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METHODOLOGY

The Glengariff Group, Inc. conducted a Michigan statewide survey of Michigan voters. The 600 sample, live operator telephone survey was conducted on March 1-4, 2023 and has a margin of error of $\pm 4.0\%$ with a 95% level of confidence. 27.0% of respondents were contacted via landline telephone. 73.0% of respondents were contacted via cell phone telephone. This survey was commissioned by the Glengariff Group, Inc. as part of our public polling program.

KEY FINDINGS

Voters See State and Community as Safe; Schools Seen as Much Less Safe

- * 87.7% of Michigan voters believe their community is safe. 9.7% do not believe their community is safe.
- * 72.4% of Michigan voters believe the state is safe. 15.3% do not believe Michigan is safe.
- * But when it comes to schools, only 54.7% of Michigan voters believe schools are a safe place.

54.7%. Schools are safe.25.8%. Schools are not safe.19.5%. Unsure

There are not big partisan differences in how voters view the safety of schools

Three Bill Package Brings Extraordinary Bipartisan Voter Support; Voters Unite Behind Three Main Proposals

* Voters were asked if they support or oppose each of the three pieces of legislation currently making their way through Michigan's Legislature. Each of the three bills brings extraordinary bipartisan support.

87.8% Support Background Check Law

* By a margin of 87.8%-9.2%, Michigan voters support passage of a law requiring any person purchasing any type of gun from anyone else to go through a background check.

77.5% of Michigan voters STRONGLY SUPPORT background checks.

85.5% of gun owners support background checks. 84.5% of non-gun owners support background checks. 77.8% of Republican gun owners support background checks.

74.5% Support Red Flag Law

* By a margin of 74.5%-19.3%, Michigan voters support passage of a law that creates red flag laws which would allow law enforcement to temporarily take guns away from a person deemed a risk to themselves or others by a court.

57.2% of Michigan voters STRONGLY SUPPORT a red flag law.

The strongest opposition for a red flag law comes from Republican voters who still support the law overall 57.5%-38.0%

There is a particularly sharp difference among GOP households based on whether their household owns a gun. GOP gun owners support the red flag law 56.3%-39.3%. But GOP non-gun owners support the red flag law 80.5%-15.2%.

Republican women support red flag laws 70.0%-24.7%. Republican men support red flag laws 52.0%-43.9%.

The only demographic that opposes a red flag law are those voters that called themselves staunch supporters of the Second Amendment who oppose it 36.8%-58.2%.

79.8% Support Safe Storage Law

* By a margin of 79.8%-16.6%, Michigan voters support passage of a safe storage gun law that would create penalties for individuals that fail to lock up their guns at home or keep them out of the hands of minors.

69.2% of Michigan voters STRONGLY SUPPORT a safe storage law.

Republican women support a safe storage law 72.1%-20.5%. Republican men support a safe storage law 60.1%-38.4%,

Republican non-gun owners support a safe storage law 86.9%-10.8%. Republican gun owners support a safe storage law 60.1%-35.5%. Voters that call themselves strong proponents of the Second Amendment are split on safe storage laws at 47.2%-47.2%.

80.2% Say Three Bills Represent Important Changes

* Voters were asked if they viewed this three-bill package as important or not important in response to the Michigan State University shooting.

80.2% of voters say the laws are important compared to only 16.7% that say the laws are not important. 62.2% of Michigan voters say the laws are VERY IMPORTANT.

Those voters that say passage of the bills is not important is concentrated among Republican men. Republican women say the laws are important 73.2%-24.7%. Republican men say the laws are important 56.1%-40.7%.

Republican non-gun owners say the bills are important by a margin of 76.1%-21.7%. Republican gun owners say the bills are important 62.0%-36.7%.

67.7% Say Three Laws Will Make Michigan Safer

* Voters were asked if the three proposed bills would make Michigan safer. By a margin of 67.7%-30.5%, Michigan voters believe the laws will make Michigan safer.

18.8% say it will make Michigan much safer while 48.9% say it will make Michigan somewhat safer. 12.0% say it will not make Michigan much safer, and 18.0% say it will not make Michigan any safer at all.

Non gun owners believe it will make Michigan safer by a margin of 85.2%-13.2%. Gun owners believe it will make Michigan safer by a margin of 58.1%-40.0%.

Only base Republican voters believe the three bills will not make Michigan safer.

* Voters were asked if an elected official were to vote against background checks would that make them more likely to vote for that official, less likely to vote for that official or would their position make no difference to them.

66.7% of Michigan voters would be less likely to vote for that official – with 55.6%, a majority of voters, MUCH LESS LIKELY to vote for that official. 23.1% of voters said it would make no difference to them. 8.0% would be more likely to vote for the official.

68.4% of independent voters would be more likely to vote against the official – with 57.6% of independent MUCH LESS LIKELY to vote for that official.

61.1% of gun owners would more likely to vote against an official that opposes background checks with 50.1% MUCH LESS LIKELY.

Waiting Period, Raising Age to 21, Banning Ghost Guns Garner More Than 73% Support Among Voters

- * Three additional proposed changes capture more than 73% support among Michigan voters.
- * By a margin of 74.5%-21.8%, Michigan voters support creating a fourteen-day waiting period for the purchase of a new gun meaning a person must wait fourteen days to take possession of a new firearm.

59.7% of Michigan voters STRONGLY SUPPORT a fourteen-day waiting period.

Even respondents that call themselves strong proponents of the Second Amendment are split on this proposal with 49.9% supporting and 48.7% opposing.

Gun owners support a fourteen-day waiting period 67.0%-28.5%. Non-gun owners support a fourteen-day waiting period 86.1%-12.3%.

By a margin of 84.6%-12.9% women support a waiting period. By a margin of 63.7%-31.5% men support a waiting period.

* By a margin 74.0%-22.5% Michigan voters support raising the purchase age for guns in Michigan from 18 to 21 years old except for guns used for hunting or agricultural purposes.

61.7% of Michigan voters STRONGLY SUPPORT raising the purchase age to 21 years old.

The only block of opposition to this proposal comes from base Republican voters who still support the proposal but by a narrower margin of 55.3%-40.7%.

Gun owners support raising the purchase age by a margin of 67.6%-27.6%. Non-gun owner support raising the purchase age by a margin of 84.3%-14.0%.

* By a margin of 73.1%-22.1%, Michigan voters support banning the creation or possession of 3-D printed ghost guns that do not have a serial-numbers or can evade metal detectors.

There is no equivocation among those that want to ban these guns with 68.9% of Michigan voters STRONGLY SUPPORTING banning 3-D ghost guns. Outside of background checks and safe storage laws, banning ghost guns has the most intense support among Michigan voters.

<u>Gun owners support banning ghost guns by a margin of 68.9%-26.4% -- with 66.5% of gun owners STRONGLY</u> <u>SUPPORTING banning ghost guns.</u> Even among respondents that consider themselves staunch supporters of the second amendment, they support banning ghost guns by a margin of 52.0%-35.4%.

Michigan Voters Strongly Support Gun-Related Criminals Forfeiting Gun Rights

* By a margin of 79.2%-14.5%, Michigan voters overwhelmingly support any person convicted of a crime involving a gun from ever owning or possessing a firearm in the future.

64.1% STRONGLY SUPPORT criminals convicted of a gun related crime forfeiting their rights to gun possession or ownership.

A majority of every demographic group STRONGLY SUPPORTS criminals involved with gun crimes forfeiting their rights to gun ownership or possession.

Gun owners support this proposal by a margin of 78.3%-14.5%, with 59.9% STRONGLY SUPPORTING. Staunch Second Amendment proponents support this proposal by a margin of 70.1%-20.1%, with 50.7% STRONGLY SUPPORTING.

* By a margin of 64.6%-26.5%, Michigan voters support any person convicted of a domestic violence crime from ever owning or possessing a gun.

A lesser 47.3% STRONGLY SUPPORT domestic violence offenders from possessing a gun.

The difference between support levels for banning anyone convicted of a gun crime and banning anyone convicted of a domestic violence crime from possessing a gun is driven by Republican voters and <u>male voters</u>.

<u>No issue more strongly separates voters by gender than this proposal to prohibit individuals convicted of a domestic</u> violence crime from possessing a gun.

* Voters are in strong agreement that individuals convicted of a gun related crime should forfeit their right to future possession of a gun. They are also supportive of backing that restriction up with more money for police, prosecutors and corrections budgets to enforce those restrictions.

By a margin of 73.9%-20.0%, Michigan voters support more money for police and prosecutors to prosecute gun laws. 47.6% of voters STRONGLY SUPPORT more funding.

On the issue of more funding for police and prosecutors, there is little statistical difference by party affiliation.

By a margin of 69.6%-22.3%, Michigan voters support more money for corrections to house more criminals convicted as a result of aggressively enforcing Michigan gun laws. But a lesser 41.8% STRONGLY SUPPORT this budget increase.

Again, there is little statistical difference by party affiliation.

*

But one of the strongest responses in the survey came on the issue of more funding for mental health services directed at young adults impacted by Covid. By a margin of 85.7%-10.5%, Michigan voters OVERWHELMINGLY support more funding for youth mental health services.

73.9% of Michigan voters STRONGLY SUPPORT more funding for youth mental health services.

Support for additional youth mental health funding is strong and deep across all demographic groups.

Assault Weapons Ban, Limiting Bullets in Magazines Have Support, But Below 60%

* By a margin of 59.7%-32.5%, Michigan voters support limiting gun magazines to no more than ten bullets at a time.

46.1% STRONGLY SUPPORT this proposal while 26.0% STRONGLY OPPOSE this proposal.

Non-gun owners support this proposal by a margin of 76.7%-18.6%. But gun owners are split on this proposal by a margin of 48.0%-44.2%. Opposition to limiting magazines to ten bullets comes from Republican voters.

* By a margin of 55.1%-40.3%, Michigan voters support a proposal to ban semi-automatic assault weapons in Michigan.

46.6% STRONGLY SUPPORT the ban on assault weapons while 28.3% STRONGLY OPPOSE the ban.

There are sharp statistical differences by party affiliation with Republican voters STRONGLY OPPOSED to banning assault weapons and Democratic and Independent voters STRONGLY SUPPORTIVE of banning assault weapons.

There are sharp divisions on banning assault weapons between gun owners and non-gun owners. Non-owners sharply support banning assault weapons with 64.4% STRONGLY SUPPORTING a ban. But gun owners are narrowly against the ban. But the intensity of gun owners is split with 34.7% STRONGLY SUPPORTING a ban and 37.7% STRONGLY OPPOSING a ban.

Arming Teachers Splits Voters

* Voters were asked if they support or oppose arming teachers in classrooms. By a narrow margin of 47.9%-43.7%, Michigan voters appear split on the subject.

30.8% STRONGLY SUPPORT the idea while 33.1% STRONGLY OPPOSE the idea.

Republican voters strongly support the idea. Democratic voters strongly oppose the idea. Independent voters are split.

Parents with children in schools narrowly support the idea 52.8%-39.8%. Voters without children in schools are split on the proposal 44.7%-46.3%.

Gun owners support the idea 61.4%-31.2%. Non-gun owners oppose the idea 28.4%-62.3%.

Voters Strongly Reject Constitutional Carry Proposal and Amnesty for Gun Violations

* Voters rejected two ideas that come from opposite ends of the partisan spectrum.

By a margin of 22.1% support to 71.9% oppose, voters overwhelmingly reject making Michigan a Constitutional Carry state where anyone can legally carry a gun with them without a concealed weapons permit.

62.6% of voters STRONGLY OPPOSE making Michigan a Constitutional Carry state.

Gun owners oppose the Constitutional Carry proposal by a margin of 28.2%-67.4% -- with 57.3% of gun owners STRONGLY OPPOSED.

But staunch Second Amendment advocates support the Constitutional Carry proposal by a margin of 59.8%-35.4%, with 44.4% STRONGLY SUPPORTIVE – the only substantial base of support for the proposal.

* By a margin of 34.5% support to 47.2% opposed, Michigan voters oppose a proposal that would allow a family member to report if a family member convicted of a felony that is on probation or parole and is in possession of a gun to the authorities guaranteeing that their family member would be given amnesty for that gun possession.

32.6% STRONGLY OPPOSE the proposal. But 18.3% of voters were undecided.

There are few partisan differences in this proposal with Democratic, Republican and Independent voters all opposed to the proposal.

Voters Do Not Blame Prosecutors

* Voters were asked if they thought their county prosecutor was too aggressive, too lenient or about right in prosecuting gun violations.

The reality is voters simply do not know – with 53.4%, a majority of voters, unsure.

1.3% said their prosecutor was too aggressive. 18.6% said they were too lenient. 25.8% said they were about right.

Voters Reach Agreement on Policy, But Messaging Rhetoric Sends Voters into Their Political Corners

- * Voters were read two competing statements and asked which one they agree with more.
 - 51.7% Guns aren't the problem. People are the problem. If police and prosecutors would just enforce the laws we have on the books we wouldn't be talking about limiting our second amendment right to own guns.
 - 41.3% There are too many guns on the streets. Police and prosecutors need help by passing some common-sense Limits on purchase and possession of guns.

When presented with these two competing statements, voters took their partisan corners.
