Today, as part of the U.S. Food and Drug Administration's ongoing and aggressive commitment to address the coronavirus outbreak, the agency <u>issued a new policy</u> for certain laboratories seeking to develop diagnostic tests for coronavirus in order to achieve more rapid testing capacity in the U.S.

The new policy is for certain laboratories that develop and begin to use validated COVID-19 diagnostics before the FDA has completed review of their <u>Emergency Use Authorization</u> (EUA) requests. The immediately in effect guidance issued today describes the circumstances where the FDA does not intend to object to the use of these tests for clinical testing while the laboratories are pursuing an EUA with the FDA. Importantly, this policy only applies to laboratories that are certified to perform high-complexity testing consistent with requirements under <u>Clinical Laboratory Improvement Amendments</u>.

The FDA guidance provides recommendations for test developers, including information regarding test validation, FDA notification and interim confirmatory clinical testing. Following the completion of their test validation, laboratories should communicate with the FDA, via email, in order to notify the agency that the test has been validated. Laboratories should submit a completed EUA request within 15 business days of notification.

Today, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), through the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA), <u>awarded</u> <u>approximately</u> \$117 million to expand access to HIV care, treatment, medication, and prevention services. This investment is a critical component of the Administration's <u>Ending the HIV Epidemic: A Plan for America (EHE)</u> initiative, which aims to reduce the number of new HIV infections in the United States by 90 percent by 2030.

The EHE initiative and today's awards focus on 48 counties, Washington, D.C., and San Juan, Puerto Rico, <u>geographic areas</u> where more than 50 percent of new HIV diagnoses occurred in 2016 and 2017, as well as the seven states with a substantial rural HIV burden.

FEDERAL CORONAVIRUS FUNDING BILL

- Bill will be entitled "Coronavirus Preparedness and Response Supplemental Appropriations Act, 2020"
- \$61 million to HHS, FDA to prevent, prepare for, and respond to Coronavirus, domestically or internationally
 - Includes development of necessary medical countermeasures and vaccines, advanced manufacturing of medical products, the monitoring of medical supply chains, and related administrative activities
- \$20 million to Small Business Administration
- \$2.2 billion to HHS, CDC to prevent, prepare for, and respond to the virus, domestically and internationally
 - At least \$950 million shall be for grants to or cooperative agreements with States, localities, tribes, etc.
 - § For surveillance, epidemiology, lab capacity, infection control, mitigation, communications, and other preparedness and response activities
 - § \$475 million of these funds shall be allocated within 30 days of enactment
 - § Special provisions apply to protect Public Health Emergency Preparedness Grants provided in FY2019
 - Not less than 90% of the grant level
 - If applicable, grantee shall submit CDC spending plan within 45 days of enactment
 - At least \$300 million is allocated for global disease detection and emergency response
 - \$300 million transferred to, and merged with, Infectious Diseases Rapid Response Reserve Fund
 - Funds under this heading may be used for construction, alteration, or renovation of non-federally owned facilities to improve preparedness and response capability at the State and local level
- \$836 million for "National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases" available until 9/30/2024
 - \$10 million of this amount goes to "National Institute of Environmental Health Sciences" for worker-based training (hospital employees, first responders, and other at-risk workers)
- \$3.1 billion for "Public Health and Social Services Emergency Fund" available until 9/30/2024 for development of necessary countermeasures and vaccines, prioritizing platform-based technologies with U.S.-based manufacturing capabilities, and the purchase of vaccines, therapeutics, diagnostics, necessary medical supplies, medical surge capacity, and related
 - Secretary of HHS shall also use these funds to purchase vaccines developed using funds under this heading to respond to an outbreak or pandemic related to Coronavirus
 - § Products may be placed in the Strategic National Stockpile
 - These funds can also be used for construction, alteration, or renovation of non-Federally owned facilities to improve preparedness and response capability at the State and local level.
 - Funds may be used for construction, alteration, or renovation of non-federally owned facilities for the production of vaccines, therapeutics, and diagnostics

where the Secretary determines necessary to secure sufficient amounts of such supplies.

- \$100 million goes to "Health Resources and Services Administration Primary Health Care" for coronavirus grants under section 330 of the Public Health Services Act
- \$300 million into "Public Health and Social Services Emergency Fund" available until 9/30/2024 for vaccines, therapeutics, etc, under certain conditions.
- Act includes provisions for reimbursement of expenditures by HHS prior to enactment date. Provisions for reimbursement to States to carry out things described in this Act that were incurred between January 20, 2020, and date of enactment.
- NOT LATER THAN 30 days after the enactment, Secretary Azar must provide a detailed spend plan of anticipated uses of funds made available to HHS, including estimated personnel and administrative costs. Requires updates every 60 days until 9/30/2024.
- \$2 million available to OIG for oversight
- \$264 million to Department of State, Foreign Affairs until 9/30/202, for necessary expenses to prevent, prepare for, and respond to virus, including maintaining consular operations, evacuation expenses, and emergency preparedness
- \$1 million additional for OIG until 9/30/2022 for oversight of activities administered by US Agency for International Development
- \$450 million for "Global Health Programs" available until 9/30/2022 for necessary expenses to prevent, prepare for, and respond to coronavirus to be administered by US Agency for International Development.
 - At least \$200 million shall be merged with Emergency Reserve Fund
- \$300 million for "International Disaster Assistance" until expended for necessary expenses to prevent, prepare for, and respond to virus.
- \$250 million for "Economic Support Fund" to remain available until September 30, 2022, for expenses to prevent, prepare for and respond to virus including related economic, security, and stabilization requirements.
- \$90 million increase in "Worldwide Security Protection"
- Unless specifically mentioned, the appropriations of The Act are for current fiscal year only.
- Act provided for some waivers related to Medicare Telehealth

Update on COVID-19 (Coronavirus)

Senate Committee on Health & Welfare March 11, 2020

Coronavirus Disease (COVID-19)

Coronaviruses are a large family of viruses, some causing illness in people and others that circulate among animals, including camels, cats and bats. Rarely, animal coronaviruses can evolve and infect people and then spread between people such as has been seen with recent outbreaks of MERS and SARS.

COVID-19

Hile the CDC now expects community spread in some parts of the United States, **the immediate threat to the U.S. remains low**. We are not seeing the same level of spread other countries are seeing. That said, it is important to be prepared.

Hirroring the federal approach, we are moving from a **containment** approach to a **mitigation** approach.

■ LDH remains in constant contact with the CDC to ensure that we all have the latest data, are on the same page, and can adapt our plans as conditions change.

Cases in Louisiana

As of 3/10/20, we have conducted **43 tests** of Persons Under Investigation (PUI) and, only **6 have been identified as presumptive positive** in Louisiana.

The recent testing by the state laboratory run by LDH's Office of Public Health includes samples from people who went to their doctor or to a hospital and had symptoms consistent with COVID-19.

Because of patient privacy laws, LDH cannot provide any information that might identify these patients. This includes name, residence of patient, place of treatment, or any other potentially identifying patient information.

Disease Description

What are the symptoms?

For confirmed coronavirus infections, reported illnesses have ranged from infected people with little to no symptoms (similar to the common cold) to people being severely ill and dying. Symptoms can include:

⊨ Fever

⊨ Cough

Shortness of breath/difficulty breathing

Is their a vaccine or cure?

No.

There is no specific antiviral treatment recommended for this infection at this time.

 People infected with COVID-19 receive supportive care to help relieve symptoms.

Disease Description

How does novel coronavirus spread?

Health experts are still learning the details about how this new coronavirus spreads. Other coronaviruses spread from an infected person to others through:

- Respiratory droplets produced when coughing and sneezing
- ⊢ Close personal contact
- Touching an object or surface with the virus on it, then touching your mouth, nose, or eyes

What you can do?

Anyone who recently traveled to China, Iran, Italy, or South Korea, who experiences fever, cough, or other acute illness should contact a health care provider as soon as possible and mention your recent travel. <u>Please call ahead and inform</u> the health care provider about your travel history.

Take steps to avoid spreading germs from any respiratory diseases by:

- ⊢ Covering your cough
- B Staying home if you are sick
- Hashing your hands LA-GOV-20-1240, 20-1241, 20-1242-A-000097

Key Terms

Close contact is defined as:

a) being within approximately 6 feet (2 meters) of a COVID-19 case for a prolonged period of time; close contact can occur while caring for, living with, visiting, or sharing a healthcare waiting area or room with a COVID-19 case

– or –

- b) having direct contact with infectious secretions of a COVID-19 case (e.g., being coughed on)
- Self-monitoring means people should monitor themselves for fever by taking their temperatures twice a day and remain alert for cough or difficulty breathing. If they feel feverish or develop measured fever, cough or difficulty breathing during the selfmonitoring period, they should self-isolate, limit contact with others and seek advice by telephone from a healthcare provider or their local health department to determine whether medical evaluation is needed.

Key Terms

- Quarantine in general means the separation of a person or group of people reasonably believed to have been *exposed to* a communicable disease but not yet symptomatic, from others who have not been so exposed, to prevent the possible spread of the communicable disease.
- **Isolation** means the separation of a person or group of people known or reasonably believed to be *infected with a communicable disease and potentially infectious* from those who are not infected to prevent spread of the communicable disease. Isolation for public health purposes may be voluntary or compelled by federal, state or local public health order.

What The Public Should Do

What You Should Do:

- ⊨ Avoid close contact with people who are sick.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth with unwashed hands.
- Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. Use alcohol -based hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol if soap and water are not available.
- ⊨ Limit contact with others as much as possible.

⊢ Stay home when you are sick.

- Cover your cough or sneeze with a tissue when you cough or sneeze. Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth to prevent spreading germs.
- □ Clean and disinfect surfaces and objects that may be contaminated.

What You Should Not Do:

- Do not travel to China, Italy, South Korea, or Iran.
- Do not use facemasks.
 - CDC does not recommend the use of facemasks for the general public to prevent the spread of COVID-19
- Do not show prejudice to people of Asian descent, because of fear of this new virus. Do not assume that someone of Asian descent is more likely to have COVID-19.

Testing

Who should be tested?

If you develop a fever and symptoms of respiratory illness, such as cough or shortness of breath, within 14 days after travel from China, Italy, Iran, South Korea, and Japan.

- If you exhibit symptoms and care for someone with respiratory illness who tests negative for flu or other illnesses.
- ⊢ Call ahead to your healthcare provider and mention your recent travel or close contact.

- As of March 10, 2020, we have completed 43 tests, 6 of which have turned out positive.
- H We are awaiting testing from the CDC to confirm each result.
- CDC does not recommend testing, symptom monitoring, or special management for people exposed to asymptomatic people with potential exposures to SARS-CoV-2 (such as in a household), i.e., "contacts of contacts;" these people are not considered exposed.

The State of Louisiana, Department of Health ("LDH"), is committed to taking critical steps to ensure public health and safety; to prevent the spread of COVID-19 in healthcare facilities, the State of Louisiana, Department of Health, is <u>DIRECTING AND REQUIRING</u> that all licensed healthcare facilities in Louisiana that receive visitors, adhere to the following provisions, restrictions, and limitations, <u>EFFECTIVE IMMEDIATELY</u>:

A. VISITOR RESTRICTION

A.1. Any licensed healthcare facility in Louisiana that receives visitors shall **IMMEDIATELY PROHIBIT** all non-essential visitors for thirty (30) days; this 30 day mandatory prohibition of visitors shall commence on March 12, 2020, and shall end on April 10, 2020, unless otherwise extended by written notice from the Department.

(a) Visitors deemed essential, vital, or necessary to the patient's/client's/resident's care and well-being, as determined by the individual healthcare facility after consultation with the family/responsible party, may be allowed into the facility pursuant to policies/procedures adopted by the healthcare facility, provided that such visitor does not meet the definition of Restricted Person [see definition in Paragraph A.3 below].

LDH – Provider Memorandum – Visitation March 12, 2020 Page 2

A.2. However, this prohibition on non-essential visitors is subject to the following exception:

(a) A Visitor who does not meet the definition of a Restricted Person [see definition in Paragraph A.3 below] may be allowed to enter the facility as a non-essential visitor, subject to the facility's approval, in situations involving a resident/client/patient who is on end-of-life care.

A.3. A Restricted Person is defined as a person who meets any one or more of the following criteria:

(a) Has signs or symptoms of a respiratory infection, such as fever, cough, shortness of breath, or sore throat (as assessed by the facility);

(b) In the last 14 days, has had contact with someone with a confirmed diagnosis of COVID-19, or is under investigation for COVID-19, or has been or is currently ill with respiratory illness;

(c) Has been on international travel within the last 14 days to countries with sustained community transmission. For updated information on affected countries, please see: https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/travelers/index.html

(d) Is residing in a community where community-based spread of COVID-19 is occurring.

A.4. A facility shall immediately implement a policy and procedure to offer alternative means of communication for residents/clients/patients and their families and friends. Alternative means of communication may include virtual visitations and communications (telephone access, Skype, Face Time, other video-communications, etc.). Facility should consider assigning staff as primary contact for families for inbound calls, and should consider conducting regular outbound calls to keep families up to date.

A.5. A Facility shall immediately notify responsible parties and family members of prohibitions on visitation and the alternative means of communication for residents/clients.

B. ELECTIVE PROCEDURES

B.1 The Department recommends that all facilities consider limiting and restricting all elective or voluntary medical procedures in their facilities, for thirty (30) days from the date of this Notice.

Presidential Proclamation to Protect the Homeland from Travel-Related Coronavirus Spread

On Thursday, March 12, President Donald J. Trump signed a **Presidential Proclamation**, which suspends the entry of most foreign nationals who have been in certain European countries at any point during the 14 days prior to their scheduled arrival to the United States. These countries, known as the Schengen Area, include: Austria, Belgium, Czech Republic, Denmark, Estonia, Finland, France, Germany, Greece, Hungary, Iceland, Italy, Latvia, Liechtenstein, Lithuania, Luxembourg, Malta, Netherlands, Norway, Poland, Portugal, Slovakia, Slovenia, Spain, Sweden, and Switzerland. *This does not apply to legal permanent residents, (generally) immediate family members of U.S. citizens, and other individuals who are identified in the proclamation.*

the crews of aircraft continuing to fly between the US and foreign locations; and, dissemination of health messages about the virus, for airlines to use to inform their passengers.

- The U.S. government's travel restrictions and advisories have been a remarkably effective 'first layer' of containment. These travel requirements delayed the arrival of the virus to the United States, giving the nation precious time to prepare further measures, and plan for mitigation. This achievement took the cooperation of nearly 200 commercial airlines, a like number of overseas airports, and the Civil Aviation Authority of China.
- External Stakeholder outreach is being actively conducted throughout the modes of transportation in DOT. DOT has already hosted calls with stakeholders for the Federal Aviation Administration, Federal Transit Authority, Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration, and others. Additional calls are scheduled for outreach to additional stakeholders in all surface transportation, maritime, and labor.

U.S. Department of Labor (DOL)

- The Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) developed COVID-19 **planning guidance** for employers to implement engineering, administrative, and work practice controls and personal protective equipment (PPE). The guidance is intended for planning purposes employers and workers should use the planning guidance to help identify risk levels in workplace settings and to determine any appropriate control measures to implement.
- The U.S. Office of Personnel Management (OPM), an independent agency that serves as the chief human resources agency and personnel policy manager for the Federal Government, issued **guidance** for Federal Agencies regarding COVID-19 and human resources policies.
- DOL announced new guidance outlining flexibilities that States have in administering their unemployment (UI) programs to assist Americans affected by the COVID-19 outbreak. Under the guidance, federal law.

U.S. Department of Housing & Urban Development (HUD)

- The health and well-being of our country's most vulnerable citizens is Secretary Ben Carson's highest priority. At the direction of Secretary Carson senior HUD, officials have developed an Infectious Disease Toolkit for Continuum of Care homeless shelters (CoC). This includes specific documents addressing preparedness in shelters and encampment settings. More <u>here</u>.
- HUD has sent communication to CoC and Housing Opportunities for Persons With AIDS (HOPWA) grantees, highlighting the importance of infectious disease preparedness and linking to CDC and Healthcare for the Homeless resources: <u>Infectious</u> <u>Disease Preparedness Among Homeless Assistance Providers</u>
- HUD is coordinating with the CDC, Healthcare for the Homeless, United States Interagency Council on Homelessness (USICH) on messaging and cross-promoting resource materials. This will continue on an ongoing basis. Also, the Department is reaching out to Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) and Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) for future coordination.
- HUD has plenty of resources for your communities including:
 - Communities can use their unspent Emergency Solutions Grants and Continuum of Care Program funds to help address needs related to coronavirus. Additionally, a portion of CDBG funds are also available for public services, including health care.
 - Technical Assistance is available for ESG and CoC Program recipients if requested. Additionally, communities that want to amend their CDBG plans, can reach out to their CPD representative if they need assistance.

U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA)

- USDA Secretary Sonny Perdue <u>announced proactive flexibilities</u> to allow meal service during school closures to minimize potential exposure to the coronavirus. During an unexpected school closure, schools can leverage their participation in one of USDA's summer meal programs to provide meals at no cost to students. Under normal circumstances, those meals must be served in a group setting. However, in a public health emergency, the law allows USDA the authority to waive the group setting meal requirement, which is vital during a social distancing situation.
- USDA intends to use all available program flexibilities and contingencies to serve program participants across our 15 nutrition
 programs. USDA has already begun to issue waivers to ease program operations and protect the health of participants. USDA
 is receiving requests for waivers on an ongoing basis. As of today, USDA has been asked to waive congregate feeding
 requirements in Washington, California, Maryland, Alaska, Utah, Pennsylvania, Wyoming, Maine, Kansas, New Jersey, New
 York, South Carolina, South Dakota, and Virginia and USDA has granted those requests.

DHS is working with the Department of State, HHS, and the senior public health leadership with the Government of Mexico to prepare for any COVID-19 cases identified along the South West Border. This effort includes coordination with state, and local Public Health Officials to develop reporting and response courses of action.
- FEMA has rostered 56 four-person Incident Management Assistance Teams.
- The Countering Weapons of Mass Destruction Office, which contains the National Biosurveillance Integration Center and the Chief Medical Officer, has maintained close coordination with our Components and U.S. Government partners regarding the status of the outbreak and associated U.S. Government response actions.


CDC to Award Over \$560 Million to State & Local Jurisdictions in Support of COVID-19 Response

The Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) is announcing another upcoming action by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) to provide resources to state and local jurisdictions in support of our nation's response to the coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19). The \$8.3 billion dollar Supplemental passed by Congress included <u>statutory language</u> which prescribed the exact formula for disbursing the money: states will receive 90% of their <u>2019 CDC PHEP grants</u>. This marks the first tranche of funding to states from the \$8.3 billion supplemental. Your state health officers are receiving a letter today from CDC outlining what is needed to receive the funding, essentially they need to submit a spend plan and they will receive guidance on what that spend plan should contain. U.S. Department of Transportation (DOT)

- The U.S. Department of Transportation, in its important supporting role, has and will continue to coordinate with
- transportation stakeholders, foreign counterparts and other federal agencies to manage the risk in the United States.
- DOT continues to ensure: an active air bridge remains in place for the safe return of Americans from affected areas; airlines are funneling passenger flights to one of the eleven designated U.S. airports equipped to health-screen Americans returning from affected areas; continued air and sea cargo traffic between the US and China: health protocols are established to protect LA-GOV-20-1240. 20-1241. 20-1242-A-000116

the crews of aircraft continuing to fly between the US and foreign locations; and, dissemination of health messages about the virus, for airlines to use to inform their passengers.

- The U.S. government's travel restrictions and advisories have been a remarkably effective 'first layer' of containment. These travel requirements delayed the arrival of the virus to the United States, giving the nation precious time to prepare further measures, and plan for mitigation. This achievement took the cooperation of nearly 200 commercial airlines, a like number of overseas airports, and the Civil Aviation Authority of China.
- External Stakeholder outreach is being actively conducted throughout the modes of transportation in DOT. DOT has already hosted calls with stakeholders for the Federal Aviation Administration, Federal Transit Authority, Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration, and others. Additional calls are scheduled for outreach to additional stakeholders in all surface transportation, maritime, and labor.

U.S. Department of Labor (DOL)

- The Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) developed COVID-19 **planning guidance** for employers to implement engineering, administrative, and work practice controls and personal protective equipment (PPE). The guidance is intended for planning purposes employers and workers should use the planning guidance to help identify risk levels in workplace settings and to determine any appropriate control measures to implement.
- The U.S. Office of Personnel Management (OPM), an independent agency that serves as the chief human resources agency and personnel policy manager for the Federal Government, issued **guidance** for Federal Agencies regarding COVID-19 and human resources policies.
- DOL announced new guidance outlining flexibilities that States have in administering their unemployment (UI) programs to assist Americans affected by the COVID-19 outbreak. Under the guidance, federal law.

U.S. Department of Housing & Urban Development (HUD)

- The health and well-being of our country's most vulnerable citizens is Secretary Ben Carson's highest priority. At the direction of Secretary Carson senior HUD, officials have developed an Infectious Disease Toolkit for Continuum of Care homeless shelters (CoC). This includes specific documents addressing preparedness in shelters and encampment settings. More <u>here</u>.
- HUD has sent communication to CoC and Housing Opportunities for Persons With AIDS (HOPWA) grantees, highlighting the importance of infectious disease preparedness and linking to CDC and Healthcare for the Homeless resources: <u>Infectious</u> <u>Disease Preparedness Among Homeless Assistance Providers</u>
- HUD is coordinating with the CDC, Healthcare for the Homeless, United States Interagency Council on Homelessness (USICH) on messaging and cross-promoting resource materials. This will continue on an ongoing basis. Also, the Department is reaching out to Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) and Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) for future coordination.
- HUD has plenty of resources for your communities including:
 - Communities can use their unspent Emergency Solutions Grants and Continuum of Care Program funds to help address needs related to coronavirus. Additionally, a portion of CDBG funds are also available for public services, including health care.
 - Technical Assistance is available for ESG and CoC Program recipients if requested. Additionally, communities that want to amend their CDBG plans, can reach out to their CPD representative if they need assistance.

U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA)

- USDA Secretary Sonny Perdue <u>announced proactive flexibilities</u> to allow meal service during school closures to minimize potential exposure to the coronavirus. During an unexpected school closure, schools can leverage their participation in one of USDA's summer meal programs to provide meals at no cost to students. Under normal circumstances, those meals must be served in a group setting. However, in a public health emergency, the law allows USDA the authority to waive the group setting meal requirement, which is vital during a social distancing situation.
- USDA intends to use all available program flexibilities and contingencies to serve program participants across our 15 nutrition
 programs. USDA has already begun to issue waivers to ease program operations and protect the health of participants. USDA
 is receiving requests for waivers on an ongoing basis. As of today, USDA has been asked to waive congregate feeding
 requirements in Washington, California, Maryland, Alaska, Utah, Pennsylvania, Wyoming, Maine, Kansas, New Jersey, New
 York, South Carolina, South Dakota, and Virginia and USDA has granted those requests.

U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS)

- While the overall risk to the American public remains low, actions by DHS and the administration are decreasing the strain on public health officials by screening incoming travelers, expediting the processing of U.S. citizens returning from China, and ensuring resources are focused on the health and safety of the American people. It is important to recognize, that while there is a significant focus on containing and mitigating the spread of COVID-19, all departments and agencies of DHS are continuing to perform their regular duties with no impact on their mission.
- DHS is working to recognize, detect, and assist individuals attempting to enter the U.S. through our, airports, land ports, or waterways who may be carrying the virus: Cruise Lines International Association, CDC, USCG, and CBP. DHS is working with the Department of State, HHS, and the senior public health leadership with the Government of Mexico to prepare for any COVID-19 cases identified along the South West Border. This effort includes coordination with state, and local Public Health Officials to develop reporting and response courses of action.
- FEMA has rostered 56 four-person Incident Management Assistance Teams.
- The Countering Weapons of Mass Destruction Office, which contains the National Biosurveillance Integration Center and the Chief Medical Officer, has maintained close coordination with our Components and U.S. Government partners regarding the status of the outbreak and associated U.S. Government response actions.

Recent Announcements

On Thursday, March 12, SBA Administrator Jovita Carranza issued the following statement: "The President took bold, decisive action to make our 30 million small businesses more resilient to Coronavirus-related economic disruptions. Small businesses are vital economic engines in every community and state, and they have helped make our economy the strongest in the world. Our Agency will work directly with state Governors to provide targeted, low-interest disaster recovery loans to small businesses that have been severely impacted by the situation. Additionally, the SBA continues to assist small businesses with counseling and navigating their own preparedness plans through our network of 68 District Offices and numerous Resource Partners located around the country. The SBA will continue to provide every small business with the most effective and customer-focused response possible during these times of uncertainty." SBA's Economic Injury Disaster Loans offer up to \$2 million in assistance for a small business. 
CDC to Award Over \$560 Million to State & Local Jurisdictions in Support of COVID-19 Response

The Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) is announcing another upcoming action by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) to provide resources to state and local jurisdictions in support of our nation's response to the coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19). The \$8.3 billion dollar Supplemental passed by Congress included <u>statutory language</u> which prescribed the exact formula for disbursing the money: states will receive 90% of their <u>2019 CDC PHEP grants</u>. This marks the first tranche of funding to states from the \$8.3 billion supplemental. Your state health officers are receiving a letter today from CDC outlining what is needed to receive the funding, essentially they need to submit a spend plan and they will receive guidance on what that spend plan should contain. HHS Funds Development of COVID-19 Diagnostic Tests

Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) announced critical new measures designed to keep America's nursing home residents safe from COVID-19 taking the form of a <u>memorandum</u> and is based on the <u>newest</u> recommendations from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC).

Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration (FMCSA) - Emergency Declaration- Hours of Service Relief: FMCSA has issued an Emergency Declaration covering all 50 states and the District of Columbia to provide hours of service relief to drivers transporting emergency relief. Specifically, the declaration provides for regulatory relief for commercial motor vehicle operations providing direct assistance supporting emergency relief efforts, and will cover the shipment of: medical supplies and equipment related to the testing, diagnosis and treatment of COVID-19; supplies and equipment, including masks, gloves, hand sanitizer, soap and disinfectants, necessary for healthcare worker, patient and community safety, sanitation, and prevention of COVID-19 spread in communities; food for emergency restocking of stores; equipment, supplies and persons necessary for establishment and management of temporary housing and quarantine facilities related to COVID-19; persons designated by Federal, State or local authorities for transport for medical, isolation or quarantine purposes; and personnel to provide medical or other emergency services. The declaration does not cover routine commercial deliveries, or transportation of mixed loads of essential supplies and/or persons and goods or persons not related to emergency needs. Effective immediately, the declaration will remain in effect for the duration of the emergency or until 11:59 P.M. (ET), April 11, 2020, whichever occurs sooner.

Fact Sheet on H.R. 6021 – Families First Coronavirus Response Act

Following extensive negotiations with Congress, President Trump announced his support for legislation to help American workers and families impacted by the coronavirus.

- The President is committed to ensuring American workers and families have the support they need, and this legislation follows through on that.
- The Administration engaged in extensive discussions with Congress to secure key provisions and changes in language.
- As a result of the Administration's efforts, substantial improvements were made from the initial bill.

This delivers on President Trump's plan to help American workers and their families who have been harmed by the coronavirus outbreak.

- The legislation establishes tax credits to provide paid sick and family medical leave for employment interruptions related to coronavirus.
 - $\,\circ\,$ This will provide support for employees with coronavirus, under quarantine, caring for someone affected, or with children whose school has closed.
- Eligible employers will receive a dollar-for-dollar tax credit for any paid leave they provide under this program.
- Importantly, employees will be able to receive the paid leave directly from their employer, rather than an inefficient government run program.

- Every American who needs a test, should be able to get a test regardless of their financial circumstances.

- The Department of Health and Human Services is committed to providing as much information as possible to prepare communities for response to COVID-19. The Department, through the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the Food and Drug Administration, and other agencies, continuously provide guidance to healthcare providers, laboratories, communities, and state and local officials for dealing with suspected or confirmed cases of COVID-19. The most up-to-date information can be found at <u>www.coronavirus.gov</u>.
- Wednesday, March 12, CDC <u>announced</u> the imminent release of almost \$600 million to support state and local authorities respond to the COVID-19 outbreak. Full funding amounts are <u>here</u>,
- Framework Mitigation Strategies for Communities with Local COVID-19 Transmission: Protect yourself and your community from getting and spreading respiratory illnesses like coronavirus disease 2019. Everyone has a role to play in getting ready and staying healthy. CDC is aggressively responding to the global outbreak of COVID-19 and community spread in the United States. CDC's all of community approach is focused to slow the transmission of COVID-19, reduce illness and death, while minimizing social and economic impacts.
 - A Framework for Mitigation: Implementation of Mitigation Strategies for Communities with Local COVID-19 Transmission (*more here*; 10-page frame work for States, localities, and communities).

- The CDC has been actively working to address the need for testing across the country. You can find more information about testing <u>here</u>. We encourage review of the <u>Updated Guidance on Evaluating and Testing Persons for Coronavirus</u> <u>Disease 2019</u>, as well as the recently updated the <u>FAQ website for laboratories</u> to determine best practices for testing.
- The U.S. Public Health Service Commissioned Corps has deployed hundreds of officers to help with this response. As America's Health Responders, the Commissioned Corps is currently very involved in assisting the CDC with airport

- Part of preparedness includes a robust blood supply. The current situation around COVID-19 heightens the need for a ready blood supply, please encourage your health community members to keep their appointments to donate blood.
- CDC released updated **guidance** on infection prevention and control recommendations for healthcare workers. Healthcare workers are fighting this outbreak on the front lines, and this guidance is intended to provide assistance to healthcare settings that are handling suspected or confirmed cases of COVID-19. This guidance is applicable to all U.S. healthcare settings.
- · Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS)
 - *Flexibility and Relief for State Medicaid Agencies*: The national emergency declaration also enables CMS to grant state and territorial Medicaid agencies a wider range of flexibilities under section 1135 waivers. States and territories are now encouraged to assess their needs and request these available flexibilities, which are outlined in the Medicaid and CHIP Disaster Response Toolkit. Examples of flexibilities available to states under section 1135 waivers include the ability to permit out-of-state providers to render services, temporarily suspend certain provider enrollment and revalidation requirements to promote access to care, allow providers to provide care in alternative settings, waive prior authorization requirements, and temporarily suspend certain pre-admission and annual screenings for nursing home residents.  - *Waivers and Flexibilities for Hospitals and other Healthcare Facilities*: CMS will temporarily waive or modify certain Medicare, Medicaid, and CHIP requirements. CMS will also issue several blanket waivers, listed on the website below, and the CMS Regional Offices will review other provider-specific requests. These waivers provide continued access to care for beneficiaries. For more information on the waivers CMS has granted, visit <u>here</u>.
 - *Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) Nursing Home Guidance* : As you know, nursing homes and their residents are vulnerable populations for COVID-19. This week, CMS released updated guidance for infection control and prevention of COVID-19 in Nursing Homes which can be found <u>here</u> (3/9). The Press Release can be found <u>here</u> and all CMS guidance related to COVID-19 can be found <u>here</u>.

U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA)

- The Small Business Administration will work directly with state Governors to provide targeted, low-interest loans to small businesses and non-profits that have been severely impacted by the Coronavirus (COVID-19). The SBA's Economic Injury Disaster Loan program provides small businesses with working capital loans of up to \$2 million that can provide vital economic support to small businesses to help overcome the temporary loss of revenue they are experiencing. More here.
- The Coronavirus Preparedness and Response Supplemental expanded the disaster definition for the Small Business Administration's Economic Injury Disaster Loans (EIDL) to include COVID-19. Economic Injury Disaster Loans are SBA loans that are available to eligible Small Businesses, Small agricultural cooperatives, and most non-profits that have experienced substantial economic injury as a result of a disaster.
 - EIDLs are available in areas that are declared a disaster area by the SBA.
 - There has to be an SBA Disaster Declaration in an area for EIDL loans to be made available, which originates from a request made by the Governor.
 - To assist in the efforts, the SBA engages with States' Emergency Response Teams to help them comply with the requirements before a request is made.
- EIDL Loan Details
 - Entities that can apply for EIDL loans are eligible Small Businesses, Small agricultural cooperatives, and most private nonprofit organizations.
 - EIDL Loans are up to \$2million and have terms as long as 30 years.
- State and local officials who have been contacted by Small Businesses that may have been affected should share that information with their Governor or the State's Emergency Response Officials. More information on SBA's disaster loans, including eligibility and how to apply for loans, can be found here: www.SBA.gov/disaster.

U.S. Department of Education (DoED)

The Department of Education has established a dedicated Coronavirus webpage, which includes resources for institutions of higher education and for K-12.

- The website includes **guidance** for students at institutions of higher education, and covers Coronavirus-related scenarios that could impact students who are enrolled in study abroad programs, students who meet full-time requirements but fall below 12 credit hours, students who are quarantined and miss class, campuses that have temporarily stopped offering ground-based classes to prevent the spread of Coronavirus, and foreign schools that serve Americans who receive Federal financial aid. Also see a **letter from the Office for Civil Rights** that addresses potential discrimination associated with coronavirus.
- The Department is working on additional information for families and communities including:
 - · Information regarding certain flexibilities under the Every Student Succeeds Act, or "ESSA;"
 - Information regarding services to children with disabilities;
 - · A fact sheet from our Office for Civil Rights on the risk of Coronavirus in schools while protecting the civil rights of students; and
 - Information on the Family Education Records Privacy Act, or "FERPA," as it pertains to K-12 and higher education students.

U.S. Department of Transportation (DOT)

- The U.S. Department of Transportation, in its important supporting role, has and will continue to coordinate with transportation stakeholders, foreign counterparts and other federal agencies to manage the risk in the United States.
- DOT continues to ensure: an active air bridge remains in place for the safe return of Americans from affected areas; airlines
- are funneling passenger flights to one of the eleven designated U.S. armorze upique, dp. 1241, 20-022420 areas, armies

from affected areas; continued air and sea cargo traffic between the US and China; health protocols are established to protect the crews of aircraft continuing to fly between the US and foreign locations; and, dissemination of health messages about the virus, for airlines to use to inform their passengers.

- The U.S. government's travel restrictions and advisories have been a remarkably effective 'first layer' of containment. These
 travel requirements delayed the arrival of the virus to the United States, giving the nation precious time to prepare further
 measures, and plan for mitigation. This achievement took the cooperation of nearly 200 commercial airlines, a like number of
 overseas airports, and the Civil Aviation Authority of China.
- External Stakeholder outreach is being actively conducted throughout the modes of transportation in DOT. DOT has already hosted calls with stakeholders for the Federal Aviation Administration, Federal Transit Authority, Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration, and others. Additional calls are scheduled for outreach to additional stakeholders in all surface transportation, maritime, and labor.

U.S. Department of Labor (DOL)

- The Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) developed COVID-19 planning guidance for employers to implement engineering, administrative, and work practice controls and personal protective equipment (PPE). The guidance is intended for planning purposes – employers and workers should use the planning guidance to help identify risk levels in workplace settings and to determine any appropriate control measures to implement.
- The U.S. Office of Personnel Management (OPM), an independent agency that serves as the chief human resources agency and personnel policy manager for the Federal Government, issued **<u>guidance</u>** for Federal Agencies regarding COVID-19 and human resources policies.
- DOL announced new guidance outlining flexibilities that States have in administering their unemployment (UI) programs to assist Americans affected by the COVID-19 outbreak. Under the guidance, federal law.

U.S. Department of Housing & Urban Development (HUD)

- The health and well-being of our country's most vulnerable citizens is Secretary Ben Carson's highest priority. At the direction of Secretary Carson senior HUD, officials have developed an Infectious Disease Toolkit for Continuum of Care homeless shelters (CoC). This includes specific documents addressing preparedness in shelters and encampment settings. More here.
- HUD has sent communication to CoC and Housing Opportunities for Persons With AIDS (HOPWA) grantees, highlighting the importance of infectious disease preparedness and linking to CDC and Healthcare for the Homeless resources: <u>Infectious</u> <u>Disease Preparedness Among Homeless Assistance Providers</u>
- HUD is coordinating with the CDC, Healthcare for the Homeless, United States Interagency Council on Homelessness (USICH) on messaging and cross-promoting resource materials. This will continue on an ongoing basis. Also, the Department is reaching out to Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) and Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) for future coordination.
- HUD has plenty of resources for your communities including:
 - Communities can use their unspent Emergency Solutions Grants and Continuum of Care Program funds to help address needs related to coronavirus. Additionally, a portion of CDBG funds are also available for public services, including health care.
 - Technical Assistance is available for ESG and CoC Program recipients if requested. Additionally, communities that want to amend their CDBG plans, can reach out to their CPD representative if they need assistance.

U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA)

- USDA Secretary Sonny Perdue **announced proactive flexibilities** to allow meal service during school closures to minimize potential exposure to the coronavirus. During an unexpected school closure, schools can leverage their participation in one of USDA's summer meal programs to provide meals at no cost to students. Under normal circumstances, those meals must be served in a group setting. However, in a public health emergency, the law allows USDA the authority to waive the group setting meal requirement, which is vital during a social distancing situation.
- USDA intends to use all available program flexibilities and contingencies to serve program participants across our 15 nutrition programs. USDA has already begun to issue waivers to ease program operations and protect the health of participants. USDA is receiving requests for waivers on an ongoing basis. As of today, USDA has been asked to waive congregate feeding requirements in Washington, California, Maryland, Alaska, Utah, Pennsylvania, Wyoming, Maine, Kansas, New Jersey, New York, South Carolina, South Dakota, and Virginia and USDA has granted those requests.


U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS)

- While the overall risk to the American public remains low, actions by DHS and the administration are decreasing the strain on public health officials by screening incoming travelers, expediting the processing of U.S. citizens returning from China, and ensuring resources are focused on the health and safety of the American people. It is important to recognize, that while there is a significant focus on containing and mitigating the spread of COVID-19, all departments and agencies of DHS are continuing to perform their regular duties with no impact on their mission.
- DHS is working to recognize, detect, and assist individuals attempting to enter the U.S. through our, airports, land ports, or waterways who may be carrying the virus: Cruise Lines International Association, CDC, USCG, and CBP. DHS is working with the Department of State, HHS, and the senior public health leadership with the Government of Mexico to prepare for any COVID-19 cases identified along the South West Border. This effort includes coordination with state, and local Public Health Officials to develop reporting and response courses of action.
- FEMA has rostered 56 four-person Incident Management Assistance Teams.
- The Countering Weapons of Mass Destruction Office, which contains the National Biosurveillance Integration Center and the Chief Medical Officer, has maintained close coordination with our Components and U.S. Government partners regarding the status of the outbreak and associated U.S. Government response actions.
- Presidential Proclamation to Protect the Homeland from Travel-Related Coronavirus Spread: On Thursday, March 12, President Donald J. Trump signed a <u>Presidential Proclamation</u>, which suspends the entry of most foreign nationals who have been in certain European countries at any point during the 14 days prior to their scheduled arrival to the United States. LA-GOV-20-1240, 20-1241, 20-1242-A-000125

These countries, known as the Schengen Area, include: Austria, Belgium, Czech Republic, Denmark, Estonia, Finland, France, Germany, Greece, Hungary, Iceland, Italy, Latvia, Liechtenstein, Lithuania, Luxembourg, Malta, Netherlands, Norway, Poland, Portugal, Slovakia, Slovenia, Spain, Sweden, and Switzerland. *This does not apply to legal permanent residents, (generally) immediate family members of U.S. citizens, and other individuals who are identified in the proclamation.*





In an effort to keep you informed of federal response efforts related to COVID-19, we would like to share an update on CDC actions as of February 24th (see full update attached). Please visit <u>www.cdc.gov/COVID19</u> for the most up to date information. Current interim guidance issued by the CDC regarding COVID-19 is available at <u>https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-nCoV/hcp/index.html</u>

CDC is aggressively responding to the global outbreak of COVID-19 and preparing for the potential of community spread in the United States.

- Preparing first responders, healthcare providers, and health systems:
 - Establishing visibility across healthcare systems to understand healthcare use, particularly surges in demand for medical care and associated resources.
 - Conducting extensive outreach to clinical and hospital professional organizations to ensure health system preparedness.
 - Producing more than 23 guidance documents on infection control, hospital preparedness assessments, personal protective equipment (PPE) supply planning, and clinical evaluation and management (as of February 22, 2020).
 - Working closely with healthcare facilities and providers to reinforce infection control principles that recognize PPE is one component of a larger set of practices that help to limit the spread of disease.
 - Developing a range of respirator conservation strategies, including strategies to make supplies last longer (such as using alternative products like reusable respirators) and extending the use of disposable respirators.
 - o Leveraging existing telehealth tools to direct people to the right level of healthcare for their medical needs.
 - Working with supply chain partners to understand supply usage, what products are available, and when more
 aggressive measures may need to be taken to ensure that healthcare workers at highest risk have access to PPE.
 - $\circ\,$ Sharing information with stakeholders to help them recognize when to shift the strategies they are using.

Reinforcing state, territorial, and local public health readiness:

- Assessing state and local readiness to implement community mitigation measures like home containment, including housing and transportation needs.
- Coordinating with states to identify and mitigate gaps in readiness that will help reduce the spread of disease in the community while protecting workers, infrastructure, and institutions.
- Linking public health agencies and healthcare systems to identify and mitigate stressors to the health system
- · Tracking stockpiles of PPE across jurisdictions.
- Working with state and local public health to use existing Public Health Emergency Preparedness (PHEP) funding to support COVID-19 preparedness and response activities.
- Leveraging funding mechanisms to help states accelerate preparedness activities.
- Providing technical assistance and guidance to states to improve their ability to respond to the outbreak.

Supporting communities, businesses, and schools:

- Creating business guidance to help the public and private sectors ensure they are able to operate with adaptations like telework and flexible sick leave policies, as well as how to respond if an employee gets sick.
- Developing guidance for childcare programs, K-12 schools, and colleges/universities to help them plan and prepare for COVID-19 and respond if there is a local outbreak in their community.
- Providing planning guides for COVID-19 that households, community- and faith-based organizations, event planners of mass gatherings, and public health communicators can use.

Coronavirus Disease 2019 ("COVID-19") Outbreak

February 24, 2020

MAIN KEY POINTS

- There is an expanding global outbreak of respiratory illness caused by a novel (new) coronavirus.
- This virus has been named "SARS-CoV-2;" the disease it causes has been named COVID-19.
 - Due to potential for confusion with SARS-CoV, where possible, public communications will use "the virus that causes COVID-19."
- While most COVID-19 cases outside of China have been associated with travel to or from China, community spread is being detected in a growing number of countries.
- Destinations with apparent community spread of COVID-19 include Hong Kong, Iran, Italy, Japan, Singapore, South Korea, Taiwan, and Thailand.
- The fact that COVID-19 has caused illness, including illness resulting in death, and sustained person-to-person spread is concerning. These factors meet two of the criteria of a pandemic.
- As community spread is detected in more and more countries, the world moves closer toward meeting the third criteria, worldwide spread of the new virus.
- The potential public health threat posed by COVID-19 is high, both globally and to the United States.
- But individual risk is dependent on exposure.
- For the general American public, who are unlikely to be exposed to this virus at this time, the immediate health risk from COVID-19 is low.
- Under current circumstances, certain people will have an increased risk of infection. For example, healthcare workers caring for patients with COVID-19 and other close contacts of persons with COVID-19. CDC has developed guidance to help in the risk assessment and management of people with potential exposures to COVID-19.
- However, it's important to note that current global circumstances suggest it is likely that this virus will cause a pandemic. In that case, risk assessment would be different.
- Global efforts at this time are focused concurrently on containing spread of this virus and mitigating the impact of this virus.
- The federal government is working closely with state, local, tribal, and territorial partners, as well as public health partners, to respond to this public health threat.
- The public health response is multi-layered, with the goal of detecting and minimizing introductions of this virus in the United States so as to reduce the spread and the impact of this virus.
- CDC is operationalizing all of its pandemic preparedness and response plans, working on multiple fronts to meet these goals, including specific measures to <u>prepare communities</u> to respond local transmission of the virus that causes COVID-19.
- <u>Pandemic guidance</u> developed in anticipation of an influenza pandemic is being repurposed and adapted for a COVID-19 pandemic.
- Public health partners are encouraged to review their pandemic preparedness plans at this time.

- At this time, there is no vaccine to protect against COVID-19 and no medications approved to treat it.
- Nonpharmaceutical interventions would be the most important response strategy.
- CDC launched a new weekly email newsletter with updates on the agency's COVID-19 outbreak response. <u>Sign up for the newsletter</u>.

SITUATION UPDATE

- To date, 35 international locations (including the U.S.) have reported confirmed cases of COVID-19.
- More than 77,000 cases have been confirmed on mainland China, with more than 2,500 deaths.
- On February 22, 2020, CDC issued a Level 2 Travel Notice (Practice Enhanced Precautions) for Japan and South Korea.
- On February 23, 2020 CDC issued Level 1 Travel Alert Notices (Practice Usual Precautions) for Iran and Italy.
- CDC also recommends that all travelers reconsider cruise ship voyages into or within Asia at this time.
- This is consistent with guidance by the U.S. State Department.
- For the latest travel guidance, visit <u>COVID-19 Information for Travel</u>.
- This is a rapidly evolving situation. CDC is constantly reviewing and updating its guidance as needed.
- CDC is reporting confirmed cases of COVID-19 in the United States in two categories:
 - 1. Cases detected through our domestic public health systems, and
 - 2. Cases among people who were repatriated via U.S. State Department flights from Wuhan, China and from the Diamond Princess cruise ship (Japan).
- Fourteen cases of COVID-19 have been detected in California, Illinois, Massachusetts, Washington, and Wisconsin through U.S. public health surveillance.
- Two of these cases occurred through person-to-person spread. The remaining cases all were in persons who had travel to China.
- 39 cases of COVID-19 have been detected among the 1,100+ people repatriated from Hubei Province, China and the Diamond Princess. (That includes 3 people repatriated from Wuhan and 36 people who were repatriated from the Diamond Princes.)
- Almost all of the people from the Wuhan flights who were quarantined have finished their 14day quarantine period.
- Because the passengers on the Diamond Princess were in a close setting where there was significant spread of COVID-19, they are considered at high-risk for infection. CDC expects to see additional confirmed cases of among those passengers.

WHAT YOU CAN DO

- While the immediate risk of this new virus to the American public is believed to be low at this time, everyone can do their part to help us respond to this emerging public health threat:
 - It's currently flu and respiratory disease season and CDC recommends getting a flu vaccine, taking everyday preventive actions to help stop the spread of germs, and taking flu antivirals if prescribed.

- If you are a healthcare provider, be on the look-out for people with who recently traveled from China and fever and respiratory symptoms.
- If you are a healthcare provider caring for a COVID-19 patient or a public health responder, please take care of yourself and follow recommended infection control procedures.
- If you have been in China or have been exposed to someone sick with COVID-19 in the last 14 days, you will face some limitations on your movement and activity. Please follow instructions during this time. Your cooperation is integral to the ongoing public health response to try to slow spread of this virus. If you develop COVID-19 symptoms, contact your healthcare provider, and tell them about your symptoms and your travel or exposure to a COVID-19 patient.
- For people who have had close contact with someone with COVID-19 who develop symptoms, contact your healthcare provider, and tell them about your symptoms and your exposure to a COVID-19 patient.
- For people who are ill with COVID-19, please follow CDC guidance on how to reduce the risk of spreading your illness to others. This guidance in on the CDC website.

TESTING

- All testing for COVID-19 continues to be performed at CDC. At this time, all positive results from testing conducted in non-CDC, U.S. laboratories must be confirmed at CDC.
- CDC is remanufacturing test kits, which will be distributed following rigorous quality control processes.

- CDC has supported the Department of State in the safe and expedient ordered departure of U.S. citizens and residents affected by outbreaks of COVID-19.
 - Five chartered flights returned passengers from Wuhan City, China.
 - Most recently, passengers from a cruise ship docked in Japan were repatriated. (See section: *Diamond Princess*)
- The Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) Secretary, under statutory authority, issued federal quarantine orders to all such passengers entering the United States.
- Almost all of the people from the Wuhan flights who were quarantined fulfilled their 14-day quarantine period and been released.
 - On February 12, 195 people from the first chartered flight were discharged from quarantine.
 - On February 18, 347 people who were under federal quarantine were released.
 - On February 20, 263 people who were under federal quarantine were released.
- People released from quarantine pose no health risk to their communities.

DIAMOND PRINCESS

- On February 16, 329 American citizens returned by flights chartered by the State Department.
- Persons who are not sick are being kept in quarantine.
- Persons who are sick with COVID-19 are in isolation and receiving medical care as needed.

- All American passengers have disembarked from the *Diamond Princess* cruise ship. These people have been placed under travel restrictions, as have the ship's other passengers and crew.
- Some American crew members of the Diamond Princess remain aboard the ship.
- More than 60 Americans who were on board the Diamond Princess remain in Japan, hospitalized with COVID-2, including some who are reportedly severely ill.
- The U.S. Government is taking measures to protect the health of the people under quarantine, their loved ones, and their communities, as well as the communities where they are being temporarily housed.
- Based on what is known about this virus and other coronaviruses, CDC believes the risk to the communities temporarily housing these people is low.

WESTERDAM

- No testing of passengers from the Westerdam Cruise Ship for SARS-CoV-2, the virus that causes COVID-19, has been done at CDC.
- CDC is aware that an American passenger on the Westerdam tested positive for infection with SARS-CoV-2 in Malaysia and that two subsequent and sequential tests on samples from that same person were negative.
- CDC is aware that follow-up testing among more than 1,500 passengers from the Westerdam has all been negative.
- CDC considers passengers from the Westerdam to be at "low risk" of SARS-CoV-2 infection during the 14 days after their last exposure per the agency's <u>Risk Assessment guidance</u>.
- Given this level of risk, testing of Westerdam passengers for SARS-CoV-2 is not recommended unless additional exposures are identified to warrant testing.

CDC ACTIONS

- CDC is aggressively responding to the global outbreak of COVID-19 and preparing for the potential of community spread in the United States.
- Preparing first responders, healthcare providers, and health systems:
 - Establishing **visibility across healthcare systems** to understand healthcare use, particularly surges in demand for medical care and associated resources.
 - Conducting **extensive outreach to clinical and hospital professional organizations** to ensure health system **preparedness**.
 - Producing more than <u>23 guidance documents</u> on infection control, hospital preparedness assessments, personal protective equipment (PPE) supply planning, and clinical evaluation and management (as of February 22, 2020).
 - Working closely with healthcare facilities and providers to reinforce infection control principles that recognize PPE is one component of a larger set of practices that help to limit the spread of disease.
 - Developing a range of <u>respirator conservation strategies</u>, including strategies to make supplies last longer (such as using alternative products like reusable respirators) and extending the use of disposable respirators.
 - Leveraging existing **telehealth tools** to direct people to the right level of healthcare for their medical needs.

- Working with supply chain partners to understand supply usage, what products are available, and when more aggressive measures may need to be taken to ensure that healthcare workers at highest risk have access to PPE.
- **<u>Sharing information with stakeholders</u>** to help them recognize when to shift the strategies they are using.
- Reinforcing state, territorial, and local public health readiness:
 - **Assessing state and local readiness** to implement community mitigation measures like home containment, including housing and transportation needs.
 - Coordinating with states to **identify and mitigate gaps in readiness** that will help reduce the spread of disease in the community while protecting workers, infrastructure, and institutions.
 - Linking public health agencies and healthcare systems to **identify and mitigate stressors to the health system**
 - Tracking stockpiles of PPE across jurisdictions.
 - Working with state and local public health to use existing <u>Public Health Emergency</u> <u>Preparedness (PHEP)</u> funding to support COVID-19 preparedness and response activities.
 - Leveraging funding mechanisms to help states accelerate preparedness activities.
 - Providing **technical assistance and guidance** to states to improve their ability to respond to the outbreak.
- Supporting communities, businesses, and schools:
 - <u>Creating business guidance</u> to help the public and private sectors ensure they are able to operate with adaptations like telework and flexible sick leave policies, as well as how to respond if an employee gets sick.
 - **Developing guidance for childcare programs, K-12 schools, and colleges/universities** to help them plan and prepare for COVID-19 and respond if there is a local outbreak in their community.
 - Providing planning guides for COVID-19 that households, community- and faith-based organizations, event planners of mass gatherings, and public health communicators can use.
 - Educating communities about **nonpharmaceutical interventions (NPIs)** that help slow the spread of illness, like COVID-19.

Dear State and Local Partners:

Every day brings new information and developments on COVID-19, many of which impact your efforts to address the Coronavirus. We value our strong partnership with you all as we continue to work on the COVID-19 response. We aim to ensure that you have access to the resources and information that you need for your communities.

Here are key highlights:

National Emergency Declaration: Today, President Trump signed a <u>National Emergency Declaration</u> in response to COVID-19. The Emergency Declaration will allow HHS to provide emergency funding to state and local entities (up to \$50 billion) and specifically will enable HHS to waive provisions of certain laws and regulations to provide increased flexibility to healthcare providers. Additional flexibilities will be able to be exercised around the use of telehealth, state licensing requirements for providers to practice in areas of greatest need, increasing the supply of providers, loosening restrictions on where hospitals can care for patients within a hospital, and flexibilities on the number of beds and lengths of stay for Critical Access Hospitals.

Increasing Capacity for Testing: The Administration designated Assistant Secretary for Health, ADM Brett Giroir, M.D., to take the lead in coordinating testing efforts to ensure seamless access for patients, doctors, and hospitals. HHS is working to help expedite the availability of tests by utilizing the private sector and allowing states to offer and develop their own tests. Yesterday, the FDA authorized a diagnostic test developed by Roche, to rapidly expand the capacity and timeliness of testing for COVID-19 diagnostics. The FDA also approved the New York State Department of Health to directly authorize labs to begin patient testing. More information about these actions can be found <u>here</u>. For technical information on diagnostic testing, FDA posted <u>frequently asked questions</u> related to the development and performance of diagnostic testing.

With help from public-health and private-sector lab capabilities, HHS has also enabled states and healthcare providers to implement sample collection for pre-screened patients, similar to what is being done at the Mayo Clinic and Minnesota Department of Health, by the Colorado Health Department and by the University of Washington. CMS has also published the Medicare reimbursement amounts to providers for COVID-19 testing, which can be found <u>here</u>.

Lab Test Questions – As public and private testing labs continue to gear up capabilities and review the new options being created through the FDA, they may have questions. To help answer those questions that are technical in nature, the FDA has stood up a 24/7 hotline for things related to COVID-19: 1-888-INFO-FDA or 1-888-463-6332.

Essential Health Benefit Coverage of COVID-19: The FAQs released today, March 13, detail existing federal rules governing health coverage provided through the individual and small group insurance markets that apply to the diagnosis and treatment of COVID-19. The FAQs clarify which COVID-related services, including testing, isolation/quarantine, and vaccination, are generally currently covered as EHBs in these markets. The purpose of the FAQs is to provide guidance to Americans enrolled in individual or small group market health plans, including HealthCare.gov consumers. As questions and issues continue to come to CMS, they will be addressed and added to these FAQs. The document can be found here.

Community Response: All communities can take measures to reduce the spread of COVID-19. Everyone has a role to play in getting ready and staying healthy. CDC has released updated information on <u>Preventing the Spread of COVID-19 in Communities</u> as well as issuing <u>considerations</u> for school closures.

Surgical Masks and Gowns: The FDA sent a <u>letter to healthcare providers</u> on conservation strategies for personal protective equipment. The recommendations include strategies for conventional, contingency and crisis level of supplies.

Cruise Advisory: CDC and the State Department recommend travelers, particularly those with underlying health issues, defer all cruise ship travel worldwide. At this point, all passengers from the Grand Princess cruise have disembarked from the ship.

Please see the attached brief and FAQ document regarding the novel coronavirus, COVID-19.

This morning, the Governor held a meeting of the Unified Command Group (UCG) with state agency heads to make sure that every agency is preparing and coordinating with local, state, and federal partners. The Governor is being briefed regularly by LDH and GOHSEP regarding the virus and our preparations. It is important to note that currently, there are no confirmed cases of COVID-19 in Louisiana. The nearest case is in Texas, and this person remains in isolation. While the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) now expects there to be "community spread" in certain regions of the United States, the immediate threat to the United States and Louisiana remains low.

Additionally, LDH has put together online resources for the public at <u>Idh.louisiana.gov/Coronavirus</u>. Members of the public with questions about coronavirus, should contact the Coronavirus General Information Line at 1-855-523-2652 from 8:00 am – 4:30 pm, Monday through Friday. Please encourage your constituents and others to use official sources, like LDH or the CDC, for actual information about the illness. If you hear troubling rumors, please pass them along so we can work with our team to make sure we are communicating effectively and dispelling any mistruths.

The bigger threat to Louisiana remains the flu; we still are experiencing very high levels of that virus. It is not too late to get a flu shot. There are actions we all can take as individuals to be prepared for COVID-19. They are the same actions you take to prevent the spread of flu - cover your cough, wash your hands often and well, and stay home when you're sick.

COVID-19 (Coronavirus) *No confirmed cases in Louisiana*

Situation

- As of 03/02/20, there are no confirmed cases of Novel coronavirus (COVID-19) in Louisiana.
- The nearest case is in Texas, and this person remains in isolation.
- There are 15 confirmed cases in the United States; another 47 individuals with COVID-19 have been repatriated.
- While the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) now expects there to be "community spread" in certain regions of the United States, <u>the immediate threat to the United States and Louisiana remains low</u>. We are not yet seeing the same spread other countries are seeing.
- The Louisiana Department of Health remains in close contact with the CDC and has been proactively preparing for the introduction of this virus since it was first identified in China earlier this year.
- COVID-19 in many ways behaves similarly to influenza. The CDC are recommending using Pandemic Influenza Preparedness as our model for response, with the key focus being on Non-Pharmaceutical Interventions (NPI).
 - NPIs are actions, apart from getting vaccinated and taking *medicine* that people and communities can take to help slow the spread of illnesses like pandemic influenza (flu). NPIs are also known as community mitigation strategies.
- Louisiana has been working on Pandemic Preparedness for the last 15 years. We have a comprehensive State Pandemic Plan. We have also encouraged Pandemic Planning throughout the State, both in the governmental sector as well as the private sector.
- At this time, what poses a greater risk to Louisiana residents is the flu. It's not too late to get your flu shot which is available at no cost at your parish public health unit.

About Coronavirus

Coronaviruses are a large family of viruses, some causing illness in people and others that circulate among animals, including camels, cats and bats. Rarely, animal coronaviruses can evolve and infect people and then spread between people, like has been seen with recent outbreaks of MERS and SARS.

General Public Questions

Immediate Threat to the Public is Low

<u>Currently, the immediate threat to the general public in the U.S. remains low</u>. People with recent travel to China, South Korea, Iran, Italy, or Japan (or those who have come in contact with someone who has recently traveled to one of these countries and is ill with COVID-19) have a greater risk for becoming ill. Reported cases have ranged from mild illness (similar to a common cold) to severe pneumonia that requires hospitalization. So far, deaths have been reported mainly in older adults who had other health conditions. To minimize the risk of spread, Louisiana health officials are working with health care providers to promptly identify and evaluate any suspected cases.

Symptoms

For confirmed COVID-19 infections, reported illnesses have ranged from infected people with little to no symptoms (similar to the common cold) to people being severely ill and dying. Symptoms can include fever, cough, and shortness of breath/difficulty breathing.

The CDC believe at this time that symptoms of COVID-19 may appear in as few as 2 days or as long as 14 after exposure. There is no specific antiviral treatment recommended for COVID-19 infection. People infected with COVID-19 should receive supportive care to help relieve symptoms.

How is the virus spread

Health experts are still learning the details about how this new coronavirus spreads. Other coronaviruses spread from an infected person to others through:

- Respiratory droplets produced when coughing and sneezing
- Close personal contact
- Touching an object or surface with the virus on it, then touching your mouth, nose, or eyes

What can you do

Anyone who recently traveled to China, South Korea, Iran, Italy, or Japan within the previous 14 days, who experiences fever, cough, or other acute illness should contact a health care provider as soon as possible and mention your recent travel. Please call ahead and inform the health care provider about your travel history.

It is currently flu and respiratory disease season, and flu activity is still high and expected to continue for a number of weeks. Take steps to avoid spreading germs from any respiratory diseases by:

- Getting a flu vaccine and taking flu antivirals if prescribed
- Covering your cough
- Staying home if you are sick
- Washing your hands

State Response

- Louisiana has been working on Pandemic Preparedness for the last 15 years. We have a comprehensive State Pandemic Plan; additionally, we have also encouraged Pandemic Planning throughout the State, both in the government and private sectors.
- Louisiana has also put together a COVID-19 Task Force to build upon our pandemic plan in order to respond to the COVID-19 threat more specifically. Members will include essential subject matter experts from public health, hospital preparedness, human resources, emergency preparedness, and other government agencies.
- The Louisiana Department of Health is now able to test for the virus in the state public health lab.



COVID-19 Frequently Asked Questions

Q: Are there any confirmed cases in Louisiana?

A: As of 3/2/20, there are no confirmed cases in Louisiana.

Q: What is our message to the public?

A: While the CDC now expects community spread in some parts of the U.S., the immediate threat to the U.S. remains low. We are not seeing the same level of spread other countries are seeing. That said, it is important to be prepared, which is what we have been doing since the outbreak in mainland China.

There are actions we all can take as individuals to be prepared for COVID-19. The same actions you take to prevent the spread of flu put you in a good position for any respiratory illness - cover your cough, wash your hands often and well, and stay home when you're sick.

Q: What is the protocol in place for responding to a pandemic like Coronavirus/COVID-19?

A: COVID-19 in many ways behaves similarly to influenza. The CDC are recommending using the Pandemic Influenza Preparedness plan as our model for the response because COVID-19 in many ways behaves similarly to influenza. The Louisiana Department of Health has been working on our Pandemic Preparedness Plan for the last 15 years, and we have been preparing for COVID-19 since it was first reported in China in December 2019. The Governor directed the formation of a COVID-19 Task Force with representation from state agencies and federal partners key to preparing for a COVID-19 outbreak to guide updating pandemic flu and continuity of operations planning documents and advise the Unified Command Group.

Q: What have you been doing as far as monitoring people who may have been exposed?

A: Our first priority was to ensure we were monitoring any travelers who returned to Louisiana from visiting China, where many of the cases have occurred, and especially Wuhan, the city that experienced the largest outbreak. We touch base with those travelers each day and ask about their symptoms during a 14-day period of observation. We are also ensuring that travelers know the destinations where non-essential travel should be avoided.

Q: Do we have the capability to test?

A: We do have the capability to test for COVID-19 in-state. Providers should contact the Office of Public Health Division's Infectious Disease Epidemiology Program (IDEpi).

Q: What's the next major step in the Department's plan for responding to an outbreak?

A: Mirroring the federal government's response, we are moving from a 'containment' approach in which we focused on restricting travel from the outbreak area in Wuhan city and Hubei province in China and monitoring returning travelers from other parts of China, to a 'mitigation' approach in which we anticipate and plan for person-to-person transmission in the community somewhere in the United States and ensure state and local governments, health care providers, schools, businesses, and community members are adequately prepared to take action to reduce the spread of COVID-19. We don't want people to be alarmed, but we do want them to be prepared. We also want businesses and health care facilities to be prepared to make sure people are safe and protected so we can avoid an unnecessary spread, including planning now for actions that can be taken to avoid the spread of infections such as mandatory teleworking and canceling unnecessary large gatherings.



- Q: Why are you using the state's pandemic plan that was developed for an influenza outbreak like H1N1?
- A: COVID-19 behaves very much like the flu, and all of the drills we've done around responding to an influenza outbreak apply extremely well to dealing with a COVID-19 outbreak.

Q: Do plans for the future include quarantining?

A: Although we don't expect to do quarantines for this particular infection, we have extensive plans stemming from our H1N1 and Ebola planning which had us exercise the legal authority to quarantine.

Q: What are you doing to make sure hospitals are prepared?

- A: LDH has been working with Louisiana Hospital Association (LHA) and the ESF8 Network to prepare hospitals for an outbreak and ensure they have the proper supplies needed as well as protocols are in place for anyone treated who tests positive. We haven't had any indication that hospitals don't have what they need on the supply side.
- Q: Have you seen any indication that the consumer market is having problems keeping up with demand for supplies, such as face masks?
- A: So far, everyone has been able to acquire what they need, but we understand that just as when a big storm is predicted and grocery stores run low on supplies because of high demand, that may happen in this case. We are anticipating that an outbreak could produce bottlenecks in the future. We're focused on ensuring patients who rely on personal protective equipment, such as face masks, even without an outbreak, will be first in line for any new stock.
- Q: Is the Louisiana Department of Health concerned about shipping channels such as the Port of New Orleans being affected by COVID-19?
- A: Department officials met with the Coast Guard to discuss potential issues with the COVID-19 virus once it became more clear that the virus was spreading globally last week. We don't think there will be potential for spreading the virus through shipping channels, as anyone on board a vessel is likely to have already gone through the virus' cycle while on board the ship. Chinese goods in particular have a two-week shipping time from China, which is the period of observation for individuals potentially exposed to SARS-CoV-2 to develop COVID-19. There's been no indication that Chinese-made goods on their own would play a role in spreading COVID-19.

Q: So is it safe to receive a package from any area where COVID-19 has been reported?

A: Yes. The likelihood of an infected person contaminating commercial goods is low and the risk of catching the virus that causes COVID-19 from a package that has been moved, traveled, and exposed to different conditions and temperature is also low.

Q: What federal resources have been made available to Louisiana to aid in the response?

A: We receive a number of federal resources for emergency preparedness that we are awarded yearly, including for hurricane preparation. Our federal partners have given us flexibility to shift some of that existing funding into COVID-19 preparation. If the U.S. Congress approves the \$2.5 billion for COVID-19 that's now being discussed, we expect we would use some of that funding to expand our Infectious Disease Epidemiology Program.



Q: Are you in regular contact with the federal government?

A: Yes. We are in very regular contact with the CDC and HHS; we're currently averaging several calls per week just with the CDC. In addition, we have standing calls across state health departments and a standing call internally in Louisiana. This is all very important so that we all have the latest data, are on the same page, and can adapt our plans as conditions change.

Q: Should families have a plan if an outbreak occurs?

A: The best preparation families can do is practice good seasonal flu/cold hygiene: cover your cough, wash your hands (especially after being in public spaces, shaking hands), stay home if you are sick, and get your flu shot! Families should also monitor the CDC COVID-19 website for updated travel advisories before making plans to travel internationally.

Q: Are you screening travelers from any of the other countries where there have been outbreaks?

A: Currently no, but the situation is changing quickly, and we are in close communication with the CDC.

FOR IMMEDIATE RELEASE

The State of Louisiana, Department of Health ("LDH"), is committed to taking critical steps to ensure public health and safety; to prevent the spread of COVID-19 in healthcare facilities, the State of Louisiana, Department of Health, is **DIRECTING AND REQUIRING** that all licensed healthcare facilities in Louisiana that receive visitors, adhere to the following provisions, restrictions, and limitations, **EFFECTIVE IMMEDIATELY**:

A. VISITOR RESTRICTION

A.1. Any licensed healthcare facility in Louisiana that receives visitors shall **IMMEDIATELY PROHIBIT** all non-essential visitors for thirty (30) days; this 30 day mandatory prohibition of visitors shall commence on March 12, 2020, and shall end on April 10, 2020, unless otherwise extended by written notice from the Department.

(a) Visitors deemed essential, vital, or necessary to the patient's/client's/resident's care and well-being, as determined by the individual healthcare facility after consultation with the family/responsible party, may be allowed into the facility pursuant to policies/procedures adopted by the healthcare facility, provided that such visitor does not meet the definition of Restricted Person [see definition in Paragraph A.3 below].

A.2. However, this prohibition on non-essential visitors is subject to the following exception:

(a) A Visitor who does not meet the definition of a Restricted Person [see definition in Paragraph A.3 below] may be allowed to enter the facility as a non-essential visitor, subject to the facility's approval, in situations involving a resident/client/patient who is on end-of-life care.

A.3. A Restricted Person is defined as a person who meets any one or more of the following criteria:

(a) Has signs or symptoms of a respiratory infection, such as fever, cough, shortness of breath, or sore throat (as assessed by the facility);

(b) In the last 14 days, has had contact with someone with a confirmed diagnosis of COVID-19, or is under investigation for COVID-19, or has been or is currently ill with respiratory illness;

(c) Has been on international travel within the last 14 days to countries with sustained community transmission. For updated information on affected countries, please see: https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/travelers/index.html

(d) Is residing in a community where community-based spread of COVID-19 is occurring.

A.4. A facility shall immediately implement a policy and procedure to offer alternative means of communication for residents/clients/patients and their families and friends. Alternative means of communication may include virtual visitations and communications (telephone access, Skype, Face Time, other video-communications, etc.). Facility should consider assigning staff as primary contact for families for inbound calls, and should consider conducting regular outbound calls to keep families up to date.

A.5. A Facility shall immediately notify responsible parties and family members of prohibitions on visitation and the alternative means of communication for residents/clients.

B. ELECTIVE PROCEDURES

B.1 The Department recommends that all facilities consider limiting and restricting all elective or voluntary medical procedures in their facilities, for thirty (30) days from the date of this Notice.

End of Memo

State health department orders healthcare facilities to restrict visitors

Effective today, the Louisiana Department of Health is requiring all licensed healthcare facilities in the state to restrict visitors to those deemed essential, vital or necessary to the care and wellbeing of patients, clients and residents. This action is being taken to limit the spread of COVID-19, commonly referred to as coronavirus, among the populations most vulnerable to the virus.

This prohibition will last for the next 30 days, ending on April 10, 2020 unless otherwise extended by the Department.

Visitors who will be allowed into each facility will be determined by those facilities after consultation with families and responsible parties. This does not extend to non-essential visitors in situations involving end of life care, as approved by the facility.

However, any visitor that meets the definition of a restricted person cannot enter a facility.

A restricted person is defined as someone who:

- Has signs or symptoms of a respiratory infection, such as fever, cough, shortness of breath or sore throat as assessed by the facility;
- In the last 14 days, has had contact with someone with a confirmed diagnosis of COVID-19, or is under investigation for COVID-19 or has been or is currently ill with respiratory illness;
- Has been on international travel within the last 14 days to countries with sustained community transmission of COVID-19; or
- Is residing in a community where community-based spread of COVID-19 is occurring.

Facilities are required to provide alternative means of communication, including virtual visitations, and should consider assigning staff as primary contact for families and regular calls to keep families up to date.

The Department also recommends that all facilities considering limiting or restricting all elective or voluntary medical procedures for the next 30 days.

In addition to the above links, we wanted to share with you some questions that can inform preparedness plans. These will be particularly important if the U.S. response has to move from aggressive containment to a mitigation response. We encourage you to use these to reflect on these as you explore possible necessary response actions. In a response focused on mitigation rather than containment, state and local officials will be responsible for three key pieces of a state's response:

- Transportation;
- · Housing for individuals under observation or quarantine; and
- Communication and Coordination with local and private sector partners.

We encourage you to confer and collaborate with your Attorneys General and legislature leaders to confirm and identify what authorities that you have and any that you may need to be granted.

Authorities & Responsibilities for Prudent State and Local Planning:

- Have you reviewed the scope of your emergency authorities as Governor to respond to a public health crisis in your state?
 - When have you last exercised these authorities?
 - Do you have plans to in the future?
- What are your quarantine and isolation authorities, roles, and responsibilities?
- Do you have plans for canceling large events and community gatherings?
- Do you have a mechanism to encourage or compel school closures, if necessary? If so, what is its scope? (public v. private, secondary v. university, time limited, etc.)?
- What are your policies for limiting or discouraging mass transit?
- Coordination and Communication with Local Governments what authorities do local governments have in your state? What is your coordination plan between state, local, and tribal governments?
- What public health and human resource resources do you have for local governments, the private sector, and non-profits on hygiene or social distancing?
- What are your critical infrastructure, key resources, and essential services that might face personnel shortages?
- Do you have policies and plans in place for state and local government workers?

Finally, the U.S. State Department has posted guidance for cruise ship passengers in the event of planned travel to or within East Asia and the Asia-Pacific Region. That guidance can be found <u>here</u>.

UPDATE: Health officials on Tuesday confirm six total presumptive positive COVID-19 cases in Louisiana as state increases testing for the virus

BATON ROUGE, La. – The Louisiana Department of Health reported on Tuesday evening three new presumptive positive cases of COVID-19, commonly referred to as coronavirus, all three residents of Orleans Parish Two are hospitalized in Orleans Parish; the third is hospitalized in St. Tammany Parish.

Gov. John Bel Edwards said, "Currently, we have a total of six presumptive positive cases of coronavirus in Louisiana. While we investigate these cases, we cannot disclose any additional information about these patients at this time."

The presumptive positive tests will be sent to the CDC for final confirmation of COVID-19. Louisiana will move forward as if the tests are actual positives and take actions to contain the illness and assess the risk of spread.

Additional tests will be administered to determine if more people have been infected after the Department's epidemiology team performs an investigation of close contacts.

At this time, there are a total of six known cases of the illness in the state. Gov. Edwards announced the state's first presumptive positive case, a Jefferson Parish resident, on Monday, March 9, and two additional presumptive positive cases on Tuesday afternoon, both in Orleans Parish.

"At this point in our investigation we believe the first presumptive positive announced yesterday [Monday] is not travel-related and was community acquired," said Dr. Alex Billioux, Assistant Secretary of the Office of Public Health.

Louisiana ramps up testing

This comes as the state has increased testing for the virus.

In the five days since receiving more test kits from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, LDH has tested more than seven times as many people for the virus.

With 43 tests of Persons Under Investigation (PUI) now completed, only six have been confirmed presumptive positive in Louisiana. This compares to five completed tests as of Friday, March 6.

Health officials expected that increased testing for COVID-19 would lead to confirmation of additional cases in the state.

LDH is following the CDC's guidance and testing three groups of people – those who have traveled to certain areas and have symptoms, those who have had close contact with someone confirmed to have COVID-19 and have symptoms, and people with an unexplained acute respiratory illness.

The recent testing by the state laboratory run by LDH's Office of Public Health includes samples from people who went to their doctor or to a hospital and had symptoms consistent with COVID-

19, cough, headache, or lower respiratory illness. Some patients had recently traveled to a geographic area with known COVID-19 activity, while others did not have such a travel history.

In other instances, OPH is using the tests for surveillance purposes. This is done using existing disease surveillance infrastructure that includes several hospitals and clinics throughout Louisiana. For COVID-19 surveillance, when patients are treated for respiratory illnesses, but are not diagnosed with influenza, swabbed samples are sent to the State public health lab where the COVID-19 test is done. Following CDC guidance, a sampling of cases from each site are sent the lab. This is a proven and effective system for the early detection of diseases, allowing health officials to take the appropriate next steps.

For all people who have symptoms and who are being tested, they and their healthcare provider are being advised on precautions to take to prevent spreading the illness to others. Precautions include self-isolation at home or in an isolation room at the hospital.

Some commercial labs are now equipped to conduct COVID-19 testing. With these private labs ready to test, healthcare providers will start sending their samples to those labs. LDH will be notified of any positive results coming from a commercial lab.

Appropriate treatment and precautions will immediately be put in place for any positive commercial test before that test is confirmed by the State lab, and the public will be notified.

Advice for the public

State officials encourage Louisianans to take the following proactive steps to protect the health of themselves and those around them:

- Stay home if you are sick.
- Cover your cough.
- Wash your hands frequently and thoroughly with soap and water, or with a hand sanitizer containing at least 60% alcohol if soap and water are not available.
- Disinfect frequently touched surfaces.
- Avoid close contact (within six feet) with those who are sick.

Symptoms can include fever, cough and shortness of breath or difficulty breathing. CDC believes at this time that symptoms of COVID-19 may appear in as few as two days or as long as 14 days after exposure.

Yesterday, NGA held a call with 140 key governors' advisors and Washington Representatives/State-Federal Contacts and experts on the COVID-19 as part of an NGA State Coronavirus Action Network (SCAN). This call featured state public health and legal considerations, including federal-state coordination, and health information sharing. Our government relations team also provided an update regarding emergency supplemental funding. During this call, states identified the need for additional federal resources and for coordination in state preparedness and response efforts.

To help with the coordination and alignment of state efforts, NGA launched a<u>website</u> regarding COVID-19 as a resource for you and state officials. SCAN will be holding bi-weekly calls to support state officials regarding COVID-19 planning and response. These calls are designed to allow states to share best practices, speak with subject-matter experts, and receive technical assistance from the National Governors Association.

Dr. Giroir:

Thank you for your work on this pandemic emergency.

There are now 77 presumptive positive cases in Louisiana, with the vast majority being in Orleans and Jefferson Parish. An hour ago we announced the first death — a 58 year old gentleman from New Orleans with chronic health conditions. On a per capita basis, I believe Louisiana has the third most cases in the country.

Immediate Threat to the Public is Low

<u>Currently, the immediate threat to the general public in the U.S. remains low</u>. Reported cases have ranged from mild illness (similar to a common cold) to severe pneumonia that requires hospitalization. So far, deaths have been reported mainly in older adults who had other health conditions. To minimize the risk of spread, Louisiana health officials are working with health care providers to promptly identify and evaluate any suspected cases.

Symptoms

For confirmed COVID-19 infections, reported illnesses have ranged from infected people with little to no symptoms (similar to the common cold) to people being severely ill and dying. Symptoms can include fever, cough, and shortness of breath/difficulty breathing.

The CDC believe at this time that symptoms of COVID-19 may appear in as few as 2 days or as long as 14 after exposure. There is no specific antiviral treatment recommended for COVID-19 infection. People infected with COVID-19 should receive supportive care to help relieve symptoms.

How is the virus spread

Health experts are still learning the details about how this new coronavirus spreads. Other coronaviruses spread from an infected person to others through:

- Respiratory droplets produced when coughing and sneezing
- Close personal contact
- Touching an object or surface with the virus on it, then touching your mouth, nose, or eyes

What can you do

Anyone who recently traveled to China, South Korea, Iran, Italy, or Japan within the previous 14 days, who experiences fever, cough, or other acute illness should contact a health care provider as soon as possible and mention your recent travel. Please call ahead and inform the health care provider about your travel history.

Q: What is the protocol in place for responding to a pandemic like Coronavirus/COVID-19?

A: COVID-19 in many ways behaves similarly to influenza. The CDC are recommending using the Pandemic Influenza Preparedness plan as our model for the response because COVID-19 in many ways behaves similarly to influenza. The Louisiana Department of Health has been working on our Pandemic Preparedness Plan for the last 15 years, and we have been preparing for COVID-19 since it was first reported in China in December 2019. The Governor directed the formation of a COVID-19 Task Force with representation from state agencies and federal partners key to preparing for a COVID-19 outbreak to guide updating pandemic flu and continuity of operations planning documents and advise the Unified Command Group.

Q: What have you been doing as far as monitoring people who may have been exposed?

A: Our first priority was to ensure we were monitoring any travelers who returned to Louisiana from visiting China, where many of the cases have occurred, and especially Wuhan, the city that experienced the largest outbreak. We touch base with those travelers each day and ask about their symptoms during a 14-day period of observation. We are also ensuring that travelers know the destinations where non-essential travel should be avoided.

Q: Do we have the capability to test?

A: We do have the capability to test for COVID-19 in-state. Providers should contact the Office of Public Health Division's Infectious Disease Epidemiology Program (IDEpi).

Q: What's the next major step in the Department's plan for responding to an outbreak?

A: Mirroring the federal government's response, we are moving from a 'containment' approach in which we focused on restricting travel from the outbreak area in Wuhan city and Hubei province in China and monitoring returning travelers from other parts of China, to a 'mitigation' approach in which we anticipate and plan for person-to-person transmission in the community somewhere in the United States and ensure state and local governments, health care providers, schools, businesses, and community members are adequately prepared to take action to reduce the spread of COVID-19. We don't want people to be alarmed, but we do want them to be prepared. We also want businesses and health care facilities to be prepared to make sure people are safe and protected so we can avoid an unnecessary spread, including planning now for actions that can be taken to avoid the spread of infections such as mandatory teleworking and canceling unnecessary large gatherings.



- Q: Why are you using the state's pandemic plan that was developed for an influenza outbreak like H1N1?
- A: COVID-19 behaves very much like the flu, and all of the drills we've done around responding to an influenza outbreak apply extremely well to dealing with a COVID-19 outbreak.

Q: Do plans for the future include quarantining?

A: Although we don't expect to do quarantines for this particular infection, we have extensive plans stemming from our H1N1 and Ebola planning which had us exercise the legal authority to quarantine.

Q: What are you doing to make sure hospitals are prepared?

- A: LDH has been working with Louisiana Hospital Association (LHA) and the ESF8 Network to prepare hospitals for an outbreak and ensure they have the proper supplies needed as well as protocols are in place for anyone treated who tests positive. We haven't had any indication that hospitals don't have what they need on the supply side.
- Q: Have you seen any indication that the consumer market is having problems keeping up with demand for supplies, such as face masks?
- A: So far, everyone has been able to acquire what they need, but we understand that just as when a big storm is predicted and grocery stores run low on supplies because of high demand, that may happen in this case. We are anticipating that an outbreak could produce bottlenecks in the future. We're focused on ensuring patients who rely on personal protective equipment, such as face masks, even without an outbreak, will be first in line for any new stock.
- Q: Is the Louisiana Department of Health concerned about shipping channels such as the Port of New Orleans being affected by COVID-19?
- A: Department officials met with the Coast Guard to discuss potential issues with the COVID-19 virus once it became more clear that the virus was spreading globally last week. We don't think there will be potential for spreading the virus through shipping channels, as anyone on board a vessel is likely to have already gone through the virus' cycle while on board the ship. Chinese goods in particular have a two-week shipping time from China, which is the period of observation for individuals potentially exposed to SARS-CoV-2 to develop COVID-19. There's been no indication that Chinese-made goods on their own would play a role in spreading COVID-19.

Q: So is it safe to receive a package from any area where COVID-19 has been reported?

A: Yes. The likelihood of an infected person contaminating commercial goods is low and the risk of catching the virus that causes COVID-19 from a package that has been moved, traveled, and exposed to different conditions and temperature is also low.

Q: What federal resources have been made available to Louisiana to aid in the response?

A: We receive a number of federal resources for emergency preparedness that we are awarded yearly, including for hurricane preparation. Our federal partners have given us flexibility to shift some of that existing funding into COVID-19 preparation. If the U.S. Congress approves the \$2.5 billion for COVID-19 that's now being discussed, we expect we would use some of that funding to expand our Infectious Disease Epidemiology Program.



Q: Are you in regular contact with the federal government?

A: Yes. We are in very regular contact with the CDC and HHS; we're currently averaging several calls per week just with the CDC. In addition, we have standing calls across state health departments and a standing call internally in Louisiana. This is all very important so that we all have the latest data, are on the same page, and can adapt our plans as conditions change.

Q: Should families have a plan if an outbreak occurs?

A: The best preparation families can do is practice good seasonal flu/cold hygiene: cover your cough, wash your hands (especially after being in public spaces, shaking hands), stay home if you are sick, and get your flu shot! Families should also monitor the CDC COVID-19 website for updated travel advisories before making plans to travel internationally.

Q: Are you screening travelers from any of the other countries where there have been outbreaks?

A: Currently no, but the situation is changing quickly, and we are in close communication with the CDC.

A: Yes. The likelihood of an infected person contaminating commercial goods is low and the risk of catching the virus that causes COVID-19 from a package that has been moved, traveled, and exposed to different conditions and temperature is also low.

Q: What federal resources have been made available to Louisiana to aid in the response?

A: We receive a number of federal resources for emergency preparedness that we are awarded yearly, including for hurricane preparation. Our federal partners have given us flexibility to shift some of that existing funding into COVID-19 preparation. If the U.S. Congress approves the \$2.5 billion for COVID-19 that's now being discussed, we expect we would use some of that funding to expand our Infectious Disease Epidemiology Program.



Q: Are you in regular contact with the federal government?

A: Yes. We are in very regular contact with the CDC and HHS; we're currently averaging several calls per week just with the CDC. In addition, we have standing calls across state health departments and a standing call internally in Louisiana. This is all very important so that we all have the latest data, are on the same page, and can adapt our plans as conditions change.

Q: Should families have a plan if an outbreak occurs?

A: The best preparation families can do is practice good seasonal flu/cold hygiene: cover your cough, wash your hands (especially after being in public spaces, shaking hands), stay home if you are sick, and get your flu shot! Families should also monitor the CDC COVID-19 website for updated travel advisories before making plans to travel internationally.

Q: Are you screening travelers from any of the other countries where there have been outbreaks?

A: Currently no, but the situation is changing quickly, and we are in close communication with the CDC.

Good afternoon members –

We haven't had any indication that hospitals don't have what they need on the supply side.

Q: Is it safe to receive a package from any area where COVID-19 has been reported?

A: Yes. The likelihood of an infected person contaminating commercial goods is low and the risk of catching the virus that causes COVID-19 from a package that has been moved, traveled, and exposed to different conditions and temperature is also low.

Q: Are you in regular contact with the federal government?

A: Yes. We are in very regular contact with the CDC and HHS; we're currently averaging several calls per week just with the CDC. In addition we have standing calls across state health departments and a standing call internally in Louisiana. This is all very important so that we all have the latest data, are on the same page, and can adapt our plans as conditions change.

Q: Should individuals and families have a plan if an outbreak occurs?

Presidential Proclamation to Protect the Homeland from Travel-Related Coronavirus Spread

On Thursday, March 12, President Donald J. Trump signed a **Presidential Proclamation**, which suspends the entry of most foreign nationals who have been in certain European countries at any point during the 14 days prior to their scheduled arrival to the United States. These countries, known as the Schengen Area, include: Austria, Belgium, Czech Republic, Denmark, Estonia, Finland, France, Germany, Greece, Hungary, Iceland, Italy, Latvia, Liechtenstein, Lithuania, Luxembourg, Malta, Netherlands, Norway, Poland, Portugal, Slovakia, Slovenia, Spain, Sweden, and Switzerland. *This does not apply to legal permanent residents, (generally) immediate family members of U.S. citizens, and other individuals who are identified in the proclamation.*

Background & Additional Information for State & Local Officials

U.S. Department of Health & Human Services (HHS)

- The Department of Health and Human Services is committed to providing as much information as possible to prepare communities for response to COVID-19. The Department, through the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the Food and Drug Administration, and other agencies, continuously provide guidance to healthcare providers, laboratories, communities, and state and local officials for dealing with suspected or confirmed cases of COVID-19. The most up-to-date information can be found at <u>www.coronavirus.gov</u>.
- Wednesday, March 12, CDC <u>announced</u> the imminent release of almost \$600 million to support state and local authorities respond to the COVID-19 outbreak. Full funding amounts are <u>here</u>.
- CDC released their "Implementation of Mitigation Strategies for Communities with Local COVID-19 <u>Transmission</u>." This is a guide for communities describing possible coronavirus transmission. Community mitigation strategies are often the most available interventions to help slow the transmission of COVID-19 in communities.
- The CDC has been actively working to address the need for testing across the country. You can find more information about testing <u>here</u>. We encourage review of the <u>Updated Guidance on Evaluating and Testing Persons for Coronavirus</u> <u>Disease 2019</u>, as well as the recently updated the <u>FAQ website for laboratories</u> to determine best practices for testing.
- The U.S. Public Health Service Commissioned Corps has deployed hundreds of officers to help with this response. As America's Health Responders, the Commissioned Corps is currently very involved in assisting the CDC with airport screenings, deploying staff to support hospitals, among other important missions. Find out more about Commissioned Corps activities here.
- Part of preparedness includes a robust blood supply. The current situation around COVID-19 heightens the need for a ready blood supply, please encourage your health community members to keep their appointments to donate blood.
- CDC released updated **guidance** on infection prevention and control recommendations for healthcare workers. Healthcare workers are fighting this outbreak on the front lines, and this guidance is intended to provide assistance to healthcare settings that are handling suspected or confirmed cases of COVID-19. This guidance is applicable to all U.S. healthcare settings.

U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA)

- The Small Business Administration will work directly with state Governors to provide targeted, low-interest loans to small businesses and non-profits that have been severely impacted by the Coronavirus (COVID-19). The SBA's Economic Injury Disaster Loan program provides small businesses with working capital loans of up to \$2 million that can provide vital economic support to small businesses to help overcome the temporary loss of revenue they are experiencing.
- The Coronavirus Preparedness and Response Supplemental expanded the disaster definition for the Small Business Administration's Economic Injury Disaster Loans (EIDL) to include COVID-19. Economic Injury Disaster Loans are SBA loans that are available to eligible Small Businesses, Small agricultural cooperatives, and most non-profits that have experienced substantial economic injury as a result of a disaster.
 - EIDLs are available in areas that are declared a disaster area by the SBA.
 - There has to be an SBA Disaster Declaration in an area for EIDL loans to be made available, which originates from a request made by the Governor.
 - To assist in the efforts, the SBA engages with States' Emergency Response Teams to help them comply with the requirements before a request is made.
- EIDL Loan Details
 - Entities that can apply for EIDL loans are eligible Small Businesses, Small agricultural cooperatives, and most private nonprofit organizations.
 - EIDL Loans are up to \$2million and have terms as long as 30 years.
- State and local officials who have been contacted by Small Businesses that may have been affected should share that information with their Governor or the State's Emergency Response Officials. U.S. Department of Education (DoED)

The Department of Education has established a dedicated Coronavirus **webpage**, which includes resources for institutions of higher education and for K-12.

- The website includes **guidance** for students at institutions of higher education, and covers Coronavirus-related scenarios that could impact students who are enrolled in study abroad programs, students who meet full-time requirements but fall below 12 credit hours, students who are quarantined and miss class, campuses that have temporarily stopped offering ground-based classes to prevent the spread of Coronavirus, and foreign schools that serve Americans who receive Federal financial aid. Also see a <u>letter from the Office for Civil Rights</u> that addresses potential discrimination associated with coronavirus.
- The Department is working on additional information for families and communities including:
 - Information regarding certain flexibilities under the Every Student Succeeds Act, or "ESSA;"
 - · Information regarding services to children with disabilities;
 - A fact sheet from our Office for Civil Rights on the risk of Coronavirus in schools while protecting the civil rights of students; and

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- · Information on the Family Education Records Privacy Act, or "FERPA," as it pertains to K-12 and higher education students.

U.S. Department of Transportation (DOT)

- The U.S. Department of Transportation, in its important supporting role, has and will continue to coordinate with transportation stakeholders, foreign counterparts and other federal agencies to manage the risk in the United States.
- DOT continues to ensure: an active air bridge remains in place for the safe return of Americans from affected areas; airlines are funneling passenger flights to one of the eleven designated U.S. airports equipped to health-screen Americans returning from affected areas; continued air and sea cargo traffic between the US and China; health protocols are established to protect the crews of aircraft continuing to fly between the US and foreign locations; and, dissemination of health messages about the virus, for airlines to use to inform their passengers.
- The U.S. government's travel restrictions and advisories have been a remarkably effective 'first layer' of containment. These travel requirements delayed the arrival of the virus to the United States, giving the nation precious time to prepare further measures, and plan for mitigation. This achievement took the cooperation of nearly 200 commercial airlines, a like number of overseas airports, and the Civil Aviation Authority of China.
- External Stakeholder outreach is being actively conducted throughout the modes of transportation in DOT. DOT has already hosted calls with stakeholders for the Federal Aviation Administration, Federal Transit Authority, Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration, and others. Additional calls are scheduled for outreach to additional stakeholders in all surface transportation, maritime, and labor.

U.S. Department of Labor (DOL)

- The Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) developed COVID-19 **planning guidance** for employers to implement engineering, administrative, and work practice controls and personal protective equipment (PPE). The guidance is intended for planning purposes employers and workers should use the planning guidance to help identify risk levels in workplace settings and to determine any appropriate control measures to implement.
- The U.S. Office of Personnel Management (OPM), an independent agency that serves as the chief human resources agency and personnel policy manager for the Federal Government, issued **guidance** for Federal Agencies regarding COVID-19 and human resources policies.
- DOL announced new guidance outlining flexibilities that States have in administering their unemployment (UI) programs to assist Americans affected by the COVID-19 outbreak. Under the guidance, federal law.

U.S. Department of Housing & Urban Development (HUD)

- The health and well-being of our country's most vulnerable citizens is Secretary Ben Carson's highest priority. At the direction of Secretary Carson senior HUD, officials have developed an Infectious Disease Toolkit for Continuum of Care homeless shelters (CoC). This includes specific documents addressing preparedness in shelters and encampment settings. More <u>here</u>.
- HUD has sent communication to CoC and Housing Opportunities for Persons With AIDS (HOPWA) grantees, highlighting the importance of infectious disease preparedness and linking to CDC and Healthcare for the Homeless resources: <u>Infectious</u> <u>Disease Preparedness Among Homeless Assistance Providers</u>
- HUD is coordinating with the CDC, Healthcare for the Homeless, United States Interagency Council on Homelessness (USICH) on messaging and cross-promoting resource materials. This will continue on an ongoing basis. Also, the Department is reaching out to Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) and Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) for future coordination.
 - HUD has plenty of resources for your communities including:
 - Communities can use their unspent Emergency Solutions Grants and Continuum of Care Program funds to help address needs related to coronavirus. Additionally, a portion of CDBG funds are also available for public services, including health care.
 - Technical Assistance is available for ESG and CoC Program recipients if requested. Additionally, communities that want to amend their CDBG plans, can reach out to their CPD representative if they need assistance.

U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA)

- USDA Secretary Sonny Perdue <u>announced proactive flexibilities</u> to allow meal service during school closures to minimize potential exposure to the coronavirus. During an unexpected school closure, schools can leverage their participation in one of USDA's summer meal programs to provide meals at no cost to students. Under normal circumstances, those meals must be served in a group setting. However, in a public health emergency, the law allows USDA the authority to waive the group setting meal requirement, which is vital during a social distancing situation.
- USDA intends to use all available program flexibilities and contingencies to serve program participants across our 15 nutrition programs. USDA has already begun to issue waivers to ease program operations and protect the health of participants. USDA is receiving requests for waivers on an ongoing basis. As of today, USDA has been asked to waive congregate feeding requirements in Washington, California, Maryland, Alaska, Utah, Pennsylvania, Wyoming, Maine, Kansas, New Jersey, New York, South Carolina, South Dakota, and Virginia and USDA has granted those requests.

U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS)

- While the overall risk to the American public remains low, actions by DHS and the administration are decreasing the strain on public health officials by screening incoming travelers, expediting the processing of U.S. citizens returning from China, and ensuring resources are focused on the health and safety of the American people. It is important to recognize, that while there is a significant focus on containing and mitigating the spread of COVID-19, all departments and agencies of DHS are continuing to perform their regular duties with no impact on their mission.
- DHS is working to recognize, detect, and assist individuals attempting to enter the U.S. through our, airports, land ports, or waterways who may be carrying the virus: Cruise Lines International Association, CDC, USCG, and CBP. DHS is working with LA-GOV-20-1240, 20-1241, 20-1242-A-000193

the Department of State, HHS, and the senior public health leadership with the Government of Mexico to prepare for any COVID-19 cases identified along the South West Border. This effort includes coordination with state, and local Public Health Officials to develop reporting and response courses of action.

- FEMA has rostered 56 four-person Incident Management Assistance Teams.
- The Countering Weapons of Mass Destruction Office, which contains the National Biosurveillance Integration Center and the Chief Medical Officer, has maintained close coordination with our Components and U.S. Government partners regarding the status of the outbreak and associated U.S. Government response actions.


CDC to Award Over \$560 Million to State & Local Jurisdictions in Support of COVID-19 Response

The Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) is announcing another upcoming action by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) to provide resources to state and local jurisdictions in support of our nation's response to the coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19). The \$8.3 billion dollar Supplemental passed by Congress included <u>statutory language</u> which prescribed the exact formula for disbursing the money: states will receive 90% of their <u>2019 CDC PHEP grants</u>. This marks the first tranche of funding to states from the \$8.3 billion supplemental. Your state health officers are receiving a letter today from CDC outlining what is needed to receive the funding, essentially they need to submit a spend plan and they will receive guidance on what that spend plan should contain. Background

Under the leadership of President Trump and Vice President Pence, the full weight of the U.S. Government is working to protect the health and safety of the American people. Since the beginning of the outbreak, President Trump has taken unprecedented steps – including prudent travel restrictions and an early containment strategy – to protect the health of Americans in response to the coronavirus. In January, the President formed a Coronavirus Task Force, led by Vice President Mike Pence and comprised of subject-matter experts, to organize a whole-of-government response (**President Donald J. Trump Has Taken Unprecedented Steps to Respond To the Coronavirus and Protect the Health and Safety of Americans**). 

In an effort to keep you informed of federal response efforts related to COVID-19, we would like to share an update on CDC actions as of February 24th (see full update attached). Please visit <u>www.cdc.gov/COVID19</u> for the most up to date information. Current interim guidance issued by the CDC regarding COVID-19 is available at <u>https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-nCoV/hcp/index.html</u>

CDC is aggressively responding to the global outbreak of COVID-19 and preparing for the potential of community spread in the United States.

- · Preparing first responders, healthcare providers, and health systems:
 - Establishing visibility across healthcare systems to understand healthcare use, particularly surges in demand for medical care and associated resources.
 - Conducting extensive outreach to clinical and hospital professional organizations to ensure health system preparedness.
 - Producing more than 23 guidance documents on infection control, hospital preparedness assessments, personal protective equipment (PPE) supply planning, and clinical evaluation and management (as of February 22, 2020).
 - Working closely with healthcare facilities and providers to reinforce infection control principles that recognize PPE is one component of a larger set of practices that help to limit the spread of disease.
 - Developing a range of respirator conservation strategies, including strategies to make supplies last longer (such as using alternative products like reusable respirators) and extending the use of disposable respirators.
 - \circ Leveraging existing telehealth tools to direct people to the right level of healthcare for their medical needs.
 - Working with supply chain partners to understand supply usage, what products are available, and when more aggressive measures may need to be taken to ensure that healthcare workers at highest risk have access to PPE.
 - Sharing information with stakeholders to help them recognize when to shift the strategies they are using.

Reinforcing state, territorial, and local public health readiness:

- Assessing state and local readiness to implement community mitigation measures like home containment, including housing and transportation needs.
- Coordinating with states to identify and mitigate gaps in readiness that will help reduce the spread of disease in the community while protecting workers, infrastructure, and institutions.
- · Linking public health agencies and healthcare systems to identify and mitigate stressors to the health system
- Tracking stockpiles of PPE across jurisdictions.
- Working with state and local public health to use existing Public Health Emergency Preparedness (PHEP) funding to support COVID-19 preparedness and response activities.
- · Leveraging funding mechanisms to help states accelerate preparedness activities.
- Providing technical assistance and guidance to states to improve their ability to respond to the outbreak.

Supporting communities, businesses, and schools:

- Creating business guidance to help the public and private sectors ensure they are able to operate with adaptations like telework and flexible sick leave policies, as well as how to respond if an employee gets sick.
- Developing guidance for childcare programs, K-12 schools, and colleges/universities to help them plan and prepare for COVID-19 and respond if there is a local outbreak in their community.
- Providing planning guides for COVID-19 that households, community- and faith-based organizations, event planners of mass gatherings, and public health communicators can use.
- Educating communities about nonpharmaceutical interventions (NPIs) that help slow the spread of illness, like COVID-19.

MAIN KEY POINTS

- There is an expanding global outbreak of respiratory illness caused by a novel (new) coronavirus.
- This virus has been named "SARS-CoV-2;" the disease it causes has been named COVID-19.
 - Due to potential for confusion with SARS-CoV, where possible, public communications will use "the virus that causes COVID-19."
- While most COVID-19 cases outside of China have been associated with travel to or from China, community spread is being detected in a growing number of countries.
- Destinations with apparent community spread of COVID-19 include Hong Kong, Iran, Italy, Japan, Singapore, South Korea, Taiwan, and Thailand.
- The fact that COVID-19 has caused illness, including illness resulting in death, and sustained person-to-person spread is concerning. These factors meet two of the criteria of a pandemic.
- As community spread is detected in more and more countries, the world moves closer toward meeting the third criteria, worldwide spread of the new virus.
- The potential public health threat posed by COVID-19 is high, both globally and to the United States.
- But individual risk is dependent on exposure.
- For the general American public, who are unlikely to be exposed to this virus at this time, the immediate health risk from COVID-19 is low.
- Under current circumstances, certain people will have an increased risk of infection. For example, healthcare workers caring for patients with COVID-19 and other close contacts of persons with COVID-19. CDC has developed guidance to help in the risk assessment and management of people with potential exposures to COVID-19.
- However, it's important to note that current global circumstances suggest it is likely that this virus will cause a pandemic. In that case, risk assessment would be different.
- Global efforts at this time are focused concurrently on containing spread of this virus and mitigating the impact of this virus.
- The federal government is working closely with state, local, tribal, and territorial partners, as well as public health partners, to respond to this public health threat.
- The public health response is multi-layered, with the goal of detecting and minimizing introductions of this virus in the United States so as to reduce the spread and the impact of this virus.
- CDC is operationalizing all of its pandemic preparedness and response plans, working on multiple fronts to meet these goals, including specific measures to <u>prepare communities</u> to respond local transmission of the virus that causes COVID-19.
- <u>Pandemic guidance</u> developed in anticipation of an influenza pandemic is being repurposed and adapted for a COVID-19 pandemic.
- Public health partners are encouraged to review their pandemic preparedness plans at this time.

- At this time, there is no vaccine to protect against COVID-19 and no medications approved to treat it.
- Nonpharmaceutical interventions would be the most important response strategy.
- CDC launched a new weekly email newsletter with updates on the agency's COVID-19 outbreak response. <u>Sign up for the newsletter</u>.

SITUATION UPDATE

- To date, 35 international locations (including the U.S.) have reported confirmed cases of COVID-19.
- More than 77,000 cases have been confirmed on mainland China, with more than 2,500 deaths.
- On February 22, 2020, CDC issued a Level 2 Travel Notice (Practice Enhanced Precautions) for Japan and South Korea.
- On February 23, 2020 CDC issued Level 1 Travel Alert Notices (Practice Usual Precautions) for Iran and Italy.
- CDC also recommends that all travelers reconsider cruise ship voyages into or within Asia at this time.
- This is consistent with guidance by the U.S. State Department.
- For the latest travel guidance, visit <u>COVID-19 Information for Travel</u>.
- This is a rapidly evolving situation. CDC is constantly reviewing and updating its guidance as needed.
- CDC is reporting confirmed cases of COVID-19 in the United States in two categories:
 - 1. Cases detected through our domestic public health systems, and
 - 2. Cases among people who were repatriated via U.S. State Department flights from Wuhan, China and from the Diamond Princess cruise ship (Japan).
- Fourteen cases of COVID-19 have been detected in California, Illinois, Massachusetts, Washington, and Wisconsin through U.S. public health surveillance.
- Two of these cases occurred through person-to-person spread. The remaining cases all were in persons who had travel to China.
- 39 cases of COVID-19 have been detected among the 1,100+ people repatriated from Hubei Province, China and the Diamond Princess. (That includes 3 people repatriated from Wuhan and 36 people who were repatriated from the Diamond Princes.)
- Almost all of the people from the Wuhan flights who were quarantined have finished their 14day quarantine period.
- Because the passengers on the Diamond Princess were in a close setting where there was significant spread of COVID-19, they are considered at high-risk for infection. CDC expects to see additional confirmed cases of among those passengers.

WHAT YOU CAN DO

- While the immediate risk of this new virus to the American public is believed to be low at this time, everyone can do their part to help us respond to this emerging public health threat:
 - It's currently flu and respiratory disease season and CDC recommends getting a flu vaccine, taking everyday preventive actions to help stop the spread of germs, and taking flu antivirals if prescribed.

- If you are a healthcare provider, be on the look-out for people with who recently traveled from China and fever and respiratory symptoms.
- If you are a healthcare provider caring for a COVID-19 patient or a public health responder, please take care of yourself and follow recommended infection control procedures.
- If you have been in China or have been exposed to someone sick with COVID-19 in the last 14 days, you will face some limitations on your movement and activity. Please follow instructions during this time. Your cooperation is integral to the ongoing public health response to try to slow spread of this virus. If you develop COVID-19 symptoms, contact your healthcare provider, and tell them about your symptoms and your travel or exposure to a COVID-19 patient.
- For people who have had close contact with someone with COVID-19 who develop symptoms, contact your healthcare provider, and tell them about your symptoms and your exposure to a COVID-19 patient.
- For people who are ill with COVID-19, please follow CDC guidance on how to reduce the risk of spreading your illness to others. This guidance in on the CDC website.

TESTING

- All testing for COVID-19 continues to be performed at CDC. At this time, all positive results from testing conducted in non-CDC, U.S. laboratories must be confirmed at CDC.
- CDC is remanufacturing test kits, which will be distributed following rigorous quality control processes.

REPATRIATED FLIGHTS & QUARANTINE ORDERS

- CDC has supported the Department of State in the safe and expedient ordered departure of U.S. citizens and residents affected by outbreaks of COVID-19.
 - Five chartered flights returned passengers from Wuhan City, China.
 - Most recently, passengers from a cruise ship docked in Japan were repatriated. (See section: *Diamond Princess*)
- The Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) Secretary, under statutory authority, issued federal quarantine orders to all such passengers entering the United States.
- Almost all of the people from the Wuhan flights who were quarantined fulfilled their 14-day quarantine period and been released.
 - On February 12, 195 people from the first chartered flight were discharged from quarantine.
 - On February 18, 347 people who were under federal quarantine were released.
 - On February 20, 263 people who were under federal quarantine were released.
- People released from quarantine pose no health risk to their communities.

DIAMOND PRINCESS

- On February 16, 329 American citizens returned by flights chartered by the State Department.
- Persons who are not sick are being kept in quarantine.
- Persons who are sick with COVID-19 are in isolation and receiving medical care as needed.

- All American passengers have disembarked from the *Diamond Princess* cruise ship. These people have been placed under travel restrictions, as have the ship's other passengers and crew.
- Some American crew members of the Diamond Princess remain aboard the ship.
- More than 60 Americans who were on board the Diamond Princess remain in Japan, hospitalized with COVID-2, including some who are reportedly severely ill.
- The U.S. Government is taking measures to protect the health of the people under quarantine, their loved ones, and their communities, as well as the communities where they are being temporarily housed.
- Based on what is known about this virus and other coronaviruses, CDC believes the risk to the communities temporarily housing these people is low.

WESTERDAM

- No testing of passengers from the Westerdam Cruise Ship for SARS-CoV-2, the virus that causes COVID-19, has been done at CDC.
- CDC is aware that an American passenger on the Westerdam tested positive for infection with SARS-CoV-2 in Malaysia and that two subsequent and sequential tests on samples from that same person were negative.
- CDC is aware that follow-up testing among more than 1,500 passengers from the Westerdam has all been negative.
- CDC considers passengers from the Westerdam to be at "low risk" of SARS-CoV-2 infection during the 14 days after their last exposure per the agency's <u>Risk Assessment guidance</u>.
- Given this level of risk, testing of Westerdam passengers for SARS-CoV-2 is not recommended unless additional exposures are identified to warrant testing.

CDC ACTIONS

- CDC is aggressively responding to the global outbreak of COVID-19 and preparing for the potential of community spread in the United States.
- Preparing first responders, healthcare providers, and health systems:
 - Establishing **visibility across healthcare systems** to understand healthcare use, particularly surges in demand for medical care and associated resources.
 - Conducting **extensive outreach to clinical and hospital professional organizations** to ensure health system **preparedness**.
 - Producing more than <u>23 guidance documents</u> on infection control, hospital preparedness assessments, personal protective equipment (PPE) supply planning, and clinical evaluation and management (as of February 22, 2020).
 - Working closely with healthcare facilities and providers to reinforce infection control principles that recognize PPE is one component of a larger set of practices that help to limit the spread of disease.
 - Developing a range of <u>respirator conservation strategies</u>, including strategies to make supplies last longer (such as using alternative products like reusable respirators) and extending the use of disposable respirators.
 - Leveraging existing **telehealth tools** to direct people to the right level of healthcare for their medical needs.

- Working with supply chain partners to understand supply usage, what products are available, and when more aggressive measures may need to be taken to ensure that healthcare workers at highest risk have access to PPE.
- **<u>Sharing information with stakeholders</u>** to help them recognize when to shift the strategies they are using.
- Reinforcing state, territorial, and local public health readiness:
 - **Assessing state and local readiness** to implement community mitigation measures like home containment, including housing and transportation needs.
 - Coordinating with states to **identify and mitigate gaps in readiness** that will help reduce the spread of disease in the community while protecting workers, infrastructure, and institutions.
 - Linking public health agencies and healthcare systems to **identify and mitigate stressors to the health system**
 - Tracking stockpiles of PPE across jurisdictions.
 - Working with state and local public health to use existing <u>Public Health Emergency</u> <u>Preparedness (PHEP)</u> funding to support COVID-19 preparedness and response activities.
 - Leveraging funding mechanisms to help states accelerate preparedness activities.
 - Providing **technical assistance and guidance** to states to improve their ability to respond to the outbreak.
- Supporting communities, businesses, and schools:
 - <u>Creating business guidance</u> to help the public and private sectors ensure they are able to operate with adaptations like telework and flexible sick leave policies, as well as how to respond if an employee gets sick.
 - **Developing guidance for childcare programs, K-12 schools, and colleges/universities** to help them plan and prepare for COVID-19 and respond if there is a local outbreak in their community.
 - Providing planning guides for COVID-19 that households, community- and faith-based organizations, event planners of mass gatherings, and public health communicators can use.
 - Educating communities about **nonpharmaceutical interventions (NPIs)** that help slow the spread of illness, like COVID-19.

The nation's governors applaud the U.S. House of Representatives for passage of the "*Coronavirus Preparedness and Response Supplemental Appropriations Act, 2020*" (H.R. 6074) and urge the U.S. Senate to take swift action and pass the emergency supplemental request, in response to the 2019 Novel Coronavirus (COVID-19).

As the nation's governors, the health and well-being of our residents is our primary concern. States and localities are at the forefront of public health crises, and COVID-19 is no different. As the situation evolves, states are incurring escalating costs in assisting the federal response to COVID-19. It is imperative that we have adequate resources and funding to respond to this rapidly developing public health emergency. Any appropriation must include the allocation of new federal funding for preventing and responding to COVID-19, backfill states for costs already incurred, and ensure that any monies transferred from existing programs be replenished.

Congress must assure states and territories that necessary resources will be provided to address the multitude of costs associated with a public health emergency. These include but are not limited to travel screening, isolation and quarantine related activities, transportation, lodging, increased staffing, National Guard personnel, testing and monitoring patients, public outreach, supplies, equipment, schools, and wrap-around services.

States and territories are relying on federal dollars to support state public health efforts to prevent and reduce the impact of COVID-19. We appreciate the state-federal coordination on the response thus far and look forward to working with both the Administration and Congress as the nation tackles this public health threat.



- Travelers are encouraged to always exercise healthy travel habits when traveling and to follow appropriate guidance (*see* **here**). At this time, there are no domestic travel restrictions in the United States.
- We are working rapidly on therapeutics and vaccines and have launched the first U.S. clinical trial for an investigational antiviral.
- The Federal Government has been able to provide tests to all the state jurisdictions and labs that have requested it. Between March 2nd and 5th, more than 900,000 tests were distributed across the country.
- The United States has the finest public health system in the world and knows the playbook to respond to infectious disease outbreaks.

Local, State, tribal, & Federal coordinated preparedness & response efforts.

- Federal officials have been working diligently to communicate with State, local, and tribal officials on the Federal government's efforts to prepare and respond to COVID-1.
- Our Nation's Governors have participated in-person and on conference call briefings with Federal partners on January 30, February 9, February 20 and March 2. These communications remain ongoing.
- White House, OMB, HHS, DHS, DOT, and State Department Officials met with over 40 State, county, and city health officials from over 30 States and territories to thank them for their leadership and to continue discussions on the Federal-State-Local partnership to prepare and respond to COVID-19 (February 25).
- HHS, CDC, DHS, and Federal partners have held numerous national briefing calls with State, local, tribal, private-sector, and community leaders.
- The Trump Administration is partnering with State, local, and tribal elected and appointed leaders' associations.

<u>Press Advisory – President Donald J. Trump Directs FEMA Support Under Emergency Declaration for COVID-19</u> (<u>PRESIDENTIAL PROCLAMATION HERE</u>)

The federal government continues to take aggressive and proactive steps to address the COVID-19 threat as the health and safety of the American people remain a top priority.

Today, President Trump <u>declared</u> a nationwide emergency pursuant to Sec. 501(b) of the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act, 42 U.S.C. 5121-5207 (the "Stafford Act"). This increases federal support to the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) in its role as the lead federal agency for the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic response. As a result of the President's decisive, unprecedented action, FEMA is directed to assist state, local, tribal, territorial governments and other eligible entities with the health and safety actions they take on behalf of the American public. Today's declaration does not make direct financial assistance available to individuals.

The emergency declaration does not change measures authorized under other federal statutes and HHS remains the lead federal agency directing the federal response to COVID-19. FEMA actions will be in support of HHS and in coordination with state, tribal and territorial governments. Eligible emergency protective measures taken at the direction or guidance of public health officials in response to this emergency, and not supported by the authorities of another federal agency, will be reimbursed strictly under the FEMA Public Assistance program. FEMA assistance will be provided at a 75 percent Federal cost share. Reimbursable activities typically include emergency protective measures such as the activation of State Emergency Operations Centers, National Guard costs, law enforcement and other measures necessary to protect public health and safety.

<u>Presidential Message to the Congress on Declaring a National Emergency Concerning the Novel Coronavirus</u> <u>Disease (COVID-19) Outbreak (March 13, 2020) (PRESIDENTIAL MESSAGE HERE)</u>

"Pursuant to section 201 of the National Emergencies Act (50 U.S.C. 1621), I hereby report that I have exercised my authority to declare that the outbreak of coronavirus disease (COVID-19) in the United States constitutes a national emergency. This declaration invokes section 1135 of the Social Security Act, 42 U.S.C. 1320b–5, to allow the Secretary of Health and Human Services to exercise the authority under that section to temporarily waive or modify certain requirements of the Medicare, Medicaid, and State Children's Health Insurance programs and of the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act Privacy Rule throughout the duration of the public health emergency declared in response to the COVID-19 outbreak."


"By the authority vested in me as President by the Constitution and the laws of the United States of America, it is hereby ordered as follows: It is the policy of the United States to take proactive measures to prepare for and respond to public health threats, including the public health emergency involving Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19), which was declared by the Secretary of Health and Human Services (the "Secretary") on January 31, 2020, pursuant to section 319 of the Public Health Service Act (42 U.S.C. 247d). Our response must include heightened coordination among Federal, State, local, and tribal agencies, and we must offer States the flexibility they need to care for their citizens. In accordance with this principle, the Food and Drug Administration, in coordination with the State of New York, allowed the State flexibility in expediting State-approved COVID-19 testing. Should additional States request flexibility to authorize laboratories within the State to develop and perform tests used to detect COVID-19, the Secretary shall take appropriate action, consistent with law, to facilitate the request."

As we continue to monitor this health crisis, we are also working with states on their efforts. Thanks to NGA Chair and Maryland Governor Larry Hogan and NGA Vice Chair and New York Governor Andrew Cuomo for the leadership over the past weeks, as they worked both within this organization and their states to provide guidance during this public health emergency. Governors and state officials are leading the preparedness and response to COVID-19, and this email outlines some of those efforts, as well as providing links to online resources with further information to assist you.

Actions Being Taken By Governors

State Emergency/Public Health Emergency Declarations

At least 30 states and the District of Columbia have issued emergency declarations: AK, AR, AZ, CA, CO, CT, DC, FL, IA, IL, IN, KY, LA, MA, MD, MI, NC, NJ, NM, NY, OH, OR, PA, RI, TN, UT, VA, WA, WI and WV.

State Employee Restricted Travel/Restricted State Travel

At least 13 states have restricted state employee travel as a result of the coronavirus: AK, AR, CT, FL, KY, LA, MD, NJ, NM, OH, PA, RI and VA.

- Alabama
 - Governor Kay Ivey <u>announced the formation</u> of a Coronavirus (COVID-19) Task Force comprised of cabinet and state agency officials, as well as disease specialists in an abundance of caution.
 - Governor lvey sent a memo to state agency heads directing state employees to notify their department heads,
 - supervisors, and human resource offices if they have traveled in areas affected by coronavirus.
- Alaska
 - Governor Mike Dunleavy <u>submitted a supplemental budget amendmen</u> to fund 10 additional temporary positions within the Department of Health and Social Services for novel coronavirus disease preparedness and response.
 - Governor Dunleavy issued a declaration of public health disaster emergency in response to the COVID-19
 - anticipated outbreak.
- American Samoa
 - Governor Lolo Matalasi Moliga <u>appointed</u> a government taskforce to provide a plan for preparation and response to the COVID-19 coronavirus.
- Arizona
 - Governor Doug Ducey <u>issued</u> a Declaration of Emergency and an Executive Order to provide health officials and administrators with tools and guidance necessary to combat the continued spread of COVID-19 and to reduce financial burdens on Arizonans by lowering healthcare costs associated with the virus.
- California
 - Governor Gavin Newsom announced that gatherings larger than 250 page log by the bocapage lad or or start point.

- Colorado
 - Governor Jared Polis has instructed the Colorado Division of Insurance (DOI to require insurance companies to take actions related to COVID-19 in the area as of telehealth, prescription refills and cost-sharing.
 - Governor Polis signed an executive order <u>declaring a state of emergency</u> and requesting certain actions:
 - The Colorado Department of Labor and Employment (CDLE) is directed to engage in emergency
 rulemaking to ensure workers in food handling, hospitality, child care, health care, and education can get
 paid sick leave.
 - For workers who test positive and lack access to paid leave, the governor is directing CDLE to identify additional supports and wage replacement such as access to unemployment insurance.
 - The Colorado Department of Personnel and Administration will engage in emergency rulemaking regarding state employees.
 - The Department of Revenue is directed to temporarily allow Coloradans over the age of 65 to extend their driver's licenses online to avoid having to congregate at DMVs.
 - The Colorado Department of Public Health and the Environment will be opening a drive-up lab at their facility in Lowry to test anyone who has a note from their doctor stating that they meet the criteria for testing.
 - Governor Polis also encouraged the private sector to voluntarily offer paid sick leave.
 - Governor Polis <u>issued</u> guidance to all K-12 schools recommending that if they have a student or faculty member who tests positive that they close for 72 hours, allowing for schools to be disinfected and for the epidemiologists to conduct an investigation and recommend next steps for those schools. More details on the guidance are available <u>here</u>.
 - Governor Polis also <u>instructed</u> the Colorado Department of Public Health and the Environment and the Colorado Department of Human Services to engage in emergency rulemaking to limit visitation to facilities that serve older Coloradans, to screen all employees and visitors to these facilities, and to take necessary steps to protect those in these facilities.
- Connecticut
 - Governor Ned Lamont <u>declared civil preparedness and public health emergencies</u>. The declarations trigger price gouging laws and make clear that municipal leaders have emergency powers to mitigate disasters and emergencies.
 - The Connecticut Insurance Department is notifying travel insurance companies about the emergency declarations and will be monitoring their compliance with the terms of their policies.
 - Governor Lamont announced that his administration is <u>working with health insurance carriers in Connecticut to</u> <u>cover the costs for COVID-19 testing</u> and to assure access to maintenance prescription drug medications (excluding controlled substances).
 - The Department of Insurance has a <u>bulletin</u> which encourages insurers to consider waiving cost sharing for COVID-19 testing and also highlights other related benefits.
 - Connecticut Insurance Department Commissioner Andrew Maisissued a notice to all travel insurers conducting business in Connecticut. The notice instructs insurers to accommodate travel cancellation requests under the terms of the policies taking into account the seriousness of the circumstances and the civil preparedness and public health emergencies issued by Governor Lamont.
 - Governor Lamont <u>made</u> an emergency request from the Strategic National Supply for a total of 540,000 additional N-95 protective masks.
- CNMI
 - Governor Ralph Deleon Guerrero Torres <u>created</u> a COVID-19 Task Force, bringing together key departments, agencies, and stakeholders, to focus on three major concerns: tourism, residents, and schools.
- · Florida
 - Governor Ron <u>DeSantis declared a state of emergency</u> allowing nurses and doctors from other states to work in Florida and pharmacists to issue emergency 30-day prescriptions. The order also allows officials to activate the Florida National Guard, purchase medical supplies more swiftly, and establish field hospitals.
- Georgia
 - Governor Brian Kemp, the public safety department and health officials <u>announced</u> they have designated Hard Labor Creek State Park as a location that could be used to isolate any patients with COVID-19
- Guam
 - A <u>bipartisan bill was introduced</u> to create and fund an Emergency Pandemic Fund for COVID-19 response efforts.
- Idaho
 - Governor Brad Little requested a <u>transfer of \$2 million</u> from the state legislature to the Governor's Emergency Fund.
- Illinois
 - Governor JB Pritzker issued a public health disaster prodated by 201241, 20-1242-A-000237

- In a press conference, Governor Pritzker <u>announced</u> that his office would file emergency rules to allow those who are unemployed because they are sick to collect unemployment insurance if permitted under federal law.
- Iowa
 - Governor Kim Reynolds <u>announced</u> that 18 of the 22 lowans quarantined on the Grand Princess cruise ship will be returning home on a chartered flight to lowa. The Department of Public Health will screen the returning people before they begin their travel back to lowa and direct people to a screening center when they arrive.
- Kentucky
 - Governor Andy Beshear <u>announced</u> that Kentucky nursing homes will be limiting patient visits. Patients receiving end-of-life-care are the only group allowed to receive visitors to help prevent and limit the spread of COVID-19.
 - Governor Beshear <u>instructed</u> school districts to be prepared to close schools on short notice, closed all state prisons to visitors, suspended out-of-state travel for state employees, urged more businesses to allow employees to tele-commute and to provide paid sick leave, and asked places of worship to temporarily cancel services.
- Louisiana
 - Governor John Bel Edwards <u>declared a public health emergency</u> to allow state agencies to thoroughly prepare for any eventuality related to public health needs and deploy additional resources to assist local authorities. The declaration also addresses efforts to prevent price gouging and limits state employee travel.
- Maryland
 - Governor Larry Hogan issued a directive requiring state health carriers to <u>waive all cost-sharing</u> for coronavirus testing.
 - The governor, with support from the Department of Budget and Management, is advising state agencies to <u>cancel out-of-state</u> business travel, and to prepare for possible mandatory telework.
 - Governor Hogan <u>signed</u> emergency legislation allowing his state to access rainy day funds, and formed a Coronavirus Response Team to advise on health and emergency management decisions.
 - $_{\odot}\,$ Governor Hogan $\underline{enacted}$ several new actions and recommendations:
 - § The Department of Motor Vehicles moved toward an all appointment system for all transactions, to reduce walk-in visits and foot traffic.
 - § The Maryland Health Benefits Exchange established a special enrollment period through Maryland Health Connection for COVID-19.
 - § The Department of Corrections and Public Safety Services discontinued visitation services for an individual in infirmaries.
 - § For long-term care communities, access is restricted to essential visits only; staff are prohibited from international travel; and it is recommended that facilities screen all individuals entering the facilities.
 - § All state veterans' facilities are required to follow the above guidelines.
 - o Governor Hogan suspended all business-related out-of-state travel for state employees.
 - o Governor Hogan <u>announced</u> major action including:
 - § Maryland Emergency Management Agency moving to its highest action level.
 - § Activating the National Guard.
 - § All state government is raised to "elevated level two" and all non-essential state employees who are approved for telework will be required to do so.
 - § Closing all public schools from March 16 through March 27.
- Massachusetts
 - o Governor Charlie Baker declared a state of emergency on March 10.
- Michigan
 - The state's Medicaid program will <u>waive copays and cost-sharing</u> for testing and treatment related to COVID-19.
 Governor Gretchen Whitmer <u>declared</u> a state of emergency on March 10.
- Minnesota

- Governor Tim Walz <u>signed</u> legislation authorizing the state to use an additional \$21 million in state investments to support disease investigation, monitoring of the outbreak, public health information, and laboratory analysis of samples.
- Proposed legislation would <u>grant</u> the governor the authority to declare a peacetime emergency and allow employees to seek unemployment insurance or paid sick leave should they be guarantined due to COVID-19.
- Mississippi
 - Governor Tate Reeves appointed a preparedness and response planning committee.
- Nebraska
 - A press release from Governor Pete Ricketts announced the University of Nebraska Medical Center has begun a <u>clinical trial for a vaccine</u> to treat COVID-19.
- New Jersey
 - Governor Phil Murphy <u>signed</u> an executive order declaring a state of emergency and public health emergency. The declaration <u>allows</u> for certain safeguards, such as the prohibition of price increases pursuant to New Jersey's Consumer Fraud Act, as well as the ability to expedite the delivery of goods and services essential for preparedness and response efforts.
- New Mexico
 - The Department of Insurance <u>issued</u> a bulletin stating that carriers should educate enrollees and providers on CDC guidelines around COVID, adopt new billing codes, encourage telehealth, and ensure preparedness response is ready.
 - Governor Michelle Lujan Grisham signed an <u>executive order</u> declaring a state of public health emergency. The governor also restricted state employee travel.
- New York
 - Governor Andrew Cuomo <u>deployed</u> National Guard troops to a Health Department command post in New Rochelle to assist with the outbreak an area with 108 confirmed cases at the time of mobilization.
 - Governor Cuomo <u>announced</u> that New York will contract with 28 private labs to increase COVID-19 testing capacity. Additionally, he announced that the state will provide two weeks paid leave for workers who are quarantined as well as \$200,000 to local food banks in New Rochelle for families who rely on free school lunches.
 - Governor Cuomo announced that gatherings larger than 500 people should be cancelled or postponed.

 - Governor Gina M. Raimondo <u>declared a state of emergency</u> in Rhode Island to allow better response and coordination related to the coronavirus.
 - Governor Raimondo <u>issued guidance</u> for large events in Rhode Island to help contain the spread of COVID-19 in accordance with the Centers for Disease Control.
- South Dakota
 - Governor Kristi Noem <u>announced</u> the first presumptive case of coronavirus in South Dakota on March 10.
 - The South Dakota State Department of Health issued <u>guidance</u> to school administrators regarding prevention and mitigation in schools.
- Texas
 - Governor Greg Abbott <u>issued</u> a statement regarding price-gouging of medical supplies, pointing out that should there be extensive reports of price gouging, the governor can grant the Texas Attorney General broader powers to prosecute those cases.
 - Governor Abbott and the Texas Department of Insurance<u>requested</u> insurers and HMOs to waive copayments, co-insurance, and deductibles for "testing and telemedicine visits for the diagnosis of coronavirus," that is consistent with CDC guidance.

 - Utah <u>established</u> the COVID-19 Community Task Force. On March 10, the task force<u>recommended</u> that hospital and health care systems establish satellite sites for testing.

NGA Activities

NGA Statement

Yesterday, NGA released a <u>statement</u> calling on congressional leaders to take swift action and expand liability protections to ensure a supply of respirators needed to support the COVID-19 response. Legislations is need to make all National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health (NIOSH)-approved respirators eligible for protection under the Public Readiness & Emergency Preparedness (PREP) Act.

Because of NGA's bipartisan leadership, and the efforts of allied organizations,the "Families First Coronavirus Response Act" (H.R. 6210) bill includes "Section 106. Treatment of Personal Respiratory Protective Devices as Covered Countermeasures," which requires certain personal respiratory protective devices to be treated as covered countermeasures under the PREP Act Declaration for the purposes of emergency use during the COVID-19 outbreak and ending Oct. 1, 2024.

SCAN Call

On Tuesday, NGA held our second State Coronavirus Action Network (SCAN) call with 136 key governors' advisors and Washington Representatives/State-Federal Contacts and experts. This call focused on strategies for communicating effectively with the public as coronavirus testing becomes more widely available and additional COVID-19 cases emerge. Our government relations team also provided an updated regarding a second emergency supplemental bill. Presentation slides can be found here and a recording of the call is available here A-GOV-20-1240, 20-1241, 20-1242-A-000240

Because this public health crisis is advancing so quickly, we will be holding our SCAN calls on a weekly basis moving forward. Our next SCAN call is scheduled for Tuesday, March 17 at 4 p.m. ET. These calls are designed to share best practices among peers, learn from subject-matter experts, and provide technical assistance from the National Governors Association. The next call will focus on the decision making criteria and strategies governors have used in their COVID-19 response efforts, including restrictions on state employee travel and mass gatherings, as well as guidance to schools and employers.





Estimated Influenza Disease Burden, by Season United States, 2010-11 through 2017-18 Influenza Seasons







Box 1. Workplace Interventions

- No handshaking policy
- Promote cough and sneeze etiquette (but focus is on excluding ill staff)
- Videoconferencing as default for meetings
- Defer large meetings

- Regular handwashing schedule
- Disinfect high touch surfaces regularly and between users
- Outdoor lessons where possible
- Consider opening windows and adjusting conditioning
- Enhance hygiene and screening for illness among food preparation (canteen) staff and their close contacts
- Review after-school care arrangements that lead to mixing of children from multiple classes and ages



Household

Box 3. Household-based Interventions

All Households

- Enhanced hand sanitisation
- Gamifying hygiene rules e.g. to discourage touching face
- Disinfect high touch surfaces regularly
- "Welcome if you are well" signs on front door.
- Increase ventilation rates in the home by opening windows or adjusting air conditioning
- Promote cough and sneeze etiquette

Households with ill members (in addition to measures above)

- Ill household members are given own room if possible and only one person cares for them
- The door to the ill persons room is kept closed*
- Wearing simple surgical/dust masks by both infected persons and other family members caring for the case.
- Consider extra protection or alternative accommodation for household members over 65 years or with underlying illness.

Commercial establishments

Box 4. Commercial/entertainment/transport setting Interventions

- Sanitisation of hands at building entrance encouraged
- Tap and pay preferred to limit handling of money.
- Disinfect high touch surfaces regularly
- Avoiding crowding through booking and scheduling, online prepurchasing, limiting attendance numbers.
- Enhance hygiene and screening for illness among food preparation staff and their close contacts.
- Enhance airflow and adjust air conditioning
- Public transport workers/taxi/ride share vehicle windows opened where possible, increased air flow, high-touch surfaces disinfected.



One principle in particular has defined President Trump's approach: radical transparency. Rather than keep Americans in the dark, the Administration wants citizens to be able to see inside each step of the process. The President also wants all Americans to understand how their government is working hard to keep them safe.

"We're taking this incredibly serious here in the United States," Secretary Azar said. "We are doing the most aggressive containment efforts in modern history to prevent further spread in the United States. We're going to continue taking those measures."

Dear Governor:

Thank you for your continued engagement and partnership with us to address and mitigate the spread of COVID-19.

As you might imagine, a number of HHS divisions are releasing COVID-19-related information on funding and guidance. We thought it would be helpful to batch up information on key issues to keep you up-to-date.

Funding for States to Address COVID-19

Perhaps of keenest interest to you and your health officials is an update on funding for states and communities to address mitigation of COVID-19.

Today, at 1 PM EST HHS will be announcing that more than \$560 million will be made available to the 62 entities which have existing cooperative agreements with the CDC through its Public Health Emergency Program, known as "PHEP."

The \$8.3 billion dollar Supplemental passed by Congress included <u>statutory language</u> which prescribed the exact formula for disbursing the money: states will receive 90% of their <u>2019 CDC PHEP grants</u>. So that you know what your state will receive, we have attached a document identifying the amounts going to states, territories, or cities. This marks the first tranche of funding to states from the \$8.3 billion supplemental. Your state health officers are receiving a letter today from CDC outlining what is needed to receive the funding, essentially they need to submit a spend plan and they will receive guidance on what that spend plan should contain.

Helping Communities Know Mitigation Strategies

Yesterday, CDC released their "Implementation." Essentially, this is a guide for communities describing possible mitigation strategies for communities dealing with transmission at three different levels: (1) None/Minimal, (2) Moderate, or (3) Substantial. Community mitigation strategies, which are non-pharmaceutical interventions, are often the most available interventions to help slow the transmission of COVID-19 in communities. The Mitigation Plans include a set of actions that persons and communities can take to slow the spread of respiratory virus infections. The Community Mitigation Plan can be found <u>here</u>.

Guidance on Infection Control For Healthcare Workers

Yesterday, CDC released updated guidance on infection prevention and control recommendations. Healthcare workers are fighting this outbreak on the front lines, and this guidance is intended to provide assistance to healthcare settings that are handling suspected or confirmed cases of COVID-19. This guidance is applicable to all U.S. healthcare settings, but not for non-healthcare settings. There is separate guidance for that. The new guidance on infection control can be found <u>here</u>.

OMB Flexibilities

On March 9, 2020, OMB issued a memo that provides administrative relief for recipients and applicants of Federal financial assistance who are directly impacted by COVID-19. The grant flexibilities include 10 actions that HHS can take to provide short-term administrative and financial management relief, allowing funds to be awarded quicker and giving grantees the ability to focus on their critical response, research, or services. More information can be found <u>here</u>.

General Preparation Information: On March 9, 2020, the White House Coronavirus Task Force released practical steps that we recommend posting and sharing to keep workplaces, school, home and commercial establishments safe. This information can be found <u>here</u>.

CMS Specific Guidance:

- CMS Guidance on Masks: On March 10, 2020, CMS released guidance updating recommendations to expand the type of facemasks healthcare workers can use in situations involving COVID-19. This guidance aligns with the information by CDC regarding personal protective equipment as well. The memo sent to State Survey Agency Directors can be found <u>here</u>.
- CMS FAQs on Suspension of Non-Emergency Survey Inspections: On March 10, 2020, CMS released a frequently asked questions document to further explain the changes in guidance issued on March 4 that suspends all non-emergency survey inspections. This guidance and FAQ will help to enable State Inspectors to address the spread of COVID-19. The FAQ

Excerpt from On-The-Record Pen and Pad Roundtable by Health and Human Services Secretary Alex Azar and Other Senior Administration Officials on Resources Available to Combat the Coronavirus (*February 28, 2020*)

SECRETARY AZAR: Well, thanks for coming, everybody. In case you didn't hear from us enough the other night, wanted to give you an update on the budget issues, in particular.

As the President has repeatedly emphasized, there is no higher priority for us than protecting the health and safety of Americans. Thanks to the President's aggressive containment efforts, at this time, the risk from COVID-19 to the American public is low. But as we have all repeatedly emphasized, that has the potential to change.

The President's bold, decisive decisions have brought us extremely -- have bought us extremely valuable time to prepare for the possibility that the situation may worsen and we may need to mitigate its spread in the United States. That time is valuable for all sorts of things, including state and local preparation, and the development of diagnostics, therapeutics, and vaccines.

It's also helped us determine our funding and resource needs, allowing the White House to make its supplemental funding request of Congress earlier this week. We want to work with Congress to determine the funds we need for FY2020 first, because our priorities here are speed and flexibility.

HHS is already using up the \$105 million in the Infectious Disease Rapid Response Reserve Fund, which has been vital, but it's not enough -- which is why we are moving forward with a transfer of \$136 million to continue our public health response, which I notified Congress about on February the 2nd.

Thanks to investments supported by this administration, we have highly valuable and flexible relationships and contracting methods for developing and purchasing diagnostics, therapeutics, and vaccines through entities like BARDA. But we'll need more money for the focused drive toward countermeasures that we need to keep America safe.

Working on a supplemental needs to be a top priority for Congress. As the President has said, this is not a time for politics. We cannot undertake all the preparation that it's widely acknowledged we need without more funding.

As chairman of the Coronavirus Task Force, I have already begun working alongside Vice President Pence, Acting Director Vought, Director Ueland, and others to begin productive discussions with Congress about what funding should look like.

We laid out five key elements of our supplemental request. First, surveillance. Second, state and local support. Third, therapeutics. Fourth, vaccines. And fifth, personal protective equipment, or PPE.

I want to mention some particular activities we plan with the funding. With surveillance funds, we'll build on existing influenza surveillance systems, covering all states and adding coronavirus testing and reporting to the current flu systems. We request funding for grants to state and local jurisdictions for epidemiology, lab capacity, infection control, and other activities, complementing CDC investments over the years. And we've requested new funding for the 62 recipients of our hospital preparedness program.

We request \$1 billion in support for the development of up to five candidate coronavirus vaccines, including support for one or more through phase-three clinical trials.

On therapeutics and diagnostics, we request support for investigation of broad-spectrum antivirals, research on existing monoclonal antibodies that work on other coronaviruses, development of new targeted monoclonal antibodies, and screening of small molecule compounds that have existing clinical data. We request support for these activities through early clinical trials.

We also request support for development of assays to ensure ready availability of diagnostics, plus funding to help the FDA support these development priorities -- pipelines.

On personal protective equipment, we propose almost half a billion dollars in investments for the Strategic National Stockpile to increase production, capacity, and purchase of respirators, ventilators, and antimicrobials for secondary infections.

These kinds of activities will build on activities that we have prioritized and generously funded over the years. Since FY2017, under President Trump, the CDC's budget has increased by \$668 million, while NIH's budget has increased by more than \$7 billion.

The FY2020 appropriations signed by President Trump include \$2.7 billion for preparedness programs in HHS's Office of the Assistant Secretary for Preparedness and Response, up about \$600 million from FY2017. That included a 130-million-dollar increase in annual spending for the Strategic National Stockpile, and a 203-million-dollar increase in our Pandemic Preparedness Program.

The President's 2021 budget for CDC, developed before we knew the coronavirus would present such an emergency, reflects similar priorities. It maintains the \$675 million in state and local preparedness investments, the FEP funding. It prioritizes infectious disease funding and proposes a \$50 million increase for CDC's Global Health Security Agenda efforts.

That reflects this administration's longtime focus on effective preparedness programs, the CDC's core mission of infectious disease response, and support for tackling infectious disease threats, especially ones that can cross borders.

I've been a strong advocate for this work and so have leaders across the Trump administration. Tragically, we are now reminded why we've made the case for these priorities over the years. And this situation demands more support from Congress, just as earlier potential pandemic situations have.

DIRECTOR VOUGHT: So the first one I want to tackle is the total amount for CDC of fighting infectious diseases and preparedness in the President's budget versus last year. So, last year, fiscal year 2020, there was \$4.182 billion for fighting infectious diseases and preparedness within CDC. We then increased that in the President's budget by 3 percent -- \$135 million -- to \$4.317 LA-GOV-20-1240, 20-1241, 20-1242-A-000273

billion.

So from the standpoint of everything that -- all of the activities that are going on at CDC in this area, there's an increase of 3 percent.

There is a topline reduction in the President's budget for CDC in areas that are not infectious disease fighting and preparedness -things like climate change research; things like occupational health research that is not going to go away, but is merely something that we no longer feel like we need to jumpstart research that universities are doing, and they have been doing it since 1970, when these programs were first created because it wasn't happening at universities.

We also think there's waste, fraud, and abuse in this area, where you have studies on how taxi drivers are taking too few bathroom breaks, and whether that's an important occupational health issue.

Those are the kinds of things that we still think, even in a time of making sure that all the resources are there for CDC, we can find inefficiencies and waste, and deal with mission creep at the same time.

So it is not true that we cut CDC infectious disease fighting -- which gets me to the second one, which I think this is the main inaccuracy out there, which is this notion that you see in some of the New York Post and CNN reporting that we cut CDC by 80 percent. It's flat-out inaccurate.

Let me explain how the numbers are concocted, comparing apples and oranges, to get that 80 percent. When the Ebola supplemental was passed, there was \$597 million provided over five years. It was not an annual spend; it was a five-year lump sum supplemental. Per year, that was \$119 million for global health activities that would apply to any infectious disease. But that was passed by Congress as part of the Ebola supplemental.

The last two years of that five-year supplemental, we began to make sure that it would be funded within the base amount of resources. So we put forward \$50 million in Fiscal Year '18, \$50 million in Fiscal Year '19, \$125 million in Fiscal Year '20, and in this budget we propose \$175 million in Fiscal Year '21.

So, in -- while it was still available, we were taking steps to make sure it was funded within base resources. So when the supplemental emergency funding expired, there would still be there, and then when that expired we then pulsed it up to \$125 [million]. And this year we propose it at \$175 [million]. So significant resources there.

You hear, in the same kind of stories, about leaked memos regarding contingency plans. Those were -- we never got to the point where the funds were expired. And so the contingency plans were what they're meant to be: contingency plans if the funds go away. So, kind of -- we keep seeing this story out there. It's flat-out inaccurate.

I want to talk a little bit about the run rate. So when we talk about: Is there money in the account right now? There's money in the account. We have spent \$77 million of the \$105 million that Secretary Azar mentioned.

We will be able to get through into April. We can't tell you with a specific degree of certainty, but we're in a good place right now, temporarily. The difference between what we have actually spent, and the -- and the amounts that are provided, we have committed to other activities. We need a supplemental; we need it soon. There's no doubt about that. But we haven't run out of money. And we've got some time and we think that Congress is taking this very seriously.

Eric will speak to how quickly they will move a supplemental. But we're moving forward and we are making sure we have all the accurate data.

I've heard the argument from the Hill: "Well, you haven't given us all of the obligation rates." Well, that's because we're trying to get all of the obligation rates ourselves: collect them, make sure we have all of them from the various different accounts across the federal government, compile them, and get them to the Hill. And we will be as transparent as we always have.

And then the last thing I would just say from a comparison of -- this is our sup request versus their sup request. Remember that ours was based on the notion of what's needed for the seven months remaining in Fiscal Year '20. We put forward a two-and-a-half-billion-dollar request. The President has been very -- made it very clear. Secretary Azar, as head of our task force, has made it very clear. We are willing to go to a higher level if Congress feels the need to do that. But we put forward a two-and-a-half-billion-dollar request based on what was required in seven months, knowing that we're going to go right into Fiscal Year '21 appropriations, and build in additional resources for this area.

So when you see a big number from Senator Schumer -- again, not much detail there, but the assumption is that that is a five-year number. "No-year money" was what we call it. And so, to some extent, you're dealing, again, with apples and oranges. The Ebola supplemental was, again, no-year money, so it wasn't intended to be for what was needed in this particular fiscal year.

So those are the main things that I've seen that I wanted to make sure we definitely unpack. And I'm sure we'll do more of that in the Q&A.

Thank you for all you're doing to serve customers and members during this challenging time, as the U.S. deals with COVID-19 (coronavirus). We know how busy you are, and greatly appreciate what you're doing for your communities.

As you know from previous notes, we are responding to the developing situation and planning for what may occur in the coming weeks and months. We wanted to share an update that a Walmart associate at our store in Cynthiana, Kentucky, has tested positive for COVID-19. The associate is receiving medical care, and her condition is improving. We wish her a speedy recovery. After learning of this case, we consulted with state and local health experts, reinforced our cleaning and sanitizing protocol, and, with the support and encouragement of the state government, the store remains open.

As more cases are likely to occur, we'll continue to take precautions and actions to keep our stores, clubs and other facilities clean and ensure the well-being of our associates, customers and members, following the protocols from our own health experts and relevant federal and state agencies. We are in close communication with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), as well as other health organizations, and have plans and procedures in place.

Your health is our priority, and, as we've said before, we want any associate who is not feeling well to stay home. So, we have created a COVID-19 emergency leave policy, which is effective immediately, to ensure you have the support you need. Let us describe three different circumstances:

- During this uncertain time, if you determine you are unable to work or are uncomfortable at work, you can choose to stay home. To ensure you feel supported making this choice, we will waive our attendance occurrence policy through the end of April, but please call in as usual to let us know. In order to be paid for this time, you may use your regular paid time off options.
- If your store, club, office or distribution center is part of a mandated quarantine or if you're required to quarantine by a government agency or by Walmart, you will receive up to two weeks of pay, and absences during the time you are out will not

count against attendance. We've chosen two weeks because it matches the recommended time for quarantines related to this virus.

 Should an associate have a confirmed case of the virus, they'll receive up to two weeks of pay. If they're not able to return to work after that time, additional pay replacement may be provided for up to 26 weeks for both full-time and part-time hourly associates.

We are also pleased that, in response to COVID-19, the Walmart Associates in Critical Need Trust, an independent charitable trust (ACNT), temporarily waived the eligibility requirement that U.S. associates be employed with Walmart for 365 days before they can apply for a grant.

More information on all of these options will be available on OneWalmart.

We will continue to monitor this situation closely with the support of our Emergency Operations Center and health officials. Know that we will continue to take any and all measures necessary to ensure the well-being of our associates, customers and members.

Again, thank you for all you are doing during this difficult time.

<u>CDC to Award Over \$560 Million to State & Local Jurisdictions in Support of COVID-19 Response</u> (more <u>here</u>)

The Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) is announcing another upcoming action by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) to provide resources to state and local jurisdictions in support of our nation's response to the coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19). The \$8.3 billion dollar Supplemental passed by Congress included <u>statutory language</u> which prescribed the exact formula for disbursing the money: states will receive 90% of their <u>2019</u> <u>CDC PHEP grants</u>. This marks the first tranche of funding to states from the \$8.3 billion supplemental. Your state health officers are receiving a letter today from CDC outlining what is needed to receive the funding, essentially they need to submit a spend plan and they will receive guidance on what that spend plan should contain.

<u>White House Coronavirus Task Force Announces Community Mitigation Strategies for Seattle,</u> <u>Santa Clara</u>

The White House Coronavirus Task Force today recommended 30-day mitigation strategies for <u>Seattle-King</u>, <u>Pierce</u>, and <u>Snohomish County</u>, <u>Washington</u>, and <u>Santa Clara County</u>, <u>California</u> due to widespread transmission of coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19). These mitigation activities are designed to address the effects of COVID-19 on areas that are experiencing community spread.

"President Trump has made clear that the Task Force must move decisively to protect the health and safety of the American people," said Vice President Mike Pence. "These recommendations outline a whole-of-community approach to immediately minimize the impacts of coronavirus in these cities and towns. I look forward to the continued partnership between the Task Force and State and local leaders."

Earlier today, Vice President Pence spoke with California Governor Gavin Newsom and Washington Governor Jay Inslee about these community mitigation strategies. The Task Force and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) have worked closely with state and local leaders in California, Washington, and around the Nation to develop these strategies. Additionally, CDC has teams in these areas working with public health partners to respond to the situation on the ground.

Cooperation with communities, businesses, and healthcare organizations is necessary to implement extensive community mitigation activities with the goal of protecting:

- Individuals at risk for severe illness, including persons with underlying health conditions including immune suppression and especially seniors with underlying health conditions;
- The healthcare workforce; and
- Critical infrastructure workforces.

Due to widespread community transmission of COVID-19 in these communities, examples of mitigation strategies for these areas include, but are not limited to:

- Individuals should practice protective measures (e.g., hand washing);
- Schools should conduct regular health checks of students, staff, and visitors;
- Senior living facilities should implement social distancing measures;
- Workplaces should encourage staff to telework and expand sick leave policies;
- Community and faith-based organizations should move gatherings of any size to video-accessible venues or postpone/cancel; and
- Healthcare facilities should implement triage before entering facilities.

In making these recommendations, the Task Force considered guidance from multiple Federal agencies, including technical advice from CDC. These community mitigation strategies are recommended for 30 days, after which local and state public health officials, in coordination with CDC will reassess the individual community situations.

Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) Nursing Home Guidance

As you know, nursing homes and their residents are vulnerable populations for COVID-19. This week, CMS released updated guidance for infection control and prevention of COVID-19 in Nursing Homes which can be found <u>here</u> (3/9). 

This marks the first tranche of funding to states from the \$8.3 billion supplemental. Your state health officers are receiving a letter today from CDC outlining what is needed to receive the funding, essentially they need to submit a spend plan and they will receive guidance on what that spend plan should contain.

<u>White House Coronavirus Task Force Announces Community Mitigation Strategies for Seattle,</u> <u>Santa Clara</u>

The White House Coronavirus Task Force today recommended 30-day mitigation strategies for <u>Seattle-King</u>, <u>Pierce</u>, and <u>Snohomish County</u>, <u>Washington</u>, and <u>Santa Clara County</u>, <u>California</u> due to widespread transmission of coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19). These mitigation activities are designed to address the effects of COVID-19 on areas that are experiencing community spread.

"President Trump has made clear that the Task Force must move decisively to protect the health and safety of the American people," said Vice President Mike Pence. "These recommendations outline a whole-of-community approach to immediately minimize the impacts of coronavirus in these cities and towns. I look forward to the continued partnership between the Task Force and State and local leaders."

Earlier today, Vice President Pence spoke with California Governor Gavin Newsom and Washington Governor Jay Inslee about these community mitigation strategies. The Task Force and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) have worked closely with state and local leaders in California, Washington, and around the Nation to develop these strategies. Additionally, CDC has teams in these areas working with public health partners to respond to the situation on the ground.

These community mitigation strategies are recommended for 30 days, after which local and state public health officials, in coordination with CDC will reassess the individual community situations.



Dear State and Local Partners:

Every day brings new information and developments on COVID-19, many of which impact your efforts to address the Coronavirus. We value our strong partnership with you all as we continue to work on the COVID-19 response. We aim to ensure that you have access to the resources and information that you need for your communities.

Here are key highlights:

National Emergency Declaration: Today, President Trump signed a <u>National Emergency Declaration</u> in response to COVID-19. The Emergency Declaration will allow HHS to provide emergency funding to state and local entities (up to \$50 billion) and specifically will enable HHS to waive provisions of certain laws and regulations to provide increased flexibility to healthcare providers. Additional flexibilities will be able to be exercised around the use of telehealth, state licensing requirements for providers to practice in areas of greatest need, increasing the supply of providers, loosening restrictions on where hospitals can care for patients within a hospital, and flexibilities on the number of beds and lengths of stay for Critical Access Hospitals.

Increasing Capacity for Testing: The Administration designated Assistant Secretary for Health, ADM Brett Giroir, M.D., to take the lead in coordinating testing efforts to ensure seamless access for patients, doctors, and hospitals. HHS is working to help expedite the availability of tests by utilizing the private sector and allowing states to offer and develop their own tests. Yesterday, the FDA authorized a diagnostic test developed by Roche, to rapidly expand the capacity and timeliness of testing for COVID-19 diagnostics. The FDA also approved the New York State Department of Health to directly authorize labs to begin patient testing. More information about these actions can be found <u>here</u>. For technical information on diagnostic testing, FDA posted <u>frequently</u> asked questions related to the development and performance of diagnostic testing.

With help from public-health and private-sector lab capabilities, HHS has also enabled states and healthcare providers to implement sample collection for pre-screened patients, similar to what is being done at the Mayo Clinic and Minnesota Department of Health, by the Colorado Health Department and by the University of Washington. CMS has also published the Medicare reimbursement amounts to providers for COVID-19 testing, which can be found <u>here</u>.

Lab Test Questions – As public and private testing labs continue to gear up capabilities and review the new options being created through the FDA, they may have questions. To help answer those questions that are technical in nature, the FDA has stood up a 24/7 hotline for things related to COVID-19: 1-888-INFO-FDA or 1-888-463-6332.

Essential Health Benefit Coverage of COVID-19: The FAQs released today, March 13, detail existing federal rules governing health coverage provided through the individual and small group insurance markets that apply to the diagnosis and treatment of COVID-19. The FAQs clarify which COVID-related services, including testing, isolation/quarantine, and vaccination, are generally currently covered as EHBs in these markets. The purpose of the FAQs is to provide guidance to Americans enrolled in individual or small group market health plans, including HealthCare.gov consumers. As questions and issues continue to come to CMS, they will be addressed and added to these FAQs. The document can be found here.

Community Response: All communities can take measures to reduce the spread of COVID-19. Everyone has a role to play in getting ready and staying healthy. CDC has released updated information on <u>Preventing the Spread of COVID-19 in Communities</u> as well as issuing <u>considerations for school closures</u>.

- 1) OPH and NOHD continue to work closely together on coordination of COVID-19 preparedness and response, starting at the beginning of the state's activities in January, 2020

H.R. 6201, FAMILIES FIRST CORONAVIRUS RESPONSE ACT *Title-By-Title Summary*

The legislation provides paid leave, establishes free testing, protects public health workers, and provides important benefits to children and families.

DIVISION A – Second Coronavirus Preparedness and Response Supplemental Appropriations Act, 2020 Prepared by the Democratic staff of the House Committee on Appropriations

Title I – Agriculture, Rural Development, Food and Drug Administration, and Related Agencies

Food and Nutrition Service – Includes funding to ensure the domestic nutrition assistance programs have adequate resources to help those impacted by the COVID-19 public health emergency. Funding is provided for:

- The Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women Infants and Children (WIC) \$500 million to provide access to nutritious foods to low-income pregnant women or mothers with young children who lose their jobs or are laid off due to the COVID-19 emergency.
- The Emergency Food Assistance Program (TEFAP) \$400 million to assist local food banks to meet increased demand for low-income Americans during the emergency. Of the total, \$300 million is for the purchase of nutritious foods and \$100 million is to support the storage and distribution of the foods.

In addition –

- The legislation includes a general provision that allows the Department of Agriculture to approve state plans to provide emergency SNAP assistance to households with children who would otherwise receive free or reduced-price meals if not for their schools being closed due to the COVID-19 emergency. In order to be eligible, the child's school must be closed for no less than 5 consecutive days.
- Nutrition Assistance for U.S. Territories \$100 million for USDA to provide nutrition assistance grants to Puerto Rico, American Samoa, and the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands tin response to the COVID-19 public health emergency.

Title II – Labor, Health and Human Services, Education, and Related Agencies

Emergency Paid Sick Days Program – Includes \$5 million for the Department of Labor to administer the emergency paid sick days program.

Senior Nutrition Program – Includes \$250 million for the Senior Nutrition program in the Administration for Community Living (ACL) to provide approximately 25 million additional home-delivered and pre-packaged meals to low-income seniors who depend on the Senior Nutrition programs in their communities.

This funding will provide meals to low-income seniors:

- who are home-bound;
- who have disabilities;
- who have multiple chronic illnesses;
- as well as caregivers for seniors who are home-bound.

ACL's Senior Nutrition grants are provided to States, territories, and eligible tribal organizations and serve more than 2.4 million individuals annually.

Nearly two-thirds of recipients of home-delivered meals report these meals as more than half of their food intake for the day.

Title III – Bill-Wide

Technical budgetary provisions.

DIVISION B – Nutrition Waivers

Prepared by the Democratic staff of the House Agriculture Committee

Title I – Maintaining Essential Access to Lunch for Students Act

Section 101. Short Title. The short title for the bill is the Maintaining Essential Access to Lunch for Students Act or the MEALS Act.

Section 102. Waiver Exception for School Closures Due to COVID-19. Provides the Secretary of Agriculture the authority to issue nationwide school meal waivers during the COVID-19 emergency, which will eliminate paperwork for states and help more schools quickly adopt and utilize flexibilities.

Title II – COVID-19 Child Nutrition Response Act

Section 201. Short Title. The short title for the bill is the COVID-19 Child Nutrition Response Act.

Section 202. National School Lunch Program Requirement Waivers Addressing COVID-19. Allows all child and adult care centers to operate as non-congregate (i.e. they can serve outside the school or in individual settings) and waive all meal pattern requirements if there is a disruption to the food supply as a result of the COVID-19 emergency.

Title III – SNAP COVID-19 Response Waivers

Section 301. SNAP Flexibility for Low-Income Jobless Workers. Suspends the work and work training requirements for SNAP during this crisis.

Section 302. Additional SNAP Flexibilities in a Public Health Emergency. Allows states to request special waivers from the Secretary to provide temporary, emergency CR-SNAP benefits to existing SNAP households up to the maximum monthly allotment, as well as give the Secretary broad discretion to provide much more flexibility for States in managing SNAP caseloads. Additionally, this language requires the Secretary to make State requests for waivers and the USDA response, as well as any USDA guidance on State flexibilities, publicly available online.

DIVISION C – COVID-19 Health Care Worker Protection Act of 2020 *Prepared by the Democratic staff of the House Committee on Education and Labor*

Section 1. Short Title. The short title for the bill is the COVID-19 Health Care Worker Protection Act of 2020.

Section 2. Findings. This section includes Congressional findings related to COVID-19.

TITLE I – COVID-19 Emergency Temporary Standard

Section 101. COVID-19 Emergency Temporary Standard. This section requires the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) to issue an Emergency Temporary Standard (ETS) within 30 days, requiring employers within the health care sector -- and any other sectors which either OSHA or the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) designate at elevated risk -- to develop and implement a comprehensive infectious disease exposure control plan to protect health care workers from exposure to the SARS-CoV-2 virus that causes COVID19. The ETS shall be based on the CDC's 2007 "Guideline for Isolation Precautions: Preventing Transmission of Infectious Agents in Healthcare Settings" that was issued to protect health care workers against Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome (SARS). In addition, the ETS may not be less protective than the infectious disease precautions for novel pathogens issued by any OSHA state plan.

OSHA shall issue a permanent health and safety standard, which the Occupational Safety and Health Act stipulates shall be issued 6 months after the ETS has been issued.

TITLE II – Amendments to the Social Security Act

Section 201. Application of COVID-19 Emergency Temporary Standard to Certain Facilities Receiving Medicare Funds. This section requires that hospitals and skilled nursing facilities operated by state or local government agencies, which are not otherwise subject to the Occupational Safety and Health Act of 1970 or a State occupational safety and health plan, shall comply with the ETS and the permanent OSHA standard required in this Act as a condition of receiving Medicare funds. A facility that fails to comply with the OSHA standards is subject to a civil monetary penalty in an amount similar to the amount OSHA may impose under the OSHA Act for a violation of a standard, but such facility is not subject to termination of an agreement with Medicare.

DIVISION D – Emergency Paid Leave Act of 2020 *Prepared by the Democratic staff of the House Committee on Ways and Means*

Section 101. Short Title. The short title for the bill is the Emergency Paid Leave Act of 2020.

Section 102. Emergency Paid Leave Benefits. *Amends the Social Security Act by inserting after title V the following: Title VI-Emergency Paid Leave Benefits.* This section creates a new federal emergency paid leave benefits program as Title VI of the Social Security Act, consisting of the following Social Security Act sections.

Section 601. Definitions. This section defines an "emergency leave day" as a day in which an individual is unable to work due to one of four qualifying reasons related to COVID-19:

- The worker has a current diagnosis of COVID-19.
- The worker is quarantined (including self-imposed quarantine), at the instruction of a health care provider, employer, or government official, to prevent the spread of COVID-19.
- The worker is caring for another person who has COVID-19 or who is under a quarantine related to COVID-19.
- The worker is caring for a child or other individual who is unable to care for themself due to the COVID-19-related closing of their school, child care facility, or other care program.

It also defines other key terms including "eligible individual," which is someone who was working in the thirty days before they were impacted by COVID-19.

Section 602. Emergency Paid Leave Benefits. This section creates a new federal emergency paid leave benefit program. Eligible workers will receive a benefit for a month (up to three months) in which they must take 14 or more days of leave from their work due to the qualifying COVID-19-related reasons. Days when an individual receives pay from their employer (regular wages, sick pay, or other paid time off) or unemployment compensation do not count as leave days for purposes of this benefit.

The program will be administered by the Social Security Administration (SSA). Specifications include the following:

- Benefit amount: Two-thirds of the individual's average monthly earnings (based on the most recent year of wages or self-employment income for which records are readily available), up to a cap of \$4,000.
- Program and benefit period: The benefits will be available for leave that occurs from January 19, 2020 (the date of the first U.S. COVID-19 diagnosis) through one year after the bill's enactment.
- Retroactive benefits: Benefits can be paid retroactively, and applications can be filed up to 6 months after enactment.
- Application: Applications will be taken online, by phone, or by mail. Individuals will not visit SSA field offices to apply. Payments will in most cases be issued electronically.
- Program integrity: Applicants must attest that they meet the criteria for eligibility and existing penalties for fraud or misrepresentation with regard to Social Security benefits are applied to the federal emergency paid leave benefits program.

The program will operate in coordination with other relevant benefits and leave programs, including:

- Protection of existing benefit rights: Existing benefit rights are protected, including any rights to State or local paid leave benefits, and greater benefits are allowed including under a contract, collective bargaining agreement, or other employment benefit program.
- Reduction based on receipt of state or private paid leave: Benefit amounts are offset (reduced) dollar-for-dollar by the amount of any state or private paid leave benefit the individual also receives.
- Reimbursement grants to States: States will be reimbursed for the total amount of these offsets that are due to state-run or state-mandated paid leave programs.
- No effect on eligibility for SSI: Benefits paid under this program do not count as income or resources for the Supplemental Security Income (SSI) program.

Section 603. Funding and Expedited Implementation Authority. SSA will receive additional direct (mandatory) funding for both the cost of the benefits and the cost of administering the program. Treasury will receive additional direct (mandatory) funding for reimbursement of states.

Section 604. Protection of Social Security Trust Funds. Social Security's Trust Funds and regular administrative budget will be kept separate from this new program and cannot be used to administer or fund it.

Section 605. Taxation of Emergency Leave Benefits. Benefits paid under this program are not subject to federal income taxes.

DIVISION E – Emergency Unemployment Insurance Stabilization and Access Act of 2020 Prepared by the Democratic staff of the House Committee on Ways and Means

Section 101. Short Title. The short title for the division is the Emergency Unemployment Insurance Stabilization and Access Act of 2020.

Section 102. Emergency Transfers for Unemployment Compensation Administration. This section provides \$1 billion in 2020 for emergency grants to states for activities related to processing and paying unemployment insurance (UI) benefits, under certain conditions.

\$500 million would be used to provide immediate additional funding to all states for staffing, technology, systems, and other administrative costs, so long as they met basic requirements about ensuring access to earned benefits for eligible workers. Those requirements are:

- Require employers to provide notification of potential UI eligibility to laid-off workers
- Ensure that workers have at least two ways (for example, online and phone) to apply for benefits
- Notify applicants when an application is received and being processed and if the application cannot be processed, provide information to the applicant about how to ensure successful processing.

States would be required to report on the share of eligible individuals who received UI benefits and the state's efforts to ensure access within one year of receiving the funding. The funding would be distributed in the same proportions as regular UI administrative funding provided through annual appropriations.

\$500 million would be reserved for emergency grants to states which experienced at least a10 percent increase in unemployment. Those states would be eligible to receive an additional grant, in the same amount as the initial grant, to assist with costs related to the unemployment spike, and would also be required to take steps to temporarily ease eligibility requirements that might be limiting access to UI during the COVID-19 outbreak, like work search requirements, required waiting periods, and requirements to increase employer UI taxes if they have high layoff rates. Depending on the state, those actions might require changes in state law, or might just require changes in state policy. This section also provides temporary federal flexibility regarding those UI restrictions which are also in federal law.

Section 103. Temporary Assistance for States with Advances. This section provides states with access to interest-free loans to help pay regular UI benefits through December 31, 2020, if needed.

Section 104. Technical Assistance and Guidance for Short-Time Compensation Programs. This section requires the Secretary of Labor to provide technical assistance to states that want to set up work-sharing programs, in which employers reduce hours instead of laying employees off, and then employees receive partial unemployment benefits to offset the wage loss.

Section 105. Full Federal Funding of Extended Unemployment Compensation for a Limited Period. For states that experience an increase of 10 percent or more in their unemployment rate (over the previous year) and comply with all the beneficiary access provisions in section 102, this section provides 100 percent federal funding for Extended Benefits, which normally require 50 percent of funding to come from states. Extended Benefits are triggered when unemployment is high in a state and provide up to an additional 26 weeks after regular UI benefits (usually 26 weeks) are exhausted.

DIVISION F – Paid Sick Days for Public Health Emergencies and Personal and Family Care Act

The emergency paid sick days legislation:

- Requires all employers to allow employees to gradually accrue seven days of paid sick leave and to provide an additional 14 days available immediately in the event of any public health emergency, including the current coronavirus crisis;
- Requires all employers to provide an additional 14 days of paid sick leave, available immediately at the beginning of a public health emergency, including the current coronavirus crisis;
- Ensures paid sick leave covers days when your child's school is closed due to a public health emergency, when your employer is closed due to public health emergency, or if you or a family member is quarantined or isolated due to a public health emergency;
- Reimburses small businesses—defined as businesses with 50 or fewer employees—for the costs of providing the 14 days of additional paid sick leave used by employees during a public health emergency;
- Enables construction employees to receive sick pay based on hours they work for multiple contractors; and
- Makes the bill effective immediately so that employees in areas covered under a qualifying Public Health Emergency, upon the date of enactment, can take 14 days of paid sick leave in order to address COVID-19.

DIVISION G – Health Provisions

Prepared by the Democratic staff of the Committees on Energy and Commerce, Ways and Means, and Education and Labor

Section 101. Coverage of Testing for COVID-19. This section requires private health plans to provide coverage for COVID-19 diagnostic testing, including the cost of a provider, urgent care center and emergency room visits in order to receive testing. Coverage must be provided at no cost to the consumer.

Section 102. Waiving Cost Sharing Under the Medicare Program For Certain Visits Relating To Testing For COVID-19. This section requires Medicare Part B to cover beneficiary cost-sharing for provider visits during which a COVID-19 diagnostic test is administered or ordered. Medicare Part B currently covers the COVID-19 diagnostic test with no beneficiary cost-sharing. Section 103. Waiving Cost Sharing Under the Medicare Advantage Program for Certain Visits Relating to Testing for COVID-19. This section requires Medicare Advantage to provide coverage for COVID-19 diagnostic testing, including the associated cost of the visit in order to receive testing. Coverage must be provided at no cost to the beneficiary.

Section 104. Coverage at No Cost Sharing of COVID-19 Testing Under Medicaid and CHIP. This section requires Medicaid to provide coverage for COVID-19 diagnostic testing, including the cost of a provider visit in order to receive testing. Coverage must be provided at no cost to the beneficiary. It would also provide states with the option to extend Medicaid eligibility to uninsured populations for the purposes of COVID-19 diagnostic testing. State expenditures for medical and administrative costs would be matched by the federal government at 100 percent.

Section 105. Laboratory Reimbursement for Diagnostic Testing for COVID-19 in Uninsured Individuals. This section requires the National Disaster Medical System to reimburse the costs of COVID-19 diagnostic testing provided to individuals without insurance.

Section 106. Treatment of Personal Respiratory Protective Devices as Covered Countermeasures. This section requires certain personal respiratory protective devices to be treated as covered countermeasures under the PREP Act Declaration for the purposes of emergency use during the COVID-19 outbreak and ending October 1, 2024.

Section 107. Application with Respect to TRICARE, Coverage for Veterans, and Coverage for Federal Civilians. This section ensures that individuals enrolled in TRICARE, covered veterans, and federal workers have coverage for COVID-19 diagnostic testing without cost-sharing.

Section 108. Coverage of Testing for COVID-19 At No Cost Sharing for Indians Receiving Contract Health Services. This section ensures that American Indians and Alaskan Natives do not experience cost sharing for COVID-19 testing, including those referred for care away from an Indian Health Service or tribal health care facility.

Section 109. Emergency FMAP Increase. This section provides a temporary increase to states' federal medical assistance percentage for the duration of the public health emergency for COVID-19. It requires states to maintain eligibility standards that are no less restrictive than the date of enactment.

In order to be eligible, the child's school must be closed for no less than 5 consecutive days.
- Nutrition Assistance for U.S. Territories \$100 million for USDA to provide nutrition assistance grants to Puerto Rico, American Samoa, and the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands tin response to the COVID-19 public health emergency.

Title II – Labor, Health and Human Services, Education, and Related Agencies

Emergency Paid Sick Days Program – Includes \$5 million for the Department of Labor to administer the emergency paid sick days program.

Senior Nutrition Program – Includes \$250 million for the Senior Nutrition program in the Administration for Community Living (ACL) to provide approximately 25 million additional home-delivered and pre-packaged meals to low-income seniors who depend on the Senior Nutrition programs in their communities.

This funding will provide meals to low-income seniors:

- who are home-bound;
- who have disabilities;
- who have multiple chronic illnesses;
- as well as caregivers for seniors who are home-bound.

ACL's Senior Nutrition grants are provided to States, territories, and eligible tribal organizations and serve more than 2.4 million individuals annually.

Nearly two-thirds of recipients of home-delivered meals report these meals as more than half of their food intake for the day.

Title III – Bill-Wide

Technical budgetary provisions.

DIVISION B – Nutrition Waivers

Prepared by the Democratic staff of the House Agriculture Committee

Title I – Maintaining Essential Access to Lunch for Students Act

Section 101. Short Title. The short title for the bill is the Maintaining Essential Access to Lunch for Students Act or the MEALS Act.

Section 102. Waiver Exception for School Closures Due to COVID-19. Provides the Secretary of Agriculture the authority to issue nationwide school meal waivers during the COVID-19 emergency, which will eliminate paperwork for states and help more schools quickly adopt and utilize flexibilities.

Title II – COVID-19 Child Nutrition Response Act

Section 201. Short Title. The short title for the bill is the COVID-19 Child Nutrition Response Act.

Section 202. National School Lunch Program Requirement Waivers Addressing COVID-19. Allows all child and adult care centers to operate as non-congregate (i.e. they can serve outside the school or in individual settings) and waive all meal pattern requirements if there is a disruption to the food supply as a result of the COVID-19 emergency.

Title III – SNAP COVID-19 Response Waivers

Section 301. SNAP Flexibility for Low-Income Jobless Workers. Suspends the work and work training requirements for SNAP during this crisis.

Section 302. Additional SNAP Flexibilities in a Public Health Emergency. Allows states to request special waivers from the Secretary to provide temporary, emergency CR-SNAP benefits to existing SNAP households up to the maximum monthly allotment, as well as give the Secretary broad discretion to provide much more flexibility for States in managing SNAP caseloads. Additionally, this language requires the Secretary to make State requests for waivers and the USDA response, as well as any USDA guidance on State flexibilities, publicly available online.

DIVISION C – COVID-19 Health Care Worker Protection Act of 2020 *Prepared by the Democratic staff of the House Committee on Education and Labor*

Section 1. Short Title. The short title for the bill is the COVID-19 Health Care Worker Protection Act of 2020.

Section 2. Findings. This section includes Congressional findings related to COVID-19.

TITLE I – COVID-19 Emergency Temporary Standard

Section 101. COVID-19 Emergency Temporary Standard. This section requires the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) to issue an Emergency Temporary Standard (ETS) within 30 days, requiring employers within the health care sector -- and any other sectors which either OSHA or the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) designate at elevated risk -- to develop and implement a comprehensive infectious disease exposure control plan to protect health care workers from exposure to the SARS-CoV-2 virus that causes COVID19. The ETS shall be based on the CDC's 2007 "Guideline for Isolation Precautions: Preventing Transmission of Infectious Agents in Healthcare Settings" that was issued to protect health care workers against Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome (SARS). In addition, the ETS may not be less protective than the infectious disease precautions for novel pathogens issued by any OSHA state plan.

OSHA shall issue a permanent health and safety standard, which the Occupational Safety and Health Act stipulates shall be issued 6 months after the ETS has been issued.

TITLE II – Amendments to the Social Security Act

Section 201. Application of COVID-19 Emergency Temporary Standard to Certain Facilities Receiving Medicare Funds. This section requires that hospitals and skilled nursing facilities operated by state or local government agencies, which are not otherwise subject to the Occupational Safety and Health Act of 1970 or a State occupational safety and health plan, shall comply with the ETS and the permanent OSHA standard required in this Act as a condition of receiving Medicare funds. A facility that fails to comply with the OSHA standards is subject to a civil monetary penalty in an amount similar to the amount OSHA may impose under the OSHA Act for a violation of a standard, but such facility is not subject to termination of an agreement with Medicare.

DIVISION D – Emergency Paid Leave Act of 2020 *Prepared by the Democratic staff of the House Committee on Ways and Means*

Section 101. Short Title. The short title for the bill is the Emergency Paid Leave Act of 2020.

Section 102. Emergency Paid Leave Benefits. *Amends the Social Security Act by inserting after title V the following: Title VI-Emergency Paid Leave Benefits.* This section creates a new federal emergency paid leave benefits program as Title VI of the Social Security Act, consisting of the following Social Security Act sections.

Section 601. Definitions. This section defines an "emergency leave day" as a day in which an individual is unable to work due to one of four qualifying reasons related to COVID-19:

- The worker has a current diagnosis of COVID-19.
- The worker is quarantined (including self-imposed quarantine), at the instruction of a health care provider, employer, or government official, to prevent the spread of COVID-19.
- The worker is caring for another person who has COVID-19 or who is under a quarantine related to COVID-19.
- The worker is caring for a child or other individual who is unable to care for themself due to the COVID-19-related closing of their school, child care facility, or other care program.

It also defines other key terms including "eligible individual," which is someone who was working in the thirty days before they were impacted by COVID-19.

Section 602. Emergency Paid Leave Benefits. This section creates a new federal emergency paid leave benefit program. Eligible workers will receive a benefit for a month (up to three months) in which they must take 14 or more days of leave from their work due to the qualifying COVID-19-related reasons. Days when an individual receives pay from their employer (regular wages, sick pay, or other paid time off) or unemployment compensation do not count as leave days for purposes of this benefit.

The program will be administered by the Social Security Administration (SSA). Specifications include the following:

- Benefit amount: Two-thirds of the individual's average monthly earnings (based on the most recent year of wages or self-employment income for which records are readily available), up to a cap of \$4,000.
- Program and benefit period: The benefits will be available for leave that occurs from January 19, 2020 (the date of the first U.S. COVID-19 diagnosis) through one year after the bill's enactment.
- Retroactive benefits: Benefits can be paid retroactively, and applications can be filed up to 6 months after enactment.
- Application: Applications will be taken online, by phone, or by mail. Individuals will not visit SSA field offices to apply. Payments will in most cases be issued electronically.
- Program integrity: Applicants must attest that they meet the criteria for eligibility and existing penalties for fraud or misrepresentation with regard to Social Security benefits are applied to the federal emergency paid leave benefits program.

The program will operate in coordination with other relevant benefits and leave programs, including:

- Protection of existing benefit rights: Existing benefit rights are protected, including any rights to State or local paid leave benefits, and greater benefits are allowed including under a contract, collective bargaining agreement, or other employment benefit program.
- Reduction based on receipt of state or private paid leave: Benefit amounts are offset (reduced) dollar-for-dollar by the amount of any state or private paid leave benefit the individual also receives.
- Reimbursement grants to States: States will be reimbursed for the total amount of these offsets that are due to state-run or state-mandated paid leave programs.
- No effect on eligibility for SSI: Benefits paid under this program do not count as income or resources for the Supplemental Security Income (SSI) program.

Section 603. Funding and Expedited Implementation Authority. SSA will receive additional direct (mandatory) funding for both the cost of the benefits and the cost of administering the program. Treasury will receive additional direct (mandatory) funding for reimbursement of states.

Section 604. Protection of Social Security Trust Funds. Social Security's Trust Funds and regular administrative budget will be kept separate from this new program and cannot be used to administer or fund it.

Section 605. Taxation of Emergency Leave Benefits. Benefits paid under this program are not subject to federal income taxes.

DIVISION E – Emergency Unemployment Insurance Stabilization and Access Act of 2020 Prepared by the Democratic staff of the House Committee on Ways and Means

Section 101. Short Title. The short title for the division is the Emergency Unemployment Insurance Stabilization and Access Act of 2020.

Section 102. Emergency Transfers for Unemployment Compensation Administration. This section provides \$1 billion in 2020 for emergency grants to states for activities related to processing and paying unemployment insurance (UI) benefits, under certain conditions.

\$500 million would be used to provide immediate additional funding to all states for staffing, technology, systems, and other administrative costs, so long as they met basic requirements about ensuring access to earned benefits for eligible workers. Those requirements are:

- Require employers to provide notification of potential UI eligibility to laid-off workers
- Ensure that workers have at least two ways (for example, online and phone) to apply for benefits
- Notify applicants when an application is received and being processed and if the application cannot be processed, provide information to the applicant about how to ensure successful processing.

States would be required to report on the share of eligible individuals who received UI benefits and the state's efforts to ensure access within one year of receiving the funding. The funding would be distributed in the same proportions as regular UI administrative funding provided through annual appropriations.

\$500 million would be reserved for emergency grants to states which experienced at least a10 percent increase in unemployment. Those states would be eligible to receive an additional grant, in the same amount as the initial grant, to assist with costs related to the unemployment spike, and would also be required to take steps to temporarily ease eligibility requirements that might be limiting access to UI during the COVID-19 outbreak, like work search requirements, required waiting periods, and requirements to increase employer UI taxes if they have high layoff rates. Depending on the state, those actions might require changes in state law, or might just require changes in state policy. This section also provides temporary federal flexibility regarding those UI restrictions which are also in federal law.

Section 103. Temporary Assistance for States with Advances. This section provides states with access to interest-free loans to help pay regular UI benefits through December 31, 2020, if needed.

Section 104. Technical Assistance and Guidance for Short-Time Compensation Programs. This section requires the Secretary of Labor to provide technical assistance to states that want to set up work-sharing programs, in which employers reduce hours instead of laying employees off, and then employees receive partial unemployment benefits to offset the wage loss.

Section 105. Full Federal Funding of Extended Unemployment Compensation for a Limited Period. For states that experience an increase of 10 percent or more in their unemployment rate (over the previous year) and comply with all the beneficiary access provisions in section 102, this section provides 100 percent federal funding for Extended Benefits, which normally require 50 percent of funding to come from states. Extended Benefits are triggered when unemployment is high in a state and provide up to an additional 26 weeks after regular UI benefits (usually 26 weeks) are exhausted.

DIVISION F – Paid Sick Days for Public Health Emergencies and Personal and Family Care Act

The emergency paid sick days legislation:

- Requires all employers to allow employees to gradually accrue seven days of paid sick leave and to provide an additional 14 days available immediately in the event of any public health emergency, including the current coronavirus crisis;
- Requires all employers to provide an additional 14 days of paid sick leave, available immediately at the beginning of a public health emergency, including the current coronavirus crisis;
- Ensures paid sick leave covers days when your child's school is closed due to a public health emergency, when your employer is closed due to public health emergency, or if you or a family member is quarantined or isolated due to a public health emergency;
- Reimburses small businesses—defined as businesses with 50 or fewer employees—for the costs of providing the 14 days of additional paid sick leave used by employees during a public health emergency;
- Enables construction employees to receive sick pay based on hours they work for multiple contractors; and
- Makes the bill effective immediately so that employees in areas covered under a qualifying Public Health Emergency, upon the date of enactment, can take 14 days of paid sick leave in order to address COVID-19.

DIVISION G – Health Provisions

Prepared by the Democratic staff of the Committees on Energy and Commerce, Ways and Means, and Education and Labor

Section 101. Coverage of Testing for COVID-19. This section requires private health plans to provide coverage for COVID-19 diagnostic testing, including the cost of a provider, urgent care center and emergency room visits in order to receive testing. Coverage must be provided at no cost to the consumer.

Section 102. Waiving Cost Sharing Under the Medicare Program For Certain Visits Relating To Testing For COVID-19. This section requires Medicare Part B to cover beneficiary cost-sharing for provider visits during which a COVID-19 diagnostic test is administered or ordered. Medicare Part B currently covers the COVID-19 diagnostic test with no beneficiary cost-sharing. Section 103. Waiving Cost Sharing Under the Medicare Advantage Program for Certain Visits Relating to Testing for COVID-19. This section requires Medicare Advantage to provide coverage for COVID-19 diagnostic testing, including the associated cost of the visit in order to receive testing. Coverage must be provided at no cost to the beneficiary.

Section 104. Coverage at No Cost Sharing of COVID-19 Testing Under Medicaid and CHIP. This section requires Medicaid to provide coverage for COVID-19 diagnostic testing, including the cost of a provider visit in order to receive testing. Coverage must be provided at no cost to the beneficiary. It would also provide states with the option to extend Medicaid eligibility to uninsured populations for the purposes of COVID-19 diagnostic testing. State expenditures for medical and administrative costs would be matched by the federal government at 100 percent.

Section 105. Laboratory Reimbursement for Diagnostic Testing for COVID-19 in Uninsured Individuals. This section requires the National Disaster Medical System to reimburse the costs of COVID-19 diagnostic testing provided to individuals without insurance.

Section 106. Treatment of Personal Respiratory Protective Devices as Covered Countermeasures. This section requires certain personal respiratory protective devices to be treated as covered countermeasures under the PREP Act Declaration for the purposes of emergency use during the COVID-19 outbreak and ending October 1, 2024.

Section 107. Application with Respect to TRICARE, Coverage for Veterans, and Coverage for Federal Civilians. This section ensures that individuals enrolled in TRICARE, covered veterans, and federal workers have coverage for COVID-19 diagnostic testing without cost-sharing.

Section 108. Coverage of Testing for COVID-19 At No Cost Sharing for Indians Receiving Contract Health Services. This section ensures that American Indians and Alaskan Natives do not experience cost sharing for COVID-19 testing, including those referred for care away from an Indian Health Service or tribal health care facility.

Section 109. Emergency FMAP Increase. This section provides a temporary increase to states' federal medical assistance percentage for the duration of the public health emergency for COVID-19. It requires states to maintain eligibility standards that are no less restrictive than the date of enactment.

DIVISION H – Budgetary Effects

Technical budgetary provisions.

President Donald J. Trump Directs FEMA Support Under Emergency Declaration for COVID-19

The federal government continues to take aggressive and proactive steps to address the COVID-19 threat as the health and safety of the American people remain a top priority.

Today, President Trump declared a nationwide emergency pursuant to Sec. 501(b) of the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act, 42 U.S.C. 5121-5207 (the "Stafford Act"). This increases federal support to the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) in its role as the lead federal agency for the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic response. As a result of the President's decisive, unprecedented action, FEMA is directed to assist state, local, tribal, territorial governments and other eligible entities with the health and safety actions they take on behalf of the American public. Today's declaration does not make direct financial assistance available to individuals.

The emergency declaration does not change measures authorized under other federal statutes and HHS remains the lead federal agency directing the federal response to COVID-19. FEMA actions will be in support of HHS and in coordination with state, tribal and territorial governments. Eligible emergency protective measures taken at the direction or guidance of public health officials in response to this emergency, and not supported by the authorities of another federal agency, will be reimbursed strictly under the FEMA Public Assistance program. FEMA assistance will be provided at a 75 percent Federal cost share. Reimbursable activities typically include emergency protective measures such as the activation of State Emergency Operations Centers, National Guard costs, law enforcement and other measures necessary to protect public health and safety.

I want to keep you and your staff updated on actions taken at the Federal level regarding COVID-19. Early this morning, the U.S. House of Representatives passed the Families First Coronavirus Response Act (<u>H.R. 6201</u>) by a 363-40 vote. This package provides free coronavirus testing, secures paid emergency leave, enhances Unemployment Insurance, strengthens food security initiatives, and increases federal Medicaid funding to states. The bill now awaits Senate action, which is expected the week of March 16.

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HHS Funding & Health-Care Provisions

Nutrition: The measure would appropriate \$250 million for Health and Human Services Department programs that aid elderly Americans, divided as follows:

- \$160 million for home-delivered nutrition services.
- \$80 million for congregate nutrition services that provide food in group settings, such as adult day care centers and meal sites.
- \$10 million for nutrition services for American Indians.

It also would provide \$64 million to the Indian Health Service for items and services related to Covid-19.

Medicaid Funding: States would be eligible for a 6.2 percentage point increase in their federal medical assistance percentages (FMAP). They would have to provide coverage of coronavirus testing without cost sharing and meet other criteria, such as not imposing more stringent eligibility standards or additional premiums.

States could cover tests for uninsured people through their Medicaid programs and receive a 100% FMAP to cover the cost.

Medicaid funding for U.S. territories would be increased.

Test Coverage: Insurers would be required to cover coronavirus tests and related services, such as provider visits for testing, without cost-sharing or prior authorization requirements. The cost-sharing prohibition would also apply to Medicaid, Medicare, TRICARE, veterans' health programs, the Indian Health Service, and coverage provided to federal civilian employees.

The bill would appropriate \$1 billion to allow the National Disaster Medical System to reimburse provider costs associated with testing uninsured individuals.

Major insurance companies — including BlueCross BlueShield Association companies, Humana Inc., and UnitedHealth Group Inc. — have committed to waiving coronavirus test co-pays, <u>according</u> to Vice President Mike Pence.

Medicare currently <u>covers</u> testing without any patient cost-sharing. The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services wrote in March 12 <u>guidance</u> that states can modify their Medicaid plans to eliminate cost-sharing for certain services, such as Covid-19 tests, as long as their policy applies regardless of the diagnosis. The emergency declaration will also give states <u>more flexibility</u> in their programs.

The administration is also examining ways to provide free tests to the uninsured, CDC Director Robert Redfield said March <u>12</u>.

Mask Liability: The measure would make personal respiratory protective devices a covered countermeasure under the Public Readiness and Emergency Preparedness Act (<u>Public Law 109-148</u>). The law allows HHS to provide liability protections for certain emergency response products.

Nutrition Assistance

The measure would provide:

- \$500 million in emergency funding for the WIC program.
- \$400 million for the Commodity Assistance Program for the emergency food assistance program (TEFAP), \$100 million of which could be used for costs related to the distribution of goods.
- \$100 million for grants to the Northern Mariana Islands, Puerto Rico, and American Samoa for nutrition assistance provided in response to the virus.

SNAP Benefits for Kids: If a school is closed for at least five consecutive days because of a coronavirus-related public health emergency, states could adjust their Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Programs (SNAP) to provide additional aid to households with children eligible for free or reduced price school meals.

Additional benefits would have to be equal to the value of the meals for each eligible child in a household. Benefits could be distributed through an electronic benefits transfer card system. The Agriculture Department could purchase food commodities to ensure it can distribute them in areas where a public health emergency has been declared. "Such amounts as are necessary" would be appropriated for the meal provisions.

SNAPWork Requirements: The measure would waive federal work requirements for SNAP eligibility. The waiver would begin the first full month after the bill is enacted and terminate at the end of the first full month after a federal coronavirus-related emergency declaration is lifted. State-imposed work requirements wouldn't be changed, but a person's participation in SNAP during the emergency couldn't be counted for determining compliance with work requirements.

LA-GOV-20-1240, 20-1241, 20-1242-A-000330

Other SNAP Benefits: States that make their own emergency or disaster declarations related to Covid-19 could request emergency allotments of food aid to support increased participation in SNAP and address temporary food needs. The provision wouldn't change the maximum monthly allotment for any household size. States would have to provide data sufficient to demonstrate the need for additional aid.

Meal Program Waivers: The package would allow USDA to waive statutory requirements for several food programs to ensure that meals can be provided during the emergency and to implement safety measures related to preventing the spread of Covid-19. It would allow nationwide waivers of eligible <u>National School Lunch Program</u>, <u>School Breakfast Program</u>, <u>Child and Adult Care Food Program</u>, and <u>Summer Food Service Program</u> requirements.

The department could waive nutritional content requirements and rules to provide meals through the Child and Adult Care Food Program in group settings.

Waivers related to Covid-19 that increase the cost to the federal government for school meals would be allowed.

USDA has <u>granted waivers</u> to 17 states as of March 12 to allow school systems to continue serving meals during prolonged coronavirus-related closures. Several other states also have waiver requests pending.

WIC Waivers: The measure would allow states to request waivers for the requirement that WIC recipients certify their eligibility in person and for deferring biometric and bloodwork requirements. USDA could also modify or waive WIC administrative requirements that a state can't meet due to the Covid-19 outbreak.

Coronavirus Emergency Leave

The agreement would create an emergency paid leave program to directly respond to the coronavirus. Private sector employers with fewer than 500 workers and government entities would have to provide as many as 12 weeks of job-protected leave under the <u>Family and Medical Leave Act (FMLA)</u> for employees who have to:

- Comply with a requirement or recommendation to quarantine because of exposure to or symptoms of coronavirus.
- Provide care to a family member who's complying with such a requirement or recommendation.
- Provide care for child younger than 18 whose school or day care has closed because of coronavirus.

The first 14 days of leave could be unpaid, though a worker could choose to use accrued vacation days, personal leave, or other available paid leave for unpaid time off. Following the 14-day period, workers would receive a benefit from their employers that will be at least two-thirds of their normal pay rate.

The measure also would modify the FMLA to allow individuals to use unpaid leave if they are diagnosed with the virus, caring for a family member, or caring for a child whose school or day care has closed because of a public health emergency through Dec. 31, 2020.

The Labor Department would be authorized to issue regulations to:

- Exclude certain health-care providers and emergency responders from paid leave benefits.
- Exempt small businesses with fewer than 50 employees from the paid leave requirements.

Workers under a multiemployer collective bargaining agreement and whose employers pay into a pension plan would have access to paid leave.

Emergency Sick Leave

Private sector employers with fewer than 500 workers and government entities would have to provide employees with paid sick time off to:

- Self-quarantine.
- Obtain a medical diagnosis or care for coronavirus.
- Provide care for a family member who has been diagnosed or is in quarantine or for a child whose school or day care has closed due to coronavirus.

Full-time employees would receive 80 hours of sick leave under the new emergency leave program and part-time workers would be granted time off that's equivalent to their scheduled or normal work hours in a two-week period. Paid sick time could be carried over from year to year.

Workers would have to be paid at least their normal wage or the federal, state, or local minimum wage, whichever is greater. They would be paid, however, at two-thirds of their regular earning for providing caregiving to a family member.

Employers with similar existing paid leave policies would be required to provide workers with the emergency paid sick time. An employer couldn't require a worker to use any other available paid leave before using the sick time.

Employers would be prohibited from:

- Requiring a worker to find a replacement to cover their hours during time off.
- Discharging or discriminating against workers for requesting paid sick leave or filing a complaint against the employer.

An employer could be subject to civil penalties for a violation of paid sick leave requirements.

Workers under a multiemployer collective bargaining agreement and whose employers pay into a pension plan would have access to paid emergency leave.

Employer Tax Credits

The measure would provide payroll tax credits to employers to cover wages paid to employees while they are taking time off under the bill's sick leave and family leave programs.

The payroll tax, which funds Social Security, is a 6.2% levy on wages imposed on both employees and employees. Employees' share wouldn't be affected by the bill.

The sick leave credit for each employee would be for wages of as much as \$511 per day while the employee is receiving paid sick leave to care for themselves, or \$200 if the sick leave is to care for a family member or child if their school is closed. The limit would be the excess of 10 days over the aggregate number of days taken into account for all preceding calendar quarters.

The family leave credit for each employee would be for wages of as much as \$200 per day while the employee is receiving paid leave, or an aggregate of \$10,000.

The credit would be refundable if it exceeded the amount the employer owed in payroll tax.

Employers couldn't receive the credit if they're also receiving a credit for paid family and medical leave established by the 2017 tax overhaul (Public Law 115-97). They would have to include the credit in their gross income.

State and local governments couldn't receive the credit.

The credit would be in effect for wages through the end of 2020.

The Treasury Department would have to issue regulations or guidance to ensure employers don't manipulate the credit, to minimize compliance and record-keeping burdens, to waive penalties for underpayments in anticipation of the credit, and to establish a process to recapture credits when there's an adjustment.

The measure would authorize the transfer of amounts equal to the credit, as well as lost revenue from wages that are exempt from payroll tax, to the Social Security and disability insurance trust funds from the general fund.

Self-Employed Tax Credit

The measure would provide a similar refundable credit against self-employment tax. It would cover 100% of self-employed individuals' sick-leave equivalent or 67% if they were taking care of a sick family member or child if their school was closed.

Their sick-leave equivalent amount would be the lesser of their average daily self-employment income, or \$511 per day if caring for themselves or \$200 if caring for a family member. It would be available for 10 days over the number of days taken into account in preceding years.

Self-employed individuals could receive a family leave credit for as many as 50 days for the lesser of \$200 or their average daily self-employment income.

Self-employed individuals would have to submit documentation, as required by the Treasury Department.

The measure would establish alternate requirements for self-employed individuals who also receive sick-leave pay from an employer. It would also establish rules for the credit to be provided in U.S. territories.

Unemployment Insurance

Emergency Transfers: The measure would provide as much as \$1 billion for emergency transfers to states in fiscal 2020 to process and pay unemployment benefits.

Each state would receive a proportional amount based on the share of federal unemployment taxes paid by its employers.

States would receive half of their allocation within 60 days of the bill's enactment if they certify that they meet certain requirements, such as ensuring that workers can apply for benefits online or by phone.

States would receive the remaining funds if their unemployment claims increased by at least 10% over the same quarter in the previous year. They would have to waive certain eligibility rules for claimants and charges for employers affected by LA-GOV-20-1240, 20-1241, 20-1242-A-000332

Covid-19.

States could modify certain unemployment policies, including rules related to job searches and initial payment waiting periods, on an emergency temporary basis to address the effects of Covid-19.

The Labor Department <u>announced</u> guidance March 12 to clarify that states can make other changes to their unemployment policies to cover affected workers. For instance, current law allows states to pay benefits when workers are quarantined, or when they leave their jobs due to a risk of exposure or to care for a family member, the department said.

Extended Benefits: Eligible laid-off workers can receive regular unemployment benefits for as long as 26 weeks in most states.

After exhausting those benefits, individuals in states with rising unemployment can qualify for an additional 13 weeks of benefits — or 20 weeks in some states — through the Extended Benefits (EB) program.

The bill would waive a state matching requirement and provide full federal funding for the EB program for the rest of 2020. To qualify, states would need to experience a 10% spike in unemployment claims over the past year and qualify for a full emergency funding transfer under the measure.

Interest-Free Loans: The bill would waive interest payments that states owe for the rest of 2020 on federal advances to their unemployment accounts.

Other Agencies

The measure also would provide:

- \$82 million to the Defense Department for Covid-19-related items and services through the Defense Health Program.
- \$60 million for the Veterans Affairs Department.
- \$15 million to the Internal Revenue Service to carry out the bill's provisions.

H.R. 6201, FAMILIES FIRST CORONAVIRUS RESPONSE ACT Title-By-Title Summary

The legislation guarantees free coronavirus testing, establishes paid leave, enhances Unemployment Insurance, expands food security initiatives, and increases federal Medicaid funding.

DIVISION A – Second Coronavirus Preparedness and Response Supplemental Appropriations Act, 2020 Prepared by the Democratic staff of the House Committee on Appropriations and the House Committee on Education and Labor

Title I – Agriculture, Rural Development, Food and Drug Administration, and Related Agencies

Food and Nutrition Service – Includes funding to ensure the domestic nutrition assistance programs have adequate resources to help those impacted by the COVID-19 public health emergency. Funding is provided for:

- The Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women Infants and Children (WIC) \$500 million to provide access to nutritious foods to low-income pregnant women or mothers with young children who lose their jobs or are laid off due to the COVID-19 emergency.
- The Emergency Food Assistance Program (TEFAP) \$400 million to assist local food banks to meet increased demand for low-income Americans during the emergency. Of the total, \$300 million is for the purchase of nutritious foods and \$100 million is to support the storage and distribution of the foods.

In addition –

 The legislation includes a general provision that allows the Department of Agriculture to approve state plans to provide emergency Electronic Benefit Transfer (EBT) food assistance to households with children who would otherwise receive free or reduced-price meals if not for their schools being closed due to the COVID-19 emergency. In order to be eligible, the child's school must be closed for no less than 5 consecutive days. Nutrition Assistance for U.S. Territories – \$100 million for USDA to provide nutrition assistance grants to Puerto Rico, American Samoa, and the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands in response to the COVID-19 public health emergency.

Title II – Defense

Coverage of Testing for COVID-19 through the Department of Defense – Includes \$82 million for the Department of Defense to cover the costs of COVID-19 diagnostic testing for beneficiaries receiving care through the Defense Health Program.

Title III – Financial Services and General Government

Implementation of Tax Credits – Includes \$15 million for the Internal Revenue Service to implement tax credits for paid sick and paid family and medical leave.

Title IV – Interior, Environment, and Related Agencies

Coverage of Testing for COVID-19 through the Indian Health Service – Includes \$64 million for the Indian Health Service to cover the costs of COVID-19 diagnostic testing for Indians receiving care through the Indian Health Service or through an Urban Indian Health Organization.

Title V – Labor, Health and Human Services, Education, and Related Agencies

Senior Nutrition Program – Includes \$250 million for the Senior Nutrition program in the Administration for Community Living (ACL) to provide approximately 25 million additional home-delivered and pre-packaged meals to low-income seniors who depend on the Senior Nutrition programs in their communities.

This funding will provide meals to low-income seniors:

- who are home-bound;
- who have disabilities;
- who have multiple chronic illnesses;
- as well as caregivers for seniors who are home-bound.

ACL's Senior Nutrition grants are provided to States, territories, and eligible tribal organizations and serve more than 2.4 million individuals annually.

Nearly two-thirds of recipients of home-delivered meals report these meals as more than half of their food intake for the day.

Reimbursement for Diagnostic Testing and Services for COVID-19 in Uninsured Individuals

 Includes \$1 billion for the National Disaster Medical System to reimburse the costs of COVID-19 diagnostic testing and services provided to individuals without health insurance.

Title VI – Military Construction, Veterans Affairs, and Related Agencies

Coverage of Testing for COVID-19 through the Veterans Health Administration – Includes \$60 million for the Department of Veterans Affairs to cover the costs of COVID-19 diagnostic testing for veterans receiving care through Medical Services or through Medical Community Care.

Title VII – General Provisions

Technical budgetary provisions.

In addition –

• Ensures State Emergency Operations Centers receive regular and real-time reporting on aggregate testing and case data from health departments and share that data with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

DIVISION B – Nutrition Waivers

Prepared by the Democratic staff of the House Committee on Agriculture and the House Committee on Education and Labor

Title I – Maintaining Essential Access to Lunch for Students Act

Section 2101. Short Title. The short title for the bill is the Maintaining Essential Access to Lunch for Students Act or the MEALS Act.

Section 2102. Waiver Exception for School Closures Due to COVID-19. Provides the Secretary of Agriculture the authority to issue waivers for state plans that increase costs to the federal government.

Title II – COVID-19 Child Nutrition Response Act

Section 2201. Short Title. The short title for the bill is the COVID-19 Child Nutrition Response Act.

Section 2202. National School Lunch Program Requirement Waivers Addressing COVID-19. Allows all child and adult care centers to operate as non-congregate (i.e. allows them to take food to go). Allows the Secretary of Agriculture to waive meal pattern requirements in child nutrition programs if there is a disruption to the food supply as a result of the COVID-19 emergency. Provides the Secretary of Agriculture the authority to issue nationwide school meal waivers during the COVID-19 emergency, which will eliminate paperwork for states and help more schools quickly adopt and utilize flexibilities.

Section 2203. Physical Presence Waiver Under WIC During Certain Public Health Emergencies. Provides the Secretary of Agriculture with the authority to grant waivers to allow participants to be certified for the Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) without being physically present at the WIC clinic.

Sec. 2204. Administrative Requirements Waiver Under WIC. This section provides the Secretary of Agriculture with the authority to waive administrative requirements that are barriers to serving WIC participants during the coronavirus outbreak.

Title III – SNAP COVID-19 Response Waivers

Section 2301. SNAP Flexibility for Low-Income Jobless Workers. Suspends the work and work training requirements for SNAP during this crisis.

Section 2302. Additional SNAP Flexibilities in a Public Health Emergency. Allows states to request special waivers from the Secretary to provide temporary, emergency CR-SNAP benefits to existing SNAP households up to the maximum monthly allotment, as well as give the Secretary broad discretion to provide much more flexibility for States in managing SNAP caseloads. Additionally, this language requires the Secretary to make State requests for waivers and the USDA response, as well as any USDA guidance on State flexibilities, publicly available online.

DIVISION C – Emergency Family and Medical Leave Expansion Act Prepared by the Democratic staff of the House Committee on Education and Labor

Section 3101. Short Title. The short title for the bill is the Emergency Family and Medical Leave Expansion Act.

Section 3102. Amendments to the Family and Medical Leave Act of 1993. This section provides employees of employers with fewer than 500 employees and government employers, who have been on the job for at least 30 days, with the right take up to 12 weeks of job-protected leave under the Family and Medical Leave Act to be used for any of the following reasons:

- To adhere to a requirement or recommendation to quarantine due to exposure to or symptoms of coronavirus;
- To care for an at-risk family member who is adhering to a requirement or recommendation to quarantine due to exposure to or symptoms of coronavirus; and
- To care for a child of an employee if the child's school or place of care has been closed, or the child-care provider is unavailable, due to a coronavirus.

After the two weeks of paid leave, employees will receive a benefit from their employers that will be no less than two-thirds of the employee's usual pay.

Section 3103. Employment Under Multi-Employer Bargaining Agreements. The bill ensures employees who work under a multiemployer collective agreement and whose employers pay into a multiemployer plan are provided with leave.

Section 3104. Effective Date. This Act takes effect not later than 15 days after the date of bill's enactment.

DIVISION D – Emergency Unemployment Insurance Stabilization and Access Act of 2020

Prepared by the Democratic staff of the House Committee on Ways and Means

Section 4101. Short Title. The short title for the division is the Emergency Unemployment Insurance Stabilization and Access Act of 2020.

Section 4102. Emergency Transfers for Unemployment Compensation Administration. This section provides \$1 billion in 2020 for emergency grants to states for activities related to processing and paying unemployment insurance (UI) benefits, under certain conditions.

\$500 million would be used to provide immediate additional funding to all states for staffing, technology, systems, and other administrative costs, so long as they met basic requirements about ensuring access to earned benefits for eligible workers. Those requirements are:

- Require employers to provide notification of potential UI eligibility to laid-off workers
- Ensure that workers have at least two ways (for example, online and phone) to apply for benefits
- Notify applicants when an application is received and being processed and if the application cannot be processed, provide information to the applicant about how to ensure successful processing.

States would be required to report on the share of eligible individuals who received UI benefits and the state's efforts to ensure access within one year of receiving the funding. The funding would be distributed in the same proportions as regular UI administrative funding provided through annual appropriations.

\$500 million would be reserved for emergency grants to states which experienced at least a 10 percent increase in unemployment. Those states would be eligible to receive an additional grant, in the same amount as the initial grant, to assist with costs related to the unemployment spike, and would also be required to take steps to temporarily ease eligibility requirements that are limiting access to UI during the COVID-19 outbreak, like work search requirements, required waiting periods, and requirements to increase employer UI taxes if they have high layoff rates. Depending on the state, those actions might require changes in state law, or might just require changes in state policy. This section also provides temporary federal flexibility regarding those UI restrictions which are also in federal law.

Section 4103. Temporary Assistance for States with Advances. This section provides states with access to interest-free loans to help pay regular UI benefits through December 31, 2020, if needed.

Section 4104. Technical Assistance and Guidance for Short-Time Compensation Programs.

This section requires the Secretary of Labor to provide technical assistance to states that want to set up work-sharing programs, in which employers reduce hours instead of laying employees off, and then employees receive partial unemployment benefits to offset the wage loss.

Section 4105. Full Federal Funding of Extended Unemployment Compensation for a Limited Period. For states that experience an increase of 10 percent or more in their unemployment rate (over the previous year) and comply with all the beneficiary access provisions in section 102, this section provides 100 percent federal funding for Extended Benefits, which normally require 50 percent of funding to come from states. Extended Benefits (EB) are triggered when unemployment is high in a state and provide up to an additional 26 weeks after regular UI benefits (usually 26 weeks) are exhausted. This section also suspends the financial penalty within EB for states that waive the usual one-week waiting period for benefits.

DIVISION E – Emergency Paid Sick Leave Act *Prepared by the Democratic staff of the House Committee on Education and Labor*

Section 5101. Short Title. The Emergency Paid Sick Leave Act.

Section 5102. The Emergency Paid Sick Leave Act. This section requires employers with fewer than 500 employees and government employers to provide employees two weeks of paid sick leave, paid at the employee's regular rate, to quarantine or seek a diagnosis or preventive care for coronavirus; or paid at two-thirds the employee's regular rate to care for a family member for such purposes or to care for a child whose school has closed, or child care provider is unavailable, due to the coronavirus.

- Full-time employees are entitled to 2 weeks (80 hours) and part-time employees are entitled to the typical number of hours that they work in a typical two-week period.
- The bill ensures employees who work under a multiemployer collective agreement and whose employers pay into a multiemployer plan are provided with leave.

The Act, and the requirements under the Act, expire on December 31, 2020.

DIVISION F – Health Provisions

Prepared by the Democratic staff of the Committees on Energy and Commerce, Ways and Means, and Education and Labor

Section 6001. Coverage of Testing for COVID-19. This section requires private health plans to provide coverage for COVID-19 diagnostic testing, including the cost of a provider, urgent care center and emergency room visits in order to receive testing. Coverage must be provided at no cost to the consumer.

Section 6002. Waiving Cost Sharing Under the Medicare Program for Certain Visits Relating To Testing For COVID-19. This section requires Medicare Part B to cover beneficiary cost-sharing for provider visits during which a COVID-19 diagnostic test is administered or ordered. Medicare Part B currently covers the COVID-19 diagnostic test with no beneficiary cost-sharing.

Section 6003. Waiving Cost Sharing Under the Medicare Advantage Program for Certain Visits Relating to Testing for COVID-19. This section requires Medicare Advantage to provide

coverage for COVID-19 diagnostic testing, including the associated cost of the visit in order to receive testing. Coverage must be provided at no cost to the beneficiary.

Section 6004. Coverage at No Cost Sharing of COVID-19 Testing Under Medicaid and CHIP. This section requires Medicaid to provide coverage for COVID-19 diagnostic testing, including the cost of a provider visit in order to receive testing. Coverage must be provided at no cost to the beneficiary. It would also provide states with the option to extend Medicaid eligibility to uninsured populations for the purposes of COVID-19 diagnostic testing. State expenditures for medical and administrative costs would be matched by the federal government at 100 percent.

Section 6005. Treatment of Personal Respiratory Protective Devices as Covered Countermeasures. This section requires certain personal respiratory protective devices to be treated as covered countermeasures under the PREP Act Declaration for the purposes of emergency use during the COVID-19 outbreak and ending October 1, 2024.

Section 6006. Application with Respect to TRICARE, Coverage for Veterans, and Coverage for Federal Civilians. This section ensures that individuals enrolled in TRICARE, covered veterans, and federal workers have coverage for COVID-19 diagnostic testing without cost-sharing.

Section 6007. Coverage of Testing for COVID-19 At No Cost Sharing for Indians Receiving Contract Health Services. This section ensures that American Indians and Alaskan Natives do not experience cost sharing for COVID-19 testing, including those referred for care away from an Indian Health Service or tribal health care facility.

Section 6008. Emergency FMAP Increase. This section provides a temporary increase to states' federal medical assistance percentage for the duration of the public health emergency for COVID-19. It requires states to maintain eligibility standards that are no less restrictive than the date of enactment.

Section 6009. Increase in Medicaid Allotments for Territories. This section provides an increase to the territories' Medicaid allotments for 2020 and 2021. It will ensure that territories that receive an FMAP increase under the previous section will have the necessary additional federal funds for their Medicaid programs.

Section 6010. Clarification Relating to Secretarial Authority Regarding Medicare Telehealth Services Furnished During COVID-19 Emergency Period. This section makes a technical change to the Medicare telehealth provision of the Coronavirus Preparedness and Response Supplemental Appropriations Act, 2020 (P.L. 116-123) to ensure that new Medicare beneficiaries are able to access telehealth services under the emergency authority granted to the Secretary.

DIVISION G – Tax Credits For Paid Sick And Paid Family And Medical Leave

Prepared by the Democratic staff of the House Committee on Ways and Means

Section 7001. Payroll Credit for Required Paid Sick Leave. This section provides a refundable tax credit equal to 100 percent of qualified paid sick leave wages paid by an employer for each calendar quarter.

The tax credit is allowed against the tax imposed by section 3111(a) (the employer portion of Social Security taxes). Qualified sick leave wages are wages required to be paid by the Emergency Paid Sick Leave Act.

The section makes a distinction between qualified sick leave wages paid with respect to employees who must self-isolate, obtain a diagnosis, or comply with a self-isolation recommendation with respect to coronavirus. For amounts paid to those employees, the amount of qualified sick leave wages taken into account for each employee is capped at \$511 per day. For amounts paid to employees caring for a family member or for a child whose school or place of care has been closed, the amount of qualified sick leave wages taken into account for each employee is capped at \$200 per day. The aggregate number of days taken into account per employee may not exceed the excess of 10 over the aggregate number of days taken into account for all preceding calendar quarters.

If the credit exceeds the employer's total liability under section 3111(a) for all employees for any calendar quarter, the excess credit is refundable to the employer. Employers may elect to not have the credit apply. To prevent a double benefit, no deduction is allowed for the amount of the credit. In addition, no credit is allowed with respect to wages for which a credit is allowed under section 45S.

The Secretary of the Treasury is given broad authority to issue regulations and guidance necessary to carry out the purposes of the section, including regulations and guidance related to avoidance, penalty waivers with respect to deposit amounts, compliance and record-keeping relief, and benefit recapture. The Social Security OASDI trust funds are held harmless by transferring funds from the General Fund. The section applies only to wages paid with respect to the period beginning on a date selected by the Secretary of the Treasury (or the Secretary's delegate) which is during the 15-day period beginning on the date of the enactment of this Act, and ending on December 31, 2020.

Section 7002. Credit for Sick Leave for Certain Self-Employed Individuals. This section provides a refundable tax credit equal to 100 percent of a qualified sick leave equivalent amount for eligible self-employed individuals who must self-isolate, obtain a diagnosis, or comply with a self-isolation recommendation with respect to coronavirus. For eligible self-employed individuals caring for a family member or for a child whose school or place of care has been closed due to coronavirus, the section provides a refundable tax credit equal to 67 percent of a qualified sick leave equivalent amount.

The credit is allowed against income taxes and is refundable. Eligible self-employed individuals are individuals who would be entitled to receive paid leave pursuant to the Emergency Paid Sick Leave Act if the individual was an employee of an employer (other than himself or herself). For eligible self-employed individuals who must self-isolate, obtain a diagnosis, or comply with a

self-isolation recommendation, the qualified sick leave equivalent amount is capped at the lesser of \$511 per day or the average daily self-employment income for the taxable year per day. For eligible self-employed individuals caring for a family member or for a child whose school or place of care has been closed due to coronavirus, the qualified sick leave equivalent amount is capped at the lesser of \$200 per day or the average daily self-employment income for the taxable year per day.

In calculating the qualified sick leave equivalent amount, an eligible self-employed individual may only take into account those days that the individual is unable to work for reasons that would entitle the individual to receive paid leave pursuant to the Emergency Paid Sick Leave Act.

A self-employed individual must maintain documentation prescribed by the Secretary of the Treasury to establish his or her eligibility for the credit. To prevent a double benefit, the qualified sick leave equivalent amount is proportionately reduced for any days that the individual also receives qualified sick leave wages from an employer. The section contains rules to ensure that self-employed individuals in U.S. territories may claim the credit.

The Secretary of the Treasury is given broad authority to issue regulations and guidance necessary to carry out the purposes of the section, including regulations and guidance related to avoidance and compliance and record-keeping relief. The section applies only to days occurring during the period beginning on a date selected by the Secretary of the Treasury which is during the 15-day period beginning on the date of the enactment of this Act, and ending on December 31, 2020.

Section 7003. Payroll Credit for Required Paid Family Leave. This section provides a refundable tax credit equal to 100 percent of qualified family leave wages paid by an employer for each calendar quarter.

The tax credit is allowed against the tax imposed by section 3111(a) (the employer portion of Social Security taxes). Qualified family leave wages are wages required to be paid by the Emergency Family and Medical Leave Expansion Act.

The amount of qualified family leave wages taken into account for each employee is capped at \$200 per day and \$10,000 for all calendar quarters. If the credit exceeds the employer's total liability under section 3111(a) for all employees for any calendar quarter, the excess credit is refundable to the employer.

Employers may elect to not have the credit apply. To prevent a double benefit, no deduction is allowed for the amount of the credit. In addition, no credit is allowed with respect to wages for which a credit is allowed under section 45S.

The Secretary of the Treasury is given broad authority to issue regulations and guidance necessary to carry out the purposes of the section, including regulations and guidance related to avoidance, compliance and record-keeping relief, and benefit recapture. The Social Security OASDI trust funds are held harmless by transferring funds from the General Fund. The section applies only to wages paid with respect to the period beginning on a date selected by the Secretary of the Treasury which is during the 15-day period beginning on the date of the enactment of this Act, and ending on December 31, 2020.

Section 7004. Credit for Family Leave for Certain Self-Employed Individuals. This section provides a refundable tax credit equal to 100 percent of a qualified family leave equivalent amount for eligible self-employed individuals.

The credit is allowed against income taxes and is refundable. Eligible self-employed individuals are individuals who would be entitled to receive paid leave pursuant to the Emergency Family and Medical Leave Expansion Act if the individual was an employee of an employer (other than himself or herself). The qualified family leave equivalent amount is capped at the lesser \$200 per day or or the average daily self-employment income for the taxable year per day. In calculating the qualified family leave equivalent amount, an eligible self-employed individual may only take into account those days that the individual is unable to work for reasons that would entitle the individual to receive paid leave pursuant to the Emergency Family and Medical Leave Expansion Act.

Section 7005. Special Rule Related to Tax on Employers. The Social Security OASDI trust funds are held harmless by transferring funds from the General Fund.

President Donald J. Trump signed a Presidential Proclamation, which suspends the entry of most foreign nationals who LA-GOV-20-1240, 20-1241, 20-1242-A-000347 have been in certain European countries at any point during the 14 days prior to their scheduled arrival to the United States. These countries, known as the Schengen Area, include: Austria, Belgium, Czech Republic, Denmark, Estonia, Finland, France, Germany, Greece, Hungary, Iceland, Italy, Latvia, Liechtenstein, Lithuania, Luxembourg, Malta, Netherlands, Norway, Poland, Portugal, Slovakia, Slovenia, Spain, Sweden, and Switzerland. This does not apply to legal permanent residents, (generally) immediate family members of U.S. citizens, and other individuals who are identified in the proclamation.

Statement from DHS Acting Secretary Chad F. Wolf: "Protecting the American people from threats to their safety is the most important job of the President of the United States. The actions President Trump is taking to deny entry to foreign nationals who have been in affected areas will keep Americans safe and save American lives. I applaud the president for making this tough but necessary decision. While these new travel restrictions will be disruptive to some travelers, this decisive action is needed to protect the American public from further exposure to the potentially deadly coronavirus. In January and February, the Administration issued similar travel restrictions on individuals who had been in China and Iran. That action proved to be effective in slowing the spread of the virus to the U.S., while public health officials prepared. In the next 48 hours, in the interest of public health, I intend to issue a supplemental Notice of Arrivals Restriction requiring U.S. passengers that have been in the Schengen Area to travel through select airports where the U.S. Government has implemented enhanced screening procedures."

RESTRICTING TRAVEL FROM IMPACTED AREAS: President Donald J. Trump is taking further action to curb the spread of the coronavirus to the United States from other countries.

<u>President Donald J. Trump Has Taken Unprecedented Steps to Respond to The Coronavirus and Protect</u> <u>the Health and Safety Of Americans</u>

"Together we are putting into policy a plan to prevent, detect, treat and create a vaccine against coronavirus to save lives in America and the world. America will get it done!" – President Donald J. Trump

President Donald J. Trump signed a Presidential Proclamation, which suspends the entry of most foreign nationals who LA-GOV-20-1240, 20-1241, 20-1242-A-000353 have been in certain European countries at any point during the 14 days prior to their scheduled arrival to the United States. These countries, known as the Schengen Area, include: Austria, Belgium, Czech Republic, Denmark, Estonia, Finland, France, Germany, Greece, Hungary, Iceland, Italy, Latvia, Liechtenstein, Lithuania, Luxembourg, Malta, Netherlands, Norway, Poland, Portugal, Slovakia, Slovenia, Spain, Sweden, and Switzerland. This does not apply to legal permanent residents, (generally) immediate family members of U.S. citizens, and other individuals who are identified in the proclamation.

Statement from DHS Acting Secretary Chad F. Wolf: "Protecting the American people from threats to their safety is the most important job of the President of the United States. The actions President Trump is taking to deny entry to foreign nationals who have been in affected areas will keep Americans safe and save American lives. I applaud the president for making this tough but necessary decision. While these new travel restrictions will be disruptive to some travelers, this decisive action is needed to protect the American public from further exposure to the potentially deadly coronavirus. In January and February, the Administration issued similar travel restrictions on individuals who had been in China and Iran. That action proved to be effective in slowing the spread of the virus to the U.S., while public health officials prepared. In the next 48 hours, in the interest of public health, I intend to issue a supplemental Notice of Arrivals Restriction requiring U.S. passengers that have been in the Schengen Area to travel through select airports where the U.S. Government has implemented enhanced screening procedures."

RESTRICTING TRAVEL FROM IMPACTED AREAS: President Donald J. Trump is taking further action to curb the spread of the coronavirus to the United States from other countries.

- President Trump is issuing a proclamation under section 212(f) of the Immigration and Nationality Act (INA) to restrict travel to the United States from foreign nationals who have recently been in certain European countries.
 Section 212(f) of the INA only applies to the movement of human beings, not goods or cargo.
- The restriction applies to foreign nationals who have been in the Schengen Area, 26 countries in Europe with open borders agreements, in the last 14 days.
- Those who are exempt from these restrictions, such as American citizens, will be directed to a limited number of airports where screening can take place.
- There is extensive travel back and forth between Europe that heightens the risk here in the United States.

LOOKING OUT FOR AMERICAN BUSINESSES AND WORKERS: President Donald J. Trump is committed to protecting American businesses and workers from the impacts of coronavirus.

- The President is announcing an economic assistance package to help support businesses and workers who have been harmed by this outbreak.
- President Trump has instructed the Small Business Administration (SBA) to exercise available authority to provide loans to businesses affected by the coronavirus.
 - These loans will help overcome disruptions caused by the coronavirus.
 - The President is calling on Congress to increase funding for this program by an additional \$50 billion.
- The President will be instructing the Department of the Treasury to defer tax payments for certain individuals and businesses negatively impacted by the coronavirus.
 - This action will provide more than \$200 billion of additional liquidity to the economy.

"We all have known from the beginning that the coronavirus would continue to spread across this country, and it's one of the reasons why, from very early on, President Trump took decisive action to put the health of the American people first, not only declaring a public health emergency in January, but in that same month he suspended all travel from China -- an unprecedented move -- and quarantined Americans that were returning from the region. Since that time, George, we've -- we've issued travel advisories for areas of South Korea, Italy; screened all persons coming on direct flights. But, frankly, as we watched the epicenter of the coronavirus shift from China and South Korea to Europe, the President thought it was proper for us to impose a 30-day suspension on all travel from continental Europe."

The President, again, made another unprecedented decision in suspending all travel from Europe, because we want to stop the flow of people bringing the coronavirus here.

"The reality is that, really, just two weeks ago, in Italy, there were less than 500 cases and now there's 12,000 cases in Italy, George. We have tens of thousands of people that travel to the United States from Europe every day. Seventy percent of new cases in the world were in Europe. And when we looked yesterday at the -- what was then the 35 states where we had cases, about 30 of them could be traced to contacts with Europe. And so the President, again, made another unprecedented decision in suspending all travel from Europe, because we essentially want -- we essentially want to stop the flow of people bringing the coronavirus here, but then continuing to surge resources, particularly into California, Washington State, New York, and other communities where we've seen community spread. It's a combination of efforts that's being driven by the top health experts in the world on our task force. But the President -- the President showed again yesterday a willingness to take decisive action on multiple levels to protect the American people."

We want to send a very clear message to Americans that if for any reason you believe you've been exposed to the coronavirus, you should not be worried about the cost of testing or treatment.

"We're making steady progress. We're going to continue to make a very clear message to Americans that if for any reason you believe you've been exposed to the coronavirus or you have symptoms, we don't want people to be worried about the cost of testing, to be worried about the cost of treatment... As the President made clear last night, we're working with Congress and exploring actions the President can take to make sure that hourly wage earners know that you can stay home without risking losing a paycheck or losing your job if you feel if you feel that you've been exposed to the coronavirus."

"From early on in this effort we've been addressing the testing issue. We made changes through the FDA that allowed for state labs and university hospitals and hospitals to engage in testing. And I'm pleased to report every state lab in America can do testing now. Many university laboratories are doing it. Washington State – the University of Washington is doing extraordinary work. but we are literally working hour by hour to expand the testing and we think the key Savannah is going to be what we call commercial laboratories like LabCorp and Quest who are already spinning up production at the president's direction last week on tests that can be available on a broad basis in the days ahead for the American people. we're making real progress but rest assured we're going to continue to drive forward."

The President has called this a whole-of-government approach, but he has also called this is a whole-of-America approach.

"The President, you know, he said this was a whole-of-government approach but he also said this is a whole-of-America approach. So he's brought in business leaders from nursing homes; yesterday, banking; hospitals, and the rest. But one of the things we did that's most important on testing was the President brought in the leaders of the top commercial laboratories in the country who, as we speak, have already approved a test that is being spun up. It's being sent out to market. Quest, LabCorp, the largest commercial laboratories in the country, are working very closely with our administration. We're clearing the red tape out of the way. That's going to be the way that, in the days ahead, we're going to -- we're going to have broad-based testing available all across the country."

We are working together to contain the spread of the coronavirus. And we will get through this.

"Our goal, as the coronavirus spreads in this country -- and the vast majority who would contract it will have flu-LA-GOV-20-1240, 20-1241, 20-1242-A-000356 like symptoms and recover. Our goal nonetheless is to hold down that overall number as much as possible. And we will do that with the continuing cooperation of American families, schools, businesses, and states. And that's the vision President Trump has. All of us working together will get through this."

We are focusing on supporting efforts at the state and local level in Washington State, and in California. CDC issued strong guidelines for those communities about public activities, large gatherings and at schools. We will continue simply to follow the data on this.

"I want to say to your viewers, just as the President said last night, the risk to the average American of contracting the coronavirus remains low, but we do know that seniors with serious underlying chronic health conditions are particularly vulnerable to very serious outcomes. And so we're encouraging best practices for every American. We're focusing on communities where we have community spread."

Those with a family member who is a senior citizen should support them in engaging in good hygiene and good health practices.

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"But make no mistake about it: We're making steady progress. We've made changes at the FDA in January, at the President's direction. they all agreed to waive the co-pays on testing. We expanded testing to Medicare and Medicaid patients. And we also expanded coverage for treatment, and health insurance companies expanded coverage for treatment. We don't want anybody to avoid having a test because they're concerned financially."

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"Testing is happening in every state lab in the country. Many university hospitals have taken the FDA test, like the University of Washington, is doing a great job expanding testing capabilities. But the biggest piece on the testing is that our commercial labs that the President brought in last week, companies like Quest and LabCorp, have already had approved a new test that they several days ago had begun to take to market which they can do in a vast and expansive way across the country. And literally in the days ahead, we're going to continue to see the availability of tests at your local doctor, ultimately at your local pharmacy, continue to expand."

When President Trump learned that 70% of the new cases this week, around the world, were in Europe, he took decisive action to protect the American people.

"Make no mistake about it: All the new cases in the world, this week, 70% of the new cases were in Europe. And the increase has been dramatic. When the President imposed the travel advisory and we began screening all flights, all passengers coming into the United States from Italy two weeks ago, there were roughly 500 coronavirus cases. Now there's 12,000, about 1,000 in Germany, about 1,000 in France. That's the reason why the President essentially said full stop, we're going to suspend all travel, and that American citizens coming home and legal residents will be funneled through 13 different airports. They'll get an initial health screening coming in. But we're going to ask everyone returning to our country to self-quarantine for 14 days."

 - CDC has shipped tests sufficient to test about 75,000 individuals for COVID-19 to Public Health Laboratories. And all Public Health Laboratories that originally received a CDC test have received replacement tests. Laboratories in areas with the highest need for testing based on the outbreak have received additional tests, however, all state public health labs now have tests available to them.
 - As of March 7, the CDC test shipped to public health labs has been able to test more than 3,500 specimens from 1,583 patients.
 - Additionally, as of March 6, more than 1.1 million tests have been shipped to nonpublic health labs.
 - The manufacturer, IDT, is distributing these tests nationwide, although the first batch of tests were shipped to the states of California and Washington based on confirmed clusters in those areas.
 - IDT currently has another 400,000 tests which have undergone and passed final quality control check and we expect those tests to ship to labs on March 9.
 - Another manufacturer's tests will be undergoing a quality control check. That batch of 640,000 tests could ship as early as March 9.
 - IDT and other manufacturers believe they can scale up production so that by the end of next week tests, an additional 4 million tests could be shipped.
 - This does not include the ramp up expected by large commercial or academic labs.



READOUT FROM THE VICE PRESIDENT'S DISCUSSION WITH OUR NATION'S GOVERNORS ON COVID-19 COORDINATION & PREPAREDNESS

Vice President Mike Pence today participated in a discussion with nearly 50 of our Nation's governors to provide an update on the work of the White House Coronavirus Task Force, to continue coordination with governors and state and local officials to respond to and prepare for the coronavirus, and to thank governors and state and local leaders—particularly state and local health officials—for their important and tireless work.

The Vice President along with White House Coronavirus Response Coordinator Ambassador Deborah Birx, Health and Human Services Secretary Alex Azar, Centers for Disease Control & Prevention Director Bob Redfield, U.S. Northern Command and North American Aerospace Defense Command General Terrence O'Shaunessy, Office of Management and Budget Director Russ Vought, Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services Administrator Seema Verma, National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases Director Anthony Fauci, and Surgeon General Jerome Adams provided a status update on the expansion of testing capabilities, increased access to respirators for health care personnel, and the importance of the supplemental funding bill. Governor Larry Hogan, Chair of the National Governors Association, joined the Vice President in person, and other governors joined via video teleconference or phone. The Vice President pledged that Federal leaders will continue to coordinate with our Nation's governors and other State and local leaders.

Dear Leader McConnell, Leader Schumer, Speaker Pelosi, and Leader McCarthy:

The nation's Governors applaud the U.S. House of Representatives for passage of the XX (H.R...) and urge the U.S. Senate to take swift action and pass the emergency supplemental request, in response to the 2019 Novel Coronavirus (COVID-19).

As the nation's Governors, the health and well-being of our residents is our primary concern. States and localities are at the forefront of public health crises, and COVID-19 is no different. As the situation evolves, states are incurring escalating costs in assisting the federal response to COVID-19. It is imperative that we have adequate resources and funding to respond to this rapidly developing public health emergency. Any appropriation must include the allocation of new federal funding for preventing and responding to COVID-19, backfill states for costs already incurred, and ensure that any monies transferred from existing programs be replenished.

Congress must assure states and territories that necessary resources will be provided to address the multitude of costs associated with a public health emergency. These include but are not limited to travel screening, isolation and quarantine related activities, transportation, lodging, increased staffing, National Guard personnel, testing and monitoring patients, public outreach, supplies, equipment, schools, and wrap-around services.

States and territories are relying on federal dollars to support state public health efforts to prevent and reduce the impact of COVID-19. We appreciate the state-federal coordination on the response thus far and look forward to working with both the Administration and Congress as the nation tackles this public health threat.

Perhaps of keenest interest to you and your health officials is an update on funding for states and communities to address mitigation of COVID-19. Today, the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) is <u>announcing</u> upcoming action by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) to provide resources to state and local jurisdictions in support of our nation's response to the coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19).

The \$8.3 billion dollar Supplemental passed by Congress included <u>statutory language</u> which prescribed the exact formula for disbursing the money: states will receive 90% of their <u>2019 CDC PHEP grants</u>. This marks the first tranche of funding to states from the \$8.3 billion supplemental. Today, CDC is contacting State Health Officers to move forward with awarding over \$560 million to states, localities, territories, and tribes. CDC will use existing networks to reach out to state and local jurisdictions to access this initial funding. To view the list of CDC funding actions to jurisdictions, click <u>here</u>.

Helping Communities Know Mitigation Strategies

Yesterday, CDC released their "Implementation of Mitigation Strategies for Communities with Local COVID-19 Transmission." Essentially, this is a guide for communities describing possible mitigation strategies for communities dealing with transmission at three different levels: (1) None/Minimal, (2) Moderate, or (3) Substantial. Community mitigation strategies, which are non-pharmaceutical interventions, are often the most available interventions to help slow the transmission of COVID-19 in communities. The Mitigation Plans include a set of actions that persons and communities can take to slow the spread of respiratory virus infections. The Community Mitigation Plan can be found here.

Guidance on Infection Control For Healthcare Workers

Yesterday, CDC released updated guidance on infection prevention and control recommendations. Healthcare workers are fighting this outbreak on the front lines, and this guidance is intended to provide assistance to healthcare settings that are handling suspected or confirmed cases of COVID-19. This guidance is applicable to all U.S. healthcare settings, but not for non-healthcare settings. There is separate guidance for that. The new guidance on infection control can be found <u>here</u>.

Guidance on Laboratories

The CDC has been actively working to address the need for testing across the country. In addition to public health laboratories, private labs are doing testing. In addition to reviewing the <u>Updated Guidance on Evaluating and Testing Persons for Coronavirus Disease 2019</u>, the CDC recently updated the <u>FAQ website for laboratories</u>, and we encourage you to read through the site to answer preliminary questions, though we stand ready to answer other questions that you may have.

OMB Flexibilities

On March 9, 2020, OMB issued a memo that provides administrative relief for recipients and applicants of Federal financial assistance who are directly impacted by COVID-19. The grant flexibilities include 10 actions that HHS can take to provide short-term administrative and financial management relief, allowing funds to be awarded quicker and giving grantees the ability to focus on their critical response, research, or services. General Preparation Information

On March 9, 2020, the White House Coronavirus Task Force released practical steps that we recommend posting and sharing to keep workplaces, school, home and commercial establishments safe. This information can be found <u>here</u>.

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<u>Press Advisory – President Donald J. Trump Directs FEMA Support Under Emergency Declaration for COVID-19</u> (PRESIDENTIAL PROCLAMATION HERE)

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Today, President Trump <u>declared</u> a nationwide emergency pursuant to Sec. 501(b) of the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act, 42 U.S.C. 5121-5207 (the "Stafford Act"). This increases federal support to the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) in its role as the lead federal agency for the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic response. As a result of the President's decisive, unprecedented action, FEMA is directed to assist state, local, tribal, territorial governments and other eligible entities with the health and safety actions they take on behalf of the American public. Today's declaration does not make direct financial assistance available to individuals.

The emergency declaration does not change measures authorized under other federal statutes and HHS remains the lead federal agency directing the federal response to COVID-19. FEMA actions will be in support of HHS and in coordination with state, tribal and territorial governments. Eligible emergency protective measures taken at the direction or guidance of public health officials in response to this emergency, and not supported by the authorities of another federal agency, will be reimbursed strictly under the FEMA Public Assistance program. FEMA assistance will be provided at a 75 percent Federal cost share. Reimbursable activities typically include emergency protective measures such as the activation of State Emergency Operations Centers, National Guard costs, law enforcement and other measures necessary to protect public health and safety.

<u>Presidential Message to the Congress on Declaring a National Emergency Concerning the Novel Coronavirus</u> <u>Disease (COVID-19) Outbreak (March 13, 2020) (PRESIDENTIAL MESSAGE HERE)</u>

"Pursuant to section 201 of the National Emergencies Act (50 U.S.C. 1621), I hereby report that I have exercised my authority to declare that the outbreak of coronavirus disease (COVID-19) in the United States constitutes a national emergency. This declaration invokes section 1135 of the Social Security Act, 42 U.S.C. 1320b-5, to allow the Secretary of Health and Human Services to exercise the authority under that section to temporarily waive or modify certain requirements of the Medicare, Medicaid, and State Children's Health Insurance programs and of the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act Privacy Rule throughout the duration of the public health emergency declared in response to the COVID-19 outbreak."

Memorandum on Expanding State-Approved Diagnostic Tests (FULL MEMORANDUM HERE)

"By the authority vested in me as President by the Constitution and the laws of the United States of America, it is hereby ordered as follows: It is the policy of the United States to take proactive measures to prepare for and respond to public health threats, including the public health emergency involving Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19), which was declared by the Secretary of Health and Human Services (the "Secretary") on January 31, 2020, pursuant to section 319 of the Public Health Service Act (42 U.S.C. 247d). Our response must include heightened coordination among Federal, State, local, and tribal agencies, and we must offer States the flexibility they need to care for their citizens. In accordance with this principle, the Food and Drug Administration, in coordination with the State of New York, allowed the State flexibility in expediting State-approved COVID-19 testing. Should additional States request flexibility to authorize laboratories within the State to develop and perform tests used to detect COVID-10, the Secretary LA-GOV-20-1240, 20-1242, A-000418



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

- Comprehensive Update on Testing Numbers (March 7,2020 <u>White House Press Briefing by FDA</u> <u>Commissioner Stephen M. Hahn, M.D.</u>):
 - CDC has shipped tests sufficient to test about 75,000 individuals for COVID-19 to Public Health Laboratories. And all Public Health Laboratories that originally received a CDC test have received replacement tests. Laboratories in areas with the highest need for testing based on the outbreak have received additional tests, however, all state public health labs now have tests available to them.
 - As of March 7, the CDC test shipped to public health labs has been able to test more than 3,500 specimens from 1,583 patients.
 - Additionally, as of March 6, more than 1.1 million tests have been shipped to nonpublic health labs.
 - The manufacturer, IDT, is distributing these tests nationwide, although the first batch of tests were shipped to the states of California and Washington based on confirmed clusters in those areas.
 - IDT currently has another 400,000 tests which have undergone and passed final quality control check and we expect those tests to ship to labs on March 9.
 - Another manufacturer's tests will be undergoing a quality control check. That batch of 640,000 tests could ship as early as March 9.
 - IDT and other manufacturers believe they can scale up production so that by the end of next week tests, an additional 4 million tests could be shipped.
 - This does not include the ramp up expected by large commercial or academic labs.

Key Messages

Department of Health shared guidance with providers that recommends COVID-19 testing for any patient with fever, respiratory symptoms and a negative influenza test.

All patients suspected (and undergoing testing) for COVID-19 should remain hospitalized if needed or isolate at home until they receive their test results. If test results are positive, patients should continue to be isolated until cleared by a physician or public health official.

Providers should use commercial labs for any specimens collected with the exception of high-priority patients. The state public health lab will continue to test samples of high-priority patients who meet the following criteria:

Hospitalized patients with a severe respiratory illness with no other known cause.

Suspected outbreak of COVID-19 among associated individuals with recent onset of similar fever and lower respiratory symptoms.

Recent fever and lower respiratory symptoms in a healthcare worker with direct contact to a laboratory-confirmed COVID-19 case.

Suspected COVID-19 in a patient associated with a high-risk exposure setting such as a long-term care facility or a correctional facility.

For initial diagnostic testing for COVID-19, the State of Louisiana now recommends collecting and testing a single nasopharyngeal (NP) swab, or a nose swab.



MAJOR ITEMS OF NOTE

- CMS is still reviewing for approval the emergency MCO contracts and accompanying rate certification; however, LDH received guidance from CMS leadership that allowed us to draw down federal funds in order to make the first payment to MCOs in early February.
- All eight Department of Corrections facilities are in their second month of treating incarcerated persons with hepatitis C.
- The Louisiana Special Education Center/Central Louisiana Supports and Services Center transition was effective as of January 27 and all job descriptions have been affirmed by Civil Service.
- It has recently come to LDH's attention from the Louisiana Department of Insurance that the Social Security Administration may be recouping Medicare Part B premiums from individuals affected by the LaMEDS-Medicare Buy-In issue. LDH is investigating and in the process of scheduling a call with CMS and SSA to discuss the issue.
- LDH's Bureau of Infectious Disease, Bureau of Community Preparedness, Emergency Response, and OPH Laboratory are collobarting with federal partners to prepare an epidemiologic surveillance and response plan related to the 2019 novel coronavirus (2019-nCoV). To date, there are no cases nor persons under investigation in Louisiana. However, public health professionals are preparing our staff and the public health system for a case, if one is identified in the future.
- OAAS, has completed offering the 500 legislatively approved Community Choices Waiver slots to individuals receiving no formal home and community based services. OAAS is currently in the process of assessing and developing comprehensive plans of care for all individuals that have accepted a CCW slot. As of February 3, OAAS has certified 94 individuals in CCW waiver slots. As of February 3, 5,846 individuals on the Waitlist for Community Choices Waiver (meaning 5,846 are waiting with no formal services).

OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY

Hepatitis C

Our most recent data indicates that between July 15, 2019 and December 31, 2019:

- 2,916 persons have accessed treatment for HCV through Medicaid
- 2,780 persons have started treatment for HCV through Medicaid for the first time
- 1,870 persons who have accessed treatment have completed it
- 1,886 persons have accessed treatment because of Medicaid Expansion

Provider training efforts continue and there are now active Hep C Provider Champions cohorts in Regions 1, 2 & 7, with cohorts set to begin in March and April in Regions 4 and 5, respectively.

Within the Department of Corrections, all 8 facilities are in their second month of treating incarcerated persons with hepatitis C. In addition, integrated hepatitis C screening recently concluded at Louisiana Correctional Institute for Women and Hunt Correctional Center.

Multiple evaluation efforts are underway in partnership with LSUHSD, Johns Hopkins University and economists at MIT and Boston University. These evaluations will allow LDH to quantify the improvements in health outcomes and the fiscal benefit of this elimination effort.

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Taking Aim at Cancer in Louisiana (TACL)

TACL's Board elected Greg Sonnenfeld of Ochsner LSU Health Shreveport as Chairperson during the annual meeting in January. Board members discussed how to continue collaborating with the Department of Health after Dr. Gee's departure and defining a role for Dr. Gee's continued participation. The United Health Foundation grant that established TACL officially ended on January 31. TACL's Leadership submitted the final report demonstrating TACL's successes and plans for sustainability going forward.

Community Partnership Program

The Office of Community Partnerships and Health Equity (OCPHE) is running full steam ahead with the operationalization of agency-wide health equity protocols and practices. Internally, meetings with all LDH Office/Program/Bureau leads have been completed and training preparations are underway for all staffers. Trainings will focus on the plan's logistics and themes; cultural competency; social determinants of health; and demystifying the "isms" (racism, sexism, etc), which silo the work and service delivery of LDH.

Externally, OCPHE is proud to be partnering with stakeholders in the application of a technical assistance grant from Robert Wood Johnson Foundation. This partnership supports the efforts of the second phase of the Health Equity plan, which includes engaging stakeholders and building a strong community advisory board.

OCPHE has also been supporting the Denka - St. James, efforts - ensuring proper community engagement.

Finally, OCPHE is also collaborating with the Louisiana Center for Health Equity in planning the 2020 Health Summit: Advancing Health Equity for Children and Families.

Louisiana Special Education Center

LSEC/ CLSSC transition was effective as of January 27 and all job descriptions have been affirmed by Civil Service. Position transfers from LSEC to CLSSC are complete and all staff are in place with exception of normal vacancies. On January 7, a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) signed by LDH representatives and given to DOE for signing on their end. Work continues with Transition team relative to Policy/Procedure, Quality Initiatives and Name Change on legal and public documents. Finally, the new license is in effective as of this report.

MEDICAID

Medicaid Managed Care RFP

LDH remains under a stay, issued by OSP, and has stopped all actions associated with the award of the new contracts pending the outcome of the protests at the administrative level. LDH received approval from OSP to advance to emergency contracts with the current (5) MCOs effective January 1 to avoid any breaks in service. The contracts have been executed and OSP has approved the contracts. However, Medicaid is still awaiting approval from CMS, which is the final approval step. CMS is still reviewing for approval the contracts and accompanying rate certification; however, LDH received guidance from CMS leadership that allowed us to draw down federal funds in order to make the first payment to MCOs in early February. Additionally, the Chief Procurement Officer rendered a decision on the protest filed by the two plans that were not selected for an award that suggested the procurement be cancelled. LDH and the four MCOs selected for an award filed appeals to the Commissioner of Administration requesting an overturn of the Chief Procurement Officer's decision. The appeal is pending with the Commissioner.

LaMEDS Update

Wage Checks

In January, LDH presented policy options to the Governor's Office for tweaking the wage verification process to reduce churn while continuing to enhance program integrity. As a result of these discussions, Medicaid will (1) enhance its data matching process starting in February so that the LWC data match used for the quarterly wage checks and the LWC wage interface in LaMEDS used at application and renewal both key only on the social security number data element, and (2) starting in May conduct wage verifications quarterly using the prior 12 months of wage data for eligibility determination on income. We believe "evening out" small increases in income by averaging monthly income over twelve months rather than three would substantially reduce churn.

Medicare Buy-In

Medicaid continues to investigate LaMEDS defects related to the Medicare Buy-In program (which LDH reviewed with Matthew Block and the Commissioner in January). 24,000 members who were identified as still enrolled in Medicare Buy-in after they were determined ineligible and sent a closure notice. 21,000 were corrected with CMS and removed from the program with a closure effective date of November 30, 2019, and sent a letter notifying them that their Medicare premium will now be their responsibility. 2,900 cases are still being reviewed because we have no proof of a closure notice being sent. If proof of closure isn't found, we will send these individuals a closure notice and close them in February. It has recently come to LDH's attention from LDI that SSA may be recouping Medicare Part B premiums from individuals affected by this issue and is investigating the issue. We are in the process of scheduling a call with CMS and SSA to discuss the issue.

Nursing Home Payments

Medicaid continues to address billing and payment concerns raised by individual nursing homes and the Louisiana Nursing Home Association (LNHA) resulting from LaMEDS. Medicaid has re-prioritized resources to focus on reviewing and working outstanding long-term care (LTC) denied claims as part of an overall effort to return millions of dollars to LTC/nursing home providers resulting from system/worker errors that have backlogged over time. Medicaid is also working closely with Mark Berger/LNHA to communicate new LaMEDS defects that affect his constituents and support him with the appropriate communications to members and providers.

Dental MCO Procurement

The dental program is operating under an emergency contract with MCNA for one year, through June 30, 2020, to ensure continuation of services while Medicaid works through the Dental RFP process to secure new contract(s). Medicaid released the RFP/solicitation on June 6, with responses due August 6. LDH received three proposals and the evaluation team has finalized its scoring and made a recommendation on awards. The evaluation documents were sent to OSP for review and concurrence of the award recommendation, which is still pending. Medicaid anticipates negotiating contract(s) upon receipt of concurrence from OSP; however, the continued delay from OSP with concurring in the award recommendation and any protest to the award notice has jeopardized Medicaid's ability to start operations on July 1, 2020 under the new contracts. Medicaid's deadline to begin preparations for open enrollment in order to have a July 1, 2020 contract start date has passed. We have since developed scenarios for starting the contract and the subsequent open enrollment period based upon when OSP concurs and the protest period ends.

Medicaid Community Engagement Pilot

Medicaid continues to compile a report of the pilot results and findings to date, along with recommendations for broader statewide application. Medicaid, the LDH Policy Director, the Office of Public Health, and Governor's Office are collaborating to discuss ideas for a potential second pilot effort in the Lafayette region in coordination with existing Community HealthWays pilot efforts.

Medicaid Leadership Hiring Status

At the direction of the administration, Medicaid has paused efforts to recruit and hire for the Medicaid Director and Chief Operating Officer positions.

OFFICE OF ADULT AND AGING SERVICES

Waitlist Reduction Project

As of February 7, Office of Aging and Adult Service (OAAS) has completed 1,018 in-home assessments for Long-Term Personal Care Services (LT-PCS), 555 individuals have been approved to begin receiving LT-PCS services (meaning 555 individuals now have in home support), 311 individuals were denied services for not meeting functional program eligibility, and 514 individuals have declined services.

OAAS, has completed offering the 500 legislatively approved Community Choices Waiver slots to individuals receiving no formal home and community based services. OAAS is currently in the process of assessing and developing comprehensive plans of care for all individuals that have accepted a CCW slot. As of February 3, OAAS has certified 94 individuals in CCW waiver slots.

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OFFICE OF BEHAVIORAL HEALTH

HOPE Council Report

HOPE Council End of Year Report Finalized, approved by the HOPE Advisory Council and LDH and has been submitted to the Governor's Drug Policy Board, Legislature, etc.

High in Plain Sight Training

The OBH Prevention Team participated in the "HIGH IN PLAIN SIGHT" Training with Officer Jermaine Galloway on Friday, January 17. Over 200 individuals were in attendance with representatives to include law enforcement, educators, parents, prevention providers, coalition members, and others who have an interest in preventing youth and adult substance abuse and learning more about the drug culture.

OFFICE OF CITIZENS WITH DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITIES

Outreach Program

OCDD is in the process of developing an Outreach Team. Purpose of the Outreach Team is to expand OCDD's presence and reach in the State of Louisiana by developing a targeted communication strategy that relies on the creation/leveraging of resource material such as training, educational and awareness modules, videos, and documents. The team will also be responsible for the development of an outward facing OCDD newsletter and a Bi-annual stakeholder summit.

OFFICE OF PUBLIC HEALTH

Bureau of Family Health

OPH-BFH Data Accomplishments

OPH-Bureau of Family Health's Data to Action Team has published a new data brief, Louisiana Fathers: An Analysis of the Fathers of Children Born in Louisiana from 2013-2018. This brief analyzes the paternal information on Louisiana birth certificates and is the first brief looking at the data we collect about Louisiana Fathers.

The Louisiana Pregnancy Risk Assessment Monitoring System (PRAMS) has been participating in a supplemental data collection study around opioids. Opioid Supplement data from the 5-month 2019 data collection period are now available for people to request (using the data request form). The PRAMS team is also planning to release a data brief of an analysis of this mini-dataset. The 2017 PRAMS Surveillance Report has also been published and is available online with key findings about Louisiana mothers' experiences before, during, and after pregnancy.

Bureau of Infectious Disease

Infectious Disease/Epidemiology

IDEpi has initiated an epidemiologic surveillance and response plan related to the 2019 novel coronavirus (2019nCoV) that originated in Wuhan, China in December 2019. IDEpi has worked with the Bureau of Community Preparedness to distribute important health alerts to healthcare providers throughout Louisiana in order to rapidly detect any suspect cases of 2019-nCoV. IDEpi's 24/7 hotline is currently addressing approximately 50 inquiries per day from providers requesting guidance with patient evaluation. IDEpi has also provided infection control guidance to healthcare facilities so that further spread of illness within the healthcare facility can be prevented if a case is detected. Plans and resources are in place to track patients under investigation as well as confirmed cases and to monitor contacts as necessary. In accordance with CDC guidance that became effective February 3, IDEpi has begun receiving notifications of travelers returning to Louisiana that have been in mainland China within 14 days of their return (this does not include Hubei province- there are stricter restrictions for these travelers and they will be quarantined out of state). IDEpi provides prevention and control guidance to all returning travelers and supervises daily self-monitoring for fever and respiratory symptoms for 14 days following their return. If symptoms develop, OPH will coordinate with healthcare providers/facilities to facilitate laboratory testing and ensure infection control measures are in place to prevent disease transmission.

As of February 11 Louisiana has no patients under investigation or confirmed cases of 2019-nCoV.

Immunization Program

Health Heroes is a private company providing immunizations in the school setting. Louisiana Immunization Program staff heard about this vendor on June 13, 2019. OPH Leadership approved a pilot project for one parish this flu season on July 1, 2019. Flu vaccinations for Caddo parish were completed within 17 weeks from the initial meeting. This included identifying a medical director, securing a site for vaccine storage, obtaining school board agreement, coordinating with schools for parental/guardian permission for vaccination. This public private partnership was so successful, additional parishes were invited to participate. 6,621 flu vaccines were given to students at 244 schools in 5 parishes at no cost to their families, no cost to the schools and at no cost to the State.

Bureau of Community Preparedness

OPH Bureau of Community Preparedness (BCP) is working proactively to protect the state of Louisiana and prevent sustained spread of the 2019 novel coronavirus (2019–nCoV). To date, there are no cases nor persons under investigation in Louisiana. However, public health professionals are preparing our staff and the public health system for a case, if one is identified in the future. BCP is collecting and sharing information from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and World Health Organization with local, regional, and state partners including primary care providers, hospitals, and EMS. BCP has disseminated information via the Health Alert Network to health care providers around the state with current recommendations for screening and testing for 2019–nCoV, as well as to EMS providers regarding proper protection procedures. BCP is participating in and holding frequent calls with staff to remain apprised of the latest updates. BCP is sharing messages and guidance with partners and the public as it becomes available. Additionally, BCP has established a toll free hotline for the public to ask general questions regarding 2019–nCoV. This line is manned from 8:00 – 4:30 pm Monday through Friday.

OPH Laboratory

The lab is gearing up for Coronavirus testing for the 2019-nCoV epidemic. CDC sent a kit for testing. SOP was written and validation of the method will begin shortly.

The Environmental Lab is exploring the possibility of locating a water testing laboratory in Alexandria. Possible locations have been studied including space at the Alexandria Pulbic Health Unit as well as several vacant locations for possible leasing. Work has begun to obtain contract workers for this lab.

STATE HEALTH OFFICER, CHIEF ENGINEER, & EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS

Drinking Water Program

Act 263 - Act 263 of 2017 Regular Legislative Session, tasked LDH to evaluate the issues and conditions of drinking water treatment and distribution through the evaluation of sanitary survey results for each water utility system by 2020. LDH was tasked to submit interim progress reports yearly until final report submission. The ultimate goal is to develop recommendations collaboratively with stakeholders, technical experts, water utility system owners, operators, community members and legislators from areas with known public water quality

issues. On February 7, the 2019 Legislative Report was formally submitted to the Senate and House Health and Welfare Committees. The submission reflects the final report of a three year project.

Water Infrastructure Improvements for the Nation Act (WIIN) Grant: This grant provides non-competitive federal funds to states to conduct voluntary lead testing in schools and child care programs. On February 4, EPA issued the grant award to the Drinking Water Program. The program will begin the process of notifying daycares and schools of the testing available. On February 10, EHS issued notices to approximately 1600 child care facilities providing information on the WIIN Grant program. The electronic notices are being followed up with printed documents for multiple methods of awareness.

St. Joseph Water System - Environmental Health Services (EHS) conducted bi-weekly conference calls for 8 months with the St. Joseph Water System operator, Fiscal Administrator, mayor and other critical stakeholders to ensure visibility of the operational changes attempted at the plant. The system remains out of compliance with the AO.

Environmental Exposures

On February 10, LDH conducted internal huddle on Denka for status report. Status: EPA has not yet issued grant funds – but intends to. LSU has submitted several invoices which LDH will pay for invoices while waiting for grant funds. Dr. Joseph Kanter, Assistant State Health Officer, was identified as LDH Project Lead going forward.

Emergency Preparedness

Readiness for ESF8 response is highly contingent upon contracts. Surge contracts are critical as they provide medical personnel to assist in shelters, in specialized emergency operations centers such as the EMS Tactical Operations Center (TOC), at Transportation Triage centers, and other specific operations. Renewal of surge ambulances are pending finalization with venders. The Request for Proposals (RFP) which solicits paramedic support for specific operations is currently in review at DOA. Delays in review were experienced and were attributed to the Cyber-attack in November 2019.

On January 15-16, a local, state and federal Coordination Workshop was conducted on the Pre-Storm Medical Institution Evacuation Plan (MIEP). The primary intent was to prepare Lakefront Airport site for Hurricane Season in the event a pre-storm evacuation of multiple hospitals was required. The objectives included: diagraming the Workflow process of Patient movement; determine system interface between At-Risk Registry (state), TRACES (DOD), and the Federal Patient Movement Coordination Group (PMCG). Attendees included representatives from HHS, VA, FEMA, AMR, DOD, TRACES, TRANSCOM, as well as local hospital representatives and the ESF8 Network.

On February 6, LDH participated in GOHSEP's Statewide Exercise Master Scenario of Events List (MSEL) Sync Meeting was conducted with all participating Emergency Support Function Agencies to synchronize the various missions and injects that will take place during the 2020 Statewide Exercise.

Emergency Response

Weekly conference calls are being conducted with OPH to monitor changes in policy, prevention, and response for 2019 Novel Coronavirus. On Feb 5, the Governor requested a meeting with LDH and GOHSEP on 2019 n-CoV. Dr. Billioux provided a briefing on the background, current status, known/unknowns about the novel virus. As of February 5 there were no PUIs in Louisiana. In preparation for the Governor's meeting with DHHS in DC, he requested a 1 pager of requests from DHHS. A 1 pager was submitted covering: 1) timely communication on travelers; 2) clear guidance on when to take people out of isolation; 3) lab testing/related issues; and 4) that DHHS work with vendors to increase production of PPE and medical supplies to meet real and anticipated needs. There was some discussion of when to convene UCG. Current thought was that UCG will be convened once we see a PUI. In the interim, Gov Office PIO will be reaching out to GOHSEP PIO and LDH PIO.

On January 10, two Chempack Buffer Packs were accessed by Region 2 after Hospital stocks of pralidoxime [2-PAM, (2-pyridine aldoxime methyl chloride)] were exhausted. A buffer pack from Region 4 was accessed to provide additional antidote support for the same poisoned patient.

On January 11 - 14 severe storms impacted multiple parishes particularly in Region 7 area. Medical infrastructure remained intact; but with some reports of intermittent and short-term power outages. There were four (4) storm-related deaths (1 Caddo, 3 Bossier) confirmed by OPH Vital Records and respective coroners.

On February 4, the Louisiana Office of Public Health (OPH) detected mumps in several students at LSU Baton Rouge. OPH requested healthcare providers in the Baton Rouge area and other schools of higher learning to be alert for mumps. Hospitals in the Region 2 area were notified by ESF8 Network. By February 11, there were 11 positive cases, 8 negative and 6 pending results. LSU established a Point of Distribution (POD) to distribute vaccines. Approximately 60 vaccination were provided at the POD in addition to the 50 provided at the School Health Clinic.

On February 5, the Office of Public Health (OPH) saw a large surge of cases of Norovirus in Region 5. Cases have been from Calcasieu parish and Vernon Parish, but could involve other areas. ESF8 Network sent out notices to Region 5 hospitals and Region 6 hospitals. OPH/EPI have been working with the at-risk regions to conduct epidemiological investigation.

MESSAGE TO STATE EMPLOYEES MARCH 2, 2020 DRAFT

As you have undoubtedly seen in media reports, there have been confirmed cases of COVID-19, commonly called coronavirus, in several states, with six deaths in the United States. I wanted to take a moment to update state employees on the situation in Louisiana and on the steps you can take to prevent the spread of illness.

Though we do not currently have a confirmed case of COVID-19 in Louisiana, it is important to be prepared, which is what we have been doing since the outbreak in mainland China. Already in Louisiana, the Department of Health has been communicating on a very regular basis with health providers and doctors to proactively share information about symptoms and also guidance about when someone needs to be tested. We have the capability to test for coronavirus at the Office of Public Health's State Laboratory and we will be transparent with the public if we have a confirmed case in Louisiana, which we currently do not.

The same actions you take to prevent the spread of flu put you in a good position for any respiratory illness, including COVID-19: cover your cough, wash your hands often and well, and stay home when you're sick.

If you have recently traveled to China, South Korea, Iran, Italy or Japan within the previous 14 days and experience fever, cough or another kind of illness, contact your health care provider as soon as possible and tell them your symptoms and about your recent travel.

In addition, it is still flu season and your chances of getting the flu are higher than of getting coronavirus. It is still a good idea to get a flu shot if you have not already done so or to take a flu antiviral if it is prescribed.

Yesterday we held the first Unified Command Group meeting about coronavirus to ensure our state agencies are coordinating and communicating effectively across departments about this illness. In addition, we have created a COVID-19 Task Force to lead Louisiana's planning for different scenarios relating to the spread of coronavirus. It will offer guidance to state agencies, businesses and organizations.

As an initial step, the COVID-19 Task Force is recommending that all state agencies review and update their Continuity of Operations Plans (COOP) that were developed statewide in 2012 under GOHSEP direction to take coronavirus into account.

Thank you for all of your hard work on behalf of the people of Louisiana. Together, we will work to keep the people of Louisiana healthy and to prevent the spread of illness in our state.

ICYMI - Our Coronavirus Response Is Protecting Americans

USA Today By Secretary of State Mike Pompeo and HHS Secretary Alex Azar February 11, 2020 Link to op-ed here.

The first duty of the federal government is to keep our citizens safe. Since the United States first became aware on Dec. 30 of what has become known as the novel coronavirus, America's public health officials have closely monitored the situation, worked to understand the virus and taken steps to limit Americans' exposure to it.

Our task force is ensuring that our whole of government, layered, public health plan has the resources necessary to protect Americans. We've treated the sick, and traced back their travel history and contacts to minimize the spread of the virus. We've worked swiftly to screen and safely receive American travelers returning from China, and bar foreign travelers who have recently visited the epicenter of the outbreak.

Consistent with the World Health Organization International Health Regulations, our travel restrictions were intentionally devised to complement the Chinese government's policy of isolating approximately 50 million of its own citizens in Hubei province. Other nations, such as Italy and South Korea, have taken similar measures.

Our efforts in China

Thus far, the United States has only had 12 confirmed cases of the virus. We were saddened to hear last week that one American, a 60-year-old woman in Wuhan, China, has died. But we're undeterred in our vigilance to protect our people. And we're mobilizing resources around the world to help other nations fight the disease, too. This is American altruism at its finest.

Let's start with our efforts focused on the country where the virus first appeared — China. In the words of President Donald Trump, "We're offering them tremendous help." During the first week of January, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention made an offer of assistance in order to understand the disease and help bolster response efforts.

The Department of Health and Human Services subsequently provided to the WHO a list of world-class medical professionals ready to deploy their skills in China and learn from China's efforts to combat this new coronavirus. In the last week of January, Secretary Azar personally extended an offer of help to Health Minister Ma Xiaowei; Secretary Pompeo did the same with Chinese State Councilor Yang Jiechi. We hope the mission will commence immediately, whether bilaterally or under the auspices of the WHO.

We've also facilitated the delivery of vast amounts of medical supplies to the Chinese people. Just last week, the State Department helped transport 17.8 tons of relief supplies to Hubei. And more assistance will continue to be offered — the United States is prepared to spend up to \$100 million in existing State and U.S. Agency for International Development funds to assist China and other impacted countries to contain and combat the virus.

While State managed the logistics, the donations themselves were provided by Samaritan's Purse, Boeing, Intermountain Healthcare and The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, and coordinated by a nongovernmental organization called Project HOPE Time and again, when LA-GOV-20-1240, 20-1241, 20-1242-A-000456

diseases and disasters strike, the American people have stepped up to help citizens of other countries without being asked. Our robust charitable giving and enthusiastic civil society groups are channeling the American people's concern for their fellow man.

Cooperation with other nations

Then there are America's actions to help the citizens of other countries, beyond China. CDC staff based in more than 60 countries are working closely with ministries of health and other health partners, often in conjunction with their colleagues at the State Department and other federal agencies.

For instance, the United States has made coronavirus test kits available to 191 qualified laboratories around the world; so far, labs from 36 countries have put in orders. We've deployed staff to train health professionals in 15 hospitals in Vietnam. In Kenya, health experts at the U.S. Embassy in Nairobi, as part of our Infectious Diseases Task Force, engaged the government early on to recommend best practices in airport screening and public health.

Our quick and effective reaction abroad is facilitated by partnerships that America has carefully nurtured over decades — long before the latest outbreak.

We believe our actions will slow the transmission of the virus to and within the United States and other countries, solidify our ties of friendship with our allies and partners, and help save lives by giving us more time to refine preparedness measures and better understand the virus.

We all hope that our concerted efforts will control the virus and cause it to subside. But the world doesn't need to wait for that day to see how America remains a force for good throughout the globe.

Health officials confirms two new presumptive positive COVID-19 cases in Louisiana as state increases testing for the virus

BATON ROUGE, La. – The Louisiana Department of Health reported two new presumptive positive cases of COVID-19, commonly referred to as coronavirus, both residents of and hospitalized in Orleans Parish. At this time, there are three known cases of the illness in the state, all in Orleans Parish.

Gov. Edwards said, "Currently, we have three presumptive positive cases of coronavirus in Louisiana, all in the New Orleans area. While we investigate these cases, we cannot disclose any additional information about these patients at this time.

The presumptive positive tests will be sent to the CDC for final confirmation of COVID-19. Louisiana will move forward as if the tests are actual positives and take actions to contain the illness and assess the risk of spread.

Additional tests will be administered to determine if more people have been infected after the Department's epidemiology team performs an investigation of close contacts.

"At this point in our investigation we believe the first presumptive positive announced yesterday is not travel-related and was community acquired," said Dr. Alex Billioux, Assistant Secretary of the Office of Public Health.

LOUISIANA RAMPS UP TESTING

This comes as the state has increased testing for the virus.

In the four days since receiving more test kits from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the Louisiana Department of Health has tested more than four times as many people for the virus.

With 35 tests of Persons Under Investigation (PUI) now completed, only three have been confirmed presumptive positive in Louisiana. This compares to five completed tests as of Friday, March 6.

Health officials expected that increased testing for COVID-19 would lead to confirmation of a case in the state. The Department has updated its COVID-19 website to include this new information about testing and will update it daily. The website is <u>www.ldh.la.gov/coronavirus</u>.

Gov. John Bel Edwards said Louisiana is following the CDC's guidance and testing three groups of people – those who have traveled to certain areas and have symptoms, those who have had close contact with someone confirmed to have COVID-19 and have symptoms, and people with an unexplained acute respiratory illness.

"The virus has been confirmed in our neighboring states. Since people travel to Louisiana from other states where cases have been confirmed, and because people travel from other countries where there are cases, it was just a matter of time before we had our first case here," said Gov. Edwards.

The recent testing by the state laboratory run by LDH's Office of Public Health include samples from people who went to their doctor or to a hospital and had symptoms consistent with COVID-19, cough, headache, or lower respiratory illness. Some patients had recently traveled to a geographic area with known COVID-19 activity, while others did not have such a travel history.

In other instances, the Office of Public Health is using the tests for surveillance purposes. This is done using existing disease surveillance infrastructure that includes several hospitals and clinics throughout Louisiana. For COVID-19 surveillance, when patients are treated for respiratory illnesses, but are not diagnosed with influenza, swabbed samples are sent to the State public health lab where the COVID-19 test is done. Following CDC guidance, a sampling of cases from each site are sent the lab. This is a proven and effective system for the early detection of diseases, allowing health officials to take the appropriate next steps.

For all people who have symptoms and who are being tested, they and their healthcare provider are being advised on precautions to take to prevent spreading the illness to others. Precautions include self-isolation at home or in an isolation room at the hospital.

As of today, some commercial labs are equipped to conduct COVID-19 testing. With these private labs now ready to test, healthcare providers will start sending their samples to those labs.

Positive tests will then be sent to the State public health lab for verification. Appropriate treatment and precautions will immediately be put in place for any positive commercial test before that test is confirmed by the State lab, and the public will be notified.

ADVICE FOR THE PUBLIC

State officials encourage Louisianans to take the following proactive steps to protect the health of themselves and those around them:

- Cover your cough.
- Stay home if you are sick.
- Wash your hands frequently and thoroughly with soap and water, or with a hand sanitizer containing at least 60% alcohol if soap and water are not available.
- Disinfect frequently touched surfaces.
- Avoiding close contact (within six feet) with those who are sick.

Symptoms can include fever, cough and shortness of breath or difficulty breathing. CDC believes at this time that symptoms of COVID-19 may appear in as few as two days or as long as 14 days after exposure.

Subject: Policies regarding access to the Capitol Building and the legislative areas

On behalf of the Senate President and House Speaker, this is to advise that as of Monday, March 16, the following procedures will be in force at the State Capitol Building on each day, whether or not the legislature is in session:

(1) Certain doors to the building will be disabled to enter and will only be available to exit the building. This includes the doors at the bottom of the external stairs with direct access to the basement in the front (south) of the building and the door at the bottom of the stair with direct access to the Senate basement on the southwest side of the building. (The door with direct access to the Senate basement on the northwest side of the building will remain available.)

(2) At each entrance will be an employee of the State Fire Marshal's office to forehead test the temperature of everyone seeking entry into the building.

(3) All prospective entrants are encouraged to be prepared for those screening measures. Those planning to enter the capitol should perform a self-screening in anticipation of their entrance. This self-screening should include taking your temperature at home and asking yourself the questions below. If you answer, "yes," to any of the questions, your access to the building may be restricted.

Have I had any recent foreign travel? If yes, where?

Have I experienced fever and symptoms of lower respiratory illness (e.g., cough and/or shortness of breath) in the last 14 days?

Have I been in the vicinity of a person with possible COVID-19 infection?

Has a family member or close contact been in the vicinity of a person with possible COVID-19 infection? Have I been in close contact with a laboratory-confirmed COVID-19 patient?

(4) Everyone seeking to enter the State Capitol will be tested for their temperature at the designated entrances.

Those tested with a temperature of less than 100.4 degrees Fahrenheit (38 degrees Centigrade) will be given a colored sticker to wear while in the building (the color will change each day).

Those tested with a temperature of 100.4 degrees Fahrenheit (38 degrees Centigrade) or higher will be denied entry into the building.

Regarding access to the House and Senate chambers when in session:

(1) Floor access, including the areas on each side and rear of each chamber, will be limited to legislators and legislative staff only and press.

(2) The balcony in each chamber will be available for the public, lobbyists, state officials and employees, and family members of legislators. Seating in the balcony will be limited to every other seat so that proper distance can be had between individuals.

Regarding access to the House and Senate committee rooms:

During meetings, seating will be limited to every other chair in the audience. If necessary and available, a meeting with an overflow may be streamed in another committee room.

The observation deck will be closed until April 9.

The House dining hall (cafeteria) will continue service.

- 7:30/8AM Daily SITREP is circulated
- Going forward all updates on case count will be shared on our website two times per day, at 9AM and 4:30PM. Information that will be shared:
 - Total # PUI tests
 - # deaths (with location)
 - # confirmed (with location)
 - # presumptive positive (with location)
 - # negative
 - Additional updates on presumptive positive/confirmed cases
- LDH/GO will release a press statement only when there are major developments, i.e., in the case of a confirmed cluster or death. In the case of death, there will also be a press conference.
- LDH will work with GO on notifying parish presidents on a case-by-case basis for now.

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



I can make either of those windows work to touch base on a call, but I will defer to Christina with our Governor's Office comms for her availability—such as it is these days!

This is an evolving situation, and the information below continues to be updated.

(The last update was March 10, 2020 at 11:00 pm)

What are coronaviruses?

Coronaviruses are a large family of viruses, some causing illness in people and others that circulate among animals, including camels, cats and bats. Rarely, animal coronaviruses can evolve and infect people and then spread between people such as has been seen with recent outbreaks of MERS and SARS.

Are there any confirmed cases in Louisiana?

As of 3/10/20, there are six presumptive positive cases in Louisiana, all from the greater New Orleans area.

What is the current situation?

While the CDC now expects community spread in some parts of the United States, the immediate threat to the U.S. remains low. We are not seeing the same level of spread other countries are seeing. That said, it is important to be prepared. The Louisiana Department of Health has been preparing for COVID-19 since the outbreak in mainland China.

Additionally, the Office of Public Health has activated its Emergency Operations Center and has started using public health measures as part of an aggressive public health response strategy. This is the same strategy being done at the national level under the guidance of the CDC, and in all other states and the District of Columbia.

The Office of Public Health has developed guidance for clinicians for testing and treatment of COVID-19, as well as developed guidance for home care of patients with coronavirus. This guidance is given to all health care providers via our Health Alert Network.

What is Louisiana's testing capability?

Louisiana currently has the capacity for several hundred tests. Currently, these tests are coming to the Office of Public Health from provider referrals, and are being accepted based on Centers for Disease Control and Prevention guidelines. Commercial testing is now also available, and any private lab tests that come back positive will be verified at the OPH lab in Baton Rouge and confirmed by the CDC lab in Atlanta. Health care providers can call the Office of Public Health Division's Infectious Disease Epidemiology Program (IDEpi) 24-7 hotline with further questions about testing.

What is the total number of tests for COVID-19 of Persons Under Investigation (PUI)? What percentage have been positive?

As of March 10, 2020, we have completed 43 tests, six of which have turned out positive. We learned about our first presumptive positive test on March 9. We are awaiting testing from the CDC to confirm each result.



What are the symptoms of COVID-19?

For confirmed coronavirus infections, reported illnesses have ranged from infected people with little to no symptoms (similar to the common cold) to people being severely ill and dying. Symptoms can include:

- Fever
- Cough
- Shortness of breath/difficulty breathing

Is there a vaccine for COVID-19?

No. There is no specific antiviral treatment recommended for this infection. People infected with COVID-19 receive supportive care to help relieve symptoms.

How does COVID-19 spread?

Health experts are still learning the details about how this new coronavirus spreads. Other coronaviruses spread from an infected person to others through:

- Respiratory droplets produced when coughing and sneezing
- Close personal contact
- Touching an object or surface with the virus on it, then touching your mouth, nose, or eyes

How can I help protect myself?

The best way to prevent infection is to avoid being exposed to this virus. There are simple everyday preventive actions to help prevent the spread of respiratory viruses. These include:

- Avoid close contact with people who are sick.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth with unwashed hands.
- Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. If soap and water are not available, use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer.
- Stay home when you are sick.
- Cover your cough or sneeze with a tissue, then throw the tissue in the trash.
- Clean and disinfect frequently touched objects and surfaces.

Should I be tested for COVID-19?

If you develop a fever and symptoms of respiratory illness, such as cough or shortness of breath, within 14 days after travel from China, Italy, Iran, South Korea and Japan, or you are a health care provider caring for someone with respiratory illness who tests negative for flu or other respiratory illnesses, you should call ahead to a healthcare professional and mention your recent travel or close contact. In addition, someone with a respiratory illness not confirmed to be flu or another respiratory illness should ask their provider about being tested for coronavirus.

If you have had close contact with someone showing these symptoms who has recently traveled from this area, you should call ahead to a healthcare professional and mention your close contact and their recent travel.

How does COVID-19 compare to influenza in terms of symptoms, mortality rate, number of cases, etc.?

Much is unknown about COVID-19 in terms of how easily it spreads, who is most at risk, and how serious is it going to be. From preliminary studies, COVID-19 tends to be more severe in people over age 60, and those that have underlying medical conditions. Those most at risk are those over age 60 who have

underlying medical conditions. It is safe to say, given the limited scientific information we have at this point, that it is at least as severe, if not more serious than the seasonal flu.

What is the protocol in place for responding to a pandemic like Coronavirus/COVID-19?

COVID-19 behaves in many ways similar to influenza. Because of this, the CDC recommends using the Pandemic Influenza Preparedness plan as our model for the response. The Louisiana Department of Health has been working on our Pandemic Preparedness Plan for the last 15 years, and we have been preparing for COVID-19 starting in early January 2020. In early March, the Governor directed the formation of a COVID-19 Task Force with representation from state agencies and federal partners key to preparing for a COVID-19 outbreak. This task force guides updating Louisiana's pandemic flu/COVID-19 response and ensures a continuity of operations and advises the Unified Command Group.

What have you been doing as far as monitoring people who may have been exposed?

Our first priority was to monitor any travelers who returned to Louisiana from visiting China's areas that had the most community spread. As other countries experienced community spread, Louisiana epidemiologists have been in contact with travelers who returned from traveling abroad to high-exposure countries to ask whether they were experiencing symptoms of COVID-19. We touch base with those travelers each day and ask about their symptoms during a 14-day period of observation. We are also ensuring that travelers know the destinations where non-essential travel should be avoided. The countries under a Level 3 Travel Notice are China, Iran, Italy and South Korea.

Will the State identify COVID-19 patients?

Because of patient privacy laws, the Louisiana Department of Health cannot provide any information that might identify patients. This includes name, residence of patient, place of treatment or any other potentially identifying patient information.

What's the next major step in the Department's plan for responding to an outbreak?

Mirroring the federal government's response, we are moving from a 'containment' approach in which we focused on travelers to a 'mitigation' approach in which we anticipate and plan for person-to-person transmission in the community somewhere in the United States. We are focused on state and local government preparedness and are providing support to health care providers, schools, businesses and community members to ensure they are adequately prepared to take action to reduce the spread of COVID-19.

What factors would trigger a government-mandated closure of schools or businesses, etc.?

Where there has been a student in a school with COVID-19, the Office of Public Health would consider steps to close and clean that school. However, this would be triggered first by action from the school. Specifically, the circumstance(s) that would prompt the Office of Public Health to suggest school closures would be first, when it has been confirmed that children within the school are actively transmitting an infection at the school, causing an outbreak and significant disruption. Secondly, we might consider the suggestion if a significant number of students or faculty were out, and normal school activities simply could not continue. In any of these circumstances, we would suggest a thorough school cleaning.



COVID-19 (Coronavirus): FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

What precautions is the State taking to protect our students and school system staff and parent volunteers from possible exposure to the COVID-19?

The Louisiana Office of Public Health (OPH) has been in contact with the Louisiana Department of Education (DOE) in regard to disease control and prevention of COVID-19. OPH has provided guidance from the CDC on infection control best practices such as handwashing, covering of coughs, disinfection of environmental surfaces, and encouraging students and staff to stay home when they are ill. Further guidance has been shared on social distancing, cancellation of classes and school events, as well as discouraging social gatherings among students in the event that there is community (person-to-person) transmission of the disease.

These activities build on relationships and common practices established with the Department of Education during the 2009 H1N1 flu pandemic and the 2015 Ebola response. OPH has offered assistance and advice to both state and local school systems in preparing for and responding to COVID-19 in Louisiana.

What should I do if I have recently traveled?

Anyone who recently traveled to China, South Korea, Iran, Italy, or Japan within the previous 14 days, who experiences fever, cough, or other acute illness should contact a health care provider as soon as possible and mention your recent travel. Please call ahead and inform the health care provider about your travel history.

What are you doing to make sure hospitals are prepared?

LDH has been working with the Louisiana Hospital Association (LHA) and the ESF8 Network to prepare hospitals for an outbreak and ensure they have the proper supplies needed as well as protocols in place for anyone treated who tests positive. We haven't had any indication that hospitals don't have what they need on the supply side.

How does the process for testing for COVID-19 work?

The Office of Public Health operates an advanced laboratory in Baton Rouge that performs many types of tests for infectious diseases, such as for tuberculosis and measles. Our state lab workers are a team of highly trained professionals who are experienced at testing for many kinds of infectious diseases using a variety of different tests. When a test of an infectious disease of any kind is performed at the State Lab, they are on samples that are brought to the lab via a courier.

Is there a cost associated with testing for COVID-19?

The tests that the federal government has provided the Office of Public Health have not been associated with any payments. Commercial tests are covered under Medicaid and Medicare as an essential health benefit. The cost for a test under private health insurance providers may vary.

Are there additional costs for responding to COVID-19 outside of testing?

The Department anticipates hiring additional epidemiologists and lab staffing, increasing call center capacity, increasing lab training and developing educational content under the federal budget appropriations that have been set aside for COVID-19 response.



Is the Louisiana Department of Health concerned about shipping channels such as the Port of New Orleans being affected by COVID-19?

Department officials met with the Coast Guard to discuss potential issues with the COVID-19 virus once it became more clear that the virus was spreading globally. We don't think there will be potential for spreading the virus through shipping channels.

So is it safe to receive a package from any area where COVID-19 has been reported?

Yes. The likelihood of an infected person contaminating commercial goods is low and the risk of catching the virus that causes COVID-19 from a package that has been moved, traveled, and exposed to different conditions and temperature is also low.

Are you in regular contact with the federal government?

Yes. We are in constant contact with the CDC and HHS; we're currently averaging several calls per week just with the CDC. In addition we have standing calls across state health departments and a standing call internally in Louisiana. This is all very important so that we all have the latest data, are on the same page, and can adapt our plans as conditions change.

Should families have a plan if an outbreak occurs?

The best preparation families can do is practice good seasonal flu/cold hygiene: cover your cough, wash your hands (especially after being in public spaces, shaking hands), stay home if you are sick, and get your flu shot! Families should also monitor the <u>CDC COVID-19 website</u> for updated travel advisories before making plans to travel internationally.

Is there a special information phone number for people to call?

Yes, individuals with questions can call our COVID-19 General Information Line at 1-855-523-2652 from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday.

Should I keep my children home from school or avoid going to work?

There are a limited number of schools and workplaces that are closed in the U.S. You should follow guidance from your specific school district and employer about closures. At this time, it is not necessary to keep children home from school or avoid going to work unless told to do so by local officials.

Should I cancel my travel plans?

The CDC is not recommending that travelers cancel all plans except to specific locations where the threat of COVID-19 spread is significantly higher. If you have a trip planned, <u>check the CDC's site</u> for a risk assessment of your destination. If you travel, take the same precautions you would while home to avoid getting sick or spreading germs including washing your hands thoroughly and often and avoiding contact with sick people.

Please see the attached brief and FAQ document regarding the novel coronavirus, COVID-19.

This morning, the Governor held a meeting of the Unified Command Group (UCG) with state agency heads to make sure that every agency is preparing and coordinating with local, state, and federal partners. The Governor is being briefed regularly by LDH and GOHSEP regarding the virus and our preparations. It is important to note that currently, there are no confirmed cases of COVID-19 in Louisiana. The nearest case is in Texas, and this person remains in isolation. While the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) now expects there to be "community spread" in certain regions of the United States, the immediate threat to the United States and Louisiana remains low.

Additionally, LDH has put together online resources for the public at <u>Idh.louisiana.gov/Coronavirus</u>. Members of the public with questions about coronavirus, should contact the Coronavirus General Information Line at 1-855-523-2652 from 8:00 am – 4:30 pm, Monday through Friday. Please encourage your constituents and others to use official sources, like LDH or the CDC, for actual information about the illness. If you hear troubling rumors, please pass them along so we can work with our team to make sure we are communicating effectively and dispelling any mistruths.

The bigger threat to Louisiana remains the flu; we still are experiencing very high levels of that virus. It is not too late to get a flu shot. There are actions we all can take as individuals to be prepared for COVID-19. They are the same actions you take to prevent the spread of flu - cover your cough, wash your hands often and well, and stay home when you're sick.

CDC to Award Over \$560 Million to State & Local Jurisdictions in Support of COVID-19 Response (more here)

The Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) is announcing another upcoming action by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) to provide resources to state and local jurisdictions in support of our nation's response to the coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19). The \$8.3 billion dollar Supplemental passed by Congress included <u>statutory language</u> which prescribed the exact formula for disbursing the money: states will receive 90% of their <u>2019 CDC PHEP grants</u>. This marks the first tranche of funding to states from the \$8.3 billion supplemental. Your state health officers are receiving a letter today from CDC outlining what is needed to receive the funding, essentially they need to submit a spend plan and they will receive guidance on what that spend plan should contain.

White House Coronavirus Task Force Announces Community Mitigation Strategies for Seattle, Santa Clara

The White House Coronavirus Task Force today recommended 30-day mitigation strategies for <u>Seattle-King, Pierce, and</u> <u>Snohomish County, Washington</u>, and <u>Santa Clara County, California</u> due to widespread transmission of coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19). These mitigation activities are designed to address the effects of COVID-19 on areas that are experiencing community spread.

"President Trump has made clear that the Task Force must move decisively to protect the health and safety of the American people," said Vice President Mike Pence. "These recommendations outline a whole-of-community approach to immediately minimize the impacts of coronavirus in these cities and towns. I look forward to the continued partnership between the Task Force and State and local leaders."

Earlier today, Vice President Pence spoke with California Governor Gavin Newsom and Washington Governor Jay Inslee about these community mitigation strategies. The Task Force and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) have worked closely with state and local leaders in California, Washington, and around the Nation to develop these strategies. Additionally, CDC has teams in these areas working with public health partners to respond to the situation on the ground.

Cooperation with communities, businesses, and healthcare organizations is necessary to implement extensive community mitigation activities with the goal of protecting:

- Individuals at risk for severe illness, including persons with underlying health conditions including immune suppression and especially seniors with underlying health conditions;
- The healthcare workforce; and
- Critical infrastructure workforces.

Due to widespread community transmission of COVID-19 in these communities, examples of mitigation strategies for these areas include, but are not limited to:

- Individuals should practice protective measures (e.g., hand washing);
- Schools should conduct regular health checks of students, staff, and visitors;
- Senior living facilities should implement social distancing measures;
- Workplaces should encourage staff to telework and expand sick leave policies;
- Community and faith-based organizations should move gatherings of any size to video-accessible venues or postpone/cancel; and
- Healthcare facilities should implement triage before entering facilities.

In making these recommendations, the Task Force considered guidance from multiple Federal agencies, including technical advice from CDC. These community mitigation strategies are recommended for 30 days, after which local and state public health officials, in coordination with CDC will reassess the individual community situations.

Louisiana's statewide 211 network is now answering calls about COVID-19, also known as the coronavirus. This network is best designed and staffed to handle the large volume of calls from Louisiana residents who are concerned and who have questions about the rapidly spreading virus.

Anyone looking for information about the coronavirus outbreak can simply dial 211 or text the keyword LACOVID to 898-211 for the most current information about the outbreak as it becomes available.

With Louisiana 211 now equipped and trained to answer questions from the public, the Louisiana Department of Health is asking residents to call 211 instead of the current general information line, 855-523-2652.

In addition to being able to call the Louisiana 211 and to sign up for text messaging, residents can get written answers to the most-asked questions by concerned citizens. The website is: www.la211help.org

Over the past week, the call volume to LDH's general information line, that was only available during business hours, has increased from several calls a day to several hundred calls.

Dr. Alex Billioux, assistant secretary for LDH's Office of Public Health, said this change will give citizens the best way to get information any time of the day or night.

"The Louisiana 211 statewide network is established as the public's first and best source to connect callers with critical information about health and human services," Billioux said, "This expertise ensures that citizens can talk to a person who is trained to answer their questions 24 hours a day."

The <u>Louisiana 211 statewide network</u> provides multilingual services as well as information for people who are hearing impaired.

Sarah Berthelot, president and CEO of the Louisiana Association of United Ways, coordinates statewide response efforts with 211 providers throughout Louisiana.

"By working with the Louisiana Department of Health, the 211 network allows residents to get the information they need as quickly as possible. Our robust system of call centers, text message capability and websites gives people access to information that can help them make better decisions and best prepare for this health crisis," Berthelot said.

This week, LDH provided Louisiana 211 with a comprehensive list of questions that have come into the original information telephone line. These include questions about testing for coronavirus, symptoms and treatment and when to access medical help. Answers to all questions were provided by LDH's medical leadership team.

All three are residents of Orleans Parish. Two are hospitalized in Orleans Parish; the third is hospitalized in St. Tammany Parish.

Gov. John Bel Edwards said, "Currently, we have a total of six presumptive positive cases of coronavirus in Louisiana. While we investigate these cases, we cannot disclose any additional information about these patients at this time."

The presumptive positive tests will be sent to the CDC for final confirmation of COVID-19. Louisiana will move forward as if the tests are actual positives and take actions to contain the illness and assess the risk of spread.

Additional tests will be administered to determine if more people have been infected after the Department's epidemiology team performs an investigation of close contacts.

At this time, there are a total of six known cases of the illness in the state. Gov. Edwards announced the state's first presumptive positive case, a Jefferson Parish resident, on Monday, March 9, and two additional presumptive positive cases on Tuesday afternoon, both in Orleans Parish.

"At this point in our investigation we believe the first presumptive positive announced yesterday [Monday] is not travel-related and was community acquired," said Dr. Alex Billioux, Assistant Secretary of the Office of Public Health.

Louisiana ramps up testing

In the five days since receiving more test kits from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, LDH has tested more than seven times as many people for the virus.

Some commercial labs are now equipped to conduct COVID-19 testing. With these private labs ready to test, healthcare providers will start sending their samples to those labs. LDH will be notified of any positive results coming from a commercial lab.

Appropriate treatment and precautions will immediately be put in place for any positive commercial test before that test is confirmed by the State lab, and the public will be notified.

State officials encourage Louisianans to take the following proactive steps to protect the health of themselves and those around them:

- Stay home if you are sick.
- Cover your cough.

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

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

The federal government continues to take aggressive and proactive steps to address the COVID-19 threat as the health and safety of the American people remain a top priority.

Today, President Trump <u>declared</u> a nationwide emergency pursuant to Sec. 501(b) of the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act, 42 U.S.C. 5121-5207 (the "Stafford Act"). This increases federal support to the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) in its role as the lead federal agency for the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic response. As a result of the President's decisive, unprecedented action, FEMA is directed to assist state, local, tribal, territorial governments and other eligible entities with the health and safety actions they take on behalf of the American public. Today's declaration does not make direct financial assistance available to individuals.

The emergency declaration does not change measures authorized under other federal statutes and HHS remains the lead federal agency directing the federal response to COVID-19. FEMA actions will be in support of HHS and in coordination with state, tribal and territorial governments. Eligible emergency protective measures taken at the direction or guidance of public health officials in response to this emergency, and not supported by the authorities of another federal agency, will be reimbursed strictly under the FEMA Public Assistance program. FEMA assistance will be provided at a 75 percent Federal cost share. Reimbursable activities typically include emergency protective measures such as the activation of State Emergency Operations Centers, National Guard costs, law enforcement and other measures necessary to protect public health and safety.

Presidential Message to the Congress on Declaring a National Emergency Concerning the Novel Coronavirus Disease (COVID-19) Outbreak (March 13, 2020) (PRESIDENTIAL MESSAGE HERE) LA-GOV-20-1240, 20-1241, 20-1242-A-000669 "Pursuant to section 201 of the National Emergencies Act (50 U.S.C. 1621), I hereby report that I have exercised my authority to declare that the outbreak of coronavirus disease (COVID-19) in the United States constitutes a national emergency. This declaration invokes section 1135 of the Social Security Act, 42 U.S.C. 1320b–5, to allow the Secretary of Health and Human Services to exercise the authority under that section to temporarily waive or modify certain requirements of the Medicare, Medicaid, and State Children's Health Insurance programs and of the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act Privacy Rule throughout the duration of the public health emergency declared in response to the COVID-19 outbreak."

Memorandum on Expanding State-Approved Diagnostic Tests (FULL MEMORANDUM HERE)

"By the authority vested in me as President by the Constitution and the laws of the United States of America, it is hereby ordered as follows: It is the policy of the United States to take proactive measures to prepare for and respond to public health threats, including the public health emergency involving Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19), which was declared by the Secretary of Health and Human Services (the "Secretary") on January 31, 2020, pursuant to section 319 of the Public Health Service Act (42 U.S.C. 247d). Our response must include heightened coordination among Federal, State, local, and tribal agencies, and we must offer States the flexibility they need to care for their citizens. In accordance with this principle, the Food and Drug Administration, in coordination with the State of New York, allowed the State flexibility in expediting State-approved COVID-19 testing. Should additional States request flexibility to authorize laboratories within the State to develop and perform tests used to detect COVID-19, the Secretary shall take appropriate action, consistent with law, to facilitate the request."



<u>Press Advisory – President Donald J. Trump Directs FEMA Support Under Emergency Declaration for COVID-19</u> (<u>PRESIDENTIAL PROCLAMATION HERE</u>)

The federal government continues to take aggressive and proactive steps to address the COVID-19 threat as the health and safety of the American people remain a top priority.

Today, President Trump <u>declared</u> a nationwide emergency pursuant to Sec. 501(b) of the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act, 42 U.S.C. 5121-5207 (the "Stafford Act"). This increases federal support to the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) in its role as the lead federal agency for the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic response. As a result of the President's decisive, unprecedented action, FEMA is directed to assist state, local, tribal, territorial governments and other eligible entities with the health and safety actions they take on behalf of the American public. Today's declaration does not make direct financial assistance available to individuals.

The emergency declaration does not change measures authorized under other federal statutes and HHS remains the lead federal agency directing the federal response to COVID-19. FEMA actions will be in support of HHS and in coordination with state, tribal and territorial governments. Eligible emergency protective measures taken at the direction or guidance of public health officials in response to this emergency, and not supported by the authorities of another federal agency, will be reimbursed strictly under the FEMA Public Assistance program. FEMA assistance will be provided at a 75 percent Federal cost share. Reimbursable activities typically include emergency protective measures such as the activation of State Emergency Operations Centers, National Guard costs, law enforcement and other measures necessary to protect public health and safety.

Presidential Message to the Congress on Declaring a National Emergency Concerning the Novel Coronavirus

Disease (COVID-19) Outbreak (March 13, 2020) (PRESIDENTIAL MESSAGE HERE)

"Pursuant to section 201 of the National Emergencies Act (50 U.S.C. 1621), I hereby report that I have exercised my authority to declare that the outbreak of coronavirus disease (COVID-19) in the United States constitutes a national emergency. This declaration invokes section 1135 of the Social Security Act, 42 U.S.C. 1320b–5, to allow the Secretary of Health and Human Services to exercise the authority under that section to temporarily waive or modify certain requirements of the Medicare, Medicaid, and State Children's Health Insurance programs and of the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act Privacy Rule throughout the duration of the public health emergency declared in response to the COVID-19 outbreak."


"By the authority vested in me as President by the Constitution and the laws of the United States of America, it is hereby ordered as follows: It is the policy of the United States to take proactive measures to prepare for and respond to public health threats, including the public health emergency involving Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19), which was declared by the Secretary of Health and Human Services (the "Secretary") on January 31, 2020, pursuant to section 319 of the Public Health Service Act (42 U.S.C. 247d). Our response must include heightened coordination among Federal, State, local, and tribal agencies, and we must offer States the flexibility they need to care for their citizens. In accordance with this principle, the Food and Drug Administration, in coordination with the State of New York, allowed the State flexibility in expediting State-approved COVID-19 testing. Should additional States request flexibility to authorize laboratories within the State to develop and perform tests used to detect COVID-19, the Secretary shall take appropriate action, consistent with law, to facilitate the request."





MESSAGE TO STATE EMPLOYEES MARCH 2, 2020 DRAFT

As you have undoubtedly seen in media reports, there have been confirmed cases of COVID-19, commonly called coronavirus, in several states, with six deaths in the United States thus far. I wanted to take a moment to update state employees on the situation in Louisiana and on the steps you can take to prevent the spread of illness.

Though we do **not** currently have a confirmed case of COVID-19 in Louisiana, it is important to be prepared, which is what we have been doing since the outbreak in mainland China. Already in Louisiana, the Department of Health has been communicating on a very regular basis with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention at the federal level as well as health providers, hospitals and doctors to proactively share information about symptoms and also guidance about when someone needs to be tested. We have the capability to test for coronavirus at the Office of Public Health's State Laboratory, and we will be transparent with the public if we have a confirmed case in Louisiana, which we currently do not.

The same actions you take to prevent the spread of flu are also helpful in preventing any respiratory illness, including COVID-19: cover your cough, wash your hands often and well, and stay home when you're sick.

If you have recently traveled to China, South Korea, Iran, Italy or Japan within the previous 14 days and experience fever, cough or another kind of illness, contact your health care provider as soon as possible and tell them your symptoms and about your recent travel.

In addition, it is still flu season and your chances of getting the flu are higher than of getting coronavirus. It is still a good idea to get a flu shot if you have not already done so or to take a flu antiviral if it is prescribed.

Yesterday, we held the first Unified Command Group meeting about coronavirus to ensure our state agencies are coordinating and communicating effectively across all departments about this illness. In addition, we have created a COVID-19 Task Force to lead Louisiana's planning for different scenarios relating to the spread of coronavirus. It will offer guidance to state agencies, local governments, businesses and organizations.

As an initial step, the COVID-19 Task Force is recommending that all state agencies review and update their Continuity of Operations Plans (COOP) that were developed statewide in 2012 under GOHSEP's direction to take coronavirus into account.

As you all have seen in the media, appropriators are trying to get this done rather quickly and the measure is expected to provide as much as \$7 - \$8 billion. The House is looking to vote on the measure this week.

The draft letter is in support of the supplemental and includes language for new federal funding, as well as funding to backfill states for costs already incurred. Again, as we mentioned earlier today, we are not requesting a specific dollar amount but have included a list of overall spending buckets to try and be all-inclusive.

We would like to have as many governors, as possible, sign on to this letter. We are requesting that you let us know if your governor will sign-on to this letter by noon, Wednesday, March 4, 2020. If you have any questions or concerns, please reach out to me.

Gov. John Bel Edwards said, "Currently, we have three presumptive positive cases of coronavirus in Louisiana, all in the New Orleans area. While we investigate these cases, we cannot disclose any additional information about these patients at this time."

The presumptive positive tests will be sent to the CDC for final confirmation of COVID-19. Louisiana will move forward as if the tests are actual positives and take actions to contain the illness and assess the risk of spread.

Additional tests will be administered to determine if more people have been infected after the Department's epidemiology team performs an investigation of close contacts.

At this time, there are three known cases of the illness in the state, all in Orleans Parish. Gov. Edwards announced the state's first presumptive positive case, a Jefferson Parish resident, on Monday, March 9.

"At this point in our investigation we believe the first presumptive positive announced yesterday is not travel-related and was community acquired," said Dr. Alex Billioux, Assistant Secretary of the Office of Public Health.

Louisiana ramps up testing

This comes as the state has increased testing for the virus.

In the five days since receiving more test kits from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, LDH has tested more than seven times as many people for the virus.

With 35 tests of Persons Under Investigation (PUI) now completed, only three have been confirmed presumptive positive in Louisiana. This compares to five completed tests as of Friday, March 6.

Health officials expected that increased testing for COVID-19 would lead to confirmation of additional cases in the state.

LDH is following the CDC's guidance and testing three groups of people – those who have traveled to certain areas and have symptoms, those who have had close contact with someone confirmed to have COVID-19 and have symptoms, and people with an unexplained acute respiratory illness.

The recent testing by the state laboratory run by LDH's Office of Public Health includes samples from people who went to their doctor or to a hospital and had symptoms consistent with COVID-19, cough, headache, or lower respiratory illness. Some patients had recently traveled to a geographic area with known COVID-19 activity, while others did not have such a travel history.

In other instances, OPH is using the tests for surveillance purposes. This is done using existing disease surveillance infrastructure that includes several hospitals and clinics throughout Louisiana. For COVID-19 surveillance, when patients are treated for respiratory illnesses, but are not diagnosed with influenza, swabbed samples are sent to the State public health lab where the COVID-19 test is done. Following CDC guidance, a sampling of cases from each site are sent the lab. This is a proven and effective system for the early detection of diseases, allowing health officials to take the appropriate next steps.

For all people who have symptoms and who are being tested, they and their healthcare provider are being advised on precautions to take to prevent spreading the illness to others. Precautions include self-isolation at home or in an isolation room at the hospital.

As of today, some commercial labs are equipped to conduct COVID-19 testing. With these private labs now ready to test, healthcare providers will start sending their samples to those labs. LDH will be notified of any positive results coming from a commercial lab.

Appropriate treatment and precautions will immediately be put in place for any positive commercial test before that test is confirmed by the State lab, and the public will be notified.

Advice for the public

State officials encourage Louisianans to take the following proactive steps to protect the health of themselves and those around them:

- · Cover your cough.
- Stay home if you are sick.
- Wash your hands frequently and thoroughly with soap and water, or with a hand sanitizer containing at least 60% alcohol if soap and water are not available.
- Disinfect frequently touched surfaces.
- Avoid close contact (within six feet) with those who are sick.

Christina, see our guidance below.

Short answer: Potential school closures and cleanings are in our plans should we need them but in this situation that would not be our recommendation.

More information:

- Where there has been a student in a school with COVID-19 we could certainly look at closing and cleaning, but triggering for that would be someone in the school with COVID-19, not just in the community. The latter doesn't make sense to us because COVID-19 would still be in the community and no closer or farther from the school.
- Specifically, the circumstance(s) that would prompt us to suggest school closures would be first, when we have detected that children within the school are actively transmitting an infection at the school, causing an outbreak and significant disruption. Secondly, we might consider the suggestion if a significant number of students or faculty were out, and normal school activities simply could not continue. In any of these circumstances, we would suggest a thorough school cleaning.
- Dr. Guidry does have authority here re closing the school, but usually it's a partnership in which OPH gives advice and the school official closes the school.





Estimated Influenza Disease Burden, by Season United States, 2010-11 through 2017-18 Influenza Seasons







Box 1. Workplace Interventions

- No handshaking policy
- Promote cough and sneeze etiquette (but focus is on excluding ill staff)
- Videoconferencing as default for meetings
- Defer large meetings
- Enforced sanitisation of hands at entrance

- Lunch at desk rather than in lunch room

Box 3. Household-based Interventions

All Households

- Increase ventilation rates in the home by opening windows or adjusting air conditioning
- Promote cough and sneeze etiquette

Households with ill members (in addition to measures above)

- Ill household members are given own room if possible and only one person cares for them
- The door to the ill persons room is kept closed*
- Wearing simple surgical/dust masks by both infected persons and other family members caring for the case.
- Consider extra protection or alternative accommodation for household members over 65 years or with underlying illness.

Commercial establishments

Box 4. Commercial/entertainment/transport setting Interventions

- Sanitisation of hands at building entrance encouraged
- Tap and pay preferred to limit handling of money.
- Disinfect high touch surfaces regularly
- Avoiding crowding through booking and scheduling, online prepurchasing, limiting attendance numbers.
- Enhance hygiene and screening for illness among food preparation staff and their close contacts.
- Enhance airflow and adjust air conditioning
- Public transport workers/taxi/ride share vehicle windows opened where possible, increased air flow, high-touch surfaces disinfected.



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The Vice President along with White House Coronavirus Response Coordinator Ambassador Deborah Birx, Health and Human Services Secretary Alex Azar, Centers for Disease Control & Prevention Director Bob Redfield, U.S. Northern Command and North American Aerospace Defense Command General Terrence O'Shaunessy, Office of Management and Budget Director Russ Vought, Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services Administrator Seema Verma, National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases Director Anthony Fauci, and Surgeon General Jerome Adams provided a status update on the expansion of testing capabilities, increased access to respirators for health care personnel, and the importance of the supplemental funding bill. Various governors provided an update on State and local actions to respond to and prepare for the Coronavirus, including coordination across various state agencies and local governments. Participants also discussed how elderly individuals and individuals with underlying health conditions can protect themselves using common sense precautions.

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PROTECTING THE HEALTH AND SAFETY OF THE AMERICAN PEOPLE

AZAR: "We're working aggressively across the whole of government to protect the health and safety of the American people and using the time that we have bought through our very aggressive, multilayered approaches of public health to prepare."

AZAR: "This is about protecting America's borders and allowing us the time to continue our proactive preparations."

AZAR: "People who are not U.S. citizens or permanent residents of the United States may not enter the United States if they have been in China in the previous 14 days. Once they've been out of China for that 14-day incubation period, they are welcome as always into the United States."

AZAR: "Americans coming back who have been in China in the previous 14 days, we ask them to both funnel to 11 airport ports of entry where they can be inspected, surveilled, and we ask them voluntarily to isolate themselves at home for 14 days. If they've been in the hot zone, which is an increasingly diminishing number of people who've been in Hubei province in the previous 14 days, we will actually quarantine them for that 14-day period."

IDENTIFYING AND MONITORING CASES

AZAR: "We are proactively planning now to prevent further spread in the U.S., but also to conduct aggressive surveillance, to have an early warning system. Our public health system's the best in the world, and it's working. That system is what identified the 15 cases that we have."

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AZAR: "One of the things that we did – the CDC – within a week of getting the genetic sequencing, developed a test, we had a diagnostic there at CDC. We've now deployed that around the country in over 170 public health labs."

AZAR: "We're taking an important measure that we announced yesterday, which is we are using our flu surveillance network in Seattle, San Francisco, L.A., Chicago and New York, where individuals who present with flu-like, or China coronavirus-like symptoms will be tested not just for flu, but also tested for China coronavirus. That way we have an early warning system."

IMPACT WITHIN THE UNITED STATES

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AZAR: "They should be more worried about flu and regular cold season, in terms of taking precautions like washing their hands, coughing into their arms, and not touching their face."

<u>Press Advisory – President Donald J. Trump Directs FEMA Support Under Emergency Declaration for COVID-19</u> (<u>PRESIDENTIAL PROCLAMATION HERE</u>)

The federal government continues to take aggressive and proactive steps to address the COVID-19 threat as the health and safety of the American people remain a top priority.

Today, President Trump <u>declared</u> a nationwide emergency pursuant to Sec. 501(b) of the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act, 42 U.S.C. 5121-5207 (the "Stafford Act"). This increases federal support to the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) in its role as the lead federal agency for the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic response. As a result of the President's decisive, unprecedented action, FEMA is directed to assist state, local, tribal, territorial governments and other eligible

entities with the health and safety actions they take on behalf of the American public. Today's declaration does not make direct financial assistance available to individuals.

The emergency declaration does not change measures authorized under other federal statutes and HHS remains the lead federal agency directing the federal response to COVID-19. FEMA actions will be in support of HHS and in coordination with state, tribal and territorial governments. Eligible emergency protective measures taken at the direction or guidance of public health officials in response to this emergency, and not supported by the authorities of another federal agency, will be reimbursed strictly under the FEMA Public Assistance program. FEMA assistance will be provided at a 75 percent Federal cost share. Reimbursable activities typically include emergency protective measures such as the activation of State Emergency Operations Centers, National Guard costs, law enforcement and other measures necessary to protect public health and safety.

<u>Presidential Message to the Congress on Declaring a National Emergency Concerning the Novel Coronavirus</u> <u>Disease (COVID-19) Outbreak (March 13, 2020) (PRESIDENTIAL MESSAGE HERE)</u>

"Pursuant to section 201 of the National Emergencies Act (50 U.S.C. 1621), I hereby report that I have exercised my authority to declare that the outbreak of coronavirus disease (COVID-19) in the United States constitutes a national emergency. This declaration invokes section 1135 of the Social Security Act, 42 U.S.C. 1320b–5, to allow the Secretary of Health and Human Services to exercise the authority under that section to temporarily waive or modify certain requirements of the Medicare, Medicaid, and State Children's Health Insurance programs and of the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act Privacy Rule throughout the duration of the public health emergency declared in response to the COVID-19 outbreak."

Memorandum on Expanding State-Approved Diagnostic Tests (FULL MEMORANDUM HERE)

"By the authority vested in me as President by the Constitution and the laws of the United States of America, it is hereby ordered as follows: It is the policy of the United States to take proactive measures to prepare for and respond to public health threats, including the public health emergency involving Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19), which was declared by the Secretary of Health and Human Services (the "Secretary") on January 31, 2020, pursuant to section 319 of the Public Health Service Act (42 U.S.C. 247d). Our response must include heightened coordination among Federal, State, local, and tribal agencies, and we must offer States the flexibility they need to care for their citizens. In accordance with this principle, the Food and Drug Administration, in coordination with the State of New York, allowed the State flexibility in expediting State-approved COVID-19 testing. Should additional States request flexibility to authorize laboratories within the State to develop and perform tests used to detect COVID-19, the Secretary shall take appropriate action, consistent with law, to facilitate the request."



Dear Governor:

Thank you for your continued engagement and partnership with us to address and mitigate the spread of COVID-19.

As you might imagine, a number of HHS divisions are releasing COVID-19-related information on funding and guidance. We thought it would be helpful to batch up information on key issues to keep you up-to-date.

Funding for States to Address COVID-19

Perhaps of keenest interest to you and your health officials is an update on funding for states and communities to address mitigation of COVID-19.

Today, at 1 PM EST HHS will be announcing that more than \$560 million will be made available to the 62 entities which have existing cooperative agreements with the CDC through its Public Health Emergency Program, known as "PHEP."

The \$8.3 billion dollar Supplemental passed by Congress included <u>statutory language</u> which prescribed the exact formula for disbursing the money: states will receive 90% of their <u>2019 CDC PHEP grants</u>. So that you know what your state will receive, we have attached a document identifying the amounts going to states, territories, or cities. This marks the first tranche of funding to states from the \$8.3 billion supplemental. Your state health officers are receiving a letter today from CDC outlining what is needed to receive the funding, essentially they need to submit a spend plan and they will receive guidance on what that spend plan should contain.

Helping Communities Know Mitigation Strategies

Yesterday, CDC released their "Implementation." Essentially, this is a guide for communities describing possible mitigation strategies for communities dealing with transmission at three different levels: (1) None/Minimal, (2) Moderate, or (3) Substantial. Community mitigation strategies, which are non-pharmaceutical interventions, are often the most available interventions to help slow the transmission of COVID-19 in communities. The Mitigation Plans include a set of actions that persons and communities can take to slow the spread of respiratory virus infections. The Community Mitigation Plan can be found <u>here</u>.

Guidance on Infection Control For Healthcare Workers

Yesterday, CDC released updated guidance on infection prevention and control recommendations. Healthcare workers are fighting this outbreak on the front lines, and this guidance is intended to provide assistance to healthcare settings that are handling suspected or confirmed cases of COVID-19. This guidance is applicable to all U.S. healthcare settings, but not for non-healthcare settings. There is separate guidance for that. The new guidance on infection control can be found <u>here</u>.

OMB Flexibilities

On March 9, 2020, OMB issued a memo that provides administrative relief for recipients and applicants of Federal financial assistance who are directly impacted by COVID-19. The grant flexibilities include 10 actions that HHS can take to provide short-term administrative and financial management relief, allowing funds to be awarded quicker and giving grantees the ability to focus on their critical response, research, or services. More information can be found <u>here</u>.

General Preparation Information: On March 9, 2020, the White House Coronavirus Task Force released practical steps that we recommend posting and sharing to keep workplaces, school, home and commercial establishments safe. This information can be found <u>here</u>.

CMS Specific Guidance:

- **CMS Guidance on Masks:** On March 10, 2020, CMS released guidance updating recommendations to expand the type of facemasks healthcare workers can use in situations involving COVID-19. This guidance aligns with the information by CDC regarding personal protective equipment as well. The memo sent to State Survey Agency Directors can be found <u>here</u>.
- CMS FAQs on Suspension of Non-Emergency Survey Inspections: On March 10, 2020, CMS released a frequently asked questions document to further explain the changes in guidance issued on March 4 that suspends all non-emergency survey inspections. This guidance and FAQ will help to enable State Inspectors to address the spread of COVID-19. The FAQ document can be found <u>here</u>.
- **CMS Nursing Home Guidance:** As you know, nursing homes and their residents are vulnerable populations for COVID-19. This week, CMS released updated guidance for infection control and prevention of COVID-19 in Nursing Homes which can be found <u>here</u> (3/9). The Press Release can be found <u>here</u> and all CMS guidance related to COVID-19 can be found <u>here</u>.



Excerpt from On-The-Record Pen and Pad Roundtable by Health and Human Services Secretary Alex Azar and Other Senior Administration Officials on Resources Available to Combat the Coronavirus (*February 28, 2020*)

SECRETARY AZAR: Well, thanks for coming, everybody. In case you didn't hear from us enough the other night, wanted to give you an update on the budget issues, in particular.

As the President has repeatedly emphasized, there is no higher priority for us than protecting the health and safety of Americans. Thanks to the President's aggressive containment efforts, at this time, the risk from COVID-19 to the American public is low. But as we have all repeatedly emphasized, that has the potential to change.

The President's bold, decisive decisions have brought us extremely -- have bought us extremely valuable time to prepare for the possibility that the situation may worsen and we may need to mitigate its spread in the United States. That time is valuable for all sorts of things, including state and local preparation, and the development of diagnostics, therapeutics, and vaccines.

It's also helped us determine our funding and resource needs, allowing the White House to make its supplemental funding request of Congress earlier this week. We want to work with Congress to determine the funds we need for FY2020 first, because our priorities here are speed and flexibility.

HHS is already using up the \$105 million in the Infectious Disease Rapid Response Reserve Fund, which has been vital, but it's not enough -- which is why we are moving forward with a transfer of \$136 million to continue our public health response, which I notified Congress about on February the 2nd.

Thanks to investments supported by this administration, we have highly valuable and flexible relationships and contracting methods for developing and purchasing diagnostics, therapeutics, and vaccines through entities like BARDA. But we'll need more money for the focused drive toward countermeasures that we need to keep America safe.

Working on a supplemental needs to be a top priority for Congress. As the President has said, this is not a time for politics. We LA-GOV-20-1240, 20-1241, 20-1242-A-000808

cannot undertake all the preparation that it's widely acknowledged we need without more funding.

As chairman of the Coronavirus Task Force, I have already begun working alongside Vice President Pence, Acting Director Vought, Director Ueland, and others to begin productive discussions with Congress about what funding should look like.

We laid out five key elements of our supplemental request. First, surveillance. Second, state and local support. Third, therapeutics. Fourth, vaccines. And fifth, personal protective equipment, or PPE.

I want to mention some particular activities we plan with the funding. With surveillance funds, we'll build on existing influenza surveillance systems, covering all states and adding coronavirus testing and reporting to the current flu systems. We request funding for grants to state and local jurisdictions for epidemiology, lab capacity, infection control, and other activities, complementing CDC investments over the years. And we've requested new funding for the 62 recipients of our hospital preparedness program.

We request \$1 billion in support for the development of up to five candidate coronavirus vaccines, including support for one or more through phase-three clinical trials.

On therapeutics and diagnostics, we request support for investigation of broad-spectrum antivirals, research on existing monoclonal antibodies that work on other coronaviruses, development of new targeted monoclonal antibodies, and screening of small molecule compounds that have existing clinical data. We request support for these activities through early clinical trials.

We also request support for development of assays to ensure ready availability of diagnostics, plus funding to help the FDA support these development priorities -- pipelines.

On personal protective equipment, we propose almost half a billion dollars in investments for the Strategic National Stockpile to increase production, capacity, and purchase of respirators, ventilators, and antimicrobials for secondary infections.

These kinds of activities will build on activities that we have prioritized and generously funded over the years. Since FY2017, under President Trump, the CDC's budget has increased by \$668 million, while NIH's budget has increased by more than \$7 billion.

The FY2020 appropriations signed by President Trump include \$2.7 billion for preparedness programs in HHS's Office of the Assistant Secretary for Preparedness and Response, up about \$600 million from FY2017. That included a 130-million-dollar increase in annual spending for the Strategic National Stockpile, and a 203-million-dollar increase in our Pandemic Preparedness Program.

The President's 2021 budget for CDC, developed before we knew the coronavirus would present such an emergency, reflects similar priorities. It maintains the \$675 million in state and local preparedness investments, the FEP funding. It prioritizes infectious disease funding and proposes a \$50 million increase for CDC's Global Health Security Agenda efforts.

That reflects this administration's longtime focus on effective preparedness programs, the CDC's core mission of infectious disease response, and support for tackling infectious disease threats, especially ones that can cross borders.

I've been a strong advocate for this work and so have leaders across the Trump administration. Tragically, we are now reminded why we've made the case for these priorities over the years. And this situation demands more support from Congress, just as earlier potential pandemic situations have.

DIRECTOR VOUGHT: So the first one I want to tackle is the total amount for CDC of fighting infectious diseases and preparedness in the President's budget versus last year. So, last year, fiscal year 2020, there was \$4.182 billion for fighting infectious diseases and preparedness within CDC. We then increased that in the President's budget by 3 percent -- \$135 million -- to \$4.317 billion.

So from the standpoint of everything that -- all of the activities that are going on at CDC in this area, there's an increase of 3 percent.

There is a topline reduction in the President's budget for CDC in areas that are not infectious disease fighting and preparedness -things like climate change research; things like occupational health research that is not going to go away, but is merely something that we no longer feel like we need to jumpstart research that universities are doing, and they have been doing it since 1970, when these programs were first created because it wasn't happening at universities.

We also think there's waste, fraud, and abuse in this area, where you have studies on how taxi drivers are taking too few bathroom breaks, and whether that's an important occupational health issue.

Those are the kinds of things that we still think, even in a time of making sure that all the resources are there for CDC, we can find inefficiencies and waste, and deal with mission creep at the same time.

So it is not true that we cut CDC infectious disease fighting -- which gets me to the second one, which I think this is the main inaccuracy out there, which is this notion that you see in some of the New York Post and CNN reporting that we cut CDC by 80 percent. It's flat-out inaccurate.

Let me explain how the numbers are concocted, comparing apples and oranges, to get that 80 percent. When the Ebola supplemental was passed, there was \$597 million provided over five years. It was not an annual spend; it was a five-year lump sum supplemental. Per year, that was \$119 million for global health activities that would apply to any infectious disease. But that was LA-GOV-20-1240, 20-1241, 20-1242-A-000809

passed by Congress as part of the Ebola supplemental.

The last two years of that five-year supplemental, we began to make sure that it would be funded within the base amount of resources. So we put forward \$50 million in Fiscal Year '18, \$50 million in Fiscal Year '19, \$125 million in Fiscal Year '20, and in this budget we propose \$175 million in Fiscal Year '21.

So, in -- while it was still available, we were taking steps to make sure it was funded within base resources. So when the supplemental emergency funding expired, there would still be there, and then when that expired we then pulsed it up to \$125 [million]. And this year we propose it at \$175 [million]. So significant resources there.

You hear, in the same kind of stories, about leaked memos regarding contingency plans. Those were -- we never got to the point where the funds were expired. And so the contingency plans were what they're meant to be: contingency plans if the funds go away. So, kind of -- we keep seeing this story out there. It's flat-out inaccurate.

I want to talk a little bit about the run rate. So when we talk about: Is there money in the account right now? There's money in the account. We have spent \$77 million of the \$105 million that Secretary Azar mentioned.

We will be able to get through into April. We can't tell you with a specific degree of certainty, but we're in a good place right now, temporarily. The difference between what we have actually spent, and the -- and the amounts that are provided, we have committed to other activities. We need a supplemental; we need it soon. There's no doubt about that. But we haven't run out of money. And we've got some time and we think that Congress is taking this very seriously.

Eric will speak to how quickly they will move a supplemental. But we're moving forward and we are making sure we have all the accurate data.

I've heard the argument from the Hill: "Well, you haven't given us all of the obligation rates." Well, that's because we're trying to get all of the obligation rates ourselves: collect them, make sure we have all of them from the various different accounts across the federal government, compile them, and get them to the Hill. And we will be as transparent as we always have.

And then the last thing I would just say from a comparison of -- this is our sup request versus their sup request. Remember that ours was based on the notion of what's needed for the seven months remaining in Fiscal Year '20. We put forward a two-and-a-half-billion-dollar request. The President has been very -- made it very clear. Secretary Azar, as head of our task force, has made it very clear. We are willing to go to a higher level if Congress feels the need to do that. But we put forward a two-and-a-half-billion-dollar request based on what was required in seven months, knowing that we're going to go right into Fiscal Year '21 appropriations, and build in additional resources for this area.

So when you see a big number from Senator Schumer -- again, not much detail there, but the assumption is that that is a five-year number. "No-year money" was what we call it. And so, to some extent, you're dealing, again, with apples and oranges. The Ebola supplemental was, again, no-year money, so it wasn't intended to be for what was needed in this particular fiscal year.

So those are the main things that I've seen that I wanted to make sure we definitely unpack. And I'm sure we'll do more of that in the Q&A.

- President Trump took unprecedented action and suspended all travel into the United States from China. This is chief among reasons why the threat to Americans from coronavirus remains low.
- Issuing a public health emergency declaration on January 31.

- The White House has already met with over 40 state, county and health officials in 30 states on how to respond to the potential threat of the coronavirus. We will be continuing to reach out to governors, state and local officials, and Members of Congress to ensure they have the necessary resources.
- · Remained in close contact with our Nation's governors.

While the threat to the American public remains low, the President has directed the White House Task Force to take all steps to ensure the health and well-being of the American people and we are well-prepared.

Excerpt from On-The-Record Pen and Pad Roundtable by Health and Human Services Secretary Alex Azar and Other Senior Administration Officials on Resources Available to Combat the Coronavirus (*February 28, 2020*)

SECRETARY AZAR: Well, thanks for coming, everybody. In case you didn't hear from us enough the other night, wanted to give you an update on the budget issues, in particular.

As the President has repeatedly emphasized, there is no higher priority for us than protecting the health and safety of Americans. Thanks to the President's aggressive containment efforts, at this time, the risk from COVID-19 to the American public is low. But as we have all repeatedly emphasized, that has the potential to change.

The President's bold, decisive decisions have brought us extremely -- have bought us extremely valuable time to prepare for the possibility that the situation may worsen and we may need to mitigate its spread in the United States. That time is valuable for all sorts of things, including state and local preparation, and the development of diagnostics, therapeutics, and vaccines.

It's also helped us determine our funding and resource needs, allowing the White House to make its supplemental funding request of Congress earlier this week. We want to work with Congress to determine the funds we need for FY2020 first, because our priorities here are speed and flexibility.

HHS is already using up the \$105 million in the Infectious Disease Rapid Response Reserve Fund, which has been vital, but it's not enough -- which is why we are moving forward with a transfer of \$136 million to continue our public health response, which I notified Congress about on February the 2nd.

Thanks to investments supported by this administration, we have highly valuable and flexible relationships and contracting methods for developing and purchasing diagnostics, therapeutics, and vaccines through entities like BARDA. But we'll need more money for the focused drive toward countermeasures that we need to keep America safe.

Working on a supplemental needs to be a top priority for Congress. As the President has said, this is not a time for politics. We LA-GOV-20-1240, 20-1241, 20-1242-A-000813

cannot undertake all the preparation that it's widely acknowledged we need without more funding.

As chairman of the Coronavirus Task Force, I have already begun working alongside Vice President Pence, Acting Director Vought, Director Ueland, and others to begin productive discussions with Congress about what funding should look like.

We laid out five key elements of our supplemental request. First, surveillance. Second, state and local support. Third, therapeutics. Fourth, vaccines. And fifth, personal protective equipment, or PPE.

I want to mention some particular activities we plan with the funding. With surveillance funds, we'll build on existing influenza surveillance systems, covering all states and adding coronavirus testing and reporting to the current flu systems. We request funding for grants to state and local jurisdictions for epidemiology, lab capacity, infection control, and other activities, complementing CDC investments over the years. And we've requested new funding for the 62 recipients of our hospital preparedness program.

We request \$1 billion in support for the development of up to five candidate coronavirus vaccines, including support for one or more through phase-three clinical trials.

On therapeutics and diagnostics, we request support for investigation of broad-spectrum antivirals, research on existing monoclonal antibodies that work on other coronaviruses, development of new targeted monoclonal antibodies, and screening of small molecule compounds that have existing clinical data. We request support for these activities through early clinical trials.

We also request support for development of assays to ensure ready availability of diagnostics, plus funding to help the FDA support these development priorities -- pipelines.

On personal protective equipment, we propose almost half a billion dollars in investments for the Strategic National Stockpile to increase production, capacity, and purchase of respirators, ventilators, and antimicrobials for secondary infections.

These kinds of activities will build on activities that we have prioritized and generously funded over the years. Since FY2017, under President Trump, the CDC's budget has increased by \$668 million, while NIH's budget has increased by more than \$7 billion.

The FY2020 appropriations signed by President Trump include \$2.7 billion for preparedness programs in HHS's Office of the Assistant Secretary for Preparedness and Response, up about \$600 million from FY2017. That included a 130-million-dollar increase in annual spending for the Strategic National Stockpile, and a 203-million-dollar increase in our Pandemic Preparedness Program.

The President's 2021 budget for CDC, developed before we knew the coronavirus would present such an emergency, reflects similar priorities. It maintains the \$675 million in state and local preparedness investments, the FEP funding. It prioritizes infectious disease funding and proposes a \$50 million increase for CDC's Global Health Security Agenda efforts.

That reflects this administration's longtime focus on effective preparedness programs, the CDC's core mission of infectious disease response, and support for tackling infectious disease threats, especially ones that can cross borders.

I've been a strong advocate for this work and so have leaders across the Trump administration. Tragically, we are now reminded why we've made the case for these priorities over the years. And this situation demands more support from Congress, just as earlier potential pandemic situations have.

DIRECTOR VOUGHT: So the first one I want to tackle is the total amount for CDC of fighting infectious diseases and preparedness in the President's budget versus last year. So, last year, fiscal year 2020, there was \$4.182 billion for fighting infectious diseases and preparedness within CDC. We then increased that in the President's budget by 3 percent -- \$135 million -- to \$4.317 billion.

So from the standpoint of everything that -- all of the activities that are going on at CDC in this area, there's an increase of 3 percent.

There is a topline reduction in the President's budget for CDC in areas that are not infectious disease fighting and preparedness -things like climate change research; things like occupational health research that is not going to go away, but is merely something that we no longer feel like we need to jumpstart research that universities are doing, and they have been doing it since 1970, when these programs were first created because it wasn't happening at universities.

We also think there's waste, fraud, and abuse in this area, where you have studies on how taxi drivers are taking too few bathroom breaks, and whether that's an important occupational health issue.

Those are the kinds of things that we still think, even in a time of making sure that all the resources are there for CDC, we can find inefficiencies and waste, and deal with mission creep at the same time.

So it is not true that we cut CDC infectious disease fighting -- which gets me to the second one, which I think this is the main inaccuracy out there, which is this notion that you see in some of the New York Post and CNN reporting that we cut CDC by 80 percent. It's flat-out inaccurate.

Let me explain how the numbers are concocted, comparing apples and oranges, to get that 80 percent. When the Ebola supplemental was passed, there was \$597 million provided over five years. It was not an annual spend; it was a five-year lump sum supplemental. Per year, that was \$119 million for global health activities that would apply to any infectious disease. But that was LA-GOV-20-1240, 20-1241, 20-1242-A-000814

passed by Congress as part of the Ebola supplemental.

The last two years of that five-year supplemental, we began to make sure that it would be funded within the base amount of resources. So we put forward \$50 million in Fiscal Year '18, \$50 million in Fiscal Year '19, \$125 million in Fiscal Year '20, and in this budget we propose \$175 million in Fiscal Year '21.

So, in -- while it was still available, we were taking steps to make sure it was funded within base resources. So when the supplemental emergency funding expired, there would still be there, and then when that expired we then pulsed it up to \$125 [million]. And this year we propose it at \$175 [million]. So significant resources there.

You hear, in the same kind of stories, about leaked memos regarding contingency plans. Those were -- we never got to the point where the funds were expired. And so the contingency plans were what they're meant to be: contingency plans if the funds go away. So, kind of -- we keep seeing this story out there. It's flat-out inaccurate.

I want to talk a little bit about the run rate. So when we talk about: Is there money in the account right now? There's money in the account. We have spent \$77 million of the \$105 million that Secretary Azar mentioned.

We will be able to get through into April. We can't tell you with a specific degree of certainty, but we're in a good place right now, temporarily. The difference between what we have actually spent, and the -- and the amounts that are provided, we have committed to other activities. We need a supplemental; we need it soon. There's no doubt about that. But we haven't run out of money. And we've got some time and we think that Congress is taking this very seriously.

Eric will speak to how quickly they will move a supplemental. But we're moving forward and we are making sure we have all the accurate data.

I've heard the argument from the Hill: "Well, you haven't given us all of the obligation rates." Well, that's because we're trying to get all of the obligation rates ourselves: collect them, make sure we have all of them from the various different accounts across the federal government, compile them, and get them to the Hill. And we will be as transparent as we always have.

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So when you see a big number from Senator Schumer -- again, not much detail there, but the assumption is that that is a five-year number. "No-year money" was what we call it. And so, to some extent, you're dealing, again, with apples and oranges. The Ebola supplemental was, again, no-year money, so it wasn't intended to be for what was needed in this particular fiscal year.

So those are the main things that I've seen that I wanted to make sure we definitely unpack. And I'm sure we'll do more of that in the Q&A.
