Introduction

Background and Methodology

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- Each spring and fall, Digital Research, Inc. conducts the *Critical Insights on Maine*TM tracking survey, a comprehensive, statewide public opinion survey of registered voters in Maine that covers a variety of topics of interest to businesses, government, and the general public.
- Critical Insights on MaineTM has been documenting the attitudes, perceptions, and preferences of Maine's residents for more than 25 years, making it the longest-running consistently-administered tracking survey in the Northeast.
 - In addition to general-interest items (the results of which are being provided to the public in this report), the survey also includes a number of proprietary items for sponsoring entities, with results of those items released only to the sponsors of those specific questions.

Methodology

- This wave of the survey included a total of 622 respondents across the state who were surveyed by phone (312 respondents) or online (310 respondents) in March and April of 2022.
- All survey respondents were registered voters who live in Maine.
 - Final data reflect the demographics of the state's population and were statistically weighted to ensure that those responding by phone or online had an equal impact on the overall results.
 - With a total sample of 622 respondents, results presented here have a margin of sampling error of +/- 3.9 percentage points at the 95% confidence level.
- The entire survey took the average respondent 24 minutes to complete including both general-interest items and all proprietary subscriber items.



Views Towards the Direction of Maine and the Nation


Roughly three out of ten surveyed voters in Maine believe the state is headed in the *right direction*, while four out of ten believe the state is on the *wrong track*.

Direction of Maine

Democrats (51%) are much more likely than Republicans (8%) to feel the state is headed in the *right direction*.

In fact, six out of ten Republicans feel the state is on the *wrong track* (62%), compared


to only two out of ten Democrats (17%)





Just 16% of Mainers believe the nation as a whole is heading in the *right direction* – among the lowest levels tested in more than a decade.


Almost four times as many – 57% overall – believe the nation is on the wrong track.





Spring 2022 (n = 622)

Financial issues are now, by far, the most prominent concerns for Mainers overall. No non-economic concern – including the coronavirus – is top-of-mind for more than a handful of voters.

Percentage naming each issue





Chart shows issues mentioned by more than 5% of respondents in the spring of 2022 (along with the coronavirus, which is included for comparison)




Fully half of voters in Maine believe the economy will get worse over the next year, and just two out of ten believe it will improve. Only in the spring of 2020 – at the onset of the coronavirus pandemic – have so many voters been pessimistic about the future of the economy.



Opinions of Politicians

Roughly half of voters approve of Governor Mills's performance, returning to her prepandemic average.






Four out of ten constituents of Chellie Pingree approve of her performance, maintaining her historical average despite a large split between Democrats and Republicans. Four out of ten constituents of Jared Golden approve of his performance, in-line with his historical average.

(Among those in the respective districts)





Roughly one-third of voters in Maine approve of the state legislature's performance, holding close to the historical average.

Approval of the State Legislature

Six out of ten Democrats in Maine now approve of the legislature's performance (58%), compared to just two out of ten Republicans (19%).




Spring 2022 (n=622)



One-third of voters currently approve of the way Susan Collins is handling her job as U.S. Senator – holding relatively steady since the spring of 2020.


Approval of Senator Susan Collins








More than half of voters approve of the job Angus King is doing as U.S. Senator, on par with the historical average.







One out of three voters in Maine approve of Joe Biden's performance as president, representing continued decline since his election.






November 2022 Elections

The upcoming race for governor between Janet Mills and Paul LePage is a dead heat (42% vs. 39%); Mills has a strong lead in the first congressional district (52% vs. 32%), but LePage has an equal lead in the second congressional district (49% vs. 29%).

When voters are asked which *party* they will vote for in the upcoming election for the U.S. House of Representatives, a Republican candidate is much more popular in the second congressional district (42% vs. 24%), and a Democratic candidate has an equal margin in the first congressional district (43% vs. 26%). Still, many in each district are undecided who they will vote for.
