Subject: Weekly High-Level Climate Advocacy Update - July 6, 2020

Below is the weekly high-level update of climate policy advocacy and related matters.

- Call with Steve Pacala
- Stout and Ellis talked with him last Thursday
- Topic was Princeton CMI net zero work
- Will recommend infrastructure program to advance net zero policies with emphasis on CCUS – building “backbone” of pipelines to transport carbon from emitters to the Permian and Gulf Coast sites
- Highlights the importance of CCUS policy clarity in Texas
- See bullet below about Texas.

- Jesse Jenkins of Princeton should be our principal contact on this
- We will schedule a briefing for us (you, me, JP, others, perhaps Lawler) to talk about Princeton net zero work and project
- I talked with Botley about Lawler's participation – recommended that Lawler participate, Botley agrees
- London (Liz Rogers and others) want a more technical discussion with Princeton. Question is whether we want to combine that conversation with a U.S.-focused conversation (I think not). You and I should discuss.

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- Remember that other potential business opportunities are Illinois / Indiana (Graves and Wortham are working this) and North Dakota (Nazminia is leading but not much to do now, as the legal framework is already in place).

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- Purple Strategies is kicking off its research program, including in-depth interviews and targeted polling and should have results before the end of the month.
- We are trading documents with our partner in the business coalition, The Energy Foundation, on roles and responsibilities.

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- bp if-asked statement and Q&A's attached.
- Houston climate plan
- As of Monday, the City of Houston and bp have a tentative agreement in place.
- Now awaiting signatures from both sides – Mayor Turner and William Lin – which is likely to take place later this week.
- Once signed, agreement will go to Houston City Council for final approval at a July 22 meeting (though it could first go public on July 16-17, when the Council agenda is first published).
- After Council has approved, the City of Houston and bp will issue a joint press release and further amplify news in our own channels and with key stakeholders as appropriate.
- The four-year MOU calls for bp to make a \$2M grant to the City to help with implementation of the City's Climate Action Plan.

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- Annual Harvard / Tufts symposium
- Tufts is the policy lead for NAS climate policy report that will be released in November
- Working with Princeton on this
- Symposium will be in November and will be virtual – probably early week of Thanksgiving
- Dates are being confirmed with Dev
- Stout is in the lead in planning – Mogstad project managing this
- Audience is bp internal only with people from Harvard and Tufts
- Draft agenda will be available in next 2 – 3 weeks
- CFTC Climate Report
- CFTC Market Risk Advisory Committee will meet July 21
- Will receive an update from the Climate Risk Sub-Committee (Bob Litterman, founder of Kepos Capital and formerly of Goldman Sachs, is chair)
- Report release date still undetermined
- Environmental Partnership annual report will be released July 15 (attached)
- Highlights
 - Wide industry participation – 83 companies participate in TEP
 - Leak detection
 - There has been huge growth in the program and there has been only a small number of leaks found.
 - Pneumatic Controllers
 - High-bleed pneumatics were “low hanging fruit” for the program and it has been very successful.
 - There are now very few high-bleed apparatus being changed out as there aren't many left in service.
 - 43 companies have reported to TEP that they don't have high bleed controllers anymore.
 - Flaring
 - While TEP does not yet have a flaring performance program, Devon is chairing the working group to develop one.

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
