Spoiler: author doesn't rhink schools should reopen, but when they do please take these precautions.

This information was posted by an ICU nurse to provide information for teachers, paras and staff when schools reopen face to face.

"I am totally preparing to get infected this fall" is what I hear teachers saying right now, and I don't blame them. It actually makes me a bit sick to my stomach, because it's the same thought myself and all my coworkers have had since March, and I wouldn't wish that dread on anyone.

If you return to school this fall or when you return you will be met with an abundance of anxieties, "what ifs," overwhelming and likely daily policy changes, "you've been exposed" phone calls, and just some general distracting PPE discomforts. I'm hoping I can help you minimize some of those worries before you return so you could maybe feel more prepared and able to focus your energy on teaching your kids.

Before covid patients began swarming our ICU, masking became a requirement, and it was a challenge, even for healthcare workers who regularly wear PPE. So I can only imagine how challenging it will be for school staff and students to adjust to constant masking. Then when covid arrived It was also incredibly difficult and distracting to try to ignore the fact that the virus was on us. So I followed a routine of things during and after my shift that would make me feel as comfortable as possible, allowing me to stay focused on treating the patients, rather than being distracted with worry about getting infected.

1. Stop bringing your shoes from work into the house. I changed my sneakers before and after my shift, at my car in the parking lot and put them in my trunk in a shoe box size Rubbermaid container. They barely saw the light of day. Or at least keep them in a designated closet. Don't walk around your house with them on.

2. Keep an area in your car as a dirty area (I use my trunk). Do the same in your house, a closet or laundry room. Throw your work clothes right into the wash and then shower when you get home.

3. Get some eye protection! If you wear contacts. Start wearing your glasses. If you don't wear prescription glasses, get some fakes. Blue light blocking glasses are all the rage. Get some. Keeps the covid out, supposedly helps with blue light \uDB3E\uDD37\uDB3C\uDFFBQwin win. They also decrease the amount of times you'll touch your eyes. Especially for the 2nd grade and under teachers, where kids aren't required to wear masks. If you're going to wear a face shield put a name tag on it. I had a hard time recognizing people I've worked with for almost 20yrs.

4. Take your vitamins. Multivit, C, zinc, D3, B12, probiotic.

5. Get some head bands with buttons to hook your mask ear loops on. Your ears will thank you!

6. Don't touch the front of your mask. When you take it off to eat or drink grab the ear loops and put it face down into a bag or Tupperware container. Wash your hands before and after touching it.

7. Facial wipes are your friend. Wiping your face every few hours when you get a break from your mask will be the best part of your day, I promise.

8. If you don't already, keep some bleach wipes and hand sanitizer in your car. Wipe your keys, ID badge, watch and phone down. Keep as much as you can in your trunk, bring as few things as possible into your house.

9. Ask questions! Ask your administrators, coworkers, school nurse, me! You deserve answers. We're dealing with a nasty novel virus. There are no stupid questions and chances are someone else is wondering the same thing.

10. Get a group text going with your most trusted teacher friends. So you can support each other through this. Share what works for you in your classroom with them. Share your anger, your fear, your sadness. Also share inappropriate memes that you'd otherwise get fired for posting on social media. Try to find the humor in whatever you can, I can't stress enough how important it is to laugh. This group text will be your best therapy, and talking to people who understand exactly what you're going through will be invaluable.

11. Sleep.

12. Peanut M&Ms pair well with red wine and shots of fireball.

All this being said, I'd like to make it abundantly clear that I disagree with schools reopening at this time. There is no vaccine, no clear treatments and data surrounding kids contracting and transmitting the virus is minimal at best. Teachers and students are not guinea pigs, but I'm trying my best to stay positive for you guys and help out in anyway I can. I truly hope and pray that I'm wrong about what I think will happen when schools reopen this fall. I'm thinking of you all daily.

I stay home, and if on the street, wear mask, latex gloves, stay at least 10-15 ft from these "Covid-Idiots"!





What you need to know about... Business guidance updates

Updates to Modified Phase 1 county regulations (Benton, Franklin and Yakima counties)

Counties operating under Modified Phase 1 status have unique rules for business activity. <u>Benton</u>, <u>Franklin</u> and <u>Yakima</u> counties had recent

adjustments, including but not limited to indoor retail capacity, curbside library services and some pools being able to reopen. Please note that <u>Chelan and Douglas</u> counties have slightly different requirements as a result of its Modified Phase 1 application. Refer to each county's COVID-19 webpage for specific local details

Amended indoor fitness, pool regulations now in effect


Recent updates to <u>indoor fitness</u> guidance took effect on Aug. 10. Guidance is now consistent across Phases 2 and 3, face coverings are required except during strenuous exercise, and social distancing is defined as 300 square feet per person. <u>Pools</u> are also permitted to operate (with restrictions) in all Safe Start Phases, with the exception of some Modified Phase 1 counties. A new <u>FAQ document</u> illustrates how new regulations may affect common activities at fitness centers.

Under the new rules, unstaffed fitness facilities are no longer permitted to operate. Examples might include HOA or hotel pools or gyms. At least one employee must monitor the facility for its operation to be lawful.

What you need to know about... Unemployment and Work Search

Presidential Memorandum under assessment; effects not yet certain.

On Aug. 8, the Trump Administration issued a <u>memorandum</u> that referenced a program for lost wage assistance to eligible claimants. Washington state is assessing the Presidential Memorandum.

When additional information is available, the Employment Security Department (ESD) will communicate with claimants through its <u>website</u>, <u>social media</u> and direct claimant communications. ESD phone support specialists are not able to advise callers on this issue - the department discourages phone inquiries on the topic to maintain focus on claims

Services available to help Washingtonians return to work

The Employment Security Department (ESD) and workforce partners host a number of resources for workers and businesses. Unemployment and reemployment services, information on job and training opportunities and resources to maintain a skilled workforce can be found on ESD's <u>Return to</u> <u>Work</u> page.

Job search requirement remains suspended through Sept. 1

The job search requirement for unemployment benefit claimants remains suspended through Sept. 1. Claimants may continue to answer "no" to the job search question on weekly claims until the suspension is lifted.

What you need to know about... Small business relief funding

Economic Injury Disaster Loans (EIDLs) still available

The Small Business Administration's <u>EIDL program</u> offers relief to businesses experiencing a temporary loss in revenue due to COVID-19. Borrowed EIDL funds may be used to cover a variety of operational and capital expenses. EIDL terms propose a modest 3.75% interest rate for small businesses and a 2.75% rate for nonprofits with a 30-year maturity and automatic one-year deferment period before monthly payments must begin. These flexible and low-interest loans are available to a variety of <u>eligible</u> small businesses.

The Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) application deadline has elapsed

The Paycheck Protection Program application deadline elapsed on Aug. 8. The Small Business Administration (SBA) is no longer accepting applications from participating lenders. Applicants that successfully filed for loans before the deadline may wish to review SBA's <u>PPP Loan Forgiveness</u> FAQ document for instruction on management of potentially-forgivable borrowed funds.

SBA Bridge Loans, Debt Relief still available to small businesses

The Small Business Administration (SBA) continues to offer <u>bridge loans</u> to businesses currently partnered with an SBA Express Lender for quick access to up to \$25,000. The <u>SBA Debt Relief</u> program will cover six months of principal, interest, and fees for all 7(a), 504 and Microloans in regular servicing or issued through Sept. 27.


Mask exceptions and common questions detailed on L&I website

Safe Start requirements compliance

The Safe Start plan requires a number of new safety measures of most Washington businesses based on the phase of your county. Should the state receive a complaint about a business, the first contact will always be a simple notice and an offer of education from L&I. If the business continues to knowingly operate putting employees and customers at a health risk, that may culminate in a "willful general citation" like those assessed upon illegally-operating fitness centers.

Friends,

If you've been regularly reading these updates, you know we here at Civic Ventures have been relentless in our calls for immediate, impactful, and inclusive policies that meet the scale of this problem.

Thinking big, and acting accordingly, is the only way out of this economic downturn. With that in mind, we wanted to direct your attention to <u>the Roosevelt Institute's True New Deal for the COVID-19 Era</u>, a suite of nine proposals that would help us recover from coronavirus and also close the yawning inequality gap that left us so vulnerable to this economic crisis in the first place.

Here's an excerpt from their report:

A True New Deal for the COVID-19 Era outlines nine essential policy proposals that would address our current crisis, rebalance power in our economy, and build the institutions necessary to seed lasting, equitable change:

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canceling student, housing, and medical debts—and implementing structural change to address the accumulation of debt;

- creating a federal jobs guarantee;
- federalizing and expanding unemployment insurance;
- building a modern Reconstruction Finance Corporation;
- guaranteeing universal childcare;
- mandating sectoral bargaining;
- ensuring corporate accountability through federal chartering;
- reinvigorating antitrust law for real trust-busting; and
- rebalancing political power through institutional reform.

Not every policy on this list is awesome, desirable or practical, but that's not the point. You've got to admire

the Roosevelt Institute putting these bold ideas out there and challenging others to do the same. It's easy to stick your head in the sand or wait on an unlikely cavalry, but it's much harder to stand up and announce what you believe in. Good on the Roosevelt Institute for doing just that. If we are going to get out of this mess, we have to start debating how best to do it. This is a good start.

Washington unemployment insurance claims for the week of August 2-8:


- 22,140 Washington workers filed new unemployment insurance claims.
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10,841 workers filed **new Pandemic Unemployment Assistance and Pandemic Emergency Unemployment Compensation claims**, which are set to end this month without Congressional reapproval.


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2,338,445 initial claims have been filed since the start of the pandemic from 1,295,080 unique individuals.




<u>New federal unemployment claims</u> last week dropped below 1 million for the first time since March. 963,000 Amerians applied for new jobless benefits last week. This is still larger than any week in the entire Great Recession and the largest one week of claims in almost 40 years.

According to an <u>analysis by EPI</u>, there is an eye-popping 29.7 Million workers on unemployment -- roughly 1 of every 5 workers in the country.



Another unemployment wave is coming, and it is entirely preventable. Multiple studies - including from JPMorgan Chase - have shown that the \$600 a week extra benefit was the single most important intervention propping up the economy. Why? Because people are the economy and the more money they have the better the economy does. It's not rocket science; **boosting consumer spending at a time of intense economic uncertainty is good for the economy**. Sadly, Republicans in Washington, DC just don't get it. They **failed to extend benefits and now we're looking at a double-dip crisis**.

<u>Heather Long reports in the Washington Post on new data that shows "The recession is largely</u> over for the rich. The working class remain in deep pain." The data confirms what many have suspected: it's not a V-shaped recovery; it's a K-shaped recovery. The people at the top have recovered quickly climbing the arm of the K while everyone else is still on the downslope sliding down the leg of the K.



The Roosevelt Institute has released a new report that should be a must-read for policymakers and thought leaders - "A True New Deal for the COVID-19 Era." If you don't have time to read the report, at least check out the bullets at the top. It's a lot of stuff we've been talking about in these memos.

America isn't the only nation that's fumbling the economic response to the coronavirus pandemic. <u>Great Britain's economy contracted</u> by 59.9% in the second quarter of 2020, which is far, far worse than the US's second-quarter GDP of 32.9%

Another day, another complete failure from the executive branch to manage the coronavirus pandemic. This time, <u>a story in the New York Times outlines</u> "How Trump's Push to Reopen Schools Backfired." It's a little breathtaking to read Trump's energetic drive to do exactly the wrong thing—reopening schools—at exactly the wrong time—in the middle of a spike in coronavirus infection numbers.

At a time when landlords can't evict tenants for failure to pay rent, some landlords are being taken to court by hedge funds and private equity firms are taking landlords to court for failure to pay, reports Matthew Goldstein at the New York Times. "These cases have been initiated by a type of lender that is driven largely by narrow financial interests, but real estate lawyers and lenders expect foreclosure proceedings to become more widespread the longer commercial tenants fail to keep up with the monthly rent checks. Given that a full economic recovery from the pandemic is probably years in the making, things could get much uglier in the commercial real estate market before they improve."

The coronavirus pandemic is rivaling the 1918 flu epidemic in terms of global fatalities, experts say.

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Many have been frustrated by the way that public health guidelines and recommendations have changed over the course of the pandemic—you see a lot of mask skeptics, for instance, arguing that at one time we were told not to wear masks. But the fact is that we're watching public health experts learn about coronavirus in real time, and changing their message accordingly. With that in mind, <u>L</u> wanted to pass on the latest CDC information on masks, which says those supposedly "high-tech" vents in masks do absolutely nothing to stop community spread of coronavirus. If you have those ventilated masks as a part of your daily rotation, please consider making a change.

We can't recover our economy until we beat COVID, <u>Boston Fed President Eric Rosengren warns</u>, and the longer we flounder in our public health response the worse this economic crisis will get. In fact, we can see in the data now that states that lifted COVID restrictions too soon actually hurt their economies.

FP Analytics released a new <u>COVID-19 Global Response index</u>, rating countries on their response to suppressing the pandemic and the spread of the virus within their own countries. **The U.S. ranked 31st out of 36 countries.** New Zealand topped the list.

Local Reaction to the Crisis

In <u>an oped for *The Seattle Times*</u>, United Way of King County CEO Gordon McHenry writes the \$600 weekly federal unemployment benefits were a last line of defense for countless low-income workers and families who have lost their jobs, and are now on the precipice of losing their homes. **People need help - in fact, it's the only way to stabilize our economy - and cutting aid or reducing benefits at the federal or state level will only make this crisis worse.**


Seattle announced on Wednesday that the entirety of the housing levy fund—some 60 million dollars—will be put toward housing the homeless due to COVID-19. Sydney Brownstone at the Seattle Times notes that this is "the most the city has ever spent in a single year on permanent supportive housing."

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At Crosscut, Jane C. Hu profiles a northern Washington town on the border of Canada in which routine border crossings used to be a part of daily life. "since officials restricted crossborder travel in March, Point Roberts' roughly 1,000 full-time residents find themselves unexpectedly isolated, estranged from their usual lifestyle. Now, the invisible line dividing the two countries stands in the way of what was once an easy drive, and after four months of the pandemic, people on the Point miss the things they used to take for granted."

The ripple effects of Boeing's woes intensify. The Seattle Times reports: <u>Almost 600 to be laid</u> off as Kent aerospace supplier shuts plant.



We also wanted to share with you some recent polling.

From *Navigator Research*: two-thirds of Americans still support restoring the \$600 a week unemployment benefits.



Also from *Navigator*, a majority of Americans - including 47 percent of Republicans - are more worried about the U.S. rolling out an untested COVID vaccine too early than they are about developing a well-tested vaccine too slowly.

Closing Thoughts

This week <u>Mitch McConnell adjourned the US Senate until September 8th</u>, without any relief deal in place. Even though this week's jobless claims dipped below 1 million, we are still facing the largest number of unemployment claims than have been filed in any week in recorded American history before the pandemic. That is to say, it's shockingly huge -- some might even call it yuge. We can't afford to get used to numbers like this.

And now that the \$600-per-week additional unemployment payments have been allowed to expire, the tens of millions of unemployed Americans will be earning pennies on the dollar compared to what they were earning before. They'll have to cut spending drastically. They won't be able to afford next month's rent or mortgage payments. They will be forced to sit out of the economy, making things worse for all of us. That means fewer customers for neighborhood businesses, and more job losses to come.

Without a meaningful economic intervention that meets the scale of the problem—something akin to the policies I discussed in the introduction to this email—this recession could easily turn into a depression.

Be kind. Be brave. Wash your hands. Wear a mask.

Friends,

Those of us who have been working from home for the majority of the year so far are familiar with that creeping sense of deja vu—the feeling that we've done this exact thing before. It doesn't help that our leadership keeps making the same mistakes over and over again. <u>On Wednesday, Donald Trump insisted</u>, as he has multiple times since February, that COVID-19 will "go away...hopefully sooner rather than later." <u>And on Tuesday, Larry Kudlow pronounced with great confidence</u> that "the V-shaped recovery, I think, is still in place." It's startling to see this brutal denial in the face of the greatest economic and public health crisis in living memory.

If you ever doubted that states and cities are on their own in this fight, just look to the eternal *Groundhog Day* playing out in the White House. As I type this, Mnuchin announced that talks have stalled and there is no deal to pass a new stimulus package while Trump tweeted he's going a different way. Meanwhile, Kudlow continued to praise the recovery.

We in states and cities must come up with our own solutions to meet the scale of this problem, because these leaders in the other Washington still refuse to recognize the scale of the problem—let alone deliver solutions.

Here's what we are watching this week:

The Latest on the Impacts of Covid-19

July jobs numbers were <u>released today</u>. The good news: 1.8M jobs were added to the US economy in July. The bad news: the jobs recovery slowed in July after more robust growth in May and June. Three months after more than 20 million jobs were lost—far more jobs than we lost in the Great Recession or dot-com bust—we are not on track for a "V-shaped" or rocketship recovery.

Washington unemployment insurance claims for the week of July 26 - August 1.

24,985 Washington workers filed new unemployment insurance claims.

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11,308 workers filed **new Pandemic Unemployment Assistance and Pandemic Emergency Unemployment Compensation claims**, which are set to end this month without Congressional reapproval.

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There are a total of **620,263 ongoing unemployment benefit claims**, and **2,333,456 initial claims** have been filed **since the start of the pandemic** from **1,287,949 unique individuals**.

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Heather Long writes another must-read piece for the *Washington Post* about the road ahead: **The U.S. economy is on the verge of a 'lost year'**. She reports, "As so much hangs in the balance, the bulk of the federal government aid for small businesses and unemployed has expired. Congress and President Trump have been unable to come to a deal on more relief, adding to the uncertainty. The recovery is <u>stalling on many fronts</u>, and economists warn there's heightened risk of backsliding."

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As I've said before, despite the publicity of the absurd culture war being waged on cable news and social media feeds about whether or not to wear a mask (driven largely by our president and other GOP leaders) a majority of Americans actually support tightening restrictions to stem this recent wave of new infections. In fact, <u>a new NPR/Ipsos poll</u> shows that **76% support a mask mandate** and **almost 60% of Americans support a new, mandatory two-week shelter-at-home order nationwide.**

How did it happen? A combination of blind individualism and a massive failure of leadership, claims a new piece in *The New York Times* titled "The Unique U.S. Failure to Control the Virus."

"US businesses appeared to slow their hiring dramatically in July," <u>the Washington Post</u> reports. This probably reflects what you've seen in your own lived experience—the June flush of "reopening the economy" has faded dramatically as the realization that coronavirus is here for the foreseeable future has sunken in. We might still see some fluctuations in employment numbers over the next few months, but given that there are **over 30 million Americans out of work right now and only about 5 million job openings**, we're not likely to see a lasting employment boom anytime soon.

Barry Ritholtz is one of the best economic explainers in the business, which is why I'm glad <u>he wrote</u> <u>a piece for *Bloomberg Business*</u> identifying why the stock market doesn't seem to care that businesses around the country are closing and tens of millions of people are out of work: "**Department stores may have fallen 62.3%, but on a market-cap basis they are a mere 0.01% of the S&P 500**. Airlines are larger, but not much: They weigh in at 0.18% of the index. The story is the same for travel services, hotel and motel REITs, and resorts and casinos. The market is telling us that these industries just don't matter very much to stock market performance."

<u>Desirée Mullins at the Washington Post makes</u> a great case for the \$600-per-week unemployment benefit. Perhaps unsurprisingly, she makes the case not with graphs and charts, but by explaining

how much of an impact it has had on her own life. "When you don't have to fret about whether you can make your rent or where your next meal is coming from, **you experience life differently**," she writes.

Experts are expecting <u>a wave of business defaults, bankruptcies, and evictions</u> to hit Wall Street soon, sending shockwaves that will change what Main Street looks like forever.

But on a grander scale, that \$600-per-week unemployment benefit seems to have been propping up the economy. <u>Some researchers warn</u> that **if we go a full month without that additional benefit, consumer spending could drop by some 4.3 percent.** This sounds like a small number, but it's in fact a bigger drop than we saw in the entirety of the Great Recession.


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Local Reaction to the Crisis

Paul Roberts at the Seattle Times says that unemployment in Washington state fell by 13.4 percent for the week ending August 1st, which means just shy of 25,000 Washingtonians filed initial claims. "It's probably too early to say whether Washington's dip in claims represents a longer term shift in the state's job market," Roberts writes. "Recent layoffs in the airline industry and other industries suggest some sectors may only just now be reaching the point that retailers and other consumer-facing businesses hit months ago."

Governor Inslee's office, state health officials, and OSPI <u>issued guidance</u> on Wednesday that it's **unsafe for the majority of Washington students to return to in-person school in the fall**. The announcement doesn't mandate school closures, but provides guidance for school districts based on their county's risk, with about half of Washington's counties at "high risk."

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





Closing Thoughts

The pundit-industrial complex is hard at work dissecting the results of Tuesday's Washington State primary election, so I don't feel obligated to add any more to the nuts-and-bolts of the conversation. I would, however, like to point out that in the middle of a pandemic and an economic collapse, Washingtonians are itching to vote. King County's voter participation rate, for instance, is as I write this somewhere around 55 percent. Four years ago, it topped out around 37 percent. The fact that so many of our neighbors are making their voice heard—and the fact that they're doing so without putting themselves at risk for infection from the coronavirus—is at once a testament to the successful vote-by-mail system that we've constructed in this state and also to the eagerness of the people to impact the political environment. It looks like November could very well deliver record numbers of voter participation. This is the best news I've seen in a long while.

Be kind. Be brave. Wash your hands. And wear a mask.

Dear Representatives,

I would like to report a large gathering of people that took place on August 9th, 2020, in Seattle, at the popular Cal Anderson park on Capitol Hill. A large gathering organized and operated by Sean Feucht, a religious leader from California, and his organization *Hold the Line*, of more than 1,000 (one thousand) people began services on 8/9/2020 around 3:00pm, leaving shortly after 7:00pm the same day.

This service was in direct violation of the "Safe Start Plan" issued by Governor Jay Inslee in May of 2020. I am going to quote a passage from the safe start plan that pertains to outdoor religious services:

"Hold outdoor services on the organization's property (or immediately adjacent property if explicitly permitted by the local jurisdiction) with up to 200 individuals, so long as six feet of physical distancing can be achieved between households. Cloth face coverings are required for all participants. Outdoor services may be conducted under an outdoor structure (temporary or permanent) so long as the structure is not walled/enclosed on more than two sides to provide appropriate ventilation."

The gathering that Sean Feucht and his congregation organized was in violation of several permissions granted by Governor Inslee that I will list:

- --[if !supportLists]-->1. <!--[endif]-->This congregation was not administering services on their own property, nor were they on an adjacent property, nor were they granted permission to be on city owned property such as Cal Anderson Park, granted by local jurisdiction.
- --[if !supportLists]-->2. <!--[endif]-->The congregation was far larger than 200 individuals. As mentioned previously a crowd of over 1,000 congregated, directly in violation of the 200-person limit.
- --[if !supportLists]-->3. <!--[endif]-->Various images and videos taken by attendees, media members, bystanders, and passersby show that few attendees, parishioners, or religious leaders, including Mr. Feucht himself, were shown not wearing masks or facial coverings of any kind, while being closer in proximity than 6 feet. Included in this is a community baptism bath that was not cleaned nor sanitized in between baptisms.

As representatives of Washington state, King County, and the City of Seattle, I urge you to look into legal recourse against Mr. Sean Feucht and his organization *Hold the Line*, a political activist movement, for failing to meet the guidelines for religious service required by the State of Washington under the Safe Start Plan. Furthermore, the actions of Mr. Feucht and his religious organization endangered the public health of the state of Washington, King County, and the City of Seattle as they showed no sign of taking precautions to reduce the spread of COVID-19, in an area in which they do not permanently reside. As we learn more about the

health ramifications in the wake of this irresponsible gathering, I ask that charges of manslaughter and public endangerment are brought to Mr. Feucht.

Yesterday at Cal Anderson Park - the very same location where peaceful, masked protestors were met with brutal police force - another rally was held. This rally, however, was in complete violation of many of Governor Inslee's COVID-19 mandates. Most notably, attendees were deliberately unmasked and many were being dunked into a tub of shared water.

Where were the authorities to put a stop to this event? THIS is what feels threatening to my community, not a peaceful protest that is asking for all people to be treated fairly, equally, respectfully and humanely. 

cars and motorcycles continual engines explosions. Where is the noise ordinance and speed violations enforcement.

I noted that Beach Drive is now down to one lane. They also have at the end of Alki Avenue speed bumps. How is it that this was added and not to the straight aways which cause the most disruptions. How is that fair to some residents and not all.

At this time we don't have any protection. Our calls are routed to precincts who can't assist. Fire bombs are every night after 10:30. On a walk I even saw a woman open her car trunk and laying in full view were piles of fireworks cannon style.

The fire pits were removed from Alki Beach did you pass an ordinance that bonfires were not are allowed? No one in the fire and police department has any updated requirements noted from 2017.

What is even worse is the constant drive byes who play their loud music and once again a car almost hit me in the crosswalk today. Green pinto/ford car BOS601688 license plate. He screeched to a halt purposely speeding up to me. Scared my dog to the point I have to medicate her every single day. I can't walk outside after 6:00 pm because it is taken over by people who don't care about disrupting dogs, children, elderly and families who want to have a peaceful time.

So I invite you to come visit Alki during the evenings watch and learn again how disruptive it is to be on this strip. It has become a gathering of people who don't care and parade their loud engines and maximize their cut-off mufflers. Even had car without a hood so that the revving of the engine could be heard in Tacoma.

Do something or give me the tools and the contacts of people who will do something.

- Put speed bumps on all crosswalks
- Put speed controlled signs with cameras for violators -Lynnwood police have this and they have generated money to support their town, school district and more
- Put Noise Ordinance signs up stating the fines and the increase of the fine after the first offense
- With COVID-19 close down a lane 90% of the public not wearing masks and we need the space to walk

Dear Lisa,

Our family has recently moved to West Seattle living on Alki Avenue.

I understand that we are in trying times and appreciate all the support that you are giving to this community, but I did not realize that I was moving to a war zone within our state.

I have lived in the Seattle area for the past 30 years.

Seattle and Alki Avenue have become places at night and even during the day of:

- Gun shots
- Firecracker bombs
- Speeding cars through crosswalks
 - I have been close to being hit every day for the past month
- Speeding electric bikes on walking path
 - They are sometimes going faster than cars
- Speeding motorcycles that are pulling wheelies on our straight away during peak family hours that are walking on the sidewalk
- Drug deals

Noise levels

- Car and motorcycle noise levels during weekends and late nights past the 10:00 ordinance have been every night for past month to the degree I have to sedate our dog every day
- Two nights ago we had gun shots
- Last night and every night we have had fireworks or firecracker Bombs that are louder than a canon shot

I finally called the police and learned three things: 1. They don't have authorization to protect our community

- 2. It has to be a life threatening incident because
- 3. All of our police resources are focused in Seattle

Solutions until Seattle gets sorted out:

- Put in speed bumps at all crosswalks and every 25 35'
- Extend crosswalks across the bike paths so that they now yield to all pedestrians I've seen too many near misses with dogs and small children
- Add signage that shows the fines associated with our noise ordinance and speeding violations
- Tag speeders through cam recorders
 - These funds will then go to the restoring Alki's safety measures
 - You will get at least 50 speeders a day and with a ticket of \$150 that is considerable income to the state/community/schools
- Bridge access has caused considerable problems too and that in itself has been a real disappointment
 - I am getting upcharged by services because of their time in traffic even with less traffic due to COVID-19 stay home rules

Trash and foxtails

- We are lucky to have good people here in West Seattle who pick up trash every morning from people who don't care and don't live here
 - This has become habit forming by those who take advantage of the beach and walkway. Please enforce fines and signage to support this abuse
- Foxtails are deathly to dogs
 - They become knives to their paws
 - When it was finally cut down all the cuttings were left on the walkway

Where are our tax dollars going? How can we become our own city council and have a separate budget from Seattle to protect our neighborhood.

Thank you for contacting us with your concerns about Albert Davis Park and we know that the impacts of unsheltered homelessness can be challenging for neighbors and business owners.

Albert Davis Park is a location the Navigation Team have been engaging regularly over the past few months, and more recently, multiple times a week, providing outreach and littler/debris mitigation. From April 1 to July 8, the Navigation Team made at least 28 site visits. Even still, as you know first-hand, the encampment continues to grow. Therefore, we are implementing plans to engage this site three times a week moving forward.

The Navigation Team has also been in communication with

Councilmember Debora Juarez's office and other City departments to identify ways to minimize the neighborhood impacts from this unauthorized encampment. This work is ongoing.

As you know, starting on March 16, and in response to COVID-19 outbreak, removals of unauthorized encampments by the City of Seattle have been suspended, with exceptions for extreme circumstances. Since refocusing in March, citywide the Navigation Team has made over 500 site visits for outreach, conducted over 600 litter and debris mitigation operations, and made over 440 referrals to shelter.

During these unprecedented times, the Navigation Team continues to monitor conditions on the ground while providing critical outreach in the field to people living unsheltered during the COVID-19 crisis.

Dear Mayor Durkan,

I'm following up regarding the email I sent last week about Albert Davis Park and I've cc'd Tess Colby as I've become aware that she's the Navigation Team's liaison to your office.

The condition of the park continues to grow worse as the weather gets nicer, and today I learned that some of my neighbors who face the park (I'm fortunate to be on the backside of our townhouses and insulated a bit from everything) have witnessed truly worrisome activities in and around the park. On Monday morning, there was a large fight around 4am with a car attempting to run over some people in the middle of the street at 4am. At 6am the same morning, one of my neighbors was awoken by loud music and went outside to ask folks to turn the music down and discovered a car parked in front of our townhouses with a man sleeping in the open trunk and a needle sticking out of his arm.

This is absolutely unacceptable and incredibly unsafe. I understand that there is a pandemic happening and the city is faced with drastic budget changes, specifically regarding the police department and with the Navigation Team at the top of the list. I know that the police are only able to legally do so much and that other organizations that would hopefully receive diverted funding from the police department may be better equipped to handle these issues, but when? I sent emails to your office, all the council members, Council member Juarez, and the SPD Navigation team and

our community officer and SPD has been the only ones to respond. I will again be following up with Council member Juarez along with the other council members today.

I love Lake City and have come to make it my home, but when four of my six neighbors have moved in the past year to escape the turmoil of Albert Davis Park, it doesn't feel like home anymore. The issues at the park have only grown, and I fear they will continue to do so if they're not kept in check.

Can we further discuss these issues and how your office is planning to mitigate them?

Dear Mayor Durkan,

I'm reaching out to share some safety and health concerns I have regarding <u>Albert Davis Park</u>. I bought a townhome in January across the street on 27th Ave NE and prior to moving in, lived just a few blocks away for the past 6 years. I've come to love Lake City and our robust community, but have noticed an increase in destructive behavior in our beloved neighborhood, specifically Albert Davis Park, for quite sometime now and it has only become worse during the pandemic. The encampment in the park has grown significantly during the pandemic, and with it, drug abuse and violence as well. I know that times are hard and that everyone is struggling in their own ways, but I felt like this was a good time to express my concerns because I know that Albert Davis Park has been on your radar because there have been frequent drive-throughs by officers, health services visits, weekly clean up crews, and most recently interns of city council members.

I truly appreciate the efforts that have been put forth by the city, but it's not enough and I don't feel safe in my own neighborhood. I've outlined a few of my concerns below.

- Hypodermic needles littered all over the street, sidewalk, and parking areas along 27th Ave NE between NE 125th St and NE 127th St.
- On multiple occasions, I've witnessed vehicles pulling up to the encampment (often just parking in the middle of the street), get out of their car, enter a tent, stay for a few minutes, and then leave. I'm aware that this is conjecture, but pretty obviously some exchange is taking place.
- I've noticed an uptick in violence as well. Now that it's getting warmer and I'm working from home with my windows open, I've noticed that the fighting and aggressive shouting is nearly constant.
- I've had people knocking on mine and my neighbors doors late at night high as a kite.
- People that I've seen across the street in the encampment frequently wander onto our property aimlessly.
- The other day, I saw a target strapped to a tree and someone using a BB gun for target practice.
- Dumpsters are now across the street, which helps a bit so there's not just trash everywhere, but the bins fill up quickly and people have started dumping all their trash there and then trash ends up still getting all over the street and on our property. Like, piles of wood and and big trash, not

just trash bags.

- The past month at least, there have been a lot more folks living out of their cars parked along the street as well. A few of them have of them have been playing music very loudly at all hours of the night and morning.
- There aren't a lot of sidewalks in our neighborhood to begin with, but the sidewalks that are on 27th in front of the park are now nearly always blocked with debris and garbage and it just doesn't feel safe.
- There's also been a few dogs running around off-leash. I haven't seen them become violent, but they also don't seem to be taken care of.
- I've seen power cords attached to the bottom part of the lightpoles to tap electricty.
- This past week, our mail boxes (on the park side of the street) have been blocked frequently and covered with garbage to where I can't even check my mail and wouldn't be surprised if the mailman isn't even able to deliver it daily.
- Due to the pandemic, I've been doing a lot of walking in my neighborhood, and these issues seem contained to Albert Davis Park. This is evident just looking at property values. A townhome a block away, can sell for \$50,000 more than mine and I can't help but think that part if it is due to our locale.
- Other folks have noticed the activity as well I recently had to go out of town to care for a family
 member who was sick and had someone come by and watch my cats. She said that she felt
 unsafe coming to my home due to the increased activity across the street and starting bringing
 her son along for safety. I also had a social distance walk with a friend and she asked if it was
 safe to park in the street because she noticed the dramatic increase in activity since she had
 visited months prior.

I'm fortunate to live in a townhome that is off the street, but two of my three neighbors with townhomes facing the street are moving because they don't feel that this is a place that they can be safe in anymore. I really hate having to write this email during these unprecedented times with a global pandemic on the rise that's only increasing instability in folks lives' but that's also the reason I'm reaching out. Things have gotten dramatically worse in the past 6 months, I can't help but think that things won't get better unless we act as a community. I've seen some folks in the park wearing masks, but most aren't, so it also makes me concerned for the well-being of folks who are currently experiencing homelessness. I used to walk through the park to catch my bus to work or go to the shops on Lake City and it was a nice park, but the last few weeks of my going to work I stopped walking through the park because it felt increasingly unsafe, especially in the dark hours of the morning. That was just a few months ago, and now it's hard to believe that I ever even walked through there to catch the bus or visit my local coffee shop (Kaffeeklatsch - check it out and get a LCW cookie!).

What is the city doing to mitigate these issues? What are you doing to solve these problems? And, what can I be doing as a community member to keep my neighborhood safe?

Here are the details for the Mayor's office:

2 SO staff members transport and set up speaker, keyboard, chair, and microphone, disinfect everything, and step away. There will be a disposable cover over the microphone that will be discarded after performance.

Singer and pianist arrive separately. Pianist sits at a distance of 10 ft from singer.

Singer sings without mask, facing away from pianist. Pianist will wear mask the whole time. The two will perform outdoors, facing spectators, who will stay in their rooms and listen from their windows/balconies.

Any spectators who chose to come outside will have to wear masks, stay at min 20ft distance of pianist and singer and at 6ft distance

from each other monitored by SO and/or venue staff. So, to be clear: ANY individuals physically present in the area (i.e., SO staff and venue staff, listeners) must stay at least 20 ft away (twice the distance recommended by the governor's memorandum). The same 2 staff members mentioned earlier will measure and mark the perimeter.

The 2 staff members will disinfect keyboard, chair, microphone, and speaker afterward.

Following up on the topic of community serenades here is a detailed description, please let me know if under the conditions described we can proceed with those small serenades:

> Seattle Opera remains resolute in service to our community, even throughout the COVID-19 pandemic. This summer, we are launching Community Serenades, live vocal performances we hope bring healing to some of our most vulnerable neighbors, including isolated senior adults and people experiencing homelessness.

We are focused on communities most in need and are delighted to continue our partnership with Path with Art to present recitals, kicking off the series at Plymouth Housing. Additionally, we are collaborating with retirement communities to entertain older citizens deeply impacted by social isolation due to the pandemic. We hope to extend performances to health care professionals and Seattle-area neighborhoods in the future, as well.

The performances will feature a singer and pianist who will maintain recommended physical distance of 16 – 20 ft from any staff supporting the event. The performances will be amplified to allow residents to listen from the safety of their homes/rooms. 1. <u>Mask giveaway event in Rainier Beach this Thursday:</u> King County is partnering with the City of Seattle to host a free mask giveaway event this Thursday at the Rainier Beach Community

Center. See below for more details:

- a. What: Rainier Beach Mask Distribution Event
- b. Where: Rainier Beach Community Center 8825 Rainier Ave S, Seattle, WA 98118
- c. When: Thursday, August 20th from 1-5pm
- d. **Eligibility:** You must be a King County resident to be eligible to receive masks at this event
- e. **Details**: This is a drive through pick up event. Interested King County residents can enter at the parking lot entrance, drive through to the Amazon Treasure Truck, tell the staff person the number of individuals in their household, and receive 2 cloth reusable masks per household member, up to 6 household members. The maximum number of masks a car can receive is 12.

- This week's statewide report highlights COVID-19 cases are plateauing: Washington State Department of Health issues their latest <u>statewide situation report</u>, which analyzed data up to July 31, reflects the *flattening of new case counts* in most counties in western and eastern Washington. Report findings include:
 - a. The reproductive number is hovering around one. The best estimate of the reproductive number (the estimated number of new people each COVID-19 patient will infect) in western WA was likely between 0.79 and 1.15 on July 26, with a best estimate of 0.97. In eastern WA, the best estimate on July 25 was likely between 0.82 and 1.13, with a best estimate of 0.98. The goal is a reproductive number well below one, which would mean the number of people getting COVID-19 is declining.
 - b. We're starting to see the impacts of people using face coverings across the state. This report suggests that reductions in the reproductive number are attributable to statewide policy changes like the June 23 and July 7 mask mandates and pausing county movement with the Safe Start plan.
 - c. Case counts are plateauing or declining across age groups in King and Yakima counties.

In King County, we still need to be vigilant. Positive cases have been <u>relatively stable since</u> <u>July 20th</u> – our 7 day moving average has been about 130 daily cases for the last 10 days. Our target is to be less than 40 positive cases per day in King County. But we know what to do to keep the trend moving downward again – stay home if you can, and <u>wear a cloth face</u> <u>covering</u> in indoor public spaces, and outdoors when unable to stay 6 feet apart from others.

3. **Proper Face Covering Wear:** We know that wearing masks are one of the easiest and best strategies we have that can reduce the spread of the COVID-19 virus. Masks are safe and have been proven effective according to numerous recent studies. But change can be difficult, and many in our communities still resist this practice that needs to become routine for all of us. Here are some tips and tricks from DOH for wearing cloth face coverings that includes FAQs about safety, comfort, and other topics. King County has also put together some great information and very helpful posters on mask dos-and-don'ts for schools and other public places where mask use is required. These are available in many languages with more being added routinely. Please share these resources widely with stakeholders in your community.

- 4. School Reopening: We have been reminded this week that August is here as high temperatures make us uncomfortable while causing blackouts, fires, and health concerns throughout large swaths of the west coast. August also usually reminds us that school is soon to reopen. But in 2020, we know that things will be very different. On Friday, the Washington State Department of Health (DOH) and Public Health Seattle & King County released a new report by the Institute for Disease Modeling (IDM) that measures the tradeoffs between minimizing COVID-19 related health risks and maximizing educational benefits for students when Washington's K-12 schools resume instruction. While the educational benefits of inperson learning are well established, the report shows there are still significant risks associated with returning to in-person instruction. The report modeled the health risks of resuming in-person instruction assuming a slowly declining epidemic ("R0" = 0.9 effective rate) and using three hypothetical COVID-19 incidence scenarios:
 - a. A low incidence of 20 cases per 100,000 residents in the 14 days prior to school reopening (20/100,000),
 - b. A medium incidence of 50/100,000, and
 - c. A high incidence of 110/100,000.

These scenarios correspond to the low-, medium- and high risk scenarios outlined in the <u>Decision Tree framework</u> for schools released by DOH last week. DOH's <u>press release</u> outlines key takeaways from the report. The full media briefing is available on <u>TVW</u>.

Hello Jeff,

There is an event on August 9th at the Alki Beach Park in Seattle that I think you might appreciate being made aware of, if you aren't already aware of it. This

upcoming event I believe is of serious public health concern for the Seattle area. The musical/religious revival event at Alki beach Park is funded and organized by Sean Feucht, and you can find various videos on his Facebook page of recent events he has held in several cities here in California.

His events have been extremely large (sometimes several thousand people in attendance) with people traveling long distances to attend, including people coming from COVID hot zones. It is a rare sight to see a mask wearer among the tightly packed throng. They sing, dance, shout, hug, do hands-on water baptisms, etc. This week he is having events in Arkansas, Oklahoma, and Texas.

To give you some background, Sean Feucht is a volunteer leader and member of the Redding Bethel church. Many of the people who attend this church have what I consider to be rather unusual beliefs. Normally guite harmless. But the dangerous and most commonly held beliefs in this age of COVID-19 are that one only needs God's protection and perhaps some vitamin D to stay safe from contracting the virus, or that the virus is just an elaborate hoax. Either way, they feel no need to social distance in any way. They completely discredit advice from public health experts and consider these experts to be either misquided souls or evil messengers. They believe that wearing a mask provides no protection, and that the idea of wearing one is yet another hoax designed to oppress and make them do something they think is completely unnecessary and something they simply don't want to do. Like brandishing a weapon, they use religious freedom as afforded to them in the constitution to get away with this dangerous disregard for public health in the middle of a pandemic. Now that you know this background, it should come as no surprise to you that he and his organizers are not getting permits or approvals from public health agencies prior to their very large gatherings, or they routinely lie to the agencies to get approvals to use public lands but then simply ignore or defy any stipulations they are given. They have systematically run afoul of those agencies and continue to break public health guidelines in every city they have held an event. They offer free face masks and hand sanitizer, but then act in total defiance of the public health standards and behave more like rebels than Christians. They appear to actually flaunt the fact that they are not practicing any social distancing whatsoever.

I get the impression that Sean Feucht is someone who is capitalizing on these challenging times we are in. He speaks of religious oppression over COVID shutdown orders. He believes his "new Jesus people movement" will sweep across this entire country. He has ambitious political aspirations.

So he and his very large and enthusiastic throng of followers are right now a serious public health threat to entire communities.

So far no one has managed to reign in the situation, and so this total defiance has continued unabated. People on his Facebook page are posting comments and railing about it, as many are mortified by his events and their brazen disregard for public health and disregard to their community. But all that anger and railing has made no effect.

I live near Redding, California where one such event recently occurred at the Sundial bridge. You can easily find the news coverage about this event online because it received nationwide news attention. The City of Redding public health department was horrified once they got wind of the event, the size of it, and the fact there was absolutely no social distancing. This is when I actively became involved in viewing and making comments on Sean Feucht's Facebook page. I also contacted Redding

Bethel church to complain, but they neatly distanced themselves from it even though rumor has it that they help him with flier printing, distribution, etc. for his events. I wrote to the Redding City counsel person, but a lot of good that did. She is a valued member of that very same Bethel church.

So I am trying to do what I can by warning others in these various cities he is traveling to and giving them the "heads-up".

I do hope you or someone you know can somehow stop or thwart this assault on the Seattle area. I am very angered that they are getting away with threatening entire communities in this manner while the rest of us make deep personal sacrifices to keep COVID cases down so that our children can safely return to school and businesses can remain open and we might be able to someday soon enjoy some version of normal again. It feels so deeply wrong on so many levels what they are getting away with.

If you are not the appropriate person I need to channel this information to, please email me back and let me know the proper person(s). Or please feel free to forward or share this with any interested or "need to know" party or provide me with some ideas on who else to contact. I really appreciate that.

At this time we don't have any protection. Our calls are routed to precincts who can't assist. Fire bombs are every night after 10:30. On a walk I even saw a woman open her car trunk and laying in full view were piles of fireworks cannon style. The fire pits were removed from Alki Beach did you pass an ordinance that bonfires were not are allowed? No one in the fire and police department has any updated requirements noted from 2017.

What is even worse is the constant drive byes who play their loud music and once again a car almost hit me in the crosswalk today. Green pinto/ford car BOS601688 license plate. He screeched to a halt purposely speeding up to me. Scared my dog to the point I have to medicate her every single day. I can't walk outside after 6:00 pm because it is taken over by people who don't care about disrupting dogs, children, elderly and families who want to have a peaceful time.

So I invite you to come visit Alki during the evenings watch and learn again how disruptive it is to be on this strip. It has become a gathering of people who don't care and parade their loud engines and maximize their cut-off mufflers. - Gun shots
- Firecracker bombs
- Speeding cars through crosswalks
 I have been close to being hit every day for the past month
- Speeding electric bikes on walking path
 - They are sometimes going faster than cars
- Speeding motorcycles that are pulling wheelies on our straight away during peak family hours that are walking on the sidewalk
- Drug deals

Noise levels

- Car and motorcycle noise levels during weekends and late nights past the 10:00 ordinance have been every night for past month to the degree I have to sedate our dog every day
- Two nights ago we had gun shots
- Last night and every night we have had fireworks or firecracker Bombs that are louder than a canon shot

I finally called the police and learned three things:

1. They don't have authorization to protect

our community 2. It has to be a life threatening incident because 3. All of our police resources are focused in Seattle

Solutions until Seattle gets sorted out:

- Put in speed bumps at all crosswalks and every 25 35'
- Extend crosswalks across the bike paths so that they now yield to all pedestrians I've seen too many near misses with dogs and small children
- Add signage that shows the fines associated with our noise ordinance and speeding violations
- Tag speeders through cam recorders
 - These funds will then go to the restoring Alki's safety measures
 - You will get at least 50 speeders a day and with a ticket of \$150 that is considerable income to the state/community/schools
- Bridge access has caused considerable problems too and that in itself has been a real disappointment
 - I am getting upcharged by services because of their time in traffic even with less traffic due to COVID-19 stay home rules

Trash and foxtails

- We are lucky to have good people here in West Seattle who pick up trash every morning from people who don't care and don't live here

Dear Councilpersons Herbold, Morales, Sawant, Pederson, Juarez, Strauss, Lewis, Mosqueda, and Gonzalez:

I am strongly opposed to defunding the Seattle Police Department (SPD). I am strongly in favor of improving and reforming Seattle Police Department to ensure there is no biased policing or unwarranted tactics employed for ensuring orderly conduct of protesters. Defunding the SPD is irresponsible and will put all Seattle residents and community at threat. Improving and reforming the SPD will take resources and it will take strong action on personnel to ensure getting a police force that represents the values and population of the City. That can not happen without funding. I do not want public safety sacrifice in the name of reforming the SPD.

I am strongly opposed to the Council's silence on the demonstrations at the homes of the Mayor, Superintendent of Police, and several councilpersons. To me it is no different from the way the Republican Congresspeople remain silent in the face of many of Trump's egregious actions. As a City, Seattle is loosing all sense of civility; I believe in peaceful public protest, but I don't believe in harassment, bullying, and defiance of civil responsibility. From your statements, and silence you are sending the message that you support such behavior. The City Council is responsible for leadership and civil discourse, solving the problems facing Seattle, and balancing the needs of all Seattle residents. I don't believe as a Council you've demonstrated you know what your roles are.

While reform of the SPD is important, it is not the top priority for the Council to be addressing. Greater problems that desperately needs the Council's attention and efforts include:

- addressing COVID pandemic (such as constant messaging on wearing masks, etc; reinforcing the Governor's and Public Health Seattle & King County rules, warnings, and messages);
- addressing the needs of disadvantage children to ensure they are able to fully participate under a remote learning environment (such as badgering Comcast and Centurylink to make sure low income households have adequate and reduced or free internet connection, setting up teams able to provide tech support to help students of non-english speaking households to use remote learning platforms)
- addressing homelessness - get the homeless out of parks, school grounds, playgrounds, and neighborhoods and into shelters now. There are plenty of empty buildings in Seattle, including the convention center, empty parking lots like the ones at the ballparks. As a Council you are enabling the spread of homeless encampments everywhere. You've cowed the SPD from taking action, but you've left a vacuum in their place and it has gotten so far out of hand it's horrendous.
- addressing mental health and addiction.

These are the issues and problems that are desperate for the Council's problem solving

responsibilities. Start solving the problems NOW.

I stay home, and if on the street, wear mask, latex gloves, stay at least 10-15 ft from these "Covid-Idiots"!



Hello Jeff,

There is an event on August 9th at the Alki Beach Park in Seattle that I think you might appreciate being made aware of, if you aren't already aware of it. This upcoming event I believe is of serious public health concern for the Seattle area. The musical/religious revival event at Alki beach Park is funded and organized by Sean Feucht, and you can find various videos on his Facebook page of recent events he has held in several cities here in California.

His events have been extremely large (sometimes several thousand people in attendance) with people traveling long distances to attend, including people coming from COVID hot zones. It is a rare sight to see a mask wearer among the tightly packed throng. They sing, dance, shout, hug, do hands-on water baptisms, etc. This week he is having events in Arkansas, Oklahoma, and Texas.

To give you some background, Sean Feucht is a volunteer leader and member of the Redding Bethel church. Many of the people who attend this church have what I consider to be rather unusual beliefs. Normally guite harmless. But the dangerous and most commonly held beliefs in this age of COVID-19 are that one only needs God's protection and perhaps some vitamin D to stay safe from contracting the virus, or that the virus is just an elaborate hoax. Either way, they feel no need to social distance in any way. They completely discredit advice from public health experts and consider these experts to be either misguided souls or evil messengers. They believe that wearing a mask provides no protection, and that the idea of wearing one is yet another hoax designed to oppress and make them do something they think is completely unnecessary and something they simply don't want to do. Like brandishing a weapon, they use religious freedom as afforded to them in the constitution to get away with this dangerous disregard for public health in the middle of a pandemic. Now that you know this background, it should come as no surprise to you that he and his organizers are not getting permits or approvals from public

health agencies prior to their very large gatherings, or they routinely lie to the agencies to get approvals to use public lands but then simply ignore or defy any stipulations they are given. They have systematically run afoul of those agencies and continue to break public health guidelines in every city they have held an event. They offer free face masks and hand sanitizer, but then act in total defiance of the public health standards and behave more like rebels than Christians. They appear to actually flaunt the fact that they are not practicing any social distancing whatsoever.

I get the impression that Sean Feucht is someone who is capitalizing on these challenging times we are in. He speaks of religious oppression over COVID shutdown orders. He believes his "new Jesus people movement" will sweep across this entire country. He has ambitious political aspirations.

So he and his very large and enthusiastic throng of followers are right now a serious public health threat to entire communities.

So far no one has managed to reign in the situation, and so this total defiance has continued unabated. People on his Facebook page are posting comments and railing about it, as many are mortified by his events and their brazen disregard for public health and disregard to their community. But all that anger and railing has made no effect.

I live near Redding, California where one such event recently occurred at the Sundial bridge. You can easily find the news coverage about this event online because it received nationwide news attention. The City of Redding public health department was horrified once they got wind of the event, the size of it, and the fact there was absolutely no social distancing. This is when I actively became involved in viewing and making comments on Sean Feucht's Facebook page. I also contacted Redding Bethel church to complain, but they neatly distanced themselves from it even though rumor has it that they help him with flier printing, distribution, etc. for his events. I wrote to the Redding City counsel person, but a lot of good that did. She is a valued member of that very same Bethel church.

So I am trying to do what I can by warning others in these various cities he is traveling to and giving them the "heads-up".

I do hope you or someone you know can somehow stop or thwart this assault on the Seattle area. I am very angered that they are getting away with threatening entire communities in this manner while the rest of us make deep personal sacrifices to keep COVID cases down so that our children can safely return to school and businesses can remain open and we might be able to someday soon enjoy some version of normal again. It feels so deeply wrong on so many levels what they are getting away with. If you are not the appropriate person I need to channel this information to, please email me back and let me know the proper person(s). Or please feel free to forward or share this with any interested or "need to know" party or provide me with some ideas on who else to contact. I really appreciate that.



Half of states fail to require mask use by correctional staff

States are not reducing their populations sufficiently to slow the spread of COVID-19, and our survey reveals that 23 states are not even requiring masks to be worn by staff and most are not requiring incarcerated people to wear them.

The best way to slow the spread of COVID-19 in state prisons is to reduce the population density, but as we've found, states are moving far too slowly in this regard. In this new analysis, we find that states are also failing at the most modest mitigation efforts imaginable: requiring correctional staff and incarcerated people to wear masks.

Almost all states¹ are distributing masks to staff and incarcerated people,² but only half of all states are requiring that staff wear the masks at work. We examined the policies of each state's Department of Corrections to see which states are requiring masks for staff. What have prisons and jails done to slow down COVID-19?

States where prison staff must wear masks.

27 states currently require correctional facility staff to wear face masks, while 23 states and the District of Columbia do not.

Just because states require the use of masks by staff does not mean that the policy is adequately enforced. There have been a number of reports from incarcerated people that correctional staff have not been wearing masks appropriately when interacting with those who are in custody. In Arkansas, masks are required for staff, but an internal email from the state's highest corrections official to the wardens of each prison in the state reveals that "hospitals are not wanting to treat our inmates because our staff are not following the [mask] guidelines that we are sending out."³

Of course, even in states where masks are not required by correctional policy, staff can *choose* to wear them. But reports from incarcerated people and their families suggest this is wishful thinking. For example, in New Jersey -- a state where the COVID-19 pandemic hit prisons early and hard -- staff are not required to wear masks and reports from inside say that many staff are not wearing masks.⁴

As we all know by now, the federal government's February guidance discouraging masks quickly proved to be misguided, and the most current research makes it even clearer that masks benefit both the wearer *and* everyone get.


Wearing masks protects the public:

- In states that only required certain employees to wear masks, there was no effect on the county-level daily COVID-19 growth rate, but requiring everyone to wear masks results in a significant decline in infections.
- Face masks have driven down rates of overall COVID infections, as seen in hospital settings, hair salons, and on cruise ships.
- Beyond COVID, masks have long been known to reduce the likelihood of transmission of epidemic respiratory illnesses. This is particularly true in community-living settings like dense prisons.

Masks protect the individuals who wear them:

- Wearing a mask reduces the likelihood of contracting COVID-19.
- Even if you still contract COVID-19 while wearing a mask, the disease is more likely to be mild or even asymptomatic.⁵

Requiring correctional staff to wear face masks is just commonsense: staff are responsible for most day-to-day movement in and out of prisons (and are therefore most likely to carry the virus in and out of them) and they are state employees who must adhere to state regulations and requirements. But states should not stop with mandating masks for staff; they should be requiring *everyone* in the facility to wear masks. The obvious implication of the science behind using masks is that the more people who wear masks, the slower the virus will spread. Yet while 27 states require correctional staff to wear masks, only 14 state prison systems require incarcerated people to wear masks.⁶



14 states currently require incarcerated people to wear face masks, while 36 states and the District of Columbia do not. Strangely, Illinois is the only state that appears to require incarcerated people wear masks, but does not require the same for staff.


The fact that far fewer states require incarcerated people to wear masks than correctional staff may reflect some reluctance to create conflict with incarcerated people over potential enforcement issues. (A more cynical view might interpret this hands-off approach as a callous lack of concern about incarcerated people's lives and health.) But if correctional agencies care about protecting incarcerated people and staff, they could craft policies that reward those who wear masks, instead of policies that threaten disciplinary action for non-compliance.

We know that reducing the number of people behind bars is the best way to slow the spread of COVID-19 through prisons, jails, and their surrounding communities, but this analysis finds that many states are not even practicing the most basic preventative measure: requiring face masks in prisons, just as they are required by many states in other public spaces. State prison systems need to catch up before it's too late.

Footnotes

- Publicly available information indicates that the Department of Corrections in Rhode Island and the District of Columbia are providing masks to staff, but there is no available information about these Departments of Correction providing masks to incarcerated people.
- 2. It is worth noting that mask distribution in prisons across the U.S. has been fueled in part by outside charitable organizations donating over \$10 million worth of personal protective equipment, including face masks.
- 3. Arkansas is not the only state with staff who are not adhering to the policy that explicitly requires them to wear masks. For example, reports of staff not wearing masks - despite official requirements - have surfaced in state prisons in Michigan, Vermont, Connecticut, and Wisconsin.
- 4. Reports from other states without staff mask policies including Maine and Nevada - suggest that prison staff are not choosing to wear masks of their own accord. Although the federal prison system was outside the scope of this survey, it is relevant to note that reports from both staff and incarcerated people indicate that the U.S. Marshals are transporting people without masks and without adequate physical distancing.
- 5. This study was published on July 31st and is based on the most current understanding of the virus.
- 6. As of August 1st, most state prison systems are providing masks to both correctional staff and the incustody population. Based on the available information from Rhode Island and the District of Columbia, it is possible although unlikely that Rhode Island and the District are not providing masks to incarcerated. The correctional policies on masks in both Rhode Island and D.C. mention providing staff with masks, but we could not find any mention of providing masks to incarcerated people and they failed to respond to our inquiries prior to publication of this report.

Dear Mayor Durkan,

I am writing to urge you to do your part to make sure that mask-wearing is voluntary, not mandatory.

Many jurisdictions are basing their face mask policies on guidance from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). The CDC has flip-flopped its position on face coverings several times since March but is now recommending that everyone wear a mask in public. This recommendation is not supported by strong empirical evidence. Though there is science to support mask-wearing, there's also a preponderance of science showing that masks can cause considerable harm and are ineffective in preventing the spread of coronavirus. There is also no science supporting the use of masks by healthy individuals. So emergency orders that are being issued to help protect public health are actually hurting individuals' physical and emotional well being — and violating their basic human rights, constitutional rights and religious rights.

Evidence that masks reduce the transmission of viral respiratory infections within community settings is equivocal at best. A recent meta-analysis (bit.ly/2VHaubd) that included nearly a dozen randomized, controlled trials and 10 observational studies found that there was no clear clinical or laboratory-confirmed evidence that masks prevent infection. Even the U.S. Surgeon General has noted that masks "are not effective in preventing the general public from catching the coronavirus." (bit.ly/31Dgdm5)

In terms of harm, studies show that wearing a face covering reduces blood and tissue oxygenation — which can be deadly — while increasing carbon dioxide levels. The use of masks can also increase the risk of infection and the spread of viral illness (particularly cloth masks), hinder detoxification that occurs through exhalation, impair the immune system, and cause a wide range of other physical and psychological issues. (bit.ly/31Epv1e). Moreover, some masks have been found to contain known carcinogens, which put people at risk from inhaling toxic chemicals and having them come into contact with their skin.

There is no science to support the use of masks by healthy individuals, and the World Health Organization backed this up when it said, "WHO stands by recommendations to not wear masks if you are not sick or caring for someone who is sick." Forcing healthy individuals to wear face coverings is a completely unnecessary intervention that dehumanizes their interactions with others. More important, it eliminates their right to make informed decisions about what risks and precautions they are willing to take.

It is unethical and unconstitutional to subject healthy, law-abiding citizens to measures that can result in physical and emotional harm and that impinge on their ability to move freely throughout society. For those with deeply held religious beliefs, mask mandates violate their ability to abide by natural law and follow their convictions to walk in faith, not fear. As such, the decision to wear a mask is a highly personal one and should not be universally mandated; measures that are meant to protect the community as a whole are not effective if they hurt individuals in that community.

Mandatory medicine and mandated interventions such as social distancing and mask-wearing have no place in a free society; citizens want to maintain the right to make responsible decisions about what is best for themselves and their children based on their own unique circumstances. I urge you to do the right thing, stand for choice and protect all individuals by encouraging — not mandating — the use of face masks in the community. This policy can be bolstered by asking at-risk populations and those who are sick to self-quarantine, with society taking the best care of them possible.

Thank you for your continued leadership during these unprecedented times and for upholding the health and the rights of your constituents.

However, today (August 11) she wandered down the street, threatened neighbors, uttered foul language, exposed her breasts and ripped wiper blades from cars. A neighbor called the police. A squad car came with two male officers, followed by an ambulance with two male EMTs.

About a week ago, after our neighbor rang our doorbell at 4am tried to open our door and requested entry, I called the crisis center. I was advised that, should 911 be called, that appropriate health care professionals would arrive to assess and strategize. I later talked to her husband and informed him that that was an option. He said he was trying to get a handle on it and would let me know. I did not call 911. I wish I had. I would have discovered the kind of "support" they intended to send.

The officers that arrived today clearly had no empathy for my neighbor. She sat on her front porch as the police gathered stories from the all male witnesses. One officer yelled at her that she could not smoke. I don't like smoking, but I'm glad she smoked anyway. Now, I wouldn't call these officers abusive, but they simply showed little kindness. They were cops trying to figure out the crime. She received no counseling, no gentle coaxing. She was a woman surrounded by males who were witness to her anti-social antics. She needed (needs) more. Regardless of her fantastical outbursts, she needed to be assured that she was ok. She has a disease, and it is the disease that is misbehaving. She has always been a good and kind neighbor, and this behavior, for those of us who know her, is unrecognizable. She deserves respect. Instead, she is hauled away.

So, in retrospect, we didn't need two males (who did not wear masks throughout the event) with guns. We needed peers and allies. A woman should have been there for her. We needed gentle health-care workers who would not put her in a defensive posture. Neighbors needed reassurance over bluster. We needed to know about her condition, about how we should respond. We got basic machismo. Not the fault of the officers, perhaps. Their training, their culture doesn't accommodate empathy. They did their job. But that job needs to be changed. We need to acknowledge that mental illness is painful and difficult. It requires care from the very first encounter. Public humiliation cannot be part of that treatment.

It is time that we put money into in-the-field problem solvers. Professional health care workers over armed response.



Jenny Durkan,

As you are undoubtedly aware, both King County and the State of Washington have had face-covering mandates in response to COVID-19 in effect for quite some time.

According to the Department of Health, "not following the order may result in a misdemeanor subjecting the violator to a fine of up to \$100 and/or up-to 90 days in county jail per RCW 43.70.130(7), RCW 70.05.120(4), and WAC 246-100-070(3)." (1)

I am unaware of any active enforcement of these laws. I was also disturbed to learn that, according to Sgt. Lauren Truscott of the Seattle Police Department, "SPD will not be enforcing COVID-19 orders" (2), and that according to Det. Patrick Michaud of the Seattle Police Department, as described by The Seattle Times, "there is no law on the books that would come into play. In contrast, he said, police give out citations for people who don't wear bike helmets because there is a relevant state law." (2) "Ignorantia juris non excusat," I believe, applies both the citizens to follow laws and law enforcement officials to enforce those laws.

On August 9th, 2020, an event was held by Sean Feucht in Cal Anderson Park in the Capitol Hill neighborhood of the City of Seattle. (2) According to the Seattle Parks and Recreation department, Cal Anderson was and is currently "Temporarily Closed." (3) As reported, the vast majority of gatherers at this event were not wearing any face coverings. (2) I believe their presence and behavior posed a serious, life-threatening biological danger to the community.

A spokeswoman for Gov. Jay Inslee told The Seattle Times that "her office 'will have a conversation' with the Seattle Police Department about its lack of enforcement." I am not aware of the occurrence, contents, or any resulting change in policy enacted as a result of that conversation. (2) In the last two weeks, I have still yet to personally witness any enforcement activity.

It is my conclusion that:

1. Law enforcement agencies in our state are negligent by not enforcing the relevant laws.

2. Law enforcement agencies are exercising enforcement discretion beyond what is granted by the law.

3. Based on the inconsistent enforcement activity of a variety of laws (2, 3, 4) such as the occupation of a closed park, the Seattle Police Department is engaged in biased policing.

4. The governing bodies of Seattle, King County, and The State of Washington are negligent by having not ensured that law enforcement agencies fulfill their relevant responsibilities.

I am sure that you and our other elected officials would agree that mitigation of the severe impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic is contingent upon social distancing and the wearing face coverings. Voluntary adherence to the mask mandate is not adequate, given the failure of a significant number of individuals to do so. It is the government and law enforcement's responsibility to protect the lives of citizens and, without a doubt, not actively enforcing this mandate is responsible for otherwise preventable deaths.

I look forward to promptly receiving and reading an entirely original response to this letter. I will send another as a follow-up on September 7th if I do not receive a response.

Here are the details for the Mayor's office:

2 SO staff members transport and set up speaker, keyboard, chair, and microphone, disinfect everything, and step away. There will be a disposable cover over the microphone that will be discarded after performance.

Singer and pianist arrive separately. Pianist sits at a distance of 10 ft from singer.

Singer sings without mask, facing away from pianist. Pianist will wear mask the whole time. The two will perform outdoors, facing spectators, who will stay in their rooms and listen from their windows/balconies.

Any spectators who chose to come outside will have to wear masks, stay at min 20ft distance of pianist and singer and at 6ft distance from each other monitored by SO and/or venue staff.

So, to be clear: ANY individuals physically present in the area (i.e., SO staff and venue staff, listeners) must stay at least 20 ft away (twice the distance recommended by the governor's memorandum). The same 2 staff members mentioned earlier will measure and mark the perimeter.

The 2 staff members will disinfect keyboard, chair, microphone, and speaker afterward.

Toni, hello.

You're right, I disagree with the hesitancy on punitive action, especially the resource constraints regarding available personnel to enforce mask-wearing. As stated in my message to you, education is just not working, as I continue to see from window numerous people outdoors smoking, texting, on their cells while walking down the street masks-in-hand, or draped around their necks where they are of no value, or without a mask at all, totally definat. I also see SPD parking attendants giving out parking tickets.

Is it more important, during a pandemic to give out parking tickets or enforce mask-wearing? I refuse to agree that parking tickets are more important.

As stated I sent this out to Congresswoman Jayapal, and am waiting to hear from her answer, as well as from answers from Senator Murray and Senator Cantwell.

Just today, I watching MSNBC saw a Congress Member discussing his disgust, after he had contracted Covid, as he was in a House hearing where fellow Congress Member "Covid-Gohmert" was not wearing a mask, as he repeatedly refuses to do, as similarly do several GOP Congress Members. Dear Ed,

Let me begin by thanking you for your service and for your diligence in observing social distancing recommendations and the mask mandate in Washington State. Unfortunately, you will likely not be satisfied with this answer either, as you mentioned that you have heard several times that education is the focus rather than enforcement.

We reached out to the Executive Branch and Public Health, that coordinate the implementation of many of the County's efforts, to pass along your concerns about enforcement, and we received this update from Executive Branch staff:

"Specific to enforcement, they [Public Health] are focused on education and not enforcement. They have used the consistent message that the County continues to focus on education over punitive action, however, not following the order may result in a misdemeanor charge and a fine of \$25 to \$100 and/or up to 90 days in county jail.

As far as specific outreach, they said they are working broadly on messaging through communication channels, community ambassadors, social media etc. PH said that the city of Seattle has staff at City parks who are helping with education around social distancing and mask wearing as well. The County is also working to start doing more direct outreach and education through DCHS which will likely focus on areas with the highest burden of disease, primarily South King County."

As you can understand, the issue around enforcement is a tricky one as there are constraints on the County's resources to send staff out to specifically monitor individual mask usage. In the example of transit, which you brought up, it could potentially be unsafe to require Metro drivers to personally enforce mask usage on their buses. The safety of our employees is also an important concern that we must weigh.

We will continue to focus on spreading the information that masks are required and working with community organizations to make sure that folks who need masks are able to access them. More information about the mask mandate (and what to do if you see someone not wearing one) is available here: https://www.kingcounty.gov/depts/health/covid-19/care/masks/FAQ.aspx Please don't hesitate to continue to share your questions and concerns with us. It appears likely that this virus will continue to be with us for the foreseeable future and it will take all of us to get through this.


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

I am writing again asking please to respond to my first email and also this new one.

Living full-time on Alki and having to work from home due to COVID-19 how is it the traffic and the elevation of noise from Alki Avenue has increased.

Conference calls with noise cancellation just can't eliminate the race cars and motorcycles continual engines explosions. Where is the noise ordinance and speed violations enforcement.

I noted that Beach Drive is now down to one lane. They also have at the end of Alki Avenue speed bumps. How is it that this was added and not to the straight aways which cause the most disruptions. How is that fair to some residents and not all.

At this time we don't have any protection. Our calls are routed to precincts who can't assist. Fire bombs are every night after 10:30. On a walk I even saw a woman open her car trunk and laying in full view were piles of fireworks cannon style.

The fire pits were removed from Alki Beach did you pass an ordinance that bonfires were not are allowed? No one in the fire and police department has any updated requirements noted from 2017.

What is even worse is the constant drive byes who play their loud music and once again a car almost hit me in the crosswalk today. Green pinto/ford car BOS601688 license plate. He screeched to a halt purposely speeding up to me. Scared my dog to the point I have to medicate her every single day. I can't walk outside after 6:00 pm because it is taken over by people who don't care about disrupting dogs, children, elderly and families who want to have a peaceful time.

So I invite you to come visit Alki during the evenings watch and learn again how disruptive it is to be on this strip. It has become a gathering of people who don't care and parade their loud engines and maximize their cut-off mufflers. Even had car without a hood so that the revving of the engine could be heard in Tacoma.

Do something or give me the tools and the contacts of people who will do something.

- Put speed bumps on all crosswalks
- Put speed controlled signs with cameras for violators Lynnwood police have this and they have generated money to support their town, school district and more
- Put Noise Ordinance signs up stating the fines and the increase of the fine after the first offense
- With COVID-19 close down a lane 90% of the public not wearing masks and we need the space to walk

Our family has recently moved to West Seattle living on Alki Avenue.

I understand that we are in trying times and appreciate all the support that you are giving to this community, but I did not realize that I was moving to a war zone within our state.

I have lived in the Seattle area for the past 30 years.

Seattle and Alki Avenue have become places at night and even during the day of:

- Gun shots
- Firecracker bombs
- Speeding cars through crosswalks
 - I have been close to being hit every day for the past month
- Speeding electric bikes on walking path
 - They are sometimes going faster than cars
- Speeding motorcycles that are pulling wheelies on our straight away during peak family hours that are walking on the sidewalk
- Drug deals

Noise levels

- Car and motorcycle noise levels during weekends and late nights past the 10:00 ordinance have been every night for past month to the degree I have to sedate our dog every day
- Two nights ago we had gun shots
- Last night and every night we have had fireworks or firecracker Bombs that are louder than a canon shot

I finally called the police and learned three things:

- 1. They don't have authorization to protect our community
- 2. It has to be a life threatening incident because
- 3. All of our police resources are focused in Seattle

Solutions until Seattle gets sorted out:

- Put in speed bumps at all crosswalks and every 25 35'
- Extend crosswalks across the bike paths so that they now yield to all pedestrians I've seen too many near misses with dogs and small children
- Add signage that shows the fines associated with our noise ordinance and speeding violations
- Tag speeders through cam recorders
 - These funds will then go to the restoring Alki's safety measures
 - You will get at least 50 speeders a day and with a ticket of \$150 that is considerable income to the state/community/schools
- Bridge access has caused considerable problems too and that in itself has been a real disappointment
 - I am getting upcharged by services because of their time in traffic even with less traffic due to COVID-19 stay home rules

Trash and foxtails

- We are lucky to have good people here in West Seattle who pick up trash every morning from people who don't care and don't live here
 - This has become habit forming by those who take advantage of the beach and walkway. Please enforce fines and signage to support this abuse
- Foxtails are deathly to dogs
 - They become knives to their paws
 - When it was finally cut down all the cuttings were left on the walkway















I writing to you about the unfortunate and unsafe conditions for Denny Park in Seattle, which I live directly across the street from. Denny Park takes up about 2 city blocks in Seattle and has a children's playground, an off-leash dog park, public seating, and walking paths. I am begging you to please consider allowing the Navigation Team to clean this park up by moving the homeless population out.

Due to recent events since April, 2020, the homeless population has been forced to move. They decided to set up tents in Denny Park and have been there ever since. I understand that COVID-19 has made everything difficult and these are uncharted times we are living in. However, I have seen Denny Park get worse every week. There are now over 30 tents occupying this public park. There is trash/litter scattered throughout the park. This trash includes everything from furniture to used needles, expired food to dirty clothing, open flame sources causing fire hazards to human fecal matter causing extreme biohazard issues. The public seating provided by the city is unusable because they have all been moved to various tents for private seating and personal use. The children's playground has become a dump for all of the trash collecting in the park. The off-leash dog park is filled with expired food and chicken bones, which are harmful and even fatal for dogs using the allocated space, my dog included. The walking paths are almost all blocked by long extension cords stretching across the walkways to power each tent from the city path lights in the park. I have witnessed graffiti being sprayed on buildings, trash cans, fences, trees, newspaper stands, etc. multiple times by those that live in Denny Park. Yes I have reported those. To make things even more unsafe for the public, none of the homeless people living in Denny Park wear masks. They do not have the means to wash their hands, go to the bathroom, or sanitize objects that are touched, such as the public seating. This is greatly increasing the risk of transmission of COVID-19 and exposure to anyone that walks through this park.

I have reached out and used just about every resource available to combat this problem. I have called the non-emergency police, the city complaint line, the navigation team, and even the "Find it, Fix it" app. I have submitted more complaints than I can remember, yet nothing is done because all teams are shut down or responding to emergencies only. The only thing that is being done is giving out trash bags to those that live in Denny Park. It obviously isn't working.

I invite you, the Mayor, the Governor, and any city council members to come see Denny Park to understand how bad things have gotten. I am begging you to do something about this, because the community I live in is suffering.

I think playing into the things that people will want to see come back makes a lot of sense, like keeping businesses open. Unfortunately we have an uphill battle because of national inconsistencies when it comes to mask messaging. Social norms influence behavior and with a lot of normative messaging, it works best when connected to a pro-social behavior. So instead of saying "Please wear a mask" the phrase "thank you for wearing your mask" is supposed to be more effective at normalizing the behavior, like seatbelts or not littering, it's socially expected to follow those rules.

Maybe in Rachel's case it might be interesting to see if making something positive out of this part of normalizing it. You could start a #FacemaskFriday campaign featuring fun masks that the Parks crew are wearing and talk a little about their roles (humanizing them and getting people to care about them and if their actions lead to them getting infected or having to close the parks). You could ask followers to share their facemask Friday selfies from their favorite Seattle park. Just a few thoughts.

Hi All,

Following up on our discussion yesterday on the effectiveness of current mask messaging, specifically, "6ft. apart, face covering, wash your hands" doesn't seem to be cutting it. Also how to reach certain communities.

I checked in with a friend at King County Public Health comms and got a lengthy reply (pasted below). Their Instagram posts (<u>here</u> and <u>here</u>) and <u>retweet of a TikTok</u> came up in discussion yesterday.

I also asked specifically about reaching Spanish speakers, as per <u>@Schulkin, Rachel</u>'s question in the meeting, but it seems their focus is on young adults. I'm still waiting to hear back from their lead on that.

<u>@Derrick, Anthony</u>, not sure how we want to proceed on adapting or using their approaches below, but sharing for now as a first step:

We're working on mask messaging on so many fronts. Young adults are a priority audience since spread is happening at much higher rates in this age demographic. We've got some ideas for mask messaging for this group that we are discussing, like having hand-drawn masks over photos, inviting others to hand-draw masks on their selfies. We're working with youth social media ambassadors through SOAR to create their own content about masks. I'll let Lily chime in since she's more involved.

We're also developing materials about masks with parents in mind since we've heard that they are concerned about the mandate that children wear masks and some reportedly would keep their kids out of school rather than have them wear masks. I have this idea for a doodle book for kids to help socialize wearing of masks, but haven't had sufficient time to work on it. It's also harder to find child-sized masks, and they haven't been part of the free mask supplies ordered by the cities or King County.

We're also trying to raise awareness of the exemptions for mask wearing because of reports from the Disability communities that have suffered discrimination and refusal of service when they have not been able to wear masks. We have a toolkit for businesses about mask exemptions that is almost final, including a poster that is now up on our face coverings webpage: www.kingcounty.gov/masks

DOH did some research that indicated that the people who most need messaging to wear masks are young, white, single males. I won't add additional comment. The same research indicated that Latinx and Black people are wearing masks consistently.

The other messaging that is needed relates to having small gatherings rather than large ones. We know people are going to gather, especially younger folks, so we want them to do it safely. Young people gathering (and families, too) are driving up the cases. So that's our key audience right now.

Key messages are that the smaller the gathering, the safer it is. Young people may not feel as fearful about getting COVID, but they may respond to appeals to prevent spreading it to others who are at higher risk. Calls to action to protect the community may work better, especially for Gen Z (again, according to some audience research that DOH did).

We're doing some thinking about how to connect these precaution messages with issues that are more relevant to young adults, like the dating/hook-up IG posts. Also thinking about connections to colleges and high schools reopening, jobs, and mental health.

This is a heads up that I'm scheduling a call with Anthony to talk about dealing with known bad actors (*not* trolls) all up in your socials, but also physical spaces. Look out for a calendar invite before the EOD.

To be clear, I'm looking for concrete things to address something I'm dealing with now. But wanted to open it up since many of you likely might find this information useful, or have your own wisdom to share. If you just wanna be a fly on the wall, that's fine too.

Please do not reply here if you have specifics to share: save it for the call.

The call will be more of a chat, not a presentation-style meeting, where I'd like to get into the nuances of specific cases to see if <u>current City policy</u> holds up, specifically along racial equity lines that complicate the argument for keeping things entirely open. Here are my initial questions:

- How do you ensure your coordination/strategizing isn't swept up in a PDR? Especially now with most of us working from home?
- Glad we have a City policy in place, but it seems mostly calibrated for comments (Facebook, Youtube, Instagram). I'm interested in hearing Twitter scenarios and how it can be applied there, specifically if anybody's used the feature to limit who can reply to a tweet or hide replies to your tweets.
- I feel like *known* bad actors weaponize our own policies, even the social compact, against us. Specifically, "I will keep showing up physically in your spaces to disrupt, attempt to destabilize or actively harm (emotionally or psychologically, esp. when frontline staff are POC, femme, queer)." Whenever they turn up, they know this, we know this. What are our options for shutting that -ish down as soon as they try to walk in?

I think playing into the things that people will want to see come back makes a lot of sense, like keeping businesses open. Unfortunately we have an uphill battle because of national inconsistencies when it comes to mask messaging. Social norms influence behavior and with a lot of normative messaging, it works best when connected to a pro-social behavior. So instead of saying "Please wear a mask" the phrase "thank you for wearing your mask" is supposed to be more effective at normalizing the behavior, like seatbelts or not littering, it's socially expected to follow those rules.

Maybe in Rachel's case it might be interesting to see if making something positive out of this part of normalizing it. You could start a #FacemaskFriday campaign featuring fun masks that the Parks crew are wearing and talk a little about their roles (humanizing them and getting people to care about them and if their actions lead to them getting infected or having to close the parks). You could ask followers to share their facemask Friday selfies from their favorite Seattle park. Just a few thoughts.

I hope this helps! If it makes you feel any better, we're all right there with you.

Hi All,

Following up on our discussion yesterday on the effectiveness of current mask messaging, specifically, "6ft. apart, face covering, wash your hands" doesn't seem to be cutting it. Also how to reach certain communities.

I checked in with a friend at King County Public Health comms and got a lengthy reply (pasted below). Their Instagram posts (<u>here</u> and <u>here</u>) and <u>retweet of a TikTok</u> came up in discussion yesterday.

I also asked specifically about reaching Spanish speakers, as per <u>@Schulkin, Rachel</u>'s question in the meeting, but it seems their focus is on young adults. I'm still waiting to hear back from their lead on that.

<u>@Derrick, Anthony</u>, not sure how we want to proceed on adapting or using their approaches below, but sharing for now as a first step:

We're working on mask messaging on so many fronts. Young adults are a priority audience since spread is happening at much higher rates in this age demographic. We've got some ideas for mask messaging for this group that we are discussing, like having hand-drawn masks over photos, inviting others to hand-draw masks on their selfies. We're working with youth social media ambassadors through SOAR to create their own content about masks. I'll let Lily chime in since she's more involved.

We're also developing materials about masks with parents in mind since we've heard that they are concerned about the mandate that children wear masks and some reportedly would keep their kids out of school rather than have them wear masks. I have this idea for a doodle book for kids to help socialize wearing of masks, but haven't had sufficient time to work on it. It's also harder to find child-sized masks, and they haven't been part of the free mask supplies ordered by the cities or King County.

We're also trying to raise awareness of the exemptions for mask wearing because of reports from the Disability communities that have suffered discrimination and refusal of service when they have not been able to wear masks. We have a toolkit for businesses about mask exemptions that is almost final, including a poster that is now up on our face coverings webpage: www.kingcounty.gov/masks

DOH did some research that indicated that the people who most need messaging to wear masks are young, white, single males. I won't add additional comment. The same research indicated that Latinx and Black people are wearing masks consistently.

The other messaging that is needed relates to having small gatherings rather than large ones. We know people are going to gather, especially younger folks, so we want them to do it safely. Young people gathering (and families, too) are driving up the cases. So that's our key audience right now.

Key messages are that the smaller the gathering, the safer it is. Young people may not feel as fearful about getting COVID, but they may respond to appeals to prevent spreading it to others who are at higher risk. Calls to action to protect the community may work better, especially for Gen Z (again, according to some audience research that DOH did).

We're doing some thinking about how to connect these precaution messages with issues that are more relevant to young adults, like the dating/hook-up IG posts. Also thinking about connections to colleges and high schools reopening, jobs, and mental health.

Received and accepted. I look forward to discussing this with you. In the interested of starting the conversation productively here are a few more insights from conversations that happened over the weekend after my original email went out.

Myself and a number of other business owners had very positive and cooperative discussions with the Farmers Market, everyone seems to be on the same page about sharing the street and working together. We all recognize the urgency of getting sales while we can use these spaces. Honestly we only really have a few more weeks to use them before the weather changes. So to be clear, there is no conflict between the businesses and the market. Our issues are purely about SDOT sending out emails and placing phone calls to enforce the permits. We want to keep them up during the market hours, and the market is ok with this. Why is SDOT demanding that we take them down? I understand that the permits do stipulate this, but much has changesd since we applied for them, and we're asking for some consideration. Frankly speaking, we all see this as selective enforcement that is targeting the business community. We could walk you around the neighborhood and show you hundreds of tents and derelict vehicles in the public right of ways and parking lanes that have been there for months. We don't see the rules being applied there, and therefore we can't understand why are we the focus of SDOT.

From a restaurant operators perspective, there is also a growing frustration with similar issues surrounding Covid-19 restrictions. Don't get me wrong, I completely support the measures we need to take to socially distance, wear masks and follow safe practices. The ability to keep our economy running depends on it. What frustrates me is why protestors are being allowed to gather in the thousands shoulder to shoulder when we can't even seat people inside unless they live together? I voted for Mayor Durkan, but I don't understand the direction her leadership is taking on these issues. The coming surge in positive cases is going to come from protests not restaurants, yet we are going top pay the price with a likely return to a stay at home order.

I operate two restaurants on Ballard Avenue. San Fermo and Percy's & Co, both of which have been issued temporary street café permits through SDOT. We worked diligently with the SDOT plan reviewers and other agencies, such as Landmarks and WSLCB, to get these permits through the process. After our permit was issued, we were informed that we would have to remove the fencing and furniture on Sundays for the Farmers Market.

Due to the difficulty of accommodating this, I approached Doug Farr, who manages the **Ballard Farmers** Market. He and I met, he took measurements, and told me I could leave San Fermo's up. My understanding is that Percy's location does not currently conflict with the Market. Yesterday, like many businesses, we received emails and phone calls from SDOT reminding us that we need to remove them tonight. The email also specifically called out other businesses on the street who are stalled in their permit approval due to various conflicts SDOT has

This message is intended to convey a deep sense of frustration from the business community here with the way this issue is being managed. Our businesses are struggling, many of us are literally day

raised.

to day. The Governor's orders are forcing us to conduct more business outside with each week of new Covid restrictions. Ballard Avenue needs to be a shared resource. We don't accept the idea that the Farmers Market's should take precedence, regardless of when their permit was issued or what the concerns are about how to conduct it safely. The market is a temporary event. They set up and break down daily already. The event should either be moved to Shilshole or the layout should be adapted to work around our street café set ups.

Sunday has always been one of the strongest sales days of the week on Ballard Ave, but with the week to week changes to the market layout, many of us have seen erratic sales as our customers struggle to access businesses. Before Covid, the market and businesses formed a seamless corridor that

benefitted everyone; however, now that crowd control measures have been set up, the business is segregated, and the retail and restaurants are losing opportunity. Our businesses pay property tax and our revenues contribute sales tax. Most of the market vendors are exempt from paying tax. With the city's budget needs this should factor into a solution as well.

We're not asking to close the market, but we do need to maintain our café set ups during market hours. They should either work around them or move one block west where there are no businesses to compete with.

Tomorrow morning at 9 AM, myself and a group of business owners are gathering at San Fermo (5341 Ballard Ave). Doug Farr suggested we come down to meet with the mayor's representative. We are committed to a solution that works for everyone, but we are unwilling to let these spaces go on Sundays when we need them. I hope this message goes as high up as it needs to reach someone that can solve this problem. Our frustrations need to be heard, and the SDOT permits need to be adapted as quickly and easily as Olympia sends out new restrictions on how we operate. We are not going to accept being forced out of business any longer.
