John W. Hancock Heads Western Oil Association

· Elected to Succeed Charles S. Jones Jan. 1 Lists Four Major Problems Facing Industry

John W. Hancock, president of the Hancock Oil Co., has been elected president of the Western Oil and Gas Association, it was announced yesterday. He will take office Jan. 1.

Hancock will succeed Charles S. Jones, president of the Richfield Oil Corp., as head of the association which represents principal producers, refiners and distributors of petroleum products in the West.

Lists Major Problems

Hancock listed what he be-lieves the four most important problems facing the industry in the West:

One is the necessity of making clear that the oil industry has reduced its con-tribution to the Los Angeles smog problem to a point where it may be classed as minor

A second is the need for elimination of direct Federal controls on the production of natural gas so that adequate supplies of that fuel can be made available at a reasonable

natural gas so that adequate supplies of that fuel can be made available at a reasonable price.

The third is the orderly, proper and equitable development of California offshore petroleum reserves to meet the increasing demands for these products and to provide additional revenues for the State.

Depletion Allowances
And the fourth is the retention of historical depletion allowance for all natural resources, which encourages development and risk taking so that supplies and reserves will be available for both peacetime and defense purposes. Wallace, vice-president, Western Gulf Oil Co., treasurer, and Felix Chappellet, association vice-president and general manager.
