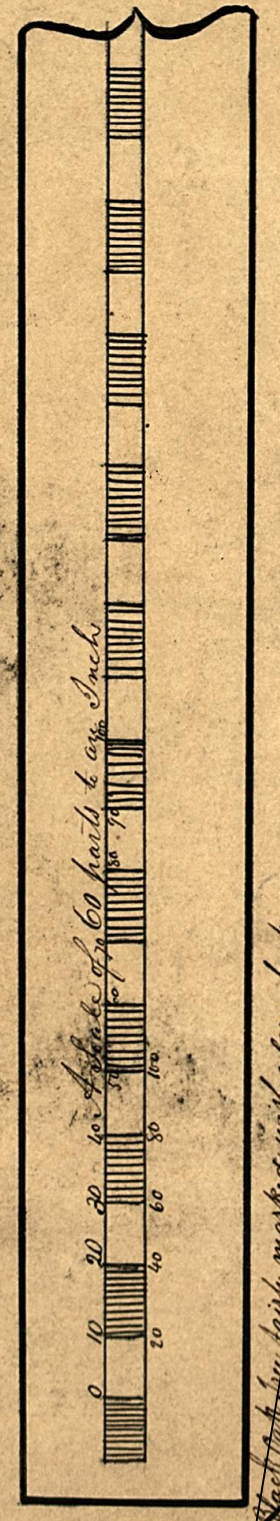


A Plan of the Lands now in the Possession of the Mohican Indian Tribe

A note on the margin states that the map was made by the Mohican Indians and is a copy of the original map made by them in 1764.



The above is a Plan of the Lands reserved and requested by the General Assembly of the Colony of Connecticut, for the Sale and Improvement of the Mohican Indian Tribe, showing it by me the subscriber with the Assistance of two Charmer and Books, viz: Amosiah West of Winsted in the County of New-Haven, and Princes of the Massachusetts Bay; and four others of respect in the County of Middlebury; at the special request of one of the Commissioners appointed by the General Assembly of the Colony of Connecticut to inspect the Indian Affairs at Mohican, and report that the title of the above Tract of Land is good for Planting, Mowing, and Pasturing; and contains between four and five Hundred Acres as appears above, as well as wood, accumulated with timber and good upon a fair River called and known by the Name of New-Haven River adjoining with Plains, Great and Small, other parts of the County to be taken by the Indians and contributing much to their Subsistence which Land is held in on Trading Cove Brook. It is of an Area belonging to the English Proprietors, Surveyed and measured the 7th 8th 9th of September 1736 and produced by the above state of 600 Acres or thereabouts.
