And even after that situation, he then went and hit 16 17 another patrol car, and then again, took off from that car. 18 So, during the chase, I, I was thinking, like 19 I mean, this was in my head like he was, "I'm only 20 trying to stop you to really talk to you first. And 21 22 I don't even know for sure if you've done anything. So, I just want to, but you're obviously running 23 from me for a reason." I mean, I don't know what's 24 going on. 25





Before we 21 clear the O'Farrell intersection, uh, Officer 22 Pfeifer brings the car up and kind of stops, so we 23 can take a look down. It's a short little block, 24 the 1500 block of O'Farrell. Uh, it kind of ends 25 into buildings, but it has a little side street. 26

I'm in the passenger seat. I'm able to look down 2 O'Farrell, and four cars in, I see Recruit Officer Reininger. Uh, he's got his gun drawn, he's 3 pointing. I can't tell if he's pointing at a car or at a person. Officer Pfeifer makes the right-hand turn, 7 stops the car on the north side of the street. I jump out of the passenger side, draw my firearm. I'm approaching Officer Reininger, just to see if he's got the guy proned out on the ground or if he 10 has the suspect in the car. I was a good probably 11 seven to ten feet in front of our patrol car, and 12 I'm probably still 15 feet away from Recruit 13 14 Officer Reininger, I hear the engine on the white rive commands for 15 the driver to stop the car and turn off the car. 16 Uh, the white car then starts to come to the left, 17 uh, towards me. It accelerates and hits the back of a black Chevy Suburban, and at that time, I'm wide out, I'm completely out in the open, I've got 20 nowhere to go. 21 22 So, I start to backpedal. I take about five to seven steps backwards. I look to my right, and my 23 closest cover is to run backwards, so I turn. I run 24 back about another ten feet and try to get cover 25 behind a parked white vehicle. As I'm running 26

backwards, and I get to the back portion of that white car, I hear two shots go off. I'm unable to turn back around, I'm on like the passenger side of 3 the white car that's parked on the south side of the street now. As I get to that point, I look back. 7 I see the white vehicle traveling west, past our patrol car. As it gets past our patrol car, it's getting ready to make a left-hand turn onto 9 southbound Webster, and as it does that, Officer 10 Sharron and Buhagiar in the black and white SUV, 11 are making the right-hand turn onto O'Farrell. They 12 meet pretty much, uh, driver side headlight to 13 passenger side headlight, at probably 40 miles an 14 15 goes across the three lanes of traffic and ends up against the concrete median.
