Some of you had inquired about the Novel Coronavirus outbreak and steps for prevention. Here are

Currently, there is no recommendation from DPH to restrict clients coming from China to visit public places unless the person has recently traveled to Wuhan and having symptoms of illness (e.g cough, malaise, shortness of breath etc). San Francisco currently has no confirmed cases yet, but DPH is monitoring the outbreak closely. I will share information as soon as we receive any updates on the situation.

At this time, It's important to practice preventative measures such as sharing basic information to the public, encouraging the staff and families to practice frequent handwashing, staying home when sick, covering coughs, and frequent disinfecting of surfaces. The attached flyers have great info about FAQs. Please post out the attached flyers at your centers.

For suspected clients, it's important to instruct them to contact their primary physician and not to come to the public.

Despite coronavirus concerns, thousands turn out for SF Chinese New Year parade

Despite some concern this week that the coronavirus scare would keep people away, thousands still showed up to the Chinese Lunar New Year Parade. It's an event bursting with sound, color, and energy. San Francisco's parade is the largest of its kind outside of Asia, attracting a diverse crowd of more than a hundred thousand each year. "I love all the excitement and the energy and I love celebrating our culture," said Gloria Lee. There were concerns some people wouldn't show up this year, due to fear of the coronavirus. But with nearly 2,400 bleacher seat tickets sold -- similar to last year - organizers say they've seen no negative effect on attendance. "If there is, you could have fooled me because everyone out here it looks like they're enjoying themselves, ready for a good time, and yeah, there doesn't seem to be any kind of impact at all," said William Gee, parade organizer. Something new this year, nearly one hundred young dancers wearing gowns representing the different provinces in China. They were part of the 1.3 mile procession, meant to be a form of visual and auditory education. "It's the atmosphere that we want to try to invite everyone to learn more about Chinese culture and we're happy to share it with everyone," said Gee. That goal seemed to be fulfilled with a woman who drove from Sacramento to be part of the celebration. "I love embracing, learning, experiencing like new cultures and experiences, so it's absolutely amazing, and I'm learning so much," said Chevelle. Whether watching from the sidelines or the vantage point of one of the 4,200 participants, it's an energy filled night of excitement. "It feels great, amazing, all the adrenaline, amazing," said parade participant Jeslyn Chun. Sydney's heaviest rain in 30 years put out bush fires that have been burning for months

Heavy rainfall in Australia's New South Wales has forced the evacuation of several towns and the closure of more than 50 schools, but also extinguished some of the persistent bush fires that have devastated the state. The country's Bureau of Meteorology said the region has seen more than 200 millimeters (7.9 inches) of rainfall in the past 24 hours. In Sydney, preliminary information from the bureau showed that 391.6 millimeters (15.4 inches) of rain fell over the past four days -- the city's heaviest rainfall since 1990. According to New South Wales Rural Fire Service media officer James Morris, the torrential rain helped put out the Currowan fire on Saturday. That particular fire burned 499,621 hectares of land over 74 days. Morris said the ongoing rain was expected to put out the five remaining uncontrolled fires in the state.

With people continuing to return from China and more capacity for laboratories to test 2019 Novel Coronavirus, there is an increasing possibility of cases in San Francisco and even the virus circulating. Plans for student/staff safety and the continuity of education would need to be implemented. Hi Mary, see my responses in green.

1. The statement "The risk of exposure to this new coronavirus in China is increasing over time" is alarming and may need to be qualified. In my mind, it seems to conflict with the statement about the risk in the US being low. Is this statement actually true in the US, given the new containment measures?

The first sentence applies to China, not US.

2. The position on facemasks is confusing because thought it's stated "face masks are most useful for preventing disease spread when they are worn by people who have symptoms," face masks is not mentioned in the recommendations for schools when a student who recently traveled from China comes down with symptoms.

Let's discuss to clarify. Here is summary: If a students develops symptoms *and* was in mainland China within the past 14 days (these would be those that arrived before 2/3), then

- put face mask on them,
- separate them from others,
- call parents to take them home,
- they should notify their doctor, and
- contact the health department (415-554-2830)
- 3. It's mentioned to contact "your health department" but probably best if a specific department or phone number is provided.

4. Could there be more specific guidance for how emergency plans should be updated for this situation?

There will be many more questions, so we need to set up regular meeting. I will have our Plans staff work on this.

Coronavirus: Lessons from past epidemics guide US response to crisis

The U.S. public health response is both more aggressive and less chaotic this time than it was with SARS, infectious disease experts say. At airports, for example, federal authorities quickly introduced travel restrictions and screenings this year. And though several government-chartered planes full of passengers evacuated from China have been quarantined upon landing, so far there have been no emergency scrambles on the tarmac. "I think for everybody, SARS was a humbling experience. It was a scramble back then," said Dr. Tomás Aragón, health officer with the San Francisco Department of Public Health, who led the Center for Infectious Diseases and Emergency Readiness at UC Berkeley during SARS. "Now there's a whole generation of people like myself with really deep experience in these things." Ebola also provided some valuable lessons in disease response, in particular in terms of identifying people traveling to the United States from affected countries — sometimes by very circuitous routes — and connecting them with public health authorities. The CDC had to figure out how to find these passengers, then rebook them on flights that would funnel them to specific airports for screening. From there, passengers would be isolated if symptomatic or told to look for symptoms and stay away from public spaces for a period of time. That process has been replicated in the current coronavirus outbreak, with travelers coming from China now sent to one of 11 airports, including San Francisco International, where CDC screening clinics are already in place. "All of our efforts right now are based on two things: Active surveillance, which means putting the systems in place to identify a high percentage of cases. And then finding their contacts and making sure they don't become new cases," said Dr. Sara Cody, health officer in Santa Clara County, which has reported two coronavirus cases. "You're trying to do everything you can to prevent transmission from a case to someone else, and stop it right there at one," she said. "Right no

He spoke out about the Wuhan virus. Now his family and friends fear he's been silenced

As people across China mourned the death of a whistleblower doctor in an almost unprecedented outpouring of grief and anger on Thursday, little did they know that another truth-teller of the coronavirus outbreak was being silenced, according to friends and family. Chen Qiushi, a citizen journalist who had been doing critical reporting from Wuhan, the central Chinese city at the epicenter of the outbreak, went missing on Thursday evening, just as hundreds of thousands of people in China began demanding freedom of speech online. Chen arrived in Wuhan on January 24, a day after the city was placed under a state-imposed lockdown, designed to stop citizens from leaving to stem the spread of the virus. He visited overflowing hospitals, funeral parlors and makeshift isolation wards and uploaded videos of what he saw online, offering the world a glimpse into the often grim reality at the heart of the crisis. Friends said they had been checking in with Chen multiple times a day, fearing he could be taken by the authorities at any time for his reporting. When he stopped answering calls early Thursday evening, they grew increasingly concerned. In the small hours of Friday, Chen's friend posted a video message of Chen's mother on his Twitter page saying her son had disappeared. His close friends say Chen had left them his login details to the platform, in case he was taken by the authorities. "I'm here to beg everyone online, especially friends in Wuhan to help find Qiushi, find out what's going on with him," she said. Later that evening in a live broadcast on YouTube, Xu Xiaodong, an outspoken mixed martial artist and friend of Chen, played a message from the journalist's mother saying he had been forcibly quarantined. "In the last few hours the Qingdao public security officers and state security officers... notified Qiushi's parents that Qiushi has already been detained in the name of quarantine. Qiushi's mother immediately asked them where and when he was taken away, they declined to say," said Xu. Xu stressed that, bas

Thanks so much. My email is to the 4 people at SFUSD and not to the general public. I totally agree about being careful and having consistency for public information on epidemiology, such as "there is an increasing possibility of cases in San Francisco and even the virus circulating." I'll delete the word "increasing". I'm eager to learn/hear what you think should be the best-language about the epidemiology now; and why prepare for the "possible worsening of the epidemic", and descriptions of how the epidemic would worsen.

In working closely with School Health over the years; we're consistently on the same page of what information is for internal discussion; and what information is for the general public. Though, based upon your thoughtful guidance, I'll provide additional clarification on Monday.

I am more concerned that schools aren't preparing for the next phase of the epidemic. What do you think will be the next phase and what epidemiological event/incident would cause the next federal/state proclamation of additional public health measures. What should be the measures? Are school districts, schools, families prepared?

When do we plan and implement some of the measures listed here?

Dear SFUSD Health Team:

Thank you very much for your great work in communicating with your school district's students and families; and your ongoing communications with the San Francisco Department of Public Health. We appreciate all of your excellent questions and thoughtful approaches to some complex cases.

Today, Dr. Aragon and I discussed the excellent response of SFUSD, the letter that SFUSD sent to families (last updated February 5th). As you can compare with other letters sent from school districts/ health departments, the SFUSD letter was comprehensive and very clear.

As I was relating the draft CDPH guidance with you earlier, local health departments have been planning with each other and with CDPH to respond to this emerging threat of an epidemic. The Chinese and U.S. governments https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov have issued an unprecedented scale of quarantine orders, so public health experts are

still determining how such orders and guidelines should be recommended. The California Department of Public Health guideline that planned for release on Wednesday-Thursday was finally released this evening. I am forwarding it to you now.

As you can read, the new CDPH guidance is very much aligned with the SFUSD (2/5/2020) and SFDPH <u>www.sfcdcp.org</u> guidance. The new CDPH guidance emphasizes some actionable steps that schools may need to prepare for or consider include:

- Separate sick students and staff from others until they can go home. When feasible, identify a "sick room" through which others do not regularly pass.
- A note about face masks: face masks are most useful for preventing disease spread when they are worn by people who have symptoms. This is why people are asked to wear a mask at doctors' offices and hospitals if they are coughing or sneezing.
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Whereas you've helped lead an excellent response for our many public school students and their families in San Francisco in this first-week of responding to the federal quarantine guidelines, I think that school "emergency plans" (e.g., for infectious diseases and pandemics) will be very useful to consider soon. With people continuing to return from China and more capacity for laboratories to test 2019 Novel Coronavirus, there is an increasing possibility of cases in San Francisco and even the virus circulating. Plans for student/staff safety and the continuity of education would need to be implemented. These are issues that all schools will need to grapple with in California, so I look forward to discussing with you and supporting best-practices with you.

5 quarantined at Travis AFB show symptoms of coronavirus, CDC says

FAIRFIELD, Calif. — Five of the people evacuated from Wuhan, China who were being quarantined at Travis Air Force Base show symptoms of coronavirus, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. The group has not been diagnosed with coronavirus, but they display symptoms of the virus, officials said. Officials said all five had fevers. They have been taken to nearby hospitals for treatment, officials said. Hundreds of American evacuees from Wuhan were flown to Travis AFB on two flights earlier in the week. One person from the first flight and four from the second flight were hospitalized as a precautionary measure, officials said. The coronavirus is a viral respiratory illness that was first identified in Wuhan. Similar to other viral infections, coronavirus is spread through when an infected person coughs or sneezes. There have been 12 confirmed cases of coronavirus in the United States.

Expect more blackouts in California, PG&E says. But utility predicts smaller, shorter shutoffs

Make no mistake: PG&E Corp. will plunge Californians into darkness again this year if it thinks that will prevent another major wildfire. But the utility said Friday it's investing millions in personnel and technology to lessen the impact of its "public safety power shutoffs" and believes the 2020 blackouts won't darken nearly as many homes as last year. PG&E, which has 16 million customers around the state, filed an updated wildfire safety blueprint with the Public Utilities Commission, outlining plans for "hardening" its electric grid, improving its weather forecasting and trimming back more tree limbs that could spark fires. Above all, PG&E expects it can make its deliberate blackouts — engineered when windstorms kick up and wildfire risk is high — less burdensome than last October, when outages affected millions of Northern Californians, infuriated Gov. Gavin Newsom, and still failed to prevent a major wildfire in Sonoma County. This year's blackouts should be "smarter, smaller and shorter," said Matt Pender, a director of the utility's wildfire safety program. "There's been a lot of learning at PG&E from the last wildfire season." Pender said the footprint of this year's blackouts should be about one-third smaller than last year's for a windstorm of similar size, thanks to "sectionalizing" switches that will allow PG&E "to cut up the grid." PG&E will double the number of switches it had last year.

Thailand shooting: Soldier kills 20 in gun rampage

A soldier has killed 20 people and injured many more in a gun rampage in the Thai city of Nakhon Ratchasima. Jakraphanth Thomma, a junior officer, killed his commanding officer before stealing weapons from a military camp, a defence spokesman told BBC Thai. The suspect then drove to the city centre and entered a shopping complex, where he is believed to be holed up. The suspect, whose motives remain unclear, posted images of his attack on social media sites. Authorities have sealed off the Terminal 21 shopping centre in Nakhon Ratchasima, also known as Korat, as they try to track down the suspect. Troops and police have entered the building and there have been reports of more gunshots. Defence ministry spokesman Lt Gen Kongcheep Tantravanich said hundreds of people had been brought out of the complex safely, but there could be dozens still in the building. A tweet from security forces said the ground floor had now been cleared. The Bangkok Post reported earlier that the suspect, who it said was 32 years old, had taken hostages, but this has not been officially confirmed.

Dear SFUSD Health Team:

Thank you very much for your great work in communicating with your school district's students and families; and your ongoing communications with the San Francisco Department of Public Health. We appreciate all of your excellent questions and thoughtful approaches to some complex cases.

Today, Dr. Aragon and I discussed the excellent response of SFUSD, the letter that SFUSD sent to families (last updated February 5th). As you can compare with other letters sent from school districts/ health departments, the SFUSD letter was comprehensive and very clear.

As I was relating the draft CDPH guidance with you earlier, local health departments have been planning with each other and with CDPH to respond to this emerging threat of an epidemic. The Chinese and U.S. governments <a href="https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-">https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-</a>

ncov have issued an unprecedented scale of quarantine orders, so public health experts are still determining how such orders and guidelines should be recommended. The California Department of Public Health guideline that planned for release on Wednesday-Thursday was finally released this evening. I am forwarding it to you now.

As you can read, the new CDPH guidance is very much aligned with the SFUSD (2/5/2020) and SFDPH <u>www.sfcdcp.org</u> guidance. The new CDPH guidance emphasizes some actionable steps that schools may need to prepare for or consider include:

- Separate sick students and staff from others until they can go home. When feasible, identify a "sick room" through which others do not regularly pass.
- A note about face masks: face masks are most useful for preventing disease spread when they are worn by people who have symptoms. This is why people are asked to wear a mask at doctors' offices and hospitals if they are coughing or sneezing.
- Update emergency plans to ensure they are in place before an outbreak occurs.
- Please note that there have been reports of students and others being stigmatized. We urge schools to ensure students' and staffs' privacy to help prevent discrimination.

Whereas you've helped lead an excellent response for our many public school students and their families in San Francisco in this first-week of responding to the federal quarantine guidelines, I think that school "emergency plans" (e.g., for infectious diseases and pandemics) will be very useful to consider soon. With people continuing to return from China and more capacity for laboratories to test 2019 Novel Coronavirus, there is an increasing possibility of cases in San Francisco and even the virus circulating. Plans for student/staff safety and the continuity of education would need to be implemented. These are issues that all schools will need to grapple with in California, so I look forward to discussing with you and supporting best-practices with you.

- CDC is closely monitoring an outbreak of respiratory illness caused by a novel (new) coronavirus (named "2019-nCoV") that was first detected in Wuhan City, Hubei Province, China and which continues to expand.
- Chinese health officials have reported thousands of infections with 2019-nCoV in China, with the virus reportedly spreading from person-to-person in many parts of that country.
- Infections with 2019-nCoV, most of them associated with travel from Wuhan, also are being reported in a growing number of international locations, including the United States.

## What should I know and do if I recently traveled to China?

Given the increasing spread of novel coronavirus in China, the CDC issued new guidance and is closely monitoring returning travelers from China beginning February 3, 2020 in partnership with the San Francisco Department of Public Health.

By federal order, as of **February 3, 2020**:

- Foreign nationals returning from China will not be allowed entry into the U.S. unless they are immediate family of U.S. citizens or permanent residents.
- All U.S. citizens returning from Hubei Province, China will be subject to a mandatory 14-day quarantine by the federal government.
- U.S. citizens returning from other parts of mainland China who have fever, cough, or shortness of breath will undergo mandatory quarantine. This does not include travel to Hong Kong. If this applies to you, please call SFDPH at 415-554-2830.
- U.S. citizens returning from other parts of mainland China who DO NOT have fever, cough, or shortness of breath will undergo self-quarantine at home with monitoring by their local health department. Do not go to school, work, or social gatherings. This does not include travel to Hong Kong. If this applies to you, please call SFDPH at 415-554-2830.

The San Francisco Department of Public Health recommends that travelers who returned from China **BEFORE February 3** monitor themselves for 14 days after their last day in China. If symptoms (fever, cough, or shortness of breath) occur during that time, please contact your health provider, inform them of your travel history and self-isolate at home pending their advice. Do not go to work, school or social events if you have these symptoms.





- CCSF Department of Human Resources (DHR) will send out guidance for CCSF employees who are returning from travel to mainland China within the last 14 days.
- DPH's recommendation for travelers returning from mainland China 1-14 days before the Federal
 Quarantine Orders were announced on 02/03/20: if you feel sick with a fever, cough, or shortness of
 breath, seek medical care right away. Before you go to a doctor's office, clinic, or emergency room, call
 ahead and tell them about your recent travel history and your symptoms so that they can prepare for your
 visit.

Public Information:

- DEM coordinated a Chinese Lunar New Year Public Safety press conference Thursday 2/6 at 2:00 pm with public safety and city officials to promote safety messaging. Xenophobia and discrimination were addressed during the press conference. The press conference included Board of Supervisors President Norman Yee, Sheriff Paul Miyamoto, Police Chief William Scott, Fire Chief Jeanine Nicholson, Dr.Grant Colfax and the Chinese Chamber of Commerce.
- Joint statement between the San Francisco Department of Public Health, San Francisco Department of Emergency Management and Office of Racial Equity of the City and County of San Francisco was released to the media: https://www.sf72.org/blog/san-francisco-rejects-xenophobia-and-discrimination.
- 911 dispatchers and 311 call takers have been provided with updated FAQs. 311 has received 268 inquiries since 1/27/2020.

 Recreation and Park, Public Library and the Department of Children Youth and Families have distributed fact sheets on the novel coronavirus.
- The Department of Public Health and the Department of Emergency Management have updated the Novel Coronavirus Factsheets and are providing talking points to San Francisco Leaders.
