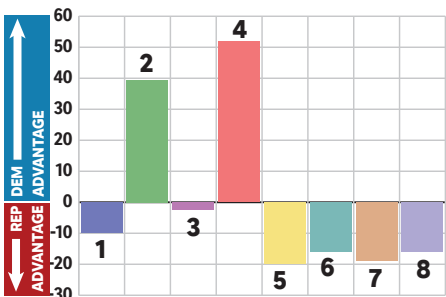
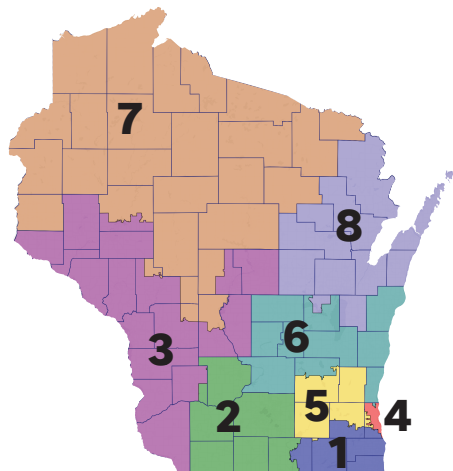


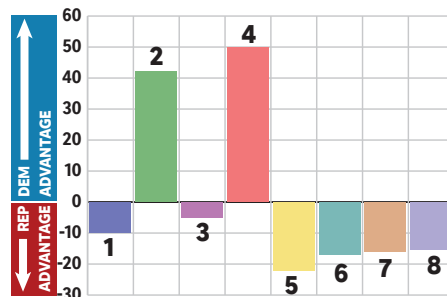
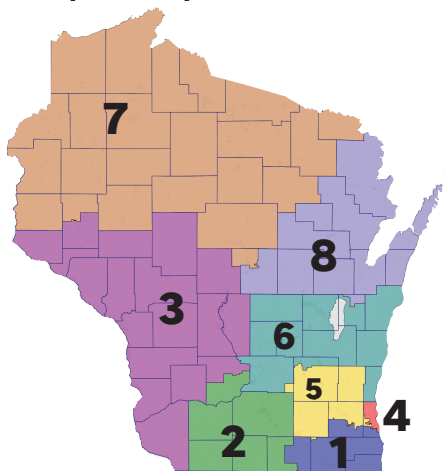
Competing congressional maps reflect differing partisan tilts

Below is the partisan tilt for each congressional district under the current lines and under the two proposed plans, one by GOP lawmakers and one by the governor's commission. The charts show the Democratic or Republican advantage in each district based on the average vote in these three very close recent elections: 2016 presidential, 2018 governor and 2020 presidential. Under the GOP plan, 6 of the eight seats would advantage Republicans. Under the commission plan, four of the eight would advantage Republicans, three would advantage Democrats and one would have a very slight Democratic lean.

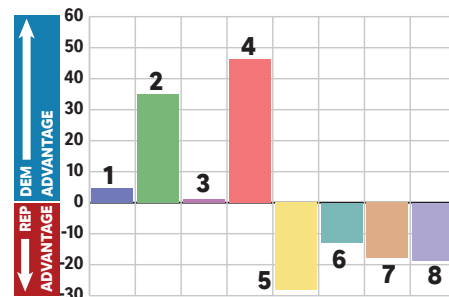
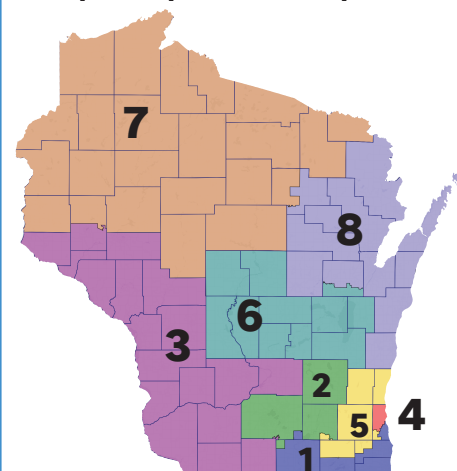
Current district boundaries
