IPSWICH LOCAL NEWS message

The Ipswich Local News had another successful year in 2022. There were a number of welcome developments for the organization.

It was our third full calendar year of operation, and we couldn't have gotten to this point without the community's support. Although we receive revenue from advertising, it only covers part of our operating budget. Donations are essential. They also are a barometer that allows us to, in part, measure the impact we have on the community.

We intentionally set up the newspaper as a nonprofit to protect it from the predations of uncaring corporate owners and to help maintain it as community-centered organization. We take our charge seriously — even when we appear to have a lot of fun doing so.

Financially, we are on a good footing, but as we are a young organization, we are not yet funding our full costs. Although we finished the year with a surplus of \$41,087, this reflects a conservative budget that does not fulfill our potential and the hard work and dedication of our core staff and interns.

However, we still need to work on making the organization more sustainable. For example, it is a challenge to hire staff when we cannot offer health insurance or competitive wages. That will require extra attention to fundraising.

Although it looks like our total income was down for 2022, the previous year's total was skewed by the inclusion of a one-time donation of \$70,000 from the late Bill Wasserman. His contribution is to be used to defray reporting expenses.

Bill's grant allowed us to hire interns for the summer. It was particularly gratifying to see two of those interns go on to win journalism awards at the annual New England Newspaper & Press Association competition. Ella Niederhelman, a rising high school senior, won for a personality profile, while Tristan Ashlock, a journalism student at Salem State University, won for historical reporting.

As 2022 was the first year we entered the competition, we were very pleased to be recognized with seven awards.

Another notable achievement for 2022 was the in-depth reporting we offered on large issues affecting the community, including the Waldingfield Road development, water scarcity, and town elections.

We sincerely believe we are making a positive impact in the community. That belief is shared by the many residents when they sit down to send us a donation along with a card or short note of encouragement.

With the support of our readers and the community, we continue to build a sustainable and enduring local news organization.

IPSWICH LOCAL NEWS financial summary

Ipswich Local News ended its 2022 fiscal year with a net surplus of \$41,087; this compares to \$127,000 in 2021. Revenue from all sources totaled \$414,321, while expenses were \$373,234.

As shown in the charts below, our primary expenses are content/wage related. ILN runs a lean operation, focused on delivering a weekly paper at our lowest possible cost.

Ipswich Local News is supported through advertising revenue at \$261,586, which was up from \$246,000 in 2021. Fundraising campaigns raised \$127,339 in 2022. We are extremely grateful for every gift received, as they go directly to support our mission to educate the public about local issues and events that affect them.

Ipswich Local News is also the recipient of grant funding, primary from matching gifts in response to NewsMatch, a fundraising program supported by major journalism funders. 2022's grant of \$16,487 was received for donations given in our fall 2021 fundraising drive.

The support we received from our new donors meant we qualified for additional bonuses over and above the original \$15,000 in matching funds.

TOTAL REVENUE 2022:



TOTAL EXPENSES 2022: \$373,234






