Enclosed is the ALEC State Factor, "Voting With Their Feet," which studies the effect high excise taxes have on "cross-border" economic activity in New England. Also enclosed is the August 8, 1992 editorial from the <u>Boston Herald</u> regarding our study.

The study proves that high excise taxes drive consumers to neighboring states to purchase the same product at a better price. Not only do high excise taxes eventually hurt a state's tax revenue, it also takes away potential customers from retailers and merchants located near state lines. In essence, states with high excise taxes only benefit the neighboring low-tax states rather than itself.

ALEC's free market, pro-business position stands for lower excise taxes. Lower excise taxes will keep commodities at a competitive price, thus maintaining a healthy intra-state commerce system, as well as attract consumers from high tax areas.





Controlling Health Care Costs: Effective Solutions Governors Hall EF

Many proposals have been put forward to provide health care coverage to those currently not insured. Included among the plans are proposals to detach the medical fees portion of workers' compensation and automobile insurance and merge these into a federally managed health care system. While appearing to increase efficiency, removing the medical fees component from these compensation systems would erase the current incentives for cost control, case management, timely reimbursement, and prompt resolution of claims. Similarly, extension of coverage should be accompanied by significant reform of existing tort law. The argument that the burdens of the current system are justified by the needs of alleged victims of tortious conduct is not valid when a reformed system's expanded access has provided for those needs.







The American Legislative Exchange Council (ALEC) was founded in 1973 by a small group of Democrat and Republican state legislators who shared a common commitment to the Jeffersonian principles of free markets, limited government and individual liberty.

Today, ALEC has grown to become the nation's largest bipartisan, individual membership organization of state legislators, with 2,400 members throughout the 50 states, Puerto Rico and Guam. Nearly one-third of ALEC's members hold leadership positions in their legislatures. Approximately 63 million Americans are represented by the citizen legislators of ALEC.

ALEC brings the states and the nation together through conferences, seminars, publications, and its fifteen National Legislative Task Forces. Each provides a unique vehicle for legislators to communicate across state lines, share experiences and ideas, and work in unison with the private sector to create effective public policies.

ALEC's goal is to ensure that our legislative members are fully armed with the information, research and ideas they need to win in the legislative arena. ALEC's Tradition of Winning the Public Policy Debate Most Evident in Seven Major Areas

Keeping the Promise: A Comprehensive Health Care Plan for the States. Few issues in 1992 were as high on the states' agenda as health care reform. Responding to the problem of skyrocketing health care costs and the plight of the uninsured, ALEC's Health Care Task Force. chaired by Representative Tom Wilder (GA) and Spencer Hathaway of Syntex Corporation, approved a Comprehensive Health Care Plan. The Plan was the result of a year long effort by the Task Force's legislative and private sector members to craft free market reforms for the nation's health care system. The plan contains 31 model bills that provide reforms in the areas of health insurance, Medicaid, long-term care, medical liability, and rural health care. Shortly after its approval, the plan in its entirety was introduced in Ohio and Georgia, and one or more bills have been introduced in 25 states. The Plan was released in book form in January 1993. Keeping the Promise: A Comprehensive Health Care Plan for the States, has now been widely distributed throughout the country, stirring health care reform in almost every state capital.

ALEC Members Lead the Charge to Stop Congress from Placing Unfunded Federal Mandates on the States. In an historic effort to halt the proliferation of unfunded federal mandates, led by Representative Michael Nye (MI), ALEC members in 27 states have introduced, and Colorado and South Dakota have enacted, calls for a limited Constitutional Convention to write an amendment that would require Congress to include funding for federal mandates on the states. With the growing federal deficit, Congress is increasing the number of unfunded federal mandates on the states. Unfunded mandates, which may cost as much \$500 billion to the states, are de facto tax increases which throw state budgets into chaos and violate the Constitutional principles of federalism.

In another initiative to raise Congress' consciousness on the issue of unfunded federal mandates, ALEC Alabama State Chairman Representative Perry Hooper Jr., introduced the ALEC's model Congressional Delegation Mandate Consultation Act, which required the state's Senators and Congressmen to meet with the state legislature to discuss the issue of unfunded federal mandates. With enthusiastic bipartisan support, the law was passed and signed into law. "Before 1913 our senators were chosen by the state legislature instead of popular vote, which made them more accountable to the legislature," said Hooper when he announced the introduction of the bill. "Since that time Congress has often ridden roughshod over state legislatures. If the principle of federalism still has any meaning in this country, then it is most appropriate that members of the national legislature meet with the state legislature to discuss issues of common interest."

Following the example of Representative Hooper, the South Dakota legislature also enacted the act, and it was introduced in Arizona, Delaware, Georgia and Florida. "This was a groundbreaking resolution in righting the imbalance between the states and the Congress," commented ALEC Executive Director Samuel A. Brunelli, "and we expect that in the not too distant future regular consultations between the Congress and the states will be the norm rather than the exception."

America's Protected Class II: Exposing the Widening Public-Private Pay Gap. America's Protected Class II, released in February 1993, built upon ALEC's ground-breaking

study America's Protected Class (Feb. '92), documented the widening public-private pay gap. The study showed that from 1980 through 1990, average state and local public employee compensation increased \$6.32 for every \$1.00 increase in the private sector. If compensation for state and local employees had risen at the same rate as the private sector during the from 1980-90, total compensation costs would have been \$47.3 billion less (\$514 per household) in 1990 alone. This "public pay premium" is one of the costs driving state and local tax increases; from 1980-90, states increased taxes by \$29.9 billion. which is \$17.3 billion less than the public pay premium. In other words, if state and local public employee compensation had just risen at the same rate as the private sector, it is likely that none of these tax increases would have been needed. However, as Samuel A. Brunelli. ALEC Executive Director said when releasing the study, "The fundamental issue is fairness. Is it fair that the compensation for public servants rises at a faster rate than that of the public's? We can argue forever about how much a teacher or a policeman should be paid for the work they do. What shouldn't be arguable is that as a group of people, public employees should not see their compensation rise at a faster rate than the group of people who are paving their salaries - the American taxpayer. And our data proves that's exactly what happened from 1980 through 1990."

ALEC's recommendation to solve this escalating problem is enactment of a Public Pay Equity law. The law would require that total compensation of state and local public employees not rise faster than the average increase in compensation for employees in the private sector. ALEC State Chairmen and

National Directors Representative Roger Halvorson (IA) and Representative Dale Van Vyven (OH) introduced Public Pay Equity laws this session, and other ALEC members have promised to take-up the issue when the '94 legislative session begins.

The America's Protected Class papers have received wide-spread media coverage, from the Wall Street Journal to the San Francisco Chronicle, and almost unanimous support on the editorial pages of newspapers from coast to coast. The data in America's Protected Class II has also been cited in public employee compensation contract negotiations across the nation, including Minnesota, Philadelphia, and San Jose.

Further research, to be released at ALEC's 20th Annual Meeting, indicates that the cost "America's Protected Class" has cost the nation an additional \$280 billion in economic growth in 1990 alone. Based on the analysis of Dr. Richard Vedder's (an advisor to ALEC's National Tax & Fiscal Policy Task Force) work in the "Economic Impact of Government Spending," published by the National Center for Policy Analysis, the total cost to the nation of excess spending by state and local governments was more than \$353 billion by 1990 - an average loss of more than \$1,400 for every man, woman and child in the U.S. Of this, \$280 billion is attributable to the "public pay premium."

No other studies in the history of ALEC have received the acclaim or exposure of the *America's Protected Class* papers, and no issue has put ALEC larger on the map.



By using ALEC model legislation as the starting point for debate, our members help to define issues from the pro-free enterprise perspective rather than letting the advocates of big government seize the upper hand.

ALEC's 1993 Legislative Scorecard, analyzed here by Task Force issue area, shows a 25% increase in introduction, 46% percent increase in enacted bills for an overall 50% increase in the passage rate of ALEC model legislation.

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Speaker Biographies

John Armor, Esq.

Mr. Woodson is a former resident fellow of the American Enterprise Institute and the former director of the National Urban League's Administration of Justice. He is the author of numerous publications and articles, including his landmark book, *On the Road to Economic Freedom: An Agenda for Black Progress.* Mr. Woodson is a frequent commentator on major news and talk shows and is a respected and popular lecturer, both nationally and internationally. He is the recipient of many awards, including the prestigious John D. and Catherine T. MacArthur Fellowship Award.

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
