

GEORGIA NEWS COLLABORATIVE 2022 GENERAL ELECTION SURVEY OF LIKELY HISPANIC VOTERS

CONDUCTED BY THE SPIA SURVEY RESEARCH CENTER OCTOBER 14, 2022

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General Information:

The 2022 Survey of Hispanic Voters in Georgia was a text-to-web survey conducted October 11-12, 2022 and included a total of 309 self-identified Hispanic/Latino likely voters. Likely general election voters were respondents who had voted in the 2018 general election, and/or the 2020 general election and/or the 2021 statewide runoff, and/or the 2022 May statewide primary; who indicated they were currently registered to vote in Georgia; and who were *definitely* or *probably* going to vote in the 2022 general election in November. The survey was administered by the School of Public and International Affairs Survey Research Center at the University of Georgia. Surveys were conducted in English. The sample was obtained through L2 (L2 is a sampling vendor that maintains a database constructed from state voter registration lists. Through commercial sources, phone numbers have been appended to the individual records (registrants) that make up these lists). The survey results were weighted using iterative proportional raking in order to ensure the sample was representative of the 2022 Hispanic electorate in terms of sex, age, and education.¹ The calculated margin of error for the total sample is +/-5.6 points at the 95% confidence level. This would mean that if 50% of respondents indicate a topline view on an issue, we can be 95% confident that the population's view on that issue is somewhere between 55.6% and 44.4%.

<u>Note</u>: This is separate survey from the Georgia News Collaborative Survey conducted September 25-October 4, 2022.

Statistical Calculations:²

<u>Governor</u>: The difference between first-place candidate Abrams' estimated vote share and Kemp's estimated vote share, at 1.2, is not statistically significant. Among likely Hispanic voters, the Governor's race is a statistical tie.

<u>U.S. Senate</u>: The difference between first-place candidate Walker's estimated vote share and secondplace candidate Warnock's estimated vote share, at 6.3, is not statistically significant. In plain English, among likely Hispanic voters the U.S. Senate race is a dead heat.

¹The Georgia voter registration database was relied upon to determine the age and sex distribution for Hispanic voters based on the last general election. The 2020 American Community Survey from the U.S. Census Bureau was used to determine the educational breakdown of the Hispanic population in Georgia.

<u>Lt. Governor</u>: The difference between first-place candidate Jones' estimated vote share and secondplace candidate Bailey's estimated vote share, at 10.9, is statistically significant. Among likely Hispanic voters, Jones leads Bailey in the race for Lt. Governor.

<u>Secretary of State</u>: The difference between first-place candidate Raffensperger's estimated vote share and second-place candidate Nguyen's estimated vote share, at 9.2, is not statistically significant. In plain English, the race for Secretary of State is tied.

<u>Attorney General</u>: The difference between Carr's vote share and that for Jordan, at 8.7, is not statistically significant. Carr and Jordan are currently tied in the race for Attorney General among likely Hispanic voters.
