### Dear Requester:

This is the final response to your Freedom of Information Act/Privacy Act (FOIA/PA) request, originally received by the United States Secret Service (Secret Service) on October 7, 2020, for information pertaining to:

- All memoranda, guidelines, or similar documents reflecting procedures for protecting the health and safety of the president and the first lady of the United States, as well as the health and safety of your agency's employees (1) during the president's stay at Walter Reed National Military Medical Center or (2) while otherwise being treated for COVID-19.
- Memoranda reflecting guidance for safely transporting the president or first lady, protecting your agency's employees with personal protective equipment, or other related precautions are considered responsive to this request and should be produced.

Please provide all responsive records from September 30, 2020, through the date the search is conducted.

After a detailed review of all potentially responsive records, 13 were released in part and 0 pages were withheld in their entirety. Exemptions under the FOIA Statute, Title 5 U.S.C. § 552, and/or the PA Statute, Title 5 U.S.C. § 552a, have been applied where deemed appropriate.

Enclosed are the documents responsive to your request, as well as a document that explains the exemptions in more detail. Withheld information is pursuant to the exemptions marked below.

Good Evening EOP Staff,

Please read the below reminders on 1) masks, 2) mandatory random testing of employees, 3) guidance on returning to the EOP campus (EOPC) after quarantining, 4) coming to work with COVID-19 symptoms, and 5) contact tracing at the White House.

- **1. Masks:** We continue to encourage staff to use a mask or facial coverings, especially when social distancing is not an option. As a reminder, we require *everyone* who enters the West Wing to wear a mask or facial covering. If you are in need of a facial covering, you may pick one up from the White House Medical Unit (WHMU) Clinic located in EEOB 97 or at every entrance to the West Wing.
- **2. Mandatory Random Testing:** We continue to conduct mandatory random COVID-19 testing for EOP employees across all components. Your cooperation in our efforts to ensure the continuity of operations of the EOP is appreciated.

Failure to report to testing will be considered a refusal to test. You may obtain a deferral of testing, based on a compelling need, such as:

- You are teleworking and have not been coming to the EOPC in the last 30 days or plan to in the next 14 days,
- You are on previously approved leave,
- · You are in an official travel status,
- You are not present in the immediate vicinity of the EOPC for the entirety of the testing hours.
- **3. Guidance on returning to the EOPC after quarantining:** If you have tested positive for COVID-19, are quarantining due to a close contact, or are self-isolating due to symptoms, you **MUST** be cleared by the White House Medical Unit prior to returning to the EOP Campus. Staff who have fulfilled quarantining requirements (10 days after COVID diagnosis / 14 days for close contacts) will be cleared for return to work upon receiving a negative COVID-19 test. If you have questions about your status or when you are cleared to return, please contact White House Management at WHOps@eop.gov or call (b)(6); (b)(7)(C)
- **4. Coming to work with COVID-19 symptoms:** As a reminder, if you are experiencing any symptoms such as sore throat, cough, fever, headache, new loss of taste or smell, muscle aches, chills, diarrhea, or difficulty breathing, **please stay home** and **do not come to work** until you are free of any symptoms. Affected staff should inform their supervisors and seek care from their primary care provider. If you need assistance in getting a test near your residence, please contact White House Management at <a href="https://www.who.edu.org/who.ed
- **5. Contact tracing at the White House:** The White House Medical Unit with assistance from the CDC has completed all contact tracing for positive COVID-19 cases that have been identified at the White House. If you believe you were a close contact with an individual with COVID-19 and you have not been contacted by WHMU, please contact White House



Management at <u>WHOps@eop.gov</u> or call (b)(6); (b)(7)(C) As a reminder, a close contact is defined by the CDC as contact within six feet for over 15 minutes within 48 hours of symptoms or a positive COVID-19 test.





All PPD Personnel,

Reference is made to all previous PPD email communications regarding mask usage and COVID-19 pandemic mitigation strategies.

After receiving inquiries regarding mask usage and as a follow up to my Mandatory Mask Requirement message, dated Tuesday, October 13, 2020, I am sending this message to provide additional guidance.

The guidance below was provided by OPO and should be adhered to by all PPD personnel while working:

### USSS Guidance and Requirements Concerning Mitigation of COVID-19

- As stated by Director Murray in his address to the workforce on October 2, 2020, the agency will continue to employ all the necessary resources and methodologies to mitigate COVID-19.
- Chief among these methodologies shall be the use of personal protective equipment (PPE) to protect our personnel and our protectees from exposure in operational settings.
- The hazard plan developed by OPO in April of 2020, allows the directorate to establish enterprisewide requirements for operational personnel to wear all forms of PPE in operational settings in excess of recommendations by the Centers for Disease Control and prevention (CDC).
- These requirements are meant to ensure the USSS's integrated mission requirements are met with zero failures and protect our employees from the spread of COVID-19.

#### **Outdoor Rallies**

- All detail personnel shall wear masks while operational at outdoor rallies.
- Although, there is some protection in outdoor settings, being around large crowds and not wearing masks will definitely increase chances of transmission of COVID-19, as per the CDC.
- The CDC recommends that all persons over the age of 2 wear a mask in public settings and when around people who do not live in your household.

### **Protectee Activities**

- Operational personnel engaged in high intensity protection activities (i.e. running/biking with a protectee) will not be required to wear a mask during these activities. Personnel shall maintain sufficient social distancing while still being able to carry out their shift responsibilities during high intensity activities.
- The CDC has concluded that masks with exhalation valves do not provide sufficient protection as a barrier to prevent the spreading of COVID-19.
- Operational personnel engaged in protective operations during golf outings shall use masks when in proximity to other persons, including protectees, staff, and other USSS personnel.



### Discretion

- The wearing of masks may not be feasible at all times. However, masks are a critical preventative measure and are most essential, even when social distancing is achievable.
- Operational personnel shall adapt (i.e. employ social distancing) and apply discretion as a short term solution in instances when wearing a mask is not feasible.
- Operational personnel shall exercise good judgement in ensuring that they comply with wearing masks while operational.

In closing, during the past 9 months, our Division has had a track record of minimal infections while continuing to travel and successfully executing our protective requirements in both domestic and foreign settings. When considering the size of our Division and the scope of our mission, this is quite an accomplishment and a testament to each of you, who have been diligent in taking the necessary steps to keep yourself, co-workers, and protectees healthy. I appreciate all the due diligence and discipline that each of you demonstrate daily.

During the final weeks of this campaign, we will continue that track record by following the guidance and practices within this email.

This responds to your Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) request sent to the United States Secret Service (USSS) in which you seek information pertaining to procedures for protecting the health and safety of the former President and the First Lady of the United States, as well as the health and safety of USSS employees during the former President's stay at Walter Reed National Military Medical Center or while otherwise being treated for COVID-19. USSS forwarded your request to Naval District Washington (NDW) for review of documents under NDW's release authority. Your request was assigned file number DON-NAVY-2021-008238.

Your FOIA request has been processed in accordance with the FOIA 5 U.S.C. § 552(b).

This is a partial release. USSS forwarded one document under NDW's release authority. In addition, we conducted an additional search for the requested reports. We identified two pages of responsive records. The documents are enclosed. Upon review of these documents, we determined they contain instances of personally identifiable information such as names, social security numbers, dates and places of birth, home addresses, and home telephone numbers, along with law enforcement information. This information is protected from disclosure under 5 U.S.C. § 552 (b)(6), (b)(7)(c), (b)(7)(e) and (b)(7)(f).

Exemption (b)(6) protects information that is personal and private in nature and release would result in a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy. Exemption (b)(7)(c) protects records or information compiled for law enforcement purposes, the disclosure of which could reasonably be expected to constitute an unwarranted invasion of personal privacy.

Exemption (b)(7)(e) protects all law enforcement information which disclose techniques and procedures for law enforcement investigations or prosecutions. Exemption (b)(7)(f) permits the withholding of information necessary to protect the physical safety of any individual when disclosures of his/her information could reasonably be expected to endanger his/her life or physical safety. Our search for records included files maintained by Department of Homeland Security, Washington, DC. We waived the fees associated with processing your request.

We currently have 7 ASF members at entrances to Tower 1. 1 NSF member at South Gate which changes into 2 during afternoon/evening, 4 NSF personnel in Tower 1 (2 on floor below the METT-1 in the METT Comms Room-1 above the METT, 3 NSF personnel in the EOC, 2 from our Region Office, 2 Base CID investigators, 2 NSF personnel located at each of of north/south wood to prevent unnecessary vehicles entering into the secured area to Tower 1. Totals 21/22 per shift. This does not include Base Police personnel working their normal shift.

This number is supposed to increase tomorrow for the rest of the week. I don't currently have the exact number but when I do I will provide it to you. Let me know if this answers your question.
