News story #2 Racial murder in Kansas (1:29)

Setting the Scene

Gun laws are very different in the United States than they are in Canada. Between different states in the US, the laws differ. In the state of Kansas, no background checks are done before a person buys a gun. Also, by law, people are allowed to carry a gun openly or hidden, without having a permit. If a gun is made in Kansas, it does not need to be registered. Canada has much stricter laws about guns, and it is not common for people to own guns. Death by shooting is many times higher in the United States than it is in Canada.

Setting the Scene

Story 1	The Carson family bungalow was once filled with the laughter of children. The family of five lived in the village of Amisk in east central Alberta. Now all of them are gone. The first one lost was Savanah Leigh-Ann, who was born with severe disabilities. She died last April at age 15. Then last Monday evening, the rest of the family was taken in an instant. Tim Carson, his wife, Michelle, their 12 year old daughter, Niki and their 9 year old son, Shawn, all died at the scene of a head-on collision. A 21-year-old man who grew up down the street from the family was behind the wheel of the oncoming SUV that struck the Carsons' car. He also died in the fiery crash. "It's hard enough to know you've lost a friend," said Tim's sister, Carol Shuttleworth, "But when the whole family is gone, I'm in shock still."	0:14
Story 2	A man has been charged with murder and attempted murder after firing into a crowded bar in Kansas City, Kansas. One man was killed and two others were wounded. Some witnesses said the attack was racially motivated. A bartender said that Adam Purinton used "racial slurs" before he started shooting. Other witnesses said that Purinton, 51, yelled "get out of my country" before he opened fire. 32 year old Srinivas Kuchibhotla died in hospital. Alok Madasani, 32, and Ian Grillot, 24, were hospitalized and are in stable condition.	1:29
Story 3	Construction of the new Whitemud Equine Centre is on target and it should open for programs this fall. The new indoor riding arena is 60 per cent complete, according to Diane David, executive director of the Whitemud Equine Learning Centre Association. The centre replaces the current building, which was once a World War II airplane hangar rebuilt in the river valley almost 60 years ago. David says the main thing is that it doubles its capacity. The fact the arena is indoors also means the centre will be able to run small shows in the winter. The old arena will be demolished once the new facility opens, which means the association can continue offering its programs throughout construction. Among the programs offered is the Little Bits Therapeutic Riding Association program, which provides horseback riding for 125 children and adults with disabilities.	2:22
