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


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## **Biden Signs Executive Orders Forcing Taxpayers to Fund Abortion Providers**

MRL and NRLC are saddened but not surprised that the most pro-abortion President in history has signed an executive order that forces all Americans to fund abortion. Many unborn lives will be lost to abortion because of Biden's Executive Order.

The following is from National Right to Life:

WASHINGTON — Rolling back protections for women and their unborn babies, proabortion President Joe Biden today signed executive orders reversing the Protecting Life in Global Health Assistance policy—often referred to as the Mexico City Policy—and requirements to qualify for Title X funding.

"During the presidential campaign, Joe Biden made it clear that promoting abortion would be a priority in his administration and it would be done at the expense of taxpayers," said Carol Tobias, president of National Right to Life. "It is



AMERICAN OVERSIGHT not surprising that his first actions are to dismantle both international and domestic protections that have saved countless lives—and put taxpayer money in the pockets of abortionists."

By signing the executive orders, President Biden is diverting taxpayer funds from organizations that do not perform or promote abortion to organizations that aggressively promote abortions both in the U.S. and around the world.

Today's executive orders also rejected the Geneva Consensus Declaration (2020) that reaffirmed "the inherent 'dignity and worth of the human person,' that 'every human being has the inherent right to life." The Geneva Consensus Declaration also reaffirmed that abortion is not health care and that sovereign nations have the right to protect all innocent human lives by rejecting abortion.

"Taxpayer funds should not be used to subsidize an industry that preys on women and their unborn children," said Tobias.

Under the Mexico City Policy, which was expanded under the Trump administration to the Protecting Life in Global Health Assistance policy, grantees had to refrain from performing abortions (except to save the life of the mother, or in cases of rape or incest), or lobbying to legalize abortion, or otherwise promoting abortion as a family-planning method. If a specific organization declined to agree with these conditions, then the same funds were channeled to other organizations that agreed to the contract stipulations. There was, therefore, no overall reduction in funding for family planning programs resulting from the policy.

Under the new Title X regulations, the Biden administration will allow funds to go to organizations that promote and perform abortions here in the U.S. Under the Trump Administration's Title X rule, abortion facilities could not be housed in the same location where family planning services were delivered. Under President Trump's administration, the rule also stated that Title X grantees were not to refer for elective abortion. The rule did not cut funding for family planning but ensured that funding went to health facilities that did not perform or promote abortion as family planning.

"The vast majority of Americans oppose using taxpayer funds to pay for abortions," said Tobias. "These executive orders blatantly disregard the wishes of the American people as shown in poll after poll."

In a Knights of Columbus/Marist poll released on January 27th, out of 1,173 respondents 58% "oppose using tax dollars to pay for a woman's abortion." Of those, 65% of Independents and even 31% of Democrats oppose federal funding of abortion.

An even larger majority of respondents—77% —oppose "using tax dollars to support abortion in other countries" including more than six in ten of those who identify as pro-choice (64%).

In a post-election poll conducted by McLaughlin and Associates, out of 1000 respondents, 64.6% opposed "using tax dollars to pay for abortion."





### Updated Interactive Dashboard Now Available

The Missouri Hospital Association and the Hospital Industry Data Institute are pleased to share the COVID-19 interactive dashboard for Jan. 13 to Jan. 20. This dashboard provides regional COVID-19 and influenza-like illness trends throughout the state to inform stakeholders and support decision-making locally.

#### Key findings this week:


- New COVID-19 case growth, positivity rates and hospitalizations were down
  markedly in all regions of Missouri last week, while effective reproductive rates
  were flat or down compared to the previous week in every region except the
  Southeast, which increased modestly. Statewide:
  - New cases as a rate of the population increased just 2.9% (for context, the weekly average in November was 14.6%).
  - o The testing positivity rate decreased by 19.1%.
  - Suspected and confirmed COVID-19 hospitalizations decreased by 7.6%.
- The effects of reduced COVID-19 activity, if sustained, will take several weeks to be borne out in hospital capacity data. Despite reductions in cases, positivity and COVID-19-related hospitalizations last week, staffed inpatient bed capacity



- decreased 5% while ICU beds available for new patients fell by 11.8%. The largest decreases were in the St. Louis and Northwest Regions.
- During the first 32 days of Missouri's mass inoculation campaign, 202,533 doses of COVID-19 vaccine were administered throughout the state for an average of 6,329 shots per day. While the coverage rate needed to induce herd immunity against the SARS-CoV-2 coronavirus is unknown, the scale of logistical challenges in inoculating a population of 6.1 million Missourians is certain. Assuming the virulence of COVID-19 is somewhere between the measles and chickenpox where 75% coverage would induce herd immunity implies that 4.6 million Missourians need to become inoculated against the virus to restore normalcy. That's 9.2 million doses that need to find a path into the arms of Missourians, considering each of the currently approved vaccines require an initial dose followed by a booster three to four weeks later, depending on the manufacturer. So far, 40,648, or 25%, of vaccine recipients in Missouri have received both doses.

The bad news is that at the current pace of 6,329 doses administered per day, Missouri would meet 75% coverage by February 2025 (1,455 days). On Monday, though, Gov. Parson opened eligibility for an additional 2 million Missourians who are 65 years and older, or 18 years and older with selected preexisting conditions that place them at elevated risk for adverse COVID-19-related outcomes. This will increase the current pace of vaccination in Missouri as soon as a stable vaccine supply is in place. In addition to adequate vaccine supply, several other key challenges remain, which include inducing demand among vaccine-hesitant populations, reliability from federal partners, building mass-vaccination venues, ensuring second doses for full protection and identifying a large geographically dispersed population with targeted underlying conditions that can be difficult to verify.

### Updated Interactive Dashboard Now Available

The Missouri Hospital Association and the Hospital Industry Data Institute are pleased to share the COVID-19 interactive dashboard for Jan. 20 to Jan. 27. This dashboard provides regional COVID-19 and influenza-like illness trends throughout the state to inform stakeholders and support decision-making locally.

VACCINE DATA NOW PUBLIC-FACING: Last evening, Gov. Parson announced the launch of a new Missouri COVID-19 vaccine dashboard. The vaccination dashboard was incorporated into the broader COVID-19 public health dashboard and also is available at MOStopsCovid.com.


#### Key findings this week:

- COVID-19 activity continued to recede in Missouri last week.
  - New cases as a rate of the population increased 2.7%, the lowest weekly increase since early October.
  - The effective reproductive rate decreased by four points, with moderate decreases in every region of the state.
  - The statewide positivity rate decreased from 19.5% during the previous week to 18.8% last week.



- Suspected and confirmed COVID-19 hospitalizations fell below 2,000 patients for the first time since the last week of October.
  - On Jan. 24, Missouri hospitals reported 1,900 hospitalized patients, a 31% decrease since the first week of January.
  - Staffed inpatient bed availability increased by 8.7% last week, while ICU bed capacity increased 26.1%.
- By Jan. 24, more than 357,000 COVID-19 vaccine doses had been administered in Missouri. The recipients include 237,688 individual Missourians, including just more than 70,000 state residents who have received both doses. While the scale and pace an average of 8,506 daily doses since Dec. 14, 2020 continues to increase, 357,000 doses is less than 4% of the total number of doses needed to inoculate 70% of the population, a very approximate benchmark for establishing herd immunity in Missouri. Additionally, numerous factors beyond state control continue to impose severe limitations on the proliferation of vaccines; however, Missouri currently is pulling up the rear amid a pack of equally supply-constrained states.

A key advantage in Missouri's vaccine tracking system is the availability of information on race and ethnicity among recipients. This information is critical in monitoring the equity of vaccine distribution and uptake among vulnerable and vaccine-hesitant populations. Unfortunately, 35% of vaccine records report race as unknown or other. Vaccinators accurately identifying and reporting recipient race and ethnicity is vital to the success of the mass vaccination campaign in Missouri.





The hospital TeleTracking compliance data used to update HIDI's hospital-specific interactive dashboards have not yet been posted by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services this week. The dashboards will be updated as soon as the latest data are available.

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


### Gov. Parson Engages With MHA Members On COVID-19

Gov. Parson and key leaders in his administration participated in a conference call with the MHA membership



on the state's response to the COVID-19 public health emergency. It was the 25th such call with the MHA membership since the pandemic began. The calls provide an opportunity for an update on state activities and hospital issues, and for hospital executives to ask questions and make comments.



This call focused on the distribution and administration of COVID-19 vaccine. The governor gave a preview of his pending announcement to activate the Missouri National Guard to help support the vaccination effort. Parson also called on hospitals to administer, not stockpile, their vaccine. Further discussion and questions addressed the metrics of success in the vaccination initiative and the process for managing the second dose of the vaccine series.

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### Biden Administration Releases COVID-19 Response And Pandemic Preparedness Strategy

Today, the new Biden administration released the National Strategy for COVID-19 Response and Pandemic Preparedness. The plan, highlighted in a Fact Sheet, authorizes use of the Defense Production Act to accelerate production of testing and vaccine supplies. It also focuses on a centralized approach for response, and vaccine planning and coordination, as well as increased funding pending Congressional approval. In addition, yesterday President Biden signed the following three executive orders related to the federal COVID-19 response.

- a masking and physical distancing mandate for the federal workforce, and everyone in federal buildings or on federal property
- an order for the U.S. to rejoin the World Health Organization with National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases Director Dr. Anthony Fauci as the delegation lead



 the establishment of a White House Office of COVID-19 Response to be headed by former Obama National Economic Council Chairman Jeff Zients

The strategy also outlines a broad framework for the success of the following seven primary goals.

- 1. Restore trust with the American people.
- 2. Mount a safe, effective and comprehensive vaccination campaign.
- 3. Mitigate spread through expanding masking, testing, data, treatments, health care workforce and clear public health standards.
- 4. Expand emergency relief and exercise the Defense Production Act.
- 5. Safely reopen schools, businesses and travel while protecting workers.
- 6. Protect those most at risk and advance equity, including across racial, ethnic and rural/urban lines.
- 7. Restore U.S. leadership globally, and build better preparedness for future threats.

### Presidential Executive Order Compels Masking And Distancing On Federal Property

In his first day in office, President Biden issued an executive order requiring masking and physical distancing by on-duty or on-site federal employees, on-site federal contractors, and everyone in federal buildings or on federal property. The infection control standards will follow Centers for Disease Control and Prevention guidelines.

### **BNDD Issues Controlled Substance Prescribing Waiver**

The Missouri Bureau of Narcotics and Dangerous Drugs issued a waiver of Section 195.030.2, which allows practitioners whose primary practice location is outside the state of Missouri, who are temporarily practicing in Missouri during the state of emergency, to not register with the Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services to dispense or prescribe controlled substances. The current waiver is in effect until Wednesday, March 31, unless otherwise communicated by the department. MHA requested the waiver upon becoming aware of the potential regulatory risk to providers assisting with the pandemic



but not registered with BNDD. The waiver is consistent with federal flexibilities allowed by the Drug Enforcement Agency in response to the pandemic.

#### **CMS Issues New Hospital Survey Guidance**

The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services issued new guidance, QSO-21-13-Hospitals, on hospital survey activity. CMS is limiting the focus and scope of surveys effective until Saturday, Feb. 20. In the guidance, the agency also addresses implementation of crisis standards of care. MHA requested a survey waiver from CMS in December in light of the resources being consumed to manage the COVID-19 pandemic.

Hospitals are encouraged to utilize mAB supply on hand before ordering additional or excessive quantities. This will ensure Missouri continues to receive full allocations of available supply going forward.






### Congrats to New CSG East Director David Biette



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


Institutional Integrity: Learning the Right Lessons from the Capitol Siege



In our pre-election analysis, following federal deployments at racial justice demonstrations over the summer that were seen as excessive and exacerbating rather than de-escalatory, we noted that the United States has a strong framework of laws and norms that guide deployments. These guardrails reflect basic principles: the domestic deployment of federal forces must be guided by law and not by politics or race. It must be based on the actual threat, evenhanded, and impartial. Moreover, the military, particularly active-duty military, should be deployed only as a last resort and with a clear mission, training, and guidance. These concepts still apply despite the very different context presented by this recent insurrection and ongoing threat. As details emerge, it will be important to properly understand where and how established guardrails were tested so that those responsible for protecting our democracy, its institutions, and the public make informed decisions that restore trust and security.

Biden plans early legislation to offer legal status to 11 million immigrants without it





During his first days in office, President-elect Joe Biden plans to send a groundbreaking legislative package to Congress to address the long-elusive goal of immigration reform, including what's certain to be a controversial centerpiece: a pathway to citizenship for an estimated 11 million immigrants who are in the country without legal status, according to immigrant rights activists in communication with the Biden-Harris transition team.

The bill also would provide a shorter pathway to citizenship for hundreds of thousands of people with temporary protected status and beneficiaries of Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals who were brought to the U.S. as children, and probably also for certain front-line essential workers, vast numbers of whom are immigrants.


In a significant departure from many previous immigration bills passed under both Democratic and Republican administrations, the proposed legislation would not contain any provisions directly linking an expansion of immigration with stepped-up enforcement and security measures, said Marielena Hincapié, executive director of the National Immigration Law Center and its Immigrant Justice Fund, who has been consulted on the proposal by Biden staffers.

Both Biden and Vice President-elect Kamala Harris have said their legislative proposal would include a pathway to citizenship for millions of immigrants in the U.S. illegally, and The Times has confirmed the bold opening salvo that the new administration plans in its first days doesn't include the "security first" political concessions of past efforts.

An Impeachment Incitement





Donald Trump was impeached again on Wednesday, a week before leaving office in one of the great travesties of modern politics.

Here are reasons why the exercise proved a farce.

One, impeachment was never intended by the founders to become a serial effort to weaken a first-term president. But this latest try will mark the third failed attempt of Democrats in Congress to remove Trump before his allotted tenure.

The first Democratic impeachment effort of December 2017 fizzled. The second impeachment of December 2019 succeeded but predictably failed to obtain a Senate conviction.

This third try will likely not result in a Senate conviction, either.

But from now on, House impeachment will be used by the out-party as a periodic club to wound a first-term president. President-elect Biden should beware.

Two, the country is wracked by a pandemic, recession, a summer of Black Lives Matter and Antifa looting, arson, and violence, and the recent rogue group of Trump supporters storming the Capitol. Washington, D.C. is now militarized in a way not seen since the Civil War. Over 20,000 troops patrol the streets.

Thousands are dying from COVID-19. Politics and incompetence at the state level slow down the widespread vaccination of the vulnerable.

So the last thing Americans now needed was the distraction of virtue-signaling politicians to impeach a lame-duck president who will be gone in a week.

Three, the rushed third impeachment attempt was even sloppier than the first two. There was neither an appointment of a special counsel nor a formal case presented for illegal or improper presidential behavior. Trump's advocates had no time to present a legal or political refutation of "incitement."



There was no real debate, just for-show stump speeches in a rushed spasm of hatred—a circus entirely contrary to the Founders' notion of a solemn and rare procedure.

On the day Congress officially counted the electoral votes making Joe Biden the next president, chants of "Stop the Steal" echoed through the U.S. Capitol. 

Before the Capitol Riot, Calls for Cash and Talk of Revolution





A network of far-right agitators across the country spent weeks organizing and raising money for a mass action to overturn President Trump's election loss.

Keith Lee, an Air Force veteran and former police detective, spent the morning of Jan. 6 casing the entrances to the Capitol.

In online videos, the 41-year-old Texan pointed out the flimsiness of the fencing. He cheered the arrival, long before President Trump's rally at the other end of the mall, of far-right militiamen encircling the building. Then, armed with a bullhorn, Mr. Lee called out for the mob to rush in, until his voice echoed from the dome of the Rotunda.


Yet even in the heat of the event, Mr. Lee paused for some impromptu fund-raising. "If you couldn't make the trip, give five to 10 bucks," he told his viewers, seeking donations for the legal costs of two jailed "patriots," a leader of the far-right Proud Boys and an ally who had clashed with the police during an armed incursion at Oregon's statehouse.

Much is still unknown about the planning and financing of the storming of the Capitol, aiming to challenge Mr. Trump's electoral defeat. What is clear is that it was driven, in part, by a largely ad hoc network of low-budget agitators, including far-right militants, Christian conservatives and ardent adherents of the QAnon conspiracy theory. Mr. Lee is all three. And the sheer breadth of the movement he joined suggests it may be far more difficult to confront than a single organization.



Structural Reforms to the Federal Judiciary. Left wing perspective...

Discussions of the federal judiciary often focus on the substance of decisions made—which side wins and which side loses—and rightly so. These individual opinions are frequently of incredible importance, not just to the parties involved but in shaping the law more broadly. Yet this focus on substantive decisions has obscured deeper structural factors at play in the nation's federal judiciary. Structural problems—such as lack of judicial diversity, ideologue judges, and lack of judicial accountability—undercut the courts' legitimacy and have tangible negative effects on judicial decision-making. Instead of protecting everyday Americans by serving as a check on abuses of power, too often the federal courts have become a tool for carrying out the agendas of special interests and corporations.


Structural problems with the judiciary have always existed to varying degrees. But they have been exacerbated in recent years due to an ongoing campaign by conservatives to take control of the federal courts, often through procedural changes that have significant effects but garner little public attention. The problem has now reached a crisis point. Conservatives have shown a willingness to abandon any and all norms to undermine the judicial nominations process and pack the courts with judges who will help them realize political goals they cannot achieve through the political process. These judges have proven more than willing to carry out the task, supporting the most specious of legal claims in order to skew the system in favor of conservative interests and even prevent many Americans from accessing the courts at all.

Progressives need to consider policies to combat the ideological bias of the courts. This report outlines the current problems in the federal judiciary and then discusses two types of structural reform: changing the composition and authority of the courts and changing the rules that dictate who has access to them.

In a new statement released <u>on Twitter</u>, China's foreign ministry accused Blinken of "interfering in its domestic affairs and undermining its interests" after he <u>backed predecessor Mike Pompeo's declaration</u> that it had launched "a systematic attempt to destroy Uyghurs."

"China is willing to work with the US on climate change. But such cooperation cannot stand unaffected by the overall China-US relations," the statement read.

"It is impossible to ask for China's support in global affairs while interfering in its domestic affairs and undermining its interests," it added.

At his first press conference as Biden's secretary of state on Wednesday, Blinken was asked by a Chinese journalist how the US would work with China with the genocide designation hanging over the relationship.




Blinken danced around the issue and said the US was able to compartmentalize difference issues with the Communist nation, which he described as "the most important relationship we have," and called on them to step up alongside America to confront climate change.

The People's Liberation Army sent 11 aircraft into the south-western corner of Taiwan's air defence zone on January 23, and 15 aircraft into the same area the next day, according to Taiwan's defence ministry.

People familiar with intelligence collected by the US and its allies said the bombers and some of the fighter aircraft involved were conducting an exercise that used a group of US Navy vessels led by the carrier USS



Theodore Roosevelt in the same area as a simulated target.

Pilots of H-6 bombers could be heard in cockpit conversations confirming orders for the simulated targeting and release of anti-ship missiles against the carrier, the people said.

The revelations highlight that the intense military competition between the two superpowers around Taiwan and the South China Sea has not eased, posing a challenge to any attempts the Biden administration might make to improve its relationship with Beijing.



### 4) John Kerry promises US won't cave to China to save climate agenda

Many feared the US would make unsavory concessions to China to ensure climate change progress. Kerry says "that's not going to happen."



John Kerry, President Joe Biden's special envoy for climate change issues, just addressed one of the biggest concerns early critics have of the new administration: Whether the White House will make unsavory concessions to China in exchange for progress on climate issues.

In a Wednesday afternoon press briefing to release the administration's new <u>climate change executive orders</u>, Kerry answered that question definitively: No.

"Obviously we have serious differences with China," the envoy said



during the White House briefing, citing Beijing's theft of intellectual property and aggression in the South China Sea as examples. "Those issues will never be traded for anything that has to do with climate. That's not going to happen."


It's a pretty big statement, and one that hopefully clarifies an early controversy over the Biden administration's foreign policy plans.

Climate change is a top Biden priority. So is confronting China.

In December, US foreign policy expert Thomas Wright wrote an article in the <u>Atlantic</u> with a provocative claim: That Kerry would prioritize extracting climate change-related concessions from China, and to do so would minimize America's plans to push Beijing on trade, security, and human rights issues:

"According to three people familiar with Kerry's thinking, Kerry believes that cooperation with China is the key to progress on climate change and that climate is by far the most important issue in the relationship between the United States and China. Kerry thinks the U.S. president should use his political capital to press Beijing on this subject. Yes, the United States should stand firm when it disagrees with Beijing, as he believes it did during his tenure as secretary of state, but everything else, including geopolitical competition with China, is of secondary importance to this overarching threat."





Kerry's former aides and others close to him denied that Wright accurately portrayed the former secretary of state's stance. Still, it led many in Washington, DC's foreign policy expert community — especially those on the right — to preemptively worry the incoming Biden administration would be softer on China to make climate change progress.

That was a fair concern. The US wants China to stop putting millions of Uighur Muslims in Xinjiang camps, cease the intellectual property theft of American business, and quit harassing US allies in regional waters. If the US weakened its pushback on any of these issues so <u>China would agree to lower carbon emissions</u>, for example, many in the US and around the world might not deem that a good trade.

But the climate envoy has now stated such fears are overblown: The Biden administration will seek both to compete with China on myriad issues and work with it to reverse climate change's effects.

It's unclear if that approach will work, and the White House could face a future scenario where it would consider trade-offs. Criticism might be warranted then. For now, Kerry is clearly trying to put an end to an early controversy about his own views — and Biden's foreign policy in general.



### 5) Walter Russell Mead: Biden's opening salvo on Beijing The Wall Street Journal, 26 January 2021

The Biden administration is less than a week old, but its most consequential foreign-policy decisions may already be behind it.

Initiating his China policy with the most aggressive concatenation of moves against a foreign power that any peacetime U.S. administration has ever launched so early on, President Biden has thrown down a gauntlet that Beijing is unlikely to ignore. Besides issuing a formal invitation to Taiwan's top Washington representative to attend the inauguration (the first such invitation since the U.S. established formal relations with Beijing in 1979), the incoming team has pledged to continue arms sales to Taiwan and indicated that it wants to delay highlevel U.S.-China talks until it consults with close allies—a stand that China will interpret as a rebuff. As if this weren't enough, Secretary of State-designate Antony Blinken announced that he concurs with his predecessor Mike Pompeo's finding that China is engaged in a genocide against its mostly Muslim Uighur minority in Xinjiang province. Taken with the previously planned dispatch of a naval strike group to the South China Sea, it all amounts to a stern message to Beijing.

These moves must be troubling for those who hoped that Mr. Biden would "prioritise global issues over great power competition," as Anne-Marie Slaughter, who served as the State Department director of policy planning during the Obama administration, put it in a recent op-ed for the Financial Times.

It's not entirely clear how coordinated the new measures are. The late designation of Chinese behavior as genocide by the Trump-era State Department in particular put Mr. Biden in a difficult spot. He had called the repression of the Uighurs a genocide on the campaign trail, but stump-speech rhetoric has no legal force. Once the State Department weighed in officially, Mr. Biden couldn't walk back a designation he was on record as endorsing without looking weak.



It remains to be seen whether the administration will attempt to tone down the strong message sent by its early actions. The combination of the hard line on Taiwan and the genocide designation could be the foundation of a policy mix that is significantly more provocative than even some China hawks in the new administration wanted—and far more hawkish than the human-rights advocates supporting the genocide designation understood.

The ball is now in Xi Jinping's court. His choices are limited. He can respond with tough statements but signal a willingness to engage Washington pragmatically. This would hand Mr. Biden a diplomatic victory at the start of his administration and tell the rest of the world that China isn't yet prepared to take on America. It would also damage Mr. Xi at home, as anything that looks like a retreat would infuriate Chinese nationalists and undercut official propaganda about China's global stature.

Alternatively, Beijing can respond with provocations of its own. Mr. Xi can order military moves in disputed territories from the Himalayas to the Senkaku islands in the East China Sea. He can also double down on repressive measures in China. The object would be to call Mr. Biden's bluff, forcing Washington to choose between a humiliating retreat or a further escalation of tensions.

The early signs aren't encouraging. On Inauguration Day, Chinese forces attacked Indian positions in Sikkim, across the border from Tibet. Following 13 Chinese sorties into Taiwan's southwestern air-defense identification zone on Saturday, State Department spokesman Ned Price warned China to cease "its military, diplomatic and economic pressure against Taiwan." China responded by sending another 15 sorties the next day. The unifying theme of Mr. Xi's speech to the World Economic Forum Monday morning was China's staunch opposition to U.S. attempts to isolate China or limit its rise. China will think carefully before making its next moves, but it's unlikely to submit tamely to American pressure.

The crisis in China policy is the most dramatic problem facing the new administration, but relations with Russia also look tangled. The quick



U.S. response to support the rights of opposition leader Alexei Navalny and his supporters is noble from a human-rights standpoint, but it will strengthen the hand of those in the Kremlin (and in Beijing) who argue that Washington's ultimate goal in their countries remains regime change. How that will affect the Biden administration's hopes for agreements on topics ranging from arms control to climate change remains to be seen. It will certainly stimulate efforts in both China and Russia to weaken U.S. power, meddle in American politics and disrupt Washington's alliances.

All this may well be inevitable, and the U.S. cannot abandon either its strategic interests or its core values. But weaving those sometimes conflicting elements into a coherent foreign policy is never an easy task. The dramatic first steps of the Biden administration demonstrate how challenging American statecraft can be.

Can Biden Avoid Obama's First-Term Mistake?





The left will try to convince the new president he has a mandate for progressive change. He doesn't.

When Barack Obama and Joe Biden entered the White House 12 years ago, the economy was in recession, unemployment was pushing 8%, and their fellow Democrats controlled the House and Senate. Sound familiar?

We know what happened next. Instead of focusing on economic growth, the Obama administration advanced an expensive but ineffective stimulus package and then went all in on a partisan transformation of the U.S. health-care system. The upshot was the slowest economic recovery since World War II. Democrats lost their House majority in 2010, and Republicans won the Senate four years later.

We're about to find out what, if anything, Mr. Biden and his more liberal allies took away from that experience. On the campaign trail, Mr. Biden tried to put some rhetorical distance between himself and more radical proposals like the Green New Deal and Medicare for All. It's a strategy that obviously served him well in the election, but how well will it work for him in the White House?

#### Where Trump Came From—and Where Trumpism Is Going



A populist movement rooted in worries about globalization and alienation from elites culminated in the storming of the Capitol. What can conservatives salvage from the debris?

At the outset of the 2016 presidential campaign, Chris Christie, then the governor of New Jersey, sensed a yearning within a changed Republican Party for a populist voice—for a political figure who knew how to speak bluntly for the burgeoning ranks of working-class voters in the GOP.

So he set out to be that guy: a no-nonsense everyman from outside Washington who talked about the economic travails of a prototypical 45-year-old construction worker, the need to use government aggressively to end the opioid crisis in working America, the virtues of law and order, and the need to "stop the Washington bull."



Mr. Christie was right, in part. The party was ready to move away from traditional conservative formulations and toward a populist message—and even toward somebody who came across as a bit of a bully delivering it. His problem was that the biggest bully with the loudest megaphone turned out to be somebody else: Donald J. Trump. Mr. Trump won the nomination and the White House with a populist and nationalist message and has led a consequential, tumultuous presidency.

That presidency effectively collapsed in flames on Jan. 6, when Mr. Trump sent a crowd of his supporters to the Capitol to stop the constitutional transfer of power to his elected successor. That crowd turned into a mob that ransacked the seat of American democracy and tried to hunt down its elected leaders.

Republicans, and the nation as a whole, now are left to ponder what went wrong—and whether such an ugly and violent ending was inevitable. Mr. Christie, who went from Trump rival to informal Trump counselor, thinks that he knows how things went awry. "One of the big concerns I've had all the way through the Trump presidency—and I've spoken to him about this directly—is that his behavior has obscured his message and his accomplishments," he says. "And worse than obscuring them, as time went on it was discrediting them."



Washington has barely had time to process the implications of Democratic control after two Georgia runoff elections that are delivering the Senate to Democrats. Hours after the races were decided, a mob of zealots ransacked the U.S. Capitol and reshaped the national and political landscape.

#### Missouri Lawmakers Improve Conservative Ratings in New Analysis

CPAC Host Releases Scores of Missouri State Lawmakers

Alexandria, VA—Lawmakers of the Missouri General Assembly voted more conservatively during the 2020 session than in years past, according to the just-released analysis published by The American Conservative Union Foundation (ACUF), host of the Conservative Political Action Conference (CPAC).

Review the scorecard to see the ratings of all Missouri state lawmakers and find out which votes ACUF scored.

The General Assembly's overall conservative score (65.5%) improved by five points compared to the 2019 session. Similar to the previous session, Republicans maintained an average score of 78.5%. Democrats (32%) improved their average score by nine points. While there was notable turnover in awards for conservative voting records, the total number of awardees increased by two members.

"State law once made Missouri a hostile place to run a business, making it that much harder for working families to earn a living," said ACU Chairman Matt Schlapp. "Thankfully, conservatives of the General Assembly have led the way on tort reforms and lifted unnecessary legal pressure from businesses of all sizes. We applied the Missouri General Assembly as they continue to climb in ACUF's conservative rankings of the states."

ACUF's Ratings of Congress and Ratings of the States are initiatives of ACUF's Center for Legislative Accountability (CLA). These ratings are designed to reflect how over 8,000 elected officials across the nation view the role of government while illustrating the differences between chambers of the legislature and revealing lawmakers' positions on a wide variety of issues that directly affect citizens.

ACU Foundation reviewed each piece of legislation voted on in both chambers of the legislature to produce average scores of each chamber as well as individual scores for each sitting member.


# MLK Day of Service – Thank You for Participating

Presidential inaugurations are usually festive occasions in which Americans celebrate the orderly and peaceful transition of power to new political leaders.




With the coronavirus pandemic raging and thousands of troops on guard to deter violence by deranged followers of Donald Trump, that's not exactly the mood in Washington today.

But before there can be reconciliation, there must be truth and accountability.





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



Despite US sanctions and a European Parliament resolution, Russian pipe-laying ship Fortuna has started work in Danish waters ahead of the resumption of construction of the Nord Stream 2 gas pipeline which would bring Russian gas to Germany under the Baltic Sea.





"The laybarge Fortuna has started works in the construction corridor in the Danish EEZ, ahead of the resumption of the Nord Stream 2 construction. All works are performed in line with relevant permits," a spokesman for Nord Stream 2 told New Europe on January 25.

He referred to the notice to mariners by the Danish Maritime Authority (DMA). "The authorities announced construction works from January 15 onwards, including preparatory works and tests before pipelay works start," he said.

MEPs passed a resolution on January 21 calling on the EU to immediately stop the completion of Nord Stream 2. MEPs also underline that the EU should no longer be a welcoming place for Russian wealth of unclear origin," the European Parliament said in a press release.

With a view to the new administration in Washington, MEPs stressed that the EU should use this momentum to strengthen transatlantic unity in protecting democracy and fundamental values against authoritarian regimes.

The Nord Stream 2 pipeline is already facing US sanctions under its Countering America's Adversaries Through Sanctions Act (CAATSA). Washington has said that the Nord Stream 2 would make Europe more dependent on Russian gas, undermining EU energy security. At the same time, however, the US is trying to promote sales of its own



liquefied natural gas (LNG).

2) Biden bans new permits for drilling on federal lands, waters for one year

The Biden Administration is set to extend a ban on new leases for oil and gas drilling and fracking on federal lands and waters for one year as it attempts to combat climate change, a source told FOX Business.

The decision comes days after President Biden signed an executive order that putting <u>drilling and fracking</u> on hold for 60 days. Biden on the campaign trail called for the U.S. to phase out its dependence on fossil fuels.

"I would transition away from the oil industry," Biden said at a presidential debate in October. "

Biden has called Rep. Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez's Green New Deal, which calls for the U.S. to reach net-zero carbon emissions by 2050 a "framework" for his energy plan. He has repeatedly called on a shift away from oil toward renewable energy.

A fracking ban on federal lands would deliver a devastating blow to the U.S. economy, according to the American Petroleum Institute.

The organization projects a \$700 billion hit to U.S. gross domestic product should the ban be extended through 2030. Such action would also erase \$9 billion of revenue, some of which is used to fund education and conservation programs.

API projects 1 million job losses would occur by 2022 with the states of Texas, Wyoming and New Mexico seeing the biggest impact. The U.S.



oil and gas industry supports 10.3 million jobs, with workers making an average salary of \$101,181, according to a 2015 study from PricewaterhouseCoopers and the American Petroleum Institute.

3) China increases coal production & imports MenaFM, 24 January 2021

China's raw coal production increased by 0.9 percent year on year in 2020, while its coal imports augmented 1.5 percent, statistics from the National Bureau of Statistics (NBS) revealed.

A total of 3.84 billion tons of raw coal were manufactured in China last year, reporting a year-on-year expansion of 90 million tons, according to the NBS statistics.


In December alone, the raw coal production increased 3.2 percent from a year ago to 350 million tons, 1.7 percentage points higher than the upsurge seen in November.

New Delhi: The government may give a 'Make in India' push to oil and gas explorers, as it is considering a proposal to almost halve cess on domestic crude oil to encourage exploration activity and allow Covidhit oil producers to protect their margins. The glut in the oil market and deep suppression of demand during the peak of pandemic in 2020 had pushed down crude oil prices to unprecedented levels.

Though crude prices have recovered over the vaccination drive against Covid and a pick in demand coupled with unilateral production cut announced by <u>Saudi Arabia</u>, cess puts domestic crude at a disadvantage against imported oil.

Cess on domestic crude is currently levied at the rate of 20 per cent of the value of oil. Official sources said the proposal by the Union Oil Ministry is to reduce it to 10 per cent. If this is accepted by the Finance Ministry, the changes may be announced as part of Budget 2021-22 proposals, sources said....



The government is looking to reduce the tax burden on oil companies to push up domestic production that has stagnated for past several years at around 30-35 million tonne.

LONDON (Reuters) - Iranian oil exports are climbing in January after a boost in the fourth quarter despite U.S. sanctions, three assessments showed, in a sign that the end of Donald Trump's term as U.S. President may be changing buyer behaviour.

Iran's exports have shrunk since Trump in 2018 withdrew the United States from a nuclear deal with Iran and reimposed sanctions. New President Joe Biden has said if Tehran resumed compliance with the deal, Washington would too.

Figures from SVB International and two other firms that estimate Iranian supply by tracking tankers indicated exports are rising.

6) EU Parliament and Biden Administration pressure Germany to stop Russian pipeline

The controversial Nord Stream 2 pipeline is once again the target of criticism by policy-makers, both in and outside the European Union.

Following the poisoning and imprisonment of opposition gurehead Alexei Navalny, Members of the European Parliament voted



overwhelmingly in favour of a non-binding resolution calling for an immediate halt on the infrastructure project, which is 95% completed.

During a parliamentary debate last week centred on the arrest of Navalny, MEPs from across the political spectrum didn't mince words when describing their opposition to the pipeline.

Kati Piri, a Dutch MEP from the S&D group, said that "anyone who still believes that we should continue with Nord Stream 2 is blind to what kind of regime we are dealing with in Moscow."

Sergey Lagodinsky, a German MEP from the Greens group, argued the project "undermines democracy and solidarity" with Russian, Ukrainian and Polish society. And Urmas Peat, an Estonian representative of the liberal group Renew Europe, urged the EU to be united in its approach to Russia, including in its energy policy.

The resolution of the European Parliament, passed with 581 votes in favour and just 50 against, contains high praise of Alexei Navalny and strong condemnation of the government of President Vladimir Putin. By unambiguously demanding a halt to the Nord Stream 2 route, MEPs take aim at one of Russia's most valuable assets: its profitable gas exports.

7) 'Climate champion' Germany defends Russian gas pipeline despite US sanctions and EU opposition

<u>EurActiv</u>, 26 January 2021

The German government said it will not abandon the Nord Stream 2 project, despite US sanctions and calls by the European Parliament to impose EU measures against the Russian-backed gas pipeline project over the Navalny case.

"There is no direct connection between the Navalny case and Nord



Stream 2," government spokesman Steffen Seibert said in Berlin on Monday (25 January), adding that the attitude of the government to the project has not changed.

Berlin condemns "the harsh, disproportionate actions of the Russian security forces against peaceful demonstrators" and continues to demand the "immediate" investigation of the chemical weapons attack on Alexei Navalny, Seibert added.

The German government "took note of" the European Parliament's resolution demanding the suspension of Nord Stream 2, but this has "not changed" its position regarding the pipeline project, Seibert said.

Despite US sanctions against companies involved in the construction of the pipeline, German Chancellor Angela Merkel said last week she would not abandon the project and will discuss it with the new Biden administration.

The new leader of Germany's ruling Christian Democrats, Armin Laschet, said on Monday he would not reconsider his support for the Russian-backed pipeline, despite US and European opposition to its completion.

**8) China is fuelling South America's oil boom** OilPrice, 1 January 2021

Oil demand from China has been one of the few bright spots for a global petroleum industry severely impacted by a long-term global supply glut and the economic fallout from the COVID-19 pandemic.

The world's second-largest economy hunger for energy keeps growing despite the global COVID-19 pandemic and a resultant sharp decline in global economic activity during 2020.

Data from China's General Administration of Customs show oil



imports for January to November 2020 grew by 9.1% year over year to an average of 13.5 million barrels daily. The top five suppliers of crude oil to China during the period were Saudi Arabia, Russia, Iraq, Brazil, and Angola.

Despite weaker global energy demand, primarily because of the COVID-19 pandemic and related lockdowns, China's demand for energy is expected to continue soaring during 2021. Even recent oil discoveries, estimated to hold 1.5 billion barrels of crude oil and growing domestic oil production, will not reduce demand for petroleum imports.

A key reason is despite the fallout from the pandemic sharply impacting the economic performance of many countries around the world, China's economy is returning to growth.

A fracking ban raises the risk of alienating American drivers and leaves Biden open to criticism that he's helping the likes of Saudi Arabia and Russia.

There are two basic routes to an energy transition: encouraging new forms and discouraging old ones. President Joe Biden's legislative agenda, centered on stimulus spending, will focus on the former. His executive agenda has moved swiftly on the latter already. But in targeting the oil and gas business, Biden's eyes appear fixed on the horizon.

Exploration and production stocks took fright at Biden's 60-day freeze of new federal leases and permits for drilling. The fear is that this tees up a bigger move as soon as this week: a "fracking ban," or outright end to new leasing and permitting for federal areas, which account for about



a quarter of current U.S. oil production and roughly a tenth of its natural gas.

The freeze certainly raises that possibility. And it should be set alongside Biden's other energy-related orders from last week <u>targeting</u> the Keystone XL pipeline and the revival of social-cost calculations for greenhouse gases in permitting.

A growing segment of climate activism has coalesced around a strategy of choking off funding for oil and gas. One method is pressuring money managers to <u>divest from the sector</u>. Two others are delay and doubt. The first erodes an investment's value via the magic of the time value of money. The second does it by raising the cost of capital going in; if something looks riskier, it must clear a higher hurdle before anyone cuts a check to finance it. [...]

On the other side, Biden is taking big risks of his own. Curbing drilling and pipeline construction limits oil and gas supply, putting upward pressure on prices (especially if Biden gets his big stimulus package approved). Indeed, any oil company without exposure to federal lands (or Alberta) may benefit in the near term. This raises the risk of alienating American drivers and leaves Biden open to criticism that he's helping the likes of Saudi Arabia and Russia. Moreover, no state has more to lose from a federal fracking ban than New Mexico, which provided Biden with only five electoral college votes but also, crucially, sent two blue senators.

10) And finally: Boris Johnson's 'Green Revolution' in chaos The Guardian, 26 January 2021

England's much-hyped £2bn green homes grant is in chaos, renewable energy installers say, with some owed tens of thousands of pounds and struggling to stay in business.

Members of the public have been left waiting nearly four months, in



some cases, to take advantage of the scheme to fit low carbon heating systems. Some installers say customers are pulling out after losing faith in the green grants.


Boris Johnson touted the grants as one of the key programmes in his ten 10-point plan for a green industrial revolution. It aims to help 600,000 households switch their energy to low carbon and help the UK meet its commitment to reach net zero carbon emissions by 2050.

Ministers awarded the contract to run the programme to <u>ICF</u>, a large American consulting corporation based in Virginia. Details of the value of the government contract have not yet been published.

But renewable energy businesses say the administration of the grants is chaotic, inefficient, confused and is creating long delays for the public and installers. Emails from the administrators are being sent during US office hours; in the evening and late at night, making communication impossible, businesses say.

Companies involved in installing heat pumps and solar thermal heating say they are laying off workers and struggling to stay afloat. Some are refusing to do more work until they are paid the tens of thousands of pounds owed for work dating back to last autumn.



Recognizing the significance of <u>Day of Tears</u>, just last week the Arkansas House of Representatives and the Mississippi House of Representatives passed Day of Tears Resolutions in their respective chambers.

<u>Mississippi HC 19</u>, sponsored by Representatives Dan Eubanks, Becky Currie, and Brady Williamson, passed with a significant majority. It has been sent to the Senate for a final vote.

In <u>Arkansas</u>, <u>HCR1007</u>, sponsored by Representatives DeAnn Vaught and Jim Wooten (along with 63 co-sponsors in the House) and Senator Jason Rapert (and 17 co-sponsors in the Senate), passed the House with an overwhelming majority. This resolution is now before the Senate, awaiting final passage.

"Tomorrow will mark the 48<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Row vs. Wade decision by the U.S. Supreme Court. Since that fateful decision, 61 million babies



have lost their lives because of abortion. I am saddened every day when I think of this loss of life in a so called civil society. I am also saddened when I think of the mothers of these children, who for some reason, felt compelled to have their child aborted. I can promise you not one day goes by that these mothers hearts do not hurt for their loss. When I ponder what we have done as a society, letting 61 million children die in the womb, I wonder if we lost a doctor or scientist who could have greatly lessened the harm of COVID-19. Did we lose a president who could have led our democracy through perilous times? Did we lose a senator who could have proposed laws of justice and equality for all? A state representative who could have served his constituency? And how many Godly fathers and mothers did we lose? Then we hear daily about our economy. Think of the contribution 61 million people could make to the economic well-being of America. So every day, we need to remember these 61 million babies and ask the question, "What have we done?"

Both Mississippi and Arkansas have been leaders in protecting the rights of the unborn. <u>Americans United for Life ranks</u> Arkansas as the most prolife state in the nation, and Mississippi as the 4th most prolife state. 



#### What is reconciliation?

Reconciliation is a special legislative process created as part of the Budget Act of 1974. It is intended to help lawmakers changes necessary to meet the levels proposed in the congressional budget resolution.





Wanted to share with you the most recent update I have seen from the Department of Health and Senior Services regarding the COVID-19 vaccine.

As we have seen in many nationwide rankings throughout the COVID-19 pandemic, we expect rankings by state of vaccine administration to continue to ebb and flow as the difference in rates among many states is marginal. Currently, for instance, Missouri has the 10th lowest rate for new COVID-19 cases in the country with both PCR and antigen testing combined (6th when only accounting for the state's confirmed PCR-tested cases).

As of today, a total of 661,400 vaccines have been shipped to Missouri and of those 304,434 (46%) have not been reported or administered. To date, over 351,000 doses have been administered, and 4.4% of the eligible population have received at least their first dose of the vaccine.

State-enrolled vaccinators in Missouri have administered over 60% of the doses shipped into the state for their use. The limited allotments that our state receives continues to limit the rate at which people are vaccinated, but we have also become aware that some of Missouri's vaccinators have not been administering vaccinations as efficiently as we have been asking, but we are working with these providers to increase the speed at which they get vaccines into arms.

A large amount of the distributed amount sits with the federal pharmacy partnership which was activated to serve long-term care staff and residents. To date, unfortunately, the federal partnership has administered only 17% of those shots. 332,000 doses have been allocated to this program with CVS and Walgreens. Of those 211,400 doses have been ordered by the participating pharmacies, and 56,498 doses have been administered in 920 clinics throughout the state, based on their reporting.

The State of Missouri Interagency Vaccination Planning Team is responsible for determining where vaccines go throughout the state based on the limited amount of vaccine allotted each week to Missouri. The State places vaccine orders through federal partners on behalf of providers throughout Missouri who make vaccine requests through us, and then vaccines are shipped in the days following directly to the providers who vaccinate Missourians. The State of Missouri does NOT store or distribute the vaccines and ancillary supplies.

# EU sees carbon border levy as 'matter of survival' for industry

The EU's executive Commission is expected to propose its carbon border adjustment policy before the end of June.

"It's a matter of survival of our industry. So if others will not move in the same direction, we will have to protect the European Union against distortion of competition and against the risk of carbon leakage," European Commission Executive Vice-President Frans Timmermans told an online event hosted by consultancy Global Counsel.

"Carbon leakage" would occur if companies left Europe to avoid the cost of its emissions-cutting policies.

Globally, industry is under pressure to ramp up climate action ahead of a United Nations summit in November, which serves as a deadline for nearly 200 countries to pledge deeper emissions cuts.

If that meeting fails to deliver, the EU will press ahead with unilateral carbon border measures, Timmermans said.

The agriculture ministry was investing billions of euros to run pilot schemes on CO2 storage in humus layers and by re-wetting moorlands—"but this has to go hand in hand with a carbon border adjustment", she added. It's not a good development if the EU has a healthy and climate friendly agriculture sector but consumer habits remain the same and are met by cheap imports, she said.

3) Rich nations accused of inflating climate adaptation finance figures

Rich nations have exaggerated how much funding they provided to help the world's poorest countries cope with climate change impacts such as flooding and drought, according to analysis by charity Care International.

A close reading of 112 projects representing 13% of global adaptation finance in 2013-17 found the 25 donor countries collectively overreported the amount supporting climate adaptation by 42%.

Under the UN climate process, the developed world has committed to mobilise \$100 billion of climate finance a year by 2020, with a balance between mitigation (carbon-cutting) and adaptation projects. At the last count in 2018, they delivered \$16.8 billion in adaptation finance, according to the OECD – but if overreporting levels persisted, the true amount could be less than \$10bn, Care said.

"It really shows that rich countries are not as concerned about living up to their climate commitments as they should be," John Nordbo, report co-author and senior climate advocacy adviser at Care Denmark, told Climate Home News.

Structural challenges pose a threat to the competitiveness of Germany as a business location for the automotive industry, Deutsche Bank writes in a monitoring report.

Climate policy regulation of the automotive sector is triggering "the biggest structural break in the industry in decades," the author writes. Strict CO2 limits for new passenger cars in the EU for 2021 as well as



for 2030 mean that manufacturers will have to bring more electric cars to the market. The resulting increase in costs will likely have a negative effect on value creation and employment in the automotive industry in Germany, the report states.

The CO2 limits chosen by the EU for passenger cars and the subsidies for electric cars on a national level are "extremely inefficient (expensive) and hardly effective instruments" to achieve emission reduction in the transport sector, Deutsche Bank argues.



6) Climate activists defeated as legal bid to stop UK building Europe's biggest gas power plant fails

A legal challenge to the UK government's approval of a new gasfired power plant has failed in the court of appeal.

The challenge was brought after ministers overruled climate change objections from the planning authority. The plant is being developed by Drax in North Yorkshire and would be the biggest gas power station in Europe. It could account for 75% of the UK's power sector emissions when fully operational, according to lawyers for ClientEarth, which brought the judicial review.

In 2019 the Planning Inspectorate recommended that ministers refuse permission for the 3.6GW gas plant on the grounds that it "would undermine the government's commitment, as set out in the Climate Change Act 2008, to cut greenhouse emissions [by having] significant adverse effects."

Andrea Leadsom, the secretary of state for business, energy and industrial strategy at the time of the planning application, rejected the advice and gave the project the go-ahead in October 2019. The high court rejected ClientEarth's initial legal challenge last May.

The UK is under international scrutiny as it prepares to host a UN climate summit in November. The country has cut its carbon emissions by 41% since 1990 and in 2019 was the first major economy to put into law a commitment to reach net zero emissions by 2050. Boris Johnson produced a plan for a "green industrial revolution" in November.

But the government has been criticised for failing to stop a new coalmine in Cumbria, which it said was a local issue. This comment was derided by campaigners, and MPs warned it undermined the purpose of the Cop26 summit. Another, smaller gas plant is under construction by SSE in Lincolnshire.

Some of world's largest economies are still behind on greenhousegas reduction targets, five years after signing the Paris Agreement



President Biden's move to <u>rejoin the Paris climate accord</u> within hours of his inauguration was welcomed by world leaders, but meeting the U.S.'s commitments to reduce greenhouse-gas emissions promises to be challenging.

Mr. Biden has pledged to take significant steps to address what he has described as a climate-change crisis. He proposed to limit power plants' emissions in the short term and set the industry on the path to becoming carbon free by 2035. On his first day, he took steps to limit the oil-and-gas industry's methane emissions and he has vowed to boost electric-vehicle adoption by adding 500,000 new charging outlets by 2030.


Those actions could face judicial challenges and pushback from industry groups that represent certain fossil-fuel interests. Pursuing his agenda also will require Mr. Biden to obtain, in some cases, congressional approval or changes to tax law. His infrastructure package also could help re-establish the U.S. as a leader on climate



initiatives, but enacting this ambitious legislation could be difficult after asking Congress to approve considerable expenditures to fight Covid-19.

China and other nations have recently increased their <u>pledges to do</u> more to tackle climate change, and corporations are heavily investing in the technology needed to run the global economy with fewer greenhouse-gas emissions.

But global emissions continue to rise, and groups tracking progress question whether many of the countries that have signed the Paris agreement are currently on track to hit the targets they set to reduce their share.



# Story of Mammoth Survival Is in the Soil

Ancient DNA preserved in soil may rewrite what we thought about the Ice Age

One of the most popular theories for the extinction of the wholly mammoth and other so-called 'megafauna' that roamed the wilderness during the Pleistocene is the claim that rapid global warming at the end of the last Ice Age killed off these species.

The idea that global warming rather 'overkill' by human hunters was chiefly responsible for the disappearance of the mammoth has gained in popularity in conjunction with claims that humans today are facing the



same fate due to the same alleged catastrophe.

Paleontologists have been arguing for decades what may have caused these species to vanish. For much of the second half of the 20th century the 'overkill hypothesis' dominated the scientific debate, claiming that the post-glacial expansion of human populations into their habitats led to the overhunting and gradual destruction of these species.

With the rise of climate catastrophism, a growing number of studies attempted to show that global warming rather than humans were primarily responsible for the disappearance of these Pleistocene species.

Now, a team of <u>paleogeneticists have discovered DNA</u> of "about 2,100 kinds of plants and 180 animals—including American horses and woolly mammoths, in samples from soil dated to thousands of years after their supposed extinction."

Once this new discovery can be confirmed, the whole idea of an abrupt climate catastrophe wiping out the wholly mammoth and other Pleistocene species in one fell swoop is likely to go the way of the Dodo.



"A foundation claiming to promote environmental protection should not be founded by a fossil fuel project," said Theresia Crone, an activist who organised a protest and petition with more than 24,000 signatures against the foundation.

Revenues from the European Union's upcoming carbon border charge will be "recycled" to replenish the EU budget and finance the bloc's green transition, senior officials have said.





However, this won't be the main goal, they cautioned, saying the new levy must pursue environmental objectives to comply with WTO rules.

The European Commission's proposal for a "carbon border adjustment mechanism" will be tabled in June, as part of a wider package of laws aimed at cutting the EU's emissions by 55% below 1990 levels before the end of the decade.

"It's a matter of survival for our industry," said Commission climate chief Frans Timmermans <u>during an online debate last week</u>, adding that Europe will impose the levy on non-EU competitors unless they commit to lowering their emissions.

Timmermans said the goal is to avoid the risk of "carbon leakage," whereby companies relocate manufacturing abroad to countries where pollution costs are lower.

Although there is little evidence of carbon leakage to date, "the risk is real," said Mauro Petriccione, director general at the Commission's climate action department.

"And as we strengthen our climate ambition, that risk grows," the



official told an <u>online event</u> organised on 14 January by AFEP, the French association of large companies.

The European Union's proposed carbon border charge is essential to the survival of its own industries and the bloc will impose the levy on non-EU competitors unless they commit to lowering their emissions, the bloc's climate policy chief said on Monday (18 January).

Patrick Pouyanné, CEO of French oil and gas major Total, said putting a carbon price on imported goods was "a very logical extension of the EU's carbon price policy" and a necessary step to ensure a level playing field between EU industries and foreign competitors.

"It could be a protective instrument but also a proactive instrument in terms of reducing carbon emissions in other parts of the world," he told participants at the event.

The stakes are high for Europe's industry. According to a study by AFEP, the price of CO2 allowances on the EU carbon market are set to reach stratospheric levels in Europe as the EU tightens its climate goals, from around €30 per tonne of CO2 today, to around €40/t by 2030 and above €230/t by 2050.

Without a carbon border adjustment mechanism, EU industries would be beaten by foreign competitors in countries that do not have a similar carbon cost, Pouyanné argued.

France's's Foreign Minister Jean-Yves Le Drian warned the EU should be treated as a sovereign state as the bloc jitters over President Biden's return to the Paris Agreement.

Less than a week after President Joe Biden announced the return of the United States to the 2015 Paris Climate Agreement, his Special Climate Envoy John Kerry will join China's's Deputy Prime Minister Han Zheng, German Chancellor Angela Merkel, French President Emmanuel Macron, British Prime Minister Boris Johnson and other leaders at the Climate Adaptation Summit.

Ahead of the meeting, French Foreign Minister Jean-Yves Le Drian told France Inter Radio that France is not happy with the lessons learned from the Trump administration's era.

He said: "It will no longer be the same as before, because ... perhaps indirectly linked to Trump, the EU has gained self-confidence, the EU has grown, the EU came out of its naïveté.

"The Europe that is there now is not the same as it was four years ago." He added the EU "could have its own sovereignty".

The anxiety over the possibility powers will shift back between the US and China when it comes to climate geopolitics is palpable among Brussels officials.

One senior EU official told Politico last week: "Kerry will go around [to] everyone, [saying] we will give you money to buy American clean technology.

"Everyone is infatuated with John Kerry now but actually the Europeans should win the Nobel prize."

Alok Sharma, who quit as business secretary this month to devote himself full-time to the presidency of the COP26 summit, is said to be furious with Robert Jenrick, the communities secretary, for not stopping the mine in Cumbria.

On January 6, Jenrick formally refused to intervene in the £165m Whitehaven project to remove coking coal from beneath the Irish Sea for steel-making. Jenrick, 39, decided not to use his powers to call in the scheme, which would have given him the right to block it, instead telling councillors he was "content" for the decision to be made locally. A government source said Jenrick did not consult Sharma or other ministers on the plan, in line with planning guidance.



Work is likely to begin on the first deep coalmine for 30 years as the government tells other nations to slash carbon emissions. The Swedish climate activist Greta Thunberg, 18, said the approval of the mine showed that Britain's commitment to go carbon neutral by 2050 "basically means nothing".

The decision could complicate efforts to forge an alliance with Joe Biden's White House, which has described international action on climate change as a key foreign policy goal.

Householders buying brand new homes in the next four years are likely to find an unpleasant surprise awaiting them in the future: homes built today will have to be retrofitted with energy efficiency measures and low-carbon technology, at an average cost of more than £20,000.

The extra costs will amount to more than £20bn for the whole of the UK, if the government's targets of building 300,000 new homes a year are met. Critics say the costs could have been avoided if ministers had agreed to bring in low-carbon standards sooner.

The government this week set out proposals to change building regulations to reduce greenhouse gas emissions, but declined to bring forward its proposed future homes standard from the scheduled 2025 commencement date, disappointing advocates of greener homes.

Building a new house with high energy efficiency standards and a heat



pump instead of a gas boiler costs about £4,800 more than building to current standards. However, building to current standards and then retrofitting the house with the same would cost an average of £26,300, or about £21,500 more than installing the technology in the first place, according to an analysis by the Labour party of data from the Committee on Climate Change (CCC)....

All UK homes will need to be brought up to high standards of efficiency and equipped with low-carbon heating in place of gas boilers if the government is to meet its target of net zero greenhouse gas emissions by 2050.

5) Europe's welcome gift to Joe Biden: Norway awards oil and gas exploration rights to 30 firms

OSLO (Reuters) – Norway awarded 61 offshore exploration blocks to 30 oil firms in its latest pre-defined areas (APA) licensing round as it seeks to find more resources close to existing fields, Energy Minister Tina Bru said on Tuesday.

Norway, which began to extract oil and gas from its offshore continental shelf 50 years ago, believes it has still only pumped about half of its available resources.

Firms that won stakes in the licences included Equinor, Shell, Aker BP, ConocoPhillips, Total, Lundin Energy and Eni's Vaar Energi.

"These companies have shown great interest in gaining access to new exploration acreage, illustrating the industry's confidence in continued profitability from exploration on the Norwegian continental shelf," Bru said.

"The broad interest shows that companies still believe in the Norwegian continental shelf and in the future profitability of exploration," said Anniken Hauglie, who heads the Norwegian Oil and Gas Association, an industry group.

Sweden's Lundin received stakes in 19 licences, followed by Equinor with stakes in 17 licences, while Aker BP and DNO each got 10. ConocoPhillips received stakes in four licences, Total in three and Shell in one....

Norway has also invited oil firms to submit applications by Feb. 23 for 136 exploration blocks in frontier areas in the Barents Sea and the Norwegian Sea.



Last December, the country's top court dismissed a lawsuit by environmental groups against oil exploration in Arctic waters.

Norway is western Europe's largest oil and gas producer, with a daily output of around 4 million barrels of oil equivalent.

John Kerry, Biden's special climate envoy, warns a recent Net Zero pledge by China, the world's top greenhouse gas emitter, was "not good enough".

WASHINGTON: US President Joe Biden's administration next week will release more policies it believes are needed to tackle climate change and is urging China to toughen one of its targets on greenhouse gas emissions, his top climate advisers said on Saturday (Jan 23).

Gina McCarthy, the White House's national climate adviser, did not say what policies would be released. A memo seen by Reuters on Thursday showed Biden will unveil a second round of executive orders as soon as Jan 27 that include an omnibus order to combat climate change domestically and elevate the issue as a national security priority.

"We've already sent signals on the things that we don't like that we're going to roll back, but this week you're going to see us move forward with what's the vision of the future," McCarthy told a virtual meeting of the US Conference of Mayors.

Biden, a Democrat who took office on Jan 20, <u>quickly issued executive</u> <u>orders</u> cancelling the Keystone XL pipeline that would import tar sands oil from Canada and rejoining the 2015 Paris climate agreement.

Both of those moves reversed former President Donald Trump's



policies. During his four years in office, Trump rolled back about 100 regulations on climate and the environment as he pursued a policy of "energy dominance" to maximise output and exports of oil, gas and coal.

John Kerry, Biden's special climate envoy, said a recent pledge by China, the world's top greenhouse gas emitter, was "not good enough". In September, Chinese President Xi Xingping set a goal for his country to become carbon neutral by 2060, 10 years after the 2050 time frame favoured by most countries, while also pledging a more ambitious short-term goal on emissions.

As secretary of state under former President Barack Obama in 2015, Kerry helped bring China to the table at the UN climate conference in Paris. Now, the Biden administration has begun to apply diplomatic pressure on countries to work harder on climate, said Kerry.

Rep. Lauren Boebert, Colorado Republican, introduced legislation Jan. 21, 2021, to require Senate ratification of the Paris climate agreement. Her bill, which has 11 GOP cosponsors, bars Congress from appropriating funds to implement the international climate accord until it receives Senate ratification, a step that former President Obama skipped when he used his executive authority to enter the agreement in 2016.



"My bill prohibits Congress from spending a single penny on the Paris Agreement until this treaty is ratified by the United States Senate," said Ms. Boebert in a Thursday press release. "Joe Biden took an oath to uphold the U.S. Constitution. If he wants to keep it, he must transmit the job-killing Paris Agreement to the U.S. Senate for ratification."

The bill has little chance of passing the Democrat-controlled House, but the legislation has drawn attention to the debate over whether the Paris accord is an executive agreement, as the Obama administration maintained, or a treaty that requires the advice and consent of the Senate under the Constitution.

Mr. Biden, citing "a climate in crisis," signed an executive order Wednesday to rejoin the Paris agreement after former President Trump set into motion the process to exit the accord via his 2017 executive order. The U.S. withdrawal became official on Nov. 4.

"Unilaterally entering the Paris Agreement was wrong in 2016 and it's wrong now," Ms. Boebert said. "Responsible energy production supports more than 230,000 Colorado jobs. The Paris Agreement puts these jobs at risk and will increase energy costs. \$4 per gallon gasoline, here we go again!"

Ratifying a treaty requires a two-thirds vote of the Senate, which Mr. Biden would be unlikely to secure in the 50-50 Senate.

8) China's energy dilemma: between green pledges and blackouts Reuters, 21 January 2021

HONG KONG – China's President Xi Jinping has promised to turn the world's largest consumer of fossil fuels into a carbon-neutral nation by 2060, but that might make it harder to keep the lights on.

Widespread electricity rationing in December stoked fears of another



harsh winter for the country's households. A clunky grid monopoly is the culprit.

Reviving industrial activity and a coal shortage aggravated by bans on Australian imports combined to unbalance power supply and demand in many regions just as the temperature dropped. Some residents in Hunan province, for example, have had to use flashlights and work in unheated offices, local media reported, after the provincial government introduced usage restrictions. Chinese people have become accustomed to occasional shortages of power or gas in winter months, as local governments strain to meet emissions reductions targets. Xi's new plans may make such brownouts even more frequent.

Wind and solar capacity is supposed to triple from 2019 levels by 2030, but it might not solve the problem. China's total installed electricity capacity exceeded the annual maximum load of all provinces combined in 2019, yet outages occurred the following year. That's mostly thanks to China State Grid, a largely unreformed bureaucratic dinosaur from China's command-economy past.

The operator distributes electricity across 90% of the country, but unlike utilities in market-driven economies, it also dictates prices and volumes to generators and downstream buyers. This system it controls has long been inadequate at getting renewable power from rural hinterlands to cities, despite frenetic investment in ultra-high voltage lines and smart grid technology.

The windswept province of Inner Mongolia has been turning off turbines because the grid cannot absorb them. A group of investors complained to energy authorities in December that public-private projects to expand distribution capacity had been unable to integrate with State Grid's network and were losing money.

9) Germany preparing for electricity rationing to stabilise green power grid

Germany is now looking to ration its electricity supply to stabilize its green power grid. The European country mulled over the measure amid looming blackouts due to its unstable energy supply.

The country's energy issues have also threatened the stability of the larger European Union grid.

Germany once had one of the most stable and reliable power grids worldwide when the business of power generation was in the hands of engineers and experts. However, the rise of climate alarmism in the 1990s empowered activists and their political allies to push for "green energy." Fluctuating and intermittent energy supply could be easily managed at a low cost, they insisted.

Their efforts led to the passing of the Renewable Energy Sources Act (EEG) in 2000. As it turned out, the EEG's effectivity caused more harm than good to Germany's power supply. It currently has the highest electricity prices in the world, forcing it to rely more on imports. It has also consistently failed to meet its emissions targets.

Ironically, the German parliament has addressed these issues by relying even more on green energy. It has ordered the closure of the more stable and productive coal and nuclear power plants. Politicians in the country have also passed legislation to limit the amount of power consumed by companies and individuals.

## Germany's economic affairs minister proposes a law limiting power for electric vehicle charging stations

The magazine Tichys Einblick reported that Germany's Federal Minister for Economic Affairs and Energy Peter Altmaier proposed a law permitting "peak smoothing" for energy providers. Altmaier's peak smoothing law allows utilities to "temporarily cut off charging power for e-cars" when there is insufficient electricity available. Power utilities have demanded laws similar to what the energy minister proposed, given the instability of wind and solar energy sources.

SUVs are conquering the world. That's a problem for efforts to reign in emissions from the global transportation sector, which accounts for roughly 15% of global greenhouse gas emissions.

Share of SUVs in total car sales in key markets.



For the first time ever in the U.S. last year, sport-utility vehicles (SUVs) likely accounted for half or just over half of all vehicles sold, according to recent data from IHS Markit, a data and analytics firm. Others are rapidly catching up. Between 2010 and 2019, the share of SUVs in overall car sales in China jumped from 14% to 44%. In Europe the SUV share climbed from 10% to 36%.

The SUV's popularity is effectively negating the annual fuel efficiency gains from better technology and tightening fuel economy standards. The average fuel efficiency increases of light-duty vehicles per year has



slowed to only <u>around 1.3% in recent years</u> — down from the roughly 2% per year in the handful of years prior, and well below the roughly 3% needed merely to keep total global emissions from cars from rising.


"Consumer demand for larger vehicles has risen significantly," says a <u>report</u> released last year by the Global Fuel Economy Initiative (GFEI), a partnership between the United Nations, the International Energy Agency, and others. This "has led to a slackening – or in some cases even reversal – of national rates of fuel consumption improvements." [...]

SUVs are also harder to electrify than sedans and other passenger cars, presenting another challenge to reigning in auto sector emissions. Their larger bodies and powertrains require bigger batteries capable of pumping out more electricity.

Of the roughly 27.5 million SUVs sold around the world last year, only 1.8% were pure electric (excluding hybrids), said Felipe Munoz, a senior analyst at JATO Dynamics, an auto data provider, in an email. "Bear in mind that most of the current SUV offers do not feature pure electric versions, and the very few are quite expensive."

If they offer any electric SUVs, major automakers so far offer only about one apiece, a minuscule number compared to the array of traditional SUVs on offer.

Dear Mayor Hennessy, Councilman Bibbs, Councilman Kling, Chief Dupuis and Representative Hicks:

I have been dealing with Sgt. Weeke's from the O'Fallon Police Department and although he has been responsive he has been unable to find resolution to this problem as you can see from the emails below.

I'm contacting you today because this issue is having a significantly negative impact on my adult son, David Gould. David is 37 years old and has lived in Winghaven for the past 18 years. David has multiple disabilities and we were told he would never walk and never talk. However, he lives on his own with minimal support (about 30 hours a week), he votes, he works at Marriott Residence Inn and he is fondly known as the Mayor of Winghaven. David has accessed his community for all those 18 years through different motorized transportation, i.e. a scooter, a John Deere gator, and for the last several years, a golf cart. He was able to do this under Missouri Revised Statute 304.032 1: "No person shall operate a utility vehicle, as defined in section 301.010 upon the highways of this state, except as follows: (3) utility vehicles operated by handicapped persons for short distances occasionally only on a state's secondary roads when operated between the hours of sunrise and sunset". We did our research prior to purchasing these vehicles and prior to David choosing Winghaven as his home and it has been an amazing and enriching place for him to live. He has wonderful relationships that he has developed and a neighborhood that embraces him as a part of daily life.

However, it was brought to our attention this week via the O'Fallon police department that David can no longer drive his golf cart in his community. Apparently some time in 2019, the O'Fallon City Council passed ordinance 304.260 which is more restrictive than the state statute and now requires David to have a driver's license. It states: "no person shall operate a golf cart: a. Without a valid drivers license".

As you might imagine this would have a significantly negative effect on David, his community, and his family. In the spirit of finding a solution that would benefit everyone, I wondered if any of the following suggestions could be considered.

- 1. Could David's use of the golf cart be "grandfathered" in as he has successfully utilized this means of transportation for 18 years?
- 2. Could there be an exception to the current ordinance as noted in Missouri Revised Statute 304.034
- 1. "Notwithstanding any other law to the contrary, the governing body of any municipality may by resolution or ordinance allow persons to, operate golf carts or motorized wheelchairs upon any street or highway under the governing body's jurisdiction." or
- 3. Could the ordinance be rewritten to more closely model the state statutes?

I would really appreciate your assistance in finding a solution to this very important issue. My husband, David, and I are happy to assist in this process as it is an issue for David that needs immediate resolution. I have been a strong advocate for David for many years and it seems with good cooperation and collective thinking we can find workable solutions. I can't imagine given the highly postive impact of David's community profile and the great success that has been reported and presented nationally, statewide and locally on the rich and full life David has found in Winghaven, any of us would want this to become a public relations issue.

Mrs. Gould,

So here is the problem with that statute. Your son's Golf Cart is not used primarily for landscaping, or maintenance purposes as the state statute requires. And even if it was, by City Ordinance, it is still deemed a golf cart as that is how it was originally manufactured and thus subject to the golf cart ordinance. City Ordinances typically trump state law as they can be more restrictive than state law, but can not be less restrictive.

I'm sure this is frustrating for you and I would love to have a legal solution, but I have not been able to find any exception within our city ordinances that legally allow him to operate the golf cart.



I was reminded that all statutes are completely severable. I thought so, but had a momentary lapse. Here's the language that states that:

**1.140. Severability of statute provisions.** — The provisions of every statute are severable. If any provision of a statute is found by a court of competent jurisdiction to be unconstitutional, the remaining provisions of the statute are valid unless the court finds the valid provisions of the statute are so essentially and inseparably connected with, and so dependent upon, the void provision that it cannot be presumed the legislature would have enacted the valid provisions without the void one; or unless the court finds that the valid provisions, standing alone, are incomplete and are incapable of being executed in accordance with the legislative intent.

# Administration Announces Details on Public Health Emergency (PHE)

The Department of Health and Human Service (HHS) sent letters to the nation's governors on further details for the PHE for COVID-19. The secretary of HHS outlined that the current public health emergency was renewed on Jan. 21, 2021, and will be in effect for 90 days. It is been determined that the Public Health Emergency (PHE) will likely remain in place for all of 2021. When it is decided to end the declaration or to let it expire, the HHS will provide states with 60 days' notice prior to the termination. The PHE determination allows for flexibilities and abilities to streamline access of healthcare including for telemedicine services and waives or modifies certain Medicare, Medicaid CHIP and HIPAA Privacy Rule requirements. The PHE also allows for the continuation of the temporary 6.2% FMAP increase that was included in the Families First Coronavirus Response Act, with the FMAP expiring at the end of the quarter in which the PHE ends.





#### Background:

Confirmation hearings for Joe Biden's cabinet nominees, along with other official acts, have shown the administration's focus includes several areas of keen interest for both <u>American Jews</u> and supporters of <u>Israel</u>.

In response to a question from the <u>Bipartisan Task Force</u> for Combating Anti-Semitism about "an alarming increase in domestic antisemitism and…extremism," Secretary of <u>Homeland Security</u> nominee <u>Alejandro Mayorkas</u> cited his nine family members killed in the Holocaust. He also noted his work "battling antisemitism in all forms" with the Anti-Defamation League and the Jewish Federation of North America's <u>Secure Community</u>



<u>Network</u>. Together with the Dept. of Homeland Security and FBI, the Director of National Intelligence, <u>Avril D. Haines</u>, will conduct a comprehensive assessment of the threat from domestic violent extremism in the U.S.

Secretary of State nominee **Antony Blinken** confirmed his <u>positions</u> that Jerusalem is the capital of Israel and the U.S. should keep its embassy there. He reaffirmed <u>commitments</u> to the two-state solution and Israel's security, rejected the idea that Israel is a racist nation and applauded U.S.-brokered <u>normalization</u> deals between Arab countries and Israel. Blinken <u>agreed</u> that Iran is the world's largest state sponsor of terrorism, <u>recommitted</u> to preventing it from acquiring a nuclear weapon and promised to consult with Israel, Gulf allies and <u>congress</u> when seeking "a longer and stronger" nuclear agreement. A top U.S. military leader will <u>visit Israel</u> this week to discuss expanding Arab-Israel normalization to more countries and the likely reopening of U.S. negotiations with Iran over its nuclear program. National Security Advisor <u>Jake Sullivan</u> spoke about both issues with his Israeli counterpart last week. One Israeli news source <u>reported</u> the U.S. has already begun negotiations with Iran.

Mayorkas, Haines and Blinken are among the Jewish Americans President Biden nominated to key positions within the new administration.

#### **Talking Points:**

- Statements from several of President Biden's nominees, along with some official
  government actions, demonstrate the president's commitment to address the rise
  of <u>antisemitism</u> in the U.S., as well as maintaining bipartisan support for <u>Israel</u>.
  Both the president and members of his team have reaffirmed the U.S. commitment
  to a two-state solution, maintaining the U.S. embassy in Jerusalem, consulting
  Israel early before the U.S. rejoins any potential nuclear agreement with Iran, and
  reducing both antisemitism and violent extremism in America.
- 2. Early signs hint that, on some issues, Biden's team could continue policies pursued by the Trump administration while it may diverge on others. It is the privilege of all presidential administrations to establish their own strategies. Both the U.S. and Israel remain committed to strengthening the American-Israel alliance based on shared values and strategic interests.



3. Israel is a <u>rare</u>, <u>unifying issue</u> for Congress in today's highly partisan climate. The most recent <u>national platforms</u> for both <u>Democrats</u> and <u>Republicans</u> support Israel's right to self-defense, condemn the Boycott, Divestment and Sanctions (BDS) movement against it, and uphold the necessity of Palestinians and Israelis directly negotiating peace. <u>American aid to Israel</u> advances American interests and strengthens the prospects for peace in the Middle East – that's why it has been a <u>bedrock</u> of American foreign policy for decades, under both Republican and Democratic administrations.

#### Actions to consider:

- Urge your reps in Congress to support the <u>Anti-Semitism Awareness Act</u>, which
  would strengthen civil rights protections for Jews, Muslims and Sikhs based on
  actual or perceived shared ancestry or ethnic characteristics. These links can help
  you identify and contact your <u>senators</u> and <u>representatives</u>.
- 2. Encourage new and incumbent <u>senators</u> and <u>representatives</u> to join their respective chambers' Bipartisan Task Force for Combating Anti-Semitism.

#### Stories to watch:

- Iran: The Islamic Republic of Iran <u>lost voting rights</u> in the U.N. General Assembly, because it did not pay its dues. Former Middle East diplomat for Presidents Clinton and Obama, <u>Amb. Dennis Ross</u> proposed that instead of rejoining the Iran nuclear deal, the U.S. pursue a "less for less" agreement.
- Anti-Israel Covid vaccine conspiracy theory: WHO expressed "concerns" about vaccine inequity between Israelis and Palestinians despite Palestinian leaders having signed up to acquire vaccine does through WHO's COVAX program instead of requesting them from Israel. In an interview, U.S. Rep. Rashida Tlaib (D-MI) spread the false claims that Israel denies the Covid vaccine to Palestinians.




- California Ethnic Studies Model Curriculum: The latest version applies the
  labels of "whiteness" and "privilege" only to Jews and no other ethnic groups.

  Jewish advocacy groups in California continue to work on these remaining issues that have not yet been addressed.
- IHRA Working Definition of Antisemitism: This <u>feature</u> explores why some people and groups criticize the definition that is being increasingly adopted by governments, universities and institutions.

#### In other news:

- 1. Positive momentum from peace agreements between the UAE, Bahrain, Sudan, Morocco and Israel continues. Israel opened its embassy in the UAE and reopened its liaison office to Morocco after 20 years. A Dubai-Israel partnership launched a \$100 million debt investment fund for tech companies across the Middle East. The Palestinian Campaign for the Academic and Cultural Boycott of Israel will "exclude" Arabs from the UAE from its calls to boycott Israel.
- Georgia Tech adopted the internationally accepted <u>IHRA Working Definition of Antisemitism</u>. Its adoption settled a complaint that the university discriminated against a Jewish student by barring her from attending a "Palestine 101" event.



I think I may have found a solution for David's driving issue. Under Missouri Revised Statute 304.032 it indicates that a person who has disabilities can drive a utility vehicle: No person shall operate a utility vehicle, as defined in section 301.010, upon the highways of this state, except as follows: (3) Utility vehicles operated by handicapped persons for short distances occasionally only on the state's secondary roads when operated between the hours of sunrise and sunset;". Further 301.010 defines a utility vehicle "(70) Utility vehicle, any motorized vehicle manufactured and used exclusively for off-highway use which is more than fifty inches but no more than eighty inches in width, measured from outside of tire rim to outside of tire rim, with an unladen dry weight of three thousand five hundred pounds or less, traveling on four or six wheels, to be used primarily for landscaping, or maintenance purposed;". David's cart is outfitted, not for recreational golf use, but has the maintenance accessories instead.

I don't think the exception statute 304.034 covers anything except golf carts and motorized wheelchairs so it appears under the utility vehicle definition David can continue to drive his golf cart.

## Governor Parson Announces Mass Vaccination, Targeted Vaccination Sites Across the State

(JEFFERSON CITY, MO) – Today during a briefing at the State Capitol, Governor Mike Parson announced that the Missouri National Guard will begin assisting the Department of Health and Senior Services (DHSS) and other state partners in establishing COVID-19 vaccination sites across the state.

A mass vaccination team will be assigned to each of Missouri's nine Highway Patrol regions.

"The Missouri National Guard is once again answering the call to help Missourians in time of need," said **Governor Parson**. "The purpose of these vaccination teams is to support our existing vaccinators and provide an additional vaccination source for eligible Missourians that may otherwise have a hard time receiving a vaccine."

The Missouri National Guard is providing teams of Soldiers and Airmen to assist in establishing and staffing mass vaccination and targeted vaccination sites. The National Guard will also be deploying administrative teams to assist local agencies and other providers with data backlogs.

Missouri National Guard mass vaccination teams consist of 30 support personnel, who provide assistance in the form of traffic control, administrative support, and data input. Targeted vaccination teams consist of four-person teams with one vaccinator and three support staff to assist with administrative duties. Administrative support teams consist of three personnel to assist providers with paperwork and data backlogs due to vaccination entry requirements.

"We are proud to be a small part of the whole-of-government effort to provide the COVID-19 vaccine to our fellow Missourians," said **Maj. Gen. Levon Cumpton, Missouri National Guard Adjutant General**. "This effort is truly a team effort, led by DHSS and consisting of multiple physicians, hospitals, pharmacies, clinics, local governments and others."

A mass vaccination site is scheduled to begin this week in the Southeastern region, and other sites will be operational in the remaining eight Highway Patrol regions by the end of January. These sites have the capability to provide up to 2,500 doses per day, per team. More details concerning dates and locations will be released once finalized.

Targeted vaccination sites provide vaccines to populations outside the reach of mass vaccination sites, as designated by DHSS. Target vaccination teams will work with clergies and community leaders in the Kansas City and St. Louis regions to vaccinate vulnerable populations. Teams staffing these sites have the capability to provide up to 160 doses per day, per team.

Vaccine supply remains extremely limited. Current demand for the vaccine far outweighs the current supply that the state is allotted by the federal government. These mass vaccination and target vaccination sites will ensure that vaccines are being administered as efficiently as possible and that every Missourian will have the opportunity to eventually receive a vaccine regardless of where they live.







Hello Justin,

I NEED YOUR HELP!! My son is innocent and was wrongfully convicted. Judge John M. Torrence has agreed that my son was wrongfully convicted and has even made a ruling overturning his conviction because of his innocence. But he is still in prison. I am desperately hoping that you could give me a few minutes of your time to help right the wrong that the judicial system has done to our family.

My son's name is Victor Vickers. He was granted a new trial under Rule 29.15 after Judge Torrence ruled that Victor's public defender was ineffective for failing to investigate and call his alibi witness at trial. The State's sole witness to the crime initially told police she did not know who the suspects were. Victor had evidence to prove that he was at home during the time of the crime, but was aggrieved by an underpaid and overworked public defender who never took the time to investigate his case. At the end of this email, I will include a link to a video that thoroughly outlines the details of his case and shows his innocence.

The reason Victor is still in prison is because the local prosecutor appealed the judge's order that overturned his conviction, and Missouri Supreme Court Rule 30.17 is unconstitutionally prohibiting his release on bond until the conclusion of the State's appeal. Rule 30.17 is completely unconstitutional. It deprives my son of his liberty without due process. Victor's conviction was overturned in July 2020, and his liberty should have been restored at that time. Shouldn't he be presumed innocent until proven guilty? Isn't this the land of the free? I'm reaching out to you because you have the power to right the injustice that my entire family is suffering because of my son's wrongful incarceration.

Rule 30.17 provides, "If an appeal is taken by the State, such an appeal shall not stay the operation of an order or judgment in favor of the defendant. If the judgment of the trial court is reversed, the defendant may be arrested upon a warrant and brought before the trial court for trial or for judgment or for such other proceedings as the case may require. This Rule 30.17 shall not apply to an appeal taken by the state from an order in a proceeding under Rule 24.035 or Rule 29.15, but in such a case, if the defendant is in custody, he shall remain in custody during the pendency of the appeal."

The Missouri Constitution provides that, the Supreme Court Rules "may not change substantive rights," and "any rule may be annulled or amended in whole or in part by a law limited to the purpose." Mo. Const. Art. V, § 5. The last sentence of Rule 30.17 denies a petitioner the substantive right to due process. As a member of our Missouri Congress, you have the power to amend the last sentence of Supreme Court Rule 30.17 to conform



with due process. The first two sentences of the Rule support Victor's release, then the last sentence automatically denies bail with no explanation.

Victor was granted post-conviction relief under Rule 29.15. If he had been granted relief under Rule 91 (which is basically identical to Rule 29.15 with a few procedural differences), he would have been immediately released from custody. Rule 91.14 provides that, "[i]f the person for whose relief a writ of habeas corpus has been issued is charged with a bailable offense, the court in which the answer is to be filed shall set conditions of release pursuant to Rule 33." The word "shall" makes release mandatory for a Rule 91 petitioner, and there is no reason Victor should be treated differently.

Furthermore, under federal law, a prevailing petitioner in Victor's situation is entitled to be released immediately after their conviction has been vacated, even when the Government appeals the decision. See Rule 23 of the Federal Rules of Appellate Procedure. The U.S. Supreme Court has held that there is a presumption in favor of release for a prevailing petitioner in Victor's situation. See, *O' Brien v. O' Laughlin*, 557 U.S. 1301 (2009) and *Hilton v. Braunskill*, 481 U.S. 770 (1987).

"[T]he fundamental requirement of due process is the opportunity to be heard at a meaningful time and in a meaningful manner." *Conseco Fin. Servicing Corp. v. Mo. Dep't of Revenue*, 195 S.W.3d 410, 420 (Mo. banc 2006). The ending provision of Rule 30.17 violates due process because it deprives liberty without providing a chance to be heard. It just denies bail with no explanation, and for no legitimate reason.

So my question is...would you support a bill to amend Rule 30.17 by eliminating the automatic ban against release, and providing that a person in Victor's situation should at least be entitled to a bond hearing?

An amendment would have a minimal effect on community safety because Rule 29.15 relief is rarely granted. In addition, by requiring a hearing, such an amendment can still prohibit the release of defendants who are a danger to the community or a flight risk, while simultaneously allowing an innocent defendant to be restored to freedom after a judge overturns his/her conviction. Without an amendment to the Rule, an innocent man can remain in prison for additional years that he can never get back while a case is pending on appeal.

I am attaching the judge's order vacating Victor's conviction, and also a picture of my son so you can put a face with the name! I definitely appreciate your time and attention to this email, and I look forward to hearing back from you. Thank you!!

# Association of cannabis use with self-harm and mortality risk among youth with mood disorders

Cynthia A. Contanella and colleagues at Ohio State University, the Nationwide Children's Hospital in Columbus, Ohio, and West Virginia University examined Ohio Medicaid claims data of 204,780 youth (ages 10-24) with a diagnosis of mood disorders between July 1, 2010 and December 31, 2017. They were followed for up to 365 days from the diagnostic claim until the end of enrollment, the self-harm



event, or death.

The researchers found that cannabis use disorder was documented for 10.3% (21,040) of these youth. They conclude that "Cannabis use disorder is a common comorbidity and risk marker for self-harm, all-cause mortality, and death by unintentional overdose and homicide among youth with mood disorders. These findings should be considered as states contemplate legalizing medical and recreational marijuana, both of which are associated with increased cannabis use disorder."

Eef Lien Theunissen of Maastrict University in The Netherlands and colleagues at Goethe University of Frankfurt and the University of

Freiburg, both in Germany, studied the effects of JWH-018 on humans.

They find that a relatively low dose of JWH-018 results in acute psychomotor and cognitive effects in users.

A conversation about delta-8-THC with National Families in Action's Science Advisory Board

We received ads from Vida Optima (US) and Copper Mountain Hemp Traders (GA) wanting to sell us delta-8-THC gummies, candies, and vape cartridges. Puzzled, we wrote our Science

Advisory Board asking, "Is delta-8-THC real? Is it psychoactive? Is it legal?" Here's what they said:

Ryan Vandrey, PhD

Delta-8-THC products are becoming increasingly available and are sold in both retail stores and online. There is some confusion about the effects and legality of these products. Current evidence suggests that delta-8-THC is psychoactive and can produce effects that are very similar to delta-9-THC.



The legality of delta-8-THC is questionable due to competing language in different regulations. The Farm Bill explicitly states that anything derived from hemp, except delta-9-THC, is legal. The cannabis industry has latched onto this as justification that delta-8-THC products derived from hemp are legal.

The Controlled Substances Act (CSA) does not explicitly mention delta-8-THC, but federal drug law has an "analogue" rule that essentially states that structural analogues of illicit drugs are also illegal. Delta-8-THC is an analogue of delta-9-THC. So, in essence there are contradictory federal rules regarding the legality of hemp-derived delta-8-THC.

Independent of how legality is interpreted, consumers should be aware that these products have the potential to produce strong drug effects, cause impairment, and have potential for abuse similar to products containing delta-9-THC.

#### Marilyn Huestis, PhD

I agree with everything Ryan said. DEA considers delta-8-THC as an analog (which it is), and it is not legal, but the language in the Farm Bill is very problematic.

#### Mahmoud ElSohly, PhD

Just to remind everyone that the DEA final rule confirms what the Farm Bill says as far as hemp derived compounds other than THC but adds "unless controlled elsewhere in the CSA." Well, delta-8-THC is controlled, Schedule I, just like delta-9-THC. So, delta-8-THC is as illegal as delta-9-THC. No question.



#### FDA withdraws pending CBD enforcement proposal

The Food and Drug Administration withdrew its proposal to regulate over-the-counter sales of CBD. It had sent the proposal to the White House Office of Management and Budget last July, but withdrew it after the Biden Administration sent a memo to all federal agencies asking them to withdraw all pending rules, a pro forma practice of new, incoming presidential administrations.

#### How health groups defeated Juul's effort to rewrite San Francisco's ecigarette regulations

Dr. Stanton Glantz wrote a blog post about how the tobacco industry, like the marijuana industry, uses the ballot initiative process to take down measures regulators pass to protect the public's health.

In this case, the San Francisco Board of Supervisors was already the first US jurisdiction to have passed a total ban on flavored tobacco products (except tobacco flavor). It also defeated a \$12 million ballot-initiative challenge by RJ Reynolds to overturn it.



Meanwhile, the federal Food and Drug Administration required e-cigarette makers to obtain FDA authorization of their products before legally being allowed to market them. But by March 2019, no e-cigarette maker had submitted such a proposal, so the San Francisco board passed a moratorium on the sale of e-cigarettes whose manufacturers had not received FDA premarket authorization. Following RJ Reynolds' example, Juul, which is based in San Francisco, sponsored a ballot measure to overturn the board's e-cigarette ban.

Titled "An Act to Prevent Youth Use of Vapor Products," Juul's \$15.5 million initiative contained several poison darts, including a requirement that any law promulgated by regulatory agencies like the board of supervisors must first be confirmed by a costly ballot initiative in which voters must approve the law. In such a David-vs-Goliath contest, it's one thing for a multi-billion-dollar industry to sponsor a ballot initiative, quite another for a taxpayer-funded agency to match industry's investment to defend its regulations.

Yet voters defeated Juul's initiative by 82 percent. Dr. Glantz credits this victory with the private support of Parents Against Vaping e-cigarettes, or PAVe, who raised enough early funds to draw large donations from traditional public-health organizations. So, the battle became a \$15.5 million vs a \$7 million effort, but even with less than half the amount, the good guys won.

#### Epilogue

Last summer, California legislators passed a statewide ban on flavored tobacco products. Had Juul's ballot measure succeeded, public-health advocates feared its requirement that voters must approve regulatory laws via ballot initiatives would have applied to the statewide flavor ban. Now, the tobacco industry has managed to place yet another initiative on California's 2022 ballot to overturn the statewide ban on flavored tobacco. So far, this one is a \$21 million to zip battle (although the public-health community is like to contribute funds closer to 2022).





In 1973 the Roe v Wade decision legalized abortion by anyone, for anyone, for any reason, at any age, up to birth. The battle to protect the lives of unborn babies actually began even before the Roe v. Wade decision in 1973. Several states had passed laws legalizing some abortions. Pro-life groups and various churches were actively educating and organizing in the late 60s early 70s. The founders of Missouri Right to Life, then named Missouri Citizens for Life, actively traveled the state of Missouri to pull together these already existing pro-life groups into one organization. Missouri Right to Life began under its previous name officially in 1974.

Efforts in the beginning centered around a human life amendment to the U.S. Constitution. When it became apparent that that was a futile effort due to lack of support in other states, Missouri Right to Life actively lobbied the legislature to pass pro-life laws that would protect children and vulnerable women from an unregulated abortion industry.

During the late 80s and 90s, pro-life legislation was stymied due to pro-abortion leadership in both Missouri chambers as well as in the Governor's office in the 90s. Due to a change in leadership, since 2002, great strides have been made in pro-life legislation in Missouri.

The numbers of abortions steadily increased from 1973 to 1980 with our highest total in Missouri being 21,671. With a few exceptions, the total has decreased every year since 1980.



# The state of cannabis: Local scorecards provide glimpse into California's 'wild west' patchwork of cannabis policies

Getting it Right from the Start at the Public Health Institute has released 157 scorecards to enable Californians to see how well, or not, their new marijuana ordinances are protecting youth and supporting social equity.

The organization found that 157 of the state's 539 cities and counties allow storefront sales of recreational marijuana. Of those, 34 "went backwards on smoke-free air" by allowing onsite consumption. Only one, Cathedral City, taxes products by the amount of THC concentration each contains.

# Idaho senator pushes back on legalization with proposed

Idaho Senator C. Scott Grow has proposed an amendment to the state constitution that would ban "the production, manufacture, transportation, sale, delivery, dispensing, distribution, possession, or use of a psychoactive drug." The only exceptions would be drugs approved by FDA for marketing to the public.

The amendment needs the support of at least two-thirds of Idaho's House and Senate and then must be approved by voters in the 2022 election.

Senator Grow says he is offering his amendment because "Neighboring states have legalized controlled substances to the detriment of their children, families, and communities."







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# Governor signs executive order establishing central office for all things childhood

Yesterday, Governor **Mike Parson** held a press conference and was joined by the Commissioner of Elementary and Secondary Education **Margie Vandeven**, Acting Director of Social Services **Jennifer Tidball**, and Director of Health and Senior Services **Dr. Randall Williams** to <u>announce plans</u> for the new **Office of Childhood**.



The governor signed <u>Executive Order 2021-01</u> which establishes the **Office of Childhood** within the **Department of Elementary and Secondary Education**.

This move consolidates functions currently spread across multiple departments into one central office.

Today, <u>Missouri's early childhood is one of the least coordinated in the nation, ranking 45th overall</u> by the **Bipartisan Policy Center**. This fragmentation makes it challenging for the state to deliver programs and services and results in unnecessary hardships for children, families, and early care and education providers.

The **Office** of the Governor <u>created a one-pager</u> that explains why this move makes sense.


Aligned understands that a large portion of Missouri's workforce is made up of parents who need care for their children, before they reach school age and beyond, so they can maintain their own employment. We are not only investing in the workforce of now by supporting parents, but the workforce of the future, by ensuring our children enter school prepared to learn and succeed.

We will be working with stakeholders over the next six months to help ensure a smooth transition. The new **Office of Childhood** will become official on August 28th, 2021.



### Missouri News

#### Legislative Update

On Wednesday, despite a **COVID-19** outbreak derailing his plan to address a joint session of the General Assembly, Governor **Mike Parson** delivered his annual **State of the State** address. The Governor outlined his administration's response to the pandemic and gave an update on the state's vaccine roll-out. Following a recap of 2020, Governor Parson's speech focused on priorities for 2021:

- education and workforce development
- infrastructure, stronger communities
- health care
- government reform

Governor Parson also expressed his hope that the legislature will make COVID-19 liability protection and taxation of Internet sales (Wayfair) top priorities this session. The full text of the speech may be found here: <u>State of the State Address</u>.

#### **Budget Update**

This Governor released his proposed \$34.1 billion operating budget for FY2022 which includes \$10.5 billion in general revenue. The proposed budget is currently \$3.9 billion less than FY2021. Accordingly, both House and Senate committees began meeting this week to receive broad overviews of the various state departments and become familiar with the budget process. The House Budget Committee also met twice this week to receive an update on the CARES Act funding and how that is being distributed.

#### **Education Update**

#### **Charter School Funding**

On Tuesday, the **House Committee on Budget** conducted a public hearing on <u>HB 137</u>, sponsored by Rep. **Doug Richey** (R-Excelsior Springs). This bill requires charter schools and each school district to include an annual independent audit to verify pupil residency. The bill also requires school districts to pay for each pupil attending a charter school in that district based on the formula established in the bill.

The provisions include all state aid and local aid received by the school district divided by the school district's total weighted average daily attendance and all charter schools within the school district. The bill defines "local aid" to include all local and county revenue received by the school district and charter schools within the school district, with specific examples and exclusions specified in the bill. School districts must calculate the amount of local aid owed to a charter school monthly and make timely payments to the charter school as outlined in the bill.

The **Department of Elementary and Secondary Education** shall conduct an annual review of school districts' payments with measures for over and underpayment as outlined in the bill. This bill has a delayed effective date of July 1, 2022, and replaces the



current funding mechanism for charter schools, which will no longer apply after June 30, 2022.

The sponsor stated this legislation would <u>allow for more manageable cash flow for districts that already operate charter schools</u> and addresses equitable funding and the budget cliff facing charter schools.

<u>Testifying in support</u> were representatives from **Crossroads Charter Schools**, **Gordon Parks Elementary Charter School**, **Confluence Academies**, and a private citizen.

<u>Testifying in opposition</u> were representatives from **Kansas City School District**, **St. Louis Public School District**, **School District Administrators Association**, and **Missouri NEA**. Opponents noted specific tax levies in different school districts, which could make adding any additional tax levies difficult for school districts.

The committee took no further action on the measure.

#### **Aligned Priorities**

#### **Competency Based Education Grant Program**

The **Senate Education Committee** convened Tuesday afternoon to discuss <u>SB 33</u>, sponsored by Senator **Lauren Arthur** (D-Kasnas City). The bill establishes the **Competency-Based Education Grant Program** to provide fund to eligible school districts for the purpose of providing competency-based education programs. Additionally, the bill creates the **Competency-Based Education Task Force** to study and develop competency-based education programs in public schools for the purpose to identify promising competency-based education programs and obstacles to implementing such programs and requires the task force to report their findings to the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the President Pro Tempore of the Senate, the Joint Committee on Education, and the State Board of Education before December 1, every year.

<u>Testifying in support</u> were representatives from Excellence in Education in Action, Aligned, Associated Industries of Missouri, Missouri NEA, and Missouri Alliance for Arts Education.



No opposing testimony was recorded.

#### Show Me Success Diploma Program

The **Senate Education Committee** convened Tuesday afternoon to discuss <u>SB 34</u>, sponsored by Senator **Lauren Arthur** (D-Kansas City). The bill establishes the **Show Me Success Diploma Program** and creates an alternative pathway for high school students to graduate. Students will be able to earn the show me success diploma beginning at the end of a student's tenth grade year and requires the **Department of Elementary and Secondary Education** to develop detailed requirements for students to become eligible for the show me success diploma by July 1, 2022. The sponsor stated the intent of the bill is to provide students with flexibility and another alternative to earning a diploma.

<u>Testifying in support</u> were representatives from Excellence in Education in Action, Aligned, and Associated Industries of Missouri.

No opposing testimony was recorded.

#### Local Sales Tax for Early Childhood


The **Senate Local Government Committee** convened Wednesday afternoon to discuss <u>SB 123</u>, sponsored by Senator **Lincoln Hough** (R-Springfield). The bill would allow municipalities to impose one or more sales taxes for purposes to be designated by the taxing jurisdiction, provided that the total combined rate of local sales taxes imposed by a taxing entity that is an incorporated city, town, or village shall not exceed 4.5%; the total combined rate of local sales taxes imposed by a county shall not exceed 3.25%; and for all other taxing jurisdictions, the total combined rate of sales taxes in any given taxing jurisdiction shall not exceed 3.25%. Such limits shall not apply to transient guest taxes or convention and tourism taxes. During bill presentation, the sponsor indicated this bill is an ongoing work in progress and has been filed to initiate a conversation.

<u>Testifying in support</u> were representatives from **Aligned**, **MO Retailers Association**, and **Municipal League of Metro St. Louis**.

No opposing testimony was provided.

### Kansas News

#### Legislative Update

It was the first full week since the **2021 Legislative Session** began, and committees took advantage of each day to hear and act on dozens of bills. Lawmakers introduced <u>119 bills alone this week</u>. Monday marks the deadline when all individual requests for bills must be completed.

Education policy received considerable attention as bills ranging from education savings accounts to expanding dual credits to all students received hearings.

#### Kansas Promise Act

Education committees are looking again at the **Kansas Promise Act**, which Governor **Laura Kelly** vetoed last session due to the legislation's cost. The **Senate Education Committee** introduced <u>SB 43</u>, which creates the **Kansas Promise Scholarship Act**. This proposal would provide post-secondary educational scholarships for high demand two-year associate degree programs, career and technical education certificates, and other stand-alone programs. The **House Commerce Committee** introduced <u>HB 2182</u>,



a similar bill with additional language requiring schools to provide insurance coverage for high school students participating in job training opportunities. Neither bill has received a hearing.

Aligned supports the Kansas Promise Act and its sister bill HB 2182 as one of our legislative priorities.

#### **Dual Enrollment Bill**

The Senate Education Committee heard testimony on <u>SB 32</u>, a bill that would authorize school districts to pay the tuition for a student's dual or concurrent enrollment in a post-secondary educational institution and require a tuition waiver for foster children dually or concurrently enrolled. Several organizations testified in support of this bill, including the Kansas Board of Regents, Kansas State Department of Education, Kansas Chamber, Kansas Association of Community College Trustees, Wichita Chamber, Kansas Association of School Boards, Kansas Independent College Association, and Wichita Public Schools.

Aligned supports the Dual Enrollment bill as one of our primary legislative priorities.

#### Next week in Kansas

We expect the **House K-12 Education Committee** to vote next week on <u>HB 2068</u>. This bill would amend the tax credit for low-income student's scholarship program act to expand student eligibility. This bill is identical to <u>SB 61</u>.

The Senate Education Committee will hold hearings on the following legislation:

- <u>SB 63</u> expands the ACT college entrance exam and WorkKeys assessments to students enrolled in nonpublic schools.
- <u>SB 51</u> requires the state department of education and the department for children and families to publish a Kansas foster care children academic report card.

The **House Education Committee** will hold hearings on the following legislation:


• <u>HB 2039</u> requires students to pass an American civics test to graduate with a high school diploma.



• <u>HB 2119</u> creates the student empowerment act to provide an education savings account for academically at-risk students.



# Missouri Lawmakers Improve Conservative Ratings in New Analysis

# CPAC Host Releases Scores of Missouri State Lawmakers

Alexandria, VA—Lawmakers of the Missouri General Assembly voted more conservatively during the 2020 session than in years past, according to the just-released analysis published by The American Conservative Union Foundation (ACUF), host of the Conservative Political Action Conference (CPAC).

Review the scorecard to see the ratings of all Missouri state lawmakers and find out which votes ACUF scored.

The General Assembly's overall conservative score (65.5%) improved by five points compared to the 2019 session. Similar to the previous session, Republicans maintained an average score of 78.5%. Democrats (32%) improved their average score by nine points. While there was notable turnover in awards for conservative voting records, the total number of awardees increased by two members.

"State law once made Missouri a hostile place to run a business, making it that much harder for working families to earn a living," said ACU Chairman Matt Schlapp. "Thankfully, conservatives of the General Assembly have led the way on tort reforms and lifted unnecessary legal pressure from businesses of all





sizes. We applaud the Missouri General Assembly as they continue to climb in ACUF's conservative rankings of the states."

ACUF's Ratings of Congress and Ratings of the States are initiatives of ACUF's Center for Legislative Accountability (CLA). These ratings are designed to reflect how over 8,000 elected officials across the nation view the role of government while illustrating the differences between chambers of the legislature and revealing lawmakers' positions on a wide variety of issues that directly affect citizens.

ACU Foundation reviewed each piece of legislation voted on in both chambers of the legislature to produce average scores of each chamber as well as individual scores for each sitting member.

In August last year, voters approved an amendment to the Missouri constitution to expand Medicaid to persons from 19 to 64 years of age with an income level at or below 138% of the federal poverty level. That brings 230,000 new, able-bodied adults onto the state's Medicaid program. I strongly opposed this expansion of the welfare system. The reality is this – we have a broken Medicaid system. Expanding that broken system makes no sense.

There are many good ideas for reforming Medicaid. But for me, the foundational reform – regardless of expansion – is to adopt work requirements for healthy, able-bodied adults.

Over the past several decades, welfare reformers have embraced this essential policy change. Former U.S. House Speaker Paul Ryan embraced such reforms nearly a decade ago, noting "We don't want to turn the safety net into a hammock that lulls able-bodied people to lives of dependency and complacency." Under the leadership of President Donald J. Trump, the Trump administration – three years ago this month – issued rules that permitted states to develop work requirement programs or job training for those on Medicaid.

Once President Trump greenlighted this change, nearly 20 states moved to implement these reforms, only to see this critical policy voided by lower



courts. Fortunately, the Supreme Court early last month agreed to review the Trump administration work requirement proposal, which should be heard this spring.

Asking citizens to take more personal responsibility is nothing new in our state. Missouri has required those receiving benefits to have skin in the game. Participants in the Children's Health Insurance Program are required to pay premiums and prove they do not have access to affordable insurance. Elders and disabled that are above certain incomes must "spend down" income and have asset limits to qualify for assistance. Persons who qualify for medical assistance under Ticket-To-Work must be employed.

Medicaid work requirements have been introduced in the General Assembly in the past, but these efforts did not successfully complete the legislative process. With the new Trump administration program requirements, which bring important "guard rails" of only targeting able-bodied adults and exempting children, elderly, pregnant women and people with disabilities, my fervent hope is that we can create a workable program in 2021. As the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services Director Seema Verma put it, "People who participate in activities that increase their education and training are more likely to find sustainable employment, have higher earnings, a better quality of life, and, studies have shown, improve health outcomes"

But we have a couple of obstacles in our way. First, regardless of how the Supreme Court rules, we don't know what kind of conditions the new Biden Administration will put on these state waiver requests. But that unknown should not deter us from making good policy decisions during this year's legislative session.

And second, proponents of Medicaid expansion have argued that the amendment prohibits the general assembly from requiring newly eligible participants to have a shared responsibility for the benefits they receive. In short, they want participants to receive unlimited free health care with no strings attached. This shows how extreme the other party has become and how out of touch they are with everyday Missourians. Even Bill Clinton agreed to work requirements for people receiving Temporary Assistance for Needy Families benefits in 1996.

Their interpretation is misguided and wrong. What the constitution says is that "No greater or additional burdens or restrictions on eligibility or enrollment standards... shall be imposed... than on any other population eligible for medical assistance." It's clear to me that the state of Missouri can move forward with such a policy.

If you want to see the 800-pound gorilla that haunts Missouri's budget, you need not look any further than Medicaid. That's why reforming the Medicaid system requires reform of the whole Medicaid system. The newly eligible participants are now a part of the system. While we can't impose a greater



burden on those newly eligible, we need a system that emphasizes personal responsibility. When possible, participants should be required to share in the costs through premiums; should be required to be actively seeking employment and should have incentives to take responsibility for their lifestyle choices.

The choice is clear - we can expand a broken system or fix the entire system.

# Children and adolescents are shaped by early experiences - healthy development matters

Children develop in an environment of relationships that begins with their family, and their early experiences affect brain development. [i] A child's brain undergoes an amazing period of development from birth to age three, producing more than a million neural connections each second. [ii] In the early years, children's brains are creating neural connections to use for their lifetime. They are building attachment and self-regulation skills, which provide scaffolding for future experiences and growth. [iii] This creates a unique opportunity to promote healthy development and relationships as early in life as possible to produce better outcomes and decrease costs to individuals and society. [iv], [v] Early adolescence is another period of rapid brain development, during which youth are learning to regulate emotions, exercise greater executive functioning and experience greater autonomy.

We now know the part of the brain that governs decision making, abstract thinking, and problem solving is not fully developed until around age 26. During this period the brain is more wired for risk taking which can lead to an array of unhealthy behaviors and choices. Developmental science makes clear that adolescence is a period of life when young people can easily pivot from a positive to a negative trajectory, and back again. It shows also that relationships with family and caring adults are protective against various health risks and behaviors across all racial, ethnic and gender groups. Adverse childhood experiences can have negative effects on their health and well-being into adulthood. Such experiences include exposure to parental mood disorder, abuse or neglect, and family conflict and disruption.[vi],[vii] The impacts of adverse childhood experiences can be substantially buffered for children and adolescents by a stable and supportive relationship with a parent or caregiver.[viii]

### Promoting Healthy Development through Parenting Interventions in Primary Care

- Primary care providers, by virtue of their frequent contact with families, are well positioned to provide healthy developmental and behavioral recommendations to all children, adolescents, and their families through supportive parenting programs. They also identify healthy development risks in children and provide access to resources to strengthen parents' capacity to nurture their children when needed.[ix]
- Parenting programs provide families with tools to promote healthy child development and strengthen parent-child relationships to position all children and adolescents for greater success in life and positive health outcomes, with key effects of parenting programs persisting well into adulthood.
- Research has shown that evidence-based parenting programs for all families can prevent and reduce children's behavioral health problems (often emerging early in life). Such programs offer consistent benefits for child physical and behavioral health through adolescence and into adulthood.[x],[xii],[xiii],[xiii],[xiii]



• Cost-benefit analyses of data from the Washington State Institute for Public Policy identified 15 family-focused prevention programs that produced economic benefits above and beyond the program costs.[xv],[xvi]

## Policy Opportunities for Expanding Family-Focused Prevention Programs in Primary Care

- Allow payment for family-focused prevention programs in primary care through private insurance,
   Medicaid and the Children's Health Insurance Program in order to promote greater adoption of these family focused programs.
- Increase insurance coverage for these programs, in order to broaden their reach by allowing payment for:
  - Services delivered by trained and certified allied professionals such as psychologists, nurses, social workers, marriage and family therapists, behavioral health workers, mental health workers, community health workers, and parenting educators.
  - o Services without the requirement of a child disorder diagnosis.
  - o Services delivered to parents without the child/patient present, and as part of group settings.
- The flexibility described above would increase participation in family-focused prevention programs by helping to reduce the stigma associated with these critical services.[vii]
- These policy and practice initiatives can serve to make parenting education available, accessible, affordable and attractive to all parents and caregivers, and to substantially increase children's wellbeing in all segments of society.

During the COVID-19 pandemic, we have seen a significant increase in residential, medical, and commercial deliveries of various consumer products. While commercial drones are commonly used for these deliveries in China, Japan, and elsewhere, deployment of this technology in the United States has slowed due to a lack of clarity on federal and state roles in managing airspace.

The Mercatus Center's Brent Skorup and Connor Haaland recently released an updated 2021 <u>50-State Drone Report Card</u> that ranks each state's readiness for drone technology.

Skorup highlights how states can bring new services to residents, create jobs, and save lives by creating "drone highways" above public roads. Many states already retain the legal rights to the airspace above public roads, and they should utilize that airspace for the benefit of their communities.

**1.140. Severability of statute provisions.** — The provisions of every statute are severable. If any provision of a statute is found by a court of competent jurisdiction to be unconstitutional, the remaining provisions of the statute are valid unless the court finds the valid provisions of the statute are so essentially and inseparably connected with, and so dependent upon, the void provision that it cannot be presumed the legislature would have enacted the valid provisions without the void one; or unless the court finds that the valid provisions, standing alone, are incomplete and are incapable of being executed in accordance with the legislative intent.

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reach insolvency within this presidential term, and Social Security within the next decade. Allowing these trust func which would prompt sharp and sudden cuts – would create a serious and entirely avoidable fiscal calamity.

We must continue to put all the resources necessary into addressing the pandemic. But the earlier we can plan for and protecting our long-term economic and fiscal future, the better off we'll be.

For the last several years, Congress has relied on tax cuts and borrowing in a healthy economy to delay making at tradeoffs that come with good governing. Hopefully once the pandemic is behind us and the economy has recover administration and Congress will get to work on making the hard fiscal choices that have been put off for far too lot

Dear Mayor Hennessy, Councilman Bibbs, Councilman Kling, Chief Dupuis and Representative Hicks:



I have been dealing with Sgt. Weeke's from the O'Fallon Police Department and although he has been responsive he has been unable to find resolution to this problem as you can see from the emails below.

I'm contacting you today because this issue is having a significantly negative impact on my adult son, David Gould. David is 37 years old and has lived in Winghaven for the past 18 years. David has multiple disabilities and we were told he would never walk and never talk. However, he lives on his own with minimal support (about 30 hours a week), he votes, he works at Marriott Residence Inn and he is fondly known as the Mayor of Winghaven. David has accessed his community for all those 18 years through different motorized transportation, i.e. a scooter, a John Deere gator, and for the last several years, a golf cart. He was able to do this under Missouri Revised Statute 304.032 1: "No person shall operate a utility vehicle, as defined in section 301.010 upon the highways of this state, except as follows: (3) utility vehicles operated by handicapped persons for short distances occasionally only on a state's secondary roads when operated between the hours of sunrise and sunset". We did our research prior to purchasing these vehicles and prior to David choosing Winghaven as his home and it has been an amazing and enriching place for him to live. He has wonderful relationships that he has developed and a neighborhood that embraces him as a part of daily life.

However, it was brought to our attention this week via the O'Fallon police department that David can no longer drive his golf cart in his community. Apparently some time in 2019, the O'Fallon City Council passed ordinance 304.260 which is more restrictive than the state statute and now requires David to have a driver's license. It states: "no person shall operate a golf cart: a. Without a valid drivers license".

As you might imagine this would have a significantly negative effect on David, his community, and his family. In the spirit of finding a solution that would benefit everyone, I wondered if any of the following suggestions could be considered.

- 1. Could David's use of the golf cart be "grandfathered" in as he has successfully utilized this means of transportation for 18 years?
- Could there be an exception to the current ordinance as noted in Missouri Revised Statute 304.034
- 1. "Notwithstanding any other law to the contrary, the governing body of any municipality may by resolution or ordinance allow persons to, operate golf carts or motorized wheelchairs upon any street or highway under the governing body's jurisdiction." or
- 3. Could the ordinance be rewritten to more closely model the state statutes?

I would really appreciate your assistance in finding a solution to this very important issue. My husband, David, and I are happy to assist in this process as it is an issue for David that needs immediate resolution. I have been a strong advocate for David for many years and it seems with good cooperation and collective thinking we can find workable solutions. I can't imagine given the highly postive impact of David's community profile and the great success that has been reported and presented nationally, statewide and locally on the rich and full life David has found in Winghaven, any of us would want this to become a public relations issue.

Mrs. Gould,
So here is the problem with that statute. Your son's Golf Cart is not used primarily for landscaping, or maintenance purposes as the state statute requires. And even if it was, by City Ordinance, it is still deemed a golf cart as that is how it was originally manufactured and thus subject to the golf cart ordinance. City Ordinances typically trump state law as they can be more restrictive than state law, but can not be less restrictive.
I'm sure this is frustrating for you and I would love to have a legal solution, but I have not been able to find any exception within our city ordinances that legally allow him to operate the golf cart.

Under Missouri Revised Statute 304.032 it indicates that a person who has disabilities can drive a utility vehicle: No person shall operate a utility vehicle, as defined in section 301.010, upon the highways of this state, except as follows: (3) Utility vehicles operated by handicapped persons for short distances occasionally only on the state's secondary roads when operated between the hours of sunrise and sunset;". David's cart is outfitted, not for recreational golf use, but has the maintenance accessories instead.

I don't think the exception statute 304.034 covers anything except golf carts and motorized wheelchairs so it appears under the utility vehicle definition David can continue to drive his golf cart.







# Reconciliation 101 January 22, 2021

### Read the paper.

#### What is reconciliation?

Reconciliation is a special legislative process created as part of the Budget Act of 1974. It is intended to help lawmakers mandatory spending changes necessary to meet the levels proposed in the congressional budget resolution.

Reconciliation instructions are put forward as part of a concurrent budget resolution that is adopted by both chambers of instructions set cost or savings targets for the Congressional committees, with instructions covering mandatory spending changes. Following these instructions, committees of jurisdiction identify specific policies to meet these goals in the form which can be enacted on a fast-track basis.

Reconciliation bills are privileged in a number of ways, including a 20-hour limit on debate in the Senate, a non-debatable the bill, and a strict germaneness test for amendments in a process known as "vote-a-rama" that occurs after regular debatable.

Most importantly, the limit on debate time and non-debatable motion to proceed means a reconciliation bill cannot be filib allowing the Senate to pass a reconciliation bill by a simple majority, with the Vice President able to cast a tie-breaking votes to end debate.

#### How do reconciliation instructions work?


The budget reconciliation process begins with the adoption of a concurrent budget resolution in both chambers of Congre reconciliation instructions. The reconciliation instructions identify the authorizing committee(s) tasked with reconciliation, budgetary changes that must be achieved over designated time frames (usually the first year of the budget and the five-covered by the budget resolution) that the committee(s) must achieve, and the date by which the committee(s) must repolegislation.

Reconciliation instructions may also direct the House Ways and Means Committee and the Senate Finance Committee to change the limit on the public debt in accordance with the spending levels in the budget resolution.



While budget resolutions often assume and even suggest that committees include specific policies, these suggestions ar enforceable. The budget resolution sets dollar targets, but the committees decide how these targets are met, substantive jurisdiction.

If only one committee has reconciliation instructions, the reconciliation legislation reported by that committee goes directl floor for consideration. Often, instructions will span across multiple committees. In this case, each committee reports its the Committee, which in turn combines the individual bills into an omnibus measure to send to the floor for a vote.



# Can a reconciliation bill add to the budget deficit?

Reconciliation bills are allowed to either decrease or increase the deficit over the time period covered by the budget reso for a reconciliation bill to contain provisions with costs as well as savings, as long as the net effect complies with the reco

In 2007, the Senate adopted the "Conrad rule," which prohibited reconciliation from increasing deficits. However, the Cor the 2015 budget resolution (over CRFB's objections). Even without the Conrad rule, reconciliation legislation cannot add what is allowed in the instructions under the budget resolution, though there is no limit on how costly these instructions cannot add

Reconciliation legislation is also subject to a number of budget points of order. To avoid a 60-vote point of order, they mu spending and revenue levels in the budget and abide by the Senate "pay as you go" (PAYGO) rule, which prevents legis deficits. However, these rules can be changed – or exceptions added – in the budget resolution itself.



As with any other bill, deficit increases under reconciliation are subject to the statutory PAYGO law, which does not allow deficit over the course of a year or the following five-year and 10-year periods. An exclusion from the Senate PAYGO rule as part of the reconciliation bill would be subject to a 60-vote point of order.

Statutory PAYGO can be addressed in separate legislation, subject to a 60-vote threshold. In 2017, a December continui the same day as the TCJA removed the tax cuts from the statutory PAYGO scorecard. If PAYGO had not been waived, t would have been large enough to eliminate mandatory programs that are subject to the sequester.

Finally, and in many ways more importantly, provisions in a reconciliation bill that increase the deficit beyond the period c resolution are subject to a 60-vote point of order under the "Byrd rule" unless the costs are offset by savings from other p title of the bill.

# What is the "Byrd Rule"?

Although reconciliation bills are granted many privileges that are not available to most other legislation, they remain boun Some of these restrictions championed by former Senator Robert Byrd (D-WV) and established in Section 313 of the But referred to as the "Byrd Rule." The Byrd rule disallows "extraneous matter" from a reconciliation bill, including through the reconciliation legislation.

First, reconciliation legislation must only involve budget-related changes and cannot include policies that have no fiscal ir incidental" fiscal impacts, or that increase the deficit if the committee did not follow its reconciliation instructions. For exar to repeal and replace the Affordable Care Act (ACA), the Byrd rule prevented lawmakers from repealing the individual he or modifying rules on how much health insurance companies could adjust premiums based on age. Even though both po budgetary implications, they were considered "merely incidental" budget effects. Often, policymakers can identify workard example, while they could not repeal the individual mandate, they were able to reduce the penalty to \$0 and thus effective

Reconciliation bills also cannot change Social Security spending or dedicated revenue, which are considered "off-budget policies which indirectly affect benefits or payroll tax revenue do appear to be in order, however.

Finally, provisions in a reconciliation bill cannot increase the deficit in any fiscal year after the window of the reconciliation outside the budget window are offset by other savings in that committee's section of the bill. This means that while a reconciliation are deficits, it must maintain or reduce long-term deficits. Policymakers often achieve this objective through dates that sunset some parts of a reconciliation bill that may be extended later. Notably, the long-term deficit test does not interest payments or indirect effects on Social Security.

The Byrd rule provides a "surgical" point of order that strikes any provisions in violation without blocking the entire bill. He also be waived with 60 votes. Even though this point of order only exists in the Senate, it de facto governs the House too applied to any conference report.

#### How has budget reconciliation been used in the past?

In total, 21 bills have become law through reconciliation, including the 1990 Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act, the Bala 1997, the 2001, 2003, and 2017 tax cuts, and portions of the Affordable Care Act of 2010. Some of these efforts, such as Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Acts, have produced significant deficit reduction (each saved nearly \$500 billion over five such as the 2001, 2003, and 2017 tax cuts, have increased deficits. #### Can reconciliation be used for further COVID relief?

Due to the Byrd rule, a COVID relief package could not add to the deficit beyond the budget resolution window, could not and could not include policies that are non-budgetary in nature. In addition, COVID relief enacted through reconciliation vuse of discretionary spending.

Many COVID relief policies under discussion would easily meet these criteria. For example, a temporary expansion and  $\epsilon$  unemployment benefits, one-time rebate checks, an increase in Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) funding, or tax cred be enacted under reconciliation.

Other COVID relief policies could likely be enacted under reconciliation with some adjustments. For example, lawmakers states and dedicate resources toward the COVID response itself, but likely not through the discretionary appropriations u relief bills. Instead of new discretionary appropriations, reconciliation would have to rely on mandatory allocations or man funding.

A final category of COVID relief would have a more difficult time making it through reconciliation. Based on current rules unlikely that policymakers could raise the minimum wage or mandate that businesses offer paid sick leave through reconvarious rules and requirements for existing programs such as the Paycheck Protection Program might also be difficult to

Even in these cases, policymakers may be able to identify workarounds or persuade (or possibly even overrule) the parlipolicies as germane.

# Can reconciliation be used for other elements of President Biden's agenda?

Many elements of President Biden's agenda could be enacted through reconciliation. (See our comprehensive list of his here.)



In particular, nearly all of his proposed tax increases – other than changes to the Social Security payroll tax or some tax  $\epsilon$  would qualify.

Changes to discretionary spending would be more challenging to enact through reconciliation, though in many cases cou how the spending is structured. A major infrastructure package, for example, would likely need to be composed of manda provisions rather than new discretionary appropriations.

Permanent increases in infrastructure spending would be particularly challenging since the transportation committees has a relatively limited set of potential offsets, and the financing is typically under the jurisdiction of the tax-writing committees temporary spending increases could present some challenges, since infrastructure spending tends to take several years thus could increase deficits beyond the budget window even if allocated in the near term.

### Can reconciliation legislation include budget process changes?

The Byrd rule restriction against provisions that do not directly affect spending or revenues would prohibit most changes and budget enforcement rules. Most budget process and budget enforcement provisions do not by themselves change sprather apply to subsequent legislation that does affect spending and revenues.

As a result, provisions adjusting or extending discretionary spending limits could not be considered because the actual in spending would not occur until subsequent action on appropriations bills subject to the limits occurs. The Byrd rule also prevent the budgetary effects of reconciliation legislation from budget enforcement rules.

# How many sets of the reconciliation bills can be enacted?

Ordinarily, Congress enacts only one reconciliation bill each year based on the budget resolution adopted that year, althorous consider separate bills for revenue, spending, and the debt limit (separate revenue and spending bills were enacted in 15 However, this year it will be possible to enact at least two sets of bills.

Since Congress <u>failed to adopt a FY 2021 budget resolution</u> last year, they could issue one set of reconciliation instructio budget and a second by adopting a FY 2022 budget resolution later in the year. Republicans took this approach in 2017, resolution was adopted in January 2017 with instructions used to attempt to repeal parts of the Affordable Care Act (whic and a FY 2018 resolution was adopted in late October 2017 with instructions used to enact the bill commonly known as t Act (although the Byrd Rule was used to prohibit the law from officially being renamed that).

It appears possible that Congress could issue even more instructions by adopting a second budget resolution for each ye future years, although those procedures have never been used to enact reconciliation legislation and break from precede

# Where should we go from here?

Budget reconciliation can be a powerful tool to enact reforms of mandatory spending and revenues for deficit reduction. For policymakers should consider the size of the economic output gap they are seeking to fill, as well as the potential effects output, employment, poverty, household income, business stability, public health, and long-term growth.

Other spending, and especially permanent spending, should be fully offset in light of today's high and <u>rising debt levels</u>. It believe Congress should abide by the Conrad rule in force through the last Democratic use of reconciliation, offsetting the



over the decade. Ideally, they would go further and use reconciliation as an opportunity to put in place revenue increases slow the growth of debt over the long term.

There are many <u>options available</u> to enact budget savings, including trillions of new revenue and health savings propose and on a <u>bipartisan basis</u>. 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



I have introduced the <u>Smarter and Safer Missouri Act</u>, a constitutional amendment to be submitted to the voters which would legalize the use of marijuana for adults 21 and older. The amendment will keep a 4% tax on medical marijuana similar to the existing 4% tax and impose a 12% tax on recreational marijuana. Proceeds from the sales would be directed towards infrastructure (including broadband), veterans, and drug treatment programs. In addition, the amendment would require the immediate release of anyone serving a prison sentence for nonviolent marijuana-only offenses and expunge the convictions of people for nonviolent marijuana-only offenses.

I strongly believe that we, the members of the legislature, should take the lead and craft reasonable rules and regulations around legal marijuana sales in our state instead of out-of-state special interests who are likely to put an initiative on the ballot in 2022 if we do not.

#### RESOLUTION REAFFIRMING TENTH AMENDMENT RIGHTS

WHEREAS, the Tenth Amendment to the Constitution of the United States specifically provides that, "The powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the States, are reserved to the States respectively, or to the people"; and

WHEREAS, the Tenth Amendment was part of the original Bill of Rights, which was proposed on September 25, 1789, ratified by three-fourths of the states, and went into effect on December 15, 1791; and



WHEREAS, the Tenth Amendment limits the scope of federal power and prescribes that the federal government was created by the states specifically to be an agent of the states, rather than the states being agents of the federal government; and

WHEREAS, when taking the oath of office, all members of the General Assembly of [Insert State] solemnly swear that they will support the Constitution of the United States and the Constitution of [Insert State]; and

WHEREAS, many federal mandates are in direct violation of the Tenth Amendment to the Constitution of the United States and infringe upon both the reserved powers of [Insert State] and the people's reserved powers; and

WHEREAS, the United States Supreme Court ruled in New York v. United States, 505 U.S. 144 (1992), that Congress may not simply commandeer the legislative and regulatory processes of the states by compelling them to enact and enforce regulatory programs; and

WHEREAS, the United States Supreme Court, in Printz v. United States/Mack v. United States, 521 U.S. 898 (1997), reaffirmed that the Constitution of the United States established a system of "dual sovereignty" that retains "a residuary and inviolable sovereignty" by the states;

# Biden signs executive order to support reopening schools and early childhood centers

In light of this week's presidential inauguration, we are taking a quick look at executive actions and appointments related to federal education.



President **Joe Biden** signed an <u>executive order</u> yesterday to provide guidance on how to safely reopen schools and early childhood education providers for in-person learning. His goal is to have <u>a majority of K-8 schools open in his first 100 days</u>.

In December, then President-elect Biden announced he had selected Connecticut education Commissioner **Miguel Cardona** to serve as the next **U.S. secretary of education**, praising Cardona's ability to balance virtual and in-person learning. **Politico** published a more detailed report on Biden's decision.

This week, President Biden nominated San Diego Unified Superintendent **Cindy Marten** to serve as <u>deputy secretary of education</u>. Marten has decades of experience working in diverse schools where a high percentage of students qualify for free- and reduced lunch.

Also this week, the president appointed **Jessica Rosenworcel** as acting chair of the **Federal Communications Commission**. Rosenworcel supports net neutrality and extending broadband to every child in the country to close the homework gap.

#### Missouri News

#### Legislative Update



Due to a rise in **COVID-19** cases and security concerns over potential protests at the capitol, the House did not meet or have committee hearings this week. Despite the House's absence, the Senate did meet for Session and held hearings on numerous priority bills. On Tuesday, the **Senate Judiciary Committee** heard two bills addressing liability protections against civil lawsuits relating to COVID.

The **Senate Education Committee** heard a bill dealing with the expansion of <u>charter schools</u> and a second bill to establish a <u>state tax credit scholarship account program</u>, more details below.

On Wednesday, the **Senate Health and Pensions Committee** heard over half a dozen bills that would limit local health officials' ability to issue emergency health orders. A lot of that discussion centered on St. Louis County Executive **Sam Page** and his executive ordered COVID restrictions' economic impact. Finally, on Thursday, the **Senate Government Accountability Committee** held a hearing on a bill that would crackdown on illegal gaming devices. The state gaming commission does not regulate these slot machine-like devices, often found in gas stations, convenience stores, and liquor stores. Senate Pro Tem **Dave Schatz** has made it a priority to eliminate or regulate these "grey market" games.

Both the House and Senate are scheduled to be in session next week. However, the situation remains fluid <u>as a Republican senator tested recently tested positive</u> for COVID-19.


#### **Education Update**

The **Senate Education Committee** convened Tuesday afternoon to discuss <u>SB 23</u>, sponsored by Senator **Andrew Koenig** (R-Manchester), and <u>SB 25</u>, sponsored by Senator **Bill Eigel** (R-St. Charles). The legislation creates the "**Missouri Empowerment Scholarship Accounts Program**" and specifies that any taxpayer may claim a tax credit, not to exceed 50% of the taxpayer's state tax liability, for any qualifying contribution to an educational assistance organization for all tax years beginning on or after July 1, 2022. The cumulative amount of tax credits issued in any one calendar year shall not exceed **\$50 million**.

Additionally, SB 25 includes provisions regarding the expansion of charter schools. If passed, charter school operations would be allowed to operate, upon approval, in any school district located within a charter county and any municipality with a population



greater than 30,000. The **Missouri School Boards Association** says this will impact 61 districts.



The Missouri State Treasurer **Scott Fitzpatrick** provided supporting testimony regarding empowerment accounts, and numerous parents were on hand to support charter school expansion.

The Missouri School Board Association, Missouri School Administrators Association, Missouri State Teachers Association, and American Federation of Teachers went on record to oppose the bill, stating that money earmarked in the bill should go for existing statutory and budgetary obligations. Additionally, the current language does not provide any tax payer accountability in the charter provisions. They that they are not opposed to charter schools but believe the current system does not work efficiently.

The committee rolled SB 23 and SB 23 into a substitute for SB 55.



- Provisions relating to recall of school board elections.
- Provisions relating to term limits for state school board members.
- Provisions relating to the Missouri course access program.
- Increases to the tax credits allocation from \$50 million to \$100 million.

The SCS was adopted and voted do pass - 5-4 with Senators Elaine Gannon, Lauren Arthur, Greg Razor and Jill Schupp voting no.

#### Kansas News

#### Legislative Update

It was a busy week for the **Senate Education Committee**, chaired by Senator **Molly Baumgardner**. The committee reintroduced several bills vetoed by the Governor last session.

We are closely following the following Senate education bills:

## SB 32 - Tuition reimbursement for dual or concurrent enrollment

This bill lowers or eliminates college courses' cost burden for high school students wishing to take dual credit or concurrent enrollment courses.

#### SB 43 - the Kansas Promise Scholarship Act

This bill provide post-secondary educational scholarships for certain two-year associate degree programs, career and technical education certificates, and other stand-alone programs. This action failed last year mainly due to the **\$10 million** fiscal note.

#### SB 51 - Foster care children academic report card

This bill requires the **State Department of Education and the Department for Children and Families** to publish a Kansas foster care children academic report card. Governor **Laura Kelly** issued an executive order last session to implement this;



however, to ensure this law continues after Kelly leaves office, the legislature will need to pass a bill.


In the House, school choice remained front and center in committee discussions. To prepare for the hearing on <u>HB 2068</u>, the K-12 committee received a briefing on "school choice" on Wednesday. The **House K-12 Education Budget Committee** will hear HB 2068 on Tuesday, January 26th at 3:30 p.m.

This program provides state income tax credits for contributions to organizations that fund scholarships for certain children to attend qualified private schools. The proposed legislation makes several changes:

- Under current law, to be eligible, students must also be eligible for free meals. The bill expands coverage to those also eligible for reduced-price meals.
- Under current law, an eligible student must also be attending a public elementary school identified by the State Board of Education as one of the lowest 100 performing elementary schools with respect to student achievement among all public elementary schools or must be under the age of six and eligible to be enrolled in such elementary schools (unless the student has previously received a scholarship). The bill would change this to allow any free/reduced meal eligible students attending any public school in the state, not limited to the lowest-performing elementary schools. These changes would significantly increase the number of students eligible for the program. However, the bill does not change the dollar funding available to the program through tax credits, which are capped.
- The bill requires participating private schools to provide a link to the State Department of Education's webpage for certain accreditation and accountability reports. The link shall be prominently displayed on the school's accountability reports webpage.

#### Former Missouri education chair passes

Former State Representative Maynard Wallace, R-Thornfield, died suddenly at his home last Sunday according to an obituary from Clinkingbeard Funeral Homes. Wallace served in the Missouri House from 2003-2010 and chaired the House Committee on Elementary and Secondary Education in his final term. He also served on the State Board of Education for three years. Wallace spent 33 years in public education working as a high school basketball coach and many years as a school superintendent.

State Senator **Karla Eslinger** told reporter **Brian Hauswirth** from Missourinet that Wallace was a statesman. And I think that is definitely Maynard Wallace."

### **Public Works: Report a Concern**

### Why Report a Concern?

The City of Saint Charles is committed to improving our ability to address the concerns of all residents. We depend on YOU, the Citizens of Saint Charles, to help us keep our city functioning well. In many cases, residents are the first people to alert the City about concerns.

In 2020, over 1,600 concerns have been reported using *Report a Concern*. Over 96% of reported concerns have been resolved by City staff. When concerns are reported using Report a Concern, a record is created and the concern is routed to City staff for resolution. This allows the appropriate City staff member to respond sooner and deal with concerns right away.

### NIH study suggests using cannabis while trying to conceive may reduce pregnancy chances

Women who use marijuana and who are trying to conceive may have a more difficult time doing so than women who don't use marijuana. Sunni L. Mumford and colleagues at the Eunice Kennedy Shriver National Institute of Child Health and Human Development, a National Institute of Health (NIH) agency, studied a small group of women who were part of a larger study investigating conception in women after suffering miscarriages.



The researchers found that those who used marijuana were 40% less likely to conceive per monthly cycle than those who did not use the drug. Because this study involved a small number of women (62), the researchers caution that their results need to be replicated with a much larger group of women. However, they say women who are trying to conceive should refrain from using the drug during that time.

### Cannabidiol use during pregnancy affects the brain and behavior in adulthood

Nicole M. Wanner and colleagues at the University of Minnesota's Department of Animal Science and College of Veterinary Medicine conducted a rodent study that, for the first time, shows CBD use

during pregnancy and lactation may affect mood and cognition in offspring throughout their lives.

"Key findings of the study include:

- Chronic maternal CBD treatment increased anxiety and improved memory performance in adult female offspring, while males were unaffected.
- The effects of CBD during pregnancy persisted even though the offspring had no direct exposure as adults.
- Maternal CBD treatment shifted gene regulatory marks (DNA methylation) at hundreds of genes in the brains of adult female offspring.
- Genes affected by CBD were involved in the formation of new neurons and synapses, communication between neurons, and diseases like autism spectrum disorder, epilepsy and substance use disorder."



### AMA urges court to overturn medical cannabis ballot initiative

The American Medical Association has joined the Mississippi State Medical



Association in a friend-of-the-court brief urging the state's supreme court to declare the recently passed medical marijuana voter initiative unconstitutional. In addition to a dispute about legal jurisdictional issues, the brief argues that the initiative threatens public health and burdens the state's physicians.

Both organizations oppose legalizing marijuana for medical use "through state legislative, ballot initiative, or referendum process."

The brief continues, "While it is possible there may be beneficial medicinal uses of marijuana, numerous evidence-based studies demonstrate that significant deleterious effects abound" and "public health risks are immense." These include:

- Drug abuse and addiction
- Change in brain function
- Lung disease
- Intoxication and impaired driving
- Developmental interference
- Impaired cognition
- Psychological illness
- Cardiovascular abnormalities
- Negative social functioning effects
- Cancer

### Marijuana legalization bills introduced in Nebraska Legislature

Two Nebraska senators have introduced legalization bills in the new legislature this year. One would remove marijuana from state laws

The author of the second bill introduced a similar one two years ago and launched an initiative petition at the same time. However, the bill faced stiff opposition and the Nebraska Supreme Court struck down the petition because it violated a single-subject requirement for ballot initiatives in the state constitution.

### State has 30 days to notify cannabis businesses of billboard ban

The California Bureau of Cannabis Control has 30 days to notify marijuana business owners across the state they can no longer advertise on highways that cross state lines.

The bureau ruled in 2019 that billboards advertising marijuana could be advertised on state highways except within a 15-mile radius of state borders. But a father sued, saying that the bureau misinterpreted the intent of Prop 64, which legalized the drug for recreational use in 2016. The court agreed with the father and pot billboards are no longer allowed on highways anywhere in the state if they continue beyond state borders.

#### Update from the Statehouse

#### Friends.

Well, the legislature is fully in session, and we are conducting the business of the state of lowa. This session is already so different than past sessions. While at the Capitol, one of my favorite things is to meet constituents who come to the Capitol, and thus far, visitors are few and far between.

I never knew how much time meeting constituents and visitors took out of my schedule. Yet, it seems that even with a heavier committee load than normal I still have time on my hands, and that is not because things are slow at the Statehouse. This week was a busy one with committee meetings, sub-committee meetings, and finalization of the rules that will govern how the House will be run over the course of the next 100 days, or so.

I have already run several bills in sub-committee, and we had a floor debate in the House on January 20 to pass the rules that will govern how the House functions over the next two years. With all that activity it is still eerie in the Capitol with a quiet that I haven't heard before, especially during the session. The normal hustle-bustle of activity has been replaced with hushed conversations and people moving and footsteps being heard through the halls and the rotunda.

Many people have emailed or contacted me to let me know their thoughts on the legislative session. Some are appreciative that masks are not required, and some don't even know why the legislature is in session right now. I will tell you that regardless of your opinion on masks, being in session, or simply doing the business of the day, we have work to do in Des Moines. That work doesn't stop for a pandemic. In fact, the workload is heavier right now as members of the House have been working with the Governor's office to bring financial relief to businesses that were harmed due to restrictions placed by emergency proclamation.

The first round of relief will be directed at bars and restaurants that have had to bear the brunt of closures and social distancing efforts. There will be 40 million dollars available for these bars and restaurants based on the amount their business has been harmed over the course of the pandemic. This program will



be administered by the IEDA through an online application that has yet to be developed. These funds will be CARES Act money and will be distributed as early as February.

In addition, the House has focused attention on Parental Choice in Education, The Life Amendment, The Freedom Amendment, and many other bills. I am proud to say that we are moving a pro-conservative agenda once again and in the next few weeks we will have ended the judicial mandate that calls abortion a right. We will also have passed a resolution calling for lowan Citizens to vote during the next general election to add the right to own and bear arms to our State Constitution.

Despite the general quietness of the session, we have work to do for you, the taxpayers of lowa. I am proud of the work that we have done. So far the efforts will make lowa an even better place to raise a family, bring a business to, and a place to enjoy your life. I always have lowa's motto in the back of my mind to guide me through the session, "Our Liberties we prize, and our rights we will maintain."

Thank you for allowing me the opportunity to represent you and the values of Northwest Iowa. In my opinion, while Iowa is a great place to live, Northwest Iowa is the best of the best. This is all because of the people who live there.

# **Biden Starts Presidency With Flurry of Activity**

Following a swearing-in ceremony held at the U.S. Capitol on Wednesday, Joseph R. Biden and Kamala Harris today officially began their four-year terms as president and vice president of the United States.

Between a global pandemic, deep political divisions, high levels of economic inequality, and climate



change, the new administration certainly has its work cut out for it. As National Farmers Union (NFU) President Rob Larew noted in a statement, the agriculture industry is also facing a separate set of issues: corporate consolidation, chronic overproduction, an overdependence on exports, crumbling rural infrastructure, and an aging farm population.




However, the fact that Biden and Harris have "surrounded themselves with highly qualified and diverse advisors and staff" and "issued comprehensive plans outlining how it will tackle many of the aforementioned problems" is a good sign that they are up to the task, according to Larew.

The pair certainly did not waste any time getting to work. Following the inauguration, President Biden took 17 executive actions covering a wide rage of issues. Of particular interest to National Farmers Union (NFU) is President Biden's decision to rejoin the Paris Climate Agreement. The organization, which has long advocated aggressive climate mitigation, called the previous administration's move to withdraw from the pact a "shameful mistake." Larew commended President Biden "for approaching climate change with the urgency it deserves and prioritizing solutions from day one" and urged him to "build on this effort with aggressive, economy-wide climate action and ongoing global leadership."

The President also released the U.S. Citizenship Act of 2021, a comprehensive plan for immigration reform that he plans to send to Congress next week. Among other things, the bill creates a path to citizenship for undocumented immigrants, fast-tracking "Dreamers" as well as farm workers and other essential workers. This approach aligns with Farmers Union's official immigration policy, which supports bipartisan efforts that address the needs of businesses while protecting the interests of workers. Larew said he was "encouraged" by the plan, adding that immigrants are central to our food system and offering them a clear future in this country is "the very least we can do."

# **EPA Issues Last Minute Biofuels Waivers**



gallons. Another 65 waiver requests are still pending.

In its final hours under President Donald Trump's jurisdiction, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) issued three waivers exempting oil refineries from their obligations under the Renewable Fuel Standard (RFS) – two for 2019 and one for 2018. The agency said that the waivers will cumulatively erode demand for renewable fuels by 260 million




For the duration of President Trump's term, National Farmers Union (NFU) has criticized his administration's duplicitous approach to biofuels policy. While he publicly promised to support the industry, his EPA undermined the intent of the RFS, giving free pass after free pass to multinational oil corporations. Given this context, NFU President Rob Larew said that EPA's last minute waivers were "a surprise to no one," but they were still "deeply troubling." He urged the agency under President Biden's leadership to depart from this "drama and hypocrisy" and instead "show strong and unwavering commitment to expand the use of homegrown biofuels."

# Dr. Jewel Bronaugh Nominated to be Deputy Agriculture Secretary

In the days leading up to his inauguration, President Joe Biden rushed to fill several leadership positions across every federal agency. At the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA), he named Dr. Jewel Bronaugh to serve as his Deputy Secretary of Agriculture. If confirmed, she will be the first Black woman to hold the second-incommand position at the agency.

Dr. Bronaugh – who has been the Commissioner of the Virginia Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services since 2018 – has more than 20 years of experience in food and agricultural issues. During her career, she has also served as the dean of Virginia State University's (VSU) College of Agriculture; as the executive director of the VSU Center for Agricultural Research,



Engagement and Outreach; and as the executive director for Virginia's state USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) office.

In a statement, National Farmers Union (NFU) President Rob Larew welcomed Dr. Bronaugh's nomination, saying she brings "a wealth of experience and expertise" to the USDA, particularly in "farm programs, extension, education, and research." He added that as the first Black woman in the role, she "brings an important perspective to the USDA" that will help push the agency "several leaps forwards" in regards to racial and gender equity.

President Biden also selected other senior level employees at the agency, including Katherine Ferguson for chief of staff; Stacy Dean for deputy undersecretary of Food,



Nutrition and Consumer Services; and Kumar Chandran for senior advisor for nutrition in the Office of the Secretary.

The rumors are true: National Farmers Union's 119th Anniversary Convention will be held virtually!

In addition to being hosting online, the event will be structured a bit differently than it has been in year's past. Instead of holding all the educational events, panel discussions, breakout discussions, and policy deliberation



within a few days, we'll be doing our best to prevent Zoom fatigue by splitting everything up into several separate sessions over the course of a month. Every week from January 28 through February 26, we'll be featuring one education session. Then, on March 1 and 2, delegates to the convention will have an opportunity to discuss, amend, and adopt the organization's policy positions and priorities. This process will stream live for all non-delegates to watch. Here's what we have lined up so far:

January 28 - **Forming Cooperatives** with Erbin Crowell, Neighboring Food Co-op Association

To start with, President Biden followed the tradition of past presidents from both parties of including a message for Americans and the world in his inauguration address. His message on alliances was clear, declaring that the U.S. would be "the leading force for good in the world."

And lots to share down below in this week's GLOBAL GAB including Administration actions, players and nomination hearings, the 2020 budget finale, and the new and frightening details emerging on the global pandemic.

THE GLOBAL GAB: This Week in Washington

January 22, 2021

**DAY ONE.** The president's inaugural words to "repair our alliances and engage the world" were backed up by several immediate actions on the global front – including commitments to rejoin the WHO and the Paris Climate Accords and joining COVAX, a multinational vaccine distribution effort.

The very next day, **Dr. Tony Fauci** represented the U.S. at the WHO's board meeting and **said the U.S. "stands** ready to work in partnership and solidarity to support the international COVID-19 response."

In addition, the Administration:


Rolled out its <u>National Strategy for COVID-19 Response and Pandemic Preparedness</u> that included a focus on the international COVID response, calling "epidemic and pandemic preparedness, health security, and global health… **top national security priorities**."



- Signed an Executive Order to reinstate the global health preparedness office at the National Security Council.
- Rejected a rescission package of nearly \$17 billion for the State Department and USAID, proposed by the outgoing Administration, that would have frozen funds for critical programs, such as the global vaccine efforts, PEPFAR and McGovern-Dole food aid programs. While Congress would have surely rejected this proposal, the immediate unfreezing of these funds ensures these programs can continue to advance America's national interests and save lives around the world.
- And prior to taking office, Biden outlined a COVID-19 economic stimulus plan that endorsed the importance of a global response to the pandemic proposing \$11 billion in new international resources. Here is the <u>USGLC's statement</u> on why scaling up America's international COVID-19 response is essential to protecting our own domestic health and economic security.

All this becomes that much more important with the latest news announced by UK Prime Minister Boris Johnson today that the new UK strain of COVID could be not just more contagious but also more deadly – an important reminder that these efforts to bolster America's international response could not be more urgent.

**CONFIRMATION WATCH.** Ahead of Inauguration Day, the Senate began moving the top national security picks through the confirmation hearing process. **Secretary of State nominee Tony Blinken** testified before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee:



- On U.S. global leadership: "The reality is the world simply does not organize itself. When we're not engaged... one of two things is likely to happen: Either some other country tries to take our place... or maybe just as bad, no one does."
- On diplomacy: "As a general rule, we're much better off being at the table than being outside the room if we're going to try to influence those institutions and organizations and move them in a better direction."
- On China: "If we're pulling back from the world, if we're pulling back from the institutions, if we're pulling back from playing that lead role in shaping the rules and the norms, that gives [China] the free field to redefine the century more on their terms than on ours."
- On democracy: "Our charge is to put democracy and human rights back at the center of American foreign policy."



- On COVID-19: "We have a national interest... in doing our part to make sure that as the vaccine becomes available, we help get it out there as quickly and as effectively as we can." The risk if we don't: "The potential for a debt crisis among emerging economies... public health crises... state fragility."
- On diversity: "One of the things that I am determined to focus on, if confirmed, is on making good on building... a workforce at State that looks more like the country it represents."

Two other critical nominees spoke up on the diplomacy, global health, and development arena:

- Just confirmed Secretary of Defense Lloyd Austin echoed the sentiments of former Secretary of Defense Bob Gates during his confirmation hearing when asked about the importance of diplomacy to America's national defense: "I think it is absolutely important that the State Department be resourced adequately."
- Avril Haines, Biden's pick for Director of National Intelligence, told the Senate Intelligence Committee, "enabling U.S. global health leadership and positioning us to defend and detect future outbreaks before they become pandemics" will be a top priority.

**POWER UP.** Making it the earliest nomination for USAID Administrator in recent memory, President Biden named **Ambassador Samantha Power** as his pick to lead the agency. As a former U.S. Ambassador to the UN, she is an exceptional choice and another example of positive momentum for the global development agenda.

 Of particular significance is that the USAID Administrator will also become a formal member of the National Security Committee – something USGLC has been urging for years that will ensure development has a permanent seat at the national security table.

Biden has selected two of the country's top diplomats to serve in other leading cabinet roles:

- Ambassador Linda Thomas-Greenfield is the president's nominee for U.S. Ambassador to the United Nations, whose deep experience throughout Africa gives her invaluable perspectives on today's global health and humanitarian challenges.
- Ambassador Bill Burns, a member of the USGLC's National Advisory Council, is Biden's pick to lead the CIA. He has been a strong and principled voice for the importance of America's role in the world and brings a steadfast commitment to diplomacy and global development.

**BUDGET WRAP-UP.** Looking back on a long year, 2020 started with a proposal to cut nearly a quarter of America's civilian footprint around the world – and that was *before* the COVID-19 outbreak exploded into a global pandemic. Congress not only rejected the proposed cuts but provided a 1.5% increase over last year in the bipartisan year-end spending deal.

- In addition, the COVID relief package passed by Congress included \$4 billion for Gavi, the Vaccine Alliance a critical step in the right direction for the U.S. global response.
- Last year, over 200 House members from both sides of the aisle called for strategic global resources, most urging for at least \$20 billion for an economic and humanitarian response and support for programs that have a direct impact on our security and health like GAVI, the Global Fund, CEPI, and the



World Food Program. **And a third of Republicans and Democrats in the U.S. Senate** <u>called</u> for increasing these critical programs.

- In announcing the final year-end deal, global health was specifically called out as a priority in the summary released by Speaker Pelosi and Leader Schumer and House Foreign Affairs Committee Republican Lead Michael McCaul said, "More must still be done to address the indirect impacts of the pandemic, particularly the damage it's done to stabilization efforts in fragile states and on the food security of vulnerable populations around the world."
- Typically, new Administration's release their first budget proposal sometime in February or March.
   We'll be tracking their funding proposal closely, especially as global needs to fight the COVID-19 pandemic become more urgent by the day.

**GLOBAL PANDEMIC RAGES ON.** As new COVID-19 strains from South Africa and the UK crop up in the U.S. and the death toll continues to rise, **humanitarian leaders report that the global needs are "skyrocketing."** 

- The number of people going hungry increased from a record 97 million in 2019 to more than 270 million in 2020, according to the World Food Program.
- At least 24 million children are projected to drop out of school around the world, according to UNICEF.
- The economic impacts of the pandemic could push an estimated 5 million girls into marriage over the next five years, according to Save the Children.
- While at least 50 countries have started distributing vaccines, the director general of the World Health
  Organization has said that "low and most middle-income countries are not yet receiving the vaccine."
- Since the start of the global pandemic, at least 14 vaccination campaigns against polio, measles, cholera, human papillomavirus, yellow fever, and meningitis have been postponed, delaying immunization to more than 13.5 million people in 13 of the world's least-developed countries.

Biden Administration Takes Executive Action on Food Security, Immigration Reform, Climate Change, and Farm Debt Relief





Following his inauguration last Wednesday, President Joe Biden has wasted no time implementing his agenda. In the last week, he has issued more than three dozen executive orders, proclamations, and memoranda on a wide range of issues.

Many of these actions have implications for agriculture. Here's a

brief summary of what they mean:

Climate Change

On his first day in office, President Biden announced that the United States will rejoin the Paris Climate Agreement. The voluntary agreement sets benchmarks for each participant around reducing greenhouse gas emissions, increasing renewable energy, and increasing energy efficiency with the ultimate goal of keeping "a global temperature rise this century well below 2 degrees Celsius above pre-industrial levels." (Read NFU's response here.)

A week later, Biden issued two executive orders and a memorandum outlining actions his administration will take to cut greenhouse gas emissions, conserve natural resources, invest in renewable energy, advance environmental justice, and protect climate research. Among other things, the plan prioritizes increasing carbon sequestration in the agriculture sector and directs the Secretary of Agriculture to solicit input from farmers and other stakeholders "on how to use federal programs to encourage adoption of climate-smart agricultural practices that produce verifiable carbon reductions and sequestrations and create new sources of income and jobs for rural Americans." (NFU's response.)

**Immigration** 

One of Biden's first acts as president was announcing a comprehensive plan for immigration reform. In addition to addressing the causes of migration and modernizing border control, the proposal would strengthen protections for immigrant workers and allow undocumented residents to create a path to citizenship for undocumented residents, fast-tracking "Dreamers," temporary protect status (TPS) holders, and farm workers. (NFU's response.)

**Food Security** 


To respond to the financial pressures Americans are facing as a result of the pandemic, President Biden issued an order offering relief, including nutrition assistance. The plan would extend a 15 percent boost in Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits, increase food assistance for families missing



meals due to school closures, invest \$3 billion to help women and children access food, and allow states to increase SNAP emergency allotments for the lowest income Americans. On top of that, it instructs the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) to reassess its metrics for determining SNAP benefit levels. (NFU's response.)

#### **USDA Offers Debt Relief to Farmers**

To ease mounting financial pressures, the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) announced that it will temporarily suspend past-due debt collections and foreclosures for farmers borrowing under the Farm Storage Facility Loan and the Direct Farm Loan programs. The agency also plans to offer greater flexibilities under the Guaranteed Loan Program, extend deadlines




for producers to respond to loan servicing options, and halt foreclosures and evictions that are already underway. Approximately 12,000 farmers, representing 10 percent of Farm Service Agency borrowers, will be eligible for this assistance.

National Farmers Union (NFU) President Rob Larew applauded the move, saying it will "help struggling farmers stay on their land and continue growing food for their fellow Americans." He noted that it will be particularly helpful to "beginning and historically underserved farmers" who "almost certainly do not. . . have the resources" to withstand several difficult years consecutively.

Farm, Biofuels and Environmental Groups Oppose SAFE Rule





An alliance of farm, biofuels, and environmental organizations filed an amicus brief in objection to the Safer Affordable Fuel Efficiency Vehicle (SAFE) Rule.

The rule, which was finalized in April, reversed Obama-era regulations that required 5 percent increase in vehicle efficiency each year for

light-duty vehicles. Under the new rule, the annual improvement was reduced to just 1.5 percent. Additionally, as it was in the process of finalizing the rule, EPA had requested information on octane levels and how they could be increased in accordance with the Clean Air Act, but ultimately failed to address these concerns.

In doing so, EPA both failed to account for toxic pollution from aromatic-laden fuel as well as ignored the important role that ethanol can play in improving fuel efficiency and reducing greenhouse gas emissions.

According to National Farmers Union, which is leading the brief, the rule will "increase the overall emissions from the U.S. transportation industry," and "delay and disincentivize the development and adoption of renewable fuels and cleaner, more efficient vehicles — all of which will erode air quality, contribute to climate change, worsen health outcomes, and increase fuel costs for consumers."



#### Revised Paycheck Protection Program Application Open, With Expanded Eligibility for Farmers



In mid-January, the Small Business Administration (SBA) resumed offering loans to small businesses through its Paycheck Protection Program (PPP).

Originally created by the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and

Economic Security (CARES) Act, the forgivable loan program was reauthorized, modified, and further funded by the most recent coronavirus relief bill signed into law on December 27.

SBA is offering PPP "first draw" loans for first time program participants and "second draw" loans for certain businesses that previously received a PPP loan. In some cases, it is possible for current PPP borrowers to modify their existing loan. Farmers or ranchers previously ineligible to receive a PPP loan because they had net negative income in 2019 are now eligible to apply using their gross income.

Applications will be accepted through **March 31**, **2021**. To learn more about PPP and to determine if your business is eligible, you can review Iowa State University's



extensive guide for the program. Lenders can also help you determine eligibility; to be matched with a lender, visit SBA's lender match page.



Students from any college are welcome to attend, but spots are limited to be sure to sign up soon!



College students: did you know that National Farmers Union (NFU) offers several scholarships every year to help cover tuition and books?

The application deadline for this year's scholarships is April 1, and winners will be announced on July 31.



This year, the following awards are available:

- Stanley Moore National Scholarships are awarded to Farmers Union members enrolled in a two-year or four-year college or university to be used for tuition and books. Several \$1,500 awards are available.
- The **Hubert K. JoAnn Seymour Scholarship** is awarded to one or two enrolled in a two-year or four-year college or university to be used for tuition and books. One or two scholarships of between \$1000 and \$2000 will be awarded.
- The Minorities in Agriculture, Natural Resources, and Related Sciences (MANRRS) Scholarship is awarded to MANRRS members or their children to cover tuition or books. One scholarship of \$1500 is available.




EVP and Chief Economist Jonathan Williams was featured this week in Splice Today on potential minimum wage repercussion for small businesses.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA)
Farm Service Agency
(FSA) opened signup for the Quality Loss
Adjustment (QLA)
Program on January 6.
This new program
provides assistance to producers who suffered eligible crop quality losses due to natural disasters occurring in 2018 and 2019.

Eligible crops include those for which federal crop insurance or Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) coverage is available, except for grazed crops and value loss crops, such as honey, maple sap, aquaculture, floriculture, mushrooms, ginseng root, ornamental nursery, Christmas trees, and turfgrass sod.

Additionally, crops that were sold or fed to livestock or that are in storage may be eligible; however, crops that were destroyed before harvest are not eligible. Crop quality losses occurring after harvest, due to deterioration in storage, or that could have been mitigated, are also not eligible.

Assistance is based on a producer's harvested affected production of an eligible crop, which must have had at least a 5% quality loss reflected through a quality discount; or for forage crops, a nutrient loss, such as total digestible nutrients.

The deadline to apply for QLA is Friday, March 5, 2021.



**Conservation Reserve Program Application Period Opens** 



Agricultural producers and private landowners interested in the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) can sign up for program until February 12, 2021.

The competitive program, administered by the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA), provides annual rental payments for land devoted to conservation purposes. New cropland offered in the program must have been



planted for four out of six crop years from 2012 to 2017. Additionally, producers with land already enrolled but expiring on September 30, 2021, can re-enroll this year. The acreage offered by producers and landowners is evaluated competitively; accepted offers will begin October 1, 2021.
