Subject: A Letter from Over Eight Hundred CBSD Alumni, 1959 – 2022

To CBSD School Board Members:

As proud alumni of the Central Bucks School District, we are horrified by the discriminatory and dangerous policies that you and some school administrators have implemented or allowed to happen in the district over the past year.

Our schools must be a welcoming and nurturing environment for all students. Schools should also be a marketplace of ideas that challenge students to grow and flourish their intellect. But your recent actions dramatically undermine both of these goals.

Reports of a persistent hostile environment for LGBTQ&T and other vulnerable students were rife in schools across the district for years. Students, particularly trans students, complained of regular bullying by fellow students. Instead of resolving these conflicts or disciplining those responsible for the bullying, targeted students were often told by the adults charged with protecting them that they simply needed to figure out how to cope with the bullying on their own. One teacher was even placed on administrative leave after sharing with a student information about a government agency that could address the discrimination that the student faced in school.

Some schools in the district, with the apparent blessing of some of your members, implemented a “gender identification procedure” that mandated teachers call students by the name listed in a database administered by the school. The only way to prevent a trans student from being dead-named by their teacher under the policy would be to have the student’s parent approve an official name change in the database. This forces closeted students to come out to their parents just so that they can be called by their chosen name in the classroom.

Last year, when a nonbinary student asked to attend a sex education class that didn’t conform to their birth gender, your members canceled sex education classes across the district rather than accommodating the student.

Two months later, you approved the strictest library book ban in the state, allowing a small handful of parents to challenge and remove from district libraries any book that they found objectionable. While the book ban foremost targeted LGBTQ&T themed books, any book could be potentially challenged by a disgruntled parent or school board member. These authors and themes open students to a wide array of views – some that have historically been marginalized in our country – and benefit their education.

Most recently, you passed Policy 321. Policy 321 bans teachers from discussing “partisan, political, or social policy matters” in schools and from displaying any symbols that might be considered political, including pride flags. This policy puts a significant chill on serious classroom discussion of current and historical events, and banning pride flags continues to accelerate the hostile culture towards LGBTQ&T students across the district.

To defend these clearly discriminatory policies, you have spent more than \$100,000 of taxpayer money to hire a law firm headed by a former candidate for governor who criticized the mere existence of a middle school GSA during his campaign.

As CBSD alumni, we are shocked and saddened by these developments in Central Bucks. A few board members should not be imposing their political views on thousands of students and teachers by telling them what they can and can’t read or talk about in class.

This goes against the very spirit of what a meaningful education can and should be.

Students in Central Bucks should have a school board that supports the right of students to learn in a healthy, welcoming, and intellectually challenging environment. They deserve nothing less.

The board has brought shame and disgrace to the district locally and nationally.
Your rhetoric and policies are dangerous... you are encouraging bullying and hate.
The treatment of LGBTQA+ students, their families, and the staff who protect them is despicable. How can we prepare students for life after school if we can't create a safe space for them to learn and grow to their fullest potential?
LGBTQ students are among the most vulnerable. These are YOUNG PEOPLE who need to be valued as members of society, and protected from abusive behavior. You will not change sexual orientation by these draconian practices; rather, you might be accomplices in driving these students towards, or right to, the brink.
Board members should not be imposing their political views on thousands of students and teachers by telling them what they can and can't read or talk about in class. I used to be proud to say I graduated from CB . I actually moved back here to raise my children. They too used to be proud of having been from this district.
It's incredibly disappointing to see our district regress and become unsafe for student self-expression.
I used to be so proud of being a part of CBSD... I am now so glad that I graduated before all this happened and so ashamed of what CBSD has become. My heart is broken for the students and staff who are being directly hurt by your policies. To the few of you who are still advocating for the rights of ALL CBSD students and staff, thank you.
Every student should feel safe and welcome in CB schools - regardless of race or sexual orientation. Teachers and staff can often be the only resource for a child struggling with identity. You should be empowering educators to help students, instead of shunning and ostracizing them.

As an LGBTQ+ person myself, I am heartbroken and horrified by the actions and decisions of this school district. I am one of three female siblings that graduated from CBSD schools in 2010, 2011, 2014 (on to Duke and Harvard) with nothing but exceptional things to say about the quality of our educational experiences. You are an embarrassment
Embarrassed, disturbed, disappointed. I met some of the most important and impactful people in my life's within your four walls. All students should feel comfortable with themselves and their surroundings at school.
Because of their inaction, regardless of the INTENT or MOTIVE, it will result in the deaths of students. I hope they know that because whatever incentive they may be getting for being accomplices to this kind of violence, it isn't worth the lives of these students.

As a teacher myself, I am saddened for teachers and students in the district that I attended as a student. I am disappointed that this has become a district that I would not be willing to teach in due to its discriminatory nature of marginalized students.
I am disturbed to see what has happened to the district I grew up in! I used to think we lead the way for innovation, growth and acceptance. I used to be proud. Now I am embarrassed to admit that I came from this district. All involved should be ashamed!
I went to Central Bucks schools and now own a home here. The fact that my money is being spent on these discriminatory policies is sickening and infuriating. It is a human right that ALL kids feel safe in their schools, not a political debate. Do what's right and stop putting your political agenda before the safety and lives of the kids in our district.
As a CB alum and child of a district employee, the actions of the school board continue to shock and appall my family and I. Not only are queer students at risk in what should be a safe learning environment, but lgbtq+ staff and faculty are put in a position where they feel unsafe expressing themselves at their place of work.
When the world is already so scary for these kids, they deserve an ally. More than that, they deserve someone to protect them. You don't have to scream from the rooftops but ignoring or worse, worsening these problems puts these kids in danger. Whatever happens to them is on your hands.
I am currently an elementary school teacher in Indiana, and despite the conservative nature of the state, even my district would never allow this. Students should not be treated as if they will only be valued so long as they are heterosexual or white. They should be loved, supported, and encouraged to be who they are so that learning can occur. School is supposed to be a place where creativity and differences are appreciated, not suppressed. The choices being made are incredibly harmful and are absolutely repulsive. You cannot preach about respect when you clearly have none for the students who attend your schools. I am embarrassed and ashamed to be an alumni of such a close-minded institution. The kids are the first priority ALWAYS, NOT the parents.
As a psychologist, I see firsthand the negative impact policies like these have on students. We need schools and administrations that help students feel welcome and safe, and that teach them to navigate challenging conversations and topics. In today's climate, we need more open discussion and more safe spaces for students to explore different ideas and belief systems and to learn to do so respectfully. As a former student who could not come out due to the hostile environment towards LGBTQ+ members, I worry for the kids who are now a target of the current conservative agenda. This is not helping children, this is hurting them. Protect queer kids at all costs, many do not have parents who are willing to do so. The teachers who did make school a safe place during my time made a lasting impact in my life because they gave me hope that life would get better once I got out of there. I wasted years of my life pretending to be someone I was not, just so I could be safe. The school system should be a safe place for ALL children regardless of sexual orientation or gender identity.
Do better. The actions you've chosen are embarrassing and ultimately dangerous (especially to those who are LGBTQIA+). Nothing you're doing is creating a safer space, instead it is creating a hostile environment. Get rid of these bogus policies that nobody wants. Again, do better.
I beg of you to turn things around. When I moved back to CB 2 years ago, I was proud to have the opportunity to send my son to what was an amazing public school system. I'm now ashamed to say I'm a CB alum and lack confidence in the administration's ability to provide a healthy, safe and challenging academic environment for him. Your responsibility is not to your political views but to fostering a positive educational experience for all kids of all backgrounds and beliefs.
Do better. Your children, PA, America, and history are watching.
Why are we making it harder for students to feel included and understood? Don't they have it hard enough? I'm ashamed of what's going on. I'm ashamed to be a product of this school district these days.

Growing up, CBSD was a school district everyone longed to be in. Today we have students and their families moving out of the area to get away from the district. What happened? Do better.
Your efforts to ban books and hide content about differences in the human condition is utterly despicable. It's an embarrassment and a failure to progress your students on their educational journey to being fully realized, thinking adults.
The school board should be ashamed and maybe put some effort into supporting teachers instead of disrespecting students.
To the 6 far-right members and Dr. Lucabaugh, STOP revising/creating policies which are clearly discriminatory and not in our kids best interest. STOP spending our tax money on a public relations firm. STOP spending our tax money on a law firm who is clearly discriminatory. STOP having HATE groups and organizations create these policies. Having no empathy for the students you are supposed to fairly represent is despicable. As an alumna of CB elementary, middle, and high schools I am appalled by the sheer lack of respect given to these students, when I knew CB to be a respectful and caring community of schools and teachers. I am imploring all members of the school board to promote an inclusive and respectful environment in our schools for our most vulnerable students. Do better. I was proud to graduate from CB but the new-founded reputation of the district that the school board has promoted is disgraceful. You have angered and ostracized not only current students but masses of alumni. CB has always prioritized open minds, inclusivity, and kindness and it is imperative you reflect upon your disastrous impact on the students, community, and legacy of CB.
I am embarrassed to say I went to a CBSD school. You are a disgrace. Do better.
The CBSD school board is a disgrace to students and teachers everywhere.

CBSD did not make me gay or trans. I was born gay and trans, and when I went to CBSD, I was lucky enough to have teachers who could be supportive without fear of repercussions for doing what every good teacher does— love and care for their students, regardless of who they are or where they come from. The teachers I had at CBSD inspired me to become a teacher myself. At one point, I had wanted to return to this district to teach alongside the amazing staff and students I know still exist in our schools. I no longer feel safe doing so. The idea of my livelihood being at risk if students find out about my personal life or I am too outwardly supportive of those students exactly like me who go through our classrooms every day. We've all seen how you treated Mr. Burgess, and I don't think anyone doubts the same could happen to them. No one at CBSD has made any student queer, no matter how simple or easy it might be to think that way. Like me, like the kids who graduated a decade ago and will graduate a decade from now, there will always be queer kids. We can acknowledge and support those kids, or erase them into submission. How is it that I was in the district before same sex marriage was even legalized and had a better experience than students do now? It is essential to the mental health of youth to have queer safe spaces, especially when they spend so much time at school. It is 2023, so the fact that the district is back tracking on acceptance is actually creating a more toxic environment for youth to grow and discover. It is hard to concentrate on learning when a child is frightened to come to school everyday.</p>

In addition to the great points in this letter, I urge you to consider the long term economic impact your decisions will have on the CB area. Allowing a few far-right parents and board members to dictate curriculum (banning</p>

books and social topics etc as you have done so far) does nothing but diminish these students' educational enrichment. You are making it harder for CB students to achieve academically at the level necessary to compete with other students across the country to gain acceptance to good colleges and post-grad school programs. Limiting CB kids' access to higher education in turn limits the kinds of jobs and work they can get later on, diminishes their earning power, and ultimately will economically capsize the CB community in the future. I know so many fantastic history teachers who I had the privilege of learning from because of CB. This were teachers who made me want to become a historian and politician.

Some of these teachers have retired or just straight up left because of your ridiculous policies, while others are struggling. You say you want the best for your students. If you keep these policies up, no qualified would (or should for that matter) touch CBSD with a 10 foot poll.

My husband and I are both alumni of CBSD and have very fond memories of not only the education we received in the classroom there, but also the connections we made with others who to expanded our life experiences in the complex world where we would soon find ourselves as adults. To prepare students for successful and enriched lives outside of CBSD is to help them learn to navigate new or different ideas with curiosity, openness, and critical thinking; to avoid, punish, or forbid the threads in a fabric that don't fit into a certain ideology or norm is to rob the students of that fullest education: it fails them. As our families still live in the area, we had always had plans to move back to Doylestown, and as professionals with resources, this has been a realistic option. You all are scaring the students. This is making our school district look bad to everyone else in the country.

Only good can come from cultivating a gender-affirming culture and accepting environment for LGBTQ students. LGBTQ youth have a higher rate of suicidality and depression. This is in part due to issues of bullying and lack of acceptance. These policies only further discriminate and stigmatize. They will only increase the burden on LGBTQ students. Rejecting such policies will help improve these students health. And it's not hard to be gender affirming and accepting. You just have to care enough to do it.

This is not the same school district I proudly graduated from in 2018! Do better CBSD.

Heartbreaking to know that these wonderful teachers & allies are not free to support our queer students of CBSD.
As someone who finally felt comfortable coming out to my parents and friends in college, I really would have had a better high school experience if there were more allyship and support from my mentors. Kids should feel welcome and at home in a school environment because that should be the least of their worries, and rather than policing who someone is, maybe focus on the overarching academic curriculum and update it! When I left, there was the very beginnings of flexible learning and lunch with a larger opportunity for tutoring, but as my sister entered her last years in high school, my hopes for a better learning environment were dashed when I heard about what was going on! Recognize that CBSD students deserve more than you are capable of offering and concede your positions to those who actually take the initiative to learn and understand.
You guys let a pedophile teach choir at West for 30 years and didn't have a care in the world, but pride flags and respecting kids chosen names and pronouns are a problem? You're really out here showing where your priorities are at.
I was privileged to have an amazing liberal education at Central Bucks East with teachers who were not afraid to expose us to a variety of opinions and cultures while encouraging thoughtful and respectful conversation. It prepared me far beyond many students for college and graduate studies, as well as life in general. I am embarrassed and appalled by what I read and hear coming out of this district that took pride in being an educational leader when my brother and I were there. I am so glad that I got out of CB when I did. The board is not "protecting" anyone with their policies; they are doing the opposite. You are encouraging the discrimination of a marginalized group, enabling needless bullying and hatred towards vulnerable individuals. When you say that you have the best interests in mind, you really have the interests of your donors and yourselves. When you try to "protect" students, you are only encouraging them to keep a closed mind in a rapidly changing world, and to respond to anything that they don't understand with violence, contempt, and hatred.
Our school board must listen to its students. We are tired of the discrimination. Children are not slaves to parents. Being around openly queer people won't "convert" you.
I don't even recognize the schools and community I grew up in. I luckily live in an inclusive school district now. If I still lived in Central Bucks my children would certainly be at risk of stigma and harm from these policies. They do not represent the values of the community where my parents and so many friends still live. Please change course and protect our children from discrimination.
Please allow kids to read what will bring them comfort and hope, I assisted in barcoding much of Lenape Library in the 90's and know the value of good books. Please allow the same for the kids of today and tomorrow!
As a licensed psychologist, I am very aware of the negative impact that results from discriminating against LGBTQ+ individuals. These individuals have higher rates of depression and suicide largely because of not being understood and supported. Please do what is in the best interest of the students, and do not be swayed by politics.
You do not represent me and you are ruining the school district. We need to support all children. My tax dollars shouldn't go to support intolerance and the cost to defend resulting civil rights law suits.
I will forever be thankful that you were not in charge while I was in this district. I am appalled at the harm you are causing and the ignorance you are encouraging. You should be ashamed of yourselves for ruining the reputation of what used to be a well respected school district.
Please stop this discriminatory behavior.
If the point is to cause long-term damage CBSD, you're going a fine job.

No words may be given in service of this disgrace prior to compromising one's humanity. The lives of all CBSD students—emphatically including queer lives—must be safeguarded; however, your impolitic determination to engender life-threatening bigotry obliterates this essential promise to these students and indeed to the very state of education today. I urge you to listen to the prevalent and resounding voices of our community. I urge you to heed Decency befitting an institution of learning.
When I was matriculating, CBE was a gold standard of learning. Censoring books is what totalitarian regimes do.
I am a non-binary East grad, class of '02, that protested the anti-LGBT policies by electing not to walk at '02 graduation. As a high school teacher myself I am dismayed by the discrimination rampant in the district, worse than when I was in school twenty years ago.

CBSD board, for a moment, imagine it is your child who is LGBTQ--born that way- how would you want your child to be treated at school, a place they are required to attend?
I am ashamed of how the school board is treating students in central bucks. I used to be proud to have gone to such a high caliber public school, but not any more. Public health education should be safe for every child, no matter what. Also, banning books? Ignorance is the antithesis of education. CBSD is NOT leading the way- at this rate our schools will be falling behind.
Please stop hurting the students.
I am a teacher. I loved the majority of my teachers at CB West while I was a student, they supported me through a difficult time in my life. I was a lonely, gay teenager with unsupportive parents and my teachers made me feel safe. I would have been thrilled to be their colleague. Not anymore. I will never work in CBSD because I am so disgusted by your behavior, and I will say the same to any of my fellow young teachers who want to know what the district is like.
This recent behavior by our school board members is abhorrent. You should be ashamed of yourselves. I now have a masters degree in Counseling Psychology with a specialization in Social Justice & Advocacy. I can say with confidence that you are doing irreparable harm to your students. THEY are who matter here!! Not stupid political division and angry bigoted parents. DO BETTER!
Y'all should be ashamed of yourselves. School must be a safe place where all students are comfortable to be themselves and are encouraged to learn about difficult topics. Classrooms should foster acceptance for others and encourage students to think critically. Classroom discourse on current social, political, and partisan matters is imperative to the development of well-informed citizens who will yield the next generation of voters. Students must be exposed to a variety of opinions in controlled environments which provide the full historical and social contexts. It is critical to allow teachers to lead conversations that highlight the racial, systemic, and social disparities, as well as allow students to read publications that offer a variety of opinions. Marginalized groups deserve to see themselves represented in text and deserve a support network within their schools. Lastly, Pride flags are not a political sign. A Pride flag in a classroom does nothing to detract from the education students are receiving; a pride flag in the classroom may be the only thing that makes some students feel safe- even if it is only for 45 minutes. A pride flag may be the only reason a student chooses to reach out for help if they are in mental distress. A pride flag might be the only support they have. Did you know that 82% of transgender individuals have considered killing themselves? What about that 40% have actually tried? Students who feel like they belong at school or have peer support experience a statistically significant decrease in suicidal ideations and attempts. These actions and this policy are quite frankly blood on your hands. Do better by your students and teachers.
I'm the daughter of a former board member as well as a former CBSD teacher. Would love for CB to go back to leading the way and being a place all people want to send their kids to...not a district that caters to a small group of people who do not want diversity of students and thoughts in the schools.
Be better.

As an English teacher for over 30 years at CB West, you are the most reprehensible and misguided group to ever sit on the board and the tax payer dollars you have spent could have helped the less fortunate students in our district.
