in Sweden - "Duet for Cannibals" and "Brother Carl,"

Divorced in 1957, Susan supported herself by teaching philosophy at Columbia University while writing her first book, a novel called "The Benefactor" published in 1963 by Farrar, Straus & Co. It won critical acclaim. if few readers.

HER SECOND book, a collection of essays called

"Against Interpretation," was published in 1966, on her 33rd birthday, by Farrar, Straus & Giroux. The title came from her opinion that the critic's function is to show what art is, not what it means. In other words, she was against interpretation in criticism.

It was in "Against Interpretation" that Susan used the word "camp" to describe what she called "the good taste of bad taste". that is the enjoyment of old movies, comic magazines and other pop art forms of the 1920s, '30s and '40s simply because they were so bad that they were fun.
The word 'camp' caught

on and-much to Susan's dismay, because she wasn't looking for popularity with the masses-has become part of the vocabulary of hundreds of thousands of people who never have read her.

Sucen has not attempted to play the role of the celebrity, even if such exposure might help sell a few more books. Her publisher, Roger Straus Jr., has said of her: "Susan doesn't want her life exploited, and I don't blame her."

SUSAN LIVES in near-seclusion with her 18-year-old son, David Rieff, in an apartment on New York's Riverside Drive. David has traveled extensively with his mother, including trips to Cuba and Europe, and frequently is her escort.

In one of her rare interviews, Susan told a writer for Esquire: "I can't understand why anyone should care whether I eat fried eggs or waffles for breakfast . . . All that matters is my work. Everything that's really important about me is there . . .

"As long as I have solitude and a place to work, and as long as I'm published and have enough money for books and movies and the opera, I'm perfectly content.'

IN 1968 Susan went to North Vietnam, from Sweden, and wrote a 23,000word article called "Trip to Hanoi" for Esquire that later was published as a small paperback. The article was subtitled "Notes on the Enemy Camp" - perhaps by an Esquire editor with a curious sense of humor.

Although avidly against

the war -she once was arrested at a peace rally along with Dr. Benjamin Spock - Susan did not endear herself to the radicals who identify with the North Vietnamese with her "Trip to Hanoi" article. She told the North Vietnamese she wouldn't stay in their country if she was forced to go only on government-guided tours, and went out on her

While finding the North Vietnamese courageous, like the long-suffering Jews from whom she sprung, she reached the conclusion: "... Perhaps there isn't much an American radical can learn from the Vietnamese revolution, because the Vietnamese themselves are too alien, in contrast to the considerable amount I think one can learn from the Cuban revolution, because — especially from this perspective, the Cubans

are pretty much like us...
There is clearly the feeling (in North Vietnam) that certain people are more important or valuable than others and deserve a bigger share of the pitifully

few comforts available."

AFTER SUSAN dined with North Vietnamese dignitaries who ate several varieties of meat and fish she noted that "99 per cent of the Vietnamese will have rice and bean curd for dinner tonight and are lucky to eat meat or fish once a month."

Susan also was an early supporter of Fidel Castro, but recently condemned his revolutionary government for oppressing Cuba's intellectuals.

"I was thrilled that she could have a point of view and then change it," Mrs. Sontag said of her daughter. "That's a mark of maturity."

HAVE SUSAN'S liberal views affected her parents? Her mother has been a lifelong Democrat; her father describes himself as "a rock-ribbed Pennsylvania Republican who hasn't found a Republican I could vote for in the past few years."

Sontag is an Air Force

veteran, and he said of his views on the war:


"I was as hawkish as could be. The men in Washington were the only ones qualified to make the decisions, I believed.

"Now I've changed. I see no point to a silly, sense ess war. We are no longer the economic power we thought we were—and we can lay that to the doorstep of Vietnam."


