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METHODOLOGY

The Glengariff Group, Inc. conducted a Michigan statewide survey of November 2024 likely general election voters. The 600 sample, live operator telephone survey was conducted on January 2-6, 2024 and has a margin of error of +/-4.0% with a 95% level of confidence. 14% of respondents were contacted via landline telephone. 86% of respondents were contacted via cell phone telephone. This survey was commissioned by WDIV Local 4 News and the Detroit News.

KEY FINDINGS

Lay of the Land

* By a margin of 18.5%-70.6%, Michigan voters believe the nation is sharply on the wrong track. These numbers have been consistent dating back to the 2022 election period and remain unchanged.

* Michigan voters, however, believe the state is on the right track. By a margin of 45.3%-39.7%, Michigan voters have moved to the right track – a sharp departure from the national right track/wrong track numbers.

Motivation to Vote at 9.2 - Consistent with 2018, 2020 and 2022 Turnout Levels

* Voters were asked on a one-to-ten scale how motivated there were to vote in the November 2024 election. The higher the score, the greater the motivation to vote. Michigan voters are now motivated to vote at a 9.2 on a 10.0-point scale.

The chart below compares this motivation with October 2012, 2014, 2016, 2018 and 2022 levels.

* The chart below compares motivation levels from January 2022 to January 2024 showing very similar levels of motivation in January of both election years.

^{* 18-29} year-old voters are motivated at an 8.4 on a 10.0-point scale. This compares to 7.9 in January 2022 and 9.0 in January 2020.

Economy Overriding Concern Heading into 2024 Election

* Respondents were asked in an open-ended question, what single issue would most influence how they voted this election.

Topping the list was jobs and the economy. Border security came in second place. Inflation and the cost of living has moved into third. [All responses generating more than 3.0% are listed below.]

Democrats Lead on Generic Ballot Test 37.4%-34.7% -- A 2.7% Margin

- * Respondents were asked if the election for US Senate were held today, would they vote for the Democratic candidate or the Republican candidate.
 - Democrats hold a 2.7% lead on the generic ballot test at 37.4% Democratic to 34.7% Republican. 23.5% of respondents said it would depend on the candidate.
- * We continue to see similar demographic dynamics as with the 2018, 2020 and 2022 election on the generic ballot test.
- * Independent voters choose Democrats by a margin of 19.8%-9.5% -- a ten-point margin. But typically, 58.6% of independent voters said it would depend on the candidate.
 - Men choose a generic Republican by nearly a 12 point margin at 42.1% GOP to 30.5% Democrat. While women choose the generic Democrat by a 16-point margin at 43.8% Democrat to 27.8% Republican.
 - Non-college voters are split at 33.9% Republican to 33.0% Democrat, with 27.9% undecided. College voters move to Democrats at 43.2% Democrat to 36.0% Republican, with 17.2% undecided.
- * While it is a small cell size, one of the sharp departures in the generic ballot test is that 18-29 year-old voters are now split between the two parties at 33.3% Democrat to 33.3% Republican, with 31.3% undecided.

Whitmer Numbers Strengthening; Job Approval Now Stands at 60.5%

* Voters view Gretchen Whitmer favorably by a margin of 49.8% favorable to 34.4% unfavorable. Her unfavorable numbers have dropped to their lowest level since she was elected in 2018.

Independent voters have a favorable view of Gretchen Whitmer 47.4%-20.7%. Even 24.2% of Leaning Republican voters view her favorably – consistent with poll findings from the 2022 election.

* By a margin of 60.5% approve to 34.6% disapprove, Michigan voters now give Governor Whitmer her highest job approval of her administration.

* 67.3% of independent voters approve of Governor Whitmer's performance. But the strengthening of these numbers is also due to Republican voters – with 40.3% of Leaning Republican voters and 14.7% of Strong Republican voters now approving of her performance.

- * Whitmer's job approval in out-state Michigan is 52.4%-43.4%. *Whitmer's job approval in Metro Detroit is a whopping* 70.0%-24.3%.
- * Whitmer's job approval among women is 64.6%-29.4%. Her job approval among men is 56.2%-40.1%.

Trump Favorables Underwater

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* Donald Trump is viewed unfavorably by Michigan voters with 37.5% favorable to 47.8% unfavorable. 13.9% have no opinion of him.

Independent voters view him unfavorably at 33.6%-41.4% -- but not by a wide margin.

* Non college voters narrowly view Donald Trump favorably at 45.3%-41.0%. College voters view Donald Trump sharply unfavorably at 26.8% favorable to 56.8% unfavorable.

- * Men view him favorably at 45.5%-39.4%. But women view him sharply unfavorably at 30.0% favorable to 55.6% unfavorable.
- * The 47.8% of voters who view him unfavorably were asked why in an open-ended question. All responses generating above 3.0% are listed below.

Biden More Unpopular Than Trump

* Joe Biden is viewed unfavorably by Michigan voters with only 28.8% favorable to 57.7% unfavorable.

Only 13.8% of independent voters view Joe Biden favorably while 65.5% view him unfavorably. 25.1% of Leaning Democratic voters and 18.5% of Strong Democratic voters view Joe Biden unfavorably.

- * Men view Joe Biden unfavorably 23.3%-63.7%. Women also view Joe Biden unfavorably 33.9%-52.1%.
- * The 57.7% of voters that view Joe Biden unfavorably were asked why in an open-ended question. All responses generating at least 3.0% are listed below. The overwhelming opposition to Joe Biden centers around his age and mental fitness for office.

Biden Job Approval Deeply Underwater

* Michigan voters strongly disapprove of Joe Biden's performance as President with only 35.4% approval to 60.6% disapproval. Perhaps most importantly, **49.9% of Michigan voters STRONGLY DISAPPROVE of Joe Biden's performance as President.**

Even among Strong Democratic voters where approval is 77.4%-18.4% -- only 31.8% strongly approve of his performance while 45.6% somewhat approve. Among Biden's most important base voters – he receives only tempered support for his performance.

Among Independent voters, Biden's job approval stands at a dismal 25.8%-68.1%.

- * Biden's performance is viewed negatively by both men and women. Men disapprove by a margin of 31.1%-66.4%. Women disapprove by a margin of 39.3%-55.2%.
- * There is a direct correlation to Biden's job approval and age with younger voters sharply more negative than older voters.

Trump Re-Elect at 32.6%

* For the first time in more than 100 years, American voters face the prospect of two Presidents running against each other. We asked voters if Donald Trump deserved to be re-elected or was it time to give someone else a chance to do better.

Only 32.6% of Michigan voters believe Donald Trump should be re-elected President with 62.3% saying it is time to give someone else a chance to do better. Elected officials with a re-elect below 50% are viewed as vulnerable with officials below 40% viewed as very vulnerable.

By a 2-1 margin, independent voters believe someone should be elected versus re-electing Donald Trump. 41.9% of Leaning Republicans and 24.9% of Strong Republicans believe someone new should be elected.

Biden Re-Elect at 16.7% -- Lowest in Modern Michigan Political History

* When asked of Joe Biden deserves re-election or if was time to give someone else a chance to do better, <u>only 16.7% of Michigan voters believe Joe Biden deserves re-election -- the lowest re-elect number of a major public official in modern Michigan political history.</u>

Only 41.5% of Strong Democratic voters say Joe Biden deserves re-election compared to 46.7% that say it is time to give someone else a chance to do better. This number is among Joe Biden's strongest base of supporters.

Joe Biden's re-elect among independent voters is a staggering 6.9% - 84.5%.

- * Every single demographic group we looked at said it was time to give someone new a chance to do better.
- * The numbers are particularly stark based on age where younger voters have completely abandoned Joe Biden.

Plurality Supports Impeachment Investigation into Biden

* Respondents were asked if they support or oppose the House of Representatives beginning an impeachment investigation into Joe Biden. [Note: The question is not about impeachment, it is about an impeachment investigation.]

By a margin of 48.0%-40.7%, Michigan voters support the US House beginning an impeachment investigation. 11.2% of voters are undecided.

34.0% STRONGLY SUPPORT an investigation. 31.6% STRONGLY OPPOSE an investigation.

* Independent voters support the investigation by a 2-1 margin at 56.0%-28.5%. Even 30.5% of Leaning Democratic voters support the investigation.

Only 36.7% of Voters Satisfied With Choices

* Respondents were asked if they were satisfied or unsatisfied with their current choices for President.

Only 36.7% of voters are satisfied with 48.6% of voters unsatisfied. Only Strong Republican voters are satisfied with their choices.

- * Reviewing only those voters that are VERY UNSATISFIED with their choices:
 - 14.4% of Trump voters are very unsatisfied.
 - 25.2% of Biden voters are very unsatisfied.
 - 37.2% of Undecided voters are very unsatisfied.
 - 60.0% of those voting for a third party are very unsatisfied.
 - 31.9% of independent voters are VERY UNSATISFIED with their choice.

Trump Begins with 8.2% Lead; Trump Lead Increases With Inclusion of Third Parties

* In a direct head to head matchup, Donald Trump leads Joe Biden 46.8%-38.6% -- a lead of 8.2%. 3.3% cite a specific other candidate they will vote for. 11.2% of voters are undecided.

Donald Trump leads among independent voters by a margin of 44.0%-19.8% -- a 24.2% lead. 26.7% of independent voters remain undecided.

- * Among voters aged 18-29, Donald Trump leads 47.9%-35.4% with 5.2% citing a specific other candidate and 11.5% remaining undecided.
- * Donald Trump leads among men by a margin of 54.1%-32.9%, with 11.3% undecided. Joe Biden leads among women 44.1%-40.5%, with 11.2% undecided.

36.0% of Voters Say They Are At Least Somewhat Likely to Support Third Party – 8.1% Say They Are Very Likely

- * Respondents were asked how likely they were to support a third-party candidate that is not the Republican or Democratic nominee for President. A total of 36.0% of voters said they were at least somewhat likely, with 8.1% of voters saying they were VERY LIKELY. 57.2% said they were not likely to support a third party candidate. 6.8% of voters simply did not know.
- * The greatest percentage of voters by party affiliation that are VERY LIKELY to support a third-party candidate were independent voters at 18.1% and leaning Democratic voters at 10.9%. Even 8.2% of Strong Democratic voters said they are VERY LIKELY to support a third-party candidate compared to only 1.1% of Strong Republican voters.

* But the greatest percentage of voters overall that are VERY LIKELY to support a third-party candidate are voters under 40. 13.5% of voters under 40 are VERY LIKELY to support a third-party alternative.

With Third Parties, Trump Lead Grows to Double Digits

* When Jill Stein (Green), Lars Mapstead (Libertarian) and Joe Manchin (No Labels) are added to the ballot test Donald Trump leads Joe Biden by 11.2% -- with Biden drawing only 31.1% of voters.

Joe Biden loses 7.5% points while Donald Trump loses 4.5% points when third party options are included.

- * Jill Stein presents a major problem for Joe Biden winning 9.2% of Strong Democratic voters. Stein wins 14.6% of voters aged 18-29 and 7.7% of voters aged 30-39.
- * In another ballot test Trump and Biden are challenged by Jill Stein (Green), Lars Mapstead (Libertarian) and Liz Cheney (No Labels.). Donald Trump takes a 12.3% lead over Joe Biden who falls to only 28.9% of the vote.

- * Jill Stein continues to draw support from younger Democratic voters. But Liz Cheney wins 21.7% of Leaning Democratic voters and 17.2% of independent voters.
- * Even in a multi-candidate field, Donald Trump consistently gets 41-42% of the total vote. Voters for third party candidates peel the vote away from Joe Biden making the race a bigger uphill climb for him.

Haley Leads Biden by Ten Points

* In a direct head-to-head matchup, Nikki Haley leads Joe Biden by a margin of 44.3%-34.3%. 6.1% of voters name a third candidate. 15.4% of voters were undecided. [Trump led in a direct matchup by 8.2%.]

Haley leads Biden among independent voters by a margin of 49.1%-15.5%.

- * Nikki Haley leads among voters aged 18-29 by a margin of 42.7%-29.2%.
- * Men would support Haley by a margin of 48.6%-30.5%. Women would support Haley by a margin of 40.2%-37.7%.

Newsom Cuts Trump Lead to Four Points

* In a direct head-to-head matchup, Donald Trump leads Gavin Newsom by a margin of 44.5%-40.0%. 2.8% of voters name a third party candidate. 12.7% of voters were undecided. Newsom cuts Trump's lead on Biden in half and nearly moves the race within the margin of error.

* While Biden and Newsom get comparable numbers among Democratic voters, Newsome gets 24.1% of Independent voters compared to 19.7% for Biden. Biden gets just 4.8% of Leaning Republican voters while Newsom would get 16.2% from Leaning Republicans.

Whitmer Leads Trump by 5 Points – Approaches 50% Mark

* <u>In a direct head-to-head matchup, Gretchen Whitmer leads Donald Trump by a margin of 49.4%-44.7%. 1.2% of voters choose a third-party candidate</u>. 4.8% of voters remain undecided.

Whitmer would start with a 10.8%-point advantage above Joe Biden's best numbers with the numbers looking very similar to her 2022 re-election campaign.

* Whitmer would have rock solid Democratic support. She would hold an eight-point lead among Independent voters. And she would continue to attract 16.0% of the vote from Leaning Republican voters.

Whitmer would nullify a third-party threat among Democratic and Independent voters.

Trump's Narrow Range; Democrats Wide Range

- * One consistent throughout the ballot tests is that Trump trades in a very narrow range of support from 41.2% in a multicandidate field to a high of 46.8% in a direct matchup with Biden.
- * As Biden showed in 2020, Donald Trump has a low ceiling and a high basement. Meaning, he will get a consistent level of votes in a narrow range.
- * Democrats, on the other hand, move from a low of 28.9% for Biden in a multi-candidate field (with Liz Cheney in the race) to 49.4% with Gretchen Whitmer as the nominee.
- * Support for Donald Trump will not peel off. Support for a Democratic nominee will vary wildly based on the nominee and their ability to consolidate Democrats and win Independent voters.

Potential Trump Conviction Would Have Limited Impact on Voters

* Respondents were asked if a potential criminal conviction of Donald Trump would make them more likely to vote for him, less likely to vote for him, or would it make no difference to their vote.

Among voters that plan to vote for Donald Trump:

- 12.0% would be less likely to vote for him.
- 11.7% are not sure how it would impact them.
- 14.3% would be more likely to vote for him.
- 62.0% said it would have no influence on them.

So only 11.7% said it would make them less likely and a combined 26.0% of Trump voters said there was even the possibility that it might have some impact on them. [Note: That does not mean they would vote against Donald Trump, it means the conviction might have some impact on them that made them think twice.]

* The real impact would be on undecided voters where 36.8% of undecided voters said it would make them less likely to vote for him with only 4.4% undecided. 55.9% said it would have no influence on them.

* The combined numbers indicate that any potential criminal conviction of Donald Trump might have a marginal impact on his numbers – but not enough to shift the Michigan vote to Joe Biden in the current environment.

Majority of Michigan Voters Want Trump Qualifications Left to Voters

* By a margin of 57.7%-38.8%, respondents say Michigan voters should have the final say about Donald Trump's involvement with the US Capitol riot on January 6, 2021 versus the US Supreme Court disqualifying him from the ballot.

While Democratic voters support the Supreme Court disqualifying him, independent and Republican voters overwhelmingly believe it should be left up to voters.

* Hill Harper begins the election year with 14.0% name identification breaking 5.6% favorable to 2.3% unfavorable. 6.1% of voters have heard of Harper but have no opinion. 85.0% of voters have not heard of Hill Harper.

Among Strong Democratic voters that create the base for a Democratic primary election, Harper has 22.6% name identification breaking favorably 10.8%-2.6%.

Craig, Rogers, Meijer Similarly Positioned with Name Identification; Pensler Far Behind

- * James Craig begins the election year with 38.3% name identification breaking 10.1% favorable to 8.9% unfavorable. 19.3% of voters have heard of Craig but have no opinion. 60.2% of voters have not heard of James Craig.
 - Among Strong Republican voters that create the base for a Republican primary election, Craig has 38.4% name identification breaking 18.6%-1.7%.
- * Peter Meijer begins the election year with 35.4% name identification breaking 7.8% favorable to 7.9% unfavorable. 19.7% of voters have heard of Meijer but have no opinion of him. 63.6% of voters have not heard of Peter Meijer.
 - Among Strong Republican voters that create the base of a Republican primary election, Meijer has 34.4% name identification breaking 6.2% favorable to 12.4% unfavorable.
- * Mike Rogers begins the election year with 31.6% name identification breaking 7.3% favorable to 3.8% unfavorable. 20.5% of voters have heard of Rogers but have no opinion of him. 66.9% of voters have never heard of Rogers.
 - Among Strong Republican voters that create the base of a Republican primary election, Rogers has 31.7% name identification breaking 11.9% favorable to 2.3% unfavorable.
- * Sandy Pensler begins far behind the other top GOP candidate with only 14.6% name identification breaking 3.0% favorable to 1.5% unfavorable. 10.1% have heard of Pensler but have no opinion of him. 85.0% of voters have never heard of Pensler.
 - Among Strong Republican voters that create the base of a Republican primary election, Pensler has virtually no name identification at only 13.6% breaking 1.7% favorable to 1.7% unfavorable.

US Senate Race Begins as a Classic Michigan Tossup

- * As mentioned earlier, in a generic ballot test for the US Senate race, Democrats hold a very narrow lead of 37.4%-34.7%, with 23.5% of voters saying it depends on the candidate or undecided.
- * When Elissa Slotkin, the top Democratic candidate, is paired against the top three Republican candidates, the race begins as a dead heat tossup.

- * James Craig leads Elissa Slotkin 37.8%-35.5% with a large 26.8% of voters remaining undecided.
 - Craig holds a narrow lead among independent voters at 25.9%-20.7%, with the majority 53.4% remaining undecided.
- * Elissa Slotkin and Mike Rogers are tied at 37.5% Slotkin to 37.1% for Rogers, with 25.1% undecided.
- * And Elissa Slotkin and Peter Meijer are essentially tied with Slotkin at 36.3% and Meijer at 35.7%, with 27.9% undecided.
- * The Michigan US Senate race looks like a typical 'race to the middle' in Michigan with each of three potential Republican challengers getting from 83-85% of the GOP vote. While Elissa Slotkin takes 83-85% of the Democratic vote. The battle for this seat will be among Michigan's independent, centrist voters.

Plurality Says Israel Has Gone Too Far in Gaza; But Say US Reaction Has Been Right
