I appreciate the value events like this bring to the Border Security mission as well as supporting the needs of all Agencies that work to secure the Homeland, better known as the United States of America. I also appreciate the invitation to speak here in my new position as the Director of the Federal Law Enforcement Training Centers (FLETC).

Today, I want to share with you the evolution of training at FLETC and our commitment to seeking cutting-edge solutions for training law enforcement personnel.

As many of you know, FLETC has four training sites. Our headquarters is located at Glynco, GA – and our other domestic training sites are at Artesia, NM – Charleston, S.C., and Cheltenham, M.D.

FLETC serves as an interagency law enforcement training organization, partnering with 127 federal agencies and organizations such as the U.S. Marshal's Service, Bureau of Prisons, TSA, and Pentagon Force Protection Agency, to name a few, and, of course, there's also my former DHS component agency, the US Customs and Border Protection.

However, FLETC's reach extends beyond federal agencies. We provide training to state, local, tribal, and campus law enforcement departments throughout the United States. Additionally, we collaborate with

international law enforcement agencies, exporting FLETC training worldwide.

A few examples of our US exports, and we are really good at these, include:

- 1. Active Threat Training Program
- 2. Human Trafficking Awareness Training Program, and
- 3. Tactical Medical Training Program

Since 1970, we've trained over 1.7 million students, with 67,000 graduating just last year.

 - I have a broad outlook and understanding of what makes
 FLETC work and makes FLETC the nation's premier law
 enforcement training enterprise.
 - It's safe to say that I'm still here working, in yet another position with a nexus to the border and national security because, I'm invested in protecting America. And what

better place to work than where it all begins at FLETC and the basic training academies.

FLETC's Mission

- This valuable partnership helps FLETC better understand their specific needs.

- As a career-long provider of law enforcement training,
 FLETC supports more than 800 diverse program
 offerings. FLETC's training programs are categorized
 based on the intended audience from entry-level to
 experienced.
- These programs include:
- The Center Integrated Basic programs that involve both FLETC and agency instruction. An example is U.S. Customs and Border Protection's Officer Basic Training.
- FLETC also has three flagship Center Basic training programs, which are mission-centered and attended by many agencies.
- One of the three programs is the:
 - o Uniformed Police Training Program (UPTP)

Some examples of partners that attend are:

- o U.S. Secret Service Uniform Division
- o Federal Protective Service
- o Capitol Police, and

o U.S. Park Police

The next program is FLETC's:

o Criminal Investigator Training Program (CITP)

Some examples of agencies that attend are:

- U.S. Secret Service Criminal Investigators
- o Homeland Security Investigations
- o ATF
- o Naval Criminal Investigative Service, and
- o CBP Investigators to name a few.

Lastly, is FLETC's

Land Management Police Training (LMPT)

Some examples of agencies that attend are:

- o U.S. National Park Service- LE Rangers
- o US Fish and Wildlife Service
- o Bureau of Land Management
- o US Forest Service

After graduation, most agencies conduct follow-on training to ensure their new officers and agents learn

agency-specific content necessary to execute their missions successfully.

There are others, but I would like to touch on one more

the Center Advanced Training Programs. These are
programs in which FLETC provides the instruction
necessary to meet specific law enforcement missions from multiple agencies.

Examples of Center Advanced training include:

- o Behavioral science
- o Counterterrorism
- o Investigations, including cyber-crime investigations, and
- o Law enforcement leadership training.

The success of these programs is based on dedicated instructors and support staff which are critical to success.

- I have witnessed quality staff and their passion and desire to complete the mission.
- They are the Finest professionals, with diverse backgrounds
- The FLETC instructor cadre is made up of:
 - o FLETC staff,
 - Law enforcement personnel from our partner agencies, and
 - o Retired LE personnel.

Staying Cutting-Edge

We continue to provide world-class service to those who protect our homeland as well as support our international LE partners.

I also know what it needs to evolve, adapt, and improve to be prepared for evolving threats.

While we pride ourselves on being the best, I recognize that we must continuously evolve to remain cutting-edge.

That's why we're committed to staying connected with

industry leaders to incorporate the latest technology into our training programs.

What do I mean by incorporating the latest technology?

FBI Incident / FLETC Smart House

A tragic example of why this is important is a result of a 2021 incident that occurred when the FBI attempted to execute a search warrant in Sunrise Florida. The suspect inside the house saw the agents coming with the use of a video doorbell camera and began shooting at them from inside the house, killing two and wounding three others.

This prompted conversations among law enforcement agencies, including discussions between FLETC's Cyber Division and the FBI as to what training is being provided as it relates to "Internet of Things" devices.

FLETC's Cyber Division began researching how the "Internet of Things" devices may be used to harm law enforcement officers and found numerous postings online showing how these devices can interact with the physical world to create potential "booby traps" for law enforcement. These traps can be used to harm officers and/or destroy evidence.

For examply

A suspect who has been searched and is under the control of officers can cause these actions to happen with a simple voice command which can start a chain of events

to occur within a house, such as turning off lights, locking doors, activating the HVAC system to introduce chemicals into the environment and cause a fire or explosion to take place. In fact, the suspect doesn't even need to be present. They can start this process remotely by use of a mobile device once they have been notified of entry into the house.

Other uses of these devices include simply monitoring the activities of law enforcement after they have entered a residence or business by remotely monitoring the "Internet of Things" audio/video systems that may be disguised.

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The new FLETC Smart House takes students on a walkthrough to showcase the common benefits and uses of "Internet of Things" devices and introduces them to how

these devices could potentially be used against them.

They encounter examples of "booby traps" and are shown the evidentiary value of collecting "Internet of Things" devices that may contain important evidence related to their case.

Quadruped Unmanned Ground Vehicle (Q-UGV) "NEO"

Another great initiative led by FLETC's Cyber Division is the **Quad-ru-ped** Unmanned Ground Vehicle, more commonly known as our robot K-9 – NEO.

To make NEO work, FLETC Cyber Division created a fully enclosed "mesh" radio network that is used across portions of the facility for a variety of training functions.

This includes setting up a self-contained communications

network to capture audio/video/cellular and Wi-Fi communications during a major event.

The capabilities of this type of network are limitless and FLETC Cyber Division is continuing to expand its capabilities to incorporate this technology into training across the Center.

NEO is fully controlled using the mesh network, which gives the instructors the ability to control it from anywhere as long as they can access the network.

NEO can enter a potentially dangerous environment to provide video and audio feedback to the officers before entry and allow them to communicate with those in that environment. NEO's camera systems provide a

360-degree view and can locate persons or other items through the use of infrared cameras.

NEO carries an onboard computer and antenna array that will allow officers the ability to create a "denial-of-service" event to disable "Internet of Things" devices that could potentially cause harm while entry is made.

We are still learning about the capabilities that NEO has and plan to implement these advanced technologies into many training environments across FLETC.

SUAS

Next, I'll talk about our Small Unmanned Aircraft Systems or sUAS led by FLETC's Enforcement Operations Division. FLETC saw an opportunity to develop a law

enforcement-focused sUAS training program. We developed an 80-hour course that qualifies students as sUAS pilots.

sUASs are a "force multiplier" that gives officers a multifunctional tool capable of assisting them in their duties.

By Leading Our Shot

- We need your knowledge and tools to ensure we are at the forefront of issues involving AI, Crypto Currency, S-UASs or Drones, and, as I mentioned earlier, the Internet of Things devices to name a few.
- Working together ensures FLETC training aligns with real-world scenarios and improves our:
- Equipment
- Facilities
- and Capabilities that collectively shape a training environment and prepare our students for the complexities of their roles.

Closing: Looking Towards the Future

I am here today because it's an investment in FLETC's future.

Being cutting-edge ensures that our graduates are not only well-trained but are resilient, agile, and ready to safeguard our communities.

Collaborating with industry leaders ensures we're equipped to tackle emerging threats. By leveraging industry knowledge and tools, we can enhance the effectiveness of law enforcement training and prepare our personnel for any situation they may encounter.

Together, we foster a culture of continuous improvement, staying ahead in developing relevant, cutting-edge training programs.

Together, we forge the path to excellence, ensuring our graduates are resilient, agile, and ready to safeguard our communities.
