As we continue to move forward, we will always ensure that our efforts are community-driven, relevant, and effective.



We sought to understand barriers to vaccine access and acceptance in our community.







Our empowerment sessions provide an opportunity for communities to learn more about medical racism, Covid-19, and the vaccines. Our goal is to empower people to take charge of their health and safety. We run pre-and post-surveys to acquire relevant data about community sentiments about the vaccine. # Empower the Youth

### **April Youth Events**



In addition to hosting empowerment sessions geared towards the general public, we also recognize that teenagers and young adults are often excluded from the conversations about Covid–19 and the vaccines. Not only do we believe that **everyone** should get access to relevant information about Covid–19, but gearing our programming towards youth has many key benefits:

- Youth often serve as links between the community and their parents, making them invaluable conduits of information about the Covid–19 vaccines for their households
- No one can influence youth better than other youth. By empowering them to speak with their peers about Covid–19 using scientifically accurate information, we can stop misinformation before it begins
- Most youth will (likely) have to get vaccinated. As of May 11th, 2021, the Pfizer vaccine was made available for children aged 12–15. They too, deserve information on the vaccine. In providing it, we teach them how to be advocates for their health as they approach adulthood.

## Community Engagement

### **Our Mission**

The community engagement team has paved the way for our connectedness with local communities and residents. As our mission is to provide community– focused programming, we have decided to focus our outreach efforts where the need is greatest: access to vaccine clinics and vaccine appointment registration, PPE, and information.

Working towards these goals, we have done:

- Partnered with the Anna M. Cole COVID-19 testing site in Jamaica Plain to hand out COVID-19 information, PPE, and vaccine appointments (hosted at the Reggie Lewis Center) on a weekly basis
- Partnered with Housing=Health to organize canvassing and doorknocking events to help provide people with information and PPE
- Partnered with 24HrPower to host a fun family event and moderated conversation about the Covid–19 vaccine, provided vaccine registration assistance for interested individuals, and uplifted community spirits.

### **Our Success**

#### This month, there were...

- 97 Vaccine appointments made
- 132 doors knocked and 64 doors answered
- 15+ masks and brochures distributed
- 2 new communities reached

# Research

In order to ensure that our efforts are effective at addressing the needs of the community, our goals have been to:

- Understand barriers to Covid-19 vaccine access among black individuals in Massachusetts
- Document the effectiveness of We Got Us initiated programming
- Provide useful insights into the main community concerns

To that end, we have supported or initiated the four research projects described below.

#### Vaccine Accessibility and Acceptance among Black Congregation Members

#### Purpose:

- Understand Barriers to Vaccine Access
- Understand what Information would encourage people to take the vaccine
- Provide actionable steps relevant public health stakeholders

This project is a collaboration with Dr. Wayne Altman (Tufts) and Rev. Gloria Hammond (Bethel AME)

### Empowerment session Randomized Controlled Trial

Purpose:

- Evaluate the effectiveness of our Empowerment Sessions
- Understand trends in vaccine concerns across time and locations
- Gain information on how to modify our empowerment session information and/or approach

This project is a collaboration with the Children's Services of Roxbury.

### Focus Groups for Healthcare Providers

Purpose:

- Elevate the voices of Black Healthcare providers to understand how we should better support them throughout the pandemic
- Inform our messaging and provide useful insight about barriers to vaccine access for healthcare workers

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
#### Empowerment session Pre/Post Survey Assessment and Community Event Evaluation

Purpose:


Assess the impact of these empowerment sessions on an individual's

- Comfort with getting the vaccine
- Knowledge about the Covid-19 vaccine and how it works
- Probability of registering to get vaccinated, and
- Probability of ultimately getting vaccinated

In order to guide our future work, we asked participants from our empowerment sessions to indicate how much they agreed or disagreed with the following statements:





## The Key Question: Assessing Vaccine Acceptance

Much of the narrative around vaccinations in communities of color has been one focusing on the idea of "vaccine hesitancy," which suggests that low vaccination rates in these communities are driven by lack of interest. However, we know that barriers to access also play a significant role in the low vaccination rates we see. That said, we wanted to quantify the level of vaccine interest and acceptance among individuals who attended our empowerment sessions and received a very promising response.

## If offered the Covid–19 vaccine, would you take it?




# Key Insights

- People are more concerned about long term side effects than they are short term side effects
- Vaccine efficacy and the non-genetic components of the vaccine are significant concerns
- Despite concerns, a majority of people want to get the Covid–19 vaccine

That said, we need to continue to provide our communities with:

- Accurate information about how the Covid–19 vaccines work
- Truthful insights about the safety of the vaccines
- Ways to access vaccination sites and obtain appointments
