






# Americans Continue to Feel Alienated from the Federal Government and its Elected Officials

# Public Trust in the Federal Government Nears Historic Lows

## In 7 out of the Last 8 Elections, the Public Voted for Change

2012 was the only election when the country voted to maintain the status quo.




A change in 78,379 votes in 2016 would have given an electoral college victory to Clinton (278-260), while a change in 43,692 votes in 2020 would have given Trump an electoral college victory with the House electing him President (269-269).

# Democrats Control the Senate and House by the Narrowest Margin for Either Party in 20 Years




### Trump Carried 84% of U.S. Counties, While Biden Won the Counties that Created 70% of GDP

Trump counties had a disproportionate number of less educated, white, blue collar voters, while Biden counties had a greater number of non-white and educated voters.



# Biden only Carried 25 of the 206 Counties that Flipped from Obama to Trump in 2016

Trump held on to white, working class counties, while Biden picked up educated suburban areas.




### Tribal Politics with Straight Party Voting is the New Norm

Culture wars are driving this tribalism.

#### In federal and state elections:

- 94 out of 100 U.S. Senators 94% are of the same party as the Presidential candidate who carried their state in 2020
- 419 out of 435 members of the U.S. House 96% are of the same party as the Presidential candidate who carried their district in 2020
- 38 states 76% have single party state government



# Events Over the Past 6 Months have Led to Increased Partisanship

### Recent Events Have Led to Even More Hyper-Partisanship

- A Supreme Court confirmation less than 2 weeks before the 2020 elections
- A Presidential election in which the loser disputed the results
- Highly partisan presidential transition
- 147 Republican members of Congress voted to overturn the election results
- A largely Democratic partisan vote to impeach Trump
- A Democratic party line vote for a \$1.9 trillion-dollar COVID relief package

### The Current Political Structure Rewards Partisanship

- Unifying force in American politics is the opposition to the other political party
- The vast majority of seats in the House and Senate are not competitive
- Republicans are more likely to lose a primary from the right and Democrats are more likely to lose a primary from the left – rather than being defeated in a general election
- The 2022 congressional elections have already begun, with Democrats clinging to narrow control of the Senate and House
- Republicans are jockeying for the 2024 Presidential nomination
- Increased polarization of the news media

# The Democratic Party's Ascendent Left and a Republican Party Dominated by Trumpism Will Increase Partisanship

- The left is driving the political, appointment, and policy agenda of the Biden-Harris Administration
- Progressive trends are accelerating in the 15 states where Democrats have total control
  of state government
- Trumpism now dominates Republicans in the House and controls the party apparatus at the state and local level across the country
- The GOP conference in the Senate will likely become the party of Trump following the retirement of 5 Republican members from the "governing wing" of the Republican Party

# Differences between the Parties Will Come to a Head at the End of September

- Infrastructure package will likely come to a final vote
- End of the fiscal year on September 30<sup>th</sup> requires funding approval for 2022
- Debt ceiling will need to be increased
- 2015 Surface Transportation Act needs to be reauthorized
- National Flood Insurance Program needs to be reauthorized
- Benefits from the December COVID relief package for tax credits, emergency paid leave, temporary assistance for families in need, childcare entitlements for states and increased monthly food stamp benefit increases are all due to expire

## Governing in a Hyper-Partisan and Bitterly Divided Country

- Republicans are favored to retake control of Congress after the 2022 midterm elections
- Democrats will use the reconciliation process to pass legislation on a partisan basis in anticipation of the likely outcome of the upcoming midterm elections
- The Biden-Harris administration will aggressively pursue executive orders to enact their policy agenda
- The center of opposition will come from Republican Attorneys General across the country, who will challenge the Biden's administration's executive orders in the courts
- Voting rights will be the central battleground across the country between the political parties in the upcoming election cycle, with Georgia and Texas at the epicenter of this fight

### America Going Forward in the 2020's

- America is going through the biggest transformation since the dawn of the industrial revolution in the late 1800's
- We are transitioning from a 20<sup>th</sup> century top-down industrial economy to a 21<sup>st</sup> century digital and global one
- At the same time that we are going through this economic transformation, we are approaching a tipping
  point in the next 20 years to becoming a multiracial society, with whites comprising less than 50% of our
  population
- During this period of transition, half of the country thinks that we are changing too fast while the other half believing that we are not changing fast enough
- The culture wars that are now driving American politics are bleeding into corporate America as businesses are increasingly forced to pick a side
- Political outcomes are a lagging indicator of the mood of our country, and the current period of turmoil
  and chaos that began in the early 2000's will likely continue throughout this decade

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
