AN ACT making appropriations for the support of government

AID TO LOCALITIES BUDGET

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

1 Section 1. a) The several amounts specified in this chapter for aid to
2 localities, or so much thereof as shall be sufficient to accomplish the
3 purposes designated by the appropriations, are hereby appropriated and
4 authorized to be paid as hereinafter provided, to the respective public
5 officers and for the several purposes specified.

6 b) Where applicable, appropriations made by this chapter for expendi-
7 tures from federal grants for aid to localities may be allocated for
8 spending from federal grants for any grant period beginning, during, or
9 prior to, the state fiscal year beginning on April 1, 2022 except as
10 otherwise noted.

11 c) The several amounts named herein, or so much thereof as shall be
12 sufficient to accomplish the purpose designated, being the undisbursed
13 and/or unexpended balances of the prior year's appropriations, are here-
14 by reappropriated from the same funds and made available for the same
15 purposes as the prior year's appropriations, unless herein amended, for
16 the fiscal year beginning April 1, 2022. Certain reappropriations in
17 this chapter are shown using abbreviated text, with three leader dots
18 (an ellipsis) followed by three spaces (...) used to indicate where
19 existing law that is being continued is not shown. However, unless a
20 change is clearly indicated by the use of brackets [] for deletions and
21 underscores for additions, the purposes, amounts, funding source and all
22 other aspects pertinent to each item of appropriation shall be as last
23 appropriated.

24 For the purpose of complying with the state finance law, the year,
25 chapter and section of the last act reappropriating a former original
26 appropriation or any part thereof is, unless otherwise indicated, chap-
27 ter 53, section 1, of the laws of 2021.

28 d) No moneys appropriated by this chapter shall be available for
29 payment until a certificate of approval has been issued by the director
30 of the budget, who shall file such certificate with the department of
31 audit and control, the chairperson of the senate finance committee and
32 the chairperson of the assembly ways and means committee.

33 e) Notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, for purposes
34 of any appropriation made by this chapter which authorizes spending in
35 an amount net of refunds, rebates, reimbursements, credits, repayments,
36 and/or disallowances, "refunds" shall mean funds received to the state
37 resulting from the overpayment of monies, "rebates" shall mean funds

1 received to the state resulting from a return of a full or partial
2 amount previously paid, as for goods or services, serving as a
3 reduction, discount or rebate to the original payment amount,
4 "reimbursements" shall mean funds received to the state as repayment in
5 an equivalent amount for goods or services, including but not limited to
6 personal service costs, incurred by the state in the first instance
7 being provided to a third party for their benefit and partially or in
8 full financed by such third party, "credit" shall mean monies made
9 available to the state that reduce the amount owed to a third party,
10 including but not limited to billing errors, rebates, and prior overpay-
11 ments, "repayment" shall mean the return of monies as pay back for
12 expenses incurred, and "disallowance" shall mean monies made available
13 to the state that were not allowed or accepted officially by the
14 intended recipient, based on a determination the payment is not accepta-
15 ble and/or valid. When the office of the state comptroller receives any
16 such refunds, rebates, reimbursements, credits, repayments, and/or
17 disallowances, he or she shall credit the refunded, rebated, reimbursed,
18 credited, repaid, and disallowed amount back to the original appropri-
19 ation and reduce expenditures in the year which such credit is received
20 regardless of the timing of the initial expenditure.

21 f) Notwithstanding any other provision of law to the contrary, if the
22 state or any agency thereof incurs any costs associated with administer-
23 ing the rent regulation program in accordance with subdivision (c) of
24 section 8 of chapter 576 of the laws of 1974, as amended, for a city
25 having a population of one million or more, the director of the budget
26 may direct any other state agency or agencies making payments to such
27 city, or any department, agency, or instrumentality thereof, to perma-
28 nently reduce the amount of any other payment or payments owed to such
29 city or any department, agency, or instrumentality thereof pursuant to
30 any appropriation set forth in this chapter. Provided however, that such
31 reduction shall be in an amount equal to the costs incurred by the state
32 or agency thereof in accordance with subdivision (c) of section 8 of
33 chapter 576 of the laws of 1974 and provided further that such direction
34 shall be made in writing by the director of the budget. If the director
35 of the budget makes such direction pursuant to the authority set forth
36 herein, the impacted city shall not make the payments required by subdivi-
37 sion (c) of section 8 of chapter 576 of the laws of 1974, as amended,
38 and the division of housing and community renewal shall notify such city
39 in writing of what payment or payments will be reduced and the amount of
40 such reduction. To the extent a city of one million or more or any
41 department, agency, or instrumentality thereof is entitled to any cash
42 disbursement authorized by any appropriation contained in this chapter,
43 such entitlement shall be reduced commensurate with reductions in
44 payments made in accordance with this part.

45 g) Notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, upon enact-
46 ment of this chapter of the laws of 2022 containing the aid to locali-
47 ties budget bill for the state fiscal year 2022-2023, all appropriations
48 and reappropriations contained in chapter 53 of the laws of 2021, which
49 would otherwise lapse by operation of law on March 31, 2023 are hereby
50 repealed.

51 h) The appropriations contained in this chapter shall be available for
52 the fiscal year beginning on April 1, 2022 except as otherwise noted.

41 herein shall not be available for tuition
42 expenditures for foster children, includ-
43 ing persons in need of supervision and
44 adjudicated juvenile delinquents, made by
45 a social services district located within
46 a city having a population of one million
47 or more.

48 Notwithstanding any other provision of law,
49 a portion of the funds are available to
50 reimburse social services districts for
51 the change in the maximum state aid rates
52 established by the office of children and
53 family services for the 2022-23 rate year
54 pursuant to section 398-a of the social
55 services law and sections 4003 and 4405 of
56 the education law to reflect the continua-
57 tion of the cost of living adjustments
58 that became effective April 1, 2008 for
59 payments made to foster parents and for
60 salary and fringe benefit costs and other
61 critical nonpersonal services costs for

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1 foster care programs as determined by the
2 office. Social services districts must
3 adjust the amount of payments made for
4 care provided by congregate care and
5 foster boarding home programs and to
6 foster parents to reflect the cost of
7 living adjustments in the manner specified
8 by the office. Each authorized agency
9 operating a congregate care or foster
10 boarding home program in New York state
11 for which the office sets a maximum state
12 aid rate pursuant to section 398-a of the
13 social services law or section 4003 or
14 4405 of the education law shall submit, at
15 the time and in a manner to be determined
16 by the office, a written certification,
17 attesting that the funds received for the
18 continuation of the cost of living adjust-
19 ment to the maximum state aid rate that
20 became effective April 1, 2008 for that
21 program will be or were used solely in
22 accordance with the requirements of the
23 cost of living adjustment established by
24 the office.

25 Notwithstanding any inconsistent provision
26 of law except a chapter of the laws of
27 2022 authorizing a 5.4 percent cost of
28 living adjustment increase for the period
29 commencing on April 1, 2022 and ending
30 March 31, 2023, the commissioner shall not
31 apply any other cost of living adjustment
32 for the purpose of establishing rates of
33 payments, contracts or any other form of
34 reimbursement.

35 Within the amounts appropriated herein,
36 state reimbursement to each social
37 services district for services identified
38 herein that are otherwise reimbursable by
39 the state from April 1, 2022 through March
40 31, 2023 shall be limited to a district
41 allocation, hereinafter referred to as the
42 district's block grant allocation.
43 Notwithstanding any other provision of
44 law, such block grant allocation shall be
45 based, in part, on each district's claims
46 for such costs, adjusted by the applicable
47 cost allocation methodology and net of any
48 retroactive payments for the 12 month
49 period ending June 30, 2021 that are
50 submitted on or before January 3, 2022
51 and, in part, on such other factors as
52 determined by the office of children and
53 family services and approved by the direc-
54 tor of the budget. Any portion of a social
55 services district's allocation from funds
56 appropriated herein not claimed by such
57 district during the state fiscal year may
58 be used by such district for expenditures
59 on preventive services provided pursuant
60 to section 409-a of the social services
61 law, independent living services and

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1 aftercare services provided pursuant to
2 regulations of the department of family
3 assistance, claimed by such district
4 during the next state fiscal year up to
5 the amount remaining from the district's
6 foster care block grant allocation,
7 provided however, that any claims for such
8 services during the next state fiscal year
9 in excess of such amount shall be subject
10 to 62 percent state reimbursement exclu-
11 sive of any federal funds made available
12 for such purposes, in accordance with
13 directives of the department of family
14 assistance and subject to the approval of
15 the director of the budget. Any claims
16 submitted by a social services district
17 for reimbursement for a particular state
18 fiscal year for which the social services
19 district does not receive state or federal
20 reimbursement during that state fiscal
21 year may not be claimed against that
22 district's block grant apportionment for
23 the next state fiscal year.

24 The office of children and family services,
25 with the approval of the director of the
26 budget, may reduce a district's block
27 grant allocation by the state share
28 decrease related to federal retroactive
29 reimbursement for such foster care
30 services identified herein. The office,
31 with the approval of the director of the
32 budget, may reduce a district's block
33 grant allocation by the state share of
34 disallowances or sanctions taken against
35 the district pursuant to the social
36 services law or federal law.

37 Notwithstanding any other provision of law,
38 the state shall not be responsible for
39 reimbursing a social services district and
40 a district shall not seek state reimburse-
41 ment for any portion of any state disal-
42 lowance or sanction taken against the
43 social services district, or any federal
44 disallowance attributable to final federal
45 agency decisions or to settlement made, on
46 or after July 1, 1995, when such disallow-
47 ance or sanction results from the failure
48 of the social services district to comply
49 with federal or state requirements,
50 including, but not limited to, failure to
51 document eligibility for federal or state
52 funds in the case record; provided, howev-
53 er, if the office determines that any
54 federal disallowance for services provided
55 between January 1, 1999 and May 31, 1999
56 results solely from the late enactment of
57 the state legislation implementing the
58 federal adoption and safe families act,
59 the state shall be solely responsible for
60 the full amount of the disallowance or
61 sanction; provided, further, however, this

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1 provision shall be deemed to apply both
2 prospectively and retroactively regardless
3 of whether such sanctions or disallowances
4 are for services provided or claims made
5 prior to or after April 1, 2022.

6 Notwithstanding any other provision of law,
7 any federal disallowance resulting from a
8 federal title IV-E eligibility review or
9 audit that uses extrapolated statistic
10 techniques shall be passed along by the
11 state to any and all social services
12 districts that the office of children and
13 family services has determined have not
14 complied with the title IV-E eligibility
15 requirements or have not taken the neces-
16 sary actions to ensure compliance with
17 such requirements including, but not
18 limited to, failing to: assess and fully
19 document all the criteria and have readily
20 available all the necessary documents to
21 establish and continue title IV-E eligi-
22 bility for all title IV-E eligible chil-
23 dren within the required time frames;
24 claim title IV-E funding only for cases
25 that meet all of the title IV-E eligibil-
26 ity criteria; and fully implement the
27 social services payment system on or
28 before April 1, 2005 for all direct and
29 voluntary agency foster care services.

30 Notwithstanding any law to the contrary, the
31 office of children and family services
32 shall impose on social services districts
33 any federal disallowance issued against
34 the state as a result of a federal title
35 IV-E secondary eligibility review regard-
36 less of the date the children may have
37 entered foster care, the date the eligi-
38 bility or payment errors occurred, or the
39 filing date of any federal claims for
40 reimbursement; provided, however, that the
41 state shall be responsible for the disal-
42 lowed costs and expenditures related to
43 the placement of children in a facility
44 operated by the office of children and
45 family services, which shall be determined
46 in the same manner as the disallowed costs
47 and expenditures for social services
48 districts other than the city of New York.
49 In order to reimburse the federal govern-
50 ment for the full amount of any disallow-
51 ance imposed on the state by the federal
52 administration for children and families
53 within the timeframes necessary to avoid
54 any potential interest payments on such
55 amount, the office of children and family
56 services is authorized to immediately
57 offset funds otherwise due to each
58 district for a pro rata share of the total
59 disallowed costs based on the percentage
60 of applicable federal title IV-E claims
61 made by that district for the relevant

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1 time period as compared to the total
2 applicable statewide title IV-E claims.
3 The amount of the offset against each
4 district will be adjusted, if necessary,
5 upon completion of the disallowance allo-
6 cation process. The final allocation of
7 the amount of any federal disallowance
8 resulting from a title IV-E secondary
9 eligibility review shall be allocated
10 among the districts so that each district
11 shall be responsible for the amount
12 attributable to each of the district's
13 children or cases that are determined by
14 the federal review to be unallowable. Each
15 district shall also be responsible for a
16 portion of the federal extrapolated disal-
17 lowance amount based on the relative error
18 rate for the district. The city of New
19 York's error rate will be based on the
20 federal sample and federal statistics. For
21 all social services districts other than
22 the city of New York, the error rate will
23 be based on a review conducted by the
24 district of a sample of children and/or
25 cases determined by the office of children
26 and family services and a re-review of a
27 sub-sample by the office of those children
28 and/or cases determined by the office. The
29 office of children and family services
30 will determine what is reasonable in
31 establishing the size of the sample and
32 sub-sample for each district. The office
33 of children and family services shall
34 notify each social services district of
35 the sample of children and/or cases from
36 the federal audit period that the social
37 services district must review. Any child
38 or case from the social services district
39 that was included in the federal sample
40 will automatically be included in the
41 social services district's review sample
42 and the determination made at the federal
43 review regarding that child or case will
44 govern for the purposes of the social
45 services district's review. The social
46 services district must complete and submit
47 the results of its review to the office of
48 children and family services within 60
49 days of receipt of the sample. The error
50 rate for the district will be based on the
51 findings of the district's review and the
52 office of children and family services'
53 re-review. If a social services district
54 does not complete its review within 60
55 days of receiving the sample from the
56 office of children and family services,
57 the office of children and family services
58 shall assign an error rate to the social
59 services district based on the relative
60 percentage of the district's applicable
61 title IV-E claims for the relevant period

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1 as compared to applicable statewide title
2 IV-E claims for that period and other
3 circumstances that the office of children
4 and family services may consider in order
5 to allocate 100 percent of the federal
6 disallowance. The office of children and
7 family services shall apply each social
8 services district's error rate to the
9 total amount of the district's applicable
10 title IV-E claims including associated
11 administrative expenses. The resulting
12 dollar amounts for all of the social
13 services districts will be summed to
14 derive the total amount of title IV-E
15 claims deemed to be in error statewide. To
16 establish a disallowance percentage for
17 each social services district, the amount
18 of the district's title IV-E claims deemed
19 to be in error will be divided by the
20 amount of statewide title IV-E claims
21 deemed to be in error. The resulting
22 disallowance percentage for each district
23 will be applied to the entire title IV-E
24 extrapolated disallowance calculated by
25 the federal review to determine the amount
26 of the extrapolated disallowance for which
27 the district is responsible. Each district
28 will be credited for the amount already
29 disallowed for any individual children or
30 cases found to be in error during the
31 federal review. The exclusive appeal
32 rights for the review of the amount of the
33 federal disallowance assigned to each
34 social services district shall be pursuant
35 to article 78 of the civil practice law
36 and rules; provided, however, that in any
37 such action all of the social services
38 districts shall be joined as necessary
39 parties and the venue of any such action
40 shall be in Rensselaer county. Any social
41 services district that fails to complete
42 its sample review in the required time
43 frames shall have no right to appeal and
44 shall not be a necessary party to any
45 action brought by another social services
46 district.

47 The money hereby appropriated is to be
48 available for payment of state aid hereto-
49 fore accrued or hereafter to accrue to
50 municipalities. Subject to the approval of
51 the director of the budget, such funds
52 shall be available to the office net of
53 disallowances, refunds, reimbursements,
54 and credits.

55 Notwithstanding any inconsistent provision
56 of law, the amount herein appropriated may
57 be transferred to any other appropriation
58 within the office of children and family
59 services and/or the office of temporary
60 and disability assistance and/or suballo-
61 cated to the office of temporary and disa-

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1 bility assistance for the purpose of
2 paying local social services districts'
3 costs of the above program and may be
4 increased or decreased by interchange with
5 any other appropriation or with any other
6 item or items within the amounts appropri-
7 ated within the office of children and
8 family services general fund - local
9 assistance account with the approval of
10 the director of the budget who shall file
11 such approval with the department of audit
12 and control and copies thereof with the
13 chairman of the senate finance committee
14 and the chairman of the assembly ways and
15 means committee.

16 Notwithstanding any inconsistent provision
17 of law, in lieu of payments authorized by
18 the social services law, or payments of
19 federal funds otherwise due to the local
20 social services districts for programs
21 provided under the federal social security
22 act or the federal food stamp act, funds
23 herein appropriated, in amounts certified
24 by the state comptroller or the state
25 commissioner of health as due from local
26 social services districts each month as
27 their share of payments made pursuant to
28 section 367-b of the social services law
29 may be set aside by the state comptroller
30 in an interest bearing account with such
31 interest accruing to the credit of the
32 locality in order to ensure the orderly
33 and prompt payment of providers under
34 section 367-b of the social services law
35 pursuant to an estimate provided by the
36 commissioner of health of each local
37 social services district's share of
38 payments made pursuant to section 367-b of
39 the social services law.

40 Notwithstanding the provisions of any other
41 law to the contrary, the office of chil-
42 dren and family services may, on behalf of
43 social services districts, make payments
44 to foster boarding homes paid directly by
45 social services districts by direct depos-
46 it or debit card. Local social services
47 districts shall reimburse the office for
48 the costs of administering such direct
49 deposit or debit card payments.

50 Notwithstanding any inconsistent provision
51 of the social services law or the state
52 finance law, the office of children and
53 family services shall, on a quarterly
54 basis, request that the office of tempo-
55 rary and disability assistance reimburse
56 the office of children and family services
57 for the non-federal share of the costs of
58 administering such direct deposit or debit
59 card payments to capture the local share
60 of such costs.
61

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1 Notwithstanding any other provision of law
 2 to the contrary, amounts due and owing to
 3 a social services district under this
 4 appropriation, may be reduced up to such
 5 amounts due and owing to the state under
 6 section 529 of the executive law (13997).. 390,687,000
 7 Notwithstanding any inconsistent provision
 8 of law, the amount appropriated herein
 9 shall be made available to reimburse 62
 10 percent of eligible social services
 11 district expenditures that are claimed by
 12 March 31, 2023 for child welfare services
 13 which shall include and be limited to
 14 preventive services provided pursuant to
 15 section 409-a of the social services law
 16 other than community optional preventive
 17 services, child protective services, inde-
 18 pendent living services, after-care
 19 services as defined in regulations of the
 20 department of family assistance, and
 21 adoption administration and services,
 22 other than adoption subsidies provided
 23 pursuant to title 9 of article 6 of the
 24 social services law and regulations of the
 25 department of family assistance incurred
 26 on or after October 1, 2021 and before
 27 October 1, 2022 and that are otherwise
 28 reimbursable by the state on or after
 29 April 1, 2022, after first deducting ther-
 30 efrom any federal funds properly received
 31 or to be received on account thereof upon
 32 certification by the social services
 33 district that it will not be using these
 34 funds to supplant other state and local
 35 funds and that the district will not
 36 submit claims for reimbursement under this
 37 appropriation for the same type and level
 38 of services that the county previously
 39 provided and claimed under any contract in
 40 existence on October 1, 2002 as other than
 41 child protective, preventive, independent
 42 living, after care or adoption services or
 43 adoption administration.
 44 The money hereby appropriated is to be
 45 available for payment of state aid hereto-
 46 fore accrued or hereafter to accrue to
 47 municipalities. Subject to the approval of
 48 the director of the budget, such funds
 49 shall be available to the office net of
 50 disallowances, refunds, reimbursements,
 51 and credits; provided, however, that
 52 notwithstanding any other provision of
 53 law, for a district to receive reimburse-
 54 ment for such services, the amount of
 55 funds that the district expends on such
 56 services from its flexible fund for family
 57 services allocation and any flexible fund
 58 for family services funds transferred at
 59 the district's request to the title XX
 60 social services block grant must, to the
 61 extent that families are eligible there-

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1 fore, be equal to or greater than the

17 general fund - aid to localities appropri-

47 family services shall, on a quarterly
48 basis, request that the office of tempo-
49 rary and disability assistance reimburse
50 the office of children and family services
51 in an amount equal to 38 percent of the
52 non-federal share of the costs of adminis-
53 tering such direct deposit or debit card
54 payments to capture the local share of
55 such costs.

56 Notwithstanding any other provision of law,
57 the office of children and family services
58 shall reissue per diem rates, required
59 pursuant to section 529 of the executive
60 law, for calendar years 2002 through 2009
61 to remove any adjustments to the costs

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1 included in determining such rates to
2 reflect any changes in federal funding
3 made available to the office or to local
4 social services districts for such costs
5 and, provided further, the office shall
6 not include any such adjustments in per
7 diem rates established hereafter.

8 All reimbursement made by local social
9 services districts for care, maintenance
10 and supervision under this section shall
11 be paid directly to the state through the
12 office of children and family services for
13 deposit into a miscellaneous special
14 revenue fund known as the youth facility
15 per diem account.

16 Notwithstanding any other provision of law
17 to the contrary, amounts due and owing to
18 a social services district under this
19 appropriation, may be reduced up to such
20 amounts due and owing to the state under
21 section 529 of the executive law (13998).. 610,073,000

22 Notwithstanding any other provision of law,
23 the amount appropriated herein shall be
24 available to reimburse for 98 percent of
25 65 percent of eligible social services
26 district expenditures that are claimed by
27 March 31, 2023 for those community preven-
28 tive services provided from October 1,
29 2021 through September 30, 2022 at a cost
30 that does not exceed the cost that was in
31 effect on October 1, 2008 and that a
32 social services district can demonstrate
33 had been approved by the office of chil-
34 dren and family services on or before
35 October 1, 2008; provided, however, that
36 should insufficient funds be available to
37 provide state reimbursement for 98 percent
38 of 65 percent of such costs, reimbursement
39 shall be made proportionally to each
40 district based on the percentage of their

34 For services and expenses of the office of
35 children and family services and local
36 social services districts for activities
37 necessary to comply with certain

40 7 of the laws of 1999 and chapter 668 of
41 the laws of 2006 requiring criminal record
42 checks for foster care parents, prospec-
43 tive adoptive parents, and adult household
44 members. Funds appropriated herein shall
45 be made available in accordance with a
46 plan to be developed by the commissioner
47 of the office of children and family
48 services and approved by the director of
49 the budget.

50 Notwithstanding any other provision of law
51 to the contrary, the following appropri-
52 ation shall be net of refunds, rebates,
53 reimbursements and credits. Funds appro-

53 By chapter 53, section 1, of the laws of 2021:
54 Notwithstanding any inconsistent provision of law, the amount
55 appropriated herein, shall be available under a foster care block
56 grant for state reimbursement of eligible social services district
57 expenditures for the provision and administration of foster care
58 services including care, maintenance, supervision, and tuition; for
59 supervision of foster children placed in federally funded job corps
60 programs; for care, maintenance, supervision, and tuition for
61 adjudicated juvenile delinquents placed in residential programs

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1 operated by authorized agencies and in out-of-state residential
2 programs; for the provision and administration of the kinship
3 guardian assistance program including kinship guardianship
4 assistance payments and payments for non-recurring guardianship
5 expenses and eligible expenditures associated with local compliance
6 with the federal Family First Prevention Services Act (P.L. 115-
7 123); except that, reimbursement from the amount appropriated herein
8 shall not be available for tuition expenditures for foster children,
9 including persons in need of supervision and adjudicated juvenile
10 delinquents, made by a social services district located within a
11 city having a population of one million or more.

12 Notwithstanding any other provision of law, a portion of the funds are
13 available to reimburse social services districts for the change in
14 the maximum state aid rates established by the office of children
15 and family services for the 2021-22 rate year pursuant to section
16 398-a of the social services law and sections 4003 and 4405 of the
17 education law to reflect the continuation of the cost of living
18 adjustments that became effective April 1, 2008 for payments made to
19 foster parents and for salary and fringe benefit costs and other
20 critical nonpersonal services costs for foster care programs as
21 determined by the office. Social services districts must adjust the
22 amount of payments made for care provided by congregate care and
23 foster boarding home programs and to foster parents to reflect the
24 cost of living adjustments in the manner specified by the office.
25 Each authorized agency operating a congregate care or foster
26 boarding home program in New York state for which the office sets a

39 laws of 2014, for the period commencing on April 1, 2021 and ending
40 March 31, 2022 the director shall not apply any other cost of living
41 adjustment for the purpose of establishing rates of payments,
42 contracts or any other form of reimbursement.

43 Within the amounts appropriated herein, state reimbursement to each
44 social services district for services identified herein that are
45 otherwise reimbursable by the state from April 1, 2021 through March
46 31, 2022 shall be limited to a district allocation, hereinafter
47 referred to as the district's block grant allocation.

21 Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the state shall not be
22 responsible for reimbursing a social services district and a
23 district shall not seek state reimbursement for any portion of any
24 state disallowance or sanction taken against the social services
25 district, or any federal disallowance attributable to final federal
26 agency decisions or to settlement made, on or after July 1, 1995,
27 when such disallowance or sanction results from the failure of the
28 social services district to comply with federal or state
29 requirements, including, but not limited to, failure to document
30 eligibility for federal or state funds in the case record; provided,
31 however, if the office determines that any federal disallowance for
32 services provided between January 1, 1999 and May 31, 1999 results
33 solely from the late enactment of the state legislation implementing
34 the federal adoption and safe families act, the state shall be
35 solely responsible for the full amount of the disallowance or
36 sanction; provided, further, however, this provision shall be deemed
37 to apply both prospectively and retroactively regardless of whether
38 such sanctions or disallowances are for services provided or claims
39 made prior to or after April 1, 2021.

40 Notwithstanding any other provision of law, any federal disallowance
41 resulting from a federal title IV-E eligibility review or audit that
42 uses extrapolated statistic techniques shall be passed along by the
43 state to any and all social services districts that the office of
44 children and family services has determined have not complied with
45 the title IV-E eligibility requirements or have not taken the
46 necessary actions to ensure compliance with such requirements
47 including, but not limited to, failing to: assess and fully document
48 all the criteria and have readily available all the necessary
49 documents to establish and continue title IV-E eligibility for all
50 title IV-E eligible children within the required time frames; claim
51 title IV-E funding only for cases that meet all of the title IV-E
52 eligibility criteria; and fully implement the social services
53 payment system on or before April 1, 2005 for all direct and
54 voluntary agency foster care services.

55 Notwithstanding any law to the contrary, the office of children and
56 family services shall impose on social services districts any
57 federal disallowance issued against the state as a result of a
58 federal title IV-E secondary eligibility review regardless of the
59 date the children may have entered foster care, the date the
60 eligibility or payment errors occurred, or the filing date of any
61 federal claims for reimbursement; provided, however, that the state

37 Notwithstanding any inconsistent provision of law, in lieu of payments
38 authorized by the social services law, or payments of federal funds

41 stamp act, funds herein appropriated, in amounts certified by the
42 state comptroller or the state commissioner of health as due from
43 local social services districts each month as their share of
44 payments made pursuant to section 367-b of the social services law
45 may be set aside by the state comptroller in an interest bearing
46 account with such interest accruing to the credit of the locality in
47 order to ensure the orderly and prompt payment of providers under
48 section 367-b of the social services law pursuant to an estimate
49 provided by the commissioner of health of each local social services
50 district's share of payments made pursuant to section 367-b of the
51 social services law.

52 Notwithstanding the provisions of any other law to the contrary, the
53 office of children and family services may, on behalf of social
54 services districts, make payments to foster boarding homes paid
55 directly by social services districts by direct deposit or debit
56 card. Local social services districts shall reimburse the office for
57 the costs of administering such direct deposit or debit card
58 payments.

59 Notwithstanding any inconsistent provision of the social services law
60 or the state finance law, the office of children and family services
61 shall, on a quarterly basis, request that the office of temporary

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1 and disability assistance reimburse the office of children and
2 family services for the non-federal share of the costs of
3 administering such direct deposit or debit card payments to capture
4 the local share of such costs.

5 Notwithstanding any other provision of law to the contrary, amounts
6 due and owing to a social services district under this
7 appropriation, may be reduced up to such amounts due and owing to
8 the state under section 529 of the executive law (13997)
9 383,526,000 (re. \$214,138,000)

10 Notwithstanding any inconsistent provision of law, the amount
11 appropriated herein shall be made available to reimburse 62 percent
12 of eligible social services district expenditures that are claimed
13 by March 31, 2022 for child welfare services which shall include and
14 be limited to preventive services provided pursuant to section 409-a
15 of the social services law other than community optional preventive
16 services, child protective services, independent living services,
17 after-care services as defined in regulations of the department of
18 family assistance, and adoption administration and services, other
19 than adoption subsidies provided pursuant to title 9 of article 6 of
20 the social services law and regulations of the department of family
21 assistance incurred on or after October 1, 2020 and before October
22 1, 2021 and that are otherwise reimbursable by the state on or after

9 any miscellaneous special revenue fund available to the office of

 58 health care facilities as providers
 59 eligible to receive payment pursuant to

35 federal approvals, including, but not limited to waivers, waiver
36 amendments; and suspending time frames for notice, approval or
37 certification of rate requirements, notwithstanding any provision of
38 law, rule or regulation to the contrary, including but not limited
39 to sections 2807 and 3614 of the public health law, section 18 of
40 chapter 2 of the laws of 1988, and 18 NYCRR 505.14(h).

41 The department of health shall prepare a quarterly report that sets
42 forth: (a) known and projected department of health medicaid
43 expenditures as described in subdivision (1) of this section, and
44 factors that could result in medicaid disbursements for the relevant
45 state fiscal year to exceed the projected department of health state
