Q9 We're now going to provide you a brief statement about each candidate, and then ask you if it is a very convincing, a little convincing, or a not at all convincing reason to vote for each candidate. Here's the first one: Donna Shalala served as Secretary of Health and Human Services under President Clinton, was president of the University of Miami, and most recently congresswoman for Florida's 27th congressional district before losing in 2020. Shalala has long advocated for women's rights, increased access to health care, better education, and a clean, sustainable environment. Is this a very convincing, a little convincing, or not at all convincing reason to vote for Donna Shalala?

They also say Shalala puts the Democratic House majority at risk because she is a scandal-ridden candidate and was the only Democrat to lose a district that Biden won in Florida. Does this raise serious doubts, minor doubts, or no real doubts in your mind about Donna Shalala?

Q14 Here's the next one: Her opponents say Debbie Mucarsel-Powell has a history of corruption, including her husband's company taking \$15 million in taxpayer money meant for small businesses. They also say Mucarsel-Powell's family profits off of a company that has repeatedly violated environmental laws and that Mucarsel-Powell took thousands of dollars in campaign contributions from dirty coal money. Does this raise serious doubts, minor doubts, or no real doubts in your mind about Debbie Mucarsel-Powell?

Q15 Here's the next one: His opponents say David Richardson is way too liberal to win in South Florida when Republicans are attacking Democrats for being socialists. Does this raise serious doubts, minor doubts, or no real doubts in your mind about Janelle Perez?
