NBC News Stay Tuned Gen Z Poll Results EMBARGOED FOR RELEASE: Wednesday, September 4, 2024, 5:00AM ET



The NBC News Stay Tuned Gen Z poll was created in collaboration with *Stay Tuned*, NBC's Gen Z news brand across Snapchat, TikTok, Instagram, and YouTube.

The poll was conducted online from August 23 until August 30, 2024 among a national sample of 2,617 registered voters aged 18-29. The error estimate for registered voters aged 18-29 is plus or minus 3.1 percentage points.

The NBC News Stay Tuned Gen Z poll is powered by <u>SurveyMonkey</u>.

Methodology:

This NBC News Stay Tuned Gen Z poll was <u>powered by SurveyMonkey</u>, the fast, intuitive feedback management platform where 20 million questions are answered daily. It was conducted online August 23 through August 30, 2024 among a national sample of 2,617 US adults 18-29 years old. Respondents were selected from the more than two million people who take surveys on SurveyMonkey each day.

The data was weighted to population totals among 18-29 year olds for sex, race, census region (all from the American Community Survey), and partisanship (from the Cooperative Election Study). After weighting, the sample was reduced to self-identified registered voters. The valid sample after removing non-registered voters and those without a weight is 2,617.

The estimated margin of error for this survey is plus or minus 3.1 percent. When looking at the difference between two percentages, like when calculating the margin between two candidates, this margin of error is doubled. This margin of error attempts to capture the possible error due to both sampling and weighting, though other sources of error are possible. Sampling error associated with subgroup results is higher.

To calculate a margin of error a bootstrap method was used. The full sample (before removing registered voters and before weighting) was re-sampled with replacement 5,000 times and the same weighting procedure was applied to each new sample. The reported MOE is 95% empirical distribution of estimates from these 5,000 samples.
