Re: Freedom of Information Act Request

Dear Ms. Eggleston:

Pursuant to the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA), I am writing to request a copy of any documents dated after January 1, 2017, that relate to USCIS's decision to give priority to the most recently filed affirmative asylum applications when scheduling asylum interviews and the consequences of that decision.<sup>1</sup>

Documents relevant to this request may include information regarding (i) the reasons for the scheduling priorities that took effect on January 29, 2018; (ii) the reasons for departing from the prior set of scheduling priorities; (iii) any concerns, practical, legal, or otherwise, with the new scheduling priorities that took effect on January 29, 2018; (iv) the purpose of the revised scheduling priorities; (v) the extent of any backlog of petitions filed before the revised scheduling priorities took effect; (vi) any efforts by USCIS to eliminate that backlog and adjudicate all pending affirmative asylum applications; (vii) the time it will take to adjudicate any or all pending affirmative asylum applications; and (viii) the date of the earliest-filed affirmative asylum applications that remained pending at any time.

Documents responsive to this request may have originated with the Asylum Division, the Office of Policy and Strategy, the Director's Office, the Deputy Director's Office, or other USCIS components. As FOIA requires, please release all reasonably segregable nonexempt portions of documents.

I am the Litigation Counsel at the Tahirih Justice Center, a national 501(c) charitable organization. As such, I request a waiver of all fees for this request. Disclosure of the requested information to me is in the public interest, as it will
