Overview

• Murder increased by nearly 30 percent nationally and by 35 percent in Louisiana in 2020.

• Louisiana has had the nation's highest murder rate for 32 straight years through 2020.

• There is no evidence that Louisiana's implementation of Raise The Age in 2019 and 2020 contributed to the statewide increase in murder or gun violence.



The 2020 Murder Increase

- Began nationally in early 2020, accelerated in May 2020, and has stayed elevated ever since.
- Involved large increases in red states and blue states, big cities and small towns, and everywhere inbetween.
 - Murder rose by 68 percent in Louisiana cities (70 percent in Louisiana cities excluding New Orleans).
- Likely caused by a complex combination of factors related to and exacerbated by the pandemic.



All data on national or statewide murder is from the FBI's Supplementary Homicide Report available through 2020.



Raise The Age and the Murder Increase

Why Raise The Age does not logically fit as a driver of the murder increase:

- •The increase in murder was part of a national trend which does not fit the timeline of implementation.
 - Murder fell in Louisiana in March/April 2019 when Raise The Age was first implemented, and the increase in murder in 2020 began in May/June, before the second phase of implementation.
- •Kids under 18 commit a small fraction of all murders both in Louisiana and nationally. This did not change after Raise The Age was implemented.
 - Kids under 18 made up 4.4 percent of all murder offenders in Louisiana in 2020, down from 5 percent in 2018 and 4.9 percent in 2019.

Raise The Age and New Orleans Gun Violence

Similarly, there is no evidence that Raise The Age is a driver of increasing murder in New Orleans:

- •New Orleans reached a 50-year low in murder in 2019 after Raise The Age was implemented.
- •The vast majority of New Orleans gun violence is perpetrated by adults both before and after Raise The Age implementation.
 - Kids under 18 made up 7.2 percent of all people arrested for a murder in New Orleans between 2015 and 2019 and 8.1 percent in 2020 and 2021.
 - Kids under 18 made up 8.1 percent of all people arrested in a non-fatal shooting between 2015 and 2019 and 5.8 percent in 2020 and 2021.



Raise The Age and New Orleans Juvenile Detention

Juvenile detention in New Orleans has declined after Raise The Age's implementation.

- •The Juvenile Justice Intervention Center averaged 38.8 juveniles detained per day between 2017 and February 2019. JJIC averaged 36.5 juveniles detained per day between March 2019 and December 2021.
- •The December 2019 ransomware attack, the pandemic, and decreasing NOPD commissioned strength have all likely contributed to fewer juvenile arrests and detentions.
