Speaker Bios

(listed in alphabetical order)

Secretary of State Michael Adams: Michael Adams is the 86th and current Kentucky Secretary of State, elected in 2019. Adams served as Deputy General Counsel to Kentucky Governor Ernie Fletcher, before moving to Washington to accept an appointment as Counsel to the U.S. Deputy Attorney General in the second Bush Administration. In 2007, Adams began full-time private practice in election law, first as General Counsel to the Republican Governors Association, and later opening a national practice in the field. He represented Vice President Mike Pence and other national political figures. Adams successfully pushed his signature legislative issue, Kentucky's first Photo ID to Vote law, through the state legislature only three months into his term. Having received national recognition for running smooth primary and general elections last year amid the pandemic, Adams this year presented and passed the most ambitious election reform legislation in Kentucky since 1891. Adams holds a bachelor's degree from the University of Louisville and a JD from Harvard Law School.

Jessica Anderson: Jessica Anderson is the Executive Director of Heritage Action, the 501(c)(4) sister organization of the Heritage Foundation. In this role, Ms. Anderson is responsible for the advocacy and government relations operations of Heritage Action, which serves to advance the conservative and limited government policies formulated at Heritage. Prior to assuming this role, Ms. Anderson served as Associate Director, Intergovernmental Affairs and Strategic Initiatives for the Office of Management and Budget in President Trump's Administration.

Brian Barnes: Brian Barnes is a partner at Cooper & Kirk PLLC. He has litigated cases at all levels of state trial and appellate courts, as well as all levels of the federal court system: he was the principal author of the briefs for the petitioners in *Collins v. Mnuchin*, a case challenging the nationalization of Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac, which is pending in the United States Supreme Court. Previously, Mr. Barnes cleared for Justice Samuel Alito during the Supreme Court's 2012 Term. He received his Bachelor's degree from Yale College and his JD from Yale Law School, where he was also an Articles Editor for the Yale Law Journal and a member of the Yale Supreme Court Clinic.

The Hon. Ken Blackwell: Ken Blackwell is the former Ohio Secretary of State, where he served from 1999 to 2007. Previously, he served as the Ohio State Treasurer as well as the Mayor of Cincinnati. Mr. Blackwell was the Republican nominee for Ohio governor in 2006. He is currently a Senior Fellow for Family Empowerment with the Family Research Council, a group dedicated to enacting family values-based legislation in Congress. In his time as Secretary of State, Mr. Blackwell was named an honorary co-chair of the George W. Bush campaign. He holds a Bachelor's degree and a Master's of Education from Xavier University.

The Hon. Ken Cuccinelli: Ken Cuccinelli is the chairman of the Election Transparency Initiative, an organization dedicated to preserving election integrity in both state legislatures and within the federal government. Prior to serving as chairman, Mr. Cuccinelli served in the Virginia Senate from 2002-2010 and served as the 46th Attorney General of Virginia from 2010-2014. In the federal government, Mr. Cuccinelli was appointed by President Trump in 2019 as the Acting Director of United States Immigration and Citizenship Services, and he proceeded to serve as the acting Deputy Secretary of Homeland Security. When President Trump created the Coronavirus Task Force as a response to the COVID-19 pandemic, Mr. Cuccinelli was appointed as an original member. He holds a Bachelor's degree from the University of Virginia as well as a Master's and Juris Doctor from George Mason University.

The Hon. Lee Goodman: Lee Goodman is the former Chairman and Commissioner of the Federal Election Commission (FEC), nominated by President Obama in 2013 and confirmed by unanimous consent. While serving on the FEC, he successfully led initiatives to conform the agency's rules and regulations to the Citizens United and McCutcheon Supreme Court decisions. Mr. Goodman previously served as legal counsel and policy advisor to the Governor of Virginia and the Attorney General of Virginia, and he was named a "Top Campaign & Elections Lawyer" by *Washingtonian* magazine, and his writings have appeared in *The Wall Street Journal*, *the Richmond-Times Dispatch*, and *Politico*. Mr. Goodman is now a partner at Wiley & Rein. He received his Bachelor's with highest distinction from the University of

Virginia, and he received is JD from the University of Virginia School of Law, where he served as Articles Editor for the U.Va. Journal of Law & Politics.

Tyler Green: Tyler Green is a partner at Consovoy McCarthy, Inc., a Washington, D.C.-based law firm which assists clients with litigating constitutional, statutory, and regulatory issues in courts throughout the country. Mr. Green served as the Solicitor General of the state of Utah for five years, where he oversaw all civil and criminal appellate matters in which the state of Utah was a party. He has successfully argued cases before the Utah Supreme Court, the Tenth Circuit Court of Appeals, and the United States Supreme Court. Before his role as Solicitor General, Mr. Green was Deputy Chief Counsel for Litigation at the U.S Chamber Litigation Center. He has also served as a law clerk to Justice Clarence Thomas as well as judges on the Tenth Circuit and the U.S District Court for the District of Utah. He currently serves on the Utah Supreme Court's advisory committee for the Utah Rules of Appellate Procedure. Green holds a Bachelor's and a JD from the University of Utah.

Secretary of State Tre Hargett: Tre Hargett is the 37th and current Tennessee Secretary of State. He was first elected to serve by the Tennessee General Assembly in 2009, and he has been re-elected every four years since. Under Secretary Hargett's leadership, the department has significantly modernized its technological capability and redesigned its website to offer a breadth of information to Tennessean citizens. Previously, he served in the Tennessee House of Representatives for a decade, and he was elected Republican Leader twice by his colleagues. Secretary Hargett earned a BBA in Accounting with honors from Memphis State University, as well as an MBA from the University of Memphis.

The Hon. Clea Mitchell: Clea Mitchell chairs the National Election Protection Initiative. As one of the foremost election attorneys in the country, she has litigated for years on issues as wide-ranging as campaign finance, redistricting, election integrity, and much more, even arguing before the United Supreme Court in *U.S. Term Limits Inc. v. Thornton*. Ms. Mitchell is also former member of the Oklahoma House of Representatives, and she was a candidate for Oklahoma's Lieutenant Governor in 1986. Ms. Mitchell also serves on the Board of Directors for a number of organizations, including the Bradley Foundation, the National Rifle Association, and the American Conservative Union Foundation. Recently, she has been a leading voice in training young conservatives to win elections and educating millions on the importance of voter integrity laws across the country. She holds a Bachelor's degree as well as a JD from the University of Oklahoma.

Commissioner Don Palmer: Donald Palmer has served on the U.S Election Assistance Commission since his appointment by President Trump and subsequent confirmation by unanimous consent in 2019. Previously, he was a fellow at the Bipartisan Policy Center, where he advanced the recommendations of the Presidential Commission on Election Administration to resolve the voting technology crisis, find ways to reduce lines of voters, and improve the voting experience. From 2011-2015, Palmer served as Virginia's Chief Election Official, during which time he implemented an online voter registration system and founded a nonprofit organization dedicated to increasing the accuracy of America's voter rolls and access to voter registration. Prior to all of this, he served in the U.S military for 20 years as an intelligence officer and judge advocate general. He holds a Master's degree from George Mason University and a JD from Stetson University.

Jason Snead: Jason Snead is the Executive Director of the Honest Elections Project, a nonprofit nonpartisan organization dedicated to ensuring that every lawful voter can participate in free and fair elections. Previously, he worked as a senior analyst at the Heritage Foundation, where he managed the development of the Heritage Election Fraud Database, a tool that aggregates instances of voter fraud from across the country. Jason holds a Bachelor's degree from Bowling Green University and a Master's in Public Policy from George Mason University.

Hans von Spakovsky: Hans von Spakovsky is the Senior Legal Fellow in the Meese Center for Legal and Judicial Studies, as well as the current manager of the Election Law Reform Initiative at the Heritage Foundation. He extensively studies issues in election law, such as voter ID, voter fraud, enforcement of federal legislation, and voting equipment standards. In 2017, then-President Donald Trump appointed Mr. von Spakovsky to the Presidential Advisory Commission on Election Integrity. He also has a great deal of experience working in governmental positions related to election administration, having served as a member of the Federal Elections Commission (FEC), counsel within the Department of

Justice, and the Board of Elections in both Fulton County, GA, and Fairfax County, VA. Mr. von Spakovsky holds a Bachelor's degree from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and a JD from Vanderbilt University.

Michael Thielen: Michael Thielen has served as the Executive Director of the Republican National Lawyers Association (RNLA) since 2000, through which he presents regularly on election administration and judicial confirmation. Since 2001, Mr. Thielen has been a preeminent voice exposing the actions of members of Congress who obstruct the confirmation of qualified appellate judges based solely on the president who appointed them. Previously, Mr. Thielen worked for the Republican National Committee (RNC) from 1994 to 1996, before transitioning to work directly for Congressional, Attorney General, and House of Delegates candidates in Virginia. He obtained his Bachelor's from the University of California Los Angeles and his JD from Pepperdine School of Law.

Jason Torchinsky: Jason Torchinsky is a partner at Holtzman Vogel Josefiak Torchinsky PLLC, where he specializes in campaign finance law, election law, lobbying disclosure, and issue advocacy groups. He has been named by Politico as one of "50 Politicos to Watch" and by Campaigns and Elections Magazine as a "Rising Star of Politics." As an attorney, he has represented clients in numerous litigation matters in Louisiana and Maryland involving redistricting maps, as well as representing clients in litigation matters before the Nevada Supreme Court. In various Virginia Circuit Courts, he has represented Virginia candidates in recounts and voter registration challenges. Mr. Torchinsky served as Deputy General Counsel on the Bush campaign in 2004, as well as Deputy General Counsel to the 2005 Presidential Inaugural Committee. He holds a Bachelor's degree from the College of William & Mary and a JD from the William & Mary School of Law.

Scott Walter: Scott Walter serves as the president of the Capital Research Center, an investigative think tank dedicated to gaining insight into how foundations, charities, and other nonprofits spend money in politics and political advocacy. Previously, he served as Special Assistant to the President for Domestic Policy in the George W. Bush administration. He was also Vice President of Publications and Research at the Philanthropy Roundtable, where he edited the Philanthropy Magazine and produced donor guidebooks on public policy research, school choice, and assistance to the poor. Mr. Walter previously served as a Senior Fellow at the Becket Fund for Religious Liberty and as senior editor of the American Enterprise Institute's flagship publication. He holds a Bachelor's degree from Georgetown University.

Secretary of State Mac Warner: Secretary Andrew "Mac" Warner is the 30th and current West Virginia Secretary of State, having been elected to the position in November of 2016 when he unseated the office's 8-year incumbent. Prior to his election, Secretary Warner served in the U.S Army JAG Corps before retiring and becoming a United States Department of State contractor. Since taking office, Secretary Warner has worked hard to educate voters and Congress on the dangers of the For the People Act (Congress' HR 1 / S 1), a federal bill that constitutes a federal takeover of election procedures. He holds a Bachelor's degree from the United States Military Academy, a JD from West Virginia University and an LLM from the University of Virginia.

- **1864 Absentee** **1900s – expanded to civilians w/ “state-approved excuse”**
- **1868-70 Naturalized Citizens & Universal Male Suffrage (14th & 15th A)**
 - **Reconstruction: “Grandfather” – if grandfather could vote, so can you**
- **1884 Secret Ballot vs Open Voting**
 - **1890 – 1908 Jim Crow: Poll Taxes, Literacy Tests, Length of Residency, At-Large Voting**
- **1915 Grandfather Clauses Start Getting Struck Down (NAACP cases)**

- Ignore rules & don't count proper votes -Harpers Ferry

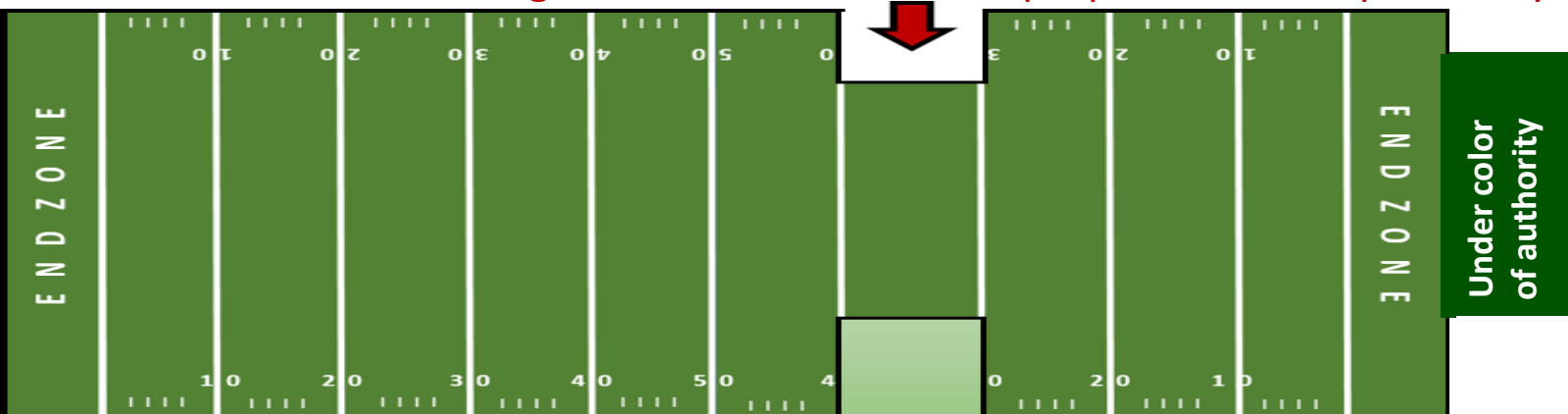
Got counted, but legal?

Irregularities

- "2nd look Commission"
 - *Validity adjudicated outside law*
- Ballots cured after the fact
- Absentee applications sent w/o request
- Extending polling hours
- Drop boxes w/o Legis approval
- Election date moved

Improprieties

- Mail ballots to everyone
- "Assume valid" – w/o signature/address
- Mail-ins submitted w/o envelopes
- Arrive late (3-days after election)
- Accepting w/o ID (when ID required)
- Harvesting more than allowed
- Accepting voters in wrong precinct



Valid, but delivery outside law

- Vote was paid for
- Delivered to unsecure / improper drop box
- Harvested in excess of state law
- Collected by unauthorized person
- Delivered by person paid in excess of permissible amount

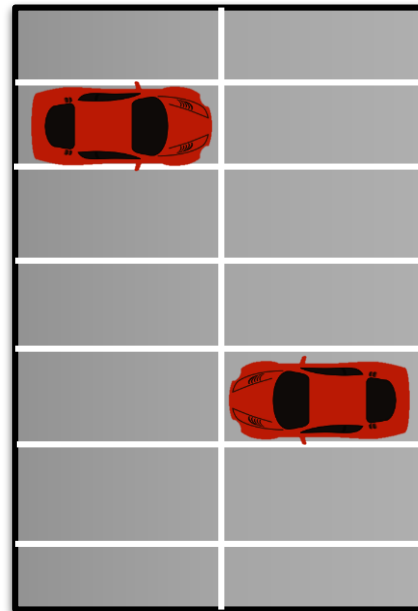
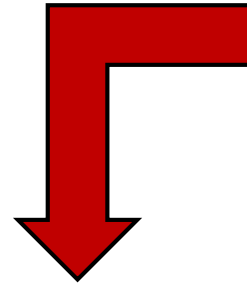
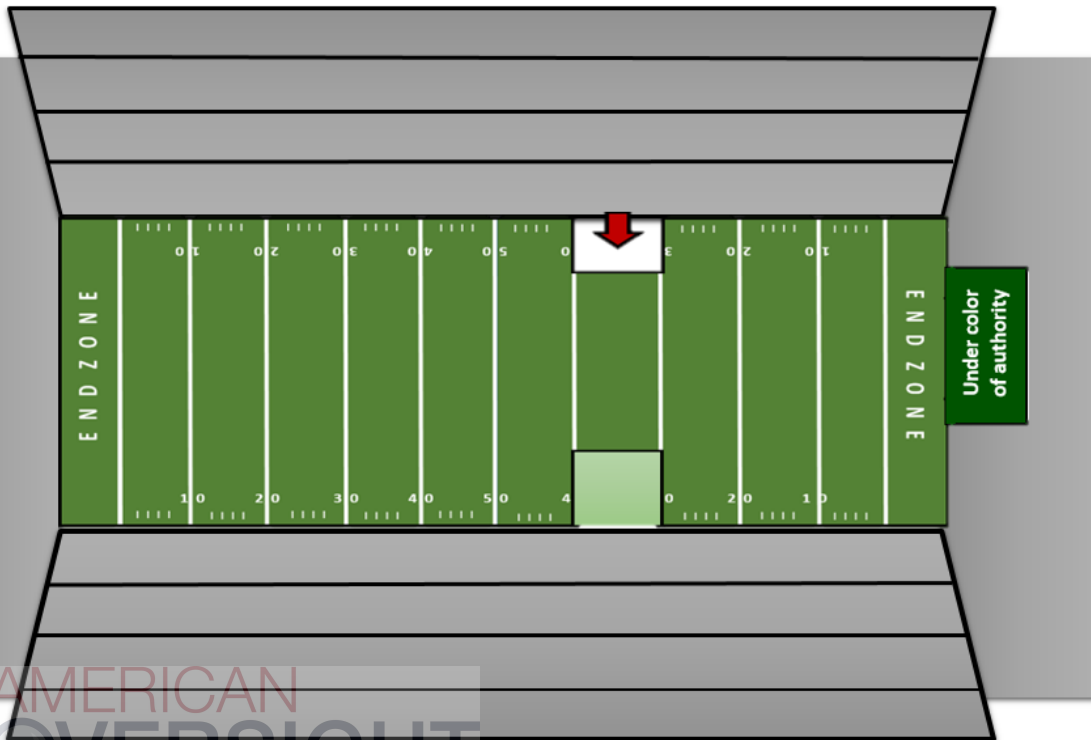

Questionable ballots/process

- Counting “stopped”
- Suitcases of ballots delivered or appear, then counting resumes
- Only one race is marked on multiple ballots
- Ovals are perfectly filled in
- Counted when legal observers not permitted to witness
- Backdating machines prior to audit

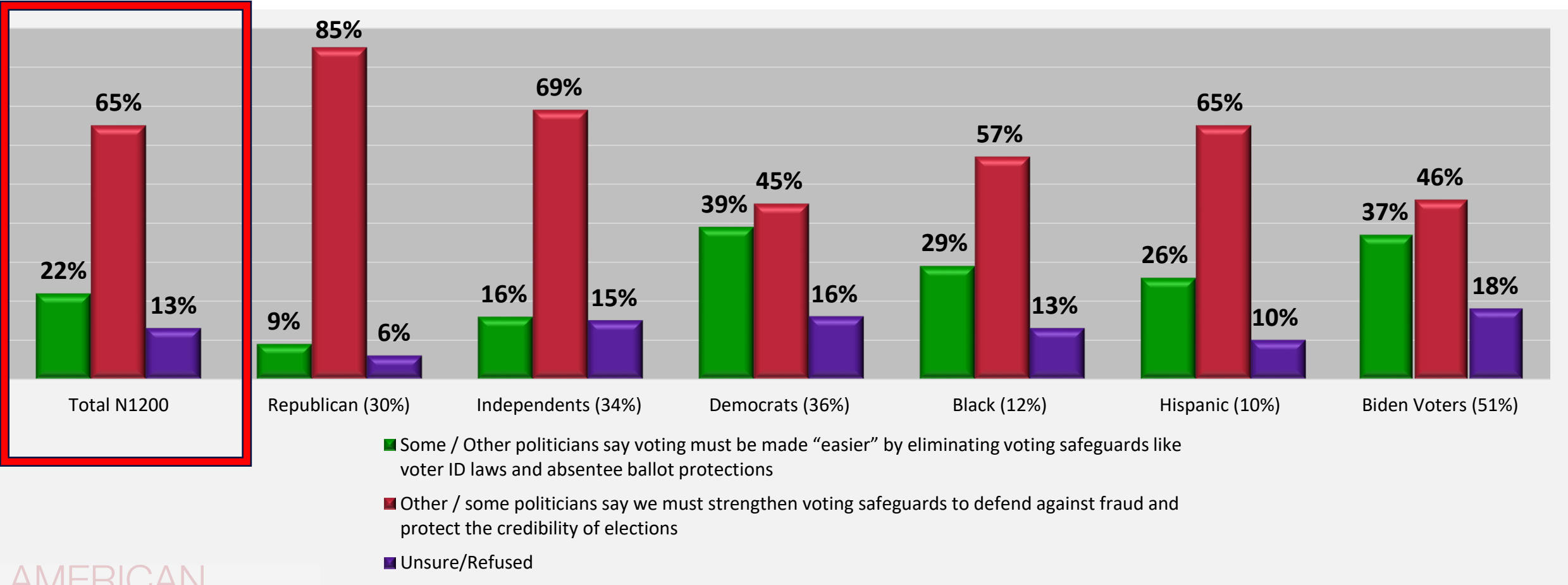

Margin of Error \pm 2.83%

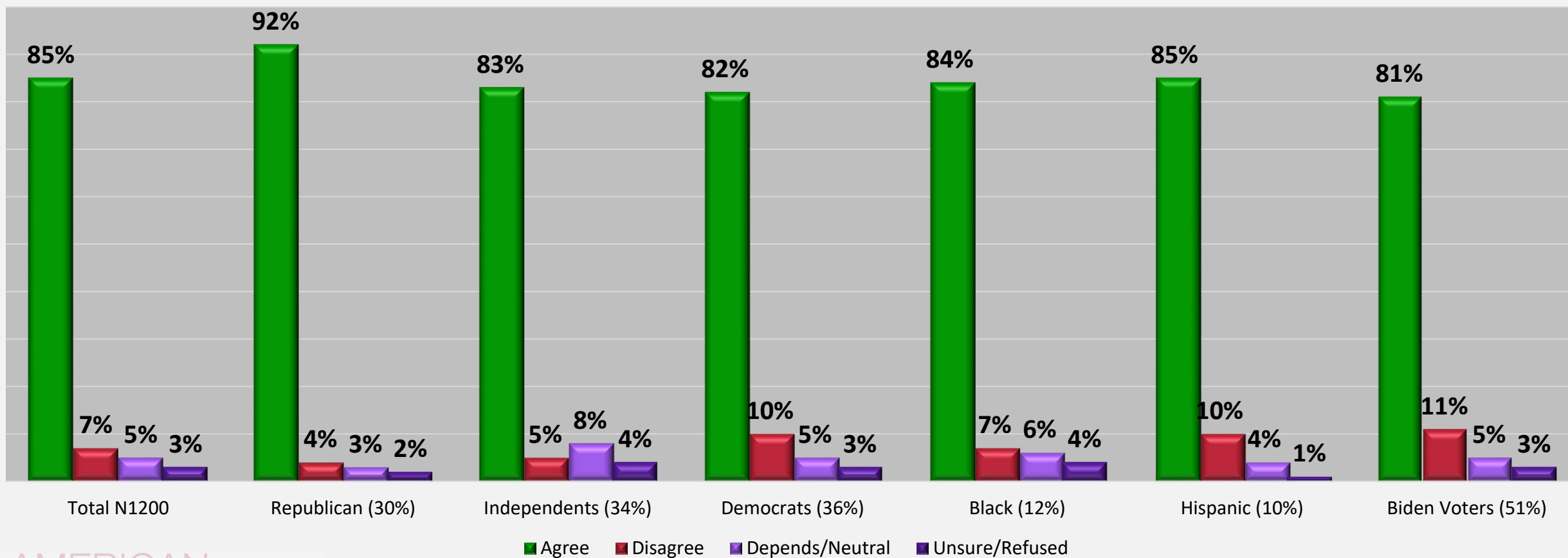
Methodology

- Online survey among 1,200 registered voters nationwide conducted July 8 – 17, 2021 by CRC Research. Respondents were selected randomly from opt-in panel participants. Sampling controls were used to ensure that a proportional and representative number of respondents were interviewed from such demographic groups as age, gender, race, and geographic region.
 - Gender breakdown: 48% men – 52% women
- This survey includes oversamples of both 1200 Independents and Republicans nationwide
- $\pm 2.83\%$ overall margin of error at the 95% confidence interval for overall survey. M.O.E.s for subgroups are larger.

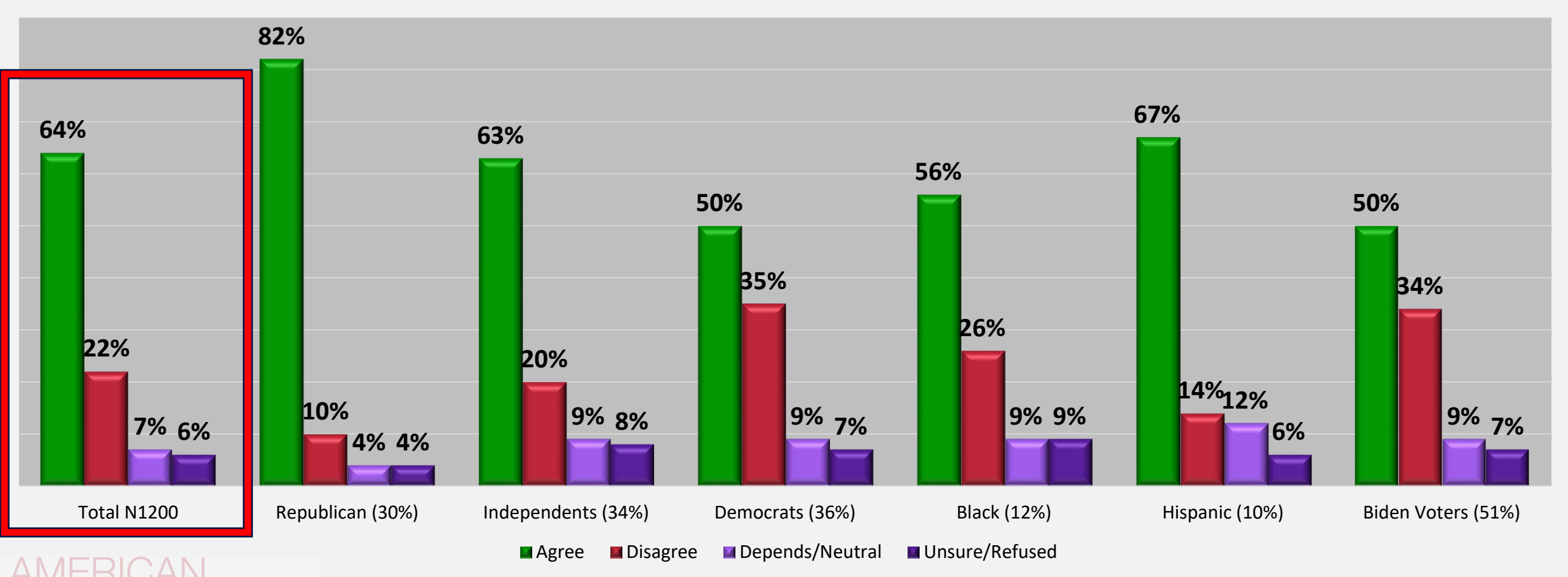

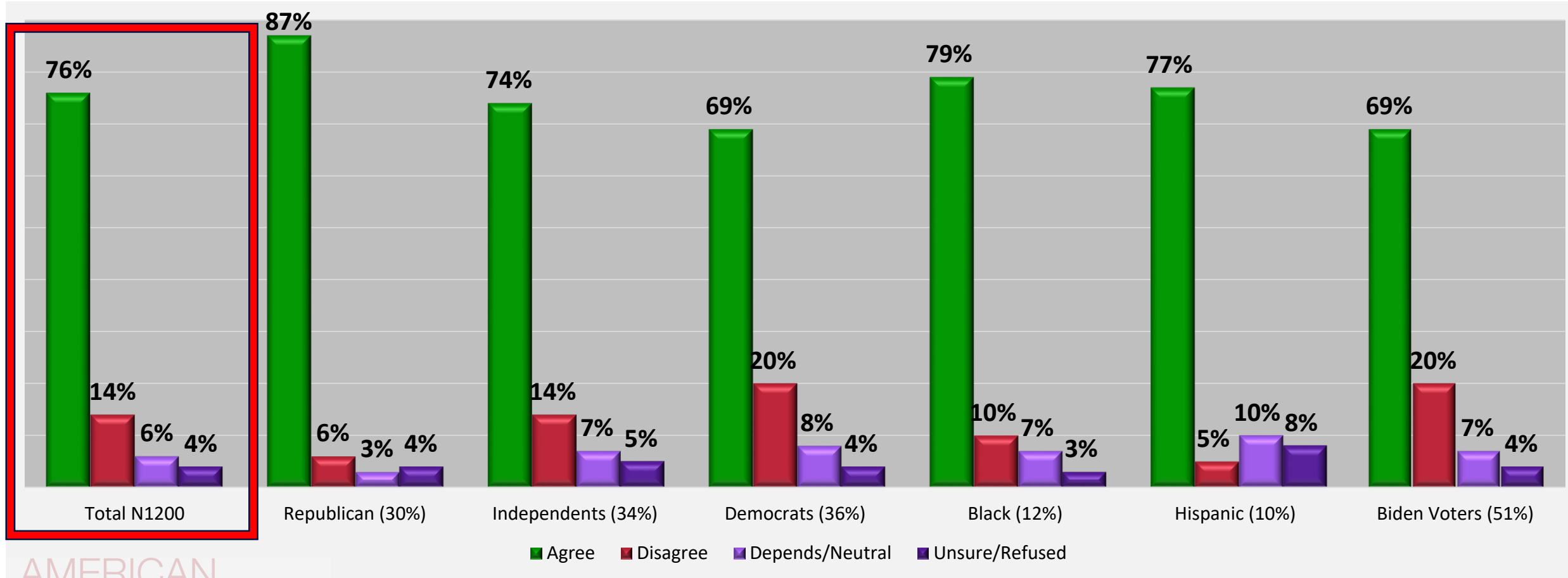
Protecting the right to vote is about more than casting ballots, it is about protecting a fair and honest election system that ensures every lawful ballot is counted, and guards against voter fraud.



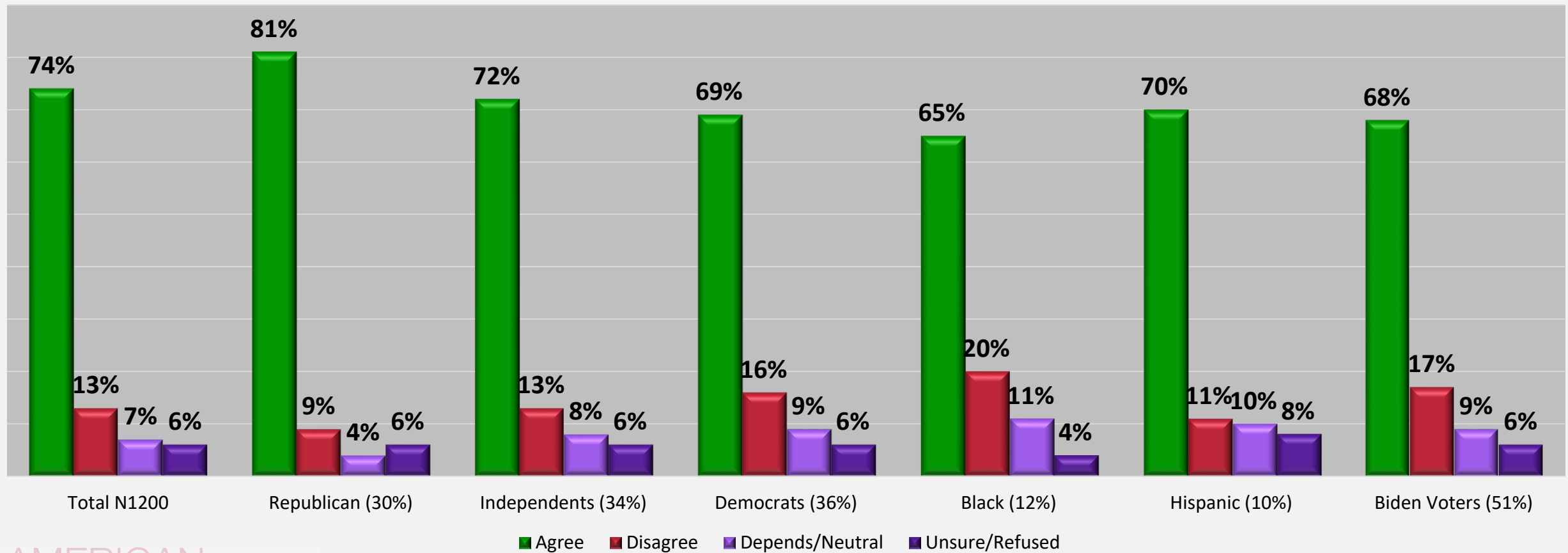

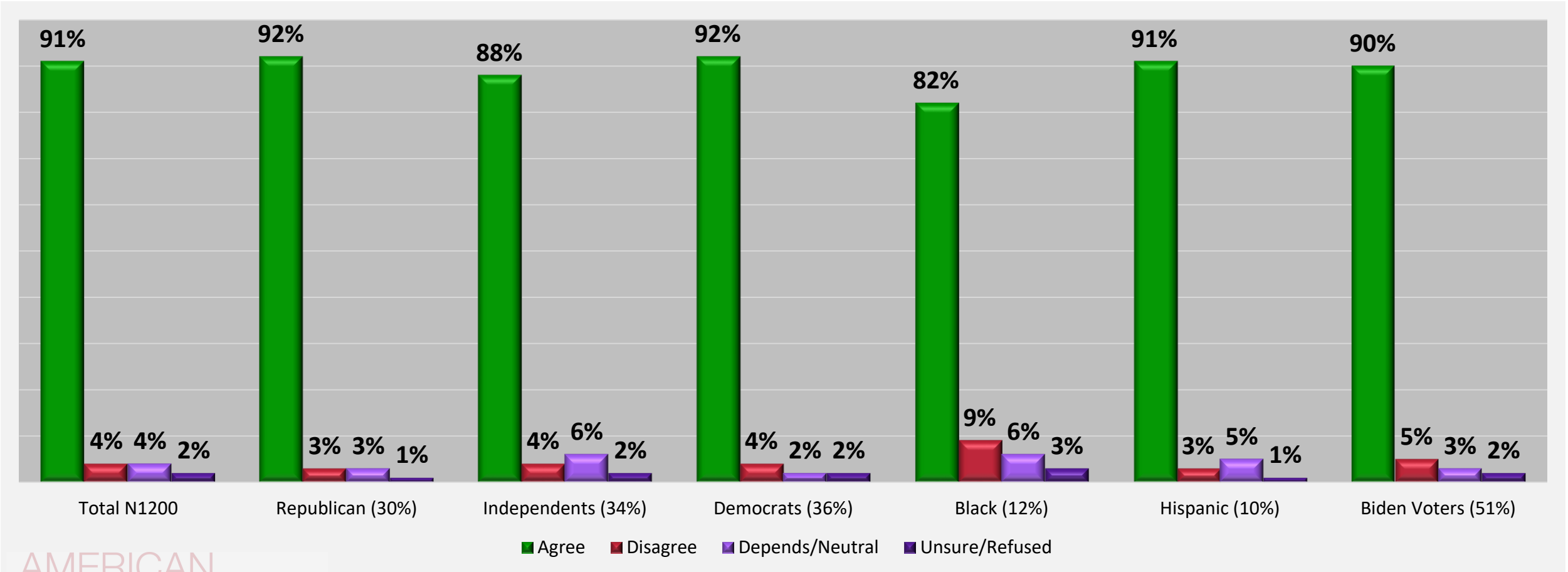

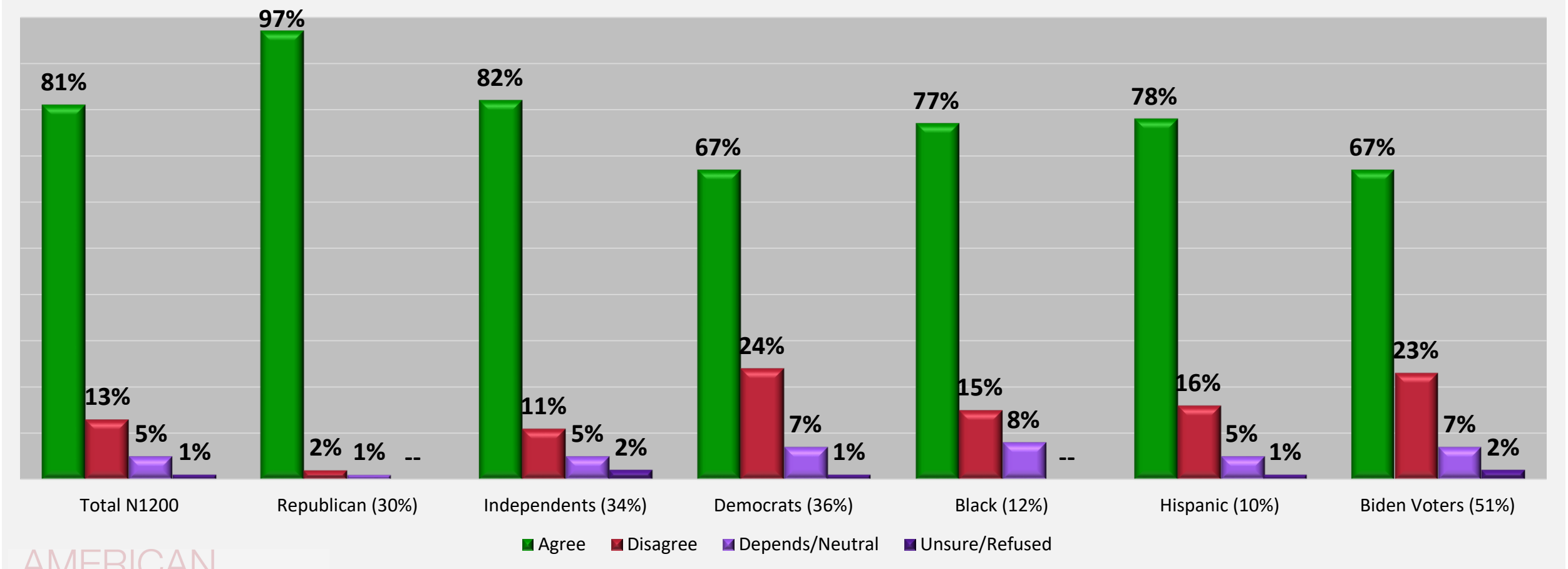
Strong safeguards and ballot protections inspire confidence by making it harder to hide fraud, and easier to dispel false allegations of fraud.



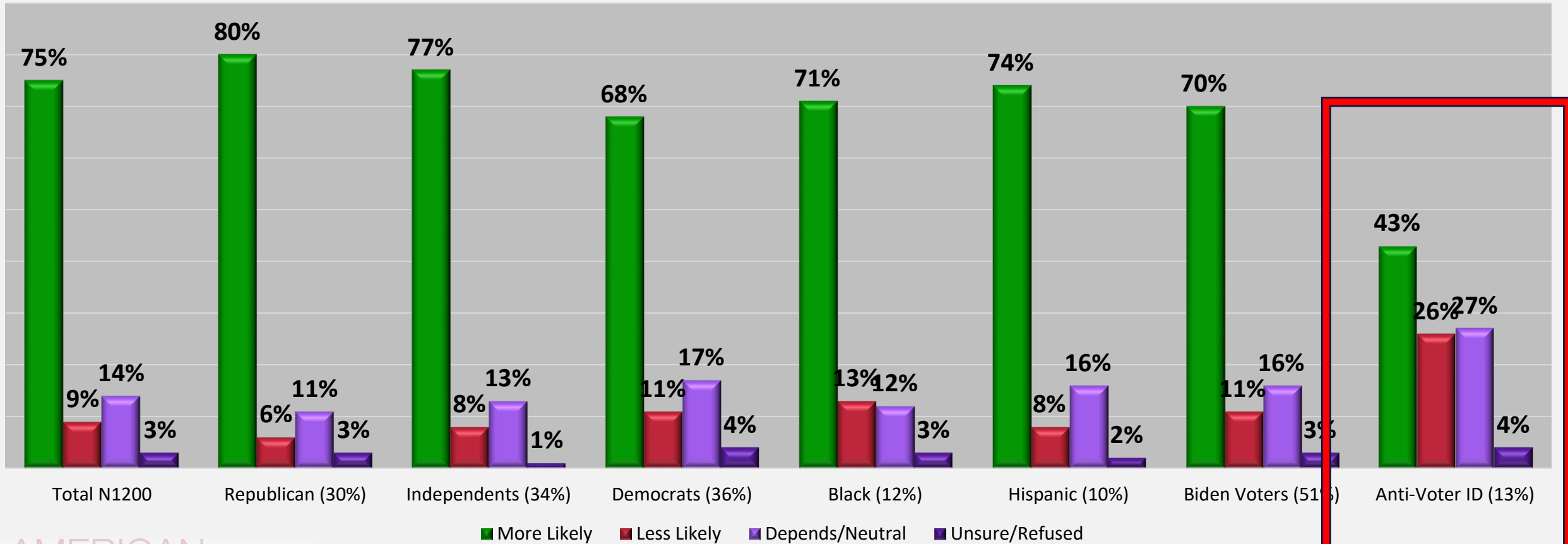

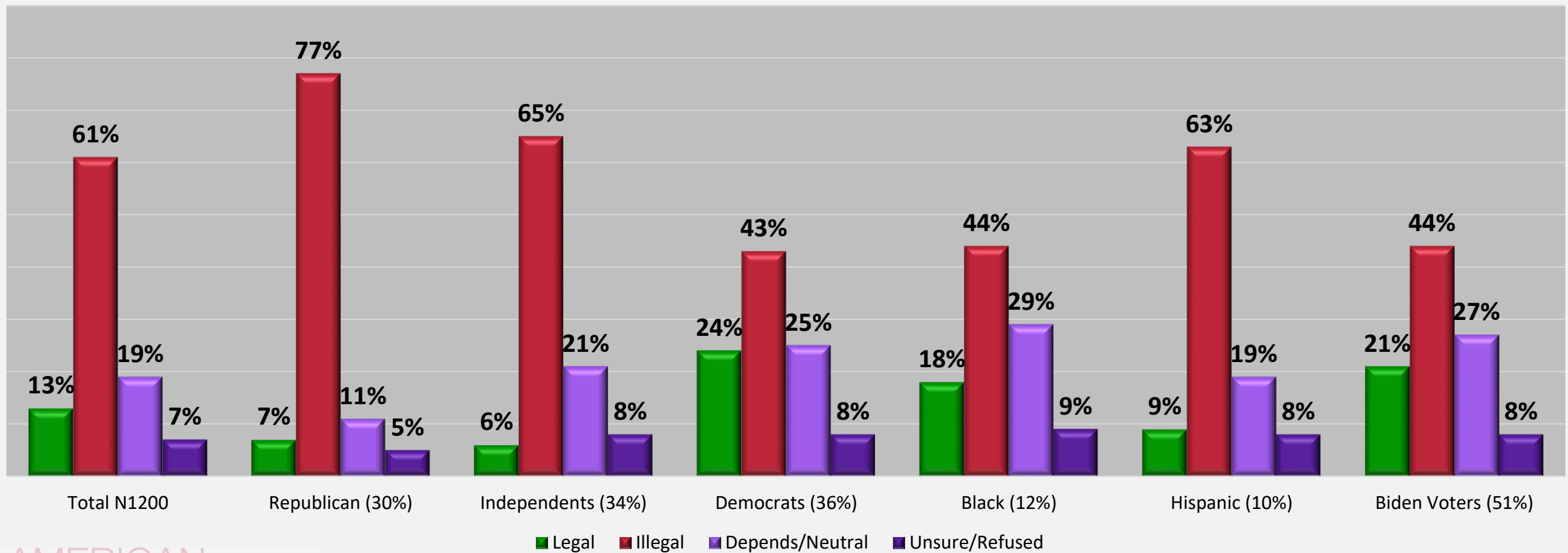

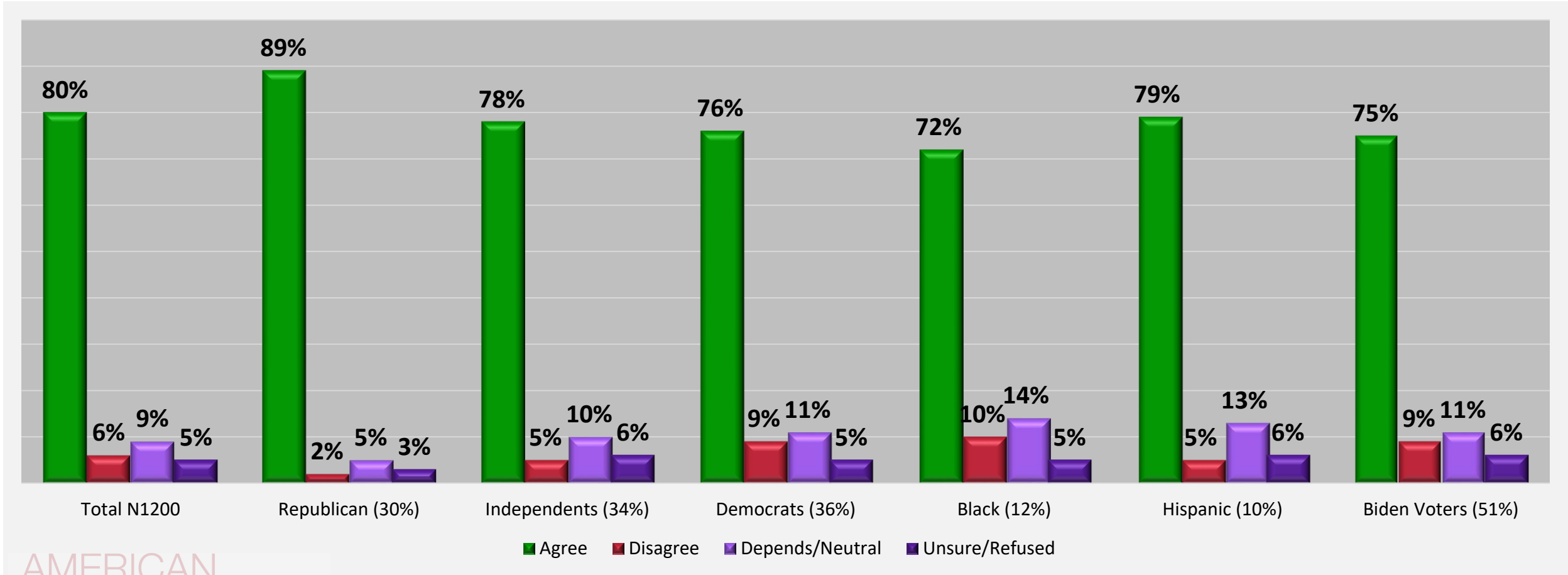

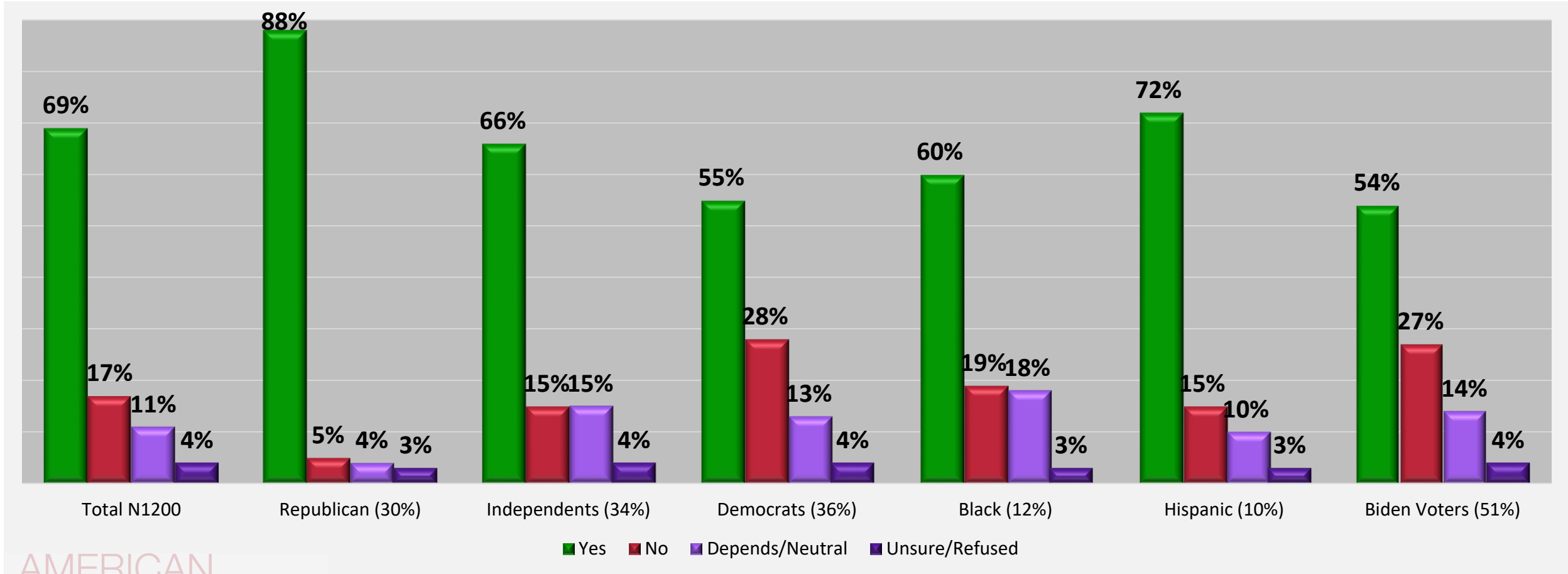

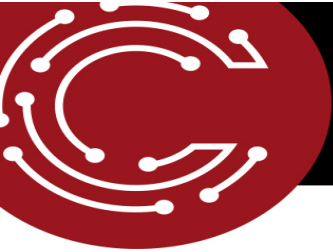
