

# MICHIGAN STATEWIDE VOTER SURVEY JULY 2024 SURVEY WDIV/DETROIT NEWS 600 SAMPLE

**JULY 25, 2024** 

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#### **METHODOLOGY**

The Glengariff Group, Inc. conducted a Michigan statewide survey of November 2024 likely general election voters. The 600 sample, live operator telephone survey was conducted on July 22-24, 2024 and has a margin of error of +/-4.0% with a 95% level of confidence. 17.8% of respondents were contacted via landline telephone. 82.2% of respondents were contacted via cell phone telephone. This survey was commissioned by WDIV Local 4 News and the Detroit News.

#### **KEY FINDINGS**

### Lay of the Land

\* By a margin of 16.8%-71.2%, Michigan voters believe the nation is sharply on the wrong track. These numbers have been consistent dating back to the 2022 election period and remain unchanged.

\* Michigan voters, however, believe the state is on the right track. By a margin of 46.4%-37.6%, Michigan voters have moved to the right track – a sharp departure from the national right track/wrong track numbers.

\* A majority of Michigan voters believe their own community is on the right track. By a margin of 53.9%-32.9%, Michigan voters are optimistic about the direction of their own community.

Democratic and Independent voters are broadly optimistic about their own community. But Republican voters are split.

### Motivation to Vote at 9.5 – Signaling Massive 2024 Turnout

\* Voters were asked on a one-to-ten scale how motivated there were to vote in the November 2024 election. The higher the score, the greater the motivation to vote. Michigan voters are now motivated to vote at a **9.5 on a 10.0-point scale.** 

The chart below compares this motivation with October 2012, 2014, 2016, 2018 and 2022 levels.

<sup>\* 18-29</sup> year-old voters are motivated at an 8.8 on a 10.0-point scale. This compares to 8.6 in October 2022 and 8.9 in October 2020.

African American votes are motivated at a 9.4 on a 10.0-point scale. This compares to 9.4 in October 2022 and 9.3 in October 2020.

<sup>\*</sup> This highly motivated electorate once again indicates the likelihood of an extraordinary voter turnout in November.

### Economy Top Issue, Abortion Makes a Comeback, Inflation Recedes

\* Respondents were asked in an open-ended question, what single issue would most influence how they voted this election. Topping the list was jobs and the economy. But abortion has now surged into second place. Immigration has placed in third.

[All responses generating more than 3.0% are listed below.]

\* At 19.7% abortion is the top concern among female voters with the economy at 15.2%.

Among men, the economy is at 20.6% with immigration at 14.0%.

\* 24.6% of Strong Democrats cited abortion as their top concern and stopping Donald Trump second at 16.2%.

26.3% of Strong Republicans cited immigration as their top concern and the economy at 25.7%.

The economy was the top concern of independent voters at 19.4%, with inflation at 13.0% and abortion at 12.0%.

### Democrats Hold a Narrow One-Point Lead on the Generic Ballot Test

\* Respondents were asked if the election for US Senate were held today would they vote for the Democratic candidate or the Republican candidate.

Democrats hold a narrow 1.3% lead on the generic ballot test at 41.9% Democrat and 40.6% Republican.

The generic ballot test looks similar to how the generic ballot test looked in the 2018, 2020 and 2022 elections with Democrats having a narrow lead.

- \* Independent voters have shifted slightly Republican at 27.8% GOP to 20.4% Democrat. But as is typical, 51.9% of independent voters said it would depend on the candidate.
- \* Kennedy voters break 29.3% Republican to 27.6% Democratic on the generic ballot test, with 43.1% saying it would depend on the candidate.

### Whitmer Job Approval At 55.9%

\* Voters view Gretchen Whitmer favorably by a margin of 49.9% favorable to 41.9% unfavorable. Her unfavorable among independent voters has doubled from 20.7% to 41.7% since the January 2024 survey. But her favorable among Democratic voters is nearly unanimous.

\* By a margin of 55.9% approve to 40.1% disapprove, a majority of Michigan voters continue to approve of Governor Whitmer's performance. *Her job approval number has consistently been in the mid-50's with the exception of the later half of 2021.*

- \* Governor Whitmer's job approval in out-state Michigan is 46.1%-50.5% -- narrowly falling unfavorable for the first time since the 2022 election. But her job approval among Metro Detroit voters continues at 66.9%-28.6%.
- \* Independent voters approve of Governor Whitmer's performance by a margin of 55.6%-38.9%.
- \* Men narrowly approve of Governor Whitmer's performance 49.7%-44.4%. But women approve of Governor Whitmer by a margin of 61.6%-36.2%.

#### Biden Still Deeply Unpopular; Job Approval at 40.2%-57.0%

\* Joe Biden is viewed unfavorably by a margin of 36.1% favorable to 56.2% unfavorable.

The chart below compares his name id from January 2024 to July 2024. His favorables have climbed since January among Strong Democrats, Lean Democrats and Independents. But he is still sharply unpopular among independent voters at 25.0%-61.1%.

Men view Joe Biden unfavorably by a margin of 30.1%-64.3%. Women view him unfavorably 41.6%-48.9%.

- \* Voters disapprove of President Biden's performance by a margin of 40.2% approve to 57.0% disapprove. There is slight improvement since January 2024 when 35.4% approved and 60.6% disapproved.
- \* 85% of Strong Democratic voters approve of Joe Biden's performance. But independent voters disapprove by a margin of 27.8%-64.8%.

#### 88.3% Agree With Biden Decision to Step Aside

\* By an overwhelming margin, Michigan voters agree with Joe Biden's decision to step aside in the 2024 Presidential race. 88.3% of voters agree compared to only 6.5% that disagree.

#### 75.2% STRONGLY AGREE with Biden's decision to step aside.

88.5% of Strong Democratic voters agree with his decision.

91.7% of independent voters agree with his decision.

84.2% of Strong Republican voters agree with this decision.

### 76.5% Say Decision Was Good for American Democracy

\* By a margin of 76.5%-11.1%, Michigan voters say Joe Biden's decision to not seek re-election is good for American democracy. 6.8% of voters say it has no impact on American democracy.

Strong Republican voters were the most likely to say the decision is bad for American democracy at 18.1%.

### 25.6% of Voters More Motivated to Vote After Biden's Decision; 46.4% of Young Voters More Motivated

\* Voters were asked if Joe Biden's announcement to not run again made them more or less motivated to vote in November.

#### 25.6% said they were more motivated.

0.7% said they were less motivated.

73.2% said it had no impact on their motivation.

\* The decision disproportionately made Strong Democratic voters, voters aged 18-29, and African American voters more motivated to vote in November.

46.4% of voters aged 18-29 are more motivated to vote. 38.5% of African American voters are more motivated to vote. 36.6% of Strong Democratic voters are more motivated to vote.

### Trump, Vance, Harris Name ID All Underwater – Only Kennedy Slightly Above Water

\* Donald Trump is viewed favorably by 39.8% of voters and unfavorably by 52.4% of voters. 6.8% of voters have no opinion of him.

He is viewed unfavorably by independent voters by a margin of 33.3%-50.0%. Trump is viewed unfavorably by 18.3% of Leaning GOP voters and 8.8% of Strong GOP voters.

- \* He is viewed favorably by men by a margin of 47.9%-43.7%. But he is viewed deeply unfavorably by women by a margin of 32.4%-60.3%.
- \* Kamala Harris is viewed unfavorably by a margin of 37.1% favorable to 47.8% unfavorable. 13.8% of voters have no opinion of her.
  - 31.5% of independent voters, 19.6% of Leaning Democratic voters and 10.5% of Strong Democratic voters have no opinion of her.

\* Female voters narrowly view her favorably at 42.5% favorable to 40.6% unfavorable, with 14.6% having no opinion of her.

Male voters view her sharply unfavorably with 31.1% favorable to 55.6% unfavorable, with 12.9% having no opinion of her.

\* African American voters view her favorably by a margin of 70.5%-7.7%, with

20.5% having no opinion of her.

\* Robert F Kennedy has 92.7% name identification breaking 29.8% favorable to 24.5% unfavorable, with 38.4% having no opinion of him. 6.0% of voters have never heard of him.

Kennedy is the only Presidential candidate whose name id is slightly above water.

\* Kennedy's name id is deeply underwater with Democratic voters. But independent and Republican voters have a favorable view of Kennedy by large margins.

64.8% of independent voters have heard of him breaking 17.6% favorable to 22.2% unfavorable.

# PRESIDENTIAL RACE DEAD EVEN, DEEPLY DIVIDED GENDER BATTLE, WILL BE A FIGHT FOR CENTRISTS

\* The Presidential race between Donald Trump and Kamala Harris is dead even at 41%-41%. Kennedy takes 10% of the vote. 6.0% of voters remain undecided.

While Harris and Trump do equally good jobs bringing in their party voters, it is KENNEDY that holds a minor one-point lead among independent voters: Kennedy at 27.1%, Harris at 26.2%, Trump at 25.2%. 17.8% of independent

- \* Trump leads 42.4%-38.0% among non-college voters. But Harris leads 46.6%-39.7% among non-college voters.
- \* Among men, Trump holds a wide lead of 50.3%-35.3%, with 8.0% of men going to Kennedy a Trump lead of 15.0% among men. But among women, Harris leads 47.4%-33.0%, with 11.2% going to Kennedy a Harris lead of 14.4% among women.
- \* Among African American voters, 82.1% support Harris, 11.5% support Kennedy, no black voters in this survey supported Donald Trump.

Among white voters, 48.4% support Trump, 35.7% support Harris, 9.2% support Kennedy.

\* The chart below looks by gender by party affiliation again showing that independent, centrist voters are evenly split between all three candidates.

### Trump Beats Newsom By 10 Points

\* If the Presidential race were between Donald Trump and Gavin Newsom, Trump would win by a wide ten-point margin.

Independent voters choose Kennedy at 29.9%, Trump at 29.0%, and Newsom at only 10.3% -- with 24.3% of independent voters remaining undecided in that race.

### Whitmer Would Hold a Three Point Lead on Trump

\* If the Presidential race were between Donald Trump and Gretchen Whitmer, Whitmer would hold a three-point lead in the race in Michigan.

### Assassination Attempt/ JD Vance Have Not Changed Voters

- \* Voters were asked if the recent assassination attempt had influenced how they plan to vote in November.
- 7.3% of voters are more likely to vote for Trump, 0.8% are less likely, but 91.7% said there was no change.
  - The 7.3% of voters appear to be largely GOP voters with 11.1% of Strong GOP Voters more likely to vote for him and 14.1% of Leaning GOP voters more likely to vote for him. 9.3% of independent voters said they were more likely to vote for him.
- \* Voters were asked if the nomination of JD Vance as Vice President changes how they plan to vote in November.
  - 89.5% of said it did not impact their vote.
  - 4.2% said they were more likely to vote for Trump.
  - 4.7% said they were less likely to vote for Trump.

## Whitmer As Veep Gives Harris a 2.6% Lead in Michigan; Race Remains Tied if Buttigieg on Ticket

\* Voters were asked who they would support if Gretchen Whitmer was the Democratic Vice-Presidential nominee along with Kamala Harris.

### Kamala Harris would move from a 0.2% lead to a 2.3% lead – Whitmer would add a two-point advantage to the Democratic ticket in Michigan.

Among men, Trump beats Harris 50.3%-35.3%, with 8.0% going to Kennedy. With Whitmer on the ticket, Trump beats Harris by an identical 50.7%-35.7%.

Among women, Harris beats Trump 47.4%-33.0%, with 11.2% going to Kennedy. With Whitmer on the ticket, Harris beats Trump 51.0%-32.7%, with only 6.8% going to Kennedy. *Whitmer adds four percent in female voters, taking away from Kennedy.* 

\* Voters were asked who they would support if Pete Buttigieg was the Democratic Vice-Presidential nominee along with Kamala Harris.

The race remains tied with Trump/Vance at 42.5% and Harris/Buttigieg at 42.3%. 9.0% of voters would choose Kennedy/Shanahan.

### Slotkin Holds Nearly Five Point Lead on Rogers at 45.9%-41.2%

\* Voters were asked who they would support in a US Senate race between Elissa Slotkin and Mike Rogers.

### Slotkin leads Rogers 45.9%-41.2%, with 12.5% of voters remaining undecided.

\* Slotkin holds 15-point lead among independent voters at 43.5%-28.7%, with 27.8% of independent voters undecided. But Slotkin also takes 9.8% of Leaning GOP voters.

- \* Among women, Slokin leads 53.3%-32.7% with 13.7% of women undecided. Among men, Rogers leads 50.7%-37.8%, with 11.2% of men undecided.
- \* Slokin beats Rogers 78.2%-7.7% among African American voters. Rogers leads among white voters 47.9%-40.2%.
- \* Slotkin leads among non-college voters 44.3%-42.9%. She leads among college voters 48.1%-38.8%.
- \* Among Kennedy voters, Slotkin leads 48.3%-34.5%.
- \* Slotkin and Rogers are tied with independent men at 38%-38%. But Slotkin leads among independent women 48.3%-20.7%.
- \* Among non-college men, Rogers leads 52.8%-36.9%. Among college men, Rogers leads 47.2%-38.7%.

Among non-college women, Slotkin leads 51.8%-32.8%. Among college women, Slotkin leads 55.4%-32.6%.

### Voters Split on Whether Trump is a Threat to Democracy

\* Voters were asked if Donald Trump is or is not a threat to the stability of

### American democracy.

48.4% said he is a threat to the stability of American Democracy. 47.9% said he is not a threat to the stability of American Democracy.

- \* Kennedy voters say Donald Trump is a threat to the stability of American democracy by a margin of 53.4%-41.4%. Undecided voters are split at 37.1%-37.1%,

### 72.2% Support for Supreme Court Term Limits

\* Voters were asked if they support or oppose setting term limits for Supreme Court Justices. By a margin of 72.2%-18.8%, Michigan voters overwhelmingly support term limits.

### 58.4% of voters – a majority of voters – STRONGLY SUPPORT term limits for Supreme Court Justices.

\* The strongest opposition came from Strong Republican voters where 34.0% oppose term limits.

### Project 2025 Having Major Impact; 62.7% Have Heard of Project 2025

- \* 62.7% of voters have already heard something about Project 2025.
  - 3.3% have a favorable view.
  - 37.4% have an unfavorable view.
  - 22.0% have heard of it, but have no opinion.
  - 36.9% have never heard of Project 2025.
- \* 70.7% of Strong Democratic voters and 78.6% of Leaning Democratic voters have heard of Project 2025 with none of these voters having a favorable opinion.
- 53.7% of independent voters have heard of Project 2025 breaking 2.8% favorable to 28.7% unfavorable.
  - 58.5% of Strong Republicans and 52.1% of Leaning Republican voters have heard of Project 2025 with the plurality of those voters having no opinion of it.
