- ASAC Belmont called from New, York and advised there have been several mysterious calls at Victoria Stone's place, by which people are trying to reach her. One which they consider highly important came in on the night of April 23 and it was relayed to her through another individual telling her ' that Mr. Arthurson (phonetic) was calling and left a message for her to call Jefferson, New York, 56. Mr. Belmont stated they checked this number and found it is listed to the Simmonds Hotel, which is at Lake Kenaza in Sullivan County. Adams stayed there for a few weeks in the summer of 1945. Agents were immediately sent there that same night and they found that the hotel was closed but there was a light in there about 1:00 0'clock at night when they arrived and stayed on about five minutes. They kept a surveillance on the hotel all night but saw nothing. The next morning they went in the hotel with the owner and the telephone line man and found the door was open, cigarettes butts scattered around, and an indication someone had been in there and tampered with the telephone since the box was burned out. The telephone had been disconnected. Mr. Belmont stated they checked with the telephone company there and they said a couple of calls had come through for that number but they advised the callers the telephone was disconnected. They are trying to trace the calls. The Agents have checked and found no indication of any strangers up there. They are also checking his friends, former residents of San Novick near Greenwich, Connecticut, since he might be staying with them.

Mr. Belmont stated they have a 24-hour surveillance on Victoria S one. They have stops on her telephones and telephones where these calls may have come through.

Mr. Belmont stated they are forwarding a teletype to the Bureau containing the above information.

This is to advise that on May 2, 1946, Confidential Informant NYT 272, whose identity is known to the Bureau, reported that at 6:35 p.m. that date, VICTORIA STONE contacted her brother, BILL, and his wife, NETTIE, in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. According to the informant the pertinent part of the conversation which ensued between VICTORIA and her brother was as follows:

Bill--"I got one of A's suits on, and it's very mice."

Victoria -- "I'm glad, Honey."

Bill--"Both of them are real nice. I had them cleaned and pressed."

Victoria--"I'm glad."

Bill--"So if any more that you have coming my way...."

Victoria -- (interrupts) "Yes, yes -- don't talk (last two words in Yiddish);"

Bill--"All right."

The remainder of the conversation between these parties dealt primarily with family matters.

It is believed that the two suits mentioned by BILL in the above conversation refer to those suits which were left by the subject in STONE'S apartment at the time of his disappearance in New York City.

On May 1, 1946, this matter was discussed with Mr. James M. McInerney of the Department by Supervisors Lish Whitson and R. G. Fletcher. McInerney advised that the Bureau should go ahead and pick up Adams on the basis of this indictment and that, in the event questioning of Adams and his associates failed to reveal evidence of espionage or violation of the Registration Act or other stronger Federal violations, the Department would proceed against Adams on this charge and would also indict him for failure of keeping his draft board advised of his change of address.

ACTION:

The New York Field Division has been advised of the Department's decision in this matter and has been instructed to make appropriate arrangements to have all individuals connected with the Adams case interrogated at the time Adams is apprehended in an endeavor to make a case against him for violation of the Espionage Statutes or Registration Act. Efforts to date, however, have failed to locate Adams.

Reference is made to the Bureau teletype of May 2, 1946, wherein authority was granted to arrest ARTHUR ADAMS upon his being located and wherein instructions were issued to the New York Field Division to the effect that arrangements should be made so that when ADANS is located, all of his associates can be interrogated at the same time. In accordance with these instructions, you are informed that unless the Bureau advises to the contrary, the procedure set forth in the subsequent paragraph will be followed:

Upon his being located, ARTHUR ADAMS will be brought to the New York Office where he will first be interviewed to determine if his attitude is one of cooperation or otherwise. In the event he is cooperative and it appears that he may be of some definite value in the future investigation of Soviet espionage activities, the Bureau will be immediately notified before any further steps are taken. However, if he is uncooperative, immediate steps will be taken to bring to the New York Office the following of his associates for questioning:

MANNING is presently believed to be still in the armed forces and the Bureau is requested to arrange to be notified in the event he returns to the United States, so his exact location can be determined.

The questioning of ADAMS and his associates will proceed along a line contemplated to produce full information as to their backgrounds and further, to render the following results:

- 1. Evidence to establish violations of the Espionage Statute on the part of ADAMS and his associates.
- 2. Evidence of the violations of the Selective Service Act and any other pertinent Federal statutes.



Reference is made to Bureau teletype dated April 29, 1946 wherein it is requested that a detailed letter concerning the recent investigations of the above mentioned subject be furnished as soon as NOLED BY possible.

At 10:30 AM on April 22, 1946, Confidential Informant NYT-272, whose identity is known to the Bureau, advised that an unidentified man contacted MIRIAM SOMERS, an employee in VICTORIA STONE's jewelry store, 510 Madison Avenue, New York City. The unidentified man asked for VICTORIA and when he was told that she was not in, he requested that VICTORIA be advised that "everything is all right".

At 10:52 AM on April 22, 1946, Confidential Informant NYT-272 reported that MIRIAM SOMERS contacted VICTORIA STONE and requested to be advised when STONE expected to be in the store. STONE advised that she would be in the store at about 12 noon and then asked MIRIAM if anyone had called. MIRIAM became suddenly mysterious and said she would tell VICTORIA when she saw her.

At 9:35 AM on April 23, 1946, a man contacted ANN GARRAMONE, another employee in STONE's jewelry store, and asked for VICTORIA, who was not in. ANN asked, "who are you?". The unidentified man replied, "don't you recognize my voice". ANN stated, "no". The unidentified man said, "I am the same man who called you yesterday. Just tell Victoria I am going to ——". (The name of the place was not definitely ascertained but sounded like Peoria.)

It should be noted here that due to the brevity of the questioned calls no recordings were made. However, agents who monitored the calls were familiar with ADAKS: voice and immediately advised that the unknown caller was not ADAKS.

At 12:58 PM on April 23, 1946, Confidential Informant NYT-272 reported a call from an unidentified woman to VICTORIA STONE. This woman suggested that she and STONE have dinner and go to a movie that evening. STONE declined saying that she expected a call and suggested that the woman call her again at 5 PM for a more definite answer.

At 2:10 PM on April 23, 1946 Confidential Informant NYT-252, whose identity is known to the Bureau, reported that VICTORIA STONE called ANN GARRAMONE at the store and asked, "he didn't call or anything?" STONE received a negative answer from ANN and then advised her that, "if he should come in, call me here".

At 3:55 PM on April 23, 1946, Confidential Informant NYT-252 reported a call from Miss KAHN. (It is believed that this is MANYA KAHN, who operates the MANYA KAHN REDUCING STUDIO at 53 West 57th Street, where STONE frequently goes). This call was taken originally by ANN GARRAMONE at the STONE jewelry store. Miss KAHN advised that a Mr. ARTHURSON called her and left a message for VICTORIA. He left a number for VICTORIA to call, namely, Jeffersonville, New York, 56. According to Miss KAHN, ARTHURSON at the time advised her that he is trying to locate VICTORIA in various places and called her because he knew that she was a customer there. Miss KAHN then inquired whether or not there was a MIRIAM at the store and advised that a Mr. ARTHURSON requested that if VICTORIA was not in the store that she give the message to MIRIAM. ANN then called MIRIAM SOMERS who talked with Miss KAHN. Miss KAHN repeated the message she previously gave to ANN. MIRIAM indicated amazement that ARTHURSON should call KAHN looking for STONE.

At 4:30 FM on April 23, 1946, Confidential Informant NYT-272 reported a call from an unidentified man, apparently a jewelry salesman, to VICTORIA STONE. (It is believed that the jewelry salesman referred to is GOTTLIED WENZ who has a jewelry firm at 48 West 48th Street, New York City). He advised STONE someone called him about an hour ago looking for her and that when she was not there he left a number for her to call in the event she came in, and further requested that he call STONE at the store and give her the number of Jeffersonville 56 to call. STONE was nonchalant about the information furnished by WENZ and advised him it was "a lot of baloney". She explained that it was probably one of her friends checking up on her. She then asked WENZ why anyone should call him to give a message to her. When WENZ advised that the caller apparently had hoped to find STONE at his establishment she appeared to be a little more serious and requested the exact time that the call was made. After a slight hesitation she advised WENZ not to worry about the call.

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At 5:15 PM on April 23, 1946, Confidential Informant NYT-272 advised VICTORIA STONE received a call from the same unidentified woman who called at 12:58 PM and requested her to go to the movies and to dinner. STONE said that she was still waiting for a call and added that the call had come through while she was out so she will have to hang around.

A physical surveillance was immediately placed on STONE but no unusual activity was noted with the exception of the fact that she appeared to be extremely surveillance conscious. Both Grand Central Terminal and Pennsylvania Railroad stations were checked on April 23, 1946 in view of the possibility that the questioned calls from the unidentified man might possibly have been from a contact of ADAMS and ADAMS was coming to town.

Confidential Informant whose identity is known to the Bureau, was requested to ascertain the subscriber to telephone located at Jeffersonville, New York, 56. This informant, however, advised that this information could not be obtained until the morning of April 24, 1946. It was ascertained through the Information Department of the telephone company that the subscriber to this telephone was SIMMONS HOTEL, Kenoza Lake, New York, where ADAMS spent his vacation in the summer of 1945.

At 6:30 PM on April 23, 1946, four agents were sent to Kenoza Lake, New York to check and determine whether or not, if possible, ADAMS was in the vicinity. Enroute to Kenoza Lake a check of the Chicago Erie Limited which passed through Narrowsburg, New York at 10:12 PM on April 23, 1946, was made to ascertain whether or not any individual who might answer the description of ADAMS boarded the train. It should be noted that Narrowsburg, New York is the main outlet for the vicinity of Kenoza Lake and is located approximately ten miles from there. This inquiry reflected that no passenger boarded the train at Narrowsburg, New York that night.

Upon arrival at Kenoza Lake at approximately midnight, it was ascertained through Mrs. EDNA T. ROESNER, owner of Thornwood House on Swiss Hill next to the STAMONS HOTEL, that no sign of life had been noted around the hotel since it had been closed at the termination of last summer's season. A light was observed in the direction of Simmons Hotel and it appeared that the light was on the attic floor of the hotel, and it appeared to be an electric light which remained on for approximately five minutes before being suddenly extinguished. A careful watch was maintained for the remainder of the night but no one was observed entering or leaving the hotel.

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Upon arrival at Kenoza lake the telephone operator at Jefferson-ville, New York was immediately contacted and from her it was ascertained that the telephone at Simmons Hotel had been disconnected before the winter months and as yet had not been connected. She stated that she was unable to give further information about the telephone and due to the lateness of the hour it would be necessary to contact the chief operator the following day.

On the morning of April 24, 1946 Mrs. BAER, chief telephone operator at Jeffersonville, New York, reaffirmed that the telephone at Simmons Hotel had been disconnected. She inquired of one of the night operators and was advised that at approximately 8 PM on the night of April 23, 1946 a telephone call was placed from New York City to Jeffersonville 56. She stated she remembered the call well because of the fact that the telephone number had been disconnected. She could not ascertain whether or not the call was placed by a man or woman inasmuch as she received the call from the New York long distance operator.

Mrs. BAER then ascertained through the Liberty, New York business office of the telephone company that at 10:30 AM on the morning of April 24, 1946, said business office at Liberty received an inquiry from the business office of the telephone company at New York in order to ascertain the subscriber for the number of Jeffersonville 56. (It is possible that this inquiry was being made by Confidential Informant. Mrs. BAER agreed to route any future calls for Jeffersonville 56 to Jeffersonville 33F, Room 2, which was the phone at Mrs. ROESNER's home where the agents making the investigation were staying.

The telephone repair man for the district was contacted and went to the Simmons Hotel in order to ring the telephone from the outside terminal box and thereby ascertain whether or not anyone would answer the phone at the hotel. Upon opening the telephone box, which was on the outside of the hotel on the ground level, the repair man observed the box had been scorched and the wires had been burned from their respective terminals. The repair man stated it appeared as though some kids had built a fire in the box or someone in attempting to hook up the telephone switched wires and burned out the coil. It could not be ascertained how long ago the scorch of the box took place. The repair man rang the telephone in the building with negative results.

After the telephone repair man left, the premises surrounding the hotel were carefully checked and no sign of life could be found. The annex to the hotel, which is a smaller building on the south side of the hotel, was thoroughly checked when it was found that the front door was opened but there was no indication of recent occupancy. All doors and windows on the main hotel were examined and found to be securely

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fastened.

At 10:30 PM on April 24, 1946, a tan colored Lincoln Zephyr, about 1940, sedan model, drove on to the grounds of the hotel and stopped in the rear. The car remained for approximately ten minutes. A man got out of the car and tried the door; made a cursory look around; reentered the car and left. The car had 1946 New York license number 9D331 and it was later ascertained that this license was issued to Mr. CHARLES KAPLAN. Further investigation reflected that Mr. KAPLAN was in the insurance business representing the ASSOCIATED COOPERATIVE FIRE INSURANCE COMPANY of Sullivan County and surrounding counties with headquarters at Woodbridge, New York. The said insurance company had fire insurance policy on the Simmons Hotel and in view of the fact that the policy was nearing expiration, Mr. KAPLAN went to the hotel expecting to find one of the proprietors there.

Mr. GEORGE STIMONS of Parksville, New York, R.D., was contacted. He stated that he has not heard or seen ADAMS since he left the hotel in the summer of 1945. Mr. STIMONS was very cooperative and appeared reliable. He stated that he would notify the F.B.I. immediately if he heard anything of ADAMS or if any attempts were made to contact him for reservations at the hotel for ADAMS.

Mr. SIMMONS accompanied the agents to the hotel and upon arrival admitted them by key and a thorough search was made of the hotel. There was no indication of occupancy. Cigarette butts were found in the ash trays in several of the rooms but they appeared to be very old. All of the cigarettes were Chesterfields. (It should be noted here that ADAKS) smokes Virginia Rounds).

It was ascertained through Mr. SIMMONS that the telephone at the hotel had been disconnected on the electric pole outside the hotel and could not be connected unless by the electric company. The inside of the telephone booth was examined for fingerprints but with negative results. There were mattresses on each of the beds in the rooms and in one of the rooms were blankets but there was no indication that any of the beds had been occupied. Mr. SIMMONS stated that at the time of his last visit to the hotel approximately two months ago the door at the hotel annex had been securely fastened and that indications were that admittance to the hotel had been gained since that time by a pass key. He stated that nothing had been disturbed in the annex.

GEORGE RAUM, postmaster at Kenoza Lake, who is extremely cooperative, was interviewed. He also stated that he had not seen anything of ADAMS since he left the vicinity last summer. He added that he had seen

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no sign of life around the Simmons Hotel all winter. It should be noted that Mr. RAUM lives in the vicinity of the hotel and can observe the hotel from his home. Mr. RAUM further advised that the ARDIZONEs were at the cottage on Swiss Hill for the weekend of April 14th and again on April 21st. He remarked that it was rather unusual for the ARDIZONEs to be up so early in the season. He stated that both on April 14th and on April 21st he had talked with ENZIO ARDIZONE but no mention of ADAMS was made. A thorough check was made at the ARDIZONE cottage and it was ascertained that it was not occupied. Mr. RAUM agreed to notify the F.B.I. immediately if he obtained any information on ADAMS.

ARTHUR KLEVINS, proprietor of Apple Grove Farm located on Swiss Hill Road, approximately three quarters of a mile north of Simmons Hotel was interviewed. He stated that he had been at the farm for approximately five days in preparation for the coming season. He stated that he had no guests nor did he have anyone seeking admittance since he came. (It will be recalled that the files of the New York office reflect that ADAMS might have stayed at the Apple Grove House several years ago). Mr. KLEVINS is the proprietor of the Apple Grove Farm for only one year.

The cottage next to the Apple Grove Farm was checked with negative results. It was ascertained that this cottage was unoccupied and the owner, Mr. NICOLAI, a close friend of the ARDIZONES, was in Florida.

Further inquiry of neighbors reflected that the farm of FRANK ARDIZONE, ccusin of ENZIO ARDIZONE, had been closed for the winter and no one had been seen at the farm so far this season. It will be recalled that ADAMS was a frequent visitor to this farm when he was at Kenoza Lake last summer.

The name of ARTHURSON was checked through all telephone exchanges in Sullivan County in New York but no listing was found for anyone by that name.

While agents were at Kenoza Lake appropriate checks were made at all garages in the vicinity for anyone answering the subject's description. All of the leading hotels, boarding houses and cottages in and around Kenoza Lake and all bus stations were likewise checked. Both of these were with negative results.

Because of ADANS: fondness for movies, theaters in Jeffersonville and Narrowsburg were checked on the night of April 24, 1946.

The Chicago bound Erie Limited passing through Narrowsburg at 10:12 PM was again checked on April 24, 1946, with negative results.

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It should be noted that immediately upon the arrival of the agents at Kenoza Lake about midnight on April 23, 1946, a check was made at the ARDIZONE cottage but no activity was observed. Further checks were made at this cottage during the course of the agents' stay. However, no one was ever seen and the place was locked.

The four agents returned to New York from Kenoza Lake on the afternoon of April 25, 1946. Because of the possibility that the ARDIZONES would spend the weekend at Kenoza Lake, and that if calls did come from there were in the vicinity of Kenoza Lake, he, ADAMS, might attempt to contact ARDIZONE, two agents were sent to Kenoza Lake on the morning of April 27, 1946, and remained there until the evening of April 28, 1946. The ARDIZONES failed to go to Kenoza Lake for the weekend.

Mrs. BAER at the telephone exchange advised that at 4:45 PM on April 25, 1946, a call came from the long distance operator at New York. An inquiry was made for the Lakeview Country Club. Mrs. BAER advised that there was no Lakeview Country Club but that this was the old name for the Simmons Hotel. Mrs. BAER stated that at this point the caller on the other end of the line, a woman, interrupted the operator and said that it was the GEORGE SIMMONS HOTEL that she was attempting to contact. Mrs. BAER stated that the line had been disconnected and the caller hung up and it was impossible to trace the call. And to give makes for the caller hung up and it was impossible to trace the call.

The Albany Field Division upon request advised on April 30, 1946 that a check of the records of the telephone company in that city reflected that no calls had been directed on April 22, 23, 24 or 25 to any of the pertinent telephone numbers. Albany had been provided with the telephone numbers of MANYA KAHN, GOTTLIEB WENZ and VICTORIA STONE and was requested to check for calls emanating from Kenoza Lake, Jeffersonville, Liberty, Monticello or Callicon, New York.

Through a confidential source the New York office is presently checking to ascertain if any calls were made from any of the pertinent numbers to Jeffersonville, New York 56, or if any collect calls were received from that number at any of the New York numbers. This search so far has been negative but is continuing.

On April 25, 1946 agents of the New York Field office, accompanied by an agent of the New Haven Field office, checked the vicinity of the cottage of SAMUEL J. NOVICK, located at Stonybrook, Connecticut, near Westport, Connecticut, for the possibility of the subject being in that area, but with negative results. A photograph of the subject was exhibited to an informant of the New Haven office residing in the area and he advised that he felt he had seen ADAMS in Stonybrook Manor at one time, possibly during the summer season of 1945. However, he was definite in his assertion

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that ADAMS was not in the colony at the present time. This informant agreed to contact the New Haven Field Division in the event any individual answering subject's description appeared in the colony. Further contacts were made with the driver of a bus servicing the area and with the local mail carrier, but with negative results.

The New Haven Field Division also caused a check to be made of all outgoing toll tickets from Westport, Connecticut, to New York for the period April 19, 1946 to April 25, 1946 and it was ascertained that no calls were made to either MANYA KAHN or GOTTLIEB WENZ.

Mail covers are being maintained on VICTORIA STONE at her home and at the office. A twenty-four hour physical surveillance is also being maintained on VICTORIA STONE and a spot check of the activities of JACOB ARNOFF is being continued. Arrangements are being made to provide services of a confidential technical informant on the activities of IRENE MILLER.

Physical surveillance of STONE thus far has revealed that her activities were routine. She had lunch with GOTTLIEB WENZ on April 25, 1946, and shortly after her return to the store from lunch with WENZ, JULIUS HEIMAN drove up in front of the store in his car. STONE went out and spent about five minutes in the car with him and then he drove off.

On April 27, 1946, physical and technical surveillances of STONE reflected that on this date STONE called ARONOFF and requested him to come to her apartment. He came and stayed for approximately one hour.

United States Customs offices in the New York and Newark areas have been alerted to watch ships leaving for Russian ports.

In addition to the aforementioned mail cover which is presently being maintained on VICTORIA STONE at her home and office, arrangements have been made with a highly confidential source who will furnish the contents of mail received by VICTORIA STONE and IRENE MILLER at their respective apartments.

Miss MTIDRED BISSO, who, it will be recalled, is secretary to ERIC BERNEY at the Keynote Recordings Company, was interviewed but was unable to supply any pertinent information concerning the subject's whereabouts. She did state that to her knowledge BERNEY has not heard from ADAMS and on one occasion when questioned by her co-employee, MARION

May 2, 1946

PEGRAM, as to ADAMS! whereabouts, he had replied in effect that he did not know but presumed ARTHUR was mad at him for giving away his desk. According to Miss BISSO, BERNEY by this remark had reference to the fact that the desk formerly utilized by ADAMS had been turned over to a Mr. GEIER, an attorney, who had previously occupied space in BERNEY'S office before the war and upon his recent release from the service had returned to the office.

This informant further reported that BERNEY was leaving New York City for Miami, Florida on May 1, 1946 and was to stay with his wife and small child at the Cadillac Hotel in Miami Beach. The details concerning this trip have been provided the Bureau and Miami by teletype of April 30, 1946.

The surveillance of JACOB B. ARONOFF, mentioned previously in this letter, has failed as yet to provide any pertinent information.

There is no surveillance being maintained on JULIUS HEIMAN but confidential informants have failed to reflect that he has any knowledge of the subject's whereabouts or that VICTORIA STONE has confided in him as to the receipt of the aforementioned telephone calls.

A check is being made of the Ardizone residence in New York, and the Philadelphia Field Division has been requested to check the residences of VICTORIA STONE'S relatives to see whether ADAMS might be there, although there is little possibility of this.

LADD SUBJECT: ARTHUR ADAMS ESPIONAGE - R Assistant SAC Belmont called from New York and advised that there have been several mysterious calls at Victoria stone's place at which people are trying to reach her. One of the calls which is considered highly important was on the night of April 23, 1946 and was relayed to her through another individual, informing her that Mry was calling and left a message for her to call Jefferson, New York 56. A check of this number revealed that it was listed to the common of the of this number revealed that it was listed to the Simmonds Hotel, which is at Lake Kanaza in Sullivan County. It is known that Arthur Adams stayed there for a few weeks in the summer of 1945. Special Agents were immediately sent to the hotel which they found was closed, but observed a light in the hotel about 1:00 a.m. when they arrived and the light remained on for a period of about five minutes. Special Agents maintained a surveillance on the hotel all night but observed nothing. The next morning they entered the hotel with the owner and a telephone lineman and found the door was open, cigarette butts scattered around and indications someone had been in there and tampered with the telephone since the telephone box was burned out. The telephone had previously been disconnected. A check with the telephone company at Lake Kanaza disclosed that a couple of calls had come through for that number but they informed the callers that the telephone was disconnected. An effort is presently being made to trace the calls. Investigation in that area to date has been negative as to any indication that Arthur Adams is in that area. Investigation, however, is still proceeding. The New York Office has a 24 hour surveillance on Victoria S as stops on her telephones and arrangements have been made to trace any calls. A complete teletype is being submitted by the New York Office. In view of the fact that Arthur Adams has been missing for quite sometime and it is possible that he may be located in the United States, I believe it would be advisable to discuss with the Criminal Division of the Department as to what action the Bureau should take should he be located. You will recall that a secret indictment has been returned which is presently sealed, charging Adams with violation of the Selective Service Act. This indictment was returned at the time that it was thought Adams might leave the United States, on March 13, 1945, and was to be used to prevent his departure. I believe that should Arthur Adams be located he should be apprehended and questioned. However, no successful prosecution may result on the Selective Service charge. RECOMMENDATION. If you agree, I believe that the matter of apprehending Arthur Adams on this secret indictment should be immediately discussed with appropriate officials of the Criminal Division of the Department in order that our Field Office can be advised to apprehend him and question him. His identity has in effect been disclosed in the New York newspapers and his value as an agent for the Soviet Government is nil and it would be to our advantage to question him as to his past activities and information that he may furnish. If this meets with your approval an immediate discussion will be had with the officials of the Criminal Division.

Attached hereto for your information is a summary of the facts of the Arthur Adams case.

Doar Mr. Conroy:

Reference is made to your conversation with Assistant Director L. B. Nichols, in which you were advised that a journamistry had reported Bureau automobiles, apparently engaged in surveillance; at 39 West 55th Street, New York City, which you advised was the admest of Victoria Stone, who is under investigation in this case as an aid toward locating the subject.

I desire that you caution the supervisors and agents in your office with respect to this and other surveillances to be most judicious and to avoid any circumstances which would cause the surveillance to be noticeable to outsiders, to say nothing of being noticeable to the individual under surveillance.

Reference is further made to the teletype from New York in this case, dated May 8, 1946, advising that the surverlance smift from 1:00 A.M. until 8:00 A.M. on Victoria Stone will be discontinued on May 12. I have no objection to this procedure since you indicate that Victoria Stone has been active only during the other hours of the day. However, the men engaged on such surveillance should arrange to be notified immediately through Sutec or other confidential sources should Victoria Stone receive a summons to meet with the subject du ing the early morning hours.

For your further information you are advised that the New York Office has caused a number of checks to be made in an attempt to ascertain the nature of the aforementioned calls and from whom they emanated. The checks made were as follows:

- 1. The Albany Field Division reviewed the toll slips representing long distance calls made from Kenoza Lake, Monticello, Liberty, Callicon, and Jeffersonville, New York, on April 22 to 25 inclusive for any calls directed to the telephones of KAHN, WENZ, or STONE.
- The New York Field Division reviewed the toll charges on the telephones of the above-named persons for the period April 1st to 25th inclusive.
- 3. The New York Field Division checked to ascertain if any of these pertinent numbers had reverse charge calls; that is, where any being made to those numbers from out of town would be charged to the numbers

As a result of these checks, the only pertinent information obtained was to the effect that on April 14th and 22nd MANYA KAHN received telephone calls from Eliot 0650 in Boston, Massachusetts. Directories of the New England Telephone & Telegraph Company reflected that Eliot 0650 is listed to SHERWOOD D. FOX, 34 Wendell Street, Cambridge, Mass.

The records of the Merchants Credit Bureau, Inc., and the Boston Field Office indices, and the Boston and Cambridge city directories were checked for this name, with negative results.

Special Agent BRENTON S. GORDON and the reporting agent proceeded to 34 Wendell Street, Cambridge, Mass. in company with Sergeant JOSEPH BREEN, MA, of the Cambridge Police Department. It was ascertained that this is the address of a rooming house in the better type neighborhood in the immediate vicinity of Harvard university. Examination of the mail boxes in the front hall revealed that one apartment is occupied by GREEN-BUDILOV, another by SHERWOOD D. FOX, a third by ANDERSON-MARSTON, and the fourth by MARK KAHN. In view of the last name having the same family name as the person conducting the beauty salon in New York City, referred to in the teletype, no contact was made at this address.

Confidential Informant T-1 was recommended as reliable, by his superior, and was contacted, and advised that most of these people had been residing at 34 Wendell Street for a year or less, that but two men are tenants in the building, FOX and KAHN. Both were described as being approximately 35 to 37 years of age, and believed to be employed as students at Harvard University. A photograph of ADAMS was exhibited to Confidential Informant T-1 but he could not recall having seen anyone similar to the Subject at this address or anywhere else. According to Informant T-1, FOX had been residing at this address since approximately December 6, 1945, while KAHN had been at this address for approximately three or four months. The name ARTHURSON did not mean anything to Informant T-1.

Agents then checked the records of the Cambridge Gas & Light Co., but found the meters at this address are charged to Mrs. NETTIE I. GREEN.

At the Cambridge Registry of Voters it was ascertained that JACOB BUDILOV, age 49 years, and SARAH BUDILOV, have resided at 34 Wendell Street for approximately one year. Previously they resided at 56 Portsmouth Street, Cambridge, which was described as a poor Polish quarter of the city. BUDILOV was born in Russia and was naturalized at the United States District Court in Boston, on April 27, 1936. He had been residing in Cambridge since 1912. He was born in Selig, Budilofsky. His wife SARAH, was first registered as a voter in Cambridge in 1922 under the name SARAH M. ROSENFIELD.

NETTIE I. GREEN is the wife of JUDAH H. GREEN, both of whom were born in Russia. Her husband was naturalized in the United States District Court in Boston, on November 18, 1902, and she holds depivative naturalization. Mrs. GREEN has resided in Cambridge

since 1925. There was no record in the Cambridge Registry of Voters for anyone named ARTHURSON. There was no listing for FOX or KAHN.

Informant T-2 made available the records reflecting MARK L. KAHN had resided at this address since January 26, 1946, and that SHERTOOD D. FOX had resided at this address since November 26, 1945. No other information of value was received from these records.

Under date of May 10, 1946, reporting agent contacted information at Harvard University. The records of this bureau reflected both SHERWOOD D. FOX and MARK L. KAHN were students in the Graduate School of Arts and Science, Harvard University, which is housed in the Farlow House, 24 Quincy Street, Cambridge, Massachusetts.

The records of the Graduate School reflected MARK LEO KAHN was born December 16, 1921 at New York City, and was presently doing graduate work for a PH.D. for political economy in government. His home address was given as 53 West 57th Street, New York City. The file further reflected KAHN was an American citizen and had a Service record with the United States Army Air Corps, and later with OSS, and that he was to be returned to civilian status on January 31, 1946. His educational background was reflected as AB at Columbia, 1942; Columbia University grant 1939 to June 1941, Class of 1907 Senior Scholarship, June 1942 to February 1943. The file also stated that KAHN held the position of Assistant Economist in OSS, Washington, D. C., February 1944 to September 1945, as Economic Intelligence Analyst with Enemy Objectives Unit (as Army Officer).

KAHN'S father was indicated as AUGUSTUS KAHN, living, born in Kiev, Russia, August 1889; citizenship American, college Columbia University; occupation - DD.S., 1917, dentist.

KAHN'S mother was given as MANYA KAHN, no middle name, living, born at Nicolaev, Russia, December 24, 1897, of American citizenship. She did not attend college and her occupation was furnished as physiotherapist. The record showed that in the event of emergency, KAHN had requested that Mrs. MANYA KAHN, 53 West 57th Street, New York City, be contacted. He made the statement that he was unmarried.

The file further reflected that he was in the United States Army Air Forces, holding the position of Captain, AUS, February 11, 1943 to January 31, 1946. He also made the following comments regarding himself: That he took job with OSS, eight months, as a junior, later Assistant Economist. The purpose of this job was to review enemy economic capabilities. After eleven months in the Army,

during which time he was commissioned Aerial Navigator, he was reassigned to OSS and sent to London as a member of the Enemy Objectives Unit. This was a small professional group consisting chiefly of economists whose mission was to assist in the Strategic Air Forces on intelligence and policy problems relating to the air attack on German industries. His particular job for eighteen months required regular digestion of economic intelligence data and the frequent writing of analyses relating to enemy industries under consideration for intensive air attack. He also served on various target committees, many of them British-American, established to negotiate and settle differences of policy or to determine the validity of suggested courses of action.

SHERWOOD D. FOX, according to the files at Harvard University, had a permanent address of 69 Southern Avenue, Dorchester, Boston, Mass. He was born October 29, 1917, at Canton, Massachusetts. His formal education included an A.B. Cum Laude, Harvard University, June 1939, A.M., University of Illinois, June 1941, he majored in Sociology and is currently working for his FH.D. in Sociology. His parents were given as DANIEL S. FOX, deceased, and JENNIE BERKAL.

A memorandum in FOXt file by Dean PAYSON WILD, JR., dated October 1945 made the following statements concerning FOX: "He is 28; he served in the Air Corps, June 12, 1942 to Oct. 8, 1945. He has overseas service and was released under the point system. He gives no history of disability." There was also a letter in FOX! handwriting, requesting catalogs from Harvard University. The return address reflected was - SHERWOOD D. FOX, Staff Sergeant, Branch 2, Squadron "O", 1060th AAF, Base Unit, O.R.D., Queensboro, N. C. The request for these catalogs is dated August 30, 1945.

There was also a memorandum in his file, to see Prof. SCROKIN, who was apparently his instructor. Instruct as it appeared that this professor had a Russian background, no contact was made with him concerning FOX.

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Informant T-5, who was exhibited a picture of Subject. He stated he had never seen anyone in the vicinity who resembled Subject in any way. He suggested that reporting Agent contact informant T-4, whom he stated was quite observing and knew the people living at 34 Wendell Street. Cambridge.

Confidential Informant T-4 was contacted in like manner, but was unable to identify the picture of Subject, stating that to her knowledge, no man of Subject's age or appearance, had ever visited 34 Wendell Street.

The records of Confidential Informant T-5 reflect the following toll tickets from the telephone of SHERMOOD D. FOX:

1/20/46 telegram, Washington, D.C. signed "FOX".

1/25/46 N.Y.C. Atwater 92000 for Mrs. SHIDENHAND, Room 7-G.

1/29/46 N.Y.C. Academy 24068.

2/17/46 N.Y.C. Endicott 2300 to "RITA" BECK.

3/22/46 Telegram Brooklyn, N.Y. signed "SHERWOOD".

4/15/46 N.Y.C. Slocum 69600 Room 235 to RITA BECK.

4/27/46 N.Y.C. Brooklyn (?) looks like Ska, Ski. 41362.

4/29/46 Telegram Washington, D.C. signed "SHERWOOD".

It is to be noted that these toll tickets do not reflect calls as set forth in reference teletype received from New York City, and it is presumed at this time that the calls were made from New York City to the Cambridge address. It further appears that in view of the fact that both FOX and KAHN reside at the same address, attend the same school, and must necessarily have a close acquaintanceship, that MARK LEO KAHN was apparently contacted by his mother, MANYA KAHN, April 14, and April 22 respectively, as set forth in the New York teletype.

All persons contacted have agreed to notify the Boston Field Division in the event an individual answering Subject's description is seen at Cambridge, Massachusetts.



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At the above time ASAC Belmont called from New York and made reference to a recent Bureau letter authorizing them to interview associated of the subject. He said they have proceeded rather cautiously in making preparations so as to get the most out of it. They are of the opinion that all the associates should not be interviewed at one time, the idea being that they can then have Agents who are thoroughly familiar with this matter handle all the interviews. He said those first interviewed probably would not tip off the others as they are in separate cliques.

Mr. Belyont said they have in mind interviewing first John Hitchcock Chapin, Clarence Hiskey, Marcia Hiskey (wife), Miriam Sherwood and Edward T. Kanning. They feel these people can give information definitely showing Adams to be an espionage agent and some of them may be right in the middle themselves, particularly Manning and Hiskey. He said they are planning to start the interviews on Monday.

Mr. Belmont said Chapin is presently in Massachusetts or Vermont and Boston is checking on it, but they would prefer to have their own (New York) Agents cover the interview as they are familiar with the background in the case. I told Mr. Belmont it would be all right to have New York Agents interview Chapin and to notify Boston of the arrangements, unless advised to the contrary.

With regard to Edward T. Manning, Mr. Belmont pointed out that so far as we know he is still in the Army. Inasmuch as he may have been brought back to the States from the Pacific, Mr. Belmont asked that we ascertain his present whereabouts as soon as possible so that he may be interviewed. He is a very important individual because he is the one who passed on information on the Cak Ridge set-up to Adams. I told Mr. Belmont we would get that information right away. He said when they are through interviewing the above-named individuals, they will start on the others.





CLARENCE RELATED THE FOLLOWING QUESTION ALLEGED TO HAVE OCCURED IN THE INTERROGATION OF MIRIAM SHERWOOD QUOTE, DID YOU KNOW CLARENCE CALLS MARCIA SWEETHEART AND SO FORTH, UNQUOTE, TO WHICH MARCIA REPLIED WITH CERTAINITY, QUOTE THEY ARE TAPPING OUR WIRES AGENTS ADVISED THAT THIS QUESTION WAS NOT ASKED THEN. UNQUOTE. OF MIRIAM SHERWOOD AND NO REFERENCE WAS MADE TO CLARENCE'S CON-TACT WITH MARCIA WHICH WOULD INVOLVE DISCLOSURE OF CONFIDENTIAL SOURCE. CLARENCE ALSO TOLD MARCIA THAT THE FBI HAS PHOTOSTATS OF LETTERS WHICH SHE WROTE TO HIM. PAULSON arrived in Cleveland the morning of July 4.

1946, and checked into the Hotel Hollenden at 9:17 a.m. and was assigned to Room 1108. He checked out of the hotel at 3:44 p.m. July 7, 1946, and gave his forwarding address as 14 Anchor Drive, Rye, New York.

Confidential Informant of Hotel Hollenden, advised that PAULAON made the following long distance telephone calls from Room 1108:

> July 4, 1946, 6:50 p.m. - station to station call to MAMRONEK 1460, New York, eight minutes at \$2.19

July 6. 1946. 8:43 a.m. - station to station call to MAMRONEK 1460, New York, nine minutes at \$2.94

___advised that telephone Confidential Informant MAMRONEK 1460, New York, is listed to MILTON PAULSON, 14 Anchor Drive, Rye, New York.

During the period July 4 through 7, or during PAULSON'S stay in Cleveland, the Convention of the National Lawyer's Guild was in session at the Hotel Hollenden and it was ascertained that soon after PAULSON'S arrival at the hotel he registered for attendance at this convention. The convention followed a full day-to-day schedule of meetings and schedules, and PAUISON attended all these meetings. Due to the closed nature of the meetings it was not possible to ascertain all of his contacts and activities. However, checks were made of his activities when possible and nothing pertinent was noted. No one answering the description of ADAMS, was

It is felt that EDWARD T. MANNING should be interviewed for the following reasons: 1 - he was employed on the D.S.M. Project and associated with ARTHUR ADAMS, CLARENCE HISKEY and JOHN HITCHCOCK CHAPIN. HISKEY and CHAPIN have both been interviewed, and it would be advantageous to secure MANNING's story as it pertains to ARTHUR ADAMS; 2 - CIARENCE HISKEY alleges that MANNING wrote him to the effect that ADAMS had expressed undue curiosity relative to MANNING's work on the project, and it is thus possible that ADAMS actually asked him for confidential information: 3 - MANNING contacted ADAMS just prior to his departure from New York City for the West Coast and the South Pacific and borrowed money from him. Further, ADAMS is known to have talked considerably to MANNING of Russia and it would be valuable to know the exact extent of their relationship As to conducting this interview in Japan, it is believed that it would be more advisable that it be handled there, rather than that the United States Government be put to the expense of returning this man to the States. Based upon previous interviews in this case, it is a matter of conjecture as to whether an interview with MANNING, though definitely desirable, will produce anything of value. Then again, it is felt that MAN-NING should not be brought back at the Bureau's request, with the possibility that he would then be allowed to remain, and thus the Bureau would have actually aided him to some degree. For the aid of the Agents conducting this interview with MANNING, there is being transmitted herewith a memorandum setting forth the necessary background information. Reference is made to the Bureau letter of March 12, 1946 wherein permission was granted to interview Dr. DAVID HENRY DUBROWSKY relative to the above captioned subject and his first wife. SABINA:

You are advised that Agents of the New York Field Division contacted Dr. DUBROWSKY at his home in Roxbury, Connecticut. Dr. DUBROWSKY identified a photograph of ARTHUR ADAMS and stated that he first met him in 1914 or/1915 through one VERAX SHIMKIN, who at that time was the wife of VICTOR SHIMKIN - editor of the Russian paper, "NEW RUSSIAN WORD". The Doctor was unable to recall any particular details of this first meeting other than the fact that it was Mrs. SHIMKIN who introduced him to ADAMS.

As to VERA SHIMKIN, he knew that she had been divorced from Mr. SHIMKIN and the last he heard was working under the name of VERA WEISS at the Kings County General Hospital, Social Service Section. He said that he received this information approximately fourteen or fifteen years ago and consequently did not know if she was still employed there.

Following his first meeting DUBROWSKY advised that he next saw ADAMS in the office of LUDWIG K, MARTENS, who was then unofficial ANDLED BY Russian Ambassador in the United States. He knew that later ADAMS actually ESK became a member of MARTENS mission and in 1921 left the United States for Russia with MARTENS. However, he did not think that ADAMS had been with MARTENS when the mission was first started.

It was DUBROWSKY's recollection that ADAMS had been employed by the SPERRY GYROSCOPE COMPANY before going with MARTENS. He also believed that ADAMS was instrumental in starting the organization known as TECHNICAL AID TO SOVIET RUSSIA. He was sure that ADAMS had instituted this organization after he became associated with MARTENS, but he did not know if the organization was MARTENS! idea or that of ADAMS. At that time, he continued, MARTENS! position in the United States was rather precarious and he was

careful not to become connected with any organization such as the TECHNICAL AID TO SOVIET RUSSIA. However, DUBROWSKY knew that ADAMS had conducted a school in Brooklyn in connection with this organization and had held classes for young technicians who were possibly interested in going to Soviet Russia. He said that following ADAMS' departure with MARTENS in 1921, the COMMUNIST PARTY took over the school entirely.

Bureau attention is called to the fact that this organization, TECHNICAL AID TO SOVIET RUSSIA, was discussed in previous Comrap reports.

Dr. DUBROWSKY thought that after ADAMS left in the early part of 1921 he saw him in the latter part of the same year in Moscow. However, he was unable to recall just what ADAMS was doing at that time but did think that he was the head of the AMO AUTOMOBILE FACTORY. He claimed that this was the only time he ever saw ADAMS in Moscow.

Continuing, he advised that he next saw ADAMS in 1927 or 1928 when the latter was in the United States, but again he had no knowledge as to what ADAMS was actually doing here. DUBROWSKY commented that it was not a good policy to ask what one was doing in those days.

After this visit it was DUBROWSKY's recollection that ARTHUR ADAMS returned again to the United States some time in 1932. On this trip he believed that ADAMS had some connection with airplanes, but he was unable to elaborate on this. He did recall that ADAMS had sent him to the LAFAYETTE RADIO CORPORATION, which was then on/Canal Street, to buy a radio. Dr. DUBROWSKY explained that one ANDREL PETROV, who was then a Vice-President of AMTORG and for all practical purposes was in charge of aviation in Russia, needed a radio and ADAMS told him to go to this LAFAYETTE COMPANY. Dr. DUBROWSKY said that PETROV did go to this concern and actually purchased a radio. However, on the following day Mrs. PETROV and Dr. DUBROWSKY went by and picked it up. According to the Doctor, ADAMS and PETROV were very well acquainted but PETROV, he advised, is now dead.

These meetings with ARTHUR ADAMS in 1932 were the last time Dr. DUBROWSKY ever saw him. He said that he had heard that ADAMS was here in the United States on various occasions, but he had no recollection of who had told him this nor did he have any personal knowledge of any further visits to this country by ADAMS.

During the course of his acquaintanceship with ADAMS, the Doctor secured the impression that he was a graduate engineer from some school in Canada. He recalled ADAMS stated that he was born in Russia and that one of his parents was Russian while the other was either British, Canadian, or American. It was DUBROWSKY's further impression that ADAMS first came to the United States shortly after 1905. He explained that around that year the first revolution started in Russia and there was a general exodus of young intellectuals from Russia, and it was his opinion that ADAMS was among this group. Dr. DUBROWSKY expressed the further opinion that ADAMS was a COMMUNIST PARTY member and quite an influential one. He said that the mere fact that ADAMS was allowed to come to the United States as a member of Soviet missions was the best proof that he was a trusted Party man. Further, he continued, the fact that ADAMS had made these trips combined with the fact that he was the head of the AMO FACTORY in Moscow would definitely mark him as an important man to the Soviets. Li

As to ADAMS! wife, DOROTHEAKEEN, DUBROWSKY recalled that he met her once when she returned to this country from Russia to see her parents, but he was unable to definitely state just when this occurred but assumed it was in 1932. However, he was unable to recall ever having known the subject's first wife, SABINA ROTHKOPF. As to his possibly meeting her in Russia, DUBROWSKY related that he met a great number of people there and it would be almost impossible for him to state definitely one way or the other as to whether he met SABINA there. 1

Dr. DUBROWSKY promised that he would review his own papers for any pertinent information re ARTHUR ADAMS or SABINA ROTHKOPF and would advise interviewing Agents in the event he located anything of interest. In addition he suggested that the United States State Department might probably have some type of biographical sketch of ARTHUR ADAMS, as such was furnished on all members of the MARTENS' mission. He further supplied the name of one BEN MANDEL, 3101 Pennsylvania Avenue, S. E., Washington, D. C., as a person who would probably know something of ADAMS. He explained that MANDEL was formerly employed by the Dies Committee and maintains files on all individuals who were mixed-up in Communist or Russian affairs. The New York Field Division will take no steps toward contacting either of these parties unless the Bureau instructs to the contrary.

As to the aforementioned VERA WEISS, preliminary investigation has shown that she is presently employed under the name of VERA J WEISS at the MORRISANIA HOSPITAL, Bronx, New York. New York files reflect that the

name of Mrs. VERA J. WEISS was included in a list of individuals who attended a class at the AMERICAN RUSSIAN INSTITUTE in New York City entitled: "METHODS OF THE RUSSIAN LANGUAGE". It was further shown that a "V. WEISS" in 1945 signed a pledge card in hehalf of BEN DAVIS.

As to the suggestion contained in referenced letter that every effort be made to develop DUBROWSKY as a confidential source of information concerning Soviet and or Communist activities, it can be stated that throughout the entire interview Dr. DUBROWSKY indicated his willingness to cooperate with Bureau Agents at any time. However, it is to be noted that the Doctor separated himself from any Russian or Communist activities in 1935, and the information he possesses pertains to activities in this field prior to that time rather than with present day phases of this work. Dr. DUBROWSKY himself stated that no present day Soviet or Communist official would dare contact him.



SYNOPSIS OF FACTS

COMPTORMIAL

IRENE MILLER presently employed at Oppenheim-Collins. NYC. Dr. LOUIS MILLER invited IRENE MILLER and his brother, SAMUEL MILLER, to his Apt., Lil West End Ave., subsequent to interview of SAMUEL MILLAR by Bureau agents and prior to interview with IRENE MILL.R. Subject interviewed by Bureau agents. He stated that she first met ADAPS in the office of her husband about ten years ago. She felt Dr. WILLER knew ADAMS prior to date of said meeting, but only in a professional way. She claimed infrequent contacts with ADAMS up to February, 1945, when she separated from her husband, had no place to live and ADAMS offered her his room at the Peter Cooper Hotel, NYC, which he intended to vacate for a period of months, while he went West for his health. ATAMS suddenly returned, at which time she surrendered the hotel room to him. She admitted having in her possession ome of ADAMS! baggage, which she was told contained clothing. She admitted forwarding packages to DUROTHEA REEN, wife of A THUR ADAMS, in M scow, but claimed these were partially for KEEN and partially for MILLER's cousin, HELEN DEAMONT. Packages contained foodstuffs and clothing, which were sent to KEEN because MILLEP was unaware of cousin's address. defied at first she knew of any relationship

She admitted receiving cables from KKEN, but claims she knew her only as a friend she met in her cousin's home in Moscow in 1931. HILLER claims she saw KEEN several years later in the IS when KEEN returned to renew her passport. She denied ever having seen ADAMS on either of these two occasions or having heard of him at that particular time. She had no knowledge of his background, except that he was Canadian. She knew he was an engineer and traveled considerably. She had no knowledge of his present wheresbouts and admitted inquiring of VICTORIA STONE as to his whereabouts. She was introduced to VICTORIA STONE by ARTHUR ADAMS. Mail cover negative. - P -REFERENCE: Report of Special Agent John F. Malone, 3/5/46, New York. DETAILS: A spot check of subject on April 28, 1946 reflected that she left her apartment and proceeded directly to Oppenheim-Colling Department Store. 34th Street. New York City. Miss M. KRAMER, Personnel Manager, Oppenheim-Collins Department Store, advised that IRENE MILLER was hired on March 11, 1946 as an Assistant Buyer at \$70 per week. At the time of application she gave as personal references, DANIEL GOLENPAUL, 875 Fifth Avenue, New York City and ROSE GLENEY. Alden Hotel, Central Park West. She listed as her former employer, R. H. Macy, from 1942 to January, 1946. Miss KRAMER stated that they have requested references from Macy's, but to date have not received a reply to their communication. - 2 -

NY 100-70397 Confidential Informant T-1 advised that on June 18, 1946 at 7:00 P.W. an unidentified man contacted IRENE MILLER at her apartment and advised her that two men came to see SAM and instead of having him (SAM) come down to the beach he is coming to the city. The unidentified man stated they will meet at his house at 8:30 and he thought it would be a good idea if she would be there. She asked if it was "411" and he said "yes. on the 11th floor". He stated that SAN and GEORGE would be there. It is believed that the unidentified man is Dr. LOUIS MILLER. He now goes to his office at Far Rockaway every other day. He resides on the 11th floor at 411 West End Avenue. It is believed that the two men referred to as going to see SAM were the two agents from the New York Office who interviewed SAMUEL MILLER, brother of Dr. LOUIS MILLER, at his office on June 18, 1946 in regard to ARTHUR ADAMS. This informant was unable to provide the date of the meeting, other than the fact that it was at 8:30. The identity of GEORGE is unknown. This same informant advised that on June 17, 1946 subject was in contact with an unidentified man, believed to be DANIEL GOLENPAUL, and advised him she expected to receive a loan of \$1100 from her sister for some investment. She stated also she expects a new job at \$100 per week at a big department store in the Dress Department. Wiss KRANER, Personnel Manager, Oppenheim-Collins Department Store, previously advised that Miss MILLER was in line for a promotion. Confidential Informant T-1 advised that Miss MILLER was promoted from Assistant Buyer to Buyer at Oppenheim-Collins at \$100 per week. IRENE MILLER was interviewed at the New York Field Office by Special Agent Francis X. Plant and the writer on June 21, 1946. She stated that she met ARTHUR ADAMS as a patient of her husband's office approximately five or ten years ago, when said office was located at 885 West End Avenue. She did not know how the doctor became acquainted with ADAMS, but believed it was in a professional way. IRENE MILLER denied emphatically that she knew ARTHUR ADAMS prior to the above-mentioned meeting. When asked if ADAMS was related to her husband, she stated she did not know, but felt that they were not because they were of different faith. She stated her husband is Jewish and that ADAMS definitely is not Jewish. She stated she knew very little of ADANS! background, other than that he was a Canadian and traveled quite extensively, mentioning such countries as South America, China and Europe. -3 -

MILLER then stated that in the early part of 1945, around January or February, she was having considerable trouble with her husband, Dr. LOUIS MILLER, and they decided to separate. After she left her husband at this time she had no place to go and it was about this time that ARTHUR ADAMS was preparing to go West for his health. He offered her the use of his room at the Peter Cooper Hotel, with the understanding that he would be gone for several months, and she could use the room until his return. She understood the purpose of the trip was for his health, but she knew no further details, such as where he was going or where he would stay. She related ADAMS came back much sooner than she expected and as a result she was forced to give up the hotel room. She stated she then went and stayed with a GOLDBURT at 40 East 10th Street, New York City, until she could herself locate at 2 Horatio Street, her present address.

Then asked if she had anything belonging to ADAMS at the present time, she stated that she did not. When she was advised that there was information available to the effect that when she moved from ADAMS room at the Peter Cooper Hotel to her present address, 2 Horatio Street, she was observed moving a bag belonging to ARTHUR ADAMS and one of the bags which he had with him on his trip to the West Coast. After recalling briefly, she stated she did have a bag belonging to ATAMS in her closet. She stated she never saw the contents of the bag, but he told her it contained clothing, including a heavy furlined coat, winter hat and underclothing. The reason she took the bag to her apartment was because she had a large "outside closet" which was cold and considered a good place to store the fur cost. She denied there was any arrangement made with ADAMS to ship the coat to any future address. It was just left there with the understanding that he would pick it up when he had use for it. She described the bag as being a large canvas-covered piece of luggage. She stated she would make the bag available to agents in the Bureau for inspection if she were within her legal right to do so, without getting herself into trouble.

When asked if she knew any of ARTHUR ADAMS' associates she stated she did not. When asked if she knew DOROTHEA KEEN, she stated that she did and that she met her in Russia on the occasion of her visit there with her husband sometime in 1931. She could not remember the exact date of the visit, but stated it was in the Summer and she was absent from the United States for three months. She stated she met DOROTHEA KEEN through her cousin, HELEN DEAMONT, in Moscow, but she denied emphatically that on this occasion she met ARTHUR ADAMS. She denied that she knew ARTHUR ADAMS was the husband of DOROTHEA KEEN. She admitted, with much reluctance, that she knew that ARTHUR ADAMS and DOROTHEA KEEN knew each other. She stated that at the time she

was in Russia it was possible that her husband met ADAMS without her anowing it, but she did not feel it was very probable.

IRENE MILLER stated that she was born in Warsaw. Poland and that she presently has one brother, PIETRO PILTROVITCH, an engineer, in Moscow. MILL: R stated that she did not know too much about DUROTHEA KEEN's position in Moscow, other than the fact that she was employed for some American newspaper correspondent and that she worked for a man by the name of DURANTY. MILLER was very slow to admit that she sent clothing to DOR THEA KEYN. but after she did admit sending packages she denied she sent them for ARTHUR ADAMS. She stated the packages she sent contained mostly foodstuffs and clothing and were designated for her cousin, HTLEN PEAMONT, although she included some clothing and food for DORDTHEA & FN. These packages, although designated for HELEN DEAMONT, were actually addressed to TOROTHEA KEEN because LOR THEA KEEN was an American citizen and was more apt to receive the packages than HELEN DEAMONT. MILLAR also stated that she was not sure of HELE. DEAMONT's address while she was always sure of DOR THEA KLEN's. MILLER stated the contents of these packages could be identified by contacting the World Tourists Corporation in New York. She stated the numbers of the packages are available at that company and the contents of each package are noted thereon. ()

When asked whether or not she was alarmed at not seeing ADAMS after January, she replied in the affirmative and stated that sometime in the latter part of January or the early part of February she called VICTORIA STONE on the telephone to inquire as to ADAMS wherebouts but she stated that she was advised by STONE that she knew nothing of ADAMS wherebouts.

it will be recalled that on January 20, 1946 MILLER was in contact with STONE and obviously inquired as to the whereabouts of ADAMS. /)

When asked if she were acqueinted with one Mme. YNA MAJESKA, a designer who resides at 1 Fifth Avenue, and has an office at 1 East 57th Street, New York City, IRENE MILLER replied in the affirmative. She stated also that she knows that ArTHUR ADAMS knew Mad. MAJESKA ut she did not know how the acquaintanceship came about.

It will be recalled that according to information supplied by a highly confidential source, IREME MILLER at one time had this page of the questioned letter in her possession.

MILLER stated that there were 11 children in her family in all, besides the brother mentioned previously as being in Moscow. She also has a brigher, MOENORRIS in San Francisco, and 8 sisters in and around Greater New York. She refused to give the names and addresses of any of her relatives.

TREME MILLER showed considerable concern over whether or not an inquiry would be made at Oppenheim-Collins in regard to her character, inasmuch as such procedure would jeopardise her position.

She stated that if there was not sufficient time during the present interview to ask her all the questions desired she would be glad to come to the office at any time in the future to discuss the matter. She stated during the interview that her time was rather limited because of a dinner engagement which she had.

TREME MILLER stated she knew VICTORIA STONE and that she goes there now as a customer. She stated ARTHUR ADAMS introduced her to VICTORIA STONE several years ago, but she could not remember when.

In regard to ADAMS' birthday, IRENE MILLER admitted attending a party at the apartment of VICTORIA STONE at 39 West 55th Street in October, 1944. She stated Dr. MILLER also attended the party with her, but she could not remember who else attended. She stated she believed the occasion of the party was ARTHUR ADAMS' birthday.

When asked if she ever sent any gifts to ADAMS she stated that in October, 1945 she sent gifts to ADAMS for herself and her son, on what she believed was the occasion of his birthday, although she was not certain. She denied she sent any gifts for anyone else other than her son.

It will be recalled that confidential informants advised that at the time IREME MILLER sent gifts to ADAMS for herself and her son she included a gift from a MOLLIE and SAM, believed to be SAMUEL NOVICK, and also from an unidentified individual, who according to the informant may have been DOROTHEA KEEN.

NY 100-70397 IREME MILLER admitted that at one time she did meet ANAMS at his place of amployment in the Keynote Recording Company. It will be recalled that IRENE MILLER was observed entering the Keynote Recording Company and that confidential informants advised that she had an appointment with ARTHUR ADAMS at said office. 1 (She stated she met JACOB ARONOFF, but did not know whether or not ADAMS knew ARONOFF. MILLER stated she knew JULIUS HEIMAN through VICTORIA STONE. L It will be recalled that according to information furnished by a highly confidential source, the name of ZOZIA ZEITZ, 58 West 8th Street appeared in the subject's address book. IRENE WILLER stated that she and ZOZIA ZEITZ were raised together in Warsaw, Poland and they have been close friends since coming to this country. She stated ZOZIA ZETTZ' present name is DIAMANT, and although this name is similar to her cousin's name, MILLER stated there is no relationship. MILLER stated that ADAMS knew ZOZIA ZEITZ, but was unable to furnish any information in regard to their acquaintanceship. It is to be noted that IRENE MILLER was very vague and general in the answers to questions put to her and would not give any specific details to any questions asked. IRENE WILLER admitted receiving two cablegrams from DOROTHEA KEEN, one of which she never actually saw, but the contents of it were conveyed to her over the telephone. She stated that one cablegram was about packages sent to her and the second cablegram included felicitations for our victory over Germeny. Mail covers were placed on IRENE MILLER with negative results. U- PENDING --7-

SEWALD, Rural Mail Carrier for RIVIT, Pittsford and Rutland, Vermont, was contacted on June 7, 1946 at the Rutland, Vermont Postoffice and advised that JOHN HITCHCOCK CHAPIN is home on a two months vacation and the CHAPIN family consisting of JOHN, his wife, father, EDMARL E. CHAPIN, brother, WILLIAM and his wife, a young fellow about twenty years old, slender and light complexion, all went to Canada for a two week vacation prior to May 26, 1946.

Mr. SEWARD was re-contacted on June 8, 1946 and identified the man staying at JOHN CHAPIN'S father's home as DONALD GEORGE BALLANTYNE. He stated BALLANTYNE received a letter from Rouges Point Immigration Office on June 7, 1946.

He also advised that a letter was forwarded to John CHAPIN from his wife with return address 1442 Sherbrook Avenue, Montreal, Quebec, Canada. At a later date Mr. SEWARD advised that JOHN CHAPIN's mother and father had separated and that the above address is the address of the mother.

It will be noted that WILLIAM CHAPIN, brother of JOHN, is mentioned in the report of Special Agent Harry E. Walsh, dated February 28, 1946 at Newark, New Jersey, in the case entitled "IGAR GUZENKO - Internal Security - R" which report reveals that a Bureau letter dated May 27, 1946 advised that DAVID GORDON LUNIAN is reported as having been an espionage agent of considerable importance under the direction of the Red Army Intelligence in Canada and was himself one of the group of agents operating for Red Army Intelligence. At the time of LUNIAN's arrest in Canada, he possessed a loose left notebook which contained the name of Captain W. T. CHAPIN, 4812 Ventnor Avenue, Atlantic City, New Jersey. Investigation at New Jersey revealed that Captain CHAPIN had secured quarters for his wife at that address.

Inasmuch as there is no request for this office to conduct further investigation by the office of origin, this case is being referred upon completion to the office of origin.

CHAPIN RETURNED TO APARTMENT, SECURED JACKET AND PROCEEDED TO CORNER WHERE HE MET ADAMS AND BOTH ENTERED NEARBY PARK. ADAMS GAVE CHAPIN AFOREMENTIONED KEY. CHAPIN CLAIMED THEY DID NOT DISCUSS SUBJECTS PROPOSITION AT FIRST MEETING BUT ARRANGED FOR SECOND MEETING AT ADAMS HOTEL. CHAPIN ALLEGED ADAMS LEFT HIM IN A DRUGSTORE WHERE HE SUPPOSEDLY MADE TELEPHONE CALL FOR RESERVATION AT A DOWNTOWN HOTEL. UPON RETURNING HE GAVE CHAPIN A PIECE OF PAPER ON WHICH HOTEL ROOM NUMBER WAS WRITTEN DOWN. CHAPIN UNABLE TO RECALL DEFINITELY TREND OF CONVERSATION AT FIRST MEETING, BUT SAID IT WAS OF GENERAL NATURE AND HE CONSIDERED IT POSSIBLE THEY

TALKED OF RUSSIA. 7 CHAPIN SAID WHEN HE VISITED SUBJECT AT HOTEL ROOM SEVERAL EVENINGS LATER THEY ENGAGED IN DISCUSSION OF RUSSIA AND SUBJECT ASKED IF CHAPIN WOULD BE DESIROUS OF OBTAINING EMPLOYMENT IN THAT COUNTRY. ADAMS FURTHER SPOKE OF PROGRESS RUSSIA MADE IN COLLECTIVE RESEARCH AND USED AS EXAMPLE PARTICULAR DEVELOPMENT IN PRODUCTION OF LINEN. ADMITTED ADAMS SPOKE OF HIS OWN ACTIVITIES IN RUSSIA, BUT CHAPIN UNABLE TO RECALL DEFINITELY WHAT WAS SAID. BELIEVED POSS-IBLE ADAMS HAD MENTIONED AMO AUTOMOBILE FACTORY. CHAPIN UNABLE TO STATE DEFINITELY HOW ADAMS HAD BROUGHT UP SUBJECT OF CHAPINS SECUR-ING INFO. HOWEVER HE SAID MATTER WAS APPROACHED AND ADAMS SUGGESTED THREE POSSIBLE METHODS. FIRST, HE WOULD PROVIDE CHAPIN WITH A CAMERA AND THE LATTER WOULD PHOTOGRAPH DOCUMENTS AND BRING SAME TO ADAMS. SECOND, CHAPIN WOULD SECURE DOCUMENTS AND BRING THEM TO ADAMS WHO WOULD IN TURN PHOTOGRAPH. THIRD, CHAPIN WOULD DICTATE FROM DOC-UMENTS AND BRING RESULTS TO ADAMS. CHAPIN SAID SUBJECT DID NOT MEN-TION ANY PARTICULAR TYPE OF INFO DESIRED AND CHAPIN PRESUMED HE WAS TO GET ANY WHICH CAME INTO HIS POSSESSION. SUBJECT DID NOT DES-CRIBE CAMERA WHICH HE WOULD OBTAIN. ADDED HE PRESUMED HE WOULD SECURE REPORTS WHICH HE HAD AVAILABLE IN GREAT VOLUME IN HIS OWN FILE CAB-INET. IT WAS FURTHER INDICATED THAT THESE DOCUMENTS WOULD BE PHOTO-GRAPHED OR DICTATED FROM AT CHAPINS RESIDENCE RATHER THAN AT HIS MET-LAB OFFICE. CHAPIN PRESUMED ANY DICTATION WOULD BE THROUGH A DICTOG-RAPH MACHINE, BUT THIS WAS NOT DUSCUSSED BY HIM AND ADAMS. HE CLAIMED

HE GAVE ADAMS NO DEFINITE ANSWER AND LEFT HIM WITHOUT AN ACCEPTANCE OR REJECTION. INSISTED SUBJECT MADE NO PROPOSALS OF PAYING FOR INFO. EXPLAINED THAT IF HE DID CONSIDER PERFORMING SUCH WORK IT WOULD NOT BE THROUGH INDUCEMENT OF MONEY BUT RATHER BECAUSE OF HIS SINCERE CON-VICTION THAT SUCH INFO SHOULD BE DISSEMINATED FOR WORLD BENEFIT> ALLEGED HISKEY NEVER TOLD OF EVER RECEIVING MONEY FROM ADAMS. ADMIT-TED THAT THOUGH HISKEY HAD NEVER ADVISED HE HAD BEEN SUPPLYING ADAMS WITH INFO, IMPLICATION THAT HE HAD BEEN SO DOING WAS THERE. SHE INFORMED HER HUSBAND THAT WHILE HE WAS IN CLEVELAND SHE SAW HISKEY FREQUENTLY DURING WHICH MEETINGS THE LATTER OFTEN SPOKE AS TO CHAPINS BACKGROUND AND POLITICAL LEANINGS. BOTH CHAPINS FELT HISKEYS MOTIVE IN MAKING SUCH INQUIRIES WAS IN PREPARATION FOR LATER CONTACT WITH CHAPIN. CLAIMED THAT AFTER MEETING AT SUBJECTS HOTEL IN CHICAGO HE NEVER SAW LATTER AGAIN. ADMITTED ON ONE TRIP TO NYC AT LATER DATE HAVING ATTEMPTED TO LOCATE SUBJECT THROUGH NY TELE-PHONE DIRECTORY. SAID HE ACTUALLY TELEPHONICALLY CONTACTED AN IN-DIVIDUAL BY NAME OF ADAMS, WHOSE ADDRESS WAS SAME AS THAT GIVEN TO HIM BY SUBJECT, BUT HUNG UP BEFORE CALL COMPLETED. STAD FURTHER HE WALKED BY ONE THREE NAUGHT EAST THIRTY NINTH ST., WHERE SUBJECT RESIDED, BUT UPON OBSERVING IT WAS A HOTEL, MADE NO ATTEMPTS TO ENTER SAME.

ARTHUR ALEXANANDROVICH ADAMS ESPIONAGE - R

Reference is made to my memorandum of July 9, 1946, in the captioned matter. For your additional information in this case, there are attached one copy of the report of Special Agent John J. Ward, Jr., dated July 9, 1946, at New York City, captioned "John Hitchcock Chapin; Internal Security -k," and one copy of the report of Special Agent John J. Ward, Jr., Cated August 9, 1946, at New York City, captioned "Dr. Clarence Francis Hiskey, was; Internal Security - R."

You are further advised that at the request of John Hitchcock Chapin, he was reinterviewed on August 26, 1946, at which time he furnished the following information: Clarence Hiskey contacted him in Cleveland. Chio, prior to his, Chapin's, departure for the armed forces and inquired how Chapin felt regarding the possibility of atomic power being used oppressively. He was unable to recall the exact words used by him and Hickey in the conversation but said this was the trend of their talk:

· Chapin said he was worried regarding the future of atomic power, and Hiskey indicated he was likewise fearful. Hiskey then inquired of A Chapin if he would be willing to do something to alleviate in some way their fears as to the possibility of atomic power being misused to which he agreed. and if he would be willing to talk to a "Russian Agent." Upon being interrogated closely as to Hiskey's exact words, Chapin claimed he could not recall Hiskey's exact terms but admitted from conversation ensuing between him and Hiskey he had no doubt that Adams was a Russian agent. He said Hiskey told him the "Aussian Agent" was an orgineer, lived in New York City, had been in Canada, and he had met him in New York City "through friends." Chapin agreed to meet Adams upon his, Chapin's, return to Chicago, and arrangements relative to Adams' identification by the use of Chapin's key were then made. It was further agreed that Chapin would advise Alams when he returned to Chicago by writing a letter to Clerente Hiskey, formerly employed in Chicago on the Lanhattan Project. who would forward it to Arthur Adams.

According to Chapin, he returned to Chicago in the Fall of 1944 and was telephonically contacted by Adams, who introduced himself as being the man Mr. Hiskey had spoken about. Arrangements were made for Adams and Chapin to meet, and several evenings later, the date he is unable to recall, Adams A. The appeared at Chapin's apartment but refused to come in stating that he would meet Chapin outside on a street corner. Chapin met Adams on the designated street corner and they both entered & nearby park. Adams gave Chapin the afore-mentioned key. Chapin claimed they did not siscuss Adam's proposition

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at this first meeting but arranged for a second meeting at Adams' hotel. He stated that their conversation on this first meeting was of a general nature though it was possible they talked of Russia.

Chapin stated that when he visited Adams! hotel room several evenings later they engaged in a discussion of Russia, and Adams asked him if he would be desirous of obtaining employment in Russia. Chapin recalled that Adams spoke of his own activities in Russia but he was unable to recall definitely the conversation though he believed Adams had mentioned the automobile industry.

Chapin was unable to recall how Adams had brought up the subject of his securing information but stated Adams suggested three possible methods:

- 1. He would provide Chapin with a camera and the latter would photograph documents and bring them to Adams.
- 2. Chapin would secure documents and bring them to Adams who would photograph them.
- 3. Chapin would dictate from documents and bring results to Adams.

Chapin claimed Adams did not mention any particular type of information desired, and that it was further indicated that these documents would be photographed or dictated from at Chapin's residence rather than at his Ketallurgical Laboratory office. He presumed that any dictation would be through a dictograph machine but this was not discussed. Chapin claims he gave no definite answer to this proposal and left Adams without accepting or rejecting the offer. He further claims that Adams made no proposals for paying for information and explained that if he did consider performing such work it would not be through inducement of money but rather because of his sincere conviction that such information should be disseminated for world benefit.

Chapin claimed that after meeting Adams at the hotel in Chicago he never saw him again. He admitted that on one trip to New York City at a later date he attempted to locate Adams through the New York telephone directory, that he telephonically contacted an individual by the name of Adams whose address was the same as that given by the subject but hung up before the call was completed, and further that he walked by 130 East 39th Street where Adams resided but on observing it was a hotel made no attempts to enter.

Chapin alleged that Hiskey had never mentioned to him receiving money from Adams, but he advised he thought Hiskey had been supplying Adams with information as the implication was there though Hiskey had never told him.

The interviewing agents advised Chapin it was not felt he was relating complete truth as to his conversations with Hiskey concerning Adams, and he was told it was believed Hiskey had more fully explained just how he had been working with Adams. To this Chapin replied by stating "I don't want to hang Hiskey, and I do not want to testify against him, though I presume that I will have to."

Chapin stated he did not desire at the time of the interview to place the afore-mentioned information in the form of a signed statement but said he would write his own statement at home, present it to his lawyer for approval and later would make it available to the interviewing agents.

It would be appreciated if you would advise as soon as possible whether in your opinion the facts in this case constitute a violation of the espionage statutes.

Reference is made to Bureau letter dated July 13, 1946, wherein it was instructed that sufficient information be furnished the Los Angeles Office by the New York Field Division in order that a comprehensive interview might be conducted of BENJAMIN MILLER and his wife, ZEIMA BAKER MILLER.

In this connection it is believed that the Los Angeles Office already has sufficient information in its possession to conduct an interview with the MILLERs inasmuch as they received copies of the reports of Special Agent H. H. HINDERAKER in the case entitled, "ARTHUR ALEXANDROVICH ADAMS, was:, INTERNAL SECURITY - R, dated December 29, 1944, and April 28, 1945, respectively. In addition a copy of the most recent report in the same case, which is presently being prepared, is being forwarded to the ING Los Angeles Field Division.

Attention is called to the Los Angeles report in the ratiove captioned matter, a copy of which report was forwarded by referenced Bureau letter. It is noted that on page 6 of this report, reference is made to correspondence between CLARENCE HISKEY and EDWARD THANNING in which the latter discusses a plan for going to New York "to see FRANK and other contractors about the Russian deal. The report to FRANK is believed to be Major BENJAM THE TRANKIN MILLER. 100 The report then states

that the individual referred to by MANNING is one FRANK P. FIFER. This belief is based on the fact that on September 12, 1944, while EDWARD T. MANNING was in New York and spent approximately four hours with ARTHUR ADAMS, he proceeded by train to the home of FRANK FIFER which is located at 10 Lowell Road, Port Washington, New York, where he and his girl friend, BEVERLY PUTNAM, spent the entire night. They were met at the train by the aforementioned FRANK FIFER.

Further, the Manhattan authorities in New York advised that the address book of CLARENCE HISKEY contained a notation as follows: "Things to do in New York ---- see Frank Pfeiffer".

The MED Office also furnished information concerning FIFER indicating that he was head engineer (hydro-electric), Office Division Engineers, North Atlantic Division, New York, New York. His employment record, United States Engineers, War Department, reflected that from the period June 1926 to June 1932 he was with the HUGH L. COOPER AND COMPANY as a representative consulting engineer in Russia, investigating and reporting on the DNEIPROSTROY HYDRO-ELECTRIC PROJECT, and was acting as a consultant on design and construction of the project.

Reference is made to your letter dated September 3, 1946, in which you advise that Customs officials in New York have stated that due to lack of proper facilities they would be unable to maintain any stops on outgoing passengers. You requested that the Bureau ascertain from the Customs officials in Washington, D. C., advice as to whether or not this situation exists throughout the entire country.

In view of recent conferences with Customs officials and Immigration and Naturalization Service representatives as reflected in Bureau letters to you dated July 9 and August 13, 1946, it is desired that you furnish the Bureau with the details of the "recent conference" held in New York City with officials of the Customs Department at which time you received the advice regarding their inability to maintain stops. It is believed that this is not in accordance with the agreements previously arrived at between the Bureau and the Customs Service.

You are requested to advise as to the date of the conference, the Customs officials present, and the purpose of the conference as well as the details concerning the matter discussed. This information is desired prior to any futher contacts with Customs officials to determine whether that service is unable to maintain stops throughout the entire country on outgoing passengers.
