

Session Descriptions

1.A What's New With Minnows and Native Fish

This session covers two topics where the DNR is working collaboratively with the public on new ways of thinking about fisheries issues. Minnesota's native "rough" fish are important ecologically and recreationally, but some have been undervalued and left unprotected, leading to concerns of overfishing and waste. Minnesota needs a high-quality, home-grown minnow supply, and work is underway to ensure a sustainable future for this economic and recreational resource. This session will cover updates, including recommendations being made to the legislature, and invite attendees to share what's important to them.

1.B What's New With Elk, Deer and Moose

Significant work is happening with big game management. This session will cover work to restore elk to northeast Minnesota and implement large-scale moose habitat improvements, as well as elements of the Deer Plan and its upcoming mid-plan review.

1.C Protecting Minnesota's Shorelines

Minnesota is the land of 11,842 treasured lakes. About half of the natural shoreline on these lakes has been lost and shorelines continue to be altered. This session highlights the Natural Shorelines Partnership and its efforts to share information and coordinate on shoreline issues to protect and restore water quality, ecosystems and habitat. Participants will discuss specific actions that can be taken to protect and improve Minnesota's natural shorelines.

2.A Climate Change and Minnesota's Fisheries

Climate change is impacting Minnesota's fisheries through rising water temperatures, heavier rains and warmer winters. These impacts will: alter fish communities, populations, and habitat; affect water quality and quantity; and reduce beneficial winterkills. This session will cover research and management updates and engage attendees in a conversation about what climate change impacts mean for them.

2.B WMA and AMA Planning for Fish and Wildlife

Wildlife Management Areas (WMA) and Aquatic Management Areas (AMA) provide over 1.3 million acres and 770 shoreland miles of habitat and fish and wildlife focused recreation across the state. This session will provide an update on planning efforts for the largest WMAs and the initiative to develop a system plan for all other WMAs and AMAs statewide. The discussion will focus on opportunities to involve partners and stakeholders to ensure these lands continue to serve Minnesotans into the future.

2.C Revising Our State Wildlife Action Plan

The State Wildlife Action Plan (SWAP) is a 10-year conservation blueprint aimed at preserving wildlife diversity, with a focus on species that are rare, declining or vulnerable to decline. The DNR is collaborating with scientists, conservationists, private landowners and members of the public to update our SWAP. In this session, DNR staff will describe how the updated SWAP will be a centerpiece in wildlife conservation and engage participants in a conversation about ongoing revisions.

2.D Minnesota's New Invasive Carp Action Plan

The Minnesota Invasive Carp Action Plan aims to prevent or limit the impact these species may have on Minnesota waters. Recently the DNR, together with stakeholders and partners, completed a structured decision-making process to evaluate numerous invasive carp management methods and inform updates to the plan. This session will provide participants an opportunity to learn about the new plan and discuss how the plan will be used to guide prevention and management efforts in Minnesota waters.
