Dear Mr. Evers:

This is the Initial Agency Decision (IAD) to your Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) request to the Office of the Secretary, U.S. Dept. of Veterans Affairs (OSVA), dated March 16, 2020, and assigned FOIA tracking number **20-05075-F**. You requested: "All daily briefings or situation reports (or other similar updates designed to keep leadership apprised of breaking events) prepared for, or otherwise provided to, the leadership of your agency that contain information regarding the ongoing coronavirus outbreak" for Secretary Wilkie.

As a reminder, the VHA FOIA Office will separately process your FOIA request for records within the possession of VHA Executive-in-Charge Robert Stone.

OSVA has posted three thousand nine hundred eleven (3,911) pages of COVID records at https://www.va.gov/FOIA/Library.asp (click on the "Frequently Requested Records" tab). OSVA does not re-release already posted redacted records that are also responsive to your FOIA request.

Reasonable Searches Dated 3/27/2020, 4/8/2020, 4/29/2020 & 1/22/2021

On March 27, 2020, an OSVA FOIA Officer requested that the VA OIT office provide all responsive emails and calendar entries in its possession. On April 8, 2020, the VA OIT office provided responsive records, with an OSVA FOIA Officer to conduct secondary searches.

On April 29, 2020, an OSVA FOIA Officer conducted the following two (2) secondary searches through the email boxes and calendar entries of Robert Wilkie.

These aforementioned three (3) searches yielded two hundred eighty-five (285) responsive pages. OSVA considers approximately one hundred fourteen (114) pages marked as non-public HHS records as non-VA records.

Initial Agency Decision

After reviewing the two hundred eighty-five (285) pages, OSVA redacts some information with FOIA Exemptions 5, 6, and 7(E). 5 U.S.C. § 552(b)(5) exempts from required disclosure "interagency or intra-agency memorandums or letters which would not be available by law to a party other than an agency in litigation with the agency." The presidential communications privilege protects agency communications to or from the President or his advisers. Redacted information includes communication amongst VA and White House officials in response to the COVID19 pandemic, including non-public COVID19 data, COVID19 topics, discussion summaries, recommendations, pros, cons, background information, flu incidence data, chronic illness information, intra-agency coordination, union's positions, and talking points. Loving v. DOD, 550 F.3d 32, 37-38 (D.C. Cir. 2008) (Exemption 5 "incorporates" Presidential Communications Privilege, which protects "communications directly involving and documents actually viewed by the President,' as well as documents 'solicited and received' by the President or his 'immediate White House advisers'" (internal citations omitted)); Berman v. CIA, 378 F. Supp. 2d 1209, 1219-20 (E.D. Cal. 2005) (same), aff'd on other grounds, 501 F.3d 1136 (9th Cir. 2007); Judicial Watch, Inc. v. DOJ, 365 F.3d 1108, 1110 n.1 (D.C. Cir. 2004) ("embrac[ing] the definitional analysis set forth" in In re Sealed Case, 121 F.3d 729, 749-50, 752 (D.C. Cir. 1997), protecting documents covered by Presidential Communications Privilege); Amnesty Int'l USA v. CIA, 728 F. Supp. 2d 479, 522 (S.D.N.Y. 2010) ("all twenty documents reflect or memorialize communications between senior presidential advisers and other United States government officials and are therefore properly withheld").

Under the attorney-client and work product privileges, the VA redacts portions of records, emails, and communications between VA employees and VA/WHCO attorneys in response to the COVID19 pandemic, including non-public COVID19 data, COVID19 topics, discussion summaries, recommendations, pros, cons, background information, flu incidence data, chronic illness information, intra-agency coordination, union's positions, and talking points. The release of this information would impede the ability of VA employees and VA//WHCO attorneys to speak openly and frankly about legal issues in responding to the COVID19 pandemic, and preparing talking points for media interviews. The release of this information would also compromise the VA's legal positions for any lawsuits.

FOIA Exemption 5 permits an agency to withhold material reflecting the thoughts, opinions, and recommendations of federal officials reviewing issues. Under the deliberative process privilege and FOIA Exemption 5, OSVA redacts portions of discussions in response to the COVID19 pandemic, including non-public COVID19 data, COVID19 topics, discussion summaries, recommendations, pros, cons, background information, flu incidence data, chronic illness



information, intra-agency coordination, and union's positions; and talking points to phone calls with U.S. Senators or state governments or media interviews. The information contained in the responsive records is both predecisional and deliberative because it reflects preliminary opinions, proposed solutions, proposed options, proposed actions, proposals, and recommendations, which do not reflect VA's final decision. Exposure of premature discussions before a final decision is made could create undue public confusion. The release of the redacted information would negatively impact the ability of federal employees to openly and frankly consider issues amongst themselves when deliberating, discussing, reviewing, proposing changes to, and making recommendations on: responding to the COVID19 pandemic, and talking points to phone calls with U.S. Senators or state governors or media interviews. The information reveals the thoughts, deliberations, and opinions that, if released, would have a chilling effect on the ability of federal officials to discuss, opine, recommend or be forthcoming about the agency's issues which require full and frank assessment. Here, the disclosure of the withheld information is likely to compromise the integrity of this deliberative or decision-making process. Moreover, the predecisional character of a document is not altered by the passage of time. Bruscino v. BOP, No. 94-1955, 1995 WL 444406 at *5 (D.D. C. May 15, 1995), aff'd in part, No. 95-5212, 1996 WL 393101 (D.C. Cir. June 24, 1996); Access Reports v. DOJ, 926 F.2d 1192, 1196-97 (D.C. Cir. 1991) ("talking points" memoranda are predecisional); ACLU v. DHS, 738 F. Supp. 2d 93, 112 (D.D.C. 2010) ("'talking points' are predecisional . . . the document itself suggests that a public statement was anticipated at the time of its creation, and given that no official statement has yet been made, the talking points remain ripe recommendations that are ready for adoption or rejection by the Department"): Sec. Fin. Life Ins. Co., No. 03-102-SBC, 2005 WL 839543, at *11 (D.D.C. Apr. 12, 2005) ("The undisputed evidence establishes that these [talking points] are deliberative."); Judicial Watch, Inc. v. U.S. Dep't of Commerce, 337 F. Supp. 2d 146, 174 (D.D.C. 2004) (protecting "talking points" and recommendations on how to answer questions); St. Louis Sewer Dist., No. 10-2103, at *18 (E.D. Mo. Mar. 2, 2012) (protecting e-mail communications, "press releases, talking points and 'Q & A." drafts, and briefing materials); Citizens for Responsibility & Ethics in Wash. v. DHS, 514 F. Supp. 2d 36, 44 (D.D.C. 2007) (protecting briefing materials concerning Hurricane Katrina response including proposed "solutions and approaches"); Judicial Watch, Inc. v. DOE, 310 F. Supp. 2d 271, 317 (D.D.C. 2004) (protecting briefing materials for Secretary of the Interior), aff'd in part, rev'd in part on other grounds & remanded, 412 F.3d 125, 133 (D.C. Cir. 2005); Klunzinger v. IRS, 27 F. Supp. 2d 1015, 1026 (W.D. 1998) (protecting paper to brief commissioner for meeting); Thompson v. Dep't of the Navy, No. 95-347, 1997 WL 527344, at *4 (D.D.C. Aug. 18, 1997) (protecting materials to brief senior officials responding to media inquiries, as "disclosure of materials reflecting the process by which the Navy formulates its policy concerning statements to and interactions with the press" could stifle frank communication within the agency), aff'd, No. 97-5292, 1998 WL 202253, at *1 (D.C. Cir. Mar. 11, 1998) (per curiam); Williams v. DOJ, 556 F. Supp. 63, 65 (D.D.C. 1982) (protecting "briefing papers prepared for the Attorney General prior to an appearance before a congressional committee").

5 U.S.C. § 552(b)(6) exempts from required disclosure "personnel and medical files and similar files the disclosure of which would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy." FOIA Exemption 6 permits VA to withhold a document or information within a document if disclosure of the information, either by itself or in conjunction with other information available to either the public or the FOIA requester, would result in an unwarranted invasion of an individual's personal privacy without contributing significantly to the public's understanding of the activities of the federal government. Specifically, the information being withheld, as indicated on the attached documents, under FOIA Exemption 6, consists of names, identities,

personal addresses, seating room locations, email addresses, phone numbers, cellular numbers, and facsimile numbers of: federal employees, state government employees, Congressional employees, veterans, and private citizens. Federal employees, state government employees, Congressional employees, veterans, and private citizens retain a significant privacy interest under certain circumstances, such as in instances where the release of their information could represent a threat to their well-being, harassment, or their ability to function within their sphere of employment. However, VA releases the names of VA Senior Executives and reporters. The federal employees, veterans, and private citizens whose information is at issue have a substantial privacy interest in their personal information. In weighing the private versus the public interest, we find that there is no public interest in knowing names, identities, personal addresses, seating room locations, email addresses, phone numbers, cellular numbers, and facsimile numbers of: federal employees, state government employees, Congressional employees, veterans, and private citizens. The coverage of FOIA Exemption 6 is absolute unless the FOIA requester can demonstrate a countervailing public interest in the requested information by demonstrating that the FOIA requester is in a position to provide the requested information to members of the general public and that the information requested contributes significantly to the public's understanding of the activities of the Federal government. Additionally, the requester must demonstrate how the public's need to understand the information significantly outweighs the privacy interest of the person to whom the information pertains. Upon consideration of the records, I have not been able to identify a countervailing public interest of sufficient magnitude to outweigh the privacy interest of the individuals whose names are redacted. The protected information has been redacted and (b)(6) inserted. "Withholding a telephone number or e-mail address, alone, is not sufficient to protect that [privacy] interest; alternate means of contacting and harassing these employees would be readily discoverable on the Internet if this court ordered their names disclosed." Long v. Immigration & Customs Enf't, 2017 U.S. Dist. LEXIS 160719 (D.C. Cir. 2017).

5 U.S.C. § 552(b)(7)(E) exempts from required disclosure information that "would disclose techniques and procedures for law enforcement investigations or prosecutions, or would disclose guidelines for law enforcement investigations or prosecutions if such disclosure could reasonably be expected to risk circumvention of the law." Redacted information includes strategies the government uses to secure borders, to defend the nation with legal or military strategies, and prevent COVID transmission, and law enforcement or military response to the COVID19 pandemic. The release of this information would risk circumvention of the law with respect to unauthorized entry, compromising the strategies and duties of law enforcement and military personnel, and COVID prevention. Redacted information also includes the room numbers of VA police officers, law enforcement and military personnel, and White House employees with security clearances in secured government buildings. Within these rooms are where those people work, gather, and plan their law enforcement or national security or border security or defense operations. The release of this information would risk impersonation, targeting, or violence against the health and safety of: VA police officers, White House employees with security clearances, military members, and those they are charged with protecting.

FOIA Mediation

The coronavirus (COVID-19) is making its way across the globe, with over 110,000 confirmed cases worldwide and over 3,800 deaths. France, Germany, Iran, Italy, Japan, South Korea, and the US are at the forefront of the pandemic. On Friday, Congress passed an \$8 billion bipartisan emergency bill to combat the coronavirus outbreak. The bill allocates money toward supplies and protective equipment, funding for state and local health departments, and vaccine development. Last week, President Trump visited the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) in Atlanta. President Trump cautioned against drastic social changes in areas without significant infections, but his trip reflected the uncertainty and fear that have the nation on edge. After touring the CDC laboratories, the president emphasized that the number of infections and deaths in the US remained limited. In the face of this mounting epidemic, what strategies should health officials and policymakers pursue to meet these goals? In 1986, Soviet leaders deliberately lied to the world about the nuclear disaster at Chernobyl. Putting millions at risk, the government prioritized regime stability over a public health emergency. As the death toll from the coronavirus continues to rise, we likewise see authoritarian systems suppressing information, ultimately facilitating the disease's spread. A sensible Indian government would acknowledge the plight of religious minorities and not confuse their political protests with treason. Last week, the United States and Taliban signed an agreement to end violence in Afghanistan. Even though violence in Afghanistan did not come to a halt, the agreement follows the same model as last fall's abandonment of the Syrian Kurds. In a Washington Examiner op-ed, **Michael Rubin** notes that as Trump's first term comes to a close, there is one consistency to his foreign policy vision: US allies do not matter. Ending "endless wars" may seem like a compelling, populist slogan, but the agreement signed in Doha no more ends the Afghanistan war than President Trump's flurry of tweets last autumn ended the Syrian conflict. Last week, the United Arab Emirates facilitated an air shipment from the World Health Organization to Iran of medical supplies to help quell the coronavirus outbreak. Gulf states are setting an example for what could soon be an official viral epidemic in the region, mostly generated from Iran, their main adversary. **Karen E. Young** took to the pages of Al-Monitor to argue that whatever the political tensions with Iran, Abu Dhabi and others reflect the insight that global disease is not a contest. The coronavirus' impact in Iran is dire, and the Gulf states recognize that an imploding Iranian regime with desperate citizens and ruthless military leadership is not the desired outcome. Following the Taliban's launch of attacks in Afghanistan hours after striking a deal with US troops, **John Yoo** joined "Fox News at Night" to discuss the problems that arise when making a deal with an enemy like the Taliban. The US will uphold its end of the agreement by reducing the amount of US troops in Afghanistan in exchange for the Taliban halting all fighting. The issue is that the Taliban may not keep its word



DEMOCRATIC PRIMARY

Following last week's Super Tuesday, Joe Biden became the favorite to win the Democratic nomination. This Tuesday, Democratic primary voters will go to the polls in six states, assigning 9 percent of the total delegates to the Democratic National Convention.



Five of the 14 states that participated in the 2020 Super Tuesday presidential primaries also hosted congressional primaries. In a new AEIdeas blog post, Rebecca Burgess tracks the results of military veterans running for office after Super Tuesday. While Tulsi Gabbard remains the sole military veteran in the US presidential race, significant numbers of veterans will continue on to the general election at the congressional level this November in Alabama, Arkansas, California, North Carolina, and Texas. Ahead of Super Tuesday, Marc A. Thiessen joined Fox News' "The Daily Briefing" to discuss the suspension of Mayor Pete Buttigieg's and Sen. Amy Klobuchar's campaigns. Although it appears that Buttigieg and Klobuchar are trying to consolidate the middle lane, they do not have much support to throw at Biden. Even with a Sanders-Biden race, no candidate will secure a majority for the Democratic nomination. Watch it here.

European countries increased checks on travelers from Italy on Sunday after Italy announced it would put 17 million people under quarantine from the coronavirus.



Recently, The New York Times and The Washington Post reported the US intelligence community's conclusion that Russia is attempting to interfere in the 2020 elections in favor of Donald Trump. Despite the president's cringe-worthy affection for Vladimir Putin, why would Putin favor Trump over Bernie Sanders? In an op-ed for The Dispatch, **Danielle Pletka** argues that while Trump has been harder on Russia than any administration since the end of the Cold War, Putin would find a lot to like in Sanders' record as a Soviet Union and Communist sympathizer. Yet another good reason to ensure the Russian dictator has no say in our elections. Read more here.

President Recep Tayyip Erdoğan has long sought to weaponize Syrian refugees for his own agenda. As Syrian refugees flee to Turkey, Erdoğan has threatened to open the floodgates unless he receives more support from Europe. Update: Limited distro due to some sensitive information

- Officials in Washington State and the CDC are tracking a possible outbreak of COVID-19
 at a long-term care nursing facility in Washington State. There are currently two
 presumptive positive cases associated with the facility (one healthcare worker and one
 resident). Officials are also reporting that approximately 27 of the 108 residents and 25
 of the 180 staff have some symptoms and are being tested.
- Japan has reported and confirmed the first patient to be re-infected with COVID-19 after showing signs of full recovery. The woman tested positive for the second time after testing positive in late January, she was released from the hospital on February 1 after recovering without any signs of the virus.



- HHS we are no longer in the containment phase, we are now in the community mitigation phase.
- The CDC is sending a team to help local officials investigate and test.
- The facility has been identified as Life Care Nursing Facility, 10101 NE 120st Kirkland, Washington - King County.

EMCC Actions:

- Palo Alto completed the dry run for receiving the Veteran patient on Sunday
- 24 additional employees will complete PPE training and fit testing today
- CDC test kits remain an issue and we have been on the phone throughout the day to shake them
 loose. We are being told the state Public Health labs have priority. I have communicated my
 displeasure with CDC particularly since we are receiving our first patient tomorrow and we
 continue to ask for kits and testing guidance.
- Preliminary search has indicated that VHA does not contract with the Washington State Nursing Home where cases have been reported. We are awaiting verification from V20
- Due to the admission of an active TB patient V8 may have a need for additional N95s, we are in the process of verifying that information and requirement.
- EMCC continues to push for a decision on the shelf life extension for N95s.

COVID-19 Patient Transfer:

- Conference call between Mercy Hospital System, Palo Alto VAMC and EMCC was conducted at 1:30 EST
- Patient arrived at Folsom Hospital on February 27th, his latest COVID-19 laboratory information will be shared with the VAMC once contact is made with CDC – numbers were exchanged.
 Folsom is not permitted to reveal lab results per CDC.
- Patient was described as a delight to care for and he is full ambulatory. When the patient
 arrived he run up the stairs and hospital personnel had to remind him to slow down.
- Patient has remained asymptomatic, normal labs, normal vitals. The patient does express a daily concern for his wife currently hospitalized in Japan.
- Contracted ambulance services will depart Travis AFB at 0700 on Monday, March 2, 2020.
 Expected arrival at Folsom Hospital is 0800.
- Constant communications will be maintained throughout the trip from Travis to ensure an exact arrival time at Folsom.
- Patient will be ready upon arrival of the contract ambulance.
- Physician to Physician contact information has been exchanged and contact will be maintained throughout the transfer.
- Arrival time at Palo Alto is unknown due to a number of variables.



Update:

- HHS future transfer of asymptomatic positive patients to home isolation will be considered on a case-by-case basis.
- One new positive at Travis transferred to hospital, 3 positives transferred to home isolation.
- . HHS is working on a memo to DoD to extend operations at the three military bases.
- HHS is working on contact tracing for the patient admitted to UC Davis.
- HHS working on DEMOB plan for low-risk patients currently quarantined in Japan.
- ASPR asked if CDC is going to change the testing guidance "because the California cases was tested late."

EMCC Actions:

- Due to notifications from suppliers the EMCC is developed and provided guidance on the proper use and type of gowns for treating/caring for COVID-19 patients.
- EMCC will conduct a nationwide conference call with VA Police to bring them up to speed on the COVID-19 response.
- Discussed PPE prioritization with HHS ASPR leadership. At this time HHS and the COVID-19 Task
 Force have not made any policy decisions that will drive prioritization, however one is expected
 as they review the needs. I provided the details of VHA's request in writing the ability to treat
 5000 patients for 30 days.
- HHS ASPR leadership did reveal that the COVID-19 Task Force has crunched the numbers and if
 the worst case scenario develops the US will require 300 million N95s per month to sustain the
 healthcare system. The manufacturing capabilities to meet that demand does NOT exist.
- EMCC was made aware of the "possibility" of the San Antonio VAMC receiving repatriated Veterans. There are currently 15 identified Veterans 9 have tested negative, 4 have refused testing, 1 is being re-tested due to an inconclusive result, 1 Veteran just revealed he is a Veteran and will undergo testing. HHS has not requested VAMC assistance at this time. The contact with the VAMC was through the OEM AEM asking the question, "can you accept a positive Veteran if needed". I reminded the AEM to call the EMCC prior to any discussions with facilities so we can ensure 1) the Veteran is enrolled and eligible for care, 2) work out any details with HHS prior to involving the VAMC.
- ALL 6 Veteran enrollees at Travis have tested negative!
- HHS IMT has asked for Chaplain Services for the Veterans at Lackland the request is for a 15-30 minute service by phone this weekend. The EMCC has placed the request and awaiting a response
- EMCC will participate on the VHA VA Police call and provide and bring all Chiefs up to date on the current VHA response tomorrow.
- EMCC is working on securing PPE for RCS and developing a shipment strategy.



- EMCC has made a request through WMC to meet with and brief the Unions of current VHA
 response plans and future scenarios should there be a worst case scenario.

Department of Veterans Affairs Estimated cost of Coronavirus Response, FY 2020 by account



Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) COVID-19 Response Future Cost Estimates By Appropriation As of March 11, 2020





Monitoring Novel Coronavirus (COVID-19).

2. Significant Weather Source: NWS

- Storm systems across the western U.S. will continue to bring heavy rainfall to portions of the Southwest Desert today, with heavy snow continuing across many mountainous areas through the weekend.
- Heavy snow is also possible across the Central Plains into Saturday, with a few severe thunderstorms possible across West Texas and Eastern New Mexico.
- Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) Source: HHS, CDC, WHO, DHS, VHA, VBA
 - On 14 Mar, the WHO reports 142,320 confirmed cases globally; 5,388 deaths.
 - On 13 Mar, CDC reported the total U.S. cases is 1,629 with 41 deaths.



- POTUS declared a National Emergency under the Stafford Act for COVID-19; provides \$50 billion in federal funding.
- The Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) published the U.S. Government COVID-19 Response Plan, dated 13 Mar; adapted from the 2018 Pandemic Crisis Action Plan. VPOTUS will lead government efforts with HHS serving as the Lead Federal Agency.
- Military Health System has reported nine confirmed and presumptive COVID-19 positive cases, including four Active Duty Service members in South Korea.
- 13 of 16 DoD laboratories slated to receive diagnostic testing kits from CDC; approved to conduct testing.
- NY, MD, and Puerto Rico have activated their National Guard in response to the COVID-19 outbreak. As part of the COVID-19 national response, the Department of Defense deployed 1,000 National Guard troops across six states to assist with logistical support, disinfection procedures, and transportation of medical personnel.
- CA, CO, CT, WA instituting drive-through COVID-19 testing. The White House announced drive through testing at Walgreens, CVS, Walmart, Target and other locations nationwide.

VA Response Efforts

- VHA reports experiencing bandwidth issues and would like to explore how operations can be staggered; OEI will lead a task force to explore this and develop a policy to support it.
- OIT is analyzing user capacity, procurements, and licensing for 300,000 additional teleworkers.
- OPIA has been tasked to work with VHA to produce a letter to state governors explaining the process of opening VA medical centers to non-Veterans.
- Grand Princess Cruise Ship Update All passengers are now off of the ship






Coronavirus (COVID-19) Impacts - 3/15/2020 as of 1100












Coronavirus (COVID-19) Impacts - 3/22/2020 as of 1200

Update: I usually send an update in the evening however lots of moving parts overnight and this morning.


- Palo Alto did create a ward (7H +room numbers) and "activated it" in CPRS in order to provide patient care and EHR use.
- I did communicate with the VISN last night to refrain from the use of SCI as a description.
- Today five rooms at a minimum will be equipped with beds and all accompanying equipment, supplies and PPE will be moved in.
- The plan is to equip 13 rooms in total
- Nursing education and infection control will be providing just in time PPE/PAPR/donning/doffing training on Sunday for nursing, physician and other staff (EMS, police, etc.) as necessary.
- Actual staffing scenarios are still being worked out, and they will severely limit who goes in or out.
- The goal is to be ready by Monday to accept a patient(s), should that be a need At this time
 there is NO indication that will happen with the current population at Travis, however as this
 entire event has progressed this could change drastically.
- The next round of test results will be available sometime Sunday.
- The VISN CMO will be contacted first by Travis to "accept" the patient for VHA and the CMO will
 call the inpatient MD supervisor at Palo Alto to give report and accept the transfer.
- A special contracted/trained ambulance company would transport the patient to the facility.

EMCC actions this morning:

- We will be scheduling a call later today with the VISN and MC planners to ensure all are on the same sheet of paper – the EMCC needs clarity on the transfer and the use of US Marshalls as escorts.
- . We will be providing a checklist to assist the facilities in their planning
- We will be providing a spreadsheet and instructions on tracking ALL costs associated with the preparedness, response and recovery efforts.
- EMCC has communicated the importance of tracking PPE usage and communicating daily with the EMCC on usage/burn rate, stocks and potential shortfalls/gaps

Update: Today is 1 full month of EMCC operations – spirits are high and team is committed. The EMCC will be staggering coverage to include some virtual support to allow time to recharge.

- As a result of a sub quality at the Quality Inn and Suites, DEMPS and DMORT staff have been moved to new lodging. Our DEMPS are at the Crown Plaza Hotel in Concord CA: 45 John Glenn Dr, Concord, CA 94520
- Area Emergency Manager has arrived as part of the IMT at Lackland AFB, San Antonio TX
- 1000 2oz bottles of hand sanitizer will arrive Thursday for 810, 811, M Street and other VACO buildings, Logs has set aside enough for Senior Leadership
- 21895 unique visits to the VHA Public Health Website
- Veteran and spouse transferred from Travis to Kaiser Vallejo have been allowed by CA
 Health Department to return home and home isolate.
- Larry, Pete Brewster and I briefed the Network Directors on the COVID-19 TTX
- Network Directors were provided with guidance on Telework, Non-GFE and GFE connectivity and how to access OIT equipment in an emergency
- Occ Health briefed the 2:00pm call (110 participants) on employee protection
- I briefed and reminded all participants on the 2:00pm and 3:00pm calls of the SecVA's
 position to continue focusing on current contingency plans and preparations for a surge
 of sick Veterans.
- EMCC Logistics coordinated with PL&O and Contracting for the order of 50,000 N95 masks and 50,000 isolation gowns
- EMCC Logistics, PL&O and Contracting have worked out a plan to spread future orders out in a way not to impact the supply chain. The plan will allow VHA to treat 4500 patients with the appropriate PPE.
- The 50,000 masks and 50,000 gowns will be shipped and stored at the NAC, should a
 facility need these supplies they will contact the EMCC and the EMCC will coordinate
 with the NAC for shipment. Only a select few individuals within the EMCC will have the
 authority to release these emergency supplies.

- On February 14, 2020 a report was filed with OSHA claiming "At the emergency room of the
 hospital, employees attending sick patients whom recently came from China with flu like
 symptoms are not being provided with respiratory protection, potentially exposing employees
 to the 2019 novel coronavirus." The facility in question was the Tampa VAMC. On follow-up
 this morning the unofficial reports are the claims are unfounded. A complete report will be
 provided once the investigation has been completed.
- The two evacuees from Travis are positive for COVID-19 but are asymptomatic and are being transferred to Sacred Heart Medical Center in Spokane, WA.
- OEM Area Emergency Manager is on the ground as part of the HHS IMT at Lackland AFB, San Antonio, TX.
- San Antonio VAMC has put together a team to be at Lackland AFB tomorrow morning as Cohort
 1 is released from quarantine. They will be setup in the out-processing tent beside HHS to
 identify any veterans that may be in the group and provide information and assistance as
 needed.

EMCC Actions

- 21,538 unique visits to the outward facing VHA Public Health Website
- Veteran who tested positive but remained asymptomatic and his wife were transported to Kaiser Vallejo.
- The 2006 Pandemic Plan was distributed for review and update by the workgroups.
- A draft document is under development concerning "stay home" messaging for patients, with the end goal to minimize physical visits and ER traffic to assist with infection control and surge capacity.
- Continue to reinforce messaging concerning the need to maintain expired PPE stocks until national level guidance (government as a whole) is provided.

Update:

State of CA reached out to Palo Alto regarding the Veteran testing positive (asymptomatic), due
to Travis policy that no PUIs or those testing positive will remain on base. State of CA Health



Department inquired on VHA's ability to house and care for the Veteran. The Veteran has asked to be placed in a Kaiser facility so that he can remain with his spouse. CA has said that due to the lack of beds they will have to move this Veteran out of state as they have done with many others and there is no guarantee the couple can stay together.

- I advise Palo Alto of VHA's current desire to keep families together and if the Veteran chooses to be in a VA facility we can accommodate him but not his spouse.
- The Veteran lives in the Travis area and we recommended home isolation per CDC guidance and NPIs and the state advised such an arrangement is "not enforceable".
- We will continue to follow this situation

Update:

Diamond Princess Cruise (Japan)

- Japan Forty-Five AMCITS Voluntarily on board; Fifty-Four AMCITS currently hospitalized in Japan; additional eight AMCITS awaiting transfer to hospital
- Lakeland AFB Four positive cases COVID-19 and two PUIs
- Travis AFB Seven positive cases COVID-19 and three PUIs
- Camp Ashland/UNMC Eleven positive cases COVID-19
- DOD continues to ban any positive evacuees on any of the DOD bases
- HHS continues to ask the EMCC for available space within VA to house additional evacuees.
- Additional repatriation flight will take place however when is up in the air due to the lack of housing for future evacuees

EMCC Actions

- 1 Veteran and spouse currently at Travis are asymptomatic but have tested positive –
 Travis policy is anyone testing positive cannot stay on the base, transport to a civilian
 hospital is pending. The names were not released however this is the Veteran we
 arranged a Telehealth consult and provided medications.
- One DEMPS volunteer utilized the CDC follow up text instant messaging system (TIM) to text a YES to symptoms - per protocol. Volunteer received a call from HHS Physician and VA Occupational Health Medical Advisor. <u>NEGATIVE</u>- validation for Corona virus symptoms. Volunteer was seen in community ED, Community Urgent care and in Occupational Health.
- DEMPS volunteer had cold symptoms hotel room was cold, he was moved to another one, had overnight delay in airport on return trip home. Volunteer visited the ED and Urgent care X2 with cold like symptoms, temp 100, negative for rapid flu, all symptoms were investigated in ED/Urgent Care. It was decided this was not the result of the coronavirus



- Volunteer is being provided reassurances through talking and supportive care. Call placed from DEMPS Program Officer to debrief deployment and to give volunteer Employee Assistance Number for additional follow up as desired. Volunteer feels supported with all information. He has all necessary numbers to use as needed.
- 21051 unique visits to the outward facing VHA Public Health Website
- EMCC received a Task Order for an AEM to be embedded in the IMT at Lackland AFB. An AEM has been identified and will deploy this evening.
- It was discovered that 1 Veteran and his wife currently at Travis only were able to keep the clothes they were wearing, it is unknown where their luggage is
- The AEM on the ground inquired on what the Veteran and his wife needed and obtained a list of clothing to include pants, shirts, socks and underwear.
- The EMCC coordinated with VCS and a delivery of appropriate clothing was completed to the Veteran and spouse. Mr. and Mrs. McMurray wanted the EMCC to pass on <u>"God Bless</u> the VA"
- The EMCC has discovered there are/were many more Veterans then we have been able to identify in the first repatriation flights. The EMCC is working closely with HHS to track down these Veterans to make sure: 1) they do not have any unmet needs, 2) if they do seek care at any time at a VAMC they will not be subjected to any additional quarantine should they be asymptomatic and reveal their recent trip to China. It is important to not unnecessarily burden these Veterans.
- San Antonio VAMC has put together a team to be at Lackland AFB tomorrow morning as Cohort 1 is released from quarantine. They will meet Marc Fisher with HHS Public Health Service and setup in the out processing tent beside HHS. Quarantine officially lifts at 0900 tomorrow but the out processing activities will begin at 0800.
- VAMC personnel will be interacting with those released after they have gone through all
 screening, they will not need to be in PPE. The assessment team will identify any veterans
 that may be in the group, gather information and have packets of information to provide to
 any veterans identified as well as verify benefits.
- Larry Mole presented to all VHA PAOs on where we have come from, where we are and where we are going.
- Larry Mole presented to the Governance Board
- I attended the HHS Healthcare System Leader Listening Session-Wednesday, February 19, 2020 from 1:00-5:00pm Eastern Time The Secretary of HHS welcomed the group and thanked the group for being partners in this response. The sessions provided a current overview of the novel coronavirus outbreak; discuss the healthcare system's preparedness and anticipated challenges related to surge, workforce protection, supply chain, and communication; and receive feedback on the federal government's activities to assist healthcare leaders' efforts to protect the nation.
- The major takeaway from this session VHA is head and shoulders above our colleagues in the community healthcare coalitions when it comes to Emergency Management, Telehealth, response capabilities and the ability to act quickly, etc.. Compared to the rest of the healthcare providers in the US we are in great shape (my opinion).
- Individual from Illinois Department of Health did bring up on the HHS call a request for surgical masks was made to VA and others and they have run out of options. Did not feel it necessary to respond.
- The EMCC rolled out the COVID-19 Table top exercise to all VHA Emergency Managers at 4:00pm 129 participants



- The Communications Workgroup rolled out VetLink and Kiosks forward facing information –
 102 participants


- Dr. Anthony Fauci (U.S. NIH) said the outbreak of COVID-19 is on the brink of becoming a pandemic. "It certainly is on the verge of that happening reasonably soon unless containment is more successful than it is right now," Fauci told CBS News, adding that two dozen countries outside of mainland
 China have approximately 500 cases of the virus. "Several of them," he added, "are starting to get to the second and third transmission." A pandemic officially means that there are several countries with sustained transmission from "person to person," Fauci explained. [02/18/20]
- HHS reiterated on their call that "we will be in this for several months to come"
- HHS and the NSC expressed frustrations with the lack of space to place any future evacuees, there is a possibility that AMCITS from Japan and all other countries that are experiencing this outbreak will need to be repatriated.
- HHS has indicated to the EMCC a request for capabilities and space may be coming to VHA.
- HHS inquired through the OEM HHS LNO if there are any spaces/building available from the Appendix D-Disposal and Reuse Reports – referencing the FY2019 submission. I assured HHS these spaces/buildings are NOT inhabitable.
- I reiterated the SecVA's position and his request for a Sec-Sec or a COVID-19 White House Task
 Force direct request for VA assistance.
- Notified today of the Whole of Government Logistics Supply Chain meeting for Thursday,
 January 20, 2020. Director of HHS Resource Management wanted to ensure the right VHA
 representative would be in attendance and be able to speak to VHA PPE issues related to this
 response. I assured the Director both myself and the PL&O representatives would be in
 attendance.
- NSC stated at the 1230 conference call this is a "federal response under a federal order in the absence of a Stafford Act declaration" and all departments and agencies are expected to step up.
- HHS, Office of the Assistant Secretary for Preparedness and Response and the Centers for
 Disease Control and Prevention are conducting a listening session (invitation only) with
 healthcare system leaders on Wednesday, February 19, 2020 from 1:00 pm 5:00 pm ET. This



session is part of the ASPR Health Care System Resilience Task Force and is designed to provide a current overview of the novel coronavirus outbreak; discuss the healthcare system's preparedness and anticipated challenges related to surge, workforce protection, supply chain, and communication; and receive feedback on the federal government's activities to assist healthcare leaders' efforts to protect the nation. I have RSVP'd and will be attending.

EMCC Actions:

- Medical Center COVID-19 signage should be approved for distribution 2/19/20
- COVID-19 Tabletop exercise was briefed on the 2:00pm call and again at 3:00pm. The exercise
 will be briefed in more detail to all Emergency Managers at 4:00pm on 2/19/20. DUSHOM
 memo was released today @ 5:30pm 2/18/20.
- The EMCC received a request from the Illinois Department of Public Health SNS Coordinator on behalf of DuPage County for surgical masks to support their current and future operations.
 Request was denied and passed on to the Hines VAMC.
- On 2/17/20 a Veteran was identified as part of the evacuees from the Diamond Princess (not on the list provided to VHA OEM). The Veteran indicated he has an enrollee card and was in the process of transferring his care to VHA from Kaiser. Due to his quarantine he missed his February 6th appointment at the Freemont, CA CBOC. His current prescription from Kaiser has expired and he is down to 2 pills.
- As of 1:00pm ET the VISN 21 CMO has been briefed and he has asked a Palo Alto VAMC Nurse Practitioner to make contact with the Veteran.
- The AEM on site is assisting with the coordination and will brief the Veterans on how to participate in a Telehealth appointment
- · Telehealth consult was arranged and completed at 1:30pm ET
- · ALL Veteran's unmet needs have been fulfilled.



- Thirteen (13) AMCITS were taken to Omaha for further care
 - Six (6) that were on Flight #1 (Travis)
 - Seven (7) that were on Flight #2 (Lackland)
- Seven (7) from Travis were transported to local hospitals
 - Five (5) were asymptomatic and tested positive
 - o Two (2) are PUIs
- One (1) from Lackland has been identified as a PUI and transported to a local hospital

- During the secondary screening process the AEM on the ground saw one of the passengers with a USMC hat on and approached the Veteran, AEM had proper PPE on and maintained the 6 feet of distance.
- Passenger indicated he was a Veteran and enrolled in My Healthy Vet and would need prescription refills.
- AEM is working with the HHS team to ensure he receives his refills and to identify any other Veteran's needs.
- This is a great example of how important it is to have OEM/VHA on the ground during these
 events.



- Flight #1 landed at Travis with 167 PAX at 0229ET see photo
- Flight #2 landed at Lackland with 151 PAX at 0456ET
- Travis has reported several testing positive during the flight, those PAX were moved to the biocontainment unit onboard, we are awaiting the exact number once officials on the ground have sorted through the details.



 Member Services did an amazing job scrubbing the ship manifest and provided 29 confirmed/possible Veterans and their families that maybe onboard the flights at Travis and Lackland. The list has been provided to the HHS SOC and the AEM at Travis.

- Two aircraft are in Japan to return AMCITS from the Diamond Princess cruise ship
- One aircraft is due to arrive at Travis AFB at approximately 2045ET on February 16, 2020 with approximately 166 AMCITS
- One aircraft is due to arrive at Lackland AFB at approximately 0010ET on February 17, 2020 with approximately 148 AMCITS
- Both aircraft have been outfitted with bio-containment sections for the medical staff to safely travel while attending to the passengers.
- The ship manifest had 417 AMCITS and it is unknown if all will make the trip, the final tally will only be known once the aircraft are inbound.
- The list of 417 AMCITS has been provided to Member Services, this is a very close hold list and
 the list was password protected. I was the only one that was provided the password. The list
 was sent to one person in Member Services by encrypted email. The password was sent to the
 same individual under separate copy, also encrypted. The emails were also protected so they
 could not be shared further.
- As of this email two (2) Veterans have been identified and as suspected they are both accompanied by their spouses. One (1) Veteran is 69 and the other is 72. Both are Air Force Veterans
- One American couple was not allowed to depart due to the wife testing positive.
- Many of the AMCITS being evacuated have expressed anger at the US Govt. due to the requirement to be quarantined for an additional 14 days upon their arrival on US soil.
- The search of the 417 names to verify Veteran status continues and the EMCC will have a complete list as soon as possible.
- In the event any of the evacuated AMCITS require hospitalization HHS/CDC teams will closely follow these individuals daily.
- In order to free up quarters at Travis the DEMPS personnel have been moved to a local hotel and HHS has provided the transportation assets for any local travel needed.

- HHS is fine tuning the repatriation plans for the AMCITS on the Princess Cruise Ship. There are
 many moving parts and a great many obstacles. HHS hopes to begin moving people on Sunday
 at the earliest. There is a high likelihood there will be Veterans on the evacuee manifest and the
 EMCC is working with HHS to identify any Veterans.
- Updating 2006 VA Pan Flu Plan to 2020 COVID-19 Plan to provide Department-wide guidance
- Continue to develop and design implementation of NPIs
- The foundational document for the VHA COVID-19 Contingency/Supportive Care Plan has been developed. The plan will now be shared with the workgroup SMEs and AEMs to fine tune and finalize the plan.
- Researching information on community recovery from epidemics to build out a recovery and reconstitution plan
- Continuity of Healthcare planning two additional areas we are focusing on should we

- HHS is preparing for additional repatriation missions from Japan. No details at this time once I
 type any details they will change as soon as I hit send.
- HHS has turned off the Task Order for Telehealth at this time, however we were asked to
 continue to gather details of capabilities. There are currently enough providers on the ground
 for the current mission. We continue to work with TEM to ensure all preparedness information
 on capabilities are ready to launch should the request become a reality.
- TEM has built a 2 week roster, identified a hub and 2 dedicated physicians to support any future mission. OEM logistics is prepared to support as needed. In the event TEM is deployed, TEM leadership will provide a representative to the EMCC.
- HHS was able to research and resolve the delay in testing kits ordered by VHA the first kits should be arriving as early as this weekend.
- DUSHOM memo Inclusion of Virtual Care in Outpatient Care Contingency Planning for
 Disasters detailing the use of Telehealth in response to disasters and emergencies transmitted
 to the field.
- A DUSHOM memo providing additional guidance on PPE tracking and notification should facilities require immediate resupply was transmitted today to the field.
- I also had a long conversation with the SES over the HHS Supply Chain and Director Resource
 Management. I discussed the desire of VHA to order additional PPE and he provided me with
 guidance on how not to disrupted the supply chain. He also reviewed our list and

- US confirmed cases 15
- AMCITs who have tested positive (33) (Princess Cruise) have been transferred to hospitals across nine Japanese provinces. Government of Japan will not give reciprocity to U.S. to practice medicine in hospitals, only on the cruise ship.
- HHS interagency Emergency Support Function call HHS ASPR briefed this is an "all hands on deck response and we are one team focused on ensuring we protect the public health, economy and security of the US."
- HHS has the authority through the Economy Act to request assistance from the interagency in the absence of a Stafford Act. Attached is a summary of the Economy Act.
- HHS indicated they are prepared to execute Interagency Agreements (IAAs) with each
 Department and Agency As the primary medical support to ESF8 VA should expect additional
 requests.
- HHS expects additional repatriation missions, planning is ongoing.



- HHS has formed the Health Care System Resilience Task Force and asked for OEM representation. The VHA planning is about 3 weeks ahead of HHS so they are looking for some insight from how we are accomplishing our tasks.
- HHS reiterated during a PPE call the need to coordinate any PPE purchases and avoid large bulk orders. The world supply chain is very fragile and any large bulk orders will disrupt all supplies.
 HHS also warned it is very unlikely any such orders will be honored and will further lengthen the time between the order and fulfillment of any kind.


EMCC Actions:

- The EMCC received an RFI on Telehealth capabilities from HHS. HHS is looking to provide support to Behavioral Health needs at Observation Support Bases in Newark, Chicago, JFK, San Francisco, Los Angeles and Hawaii. I have a meeting later tonight with Dr. Yeskey to gather more details.
- Safety/Industrial Hygiene has completed a great deal of research on alternatives for N95s and OEM will convene a conference call on Friday, February 14, 2020 with Safety/Industrial Hygiene, Infectious Diseases and PL&O to develop strong recommendations moving forward and a plan for procurement.
- Current number of isolation rooms in VHA are 726 up from 249, we still have some gaps to fill
 and will have another update.
- OEM logistics is working with HHS to identify/resolve the hold up in VHA's order of COVID-19 test kits.
- OEM has completed the development of two (2) discussion based exercises (Tabletop exercises

 TTXs) that will focus on preparedness and response to COVID-19. Upon completion of the exercise each facility should have an understanding of how to implement COVID-19 preparedness and response activities.

The TTXs are designed for:

- VAMCs to include ancillary facilities,
- VA Administrations and staff offices (non-healthcare),
- The exercises are generic by design and can be modified by each facility,
- Facilities will be required to complete the exercise within two (2) weeks of launching via webinar (Wednesday, February 19, 2020),
- Completion results will be entered into the Performance Improvement Management System (PIMS),
- Each facility will conduct their internal AAR any items that require OEM or VHACO intervention to resolve will be submitted to OEM for action/recommendations





- Another evacuee at Miramar has tested positive and is being treated at a local hospital. This is the second confirmed case at Miramar.
- Planning continues for repatriation AMCITS on the Princess Cruise Ship.
 - Thirty-three individuals on the ship that tested positive for COVID-19 have been transported to local hospitals in Japan.
 - o Planning factor of 256 used for repatriation
 - Individuals must be asymptomatic to board the aircraft
- HHS Task Order for 6 DEMPS personnel to support screening operations at Travis AFB
 - DUSHOM memorandum distributed
 - Travel booked for 3 and 3 are going through the facility approval process

- The novel coronavirus has been renamed it is now referred to as COVID-19
- HHS is finalizing a DEMPS Task Order for 6 Nursing Assistants to support screening operations at Travis Air Force Base. This will cover the repatriation of those AMCITS currently on the Princess Cruise Ship. DUSHOM memo is prepared and will be submitted once the TO has been received
- Completed a draft letter to the Medical Centers Directors of the facilities where the 11 DEMPS
 volunteers will be returning to ensure MC leadership they have all been cleared to return to
 work. The letters will be out tomorrow in time for their return to work.
- CDC launched an effort called "Health Pulse" and will be partnering with VHA as a sentinel group

- Possible repatriation from the Princess Cruise Ship, ongoing discussions on where and when this will occur.
- 1 evacuee at Miramar tested positive for the coronavirus and has been transported to a local hospital.

EMCC Actions:

 Occupational Health, Infectious Disease, DEMPS National Coordinator, Dr. Carter Mecher and HHS discussed the return of all DEMPS personnel. Special instructions have been prepared for



each and monitored by HHS Chief Medical Officer. The Chief Medical Officer for the Assistant Secretary of Preparedness and Response at HHS has deemed that at this time, the team deployed, including our VHA volunteers, has remained safe and protected with zero breaches in the respective PPE gear during the deployment. Therefore, the deployed volunteers may safely return to their regular duties. All VHA experts agree that they do not foresee any concerns and/or risks of these individuals returning to their normal duties.

- We are crafting a message to go out prior to these individuals returning home that will be sent
 to each Medical Center Director to reassure these facility Directors there are no risks. We also
 want to ensure these individuals are not subjected to the uninformed regarding their mission,
 they are not targets of mis-information and are treated well on their return.
- Coronavirus and Highly Contagious Screening Guidance was developed, cleared and will be posted on the HCI Sharepoint Site.
- DUSHOM Laboratory Instructions and guidance drafted and prepared for DUSHOM signature, will be forwarded tomorrow
- Awaiting formal request from the CDC to collaborate with Emergency Medicine on ED monitoring.
- Presented to the Infectious Disease forum (over 500 VA participants) on current VHA actions

- Total persons guarantined: 809
- Princess Cruise Ship total PAX 3,711 428 AMCITs Lab confirmed 13, Total confirmed cases onboard 64
- Japan has identified their primary challenge is supplies of medications for quarantined passengers are running low.
- Japan Ministry of Health has request USG assistance in ensuring proper medication dispensing
- 3 AMCITS disembarked in Taiwan CDC/CBP have the lead in tracking
- Westerdam Cruise Ship Current location off the coast of Keelung, Taiwan Total PAX 2000+, 701 AMCITs, confirmed cases – 0: Cruise Ship departed Hong Kong on



- February 1, 2020, 4 countries (Japan, Taiwan, Guam and Philippines) have denied docking.
- Additional Wuhan flights are still under discussion, several additional sites have been identified, however NORTHCOM approval is pending. At this time Travis appears to be the ongoing base of flight operations. Several communities are rejecting repatriation assistance due to fears of exposure and infection.

EMCC Actions

- AEM on the ground at March AFB has identified 4 Veterans in the quarantined population and they do not have any unmet needs and are happy to be home.
- AEM on the ground at Travis has confirmed there are no Veterans in the quarantined population.
- Discussed with HHS my dismay for listing every other Department assisting with this response and no mention of VA/VHA. I was assured this would be fixed immediately.

- EMCC produced a Pre-decisional draft/FOUO planning document nCoV2019
 Planning Potential Considerations To provide an enterprise-wide VHA response to
 ensure workforce viability, critical infrastructure protection, economic impact mitigation,
 appropriate social distancing, scarce resource allocations, prioritization of
 treatment/countermeasures, and medical surge operations in response to the nCoV2019.
 The intent is to begin discussions and planning should multiple Veteran cases materialize.
 Document has been share with the DUSHOM and ADUSH A/O

Update:

 All scheduled repatriation flights have landed and all passenger have been screened and are either in quarters or have been transferred to treatment facilities



- The screening mission has ended for these flights, CDC will be debriefing all screeners and presenting the plan for them moving forward.
- It is unclear if there will be additional flights, this remains a fluid situation
- The Diamond Princess (cruise ship) currently quarantined near Tokyo has 3,200 passengers
- 237 passenger (picked randomly) have been tested for the virus 89 have tested positive for nCoV
- CDC has recommended to the Japanese State Department that the 430 AMCITS currently on board remain quarantined on the ship.
- Japanese govt, wants the AMCITS removed and repatriated like those from Wuhan
- US State Department/CDC responded that all those repatriated from Wuhan were tested and screened 6 times and no one testing positive was allowed to board the aircraft and leave Wuhan
- CDC stressed they have not tested the AMCITS on the ship and would be willing to send a team to do so.
- Japanese Consulate will meet with Japanese Health officials to determine what assistance Japan will offer.

EMCC actions

- Latest WMC Authorized Absence (AA) guidance transmitted to all field entities at 8:00am this
 morning
- Provided the OPM link for the source information on the AA guidance to the field.
- Questions generated by the new AA are being gathered and will be submitted to WMC for the appropriate guidance
- Addressed questions from VISNs regarding the support of local consortiums on supplies and PPE support and reiterated the DUSHOM guidance.
- All Workgroup Sharepoint Sites have been launched and are live

Update:

Today was primarily a day to coordinate all the moving pieces. I attended the ASPR PPE Supply chain call and here are some of the highlights. I have shared these with PL&O



- Dr. Kadlec reminded everyone of the highly sensitive nature of the discussions and the importance of messaging to prevent hoarding and taxing an already taxed supply chain
- · PPE suppliers are preparing for amounts estimated in the billions
- CDC is looking beyond the healthcare industry
- No major problems in distribution at this point but there is a draw down in inventories
- 70% of distributors are seeing 2-8 times the normal orders
- . Distributors are currently filling 80-100% of orders, many on allocations
- 24 facilities and 6 manufactures in the US are able to ramp up production
- Manufacturers have planned during previous outbreaks and have designated certain lines to serve China and the rest are focused on the US
- · Not sure what the impact would be if there are shortages in raw materials and packaging
- · Global draw down will continue
- Non-pharmaceutical Interventions (NPIs) will be key to managing the outbreak

Break

- The workgroups are doing extraordinary work and we have hit a good rhythm. We should be seeing comprehensive products next week
- The 2pm daily nationwide call will focus on gathering questions from the field and the workgroups will provide an answer within 24 hours.
- The 3pm Workgroup call will focus on presentations, future planning and coordination with each Workgroup facilitator.
- The Public Health website reported 14,099 unique visits as of 3pm Friday, February 6, 2020
- The EMCC will be split this weekend to give people a day off. We are still supporting DEMPS

- At 10:26am OEM received a Request for Information from the VA IOC. The HHS request submitted through the ExecSec and in preparation for the Supply Chain Task Force. In short the request was seeking information on: 1) government stockpiles and 2) purchasing plans
- At 2:29pm after being cleared by the ADUSH A/O the attached information was transmitted to
 the VA IOC with the following instructions: This is not classified however all the information
 attached in the entirety is extremely <u>CLOSE HOLD</u>. The aggregate of this information will
 provide VHA's operational capabilities when responding to an all Hazards emergency and must
 be protected. I have indicated that I am the POC for the information contained in the attached
 documents
- The information will be transmitted via classified channels (JWICS) to HHS.
- The first of the workgroup Sharepoint sites (nCov-19 Isolation, Quarantine and Treatment) was launched. These Sharepoint sites will make it easier for each workgroup to share information and consolidate final products.
- Workgroups are fully functioning and addressing multiple questions from the field. The answers
 will be published widely on the Sharepoint site.
- Provided an up to date Tic Toc to VHA Communications.
- Awaiting confirmation of the arrival of the next aircraft with 390 evacuees. Attached is a photo
 of the MUV and LSV positioned to support the IMT receiving the aircraft.
- Deployed an additional AEM to Travis due to the extended operations.
- DOD approved 11 DOD facilities near airports as third line options for housing patients with nCoV.
- CDC distributed test kits to about 200 qualified labs nationwide, and another 200 test kits to international labs. Each kit can perform diagnostics on 700-800 patient samples. The agency advises that the distribution of the tests will improve the global capacity to detect and respond to the virus.
- China has applied for a new patent on an experimental Gilead Sciences Inc. drug that its scientists believe might fight the coronavirus. The company is shipping enough doses of Remdesivir to treat 500 patients as two clinical trials begin in China.

On today's National Incident Communications Conference Line (NICCL) the CDC announced the following:

CDC: Be careful **NOT** to describe evacuees as "US citizens." There may be some foreign nationals (not China) on these flights. In that light please don't' describe everyone as "repatriated." Use **passengers** or **evacuees**. Gretchen Michael reminded the group that evacuees in quarantine are not free to leave so they are technically NOT "repatriated."

We are running this to ground with HHS, HHS was also surprised. The mission was described as "repatriation of American Citizens, we have Americans in danger and we need to get them home".

This statement is very concerning and I had direct conversations with HHS that if this statement is true we will be pulling our DEMPS Personnel. HHS was in agreement and supported this position. I hope to have a definitive answer by tomorrow morning when HHS has access to the flight manifest.

If this is not the correct plan of action please advise.

- 1 (one) had their flight cancelled and is expected to arrive today. The HHS IMT is aware and will
 adjust training and fit testing to meet their arrival
- I spoke directly with the City of Chicago Deputy Emergency Manager and explained the
 cancelling of the agreement to house evacuees. I was informed that the cancellation would be
 raised up their chain and to HHS by the Chicago representatives. I apologized and assured them
 this should not jeopardize the great relationship between VA and the City and I was assured it
 would not, however the city is out of options.
- At approximately, 8:30pm I received a call from the PDAS ASPR wanting to know how he could help with the "issues" in Chicago. I explained the circumstances in detail. Dr. Yeskey asked me to send the language for a Task Order (TO) that would protect VA and accomplish the mission. He indicated he would run it up the chain and have the ASPR move it forward.
- At approximately 8:35pm I shared the details of my conversation with Larry Connell and the proposed language in the draft TO. Larry Connell and I had several conversations and he in turn briefed the VA COS.
- At approximately 9:15pm Larry Connell relayed a request from the VA COS: the SecVA would like S1 HHS to call him to discuss the issue.
- At approximately 9:20pm I spoke directly with the PDAS ASPR and indicated he would pass the request up the chain and thanked VA for being a good partner, "we are in this together"
- Immediately after my conversation with the PDAS ASPR I spoke with the Chicago AEM and verified that the mission to assist the City of Chicago was not approved and if anything changed I would relay the latest information.
- At approximately 9:51pm I briefed Tammy Czarnecki of the latest developments.

- The first DEMPS personnel will begin arriving today all should be on the ground by this evening and ready to train in the morning.
- The AEM on the ground has all the flight information and will ensure everyone is well taken care
 of
- HHS revealed last night they were having difficulty with securing a contract for feeding the
 evacuees and inquired if VHA could assist. I initially said no, however after speaking with
 Tammy and Ray they both agreed they could assist. We are awaiting a "go, no go" order from
 HHS this morning. If this is a real mission the feeding will occur at Travis and HHS will pay all
 costs associated with the mission through an IAA. more to come
- AEM in Chicago revealed that the city has up to 50 suspected cases and asked if VHA could help
 house during the quarantine period. The ask for VHA would be 4-5 individuals. Local leadership

 detailed what we would need should we provide this assistance. All costs associated with

will all be memorialized in an email to local leadership so they have the information at hand, we will also provide additional guidance as needed. Although this is a declared Public Health Emergency there is not a Stafford declaration.

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

Good morning,



As of this morning the plan for the second wave of repatriation involving VHA DEMPS personnel is as follows: this plan is not expected to change however this entire event changes rapidly so we remain flexible.

- We will roster 12 (currently have 11) and provide those names to HHS. The original ask was for 14. We will continue to reach out and try and fill the remaining slots however being a weekend and the short time frame to get these people on the ground we will go with 12.
- OEM will travel all we are working with FCS and the arriving airport is Sacramento, Sunday, February 2, 2020
- Due to the late and ever changing playing field it would be too late to enter all our folks into the HHS travel system so it is easier for OEM to travel these individuals
- HHS will provide the lodging and all ground transportation and support
- The DEMPS team will be located on Travis AFB in a secure location.
- The team is due to arrive Sunday afternoon and spend Monday receiving fit testing and PPE training
- CDC is flying in a specialized team (arriving Sunday) to conduct all the training and education for the DEMPS team
- The AEM in the area will be embedded in the HHS IMT for the duration of the mission. He is due
 to receive his deployment physical (new OEM process) on Monday morning and will report to
 the IMT Monday afternoon
- While on ground the DEMPS team will be constantly monitored. While screening and throughout the deployment they will be monitored by CDC and HHS physicians
- CDC and HHS has assured us that as long as PPE protocols are strictly followed, there are no breaks in the integrity of PPE the chance of virus transmission to a screener is 0. There is no reported case of this type of transmission
- Once the DEMPS mission is over the team will be instructed on proper surveillance, they will self-monitor, take their temperature 2 times a day, report to CDC and will be advised in the event there are any concerns and the next steps
- We are awaiting the final details and instructions on how the DEMPS team should brief and inform their families.



The OEM team is in good spirits, we have split the team up this weekend and we have brought in AEMs to support us here in Martinsburg and to support Larry Mole. I have also checked and all marriages are still intact.

I will provide any updates today and throughout the rest of the weekend. If there are any concerns with this plan I am available for any discussions.





Subject: Corona Virus quarantined traveler housing?

It is my understanding that the Department of Veterans Affairs is entertaining housing travelers who are currently under quarantine due to exposure to the Corona virus. We are deeply concerned that moving these travelers to VA medical facilities poses a grave danger to nurses, staff, veterans, as well as the general population.

It is our understanding that the medical staff has not been trained on dealing with patients who may be infected with this virus. We are also deeply concerned the VA has not trained staff on the use of appropriate personal protective equipment (PPE). Additionally, there is a question as to whether the VA has the appropriate PPE. We have sent the below information request to each of the 23 facilities we represent and are awaiting response. Given the concerns raised above I am escalating this request to your office for immediate response.

Information requested:

- 7. Current stock on hand of N95 respirators and powered air-purifying respirators (PAPRS) as well as gowns, gloves, and other PPE for droplet and aerosol precautions;
- 8. Please provide a list of areas that could be used to isolate a patient with suspected or possible 2019-nCoV infections if an airborne isolation room is not available;
- 9. The Facility procedure(s) used to determine daily whether negative pressure is maintained with the airborne isolation room is in use;
- 10. Has the Facility identified any possible cases of 2019-nCoV? If so, how many?
- 11. The Facility's plans to adjust staffing to address the additional staff time required to properly care for multiple patients in airborne isolation; and
- 12. The Facility Attendance Policy and any revisions to the Attendance Policy made in order to address employees with documented exposure or known/suspected Novel Coronavirus.



We understand that this is a developing situation. To the extent that educational materials, supply levels, and policies may be in flux, please consider this information request to be ongoing and provide additional materials as they become available.

- 1. Determine if the Hospital is complying with the Collective Bargaining Agreement, as well as all other applicable laws, rules, and regulations;
- 2. Determine if all RNs are being effectively protected from infectious disease exposure;
- 3. Determine the most appropriate representational course of action to take in this matter;
- 4. Fulfill the Union's representation responsibilities; The Union will use this information to assess the Facility's preparedness for the current Novel Coronavirus outbreak and its impact upon RNs employed at the Facility.

If any part of this request is denied, or if any material is unavailable, please communicate that fact to me in writing, along with the reason(s) for the denial or unavailability of the requested information, and please provide the remaining items by the same date. The Union will accept partial fulfillment of this information request without prejudice to its position that we are entitled to all documents and information called for in the request.


Please see the questions below from my email of March 10th.

Right now, there are VA hospitals having RNs and healthcare workers screen patients at entrances without providing them PPE protection or providing protocols for this process. This is just one of many concerns we currently have. VA is putting both patients and the workers at risk now.

We immediately would like a meeting with you and your staff to address our concerns because on the calls we have with VACO LMR, no one from that office can tell us anything, other than they will share our concerns with VHA.

UNION'S RESPONSE TO AGENCY'S STATEMENT OF POSITION

On or about February 14, 2020 the US Department of Veterans Affairs (Agency or VA) served its Statement of Position regarding the above-captioned Negotiability challenge filed by the National Federation of Federal Employees (Union or NFFE). Herein, the Union provides its response to the Agency's Statement of Position.

Part I: Background and Threshold Issues

In May 2015, NFFE sent notice to the VA of its intent to reopen the NFFE-VA Master Agreement. The parties eventually began negotiating ground rules, which were nearing completion in late January 2017. In early February 2017, NFFE gave notice to the VA that it was rescinding its request to negotiate the Master Agreement. In July 2017, the Agency filed an unfair labor practice charge (FLRA Case WA-CA-17-0418) against NFFE alleging a failure to bargain in good faith (the "ULP Charge").

On or about January 31, 2018, the parties entered into a private settlement agreement (the "Settlement Agreement") resolving the ULP Charge. Attachment 1. The Settlement Agreement, as proposed by the Agency, allowed the parties to designate up to four (4) articles for renegotiation, and then each party could strike one article selected by the other party, securing it as-is and protecting it from being opened for negotiations. The Union agreed to the proposal, as it would allow the Union to protect official time, as governed by Article 2. The Settlement Agreement provided that the Union would immediately sign the Ground Rules as written but modified to include that the Union will pay travel and per diem for preparation time. The Settlement Agreement further modified the Ground Rules by placing limits on which provisions of the CBA would be available to negotiate: "Each party will select no more than four (4) articles they are interested in bargaining. The opposing side will have the opportunity to strike one of the other party's four



articles from negotiations." Attachment 1. The Union signed the Ground Rules on February 1, 2018. Attachment 2. The FLRA was not a party to the Settlement Agreement.

On March 9, 2018, NFFE and the VA exchanged proposals for contract negotiations. Pursuant to the Settlement Agreement, each party submitted four articles for negotiation. The Agency gave notice of its intent to reopen three articles: (1) Article 2, Union Rights and Representation; (2) Article 25, Actions Based on Unacceptable Performance; and (3) Article 26, Disciplinary Actions, Adverse Actions, and Major Adverse Actions. Further, the VA gave notice of its intent to include a newly proposed article to negotiate: Article XX, Official Time. Article XX contains provisions essentially rewriting Article 2. NFFE chose to reopen: (1) Article 10, Partnership/Collaborative Relationships; (2) Article 5, Grievance Procedure; (3) Article 8, Negotiations, and (4) Article 24, Performance Appraisal System.

The parties began bargaining on April 29, 2018 and on April 30, 2018, NFFE struck the Agency's proposed Article 2 from bargaining. Bargaining on the articles subject to the Settlement Agreement took place over approximately 40 bargaining sessions. On December 9, 2018, the parties mutually went to mediation before FMCS Mediator Randy Mayhew. The Mediator released the parties on February 27, 2019, in FMCS Case No. 201911770013. The Union and Agency each filed requests for FSIP assistance.

On or about September 4, 2019, FSIP issued its decision in the impasse between the Union and Agency. *See* 19 FSIP 024. FSIP imposed "compromised" proposals where it accepted most of the Agency's positions. A CBA comporting with FSIP's Final Decision and Order was ratified by the Union on or about November 6, 2019. On December 12, 2019, the VA Secretary Robert Wilkie furnished the Union and Agency representative Robyn Stanton (no longer with the Agency) with its Agency Head Review. Attachment 3 (the AHR is dated December 5, 2019 but was not sent to



the Union or Ms. Stanton until December 12, 2019). The Union timely filed this Negotiability Appeal on December 17, 2019. The Union timely exercised its right to file a negotiability appeal based on language rejected at Agency Head Review, pursuant to the Ground Rules and statute. The Union's filing of this Negotiability Appeal conforms with the parties' Ground Rules because the Union and Agency had both exhausted all other avenues – including more than 40 sessions of bargaining, impasse procedures, ULPs, grievance arbitrations, and FMCS mediation.

Part II: Argument

1. The Alleged "7422 Determination" is Invalid

In its Statement of Position, the Agency raises a lawsuit filed by the undersigned on behalf of NFFE and the National Association of Government Employees (NAGE). This lawsuit is wholly unrelated to the bargaining done in this matter. The Agency bargained the provisions of this CBA before, during, and after the alleged "7422 Determination" made in November 2018 (and the second one made in April 2019) and never sought to carve out an exception for Title 38 employees in the CBA. The alleged "7422 Determination" was not raised at FSIP, despite the Agency's opportunity to do so.

Litigation regarding the alleged "7422 Determination" is pending in federal court. It has been pending for more than a year, despite being fully briefed, because Agency attorneys have failed to file any sort of Administrative Record on which the Court may make a determination of fact and law – defying two direct orders from the Court. Attachment 4.

The FLRA is not divested of jurisdiction to determine that it was perfectly legal for the Agency to voluntarily bargain the rights of Title 38 employees after the "7422 Determination" was issued in November 2018. The Agency made choices throughout bargaining and chose to bargain the rights of all employees covered by the CBA – Title 38 employees and others. The Agency



bargained for these appropriate arrangements and may not unilaterally switch course based on an unsubstantiated "7422 Determination" which was issued with no supporting documentation or reasoning in the middle of bargaining and never brought to the bargaining table. The "7422 Determination" does not pass muster as a valid agency action and does not preclude the FLRA from doing its duty in this matter.

To the extent the Agency insists on litigating the validity of its "7422 Determination" in this matter, such determination is arbitrary, capricious, contrary to law, and unsupported by substantial evidence. It is well established that Title 38 employees at the Department of Veterans Affairs enjoy collective bargaining rights, and these rights are limited by the Secretary of Veterans Affairs' authority under 38 U.S.C. § 7422 to determine that certain demands are not subject to bargaining because they implicate "professional conduct or competence"—defined to encompass "direct patient care." *See NFFE v. McDonald*, 128 F. Supp. 3d. 159, 161.

However, the Agency's decision to repudiate portions of its contracts via its "7422 Determination" violates the Administrative Procedures Act because it fails to reflect reasoned decision making. The Agency: (1) crafted a clearly erroneous interpretation of Section 7422 that stretches the purpose of the statute far beyond Congress' intent and conflicts with the policies underlying the statute; (2) failed to follow any semblance of the normal Section 7422 review process; and (3) failed to present any competent evidence to support its repudiation.

The Agency knew or at least suspected that the Plaintiffs' claim under the APA would be sustained, so it issued another "determination" in April 2019 as an attempt to cure the first. Unfortunately for the Agency, the Second Determination's attempts to post-hoc rationalize the repudiation also fail to pass muster under the APA.



If the Agency is permitted to apply the term "direct patient care" in Section 7422 to any condition of employment touching upon a medical center or its employees, to the point where Title 38 employees can never receive the bargained-for benefit of official time, or serve as union representatives, this precedent will "whittle the scope of bargaining so drastically as to render collective bargaining meaningless." *Nat'l Treasury Employees Union v. Chertoff*, 452 F.3d 839, 861 (D.C. Cir. 2006).

The Agency asserts that the FLRA is divested of authority over this negotiability matter simply because the Agency has made its own unilateral declaration of repudiation. No such authority is cited for this assertion, because no such authority exists. To allow as such would be to undermine the entire purpose of Congress' intent when it declared Title 38 employees (and Title 38 hybrids) to have bargaining rights and union representation rights as Title 5 employees.

2. The Union Has Not Withdrawn Any Claims in this Matter

The Agency baselessly asserts that the Union has withdrawn claims in this matter. It writes that "NFFE filed a second petition on or about January 17, 2020 and that petition omitted certain provisions that were included in the initial petition filed in December 2019. The Union has not, and is not, waiving its challenge to any of the provisions that it has filed for relief on in this matter. The Agency fails to assert which, if any, provisions were "omitted" but to the extent any have been omitted by clerical error, the Union seeks leave to amend and clarify its timely filed petition.

3. Agency Head Review Cannot Disapprove Agreements Based Solely on the Permissiveness of the Subject

Once an Agency determines it will bargain over a permissive subject, Agency Head Review cannot override that decision. *Nat'l Treasury Emples. Union*, 65 F.L.R.A. 509, 512 (2011) ("...the mere fact that a proposal is outside the duty to bargain does not mean that it is contrary to law, rule, or regulation."). Once an agency's negotiators have chosen to reach an agreement



concerning a permissive subject, the agency cannot later undo that choice for the duration of the agreement. *See Ass'n of Civilian Technicians, Mont. Air Chapter No. 29 v. FLRA*, 22 F.3d 1150, 1155-56 (D.C. Cir. 1994).

Here, the Agency chose to engage in bargaining over subjects which are permissive. *See for example*, Article 8 "Negotiations", Article 24 "Performance Appraisal"; Article 36 "Training". This is not undone by Executive Order 13836. The consequence of the Agency bargaining over permissive subjects in light of an alleged prohibition on bargaining such subjects issued by the executive is a matter between the executive and the Agency. It does not, and cannot, be found to undo the bargaining conducted between the Agency and the Union.

4. The Executive Orders were Issued without Statutory Authority

Not all executive orders have the force of law. *E.g.*, *Chen v. Carroll*, 866 F. Supp. 283, 287 (E.D. Va. 1994). For an executive order to be considered a "law" it must have "a distinct statutory foundation." *Ass'n for Women in Science v. Califano*, 566 F.2d 339, 344 (D.C. Cir. 1977). In the two (2) Executive Orders at issue in this negotiability appeal, Exec. Order No. 13,837 and 13,839, the President cites 5 U.S.C. § 7301 as one of the main authorities to issue the orders. The Union, among others, challenged the Executive Orders in *AFGE v. Trump*, 318 F. Supp. 3d 370 (D.D.C. 2018). The District Court issued an injunction preventing application of the Executive Orders, which was overruled by the D.C. Circuit on jurisdictional grounds only. *AFGE v. Trump*, 929 F.3d 748 (D.C. Cir. 2019). Litigation concerning the Executive Orders is still pending in other federal courts and has not yet been dismissed on jurisdictional grounds. *See for example SEIU Local 200 et al v. Trump et al*, Civ. Doc. No. 1:19-cv-01073-EAW (W.D.N.Y. – Buffalo); *NAAE v. Trump et al*, Civ. Doc. No. 8:19-cv-03057-GJH (S.D.Md.).



Section 7301 does not provide the President with broad authority to issue Executive Orders implementing the Statute. On the contrary, it specifically allows the President to "prescribe regulations for the *conduct* of employees in the executive branch." (emphasis added). Under this authority, past presidents have issued executive orders addressing federal employee drug use (Exec. Order No. 12,564, 51 Fed. Reg. 32889 (Sept. 15, 1986)); federal employee ethics (Exec. Order No. 12,674, 54 Fed. Reg. 15159 (April 12, 1989) and Exec. Order No. 13,770, 82 Fed. Reg. 9333 (Jan. 28, 2017)); smoking in the federal workplace (Exec. Order 13,058, 65 Fed. Reg. 43451 (Aug. 9, 1997)); and the investigation of federal employees for positions of public trust (Exec. Order No. 13,488, 74 Fed. Reg. 4111 (Jan. 16, 2009).

Union official time and the other aspects of the Executive Orders addressed herein are not conduct issues. Regarding official time, the Supreme Court has noted that union representatives are not "acting in their 'official capacity,' 'on the job,' or in a 'duty status'" while on official time. Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco & Firearms v. F.L.R.A., 464 U.S. 89, 105 (1983) (hereinafter BATF). While some provisions of Exec. Order No. 13,839 address employee conduct issues, Section 3, "Standard for Negotiating Grievance Procedures," and Section 4 (exempting certain matters from the scope of the negotiated grievance procedures) address solely collective bargaining issues, not employee conduct.

Moreover, Courts have uniformly concluded in cases specifically addressing the Statute that such executive orders "were not legislative." *Karahalios v. NFFE, Local 1263*, 489 U.S. 527, 535 n.3 (1989). The Court cited *Kuhn v. Nat'l Assoc. of Letter Carriers, Branch 5*, 570 F.2d 757, 760-61 (8th Cir. 1978). This Eighth Circuit decision, in turn, cited the decisions of numerous circuits for the proposition that Exec. Order No. 11,491, which governed Federal sector labor relations immediately prior to the enactment of the Statute, "was not issued under statutory



authority." *Id.* Similarly, the Third Circuit also specifically held that 5 U.S.C. § 7301 did not provide President Nixon with the statutory authority to issue Exec. Order No. 11,491:

In seeking to regulate labor relations in the federal government and internal matters of unions representing federal government employees, Executive Order No. 11491 was not issued under statutory authority providing for presidential implementation or effectuation of statutory provisions. We recognize that 5 U.S.C. § 7301 provides that: "The President may prescribe regulations for the conduct of employees in the executive branch." However, we do not read that statute as providing the necessary congressional authority to constitute Executive Order No. 11491 as a "law of the United States" within the meaning of § 1331... § 7301 has no such relationship with the substance of Executive Order No. 11491. Hence, while Executive Order No. 11491 regulates and implements federal government personnel policies, it does so solely as a product of executive authority and not as a consequence of congressional law making.

Local 1498, AFGE v. AFGE, 522 F.2d 486, 491 (3rd Cir. 1975) (internal citations and footnotes omitted). The first executive order establishing federal sector collective bargaining, Exec. Order No. 10,988, was issued by President Kennedy in 1962. This executive order cited predecessor § 7301, 5 U.S.C. § 631 as its authority. Nevertheless, the D.C. Circuit wrote:

Executive Order 10, 988 represents in essence a formulation of broad policy by the President for the guidance of federal employing agencies. *It had no specific foundation in Congressional action, nor was it required to effectuate any statute.* It could have been withdrawn at any time for any or no reason. It represented simply one President's effort to move in the direction of what he had been advised by his experts would be an improvement in the efficiency of federal employment.

Manhattan-Bronx Postal Union v. Gronouski, 350 F.2d 451, 456 (D.C. Cir. 1965).

Finally, even if § 7301 provided statutory authority for earlier presidents to issue executive orders governing federal sector collective bargaining, that general authority was rescinded when Congress enacted a more specific statute in 1978 comprehensively governing Federal sector labor relations. "[T]he Executive may obviously not rely on the broad wording of one law to achieve ends expressly foreclosed to it or permitted to it only under specified conditions by a more specific statutory directive." *AFGE v. Freeman*, 498 F.Supp. 651, 658 (D.D.C. 1980). (GSA may not issue



regulations pursuant to Presidential statement and OMB circular charging federal employees for parking under the Federal Property and Administrative Services Act as part of energy conservation plan, when Energy Policy and Conservation Act required President to submit all energy conservation plans to Congress for approval).

Ironically, the very purpose of the Federal Service Labor-Management Relations statutory scheme was to prevent the whims of the President from dictating federal labor management issues as he has done here.¹ Because the President lacks power to issue the Executive Orders, they are not valid government rules and regulations.

5. The Executive Orders Conflict with the Statute and are *Ultra Vires*

Even if it is found that the President retains authority to issue executive orders regulating the relations between the federal government and its employee unions, the Executive Orders must still be set aside if their terms conflict with the Statute. *Chamber of Commerce v. Reich*, 74 F.3d 1322, 1332-34 (D.C. Cir. 1996). The executive order provisions cited in the Agency's Statement of Position, and the Agency Head Review, conflict with both the plain text and the Statute as interpreted by the FLRA and the courts.

a. Executive Order 13837 Conflicts with the Statutory Right to Negotiate How Much Official Time is Reasonable

The Agency cites Executive Order 13837 to argue that many of the provisions at issue are nonnegotiable. These cited sections limit or prohibit official time, among other things, in direct

¹ The overall purpose of the Statute was to divest the President of authority to regulate federal sector labor relations through executive orders. Congress granted the President only the authority to remove certain groups of employees from coverage of the Statute for national security reasons. 5 U.S.C. § 7103(b). Representative Clay said that the Statute "provides for [a] statutory federal labor-management program which cannot be universally altered by any President." 124 Cong. Rec. H 9637 (daily ed. Sept 13, 1978). He explained that those who testified before his Subcommittee on the Civil Service overwhelmingly supported a statutory federal labor relations program "because the existing program was susceptible to the whims of an incumbent President." 124 Cong. Rec. H 8466 (daily ed. Aug. 11, 1978). Representative Derwinski explained that Congress' objective was to codify the [Executive Order] system into statutes which cannot, like Executive orders, be revoked by the White House at will." 124 Cong. Rec. H 9639 (daily ed. Sept 13, 1978).



conflict with 5 U.S.C § 7131. Because these EO provisions patently conflict with federal statute, they cannot be lawfully enforced.

The Statute specifically covers the topic of official time and the terms and scope of bargaining regarding the right of employees to engage in union activities during duty time. 5 U.S.C. § 7131(a) and (c) provide a list of certain activities for which employees are entitled to official time, namely, for negotiating a collective bargaining agreement and participating before the FLRA. 5 U.S.C. § 7131(b) that official time cannot be used for activities related to internal union business. 5 U.S.C. § 7131(d) grants agencies and unions broad authority to bilaterally negotiate amounts of official time for bargaining unit employees to conduct representational activities that are "reasonable, necessary, and in the public interest." *See also BATF*, 464 U.S. at 99 (defining "official time" as the right of employees to receive their "usual pay" during union-related matters).

Notably, Congress did not establish individual or bargaining unit limits in Section 7131(d). Yet, these new provisions of Executive Order 13837 expressly limit negotiations on official time usage. Specifically, Section 4(a)(i) prohibits lobbying activities during official time and Section 4(a)(v) prohibits the use of official time to prepare or pursue grievances on behalf of the union or other union members. In addition, Executive Order 13837 instructs agencies not to provide the union with government space or equipment (cited by the Agency to find proposal 3, Article 20.01-20.04, nonnegotiable), or reimburse the union for expenses incurred while performing activities on official time. *See* Sections 4(a)(iii) – (iv). The Order also mandates that official time cannot comprise more than twenty-five percent of a union employee's duty time (any excess time will count towards the limit in subsequent fiscal years) and management approval must be obtained before any official time can be used at all. *See* Exec. Order No. 13,837, Sections 4(a)(ii) and 4(b).



Courts and the FLRA have decided that each of the matters discussed above falls within the scope of the right to bargain that Congress sought to protect when it enacted the Statute. Specifically, Art 2, Sec. 5(A) providing for travel and per diem for union representatives, has been found to be a mandatory subject of bargaining absent the Executive Orders. See BATF, 464 U.S. 89, 107 n.17 (financial support to union members is negotiable during collective bargaining). Articles XX, 2, 21, 27 and 37 all deal with official time amounts that the parties found to be reasonable, necessary, and in the public interest, yet were disapproved because of Executive Order 13837. Again, this topic has been found to be a mandatory subject of bargaining. See Dep't of the Air Force Eglin Air Force Base, Fla., 2016 WL 3548040, at *13 (May 31, 2016) (a party is free "to advocate for what it believes to be the proper amount of official time"); Am. Fed'n Gov't Emps. Council of Locals No. 214 v. F.L.R.A., 798 F.2d 1525 (D.C. Cir. 1986) (finding even 100% official time a mandatory subject of bargaining). Further, the ways in which official time can be used by union representatives, is another instance where the law and Executive Orders conflict. Am. Fed'n of Gov't Emps. Nat'l Council of Field Labor Locals, 39 F.L.R.A. 546, 553 (1991) (how official time may be used is open to negotiation).

In effect, these sections of the Executive Order remove matters from the various topics that Congress left open to bargain. Considering these all together, the removal of these matters diminishes the scope of bargaining that the Statute was designed to allow. *See National Treasury Employees Union v. Chertoff*, 452 F.3d 839, 861–62 (D.C. Cir. 2006) (concluding that the removal of just six matters illegally diminished the scope of bargaining anticipated in the statute).

In *Chertoff*, the D.C. Circuit established that an agency's reduction of the matters that would otherwise be subject to negotiations deprives the union of the right to bargain collectively, and thereby violates the statute. *Chertoff*, 452 F.3d at 844. Both the number of matters affected



and the importance of the subjects that the orders target are of consideration when assessing whether the Executive Order provisions conflict with the Statute. *Id*.

Official time to assist employees in the grievance process is at the heart of union activity. The gains that workers achieve would not have been possible without the enforcement of union contracts and assisting individual members in the grievance process. *See, e.g., Vaca v. Sipes*, 386 U.S. 171, 194 (1967).

Collective bargaining over material support is also negotiable for a number of reasons, including the fact that such support helps equalize the availability of resources between management and labor. See Dep't of the Navy Naval Constr. Battalion Ctr. Port Hueneme, Cal., 14 F.L.R.A. 360, 372 (1984); see also BATF, 464 U.S. at 104 (noting that provisions of the act "aim at equalizing the positions of management and labor"); id. at 101–02 (recognizing that the justifications for allowing federal employees to perform union work during duty time have historically centered on needing "to maintain a reasonable policy with respect to union selfsupport[,]" and on the principle that union members "should be allowed official time to carry out their statutory representational activities just as management uses official time to carry out its responsibilities." With the Executive Orders in place, however, the Union's right to negotiate on topics such as official time and financial resources is significantly diminished, as seen here, where the Agency declares those topics to be nonnegotiable. Moreover, the statutory right to bargain is also significantly disturbed where management is given the right to pre-approve union representatives' use of official time. See Exec. Order No. 13,387 § 4(b). This right gives management control over when and if official time is used, which effectively shifts the determination of what is "reasonable, necessary, and in the public interest" away from both parties and into the hand of management alone.



These new "rules" artificially and preliminarily determine what is "reasonable, necessary, and in the public interest," eviscerating the carefully constructed statutory scheme whereby Congress left it to the agencies and unions to make such determinations through bilateral agreement. In addition, the removal of the above matters from the array of topics that Congress has placed on the bargaining table in the Statute reduces the scope of the protected right to bargain in an impermissible manner.

b. Executive Order 13839 Impermissibly Excludes Subjects of Bargaining Mandated by Congress in Section 7121 of the Statute

Executive Order 13839 operates to take many critical subjects off the collective bargaining table in direct contravention of 5 U.S.C. § 7121. Congress specifically mandated a broad scope grievance procedure to enable maximum problem resolution, excluding only a few matters while allowing the parties to negotiate additional exclusions where warranted. 5 U.S.C. § 7121.

It is well established that grievance procedures exist to "safeguard the participation rights of individual employees and unions...." *Am. Fed'n of Gov't Emps., Locals 225, 1504, and 3723 AFL-CIO v. Fed. Labor Relations Auth.*, 712 F.2d 640, 641 (D.C. Cir. 1983), and the Statute finds that such participation is "in the public interest," 5 U.S.C. § 7101(a), so any reduction in the scope of negotiations regarding such procedures is potentially problematic from the standpoint of the boundaries that Congress has constructed. Moreover, while the parties may further limit the scope of bargaining, those additional limitations are subject to negotiations and cannot be unilaterally decided by one party. *See Dep't of Def., Montana Air Nat'l Guard, Great Falls, MT and Ass'n of Civilian Technicians*, 00 FSIP 35 (2000); *NTEU v. Internal Revenue Service*, 27 F.L.R.A. 132, 135 (1987) (standing for the general premise that agencies must obtain agreement from the union to exclude additional subjects). In fact, the Federal Services Impasses Panel must impose a broad



scope grievance procedure unless the party seeking to narrow the scope can persuade it to do otherwise. *AFGE, Locals* 225, 1504, & 3723, *AFL-CIO v. FLRA*, 712 F.2d 640 (D.C. Cir. 1983).

Ultimately, Executive Order 13839 impermissibly interferes with the rights of federal agencies and federal employees to customize their collective bargaining agreements to the needs of the workforce and agency. Important subjects have been unilaterally removed from the bargaining table and other important subjects have been impermissibly circumscribed.

6. The Executive Orders are Not Government Wide Rules Within the Meaning of § 7117

The Agency argues that the Executive Orders are "government wide rules or regulations" upon which it has a valid reason to base its Agency Head Review / rejection of the affected contract provisions. The Agency is incorrect. To constitute a "government-wide rule or regulation," the regulation must be "generally applicable throughout the Federal government, i.e., apply to the Federal civilian work force as a whole." *National Treasury Employees Union, Chapter 6 and Internal Revenue Service, New Orleans District*, 3 F.L.R.A. 747, 755 (1980). "Congress intended that regulations which only apply to a limited segment of the Federal civilian workforce not serve to limit the duty to bargain." *Id* at 754. As a House Committee report explained:

The term "Government-wide" shall be construed literally; only those regulations which affect the civilian work force as a whole are "Government-wide regulations. No other regulations may bar negotiations. Typically, it is anticipated, the issuing agency will be the Office of Personnel Management or the General Services Administration.

H. Rep. No. 95-1403, 95th Cong., 2nd Sess. 51-52 (1978).

The Executive Orders (particularly Exec. Order No. 13,837 regulating official time) apply only to a small segment of the Federal workforce - those employees acting as union representatives, and only while they are acting as union representatives; or they apply to Federal employee unions



as an institution, or to the unions' relationship with the government. They are not policies that govern working conditions of the civil service generally, as are the policies that the FLRA have generally found to constitute "government-wide rules and regulations." Such regulations are issued by Federal agencies pursuant to a Congressional directive to issue regulations implementing a Federal statute governing Federal employment. For example:

- OPM regulations establishing minimum waiting periods before promotion of General Schedule employees. *Professional Air Traffic Controllers Organization and* Department of Transportation, Federal Aviation Administration, 4 F.L.R.A. 232 (1980).
- General Services Administration's regulations governing reimbursement rates for Federal employee travel. National Federation of Federation Employees Local 29 and Kansas City District Corps of Engineers, 20 F.L.R.A. 543 (1985).
- OSHA health and safety regulations governing employment in Federal workplaces.
 AFGE Local 1458 and Department of Justice, Office of the U.S. Attorney, Southern District of Florida, 29 F.L.R.A. 3, 5 (1987).
- Department of State Standardized Regulations governing housing and other allowances for employees of all Federal agencies stationed overseas. Overseas Education Association and Department of Defense Office of Dependent Schools, 22 F.L.R.A. 351, 354 (1986).

Each of these and the other regulations which the FLRA have found to constitute "government-wide rules and regulations" that have precluded bargaining over proposal that are in conflict are facially neutral and were not issued with the explicit intent to limit the scope of bargaining. "[W]e have recognized some important limitations on the government's ability to diminish the scope of collective bargaining through government-wide regulations," wrote the Court of Appeals. *U.S. Dep't of Treasury, I.R.S. v. Fed. Labor Relations Auth.*, 996 F.2d 1246, 1251 (D.C. Cir. 1993).

Moreover, the Executive Orders cannot constitute "government-wide rules and regulations" because there are no corresponding "consultation rights" for the unions to exercise before they were issued. In exchange for precluding bargaining over proposals that conflict



"government-wide rules and regulations," Congress granted unions the right to be consulted, and have their views considered, before those regulations are issued. 5 U.S.C. § 7117(d). Only an "agency" grants consultation rights over government-wide rules and regulations under § 7117², and therefore Congress envisioned that it would only be an "agency" who would be issuing such regulations (and not the Executive) and that such consultation rights would be available before any matter was taken off the bargaining table. The FLRA has characterized this as "the concomitant right of a labor organization." *NTEU Chapter 6*, 3 F.L.R.A. at 754. During debate, Subcommittee Chair Clay³ explained:

In section 7117, the Udall substitute removes many Government-wide regulations from collective bargaining. We have agreed to this change with the understanding that the consultation rights accorded exclusive representatives are to be rigidly enforced. It should be clear from the contents of the agency statement required in subsection 7117(d)(3)(B) that the agency has in fact considered the views and recommendations of the labor organizations exercising consultation rights. A clear record is also necessary for later judicial review of the adequacy of the agency's proceedings that led to the promulgation of the regulation.

124 Cong. Rec. H9638 (daily ed. Sept. 13, 1978). Thus, consultation rights were the *quid pro quo* for "government-wide rules and regulations," and Congress intended the scope of "government-wide rules and regulations" would be co-extensive with the scope of consultations rights. And since, under the Statute and FLRA regulations, only agencies grant consultation rights and not the Executive Office of the President, and since the Plaintiff unions were not afford the opportunity to consult on the substance of the three Executive Orders before they were issued, the Executive Orders cannot qualify as "government-wide rules and regulations" within the meaning of § 7117.

² See also FLRA regulations on how unions qualify for consultation rights, 5 C.F.R. Part 2426.11, 2426.12.

³ The Court of Appeals has called Rep. Clay one of the "major players in the legislation" and has relied heavily on his remarks when interpreting the Statute and the scope of bargaining it creates. *Office of Personnel Management v. FLRA*, 864 F.2d 165, 169 (D.C. Cir. 1988).



It is "a statement of black letter law" that 'the President's power, if any, to issue executive orders must stem either from an act of Congress or from the Constitution itself.' *Minnesota v. Mille Lacs Band of Chippewa Indians*, 526 U.S. 172, 188–89 (1999), *quoting Youngstown Sheet & Tube Co. v. Sawyer*, 343 U.S. 579, 585 (1952). An executive order that is either issued without legal authority, or which is in conflict with an act of Congress, may not be enforced. *Mille Lacs Band of Chippewa Indians*, 526 U.S. at 189 (holding that the parties' failure to point to any "colorable source for the President's authority" meant that portion of the Executive Order directing removal of Native Americans was invalid); *Chamber of Commerce of the United States v. Reich*, 74 F.3d 1322, 1327-30 (D.C. Cir. 1996) (finding that an executive order disqualifying federal contractors who hire permanent striker replacements conflicts with National Labor Relations Act).

Therefore, because the Executive Orders upon which the Agency has based its rejection of many proposals herein were issued without statutory authority, in conflict with Chapter 71, are ultra vires, and do not constitute a valid government-wide rule, the executive orders cited by the Agency may not be enforced by the Authority.

SETTLEMENT AGREEMENT

The U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (Agency) and the National Federation of Federal Employees, IAMAW, AFL-CIO (Union) (*collectively*, the Parties) agree to the following terms and conditions as full and complete settlement of the unfair labor practice charge in Case No. WA-CA-17-0418.

- 1. NFFE agrees to immediately sign the ground rules as written with the following modification: NFFE agrees to pay travel and per diem associated with preparation time. A copy of said ground rules are attached hereto as Exhibit 1.
- 2. The Parties agree to limit contract negotiations to no more than eight articles. Each party will select no more than four (4) articles they are interested in bargaining. The opposing side will have the opportunity to strike one of the other party's four articles from negotiations.
- 3. The Parties agree face-to-face bargaining will take place in the alternating locations of Atlanta, GA and Washington, DC.
- 4. NFFE agrees to post the attached Notice to Employees at all locations where its employees work.
- In exchange for the Union's commitment to perform the above-referenced actions, the Agency agrees to immediately withdraw the unfair labor practice charge in Case No. WA-CA-17-0418.

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING GROUND RULES

I. Preamble

- A. This Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) is entered into by and between the Department of Veterans Affairs (hereinafter referred to as the Department or Agency) and the National Federation of Federal Employees, AFL-CIO, National Veterans Affairs Council (hereinafter referred to as NFFE or Union).
- B. This MOU shall govern the procedures for negotiating a Master Agreement between the Department and the Union for all Title 5, hybrid 38 and Title 38 employees included in the consolidated VA-NFFE bargaining units as certified by the Federal Labor Relations Authority (FLRA).
- C. This MOU will remain in full force and effect until such time as negotiations are completed, ratified by union members, passes agency head review, and is signed by the parties.
- D. The parties agree that the terms of this agreement do not establish ground rules for future negotiations. This does not prevent either side from proposing language from this MOU, any previous ground rules, or other source at future ground rules negotiations.

II. Procedures

- A. Pursuant to Article 48 Duration of the current Master Agreement between the parties, that agreement shall remain in effect until a new successor master Agreement becomes effective.
- B. Either party may reopen for negotiations any article or articles from the Master Agreement between the Department of Veterans Affairs and the National Federation of Federal Employees dated July 1, 2012 (Master) Agreement. Either party may propose new articles not found in the Master Agreement or propose that articles in the 2012 Master Agreement not appear in the new contract. These proposals will be exchanged in Microsoft Word. When exchanging a proposal, both parties will identify when a proposal is the same as the article in the current Master Agreement. Either party may submit up to two additional articles no later than 30 days after the first face to face negotiation session.
- C. The parties agree that all members of the Master Agreement Negotiating Team have the requisite authority to negotiate on behalf of their respective party.
- D. The parties agree that the participation of any subject matter experts shall be for purpose of providing resource information mutually beneficial to the parties. See Section IV, Other Participants, below.

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- E. The parties will use any appropriate bargaining technique or a combination thereof. The parties will alternate presenting proposed articles of their choosing. The Chief Negotiators will inform the other of at least three articles they plan to propose prior to the scheduled bargaining session. Each party will introduce its proposed article before any discussion of the article takes place. The party presenting the article will be responsible for providing an electronic copy to the other team. As each proposal is, presented the party offering the proposal will explain it, and at a minimum provide the meaning, intent, interest and objectives (if any) of the proposed language. There will be ample opportunity for questions and answers, additional information, and other discussion. The parties will bargain in good faith to reach agreement.
- F. The effective date of the ground rules is the date they are signed by both Parties
- G. Each party will designate a Chief Negotiator. Chief Negotiators will be responsible for providing leadership and being responsible for the conduct of their members Chief Negotiator is responsible for the following, with respect to that party's team:
 - Determining the Master Agreement Negotiating Team members including alternates
 - Designating their Alternate Chief Negotiator and Master Agreement Negotiating Team Alternates.
 - · Calling caucuses with specified timeframes.
 - Requesting mediation assistance through Federal Mediation and Conciliation (FMCS).
 - Requesting assistance from the Federal Service Impasses Panel (FSIP).
 - Reaching tentative agreements on contract language.
 - Initialing, dating and signing agreed-upon articles.
- H. The Chief Negotiators are jointly responsible for the following:
 - Determining the dates for bargaining session, addressing scheduling or logistics modification to negotiations sessions in accordance with the ground rules scheduling agreement.
 - Signing completely agreed upon articles.
 - Mutually agreeing to the presence and number of an observer(s) and subject matter experts during bargaining.
 - Enlist the assistance of a facilitator in the bargaining process.

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- Since agreements are only reached when the parties are together, each party will make
 every effort to limit the number and length of caucuses, and will provide an update if more
 time is needed. The Bargaining team requesting a caucus will indicate the length of caucus,
 which normally will not exceed 2 hours, prior to leaving the negotiation room to caucus in
 the caucus room.
- J. During negotiations the Chief Negotiator for each party will verbally signify tentative agreement on each section. Upon request of the Chief Negotiators, the record keeper will memorialize tentative agreements by highlighting or setting the agreed-upon language in boldface in the working document of each article. Tentative agreements on an article may be revoked by either party at any time before the Chief Negotiators signs the final page of the article. When an entire article is fully negotiated and agreed upon, each Chief Negotiator will initial each page of the article and sign and date the last page of the article. The parties may reconsider or revise any signed article only by mutual consent. No signed article is binding and effective until the entire agreement is executed by the parties consistent with this MOU.
- K. A third party action filed by either party concerning these negotiations will not delay further bargaining while the action is pending, except by mutual agreement.
- L. To preserve the integrity of the bargaining process and to promote open exchange of interests and concerns, the parties agree that the content of discussions during Master Contract negotiations will be confidential. Periodic reports on the progress of negotiations to VA Leadership or NFFE Leadership, including local union representatives, will be appropriate, but the information communicated will be confidential and is embargoed from further distribution. The general publication or distribution of specific contract proposals or counter-proposals language discussed or agreed prior to the execution of the contract is strictly prohibited.
- M. Each bargaining team will consist of a chief negotiator and six bargaining team members for a total of seven bargaining team members. Within 10 calendar days of signing ground rules each Chief Negotiator must serve, in writing, the names and contact information of its respective representatives to the opposing Chief Negotiator.

III. Official Time and Bargaining Preparation

- A. This Section applies to Union representatives on the bargaining team who are employed by the Department.
- B. In accordance with 5 USC 7131(a), the seven Union representatives on the Bargaining Team shall be granted official time to attend and participate in the bargaining sessions. The amount of official time will not exceed 40 hours per bargaining session week.

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- C. The Department will pay for travel and per diem for six union bargaining team members to meet for two weeks to write proposals and/or prepare for bargaining. The six members will get 40 hours of official time for these two, one week meetings. The meeting location will be in Atlanta GA and the Department will provide a meeting room for the meeting if needed. The Union will give the Department proposed dates for travel 15 days in advance so travel will be arranged. Additionally, six union bargaining team members will receive one week of 40 hours of official time the union will either work remotely or be responsible for their own travel and per diem.
- D. The Parties will provide a complete set of proposals 60 calendar days from signing of ground rules. The parties will begin face to face negotiations 30 calendar days following the exchange of the proposals.
- E. The seven union bargaining team members will receive 16 hours of official time for the weeks when the parties are not at a scheduled bargaining session. Additionally, in accordance with 5 USC 7131(c), official time will be granted for the seven union bargaining team members to attended proceedings before the FLRA. A total of twenty hours of official time will be given to the seven bargaining team members for purposes of ratification votes upon reaching tentative agreement on all articles.
- F. If one of the seven bargaining team members has an existing allocation of official time, he or she may transfer any portion of the existing allocation of official time to a bargaining unit employee while he or she is attending the negotiations, subject to 5 USC 7106 and 38 USC 7422. A recipient of transferred official time may only use the time to perform the functions for which it was originally allocated. (For example, if a member of the bargaining team has an allocation of official time at a local facility to be the Local President, he or she may transfer the Local President allocation to one other union representative, but only for the purpose of being the Local President). Any transfer of time must be coordinated with the supervisor of the employee receiving the transfer.

IV. Other Participants

A. Role of Observers

The Chief Negotiators may permit observers to attend Master Agreement Negotiating Committee sessions. Observers will remain silent not participate in the negotiation process, and will otherwise abide by all the ground rules agreed to by the Negotiating teams. Each party is responsible for any travel expenses for its own observer. The Chief Negotiators will make every effort to work with the Observer's supervisor or other management official to encourage attendance.

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B. Role of Alternates

Each Chief Negotiator may approve attendance of Alternates at Master Agreement Negotiating sessions. Bargaining Team Member alternates serve during another team member's absence. The alternate will have the full rights, responsibilities and authority of the Master Agreement Negotiating Team member for whom they are substituting. Chief Negotiators will notify each other of alternates prior to the alternate's participation in the negotiation session with time sufficient to arrange release from duties and schedule travel. The Chief Negotiators will make every effort to work with the Alternate's supervisor or other management official to encourage attendance.

C. Role of Neutral

The Department will designate one additional person, the "Neutral," who is not on either bargaining team, to memorialize the parties' proposals and tentative agreements during the bargaining sessions. The Neutral is not considered part of either bargaining team and may not participate as a team member at the bargaining table during negotiations or in caucuses. The Neutral will observe the confidentiality of the bargaining process. During bargaining, the Neutral will project the proposed article onto the screen, make any necessary changes to the article and provide an electronic copy of the article to the other party every time the parties separate. Prior to the first session the Chief Negotiators will have a conference call with the proposed neutral.

D. Role of Subject Matter Experts (SMEs)

Subject Matter Experts (SME's) must be mutually agreed to in advance by the Chief Negotiators. SME's will have no bargaining role in the negotiation process. SME's may only comment and answer questions on matters within the scope of their expertise. SME's will provide their comment and questions by phone, V-Tel, Lync or other electronic communications. If it is necessary for the SME to attend negotiation sessions their attendance will be mutually agreed to by the Chief Negotiators in advance. The Chief Negotiators will work with the SME's supervisor or other management official to encourage attendance. The Department is responsible for any travel and per diem expenses for requested and approved SME's.

V. Session Schedules

Absent mutual agreement by the Chief Negotiators to the contrary, the following rules regarding bargaining sessions shall be followed:

A. The parties will meet two weeks per month for the first three months of bargaining. If at the end of three months there is 25% or less of articles remaining (articles either not signed or set aside for impasse), then the parties will only need to meet one week a month. If not, the parties will continue to meet for two weeks a month, and will reevaluate on a month by month basis.

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- B. Six months after the first week of bargaining commences, bargaining will terminate and the parties will proceed to mediation. By mutual agreement, the parties can schedule additional bargaining sessions prior to meeting with the FMCS. The FMSC mediator will serve as both a facilitator for unaddressed articles and as the mediator to release the parties to the FSIP, if needed.
- C. The Department will fund travel and per diem expenses for up to 7 VA Employees designated as union team members approved for scheduled negotiation sessions for up to 6 months of bargaining. If the parties proceed to mediation then the Department will pay travel and per diem for up to 3 months of mediation for NFFE team members who are VA employees. Observers will not be permitted. If mediation is unsuccessful, the Department will pay travel and per diem for any attendance at proceedings with the FSIP.
- D. If the parties complete bargaining and contact the FMCS prior to the six month deadline, the Department will fund travel and per diem for 7 of NFFE's VA representatives to attend mediation for the remainder of the six months agreed to in the section above. The bargaining schedule will be mutually agreed upon. The Chief Negotiators will meet to plan a schedule of dates upon signing of the ground rules within 30 days. The hourly bargaining schedule is as follows:

Monday - Thursday: 8:00 am - 5:00 pm Sunday and Friday: Travel day

- E. Through mutual agreement, the Chief Negotiators may make changes to the session schedules.
- F. Upon mutual agreement of the Chief Negotiators, the parties may work later. The parties agree that the Union negotiators are not entitled to overtime, compensatory time for travel, or compensatory time.
- G. The Department will provide one conference room suitable for negotiations and one conference room suitable for caucuses at a location(s) to be determined by the Department. The rooms will have access to printers, Wi-Fi, telephone with conference capabilities. NFFE may provide and the Department will consider any input regarding the parties' possible bargaining locations.
- H. The dress code for the negotiations will be business casual and appropriate for travel days.
- Cellular phones and other mobile devices will be placed on vibrate or silent mode.

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VI. Services and Facilities

Issues arising regarding services and/or facilities will be resolved expeditiously by the Chief Negotiators. Team members will assist the Chief Negotiators in this area consistent with their individual knowledge and skills.

VII. Impasse Issues

If the parties are unable to reach agreement with assistance from the FMCS mediator, either party may request the assistance of the Federal Services Impasses Panel (FSIP) in accordance with 5 USC 7119 and implementing regulations.

VIII. Mid-Term Negotiations

Absent the mutual agreement of the Chief Negotiators, midterm negotiations will be conducted in accordance of Article 8 of the current NFFE and VA Master Agreement. If the Chief Negotiators mutually agree the matter may be referred to the Master Negotiating Team.

IX. Supplemental and Official Time Negotiations

All local supplemental negotiations or local official time negotiations shall not be initiated after the effective date of this MOU. Any local official time or local supplemental agreements or past practices as of the effective date of this MOU shall remain in effect.

X. Notes

There will be no recording of the negotiations, neither audio nor video. This does not preclude either party from taking laptop or handwritten notes.

XI. Negotiability Before Agency Head Review/ 7422 Appeal

- A. If the Department believes the proposal is non-negotiable (including 38 USC 7422) it will identify how the proposal is inconsistent with a law or government-wide rule or regulation. The Parties will discuss whether there are any ways to resolve the negotiability issue. If the Union continues to believe its proposal is negotiable, it may request a formal declaration of non-negotiability. If the Department declares any proposal non-negotiable, the Union may follow the procedures for resolving negotiability disputes set forth in 5 USC 7117 (Duty to Bargain in Good Faith; Compelling Need; Duty to Consult).
- B. If any proposal declared non-negotiable is subsequently determined by the FLRA to be negotiable, or if the allegation of non-negotiability is withdrawn by the Department, the proposal will, upon the Union(s)'s request, be negotiated at the next scheduled bargaining session or as soon a bargaining session can be scheduled. Nothing in this section will preclude the right of judicial review by either party. If an issue is determined

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by the Secretary of Veterans Affairs or designee to be negotiable under Title 38, section 7422, the issue will, upon the Union(s)'s request, be negotiated at the next scheduled bargaining session or as soon a bargaining session can be scheduled.

XI. Ratification

- A. Upon completion of the negotiations of Articles, the entire Master Agreement will be referred to the Union's membership for ratification. If the union ratifies these articles, it will so notify the Department, and the chief negotiators will execute the agreement within 5 calendar days of such notice. The Parties will then refer the executed Master Agreement for agency head review.
- B. The Union will have sixty (60) calendar days after signature of the term agreement to ratify the contract. If the Union fails to notify the Department within 60 calendar days that it has not ratified the contract, the contract will be considered ratified.
- C. If the Master Agreement is not ratified, the Union will identify the article or portion of the article for reconsideration as soon as possible but no later than 15 calendar days after failure of ratification. Failure to provide the Department with the articles or portion of the articles of failed ratification in this time frame constitutes ratification. The Department and Union will meet within 10 calendar days of notification to attempt to resolve articles union membership did not ratify.
- D. Agency Head Review: Pursuant to 5 USC 7114(c), the head of the Department shall approve the contract within 30 days from the date the agreement is executed if the agreement is consistent with the Federal Service Labor-Management Relations Statute and any other applicable laws, rules or government-wide regulation.
- E. If the Department head does not approve or disapprove the contract within the 30 day period, the Master Agreement shall take effect and be binding on the Department and the Union to the extent it is consistent with law, rules and government-wide regulation. The Master Agreement will be in effect when it has been executed and approved under this section.
- F. If any provisions are rejected by the Secretary on Agency Head Review, the Parties will as soon as possible to review the provisions to determine if they can resolve the dispute prior to the union filing a negotiability appeal. Only rejected language raised at agency head review may be referred to FLRA for negotiability appeal. The Union retains the right to file a negotiability appeal with the FLRA, or seek relief in federal court, as appropriate.

XII. Effective Date

The Master Agreement will be in effect when it has been ratified, approved, and signed.

DECISION AND ORDER

This case, filed by the National Federation of Federal Employees (Union) on February 27, 2019, concerns a dispute between it and the United States Department of Veteran Affairs (Agency or Management) over all or parts of 4 articles in the parties' collective-bargaining agreement (CBA). This dispute was filed pursuant to §7119 of the Federal Service Labor-Management Relations Statute (the Statute). On May 1, 2019, the Panel asserted jurisdiction over most issues in dispute and directed that those issues be resolved in the manner described below.

BARGAINING AND PROCEDURAL HISTORY

The Agency is responsible for fulfilling President Lincoln's promise "to care for him who shall have borne the battle, and for his widow, and his orphan" by serving America's veterans "with dignity and compassion and to be their principal advocate in ensuring that they receive care, support, and recognition" for their service to the United States. The Union represents approximately 8,000 bargaining unit employees located throughout the United States who are in a variety of professional positions. The parties are governed by a CBA that expired in July 2015 but continues to roll over.

The Union provided the Agency with a request to renegotiate the CBA in May 2015. Sometime thereafter, the parties began negotiations over a ground rules agreement and largely agreed to what language would be included within that agreement. Despite the foregoing, and before the parties could execute the ground rules agreement, the Union rescinded its request to bargain in January 2017. Accordingly, the Agency filed an unfair labor practice (ULP) charge against the Union. In order to resolve the charge, the parties executed a settlement agreement (ULP)



settlement) with the assistance of the Federal Labor Relations Authority's (FLRA) Office of the General Counsel. The agreement required the parties to execute their ground rules agreement and begin CBA negotiations.

The parties turned to contract negotiations that lasted from April 2018 to October 2018. Additionally, they had 6 weeks of mediation with the Federal Mediation and Conciliation Services (FMCS) between December 2018 and February 2019. The Mediator released the parties on February 27, 2019, in FMCS Case No. 201911770013. The Union filed its request for Panel assistance on the same day. The Agency subsequently filed its own request for assistance. The latter request was consolidated into the former.

Before the Panel, the Union argued that the Panel should decline jurisdiction over the entirety of this dispute because: (1) the ULP settlement prohibited the Agency from introducing its article on official time (Article XX); and (2) several matters were covered by articles that were unopened and, therefore, agreed to. The Agency disputed each claim. Ultimately, the Panel rejected the Union's arguments and asserted jurisdiction over the full dispute on May 1, 2019. The Panel ordered the parties to provide the Panel with Written Submissions in support of their respective positions; they were also provided with an opportunity to provide rebuttal statements. The parties provided both sets of documents to the Panel.

PROPOSALS AND POSITION OF THE PARTIES

Article XX – Official Time

Agency Article and Position

The Agency offers a new article that will address solely the topic of official time. From Management's perspective, Article XX is the result of the implementation of its Veterans Affairs Time and Attendance System (VATAS) system. VATAS came about because the Government Accounting Office (GAO) issued a 2017 report in which it lambasted the Agency's inability to accurately track the use of official time. Thus, the Agency's proposed article provides it with what it believes are tools to effectively track such time through VATAS. Accordingly, among other things, the Agency offers the following official-time related proposals:

- Official time for national and local Union use will be established through proposed banks of hours;
- Employees will be prohibited from devoting more than 50% duty time to official time tasks during a year;
- Requests for official time must be made pursuant to VATAS and coordinated with supervisors;



Categories permitting the use of official time are established.

Management rejects the Union's jurisdictional arguments discussed below in greater detail. In short, the ULP settlement calls for negotiations. Moreover, the Union itself has raised issues involving official time, so Management may properly offer its own proposals on that topic.

II. Union Article and Position

In opposition to the Agency's proposal, the Union renews arguments that it presented to the Panel previously. Namely, it contends that bargaining over this matter is foreclosed by the ULP settlement and that the parties already have agreement on language in unopened portions of the CBA that already address official time. Thus, imposition of the Agency's proposal is inappropriate.

The Union does not offer its own proposal, but it does challenge some of the positions taken by the Agency in support of its language. For example, the GAO report examined five Veteran Affairs facilities, but the report did not clarify whether any of those facilities involved bargaining units represented by the Union. Additionally, Management did not provide evidence to demonstrate that current official-time reporting requirements are problematic. Finally, the Union argues that the Agency's claim that Article XX does not reduce official time is inaccurate because existing language permits local negotiations over official time. Article XX, however, does not.

III. Conclusion

The Panel adopts a modified version of Management's proposal. The Union's primary opposition to the Agency's proposal are arguments that the Panel rejected when it asserted jurisdiction over this dispute on May 1, 2019. By the Union's concession, it has presented no new position. As the Panel previously rejected these contentions, the Panel will reject them once again.

On the merits, only the Agency has provided a proposal for consideration. Given the lack of a Union proposal, it is appropriate to use Management's proposal as a basis for resolving this dispute. Although Management's proposal should serve as the base, there is the issue of the Agency's offered amount of official time. In particular, the Agency offers 6,032 hours to national officers per year in Section 2.A and B. It also offers 624 hours per year to local facilities in Section 3.A. As to the former category, the Agency argues that it is not seeking a reduction of hours from the existing agreement. Rather, Management is merely converting hours from percentage to an actual numerical value in order to make tracking easier. Regarding the latter category, Management proposes this bank in order to establish consistency between national and local official-time usage.

The Panel recently clarified its view on non-guarantees of official time. In *Social Security Administration and AFGE*, 19 FSIP 019 (May 2019) (*SSA*), the Panel acknowledged that such categories fall under 5 U.S.C. §7131(d), which provides that



such official time will be granted in any amount parties demonstrate to be "reasonable, necessary, and in the public interest." However, the Panel also noted that it has authority to impose amounts when the parties cannot reach agreement. When imposing such decisions, the Panel clarified that it expects *all* parties to justify their position as "reasonable, necessary, and in the public interest." That is, parties should have no expectation that the Panel will simply adopt one of their positions in the absence of supporting data.

In light of SSA, the Panel cannot conclude that the Agency has satisfied its burden to demonstrate that the offered hours discussed above satisfy the criteria of §7131(d). The Agency's arguments in favor of their proffered banks of official time essentially revolve around consistency and the need to track usage of official time. But, the Agency does not offer empirical data establishing that the actual hours offered are necessary in light of the Union's work load. And, it is not apparent from the record before the Panel how much official time is used by the Union or whether the Union could justify that usage (which is only compounded by the Union's refusal to offer a counter proposal). In light of this lack of data, the Panel does not believe it is appropriate to accept the Agency's offers in its Sections 2.A and B or Section 3.A. Accordingly, Sections 2.A and B should be stricken and replaced with the following language: "National Union representatives may request official time pursuant to 5 U.S.C. §7131(d). Such requests will not be considered automatic grants of official time." Further, Section 3.A should be stricken and replaced with the following language: "Local Union representatives may request official time pursuant to 5 U.S.C. §7131(d). Such requests will not be considered automatic grants of official time."

The Union challenges various portions of the Agency's position on several grounds, including the accuracy of the GAO report and lack of supporting data to justify the Agency's proposal. The Panel, however, has rejected Management's position by imposing language that operates independently of the justifications offered by the Agency. Accordingly, the Union's arguments have no bearing on the disposition of this dispute.

The Panel further believes it is appropriate to strike Section 1.G of Management's proposal, which states that any "Union Official holding a position listed in 38 USC 7401(1)¹ is not eligible for use of official time under 5 U.S.C. 7131(d) as these are direct patient care positions." Under 38 U.S.C. §7421, the Secretary for the Department of Veterans of Affairs has the authority to issue regulations for certain Title 38 employees² concerning their conditions of employment. However, pursuant to 38

This statute references "[p]hysicians, dentists, podiatrists, chiropractors, optometrists, registered nurses, physician assistants, and expanded-function dental auxiliaries." 38 U.S.C. §7401(1).

U.S.C. § 7422(b) and (d), this authority is subject to bargaining obligations under Chapter 71 of Title 5, *i.e.*, the Federal Service Labor Management Relations Statute (Statute), *unless* the Secretary concludes a bargaining topic touches upon a matter of "professional conduct or competence." The phrase "professional conduct or competence" is defined to include "direct patient care." Stated differently, the Secretary can conclude that a matter is excluded from statutory collective bargaining obligations because it concerns "direct patient care." Under §7422, only the United States Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia Circuit has the authority to review the merits of the Secretary's decision to exclude a topic from negotiations.⁴

The Agency's proposed Article XX, Section 1.G arose because the Agency has concluded that, pursuant to 38 U.S.C. §7422, official time usage for certain categories of Title 38 employees concerned direct patient care and is, therefore, exempt from collective bargaining rights and procedures. Management's proposal, therefore, is an attempt to codify this determination. The Panel does not believe it is necessary to include contract language on this topic as it essentially calls for the Panel to define the parties' legal rights. As discussed above, other forums are appropriate for challenging the Agency's decision, and it would be prudent to allow any challenge to unfold elsewhere. Additionally, the Agency has not claimed that this language is necessary in order to give effect to the Agency's determination. **Accordingly, the language will be stricken.**

Article 5 – Negotiated Grievance Procedure

Agency Article and Position

Management desires to change several aspects of the parties' existing negotiated grievance procedure. In particular, they seek alterations to three major topics.

The Agency's first proposed change concerns topics to be excluded from the scope of the grievance procedure. In particular, Management proposes excluding disputes over removals due to misconduct or poor performance, equal employment opportunity (EEO) matters, matters appealable to the Merit System Protection Board (MSPB), and terminations of temporary appointments. With respect to removals, recently enacted legislation concerning Agency employees – 38 U.S.C. §714 (discussed in greater detail below) – governs removals of those employees and provides a more effective template for removal. And, as to all four of these categories, the Union rarely pursues grievances involving any of these topics. Indeed, it has yet to file a single grievance involving the termination of a temporary employee, and there are no such employees currently within the unit. Management's proposed exclusions will create a more streamlined approach to grievance resolutions.

The Agency formalized this position in a written statement issued on April 26, 2019, after the parties had submitted their dispute to the Panel.

The second topic of proposed alteration involves Union use of time and resources to pursue grievances. Management proposes that the Union will be entitled to *no* official time for purposes of processing a grievance. Additionally, the Union will have no entitlement to the use of Agency resources in the same. And, the Union will receive no reimbursement for expenses or travel involved with pursing a grievance. Management does not believe that providing the foregoing is in the interest of the taxpayers as they have an expectation that Agency resources will be devoted to Agency business rather than third-party litigation. For similar reasons, the Agency believes that official time to pursue these actions is not "reasonable, necessary, and in the public interest" within the meaning of 5 U.S.C. §7131(d). Indeed, Management believes the Union is seeking "unlimited" official time to pursue these actions.

The final category involves Management opposition to new language that would call for the Agency to pay the travel expenses of Union witnesses in connection with a grievance hearing. Management argues that this language conflicts with language the parties agreed to elsewhere (although Management does not provide a specific citation). Thus, it should be rejected.

II. Union Article and Position

With respect to the first two categories above, the Union seeks to retain the status quo. The last category, however, is new contract language.

On the topic of exclusions, the Union notes that the United States Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia has held that a proponent seeking exclusion of topics from a grievance procedure bears a heavy burden to demonstrate that exclusion is appropriate. Management has not met this burden for any of its exclusion as it failed to provide empirical data demonstrate a need for any of them. Additionally, the MSPB lacks a quorum and the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC) is experiencing a significant backlog. Neither forum, therefore, is an attractive option. Finally, with respect to 38 U.S.C. §714, the Union acknowledges that this statute is new but notes that many concepts contained within are not. Thus, it should not serve as a barrier to grievances.

As to the use of resources to process grievances, the Union opposes Management's language in its entirety. Contrary to Management's claim, it is not seeking unlimited official time. Rather, it is requesting only "reasonable" amounts of official time consistent with 5 U.S.C. §7131(d) and recent Panel decisions. As to the use of Agency resources, the Union is of the position that the parties "agreed" that Article 9 of the CBA would remain in effect, and Section 1 of this article addresses the use of various pieces of Agency equipment for "representational purposes." It would therefore be inappropriate to accept Management's proposal. The Union also raises the same argument for Union representation travel and per diem expenses in conjunction

with grievances. Specifically, it claims that Article 9, Section 6 authorizes such expenses for "representational purposes."

Finally, the Union requests imposition of its witness-travel language. The Union claims it reflects current practice. Moreover, the proposal calls for the parties to explore video and teleconference options to save costs.

III. Conclusion

The Panel will impose a compromise proposal. For the reasons that follow, it will accept most of Management's language but remove the Agency's proposed grievance exclusions.

Grievance Exclusions

The Panel recently clarified its stance on proposed grievance exclusions. In SSA, the Panel acknowledged that it would be mindful of the holding of AFGE when tasked with determining whether exclusion is warranted. More specifically, it acknowledged that AFGE requires the Panel to examine whether an exclusion proponent establishes the need for such an exclusion in those "particular" circumstances. Thus, although an exclusion proponent bears the burden of proof, that burden turns on the particular facts of each individual case.

Although Management proposes multiple exclusions, the primary point of contention appears to be the topic of removals of Agency employees. The Agency's main concern is consistency with the recently enacted 38 U.S.C. §714 (effective June 23, 2017). This statute permits the Agency Secretary to "remove, demote, or suspend" Agency employees for misconduct or poor performance. This section further creates abbreviated deadlines for proposing such actions and granting employees an opportunity to respond. Additionally, it establishes an expedited review process to the MSPB, including the ability to ultimately appeal to the United States Court of Appeals for the Federal Circuit. Finally, as relevant, this statute permits employees to pursue grievances pursuant to a collective bargaining agreement where available. But, such grievances are subject to the requirements of §714. And, in any event, a proposed Agency action must be upheld if supported by "substantial evidence" 13

The Agency's concern about §714 is borne out of alleged real-world incidents. It notes that, since this law's enactment, the Agency has experienced at least five separate grievances in which an arbitrator applied an erroneous burden of proof. 14 Yet,

Management does not dispute the Union's argument that none of these circumstances involved bargaining unit employees represented by *this* Union. This distinction is important because exclusion under *AFGE* turns on each case's *particular* circumstances. And, in these particular circumstances, the Agency has offered no evidence that these parties' existing grievance process has created any of the foregoing issues it cited.

The only other arguments offered by the Agency on this topic are the lack of overall grievances and the lack of timeframe differences between grievances and MSPB actions. Yet, these arguments undercut the Agency's position because they do not demonstrate that the Agency faces any sort of continued hardship were the existing language to continue.

The other exclusions meet similar fates. The Agency admits there have been few to no grievances for EEO matters, MSPB-related actions, and termination of temporary appointments. ¹⁵ Again, given the *lack* of a problem, it is difficult to establish exclusion is justified. The Agency also alleges that exclusion of these categories will create a "consistent system." But, the Agency does not explain how this will be, particularly where actions could continue to be filed in a number of venues depending upon the underlying causes of action and defenses. Accordingly, the Panel does not believe there is a basis for accepting Management's proposed exclusions and Management's Proposals 1 and 2 for Article 5 should be withdrawn.

ii. Agency Resources and Grievances

The parties next dispute turns on the allocation of various Agency resources in the pursuit of Union-filed grievances. Broadly, such resources fall into the categories of official time, Agency facilities, and the recuperation of expenses. Each will be addressed in turn.

The first topic is official time, and Management opposes granting *any* such time for the purposes of pursuing a grievance. The Union, by contrast, wishes to retain existing language that allows the Union to request a "reasonable" amount of time. As this Decision and Order discusses the topic of official time within the context of Article XX, the Panel believes that discussion applies equally within this context. Instead of Management's proposal, the Panel will impose the following language: "Official time for all matters concerning grievances shall be governed by Article XX, Sections 2.A, 2.B, and 3.A." This language will take the place of Management's Proposal 3.A.

The next area of analysis concerns Union use of Agency facilities and equipment to pursue grievances and also reimbursement of travel and other expenses for Union representatives and witnesses. As an initial matter, the Union argues this topic is foreclosed because the parties reached agreement on these issues in Article 9 of the

CBA. The Union raised this precise argument in an effort to persuade the Panel to deny jurisdiction, and the Panel rejected it. As these arguments present nothing new, the Panel will once again deny them.

Turning to the merits, the Panel will impose the entirety of Management's language for Article 5, Proposal 3.B. In support of its language, Management argued to the Panel that taxpayer-funded resources should not be used to support litigation against a taxpayer-funded agency. The Agency's argument is a sensible one. Agency resources should be utilized primarily to support the Agency's mission. Co-opting the foregoing to buttress a Union-sponsored grievance does not further the goals of the Agency's mission, nor is it clear how advancing such litigation provides a benefit to the taxpayer. The Panel adopts the Agency's language without alteration to resolve this dispute.

The final category involves travel and per diem for Union representatives and Union witnesses. Management's position is that each party should be responsible for their own respective costs, and the Union seeks to recuperate various associated costs. This Panel has consistently taken the position that each party should be responsible for their own litigation costs, including travel and per diem. Consistent with these decisions, the Panel will adopt Management Proposals 3.C and D. The Panel further rejects Union's proposal on travel and per diem (Proposal 4) and orders it withdrawn.

3. Article 8 – Mid-Term Negotiations

I. Agency Article and Position

The Agency's proposal covers three categories. The first category involves travel costs for mid-term negotiations. Management proposes changing two existing contract provisions to establish that each party will be responsible for their own costs at the national level. And, Management wishes to delete a third existing provision that allows local Union officials to receive travel costs for travelling to another local facility to assist with their negotiations if certain conditions are satisfied. The Agency would not be a good steward of taxpayer dollars if it continued to fund Union activities that do not provide tangible benefits to Agency operations. Additionally, providing such funding is inefficient as evidenced by these negotiations. In this regard, the parties executed ground rules in which Management agreed to pay the Union's time for travel and per diem for 9 months of negotiations and mediation for a full contract. The parties bargained only seven articles as a result of the ULP settlement but the Union exhausted all agreed-upon time costs. The Union needs to have "skin in the game" or it will simply continue to exhaust Agency resources. As to the third provision concerning the ability of local Union officials to travel elsewhere, Management claims that the Union has abused the provision. Specifically, the Union national President cited this provision as justification to travel to a local facility to assist with negotiations over their local

supplemental agreement. It would be in the best interest of the taxpayer to remove this language and allow each party to be responsible for their own costs.

The second category, in Agency Proposal 4, addresses primarily the existence of local supplemental agreements (LSAs) and past practices. Namely, the proposal calls for all LSA's and past practices to end upon the enactment of the new contract. But, local memorandum of understandings (MOUs) will continue. There is only one existing LSA, and it was negotiated in 2000, well before any existing master CBA language. It should end so the relevant local facility can come into compliance with modern practices. As to MOUs, the Agency proposes that either party may reopen them within 180 days of the new contract. Some MOUs are decades old. Renegotiation will give an opportunity for parties to bring them into compliance with modern practices as well. Management also wishes to emphasize that national bargaining matters should unfold at the national bargaining level.

Finally, Management is opposed to new Union language that would govern information requests. The Union proposes automatic extensions of bargaining time if information is not turned over to the Union within a certain window of time. The parties have agreed-upon language in Article 8 already stating that requests will be granted only upon "mutual agreement." The Agency does not believe extensions should be automatic because different circumstances warrant different responses.

II. Union Article and Position

The Union wishes to continue existing CBA language that calls for Management to pay Union-related travel expenses and per diem. This language represents the status quo and Management has provided no data to demonstrate the burden it allegedly places upon Agency operations. The President has proposed an Agency budget of \$20.2 billion for Fiscal Year 2020; there is no conceivable way in which the Union's travel expenses would put any significant dent in this figure. In regards to the Agency's ground-rules argument above, the Union notes that Management also contributed to lengthening these negotiations.

On the topic of local LSA's and MOU's, the Union proposes continuing existing language. To begin with, the Union renews it argument that, as part of the ULP settlement, the parties agreed other articles in the CBA would not be reopened for renegotiations. And, some existing CBA articles enshrine the ongoing existence of local agreements. Thus, it is inappropriate for the Agency to attempt to offer language that modifies or terminates existing local agreements. On the merits, the Management's proposal is broad enough that it would allow them to reopen all MOU's. Such language could lead to instability.

As to its information request language, the Union proposes language that would simply call for a 4-day extension for bargaining if the Agency responds to an information request within 2 days or less of bargaining commencing. Existing language calls for an extension equal to the number of delayed days, e.g., 60 days would be added to bargaining if the Agency's data was 60 days late. The Union's proposal, therefore, would lead to more efficient negotiations.



III. Conclusion

The Panel will impose Management's proposal. The first issue involves three Management proposals that cover the topic of Union travel costs. Existing language calls for the Agency to pay some or all of the Union's costs, depending upon the circumstances. And, the Union insists these practices should continue because the Agency has not demonstrated a need to alter existing circumstances. Consistent with our earlier discussion on costs sharing, however, it would be appropriate to adopt Management's proposals so that each party will be responsible for their own respective costs. In addition to ensuring taxpayer funds are devoted primarily to effectuating the mission of the Agency, Management's proposals will keep the parties focused on completing negotiations. Accordingly, the Panel will accept Management's Proposals 1 and 2. Additionally, Management Proposal 3, which removes existing language from the CBA, should be adopted without alteration.

The next topic concerns the existence of various local agreements, and the Panel believes that the Agency's proposal for this issue should prevail as well. The Union's initial argument is that the parties have already reached agreement on other portions of the CBA, including portions that reference existing local agreements. This argument was considered, and rejected, by the Panel when it asserted jurisdiction over Article 8. As to the merits of the Agency's proposal, Management offers its language in an effort to thaw practices and local agreements that have become frozen in time. By eliminating LSA's (of which there is only one) and permitting either party to reopen longstanding local MOU's, Management contends that its facilities can catch up to modern practices. The Union counters that preserving existing agreements will promote stability and defer bargaining costs. But, aside from definitively eliminating one LSA, the Agency's proposal allows for only the option of renegotiating local MOU's. The parties can engage in a cost-benefit analysis that accounts for various factors under Management's proposal, but there is no requirement to scrap such agreement wholesale. It is entirely possible that the status quo will continue for local facilities. Management's Proposal 4, therefore, provides a better balance of meeting the parties' interests and should be adopted.

Finally, as to Proposal 5 concerning information requests, the Panel will order the Union to withdraw its proposal. Existing Article 8, Section 2.F states "[d]ata requests from either party shall automatically extend the time limits equal to the number of days it takes to receive such data." Management also alleges – without rebuttal from the Union – that the parties have reached agreement in Article 8 over language stating "[e]xtensions or reductions of any time periods will be by mutual agreement, in writing, prior to the expiration of the relevant time period." What is unclear from the record, however, is whether the latter language is intended to trump the former. Adding to the potential confusion, the Union does not explain how its proposed language would fit into the foregoing framework. To avoid exacerbating any potential uncertainty, the Panel believes it is appropriate to reject the Union's requested language.



4. Article 10 - Partnership/Collaborative Relationships

I. Agency Article and Position

The Agency proposes striking existing Article 10, "Partnership/Collaborative Relationships." To begin with, Management contends this article is inconsistent with Executive Order 13,812, "Revocation of Executive Order Creating Labor-Management Forums" (September 29, 2017) (Forum Order). In the Forum Order, the President instructed Federal agencies to take steps to abolish labor forums, councils, committees, etc. Thus, the Agency is obligated to follow this instruction.

On the merits, the Forum Order requires the demonstration of "tangible benefits" to the taxpayer in order to justify the continuation of forums. Yet, during negotiations, the Union failed to provide any documentation or evidence in support thereof. The Union's proposal also seeks to impose language from a now revoked Executive Order that established labor forums and partnerships. But, the Agency has ended its Partnership Council, making the Union's proposal redundant. The Union's proposal also calls for pre-decisional involvement before negotiations. This process results in an inefficient "two-step process" for negotiations that is not an efficient use of Agency resources.

II. Union Article and Position

The Union proposes retaining existing Article 10 in its entirety. The article does not establish the structure or scope of partnerships. Instead, it requires only that the parties jointly decide the foregoing. Contrary to Management's assertion, the Union *did* provide evidence that these groupings assisted the parties, at least at the local level. And, Management has not provided any evidence that partnership or forums has burdened its operations.

III. Conclusion

The Panel will order the adoption of Management's proposal. The Union wishes to continue Article 10 in full. This article encourages pre-decisional involvement and also leaves it to the appropriate level of bargaining to determine the particulars of a collaborative/partnership relationship (presumably including whether such a relationship should even exist). The Union claims that it has already provided evidence to the Agency concerning the effectiveness of the foregoing framework. However, the Union did not provide the Panel with any such evidence. Nor is it clear from a review of the parties' arguments, particularly the Union's, how continuation of this article would provide a benefit to the Agency's operations, the employees, or the interests of the taxpayer. Moreover, striking this language does not appear to inhibit the operations of the Union as it would retain its full bargaining rights in accordance with law. Thus, on balance, it is appropriate to adopt the Agency's proposal striking Article 10 from the parties' CBA.



ORDER

Pursuant to the authority vested in the Federal Service Impasses Panel under 5 U.S.C. §7119, the Panel hereby orders the parties to adopt the provisions as stated above. ¹⁷

ORDER

Under Local Civil Rule 7(n), in cases involving judicial review of administrative agency actions, "the agency must file a certified list of the contents of the administrative record with the Court within 30 days following service of the answer to the complaint or simultaneously with the filing of a dispositive motion, whichever occurs first." *See* LCvR 7(n). The government filed its answer on March 11, 2019. *See* Dkt. 16, 17, 18. Without filing a motion for relief from Local Civil Rule 7(n), the government did not file a certified list of the administrative record until June 7, 2019, well past the 30 days required by the rule. *See* Dkt. 26. The plaintiffs object to the timing and breadth of the administrative record filed by the government. *See* Pls.' Mot. to Strike Certified List of the Administrative R. at 5, Dkt. 30.

The plaintiffs filed motions for summary judgment on May 3, 2019, before the government had produced the administrative record. *See* Dkts. 22, 23, 24. These motions and subsequent motions filed by the plaintiffs only cite to statements of facts and exhibits included in the plaintiffs' motions, not to the administrative record.

The Court "needs to resolve disputes about the completeness of the administrative record before addressing the merits of dispositive motions." *McKoy v. Spencer*, 271 F. Supp. 3d 25, 39 (D.D.C. 2017). The government must therefore file a certified list of the administrative record that includes materials relating to the October and November agency actions challenged in the complaints. If the parties disagree about the contents of the administrative record, they shall file appropriate motions for the Court to resolve before they file dispositive motions. Finally, the Court denies both parties' motions for summary judgment without prejudice and directs the parties to re-file their motions with appropriate citations to the administrative record.

Accordingly, it is



ORDERED that the government's Motion for Extension of Time to File Certified List of the Administrative Record, Dkt. 25, is **DENIED** without prejudice and that the government shall file a certified list of the contents of the administrative record on or before February 28, 2020. It is further

ORDERED that the plaintiffs' Motion to Strike, Dkt. 30, is **DENIED** as moot. It is further

ORDERED that the plaintiffs' Motions for Summary Judgment, Dkts. 22, 23, 24, and the government's Motion for Summary Judgment, Dkt. 28, are **DENIED** without prejudice. Any future motions filed by the parties shall include citations to the administrative record. It is further

ORDERED that the parties shall file a proposed briefing schedule for dispositive motions no later than thirty days after the administrative record is filed.



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Subject: Corona Virus quarantined traveler housing?



It is my understanding that the Department of Veterans Affairs is entertaining housing travelers who are currently under quarantine due to exposure to the Corona virus. We are deeply concerned that moving these travelers to VA medical facilities poses a grave danger to nurses, staff, veterans, as well as the general population.

It is our understanding that the medical staff has not been trained on dealing with patients who may be infected with this virus. We are also deeply concerned the VA has not trained staff on the use of appropriate personal protective equipment (PPE). Additionally, there is a question as to whether the VA has the appropriate PPE. We have sent the below information request to each of the 23 facilities we represent and are awaiting response. Given the concerns raised above I am escalating this request to your office for immediate response.

Information requested:

- 1. Facilities that are designated as quarantine housing sites for travelers who have entered the U.S. from China. As well as start date, duration.
- 2. The Facility plan for disaster preparedness and response in the case of mass influx of patients or mass casualty incident;
- 2. The Facility Infection Control Guidelines, Policies, and other related documents regarding treatment, surveillance, and isolation precautions for patients with known or suspected Novel Coronavirus;
- 3. The Facility plan for exposure surveillance, prompt notification, and isolation (if indicated) of employees with occupational exposure to Novel Coronavirus;
- 4. The Facility Infection Control Guidelines, Policies, and other related documents regarding employees working while exhibiting signs and/or symptoms of Novel Coronavirus and/or any potentially communicable disease;
- 5. Any and all training and education materials, whether written, delivered via electronic means, or provided by in-person instructor(s) regarding Novel Coronavirus, including screening for symptoms and travel history that may indicate the need for further screening and/or isolation, as well as general information about Novel Coronavirus infection and treatment;
- 6. The number of available airborne isolation (negative pressure) rooms in the Facility;



- 7. Current stock on hand of N95 respirators and powered air-purifying respirators (PAPRS) as well as gowns, gloves, and other PPE for droplet and aerosol precautions;
- 8. Please provide a list of areas that could be used to isolate a patient with suspected or possible 2019-nCoV infections if an airborne isolation room is not available;
- 9. The Facility procedure(s) used to determine daily whether negative pressure is maintained with the airborne isolation room is in use;
- 10. Has the Facility identified any possible cases of 2019-nCoV? If so, how many?
- 11. The Facility's plans to adjust staffing to address the additional staff time required to properly care for multiple patients in airborne isolation; and
- 12. The Facility Attendance Policy and any revisions to the Attendance Policy made in order to address employees with documented exposure or known/suspected Novel Coronavirus.

We understand that this is a developing situation. To the extent that educational materials, supply levels, and policies may be in flux, please consider this information request to be ongoing and provide additional materials as they become available.

Particularized need:

- 1. Determine if the Hospital is complying with the Collective Bargaining Agreement, as well as all other applicable laws, rules, and regulations;
- 2. Determine if all RNs are being effectively protected from infectious disease exposure;
- 3. Determine the most appropriate representational course of action to take in this matter;
- 4. Fulfill the Union's representation responsibilities; The Union will use this information to assess the Facility's preparedness for the current Novel Coronavirus outbreak and its impact upon RNs employed at the Facility.

If any part of this request is denied, or if any material is unavailable, please communicate that fact to me in writing, along with the reason(s) for the denial or unavailability of the requested information, and please provide the remaining items by



the same date. The Union will accept partial fulfillment of this information request without prejudice to its position that we are entitled to all documents and information called for in the request.

The Union reserves the right to request additional information if necessary. To the extent that any of the above information can be provided in electronic format, please do so.

- Within a day of the first confirmed US case, VA began planning for COVID-19 by establishing screening and triage, isolation and quarantine, and infection control strategy and plans.
- Activated Veterans Health Administration (VHA) Emergency Management Coordination Cell (EMCC) to Level 1 on January 20, 2020 and it remains activated.
- Screening points established at every major VHA Healthcare Facility (170 hospitals that serve nearly 9 million veterans across the country)
- Limited admissions to Spinal Cord Injury Units (24 major centers supporting 24,000 Veterans)
 - Instituted "No Visitor" stance (except in compassionate cases ex: actively dying and will be limited to the specific Veteran room only)
- Restricted admission to VA Community Living Centers (CLC) (134 nationwide nursing homes supporting 41,000 Veterans)
 - Instituted a "No Visitor" stance (except in compassionate cases e.g., actively dying Veteran
 on our hospice units and will be limited to the specific Veteran room only)
 - No admissions from the community to our CLCs; Veterans will be processed through acute care centers prior to admission
- Established national testing capability for VA facilities at Palo Alto, CA
 - The VA lab in Palo Alto has capacity to test up to 2000 patients.
 - Additionally, VA's are utilizing state labs and recently added private testing labs available across the country (LabCorp and Quest)
- VA has moved to daily crisis action leadership meetings at 3pm to discuss updates and remain in sync internally and with other federal guidance.
- VA will be changing their policy for healthcare workers who are exposed but asymptomatic. Previously we would quarantine them for 14 days. The impact is VA is losing large chunks of workers for periods of time. VA will go to a new posture of wearing PPE equipment and continue to work during their 14 days. Many civilian hospitals are now doing the same.
- The Board of Veterans Appeals has Veteran Law Judge capacity to increase use of virtual hearings to support the mission of deciding Veterans' appeals for disability benefits and services. We are exploring this option dependent on availability and prioritization of OIT resources.
- Chief Acquisition Officer sent Guidance Memo to Contractors regarding Health and Safety Precautions for COVID-19
- Contracting Offices will utilize increased simplified acquisition procedures under National Emergency Procedures for any VA Coronavirus support efforts
- Senior Procurement Executive (SPE) Memo to VA's Heads of Contracting Activities (HCAs) regarding Preparing for Potential Contract Performance Impacts Due to COVID-19
- VA submitted updated COVID-19 Supplemental input to OMB requesting timely, additional funds in support of VA's 4th mission: to serve both Veterans and non-Veterans in times of national emergency, including significant increases in telemedicine capabilities.



- Established accounting codes for tracking VA's COVID-19 costs in accordance with Congressional reporting requirements of 38 USC Section 1785 paragraph (e).
- Provided HR Emergency Preparedness Guide to employees and managers to answer questions on a
 wide-range of human capital topics (e.g., leave, telework, employee relations, labor relations,
 compensation, staffing, reasonable accommodation). Also provided employees with the latest
 travel guidance from OPM.
- Currently, all VA national cemeteries remains open for visitation and interment as is NCA's National Scheduling Office in St. Louis, Missouri. NCA has developed continuity of operations plans to support possible reductions in staff.

As a VA-wide effort, we intend to send an initial SMS text message to all Veterans with the link to the VA's COVID-19 resource page. We anticipate 7-8 million veterans will receive this text.
- Distributed to HCAs and Chief Logistics Officers a standardized statement of objective/performance work statement developed for disinfection of buildings - For use by any VA organization that has the need to disinfect a building due to exposure to COVID-19.
- VA continues to provide updates periodically to Congressional Staff (Committees, Delegations and Leadership) on VA's COVID-19 response posture and the numbers of VA inpatients with COVID-19 and outpatients with COVID-19 who are self-quarantined at home.
- VA provided notice to the House Oversight and Reform Committee, Subcommittee on Government
 Operations that we will decline their invitation on the Government's response to COVID 19 due to



short notice and that fact that VA's focus needs to be solely on response and protecting the health of our Veterans



VEO is working very closely with our colleagues at VACO and across the country to support timely and clear communications to veterans and their families using our many channels (web site, hotline, contact centers, surveys, enews letter, social media, tv, blogs, CVEBs, etc).

Below are some immediate additional options that VEO could leverage to provide an even broader reach to Veterans, families, caregivers, survivors, our own employees and community partners.

Create Veteran enabled self-assessment on VA.gov.

 Collaborate with Digital Service and establish a Coronavirus decision tree based on the CDC risk assessment (attached) so Veterans could self-triage based on simple questions and identify the necessary actions they should take.

Provide clear, consistent answers by phone

Collaborate with VHA to create a standard phone message on VA 311 or other call centers pointing Veterans to coronavirus resources. This is underway already.

Provide updates by VA TV in facilities and ROs

3. Have the Veteran News Network (VNN https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=yA3X-ZxMTfg) provide daily Coronavirus updates. The concept is at the top of the hour, VNN will run a video of a VA leader with updated coronavirus information. VNN will inform Veterans about VA resources and allow VA leaders to be proactive without traveling in the field. A ticker can run at the bottom with additional updates and tips. VNN can be embedded on VA.gov/coronavirus.

Send Veterans critical information via text

4. Develop a text capability (Similar to VBA's Solid Start program) to advertise the latest VA coronavirus information or point Veterans to coronavirus resources. The reach could be much more effective. For example historically, VetResources has had about 20% open ratio. Text messages are nearly 90% open ratio. This could be an additional messaging capability in addition to VA's other efforts.



VEO VETERANS SIGNALS: COVID-19 CUSTOMER EXPERIENCE DATA

Background: The Veterans Experience Office (VEO) administers surveys to Veterans to capture feedback and identify opportunities for short-term service recovery and long-term program improvement. In some surveys, Veterans also have an opportunity to provide free-text responses.

VEO analyzed feedback from VSignals surveys with a free text response box (Outpatient Surveys and the Board of Veteran Appeals) and VA Social Media to find insights about Veteran feedback related to Coronavirus (COVID-19). The following key words were used in the search; "COVID-19," "COVID-19," "coronavirus," "corona," and "virus".

Overall, there were 47 free-text responses in the Outpatient Services Survey and 443 Social Media comments mentioning COVID-19 from December 12, 2019 to March 11, 2020. Below is an overview of this feedback.

Time Period: December 12, 2019 to March 11, 2020

BLUF:

When Veterans leave feedback about COVID-19, they leave specific concerns regarding:

- · Inconveniences resulting from new COVID-19 precautions at facilities
- Being exposed to COVID-19 at facilities

When Veterans leave feedback about COVID-19, they leave specific compliments regarding:

- Professionalism of staff and providers
- Appreciation for COVID-19 precautions taken at VA facilities

When Veterans leave feedback about COVID-19, they leave specific recommendations regarding:

- Requesting more information about COVID-19
- Telehealth option to prevent spread of COVID-19

When Veterans leave feedback about COVID-19, they leave Social Media comments regarding:

- Concerns that GI Bill payments will be affected by the COVID-19
- Concerns with verbal screening tests for COVID-19 when entering a facility







Concerns about COVID-19 from the Outpatient Services Surveys:

"I understand the virus protection but closing all the entries except for 5 is a bit much and the stairwells being locked is a severe inconvenience being able to go into the first floor stairwell but not being able to get out of the 2nd or 3rd floor" [sic] (Feedback submitted 03/10/2020 by a 56-year-old male Veteran seen on 03/09/2020 at VISN 22, Tibor Rubin VA Medical Center)

"I went to a meeting a group meeting the other day at the Modesto VA in California and we were supposed to be asked if we had any symptoms of the Corona virus and nobody was asked that at the front desk. "Was it wise to mandate but one entrance to the WRJ facility (main entrance/Mountains Bldg,) effective March 10 as a precaution due to the coronoavirus outbreak? Strikes me as a questionable decision to congregate so many people in a such a relatively small space, when the advice is to avoid large crowds for fear of contacting the disease." 





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Warning Order COVID-19 Response

 Situation. The Corona Virus Disease 2019 (COVID-19), which used to be called the novel coronavirus (2019-nCoV), is a new type of coronavirus. It causes respiratory illness in people. It was first identified in Wuhan, China.

On February 26, CDC confirmed an infection with the virus that causes COVID-19 in a person, within the U.S., who reportedly did not have relevant travel history or exposure to another COVID-19 patient. Confirmed US cases of COVID-19: 61 (+2), including: 15presenting in U.S, 3 among evacuees from Hubei Province, and 43 among evacuees from Diamond Princess cruise ship. Deaths: 0. Global cases: 82,066 (+1,097) global deaths: 2,800 (+40).

Declarations: World Health Organization (WHO) Public Health Emergency of International Concern (PHEIC) declaration; Presidential "Proclamation on Suspension of Entry as Immigrants and Nonimmigrants of Persons who Pose a Risk of Transmitting 2019 Novel Coronavirus" issued; Department of State (DoS) and Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) have issued Travel Advisories/Health Notices for multiple countries.

VA Lines of Effort:



 - Travis AFB, CA: 962 planned / 764 actual
 - Dobbins ARB, GA: 277 planned / 124 actual
 - The process of disembarking and screening passengers is ongoing, expect numbers to increase.
 - HHS is coordinating small flights to transport passengers to the their home state, if the home state is willing to take and house their residents from the ship.
- The Governor of NY has taken emergency measures to contain a COVID-19 "cluster" in New Rochelle.
 - The area currently has 108 confirmed cases.
 - The protocols include closing schools, houses of worship and other large gathering facilities within a one-mile radius in New Rochelle for a twoweek period, from Thursday, 12 Mar to Wednesday, 25 Mar.

Update 45:

- The WHO is reporting 114,567 confirmed cases globally and 4,027 deaths.
- DHS reports the 755 confirmed U.S. cases and 26 deaths.
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 - 21 passengers tested positive 19 crew (remaining on board), 2 passengers.
 - Approx. 1,138 rooms available for quarantine at four DoD installations: Travis Air Force Base (AFB),CA, Marine Corps Air Station (MCAS)
 Miramar, CA, Lackland AFB, TX, and Dobbins Air Reserve Base (ARB), GA.
 - Currently, 170 evacuees at Travis AFB, none at the other installations.
 - The Governors of NJ, OH, RI, and IL made emergency declarations in response to COVID-19.
- The National Capital Region (NCR) Watch Desk reports there are 13 Confirmed/Presumptive Positive cases in the NCR.
- The CDC reported 78 state/local public health labs in 50 states now have the capacity to test up to a cumulative 75,000 people for COVID-19.

VA Response:



- HHS Incident Management Team support: One AEM deployed to Travis AFB, and two AEMs onsite at MCAS Miramar, CA, and Dobbins ARB, GA. One AEM enroute to Lackland AFB, TX.
- Effective 9 Mar, the Crisis Action Team (CAT) will convene daily at 1500 ET.

COVID-19 New Rochelle, NY Containment Area- 3/11/2020





Update 47:

- The WHO is reporting 124,518 confirmed cases globally and 4,607 deaths.
- DHS reports the 1,321 confirmed U.S. cases and 38 deaths.
- On 9 Mar, the Grand Princess cruise ship docked in Oakland, CA.
 - 178 passengers are Veterans; 55 currently enrolled in VA Health Care System. Numbers likely to raise with further passenger screening.



- As of 11 Mar, 1636 passengers disembarked; approximately 700 remain on board.
- The District of Columbia declared a public health emergency and issued an advisory:
 - DC officials recommend all "nonessential mass gatherings" of 1,000 or more people be postponed or canceled amid a growing number of COVID-19 cases in the DC area.
 - Several universities in the DC area have already announced plans to cancel in-person classes and moves classes entirely online.
- On 11 Mar, CDC added Europe to the list of Warning Level 3 areas, Avoid Nonessential Travel. CDC provided a list of specified countries in Europe https://wwwnc.cdc.gov/travel/notices/warning/coronavirus-europe.
- DoS issued Global Health Advisory Level 3, urging U.S. citizens to reconsider travel abroad due to the global impact of COVID-19. According to DoS, many areas throughout the world are now experiencing COVID-19 outbreaks and taking action that may limit traveler mobility, including quarantines and border restrictions. Even countries, jurisdictions, or areas where cases have not been reported may restrict travel without notice.
- On 11 Mar, DHS announced, the President signed a Presidential Proclamation, which suspends the entry of most foreign nationals who have been in certain European countries at any point during the 14 days prior to their scheduled arrival to the U.S.
- The DoD is implementing a 60--day travel ban for service for service members effective 13 March for travel to, through and from CDC identified Warning Level 3 areas.
- City of San Francisco is providing temporary isolation housing in recreational vehicles for people experiencing homelessness or shared living arrangements.


