We're contacting you in reference to the FOIPA request number included in the subject line of this email. The FBI located approximately 2,664 pages potentially responsive to your request. In your request, you were willing to pay \$50.00 for processing.

Requests are processed in the order in which they are received through our multi-track processing system:

Small track requests (0-50 pages) current average time is approximately 4 months to complete;

Medium track requests (51-500 pages) current average time is approximately 35 months to complete;

Large track requests (501-4,999 pages) current average time is approximately 55 months to complete; and

Extra-large track requests (over 5,000 pages) current average time is approximately 77 months to complete.

The current average time to complete your large track request is at least 55 months. Dear Sir/Madam, and members of the FBI FOIA Negotiation Team,

Please accept this on behalf of my client, J. Dale Shoemaker, individually and in his capacity as reporter for Investigative Post, as our formal position with regard to the FBI's response to Mr. Shoemaker's request for records made pursuant to the Freedom of Information Act ("FOIA"), request no. 1585416.

On my review of the correspondence below, it is clear that Mr. Shoemaker's request was sufficiently clear to permit the FBI to locate responsive records. Specifically, "approximately 2,664 pages potentially responsive" to Mr. Shoemaker's request have been identified. Thus, there does not appear to be any issue with the request itself. Rather, the sole issue appears to revolve around the timing of production. In that regard, you have advised that given the volume of potentially responsive pages, Mr. Shoemaker's FOIA request falls into the category of a "large track request" (i.e., "500 - 4,999 pages") which, you have advised, take, on average, approximately 55 months – or nearly 4.6 years – to complete.

It is our position that 55 months is patently unacceptable as a time line for processing the request and producing responsive records.

Respectfully, this issue – i.e., the reasonableness of the length of time required by the FBI to process a FOIA request, review potentially responsive pages, and produce such records – has been considered by several courts. In this regard, I direct your attention to the District Court's decision in *Seavey v. DOJ*, 266 F.Supp.3d 241 (D.D.C., July 20, 2017)(copy attached). In *Seavey*, the plaintiff-requestor (Nina Seavey), a documentary film-maker and academic, submitted numerous FOIA requests to the FBI seeking historical records concerning about individuals, organizations, events, publications, and file numbers relating to the FBI's role in the anti-war movement in St. Louis in the 1960s and 1970s. Those FOIA requests included one made on March 3, 2015, in which she submitted a particularly large request for records to pertaining to hundreds of individuals and organizations, etc. While the FBI on March 23, 2015, acknowledged Ms. Seavey's request, it did little else to respond other than assigning a tracking number. Frustrated, Ms. Seavey brought suit on August 12, 2015 arguing that the FBI had failed to timely respond to her March 3 FOIA request; in that context, she sought an order seeking the processing and production of 5,000 pages per month until the request was complete. In response, the FBI argued that in accordance with its internal policies and procedures, it should have to process no more than 500 pages per month. (In this regard, it is observed that the projected timeline

you have currently provided, i.e., 55 months to process up to 4,999 pages works out to be approximately 90 pages per month; assuming the FBI were to take the full 55 months to process 2,664 pages, that would result in a glacial review pace of 48.4 pages per month, or less than one-tenth of that proposed by the FBI in the *Seavey* matter.) As of May 31, 2017 (i.e., just over two years after the request had been made), the FBI had processed 7,574 pages (i.e., three times the total number of pages at issue in this case). While the FBI at that point identified approximately 151,500 pages of responsive records remaining to be reviewed, the parties were able to narrow that to 102,385 pages. On the proposed processing timelines (i.e., plaintiff's request for 5000 pages per month versus the FBI's request for 500 pages per month), the Court noted that production of the 102,385 pages under the FBI's proposal would take 201 months (as opposed to 21 months under Ms. Seavey's proposal).

Suffice it to say that the Court in Seavey did not take kindly to the FBI's position. After going through a thorough analysis of FOIA, the Court concluded that while the statute does not include a set timeline for the actual production of records (as opposed to making a "determination" as to the request, which must be done within 20 working days), FOIA requires that agency records be made "promptly available." See Seavey, 266 F.Supp.3d at 244. To be sure, the Court noted, while an agency is entitled to "some additional time to physically redact, duplicate, or assemble for production the documents that it has already gathered and decided to produce," the time frame for such, while context dependent, would "typically be within days or a few weeks of a 'determination,' not months or years." Seavey, 266 F.Supp.3d at 244. Since FOIA is silent as to the exact amount of time an agency may have or need to review and produce records, the Court noted it was empowered to use its "equitable powers to require the agency to process documents according to a court-imposed timeline" and that "filn devising a remedy the Court is mindful that 'unreasonable delays in disclosing non-exempt documents violate the intent and purpose of the FOIA, and the courts have a duty to prevent [such] abuses." Seavey, 266 F.Supp.3d at 244, 245, citing Clemente v. Fed. Bureau of Investigation, 71 F. Supp. 3d 262, 269 (D.D.C. 2014). In that regard, the FBI in Seavey argued (as you have here) that it should be permitted to stick to the status quo and process the request in accordance with its standard policy, assigning the request to the appropriate queue based on the volume of potentially responsive pages. Specifically, and as noted above, the FBI's policy as stated in Seavey was to process "large" requests at 500 pages per month, which it did (using that metric in this case, it is noted, would yield a full production in 5 months, not 55 months as currently proposed.) That, the Court noted, would result in a total processing time of almost 17 years. Seavey, 266 F.Supp.3d at 246. The Court rejected the FBI's position, noting there was no evidence to justify the proposed processing time, and that merely reciting the general policy and procedure was patently insufficient to justify a production rate of 500 pages per month. Accordingly, the FBI was ordered to process and produce records at a rate of not less than 2,850 pages per month. Seavey, 266 F.Supp.3d at 248.

Other courts have routinely directed the review and production of responsive documents at rates of between 500 – 5,000 pages per month. See, e.g., *ACLU v United States Dept. of Homeland Sec.*, 2021 US Dist LEXIS 227089, at *4 (SDNY Nov. 19, 2021)(500 pages per month reasonable)); *Clemente v. Fed. Bureau of Investigation*, 71 F. Supp. 3d 262, 269 (D.D.C. 2014) (5,000 pages per month reasonable); *Villanueva v United States DOJ*, 2021 US Dist LEXIS 237920, at *9 (SD Fla Dec. 13, 2021) (ordering review and production of 5,125 pages per month); *Middle E. Forum v United States Dept. of Homeland Sec.*, 297 F Supp 3d 183, 187 (DDC 2018)(500 pages per month)); *Project S. v United States Immigration & Customs Enforcement*, 2022 US Dist LEXIS 120162, at *5 (SDNY July 7, 2022)(requiring ICE to process 500 pages per month). The FBI's proposed processing rate in this case, i.e., an effective rate of less than 50 pages per month, is thus wholly unacceptable. Given the state of the law, we are confident that a court of competent jurisdiction would agree. (In that regard, please be advised that my clients reserve all rights with respect thereto.)

We hope that, in light of the foregoing, the FBI is willing to review and reconsider its previously stated position that it could take up to 55 months to review and produce the requested records. By all accounts – and based on the prevailing legal authority – it is our position that the requested records should be made available within, **at most**, the next several months (if not within the next month).

I appreciate the update and the commitment to production on a rolling basis and to "push it along" (although, admittedly, I'm not quite sure what that means).

Your message, however, is vague as to two critical issues: (1) how long (approximately) until the case actually gets assigned to a FOIA analyst; and (2) once the case is assigned to the analyst, will the review and production be consistent with what I outlined is our expectation?

From your response, it is hard to tell what my client should expect. For example, based on your email it appears entirely possible that the matter could be assigned to a FOIA analyst next week and, assuming a processing rate of 500-1000 pages per month, a full production could be had within several months. That would be a most welcome (and appreciated) example of pushing it along. However, I have to allow that it is also entirely possible that the matter may not be assigned until sometime later this year (or possibly next year, or perhaps beyond depending on volume) and will then only be processed at a rate of 50-100 pages per month, resulting in a full production taking several years (or more).

This, of course, takes us right back to where we started, and the question I posed earlier: is the FBI willing and able to process my client's request in such a manner that my client can count on having the documents in hand within the next several months? Or are we back to the original estimate of large track requests taking on average 55 months to process?

I appreciate your time and consideration of the matter, and would like to provide my client with more clarity in this regard

However, I have to allow that it is also entirely possible that the matter may not be assigned until sometime later this year (or possibly next year, or perhaps beyond depending on volume) and will then only be processed at a rate of 50-100 pages per month, resulting in a full production taking several years (or more).

This, of course, takes us right back to where we started, and the question I posed earlier: is the FBI willing and able to process my client's request in such a manner that my client can count on having the documents in hand within the next several months? Or are we back to the original estimate of large track requests taking on average 55 months to process?

I appreciate your time and consideration of the matter, and would like to provide my client with more clarity in this regard

Dear Sir/Madam, and members of the FBI FOIA Negotiation Team,

Please accept this on behalf of my client, J. Dale Shoemaker, individually and in his capacity as reporter for Investigative Post, as our formal position with regard to the FBI's response to Mr. Shoemaker's request for records made pursuant to the Freedom of Information Act ("FOIA"), request no. 1585416.

On my review of the correspondence below, it is clear that Mr. Shoemaker's request was sufficiently clear to permit the FBI to locate responsive records. Specifically, "approximately 2,664 pages potentially responsive" to Mr. Shoemaker's request have been identified. Thus, there does not appear to be any issue with the request itself. Rather, the sole issue appears to revolve around the timing of production. In that regard, you have advised that given the volume of potentially responsive pages, Mr. Shoemaker's FOIA request falls into the category of a "large track request" (i.e., "500 - 4,999 pages") which, you have advised, take, on average, approximately 55 months – or nearly 4.6 years – to complete.

It is our position that 55 months is patently unacceptable as a time line for processing the request and producing responsive records.

Respectfully, this issue – i.e., the reasonableness of the length of time required by the FBI to process a FOIA request, review potentially responsive pages, and produce such records – has been considered by several courts. In this regard, I direct your attention to the District Court's decision in Seavey v. DOJ, 266 F.Supp.3d 241 (D.D.C., July 20, 2017)(copy attached). In Seavey, the plaintiff-requestor (Nina Seavey), a documentary film-maker and academic, submitted numerous FOIA requests to the FBI seeking historical records concerning about individuals, organizations, events, publications, and file numbers relating to the FBI's role in the anti-war movement in St. Louis in the 1960s and 1970s. Those FOIA requests included one made on March 3, 2015, in which she submitted a particularly large request for records to pertaining to hundreds of individuals and organizations, etc. While the FBI on March 23, 2015, acknowledged Ms. Seavey's request, it did little else to respond other than assigning a tracking number. Frustrated, Ms. Seavey brought suit on August 12, 2015 arguing that the FBI had failed to timely respond to her March 3 FOIA request; in that context, she sought an order seeking the processing and production of 5,000 pages per month until the request was complete. In response, the FBI argued that in accordance with its internal policies and procedures, it should have to process no more than 500 pages per month. (In this regard, it is observed that the projected timeline you have currently provided, i.e., 55 months to process up to 4,999 pages works out to be approximately 90 pages per month; assuming the FBI were to take the full 55 months to process 2,664 pages, that would result in a glacial review pace of 48.4 pages per month, or less than one-tenth of that proposed by the FBI in the Seavey matter.) As of May 31, 2017 (i.e., just over two years after the request had been made), the FBI had processed 7,574 pages (i.e., three times the total number of pages at issue in this case). While the FBI at that point identified approximately 151,500 pages of responsive records remaining to be reviewed, the parties were able to narrow that to 102,385 pages. On the proposed processing timelines (i.e., plaintiff's request for 5000 pages per month versus the FBI's request for 500 pages per month), the Court noted that production of the 102,385 pages under the FBI's proposal would take 201 months (as opposed to 21 months under Ms. Seavey's proposal).

Suffice it to say that the Court in Seavey did not take kindly to the FBI's position. After going through a thorough analysis of FOIA, the Court concluded that while the statute does not include a set timeline for the actual production of records (as opposed to making a "determination" as to the request, which must be done within 20 working days), FOIA requires that agency records be made "promptly available." See Seavey, 266 F.Supp.3d at 244. To be sure, the Court noted, while an agency is entitled to "some additional time to physically redact, duplicate, or assemble for production the documents that it has already gathered and decided to produce," the time frame for such, while context dependent, would "typically be within days or a few weeks of a 'determination,' not months or years." Seavey, 266 F.Supp.3d at 244. Since FOIA is silent as to the exact amount of time an agency may have or need to review and produce records, the Court noted it was empowered to use its "equitable powers to require the agency to process documents according to a court-imposed timeline" and that "[i]n devising a remedy the Court is mindful that 'unreasonable delays in disclosing non-exempt documents violate the intent and purpose of the FOIA, and the courts have a duty to prevent [such] abuses." Seavey, 266 F.Supp.3d at 244, 245, citing Clemente v. Fed. Bureau of Investigation, 71 F. Supp. 3d 262, 269 (D.D.C. 2014). In that regard, the FBI in Seavey argued (as you have here) that it should be permitted to stick to the status quo and process the request in accordance with its standard policy,

assigning the request to the appropriate queue based on the volume of potentially responsive pages. Specifically, and as noted above, the FBI's policy as stated in *Seavey* was to process "large" requests at 500 pages per month, which it did (using that metric in this case, it is noted, would yield a full production in 5 months, not 55 months as currently proposed.) That, the Court noted, would result in a total processing time of almost 17 years. *Seavey*, 266 F.Supp.3d at 246. The Court rejected the FBI's position, noting there was no evidence to justify the proposed processing time, and that merely reciting the general policy and procedure was patently insufficient to justify a production rate of 500 pages per month. Accordingly, the FBI was ordered to process and produce records at a rate of not less than 2,850 pages per month. *Seavey*, 266 F.Supp.3d at 248.

Other courts have routinely directed the review and production of responsive documents at rates of between 500 – 5,000 pages per month. See, e.g., *ACLU v United States Dept. of Homeland Sec.*, 2021 US Dist LEXIS 227089, at *4 (SDNY Nov. 19, 2021)(500 pages per month reasonable)); *Clemente v. Fed. Bureau of Investigation*, 71 F. Supp. 3d 262, 269 (D.D.C. 2014) (5,000 pages per month reasonable); *Villanueva v United States DOJ*, 2021 US Dist LEXIS 237920, at *9 (SD Fla Dec. 13, 2021) (ordering review and production of 5,125 pages per month); *Middle E. Forum v United States Dept. of Homeland Sec.*, 297 F Supp 3d 183, 187 (DDC 2018)(500 pages per month)); *Project S. v United States Immigration & Customs Enforcement*, 2022 US Dist LEXIS 120162, at *5 (SDNY July 7, 2022)(requiring ICE to process 500 pages per month). The FBl's proposed processing rate in this case, i.e., an effective rate of less than 50 pages per month, is thus wholly unacceptable. Given the state of the law, we are confident that a court of competent jurisdiction would agree. (In that regard, please be advised that my clients reserve all rights with respect thereto.)

We hope that, in light of the foregoing, the FBI is willing to review and reconsider its previously stated position that it could take up to 55 months to review and produce the requested records. By all accounts – and based on the prevailing legal authority – it is our position that the requested records should be made available within, **at most**, the next several months (if not within the next month).

I appreciate the update and the commitment to production on a rolling basis and to "push it along" (although, admittedly, I'm not quite sure what that means).

Your message, however, is vague as to two critical issues: (1) how long (approximately) until the case actually gets assigned to a FOIA analyst; and (2) once the case is assigned to the analyst, will the review and production be consistent with what I outlined is our expectation?

From your response, it is hard to tell what my client should expect. For example, based on your email it appears entirely possible that the matter could be assigned to a FOIA analyst next week and, assuming a processing rate of 500-1000 pages per month, a full production could be had within several months. That would be a most welcome (and appreciated) example of pushing it along. However, I have to allow that it is also entirely possible that the matter may not be assigned until sometime later this year (or possibly next year, or perhaps beyond depending on volume) and will then only be processed at a rate of 50-100 pages per month, resulting in a full production taking several years (or more).

This, of course, takes us right back to where we started, and the question I posed earlier: is the FBI willing and able to process my client's request in such a manner that my client can count on having the documents in hand within the next several months? Or are we back to the original estimate of large track requests taking on average 55 months to process?

I appreciate your time and consideration of the matter, and would like to provide my client with more clarity in this regard

Dear Sir/Madam, and members of the FBI FOIA Negotiation Team,

Please accept this on behalf of my client, J. Dale Shoemaker, individually and in his capacity as reporter for Investigative Post, as our formal position with regard to the FBI's response to Mr. Shoemaker's request for records made pursuant to the Freedom of Information Act ("FOIA"), request no. 1585416.

On my review of the correspondence below, it is clear that Mr. Shoemaker's request was sufficiently clear to permit the FBI to locate responsive records. Specifically, "approximately 2,664 pages potentially responsive" to Mr. Shoemaker's request have been identified. Thus, there does not appear to be any issue with the request itself. Rather, the sole issue appears to revolve around the timing of production. In that regard, you have advised that given the volume of potentially responsive pages, Mr. Shoemaker's FOIA request falls into the category of a "large track request" (i.e., "500 - 4,999 pages") which, you have advised, take, on average, approximately 55 months – or nearly 4.6 years – to complete.

It is our position that 55 months is patently unacceptable as a time line for processing the request and producing responsive records.

Respectfully, this issue – i.e., the reasonableness of the length of time required by the FBI to process a FOIA request, review potentially responsive pages, and produce such records – has been considered by several courts. In this regard, I direct your attention to the District Court's decision in Seavey v. DOJ, 266 F.Supp.3d 241 (D.D.C., July 20, 2017)(copy attached). In Seavey, the plaintiff-requestor (Nina Seavey), a documentary film-maker and academic, submitted numerous FOIA requests to the FBI seeking historical records concerning about individuals, organizations, events, publications, and file numbers relating to the FBI's role in the anti-war movement in St. Louis in the 1960s and 1970s. Those FOIA requests included one made on March 3, 2015, in which she submitted a particularly large request for records to pertaining to hundreds of individuals and organizations, etc. While the FBI on March 23, 2015, acknowledged Ms. Seavey's request, it did little else to respond other than assigning a tracking number. Frustrated, Ms. Seavey brought suit on August 12, 2015 arguing that the FBI had failed to timely respond to her March 3 FOIA request; in that context, she sought an order seeking the processing and production of 5,000 pages per month until the request was complete. In response, the FBI argued that in accordance with its internal policies and procedures, it should have to process no more than 500 pages per month. (In this regard, it is observed that the projected timeline you have currently provided, i.e., 55 months to process up to 4,999 pages works out to be approximately 90 pages per month; assuming the FBI were to take the full 55 months to process 2,664 pages, that would result in a glacial review pace of 48.4 pages per month, or less than one-tenth of that proposed by the FBI in the Seavey matter.) As of May 31, 2017 (i.e., just over two years after the request had been made), the FBI had processed 7,574 pages (i.e., three times the total number of pages at issue in this case). While the FBI at that point identified approximately 151,500 pages of responsive records remaining to be reviewed, the parties were able to narrow that to 102,385 pages. On the proposed processing timelines (i.e., plaintiff's request for 5000 pages per month versus the FBI's request for 500 pages per month), the Court noted that production of the 102,385 pages under the FBI's proposal would take 201 months (as opposed to 21 months under Ms. Seavey's proposal).

Suffice it to say that the Court in Seavey did not take kindly to the FBI's position. After going through a thorough analysis of FOIA, the Court concluded that while the statute does not include a set timeline for the actual production of records (as opposed to making a "determination" as to the request, which must be done within 20 working days), FOIA requires that agency records be made "promptly available." See Seavey, 266 F.Supp.3d at 244. To be sure, the Court noted, while an agency is entitled to "some additional time to physically redact, duplicate, or assemble for production the documents that it has already gathered and decided to produce," the time frame for such, while context dependent, would "typically be within days or a few weeks of a 'determination,' not months or years." Seavey, 266 F.Supp.3d at 244. Since FOIA is silent as to the exact amount of time an agency may have or need to review and produce records, the Court noted it was empowered to use its "equitable powers to require the agency to process documents according to a court-imposed timeline" and that "[i]n devising a remedy the Court is mindful that 'unreasonable delays in disclosing non-exempt documents violate the intent and purpose of the FOIA, and the courts have a duty to prevent [such] abuses." Seavey, 266 F.Supp.3d at 244, 245, citing Clemente v. Fed. Bureau of Investigation, 71 F. Supp. 3d 262, 269 (D.D.C. 2014). In that regard, the FBI in Seavey argued (as you have here) that it should be permitted to stick to the status quo and process the request in accordance with its standard policy,

assigning the request to the appropriate queue based on the volume of potentially responsive pages. Specifically, and as noted above, the FBI's policy as stated in *Seavey* was to process "large" requests at 500 pages per month, which it did (using that metric in this case, it is noted, would yield a full production in 5 months, not 55 months as currently proposed.) That, the Court noted, would result in a total processing time of almost 17 years. *Seavey*, 266 F.Supp.3d at 246. The Court rejected the FBI's position, noting there was no evidence to justify the proposed processing time, and that merely reciting the general policy and procedure was patently insufficient to justify a production rate of 500 pages per month. Accordingly, the FBI was ordered to process and produce records at a rate of not less than 2,850 pages per month. *Seavey*, 266 F.Supp.3d at 248.

Other courts have routinely directed the review and production of responsive documents at rates of between 500 – 5,000 pages per month. See, e.g., *ACLU v United States Dept. of Homeland Sec.*, 2021 US Dist LEXIS 227089, at *4 (SDNY Nov. 19, 2021)(500 pages per month reasonable)); *Clemente v. Fed. Bureau of Investigation*, 71 F. Supp. 3d 262, 269 (D.D.C. 2014) (5,000 pages per month reasonable); *Villanueva v United States DOJ*, 2021 US Dist LEXIS 237920, at *9 (SD Fla Dec. 13, 2021) (ordering review and production of 5,125 pages per month); *Middle E. Forum v United States Dept. of Homeland Sec.*, 297 F Supp 3d 183, 187 (DDC 2018)(500 pages per month)); *Project S. v United States Immigration & Customs Enforcement*, 2022 US Dist LEXIS 120162, at *5 (SDNY July 7, 2022)(requiring ICE to process 500 pages per month). The FBl's proposed processing rate in this case, i.e., an effective rate of less than 50 pages per month, is thus wholly unacceptable. Given the state of the law, we are confident that a court of competent jurisdiction would agree. (In that regard, please be advised that my clients reserve all rights with respect thereto.)

We hope that, in light of the foregoing, the FBI is willing to review and reconsider its previously stated position that it could take up to 55 months to review and produce the requested records. By all accounts – and based on the prevailing legal authority – it is our position that the requested records should be made available within, **at most**, the next several months (if not within the next month).

Please advise.



Your message, however, is vague as to two critical issues: (1) how long (approximately) until the case actually gets assigned to a FOIA analyst; and (2) once the case is assigned to the analyst, will the review and production be consistent with what I outlined is our expectation?

From your response, it is hard to tell what my client should expect. For example, based on your email it appears entirely possible that the matter could be assigned to a FOIA analyst next week and, assuming a processing rate of 500-1000 pages per month, a full production could be had within several months. That would be a most welcome (and appreciated) example of pushing it along. However, I have to allow that it is also entirely possible that the matter may not be assigned until sometime later this year (or possibly next year, or perhaps beyond depending on volume) and will then only be processed at a rate of 50-100 pages per month, resulting in a full production taking several years (or more).

This, of course, takes us right back to where we started, and the question I posed earlier: is the FBI willing and able to process my client's request in such a manner that my client can count on having the documents in hand within the next several months? Or are we back to the original estimate of large track requests taking on average 55 months to process?

I appreciate your time and consideration of the matter, and would like to provide my client with more clarity in this regard

Dear Sir/Madam, and members of the FBI FOIA Negotiation Team,

Please accept this on behalf of my client, J. Dale Shoemaker, individually and in his capacity as reporter for Investigative Post, as our formal position with regard to the FBI's response to Mr. Shoemaker's request for records made pursuant to the Freedom of Information Act ("FOIA"), request no. 1585416.

On my review of the correspondence below, it is clear that Mr. Shoemaker's request was sufficiently clear to permit the FBI to locate responsive records. Specifically, "approximately 2,664 pages potentially responsive" to Mr. Shoemaker's request have been identified. Thus, there does not appear to be any issue with the request itself. Rather, the sole issue appears to revolve around the timing of production. In that regard, you have advised that given the volume of potentially responsive pages, Mr. Shoemaker's FOIA request falls into the category of a "large track request" (i.e., "500 - 4,999 pages") which, you have advised, take, on average, approximately 55 months – or nearly 4.6 years – to complete.

It is our position that 55 months is patently unacceptable as a time line for processing the request and producing responsive records.

Respectfully, this issue – i.e., the reasonableness of the length of time required by the FBI to process a FOIA request, review potentially responsive pages, and produce such records – has been considered by several courts. In this regard, I direct your attention to the District Court's decision in *Seavey v. DOJ*, 266 F.Supp.3d 241 (D.D.C., July 20, 2017)(copy attached). In *Seavey*, the plaintiff-requestor (Nina Seavey), a documentary film-maker and academic, submitted numerous FOIA requests to the FBI seeking historical records concerning about individuals, organizations, events, publications, and file numbers relating to the FBI's role in the anti-war movement in St. Louis in the 1960s and 1970s. Those FOIA requests included one made on March 3, 2015, in which she submitted a particularly large request for records to pertaining to hundreds of individuals and organizations, etc. While the FBI

on March 23, 2015, acknowledged Ms. Seavey's request, it did little else to respond other than assigning a tracking number. Frustrated, Ms. Seavey brought suit on August 12, 2015 arguing that the FBI had failed to timely respond to her March 3 FOIA request; in that context, she sought an order seeking the processing and production of 5,000 pages per month until the request was complete. In response, the FBI argued that in accordance with its internal policies and procedures, it should have to process no more than 500 pages per month. (In this regard, it is observed that the projected timeline you have currently provided, i.e., 55 months to process up to 4,999 pages works out to be approximately 90 pages per month; assuming the FBI were to take the full 55 months to process 2,664 pages, that would result in a glacial review pace of 48.4 pages per month, or less than one-tenth of that proposed by the FBI in the *Seavey* matter.) As of May 31, 2017 (i.e., just over two years after the request had been made), the FBI had processed 7,574 pages (i.e., three times the total number of pages at issue in this case). While the FBI at that point identified approximately 151,500 pages of responsive records remaining to be reviewed, the parties were able to narrow that to 102,385 pages. On the proposed processing timelines (i.e., plaintiff's request for 5000 pages per month), the Court noted that production of the 102,385 pages under the FBI's proposal would take 201 months (as opposed to 21 months under Ms. Seavey's proposal).

Suffice it to say that the Court in Seavey did not take kindly to the FBI's position. After going through a thorough analysis of FOIA, the Court concluded that while the statute does not include a set timeline for the actual production of records (as opposed to making a "determination" as to the request, which must be done within 20 working days), FOIA requires that agency records be made "promptly available." See Seavey, 266 F.Supp.3d at 244. To be sure, the Court noted, while an agency is entitled to "some additional time to physically redact, duplicate, or assemble for production the documents that it has already gathered and decided to produce," the time frame for such, while context dependent, would "typically be within days or a few weeks of a 'determination,' not months or years." Seavey, 266 F.Supp.3d at 244. Since FOIA is silent as to the exact amount of time an agency may have or need to review and produce records, the Court noted it was empowered to use its "equitable powers to require the agency to process documents according to a court-imposed timeline" and that "[i]n devising a remedy the Court is mindful that 'unreasonable delays in disclosing non-exempt documents violate the intent and purpose of the FOIA, and the courts have a duty to prevent [such] abuses." Seavey, 266 F.Supp.3d at 244, 245, citing Clemente v. Fed. Bureau of Investigation, 71 F. Supp. 3d 262, 269 (D.D.C. 2014). In that regard, the FBI in Seavey argued (as you have here) that it should be permitted to stick to the status guo and process the request in accordance with its standard policy, assigning the request to the appropriate queue based on the volume of potentially responsive pages. Specifically, and as noted above, the FBI's policy as stated in Seavey was to process "large" requests at 500 pages per month, which it did (using that metric in this case, it is noted, would yield a full production in 5 months, not 55 months as currently proposed.) That, the Court noted, would result in a total processing time of almost 17 years. Seavey, 266 F.Supp.3d at 246. The Court rejected the FBI's position, noting there was no evidence to justify the proposed processing time, and that merely reciting the general policy and procedure was patently insufficient to justify a production rate of 500 pages per month. Accordingly, the FBI was ordered to process and produce records at a rate of not less than 2,850 pages per month. Seavey, 266 F.Supp.3d at 248.

Other courts have routinely directed the review and production of responsive documents at rates of between 500 – 5,000 pages per month. See, e.g., *ACLU v United States Dept. of Homeland Sec.*, 2021 US Dist LEXIS 227089, at *4 (SDNY Nov. 19, 2021)(500 pages per month reasonable)); *Clemente v. Fed. Bureau of Investigation*, 71 F. Supp. 3d 262, 269 (D.D.C. 2014) (5,000 pages per month reasonable); *Villanueva v United States DOJ*, 2021 US Dist LEXIS 237920, at *9 (SD Fla Dec. 13, 2021) (ordering review and production of 5,125 pages per month); *Middle E. Forum v United States Dept. of Homeland Sec.*, 297 F Supp 3d 183, 187 (DDC 2018)(500 pages per month)); *Project S. v United States Immigration & Customs Enforcement*, 2022 US Dist LEXIS 120162, at *5 (SDNY July 7, 2022)(requiring ICE to process 500 pages per month). The FBI's proposed processing rate in this case, i.e., an effective rate of less than 50 pages per month, is thus wholly unacceptable. Given the state of the law, we are confident that a court of competent jurisdiction would agree. (In that regard, please be advised that my clients reserve all rights with respect thereto.)

We hope that, in light of the foregoing, the FBI is willing to review and reconsider its previously stated position that it could take up to 55 months to review and produce the requested records. By all accounts – and based on the prevailing legal authority – it is our position that the requested records should be made available within, **at most**,

the next several months (if not within	the next month).



Thank you -

I appreciate the update and the commitment to production on a rolling basis and to "push it along" (although, admittedly, I'm not quite sure what that means).

Your message, however, is vague as to two critical issues: (1) how long (approximately) until the case actually gets assigned to a FOIA analyst; and (2) once the case is assigned to the analyst, will the review and production be consistent with what I outlined is our expectation?

From your response, it is hard to tell what my client should expect. For example, based on your email it appears entirely possible that the matter could be assigned to a FOIA analyst next week and, assuming a processing rate of 500-1000 pages per month, a full production could be had within several months. That would be a most welcome (and appreciated) example of pushing it along. However, I have to allow that it is also entirely possible that the matter may not be assigned until sometime later this year (or possibly next year, or perhaps beyond depending on volume) and will then only be processed at a rate of 50-100 pages per month, resulting in a full production taking several years (or more).

This, of course, takes us right back to where we started, and the question I posed earlier: is the FBI willing and able to process my client's request in such a manner that my client can count on having the documents in hand within the next several months? Or are we back to the original estimate of large track requests taking on average 55 months to process?

I appreciate your time and consideration of the matter, and would like to provide my client with more clarity in this regard

Dear Sir/Madam, and members of the FBI FOIA Negotiation Team,

Please accept this on behalf of my client, J. Dale Shoemaker, individually and in his capacity as reporter for Investigative Post, as our formal position with regard to the FBI's response to Mr. Shoemaker's request for records made pursuant to the Freedom of Information Act ("FOIA"), request no. 1585416.

On my review of the correspondence below, it is clear that Mr. Shoemaker's request was sufficiently clear to permit the FBI to locate responsive records. Specifically, "approximately 2,664 pages potentially responsive" to Mr. Shoemaker's request have been identified. Thus, there does not appear to be any issue with the request itself. Rather, the sole issue appears to revolve around the timing of production. In that regard, you have advised that given the volume of potentially responsive pages, Mr. Shoemaker's FOIA request falls into the category of a "large track request" (i.e., "500 - 4,999 pages") which, you have advised, take, on average, approximately 55 months – or nearly 4.6 years – to complete.

It is our position that 55 months is patently unacceptable as a time line for processing the request and producing responsive records.

Respectfully, this issue – i.e., the reasonableness of the length of time required by the FBI to process a FOIA request, review potentially responsive pages, and produce such records - has been considered by several courts. In this regard, I direct your attention to the District Court's decision in Seavey v. DOJ, 266 F.Supp.3d 241 (D.D.C., July 20, 2017)(copy attached). In Seavey, the plaintiff-requestor (Nina Seavey), a documentary filmmaker and academic, submitted numerous FOIA requests to the FBI seeking historical records concerning about individuals, organizations, events, publications, and file numbers relating to the FBI's role in the anti-war movement in St. Louis in the 1960s and 1970s. Those FOIA requests included one made on March 3, 2015, in which she submitted a particularly large request for records to pertaining to hundreds of individuals and organizations, etc. While the FBI on March 23, 2015, acknowledged Ms. Seavey's request, it did little else to respond other than assigning a tracking number. Frustrated, Ms. Seavey brought suit on August 12, 2015 arguing that the FBI had failed to timely respond to her March 3 FOIA request; in that context, she sought an order seeking the processing and production of 5,000 pages per month until the request was complete. In response, the FBI argued that in accordance with its internal policies and procedures, it should have to process no more than 500 pages per month. (In this regard, it is observed that the projected timeline you have currently provided, i.e., 55 months to process up to 4,999 pages works out to be approximately 90 pages per month; assuming the FBI were to take the full 55 months to process 2,664 pages, that would result in a glacial review pace of 48.4 pages per month, or less than one-tenth of that proposed by the FBI in the Seavey matter.) As of May 31, 2017 (i.e., just over two years after the request had been made), the FBI had processed 7,574 pages (i.e., three times the total number of pages at issue in this case). While the FBI at that point identified approximately 151,500 pages of responsive records remaining to be reviewed, the parties were able to narrow that to 102,385 pages. On the proposed processing timelines (i.e., plaintiff's request for 5000 pages per month versus the FBI's request for 500 pages per month), the Court noted that production of the 102,385 pages under the FBI's proposal would take 201 months (as opposed to 21 months under Ms. Seavey's proposal).

Suffice it to say that the Court in Seavey did not take kindly to the FBI's position. After going through a thorough analysis of FOIA, the Court concluded that while the statute does not include a set timeline for the actual production of records (as opposed to making a "determination" as to the request, which must be done within 20 working days), FOIA requires that agency records be made "promptly available." See Seavey, 266 F.Supp.3d at 244. To be sure, the Court noted, while an agency is entitled to "some additional time to physically redact, duplicate, or assemble for production the documents that it has already gathered and decided to produce," the time frame for such, while context dependent, would "typically be within days or a few weeks of a 'determination,' not months or years." Seavey, 266 F.Supp.3d at 244. Since FOIA is silent as to the exact amount of time an agency may have or need to review and produce records, the Court noted it was empowered to use its "equitable powers to require the agency to process documents according to a court-imposed timeline" and that "[i]n devising a remedy the Court is mindful that 'unreasonable delays in disclosing nonexempt documents violate the intent and purpose of the FOIA, and the courts have a duty to prevent [such] abuses." Seavey, 266 F.Supp.3d at 244, 245, citing Clemente v. Fed. Bureau of Investigation, 71 F. Supp. 3d 262, 269 (D.D.C. 2014). In that regard, the FBI in Seavey argued (as you have here) that it should be permitted to stick to the status quo and process the request in accordance with its standard policy, assigning the request to the appropriate queue based on the volume of potentially responsive pages. Specifically, and as noted above, the FBI's policy as stated in Seavey was to process "large" requests at 500 pages per month, which it did (using that metric in this case, it is noted, would yield a full production in 5 months, not 55 months as currently proposed.) That, the Court noted, would result in a total processing time of almost 17 years. Seavey, 266 F.Supp.3d at 246. The Court rejected the FBI's position, noting there was no evidence to justify the proposed processing time, and that merely reciting the general policy and procedure was patently insufficient to justify a production rate of 500 pages per month. Accordingly, the FBI was ordered to process and produce records at a rate of not less than 2,850 pages per month. Seavey, 266 F.Supp.3d at 248.

Other courts have routinely directed the review and production of responsive documents at rates of between 500 – 5,000 pages per month. See, e.g., *ACLU v United States Dept. of Homeland Sec.*, 2021 US Dist LEXIS 227089, at *4 (SDNY Nov. 19, 2021)(500 pages per month reasonable)); *Clemente v. Fed. Bureau of Investigation*, 71 F. Supp. 3d 262, 269 (D.D.C. 2014) (5,000 pages per month reasonable); *Villanueva v United States DOJ*, 2021 US Dist LEXIS 237920, at *9 (SD Fla Dec. 13, 2021) (ordering review and production of 5,125 pages per month); *Middle E. Forum v United States Dept. of Homeland Sec.*, 297 F Supp 3d 183, 187 (DDC 2018)(500 pages per month)); *Project S. v United States Immigration & Customs Enforcement*, 2022 US Dist

LEXIS 120162, at *5 (SDNY July 7, 2022)(requiring ICE to process 500 pages per month). The FBI's proposed processing rate in this case, i.e., an effective rate of less than 50 pages per month, is thus wholly unacceptable. Given the state of the law, we are confident that a court of competent jurisdiction would agree. (In that regard, please be advised that my clients reserve all rights with respect thereto.)

We hope that, in light of the foregoing, the FBI is willing to review and reconsider its previously stated position that it could take up to 55 months to review and produce the requested records. By all accounts – and based on the prevailing legal authority – it is our position that the requested records should be made available within, **at most**, the next several months (if not within the next month).

Please advise.

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
