We are non-partisan, grassroots organizations who work across this state to support free and fair elections in Texas. Our democracy is built upon our universal freedom to vote, and that principle is further enshrined in the governance of our state when the framers wrote in the Texas Constitution that "all political power is inherent in the people." As you embark on your tenure as Secretary of State following your confirmation this week, we are writing to suggest several ways the Secretary of State can improve Texas voters' access to their fundamental right to vote, and ask that you commit to adopting them.

In your testimony to the Senate Nominations Committee on February 27th, 2023 – you said that "it is important that we teach our young people about their important right [to vote]" and that voters become "encouraged, not discouraged" from participating in our elections. Unfortunately, millions of Texans have not been able to fulfill this goal, and exercise their political power that Article 2 consecrates, a result of systemic barriers erected by lawmakers and the chronic underfunding of our state's election administration.

The most urgent decision you face as newly confirmed Texas Secretary of State is affirming that Texas will remain in the Electronic Registration Information Center, commonly known as ERIC. It is important for the office of Secretary of State to mitigate, not validate, misinformation about the non-partisan member organization created and managed by state election officials and which has been a critical tool in registering more eligible Americans to vote.

Texas lags behind the rest of the nation in turnout, and continues to lead as one of the hardest states in which to vote according to research conducted by States United Democracy Center and Northern Illinois University. As such, we believe your office faces a unique opportunity to act on the critical need for election reforms that help every eligible voter cast their ballot. We have compiled a list of immediate changes that you could make under your existing authority as Texas Secretary of State.

#### **Election Administration**

• Increase oversight of voting machine manufacturers and testing of voting machines to prevent glitches and design flaws from affecting voters. (Reports in 2022 indicated some voting machines did not accurately reflect voters' preferences due to a design flaw on the machines' touchscreens).<sup>2</sup>

- Track and disclose monthly the number of poll watchers who take the required training, as well as the pass and fail rates, with results provided on the statewide and county levels. We suggest also updating training to prevent spread of disinformation by poll watchers.
- Improve data sharing between agencies to ensure registration records include all relevant voter ID numbers for vote-by-mail verification.

### **Modernize Voter Registration**

- Release a county-level breakdown of the number of voters who have registered to vote at the Texas Department of Public Safety on a monthly basis, as well as the method of registration (in-person or online transaction, e.g.).
- Release on a monthly basis the number of high school voter registration forms requested, submitted, and accepted on a statewide and county level basis.
- Send each high school enough printed voter registration forms sufficient to register every eligible student at that school.
- Provide clear guidance for how college and high school campuses can set up voter registration events.
- Promote a culture of civic engagement by creating a system of awards for people, groups, high schools, and college campuses that perform excellent voter registration work.

### Vote by Mail

- Implement evidence-based design best practices for vote-by-mail applications, mail ballots, and carrier envelopes to reduce voter confusion. Design changes may include increasing font-sizes, leftaligning text, and reducing language complexity.
- Publish comprehensive voter education materials that provide clear instructions for completing mail ballots.
- Track and publish online for each election the number of VBM ballots that have been rejected and the reason for rejection, with numbers reported both on a statewide and county level basis.
- Improve data sharing between counties and SOS about rejected or defective VBM applications and ballots to enable faster updates to the VBM online tracker so that voters can timely cure their VBM ballots and applications ahead of the correction deadline.

#### **Curbside Voting and Accessibility**

- Improve and expand on training for election judges and poll workers to increase compliance with the administration of curbside voting, including requirements for standardized, effective, and visible signage at every early voting and Election Day polling location.
- Amend poll worker training to require a "runner" to assist with timely curbside voting administration.
- Substantially bolster the support your office provides counties regarding curbside voting, including
  advocating for increased funding to allow for more community outreach and improved voter
  awareness of curbside voting. This work is in dire need, especially in communities of color which
  face disproportionate challenges by existing inequities for curbside voting.
- Ensure that counties have an ADA Coordinator on staff to ensure regular compliance with the <u>ADA</u>
   <u>Checklist for Polling Places</u> across Texas' 254 counties, and who has the responsibility to implement polling place remediation ahead of the election period.



We were heartened by your stated commitment to increasing voting access and helping young eligible voters exercise their right to vote. We ask that you work to carry out that commitment by publicly pledging to adopt the set of recommendations laid out in this letter. We look forward to working with you and your office to ensure that our state can move forward in our shared commitment to serving the people of Texas.

#### **BACKGROUND** related to ERIC

- For decades the Democrats and leftists have fought ferociously to prevent the cleanup of State voter registration rolls.
- It has become widely recognized that inflated voter rolls, electronic equipment, mail in ballots, etc. are key enablers of election fraud.
- In 2012 the Electronic Registration Information Center (ERIC) was formed as a cleanup and registration tool.
- ERIC is now understood to essentially be a left wing voter registration drive disguised as voter roll clean up.
- At least 5 states have/are currently dropping ERIC completely, due to those issues.
- ERIC located 17 million new voters for the 2020 election, for comparison, they only



found 5.7 million in 2012, Obama's reelection.

# ERIC database is scarily comprehensive

- Member States must not only provide all details on <u>inactive and active voters</u> to ERIC every 60 days.
- Member States must also provide every individual in their states <u>Motor Vehicle</u> <u>Department database</u>, both licensed and ID recipients.
- This combo of data is breathtaking and powerful. It's everyone who could generate a legal ballot. It includes those approaching voting age, even those here illegally yet issued an ID by their left leaning State.

[This data includes names, addresses, DOB, License #, last 4 of social #, voter activity, phone, email, title and type of citizenship documentation, and much more!]

### **ERIC and Non-CLEANUP of Rolls**

- Oddly, ERIC has **no requirement or mandate that member States clean up their voter rolls**. States are only "strongly encouraged" to request ERIC's voter updates at least once a year.
- States are required by federal law (1993 NVRA) to report to Congress how many ineligible voters they removed from their voter rolls.
- Judicial Watch found some astonishing revelations. Over the recent 4 year reporting period, large counties in powerful states reported they **removed ZERO**, **ONE**, **or only TWO ineligible voters**.
- Judicial Watch' said: "About 10% of Americans move every year. Those counties should generate hundreds of thousands of canceled registrations.
- In 2020 Judicial Watch found 29 states had huge registration excesses. In 8 states, if you combined all counties, their average registration for the entire State exceeded 100%. Seven of the 8 are long time members of ERIC

#### **ERIC** and Non-Citizens

- ERIC does NOT want to know who is voting illegally. Their rules explain that "Under no circumstances shall the members transmit any record indicating an individual is a non-citizen of the U.S." Do we know if non-citizen voters from other states are voting in Texas?

# **ERIC Non-Transparency**

- Adams says: "That's part of the smoke screen. ERIC learns who gets registered from their program, so they're able to micro target with whoever is partnered with ERIC. We don't know who their interfacing all this data with. It could be Catalist, the massive Democrat database organization. We just don't know and its secretive.
- Some Member States are currently using ERIC to hide their list maintenance data, citing it violates their ERIC contracts, even though Federal law mandates it be made public.



#### **ERIC Board Members**

- Many ERIC board members are members of the controversial NASED or National Association of State Election Directors.
- Far left organization Fair Elections Center is giving the lectures for the members of ERIC/NASED.

# ERIC FOUNDING, LEADER, etc.

- Left leaning Pew was instrumental in getting ERIC off the ground, sponsoring a workgroup on voter registration improvements in 2009. The original funding of ERIC came from an "anonymous donor" and Pew Center On The States, who received grants from the Transparency & Integrity Fund of George Soros Open Society. There is a very long trail of known leftist leaders involved in bringing ERIC to life and sustaining it.
- David Becker, the current leader of ERIC, has a concerning reputation. In 2016 he founded Center for Election Innovation and Research CEIR. He distributed \$69.5 mil in Zuckerberg money in 2020, aligned with CTCL. Previously when working at the DOJ, Becker was reported to OPR (ethics). Brad Scholzman, head of DOJ Civil Rights Division stated, "It's the most unethical thing I've ever seen. He's a hard core leftist who couldn't stand conservatives. Emails revealed nasty, disparaging remarks about Republicans...unethical and unprofessional". In 2020 Becker's CEIR gave \$20mil to Michigan Secretary of State Jocelyn Benson's personal non profit (MCELA). She then directed \$11.8mil to two Democrat PR firms. TGP reported how Becker founded the (EOLDN) to help election officials with lawyers who would fend off legitimate claims of election fraud.
- John Lindback, currently on the ERIC board, was the first Executive Director of ERIC. He was also the Senior Officer in Elections Initiatives at left leaning Pew, and part of the original 2009 workgroup. He later worked as Senior Advisor for the left leaning CSME, a subsidiary of Soros funded dark money group New Venture Fund. CSME was closely aligned with CTCL (Zuck \$\$\$). Previously, Linback was the Director of Elections in Oregon for SOS Bradbury (D). He had a seat on the EAC Board, and was President of the controversial NASED.
- Ericka Haas is the System Engineer at ERIC, for 9 years now. She previously worked in the Oregon Secretary of State's office with Lindback. In February 2018, DHS created the Elections Infrastructure Sector Coordinating Council (SCC). Haas shares a seat on this council with staff from Dominion, ES&S, Smartmatic, and Unisyn Voting. SCC represents 30 companies responsible for providing key components to our elections, including public policy. The SCC group rubs noses with GCC council, which includes CISA, EAC, NASS, NASED. Groups being overly intertwinned is the result of former DHS Director Jeh Johnson declaring our elections "critical infrastructure".

Dear Secretary Nelson,

Many recent concerns surrounding the partisan structure and operations of the Electronic Registration Information Center (ERIC) have been exposed. In light of this, I encourage you to closely examine your state's affiliation with this organization and consider withdrawing from membership. As a former Secretary of State, I understand the challenges of maintaining voter roll integrity. However, many states have lost confidence in ERIC as the mechanism by which this should be accomplished.

In late 2022, Louisiana was the first state to withdraw following concern after open records requests and investigative reporting that raised concerns about ERIC's partisan ties, data sharing practices, and focus on voter registration rather than voter roll clean up. Since then, questions continue to be unanswered, and transparency has been lacking. As a result, Alabama, Florida, Missouri, West Virginia, and Ohio have all withdrawn. These states have cited issues of data privacy concerns, partisan funding and involvement, and citizen opposition.

States should consider alternative measures that do not have the side effect of compromised data and partisan influence, and that focus on cleaning voter rolls rather than registering voters. Maintaining accurate voter rolls is crucial to free, fair, and honest elections.

I encourage you as the Secretary of State to also explore new possibilities for interstate collaboration that do not involve ERIC.

Hello, hope you have had a good week. I am sending you this email as follow up to a letter I sent you last week. I contacted Kim Berbmann earlier this week and she had not seen the letter. I've pasted the letter below and attached the summary of voter roll challenges outlined in the email below. The reason I am sending to you is because we are getting no where with the current required process. In Travis County over 11% of our voter rolls are challenged and 24% of those ineligible voters are still voting in elections.

Dear Secretary Nelson,

As Secretary of State you have full oversight of elections for the state of Texas. This letter and attached summary is to inform you of serious unresolved **voter registration issues in Travis County**. We believe these issues are statewide given that Texas has been utilizing ERIC.

In the attached summary, you will see the following types of voter registration issues:

- 1. Voters who have moved primary residence without updating voter registration including those that moved out of the county or state.
- 2. Voters who are ineligible to vote based on the location at which they are registered being a post office box, hotel, rehab facility, etc,
- 3. Voters who have more than one voter registration number (VUID) and are, therefore, on the rolls more than once.

A total of 98,000 voter registration challenges were submitted to Travis County between **January 2022 and May 2022**. However, to date the county has addressed only approximately 1,500 by sending the voter the requisite post card asking them to confirm/correct their registration information. At this rate, the Travis County rolls will never be up to date. After over a year delay by Travis County in addressing these challenges, complaint #574 was submitted to your office on March 28, 2023 for Travis's violation of Texas election code section 16.039, but to date no action has been taken on this complaint.

#### **Travis County Voter Registration Issues Summary**

- 875,156 Registered Voters
- 11.2% or 98,000 voters ineligibly registered in Travis County, TX
- 24% or 24,217 of these ineligibly registered voters, voted in recent elections (2022 and 2023)
- Net impact: 2.77% incorrect election results in any given election; the Federal Election Commission permits a .00008% error rate (a 2.77% error rate may not affect federal election results but local elections are certainly impacted)
- Only approximately 1,500 challenges have been sent a postcard by the county to date

This is very concerning to all citizens of Travis County. We need to be assured that our vote truly counts and that only eligible Travis County citizens are registered to vote so they can vote in only the appropriate election races.

We understand that the Secretary of State's office and Texas County offices may have depended on ERIC to manage voter rolls. SB1070 was signed by Governor Abbott on Sunday removing Texas from using ERIC. However, the damage has been done and the rolls are materially inaccurate leaving citizens without confidence in election results. We need to be assured that you and the Secretary of State's Office restore the integrity of our election results by ensuring the voter rolls are accurate.

Would you be open to:



1) Discussing a way for "qualified" citizens to be part of an advisory committee to review the ERIC replacement? These citizens could report progress and newly designed processes to the community which would go a long way to rebuilding trust in Texas elections.
2) Addressing the lack of timeliness in counties concerning voter registration challenges submitted to them; citizens need to know their efforts to clean up voter rolls is valued and acted upon, in order to rebuild trust with them.

Next week I will reach out to Kim Bergmann to see what next steps you recommend.

I spent most of the day yesterday going through the 98k challenges to see what's been addressed or not. It's not an encouraging report, but this is the current status of things that could use some help in motivating Gretchen Nagy, Travis County Voter Registration Director to do her job

The 98k challenges fall in 5 separate buckets which I iterate in order of size:

1) As of 6/13/23, of the 86,601 challenges submitted relating to NCOA address changes (9/23/22 NCOA list) Travis County has processed only 1,010 of these changes since January 2023 (that is to say these voters have been put in suspense BUT NOT fixed yet and can still vote). Of these that have been put in suspense, 606 voted (60%) some time in 2022 or 2023

Of the 86k, 21,932 voted some time in 2022 or 2023 (25.3%)

Of the 86K movers, 4,014 moved out of the county/state (4.6%) and 50.5% of these voted in Travis AFTER their NCOA move date

Please note that my NCOA data is as of 9/23/22 so is 9 months old so this does not include anyone who has moved since then

#### 2) Ineligibly registered voters

As of 6/13/23 of the 7,640 voters registered at ineligible locations in January 2023 (part of 98k challenges) Travis County has put 463 in suspense. I reran the analysis for voters registered at ineligible locations as of 6/13/23 and I now show 7,344. Of this, 2285 voted in the Nov 2022 election (31.1%)

#### 3) Duplicates

VERSIGHI

In Jan 2023 there were 2031 duplicate voters (one duplicated 3 times). I just reran the duplicate VUIDNOs and 24 were addressed from Jan but there are 20 new dups.

- 4) None of the 40 pre-March 31, 1976 voters needing to be cleaned up were. That's the date Travis went to computerized rolls. These 40 are keying entry errors that are just sloppy and need to be cleaned up so these aren't affecting election results but should be fixed.
- 5) None of the 2,835 TEC Sec 13.002(c)(1),(2) & (7) were addressed. These are ineligible voters based upon data missing in their registration.

Summary Complaints Voted 86,601 21,932 NCOA

7,640 2,285 Ineligibly reg

2,031 Duplicates (Half 1,015)40 Clean up2,835 Sec 13.002

98,131 24,217 24.7%

98k challenges = 11.2% of total Travis County roll of 875,156 registered voters at 6/13/23

So there you have it. Roughly 25% of the voters I challenged, voted in 2022 or 2023. That means 2.77% (11.2% x 24.7%) of the result of these elections are flat out wrong. The Federal Election Code permits an error rate of .0008% or 1/125,000 votes to be "wrong" in some way. Travis isn't in the same universe.

I look forward to strategizing with you re: how to get Travis to clean up the rolls before Nov 2024.

On Voter Rolls, Texas Could Go It Alone

State may leave national voter fraud protection group while still rebuilding trust from 2019 cleanup blunder

Texas' likely withdrawal from a nationwide consortium designed to clean up voter rolls while boosting public participation in elections could be a setback for democracy in the state.

But it may happen if members of the multistate group, Electronic Registration Information Center, or ERIC, fail to agree this week on reforms to address concerns that the group leans too far left.

If that happens, and new Texas Secretary of State Jane Nelson chooses to pull out of the consortium as expected, she has signaled the state will go it alone. Texas will then work with "other states and jurisdictions" to develop its own interstate cross-check system, her spokesman, Sam Taylor, tells us.

That's a tall order. We still have bad memories of 2019, when one of Nelson's predecessors bungled a voter-roll cleanup and damaged public trust. At the time, the secretary of state's office sent a list of potential noncitizen voters to counties. That list used bad data that mistakenly flagged tens of thousands of people who were actually citizens. But the state told counties to figure out on their own the citizenship status of people on the list.

Nelson, who was confirmed by the Senate on Wednesday and who has enjoyed bipartisan support so far, would do well to remember the previous blunder if she launches her own voter fraud prevention system.

If she takes on this important effort, the former Republican lawmaker from

Flower Mound should be fully transparent in how she plans to carry out cross-checks of voter rolls with other states, and any voter purges. About 30 states and the District of Columbia are members of ERIC. Since its inception in 2012, the nonprofit has cross-matched states' voter

records, motor vehicle data, death certificates and other information to help member states purge millions of ineligible voters from rolls.

It has also identified millions more who were eligible to vote but not yet



registered.

Up until last year, the group, the only one of its kind in the country, enjoyed bipartisan praise from secretaries of state nationwide. But that changed late last year when some far-right Republicans began floating concerns about the group's funding and purpose.

Among the complaints of some member states, including Texas, is a requirement that they notify eligible but unregistered voters of their ability to register. Critics want this provision to be optional after an initial contact. They also have privacy concerns.

ERIC executive director Shane Hamlin, a former election official in the state of Washington, has tried to allay the concerns, but to no avail. So far this year, Louisiana, Alabama, Florida, Missouri and West Virginia have announced plans to withdraw from ERIC. And some big states, such as California and New York, aren't members.

We hope ERIC doesn't collapse and that member states can work out their concerns. Any voter fraud protection program must operate free from partisan politics.

For decades the Democrats and leftists have fought ferociously to prevent the cleanup of State voter registration rolls. Recognizing a potential niche, left wing activists created ERIC to clean voter rolls their way, using their rules. So in 2012 the Electronic Registration Information Center (ERIC) was



formed as a membership organization primarily for blue States. ERIC is essentially a left wing voter registration drive disguised as voter roll clean up. But it's been gaining traction in Red States too. Originally funded by the Soros Open Society, it is now responsible for cleaning the voter rolls in 31 states, plus D.C. A top election official from each member State is appointed a seat on the ERIC Board or as an Officer, all unpaid positions.

Shane Hamlin, the Executive Director at ERIC the outdated and inefficient voter roll maintenance program founded by far-left activist David Becker. The ERIC system is now used in 32 states despite the fact that voter rolls in those states are more bloated with phantom voters than ever in US history.

Oddly, ERIC has no requirement or mandate that member States clean up their voter rolls. States are only "strongly encouraged" to request ERIC's voter updates at least once a year. If a member fails to make a request in 425 days, the data will be sent automatically. What's even more odd, and seemingly corrupt, is that ERIC does **NOT** want to know who is voting illegally. Their rules explain that "Under no circumstances shall the members transmit any record indicating an individual is a non-citizen of the U.S."

ERIC in short is outdated, and has a very left leaning operation of 'cleaning' voter rolls. John Christian Adams is an American attorney and conservative, who was formerly employed by the United States Department of Justice under George W. Bush administration. Mr. Adams recently discussed ERIC in a John Fredericks Radio Show interview. He said, "That's part of the smoke screen. ERIC learns who gets registered from their program, so they're able to micro target with whoever is partnered with ERIC. We don't know who their interfacing all this data with. It could be Catalist, the massive Democrat database organization. We just don't know.. I've talked to some ERIC Board Members who are Secretary of States. They don't even know what ERIC is doing. They've asked questions and can't get answers."

I am asking for you to please look into these concerns. Given the above information perhaps ERIC is no longer needed in Texas, as it has been removed in two other states.

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# **Election Integrity Reforms Report Card 2023**

February 28, 2023

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# Summary and Background

Look Ahead America (LAA) formed six public policy objectives relating to elections based on the findings of the Voter Integrity Project (VIP) in the aftermath of the 2020 General Election, hundreds of ideas suggested by the public, and decades of experience administering elections.

Each of these policy objectives satisfies three key requirements:

- (1) eliminating vulnerabilities in our election system,
- (2) practicality of implementation, and
- (3) harmony with current state and federal laws and established legal precedence.

Details on these objectives appear later in this report.

LAA believes that by passing these six election integrity policy objectives through all 50 U.S. state legislatures, five territories (American Samoa, Guam, Northern Mariana Islands, Puerto Rico, and the U.S. Virgin Islands), and in the District of Columbia, these will restore trust in America's electoral process while simultaneously addressing various vulnerabilities and weaknesses currently in the election system.



In the 2023 legislative sessions, thus far state legislators have introduced 35 bills that addressed LAA's six election integrity objectives. This is already half of the amount of bills introduced between the 2020-2022 legislative sessions, and the year is not even a quarter completed yet.

From the 2020-2022 legislative sessions, various states introduced 70 bills which related to the LAA public policy objectives. Of these 70 bills, 12 passed into law without loopholes. When considering that there are six objectives per state, the five territories, and Washington D.C., then simple math shows that a total of at least 336 bills will need to pass into law without loopholes. Additionally, LAA has since revised its definition of an objective obtained based on the items becoming officially enshrined in state law as opposed to the categorization from 2022, which resulted in the removal of one previous "award" given to Arizona.

Therefore, LAA has reached 3.57% percent of its goal to get all six items passed in all parts of the United States without any loopholes. When considering the limited budget of LAA, which started this effort in late 2020 as the VIP, these successful bill passages are in no small part attributed to its base of highly-motivated volunteers and generous small donors.

In addition to these 12 bills without loopholes, another 17 state bills passed albeit with loopholes, and this is not including resolutions passed in another four counties: three in Wisconsin and one in Michigan. These have no legal weight but may indicate things to come.

Furthermore, two of these bills came directly from LAA's volunteers. Although the first bill in New Jersey S4162 would have banned black box voting equipment, it failed to pass in 2021. That said, New Jersey State Senator Pennacchio has reintroduced the bill as S4162 in the 2022-23 legislative session as the idea of open source voting equipment has gained traction over the last two years. In fact, United States Representative Paul Gosar of Arizona recently introduced a bill which would include a study to consider incorporating it into the 2028 General Election.

In contrast, South Carolina passed SB 108 in 2021-22, which addresses two election integrity objectives with the help of Senator Chip Campsen. Although the bill has loopholes, LAA believes that it is better to have a law in place with loopholes that legislators can close later as opposed to nothing in place at all.

It should also be noted that Denise Bolognese of New Jersey and Lori Boddy of South Carolina undertook the enormous tasks of bringing these to their respective state senators and should be commended for their work. Even if a bill fails, it is now in the public sphere and consciousness, as seen with the New Jersey bill reintroduced with greater potentiality of becoming law as the ideas behind the bill(s) get traction. Additionally, they serve as potential templates and reference legislation for other states considering introducing similar measures.

Arizona no longer leads the pack that meet our election integrity objectives passed into law, as the Election Integrity Unit formed under former Attorney General Mark Brnovich has since pivoted focus from election integrity to expanded voting rights under the current Governor and



former Secretary of State's direction Katie Hobbs. This underscores the reason for making such units enshrined into law, as Florida did, and with which it is tied at two bills each.

That said, Look Ahead Arizona led the effort to get these reforms introduced and passed; the 2022 Arizona session passed HB 2492, using public policy objective #2 language almost verbatim for example. If any other states incorporated a Look Ahead America division within them just as Arizona did from 2021-22, then LAA would be able to the state successfully pass a significantly larger number of election integrity laws.

## Takeaways from the Data

Upon reviewing, updating, and incorporating the legislative data since 2020 it appears that five things stood out with the revised data and presentation:

- (1) Most states from 2020-22 targeted private funds and NGO funds to prevent a repeat of "Zuckerbucks" (Mark Zuckerberg donated over \$300 million to states to influence the 2020 election, which LAA reported in <a href="https://LookAheadAmerica.org/Rigged">https://LookAheadAmerica.org/Rigged</a>). One can see this reflected in the high incidence of bills regarding election objective #6 from 2020-22.
- (2) Starting in 2023, the legislatures have shifted their focus to laws that clarify, regulate, and mandate use of shared interstate databases and official tools to clean up the voter rolls. This reflects in the higher number of bills in 2023 regarding election objective #2.
- (3) LAA researchers also observed the introduction of bills approximating objective #4 for the first time this year. Previously, no states had addressed this, whereas this year New Mexico and Pennsylvania are leading the way.
- (4) LAA researchers also observed the introduction of bills on a Federal and national level involving public policy objectives #2 and #3 specifically. Should these pass into law, then this would essentially bypass the need to pass them on a state level, at least as far as Federal elections are concerned. Of course, for ideal and uniform election integrity from top to bottom, states should pass these objectives for their state and local elections.
- (5) As mentioned previously, Arizona lost a previously awarded objective as it was not made into law. Specifically, the Election Integrity Unit was funded but not made into a formal office nor division, nor were its aims and goals enshrined into law. For this reason, new administrations can either dissolve them or modify them for their own agendas. States such as Texas and Virginia are at risk of losing these should they fail to become official and defined by the state legislatures. Furthermore, the power they currently wield has been challenged as unconstitutional. Fortunately, some states like Ohio are working to pass this item into law.

#### **Election Integrity Objectives Review**

#### 1. Thumbprint Authentication of Absentee Ballots.

A single machine-readable thumbprint on the affidavit envelope of an absentee ballot will limit the ability of an individual other than the voter of record to cast that ballot. Multiple ballots cast by a single individual will be easily detectable.

Pairing a thumbprint requirement with an absentee ballot request or as part of the voter registration process would practically eliminate fraudulent absentee ballots as well as problems with ballot signature verification, witness signatures, and unscrupulous ballot harvesting.

The state would encrypt the captured thumbprints as alphanumeric values with a one-way hash using a secure key and would be prohibited from sharing raw thumbprint data with any other government agency.

## 2. Mandated and Public Voter List Hygiene.

The state will be required to engage in several processes to ensure only those legally eligible to cast ballots are on voter registration lists and lists remain current.

Further, whether or not these processes result in a voter record's removal, the findings of these processes will be reflected in the publicly available voter list (not applicable to Social Security numbers). This will allow citizens or organizations to use this information to take additional steps to ensure only legal ballots are cast.

These processes will include, but are not limited to:

Shared Interstate Residency Databases. The state will cooperate with other states to build a secure, transactional database to detect when an individual has registered in another state or taken other steps that would indicate a loss of residency and therefore voter privileges. This



database will rely on a match of name, date of birth and the last four digits of the Social Security number. Any records matched through this process must be publicly flagged in the state's voter database.

Non-Citizen Matching Using the USCIS's SAVE Database. The state will take advantage of the USCIS's SAVE database to flag non-citizens and remove them from the voter list. Any records matched through this process must be publicly flagged in the state's voter database.

National Change of Address, Social Security Death Index, and Master Death File Matching. The state will match the voter list against the NCOA permanent moves, SSDI, and MDF on a monthly basis. Any matches will require a follow-up to ensure whether the voter is still eligible to cast a ballot and, if not, they will be removed from the voter list. Any records matched through this process must be publicly flagged in the state's voter database.

#### 3. Ban on the Use of "Black Box" Voting Equipment.

"Black Box" voting equipment uses proprietary, non-public software and hardware designs. According to a study by Princeton University, this equipment is highly susceptible to undetected hacking and manipulation.

The alternative is to mandate that all election equipment use open-source software and design that is available for inspection and review by the public and technology organizations to ensure the validity and accuracy of vote counting.

Open-source election software and hardware, paired with paper ballots, will remove the potential for tampering as well as the suspicion of tampering.

# 4. Appointment of a Citizens Elections Supervisory Committee.

The public must have mechanisms through which they are assured elections are conducted in accordance with the law to facilitate trust in election officials and to confirm the integrity of election officials.

The committee shall consist of trusted citizens who represent various political parties as well as non-partisan organizations. Each committee member will be granted access to the election process equivalent to the state's election director and any county election director. These representatives will have the responsibility of documenting the lawful execution of the election at every level.



#### 5. Creation and Sufficient Funding for a Dedicated Voter Fraud Investigation Division within the State's Attorney General's Office.


Many states have little to no standing effort to investigate voter fraud. Dedicating sufficient staffing and funding to a permanent division within the state's attorney general's office will help defend the integrity of our elections.

#### Equitable Distribution of Private Contributions to Election 6. Operations.

While private individuals and corporations may choose to sponsor improvements to election operations with direct donations of funding or material to government election agencies, these contributions may not be geographically targeted and must be equitably distributed throughout a state based on voter populations.

This restriction will only be applicable to liquid contributions to allow incidental contributions to continue, such as a club allowing its headquarters to be used as a polling place.

# **Election Integrity Reforms Report Card 2023**

February 28, 2023

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# Summary and Background

Look Ahead America (LAA) formed six public policy objectives relating to elections based on the findings of the Voter Integrity Project (VIP) in the aftermath of the 2020 General Election, hundreds of ideas suggested by the public, and decades of experience administering elections.

Each of these policy objectives satisfies three key requirements:

- (1) eliminating vulnerabilities in our election system,
- (2) practicality of implementation, and
- (3) harmony with current state and federal laws and established legal precedence.

Details on these objectives appear later in this report.

LAA believes that by passing these six election integrity policy objectives through all 50 U.S. state legislatures, five territories (American Samoa, Guam, Northern Mariana Islands, Puerto Rico, and the U.S. Virgin Islands), and in the District of Columbia, these will restore trust in America's electoral process while simultaneously addressing various vulnerabilities and weaknesses currently in the election system.



In the 2023 legislative sessions, thus far state legislators have introduced 35 bills that addressed LAA's six election integrity objectives. This is already half of the amount of bills introduced between the 2020-2022 legislative sessions, and the year is not even a quarter completed yet.

From the 2020-2022 legislative sessions, various states introduced 70 bills which related to the LAA public policy objectives. Of these 70 bills, 12 passed into law without loopholes. When considering that there are six objectives per state, the five territories, and Washington D.C., then simple math shows that a total of at least 336 bills will need to pass into law without loopholes. Additionally, LAA has since revised its definition of an objective obtained based on the items becoming officially enshrined in state law as opposed to the categorization from 2022, which resulted in the removal of one previous "award" given to Arizona.

Therefore, LAA has reached 3.57% percent of its goal to get all six items passed in all parts of the United States without any loopholes. When considering the limited budget of LAA, which started this effort in late 2020 as the VIP, these successful bill passages are in no small part attributed to its base of highly-motivated volunteers and generous small donors.

In addition to these 12 bills without loopholes, another 17 state bills passed albeit with loopholes, and this is not including resolutions passed in another four counties: three in Wisconsin and one in Michigan. These have no legal weight but may indicate things to come.

Furthermore, two of these bills came directly from LAA's volunteers. Although the first bill in New Jersey S4162 would have banned black box voting equipment, it failed to pass in 2021. That said, New Jersey State Senator Pennacchio has reintroduced the bill as S4162 in the 2022-23 legislative session as the idea of open source voting equipment has gained traction over the last two years. In fact, United States Representative Paul Gosar of Arizona recently introduced a bill which would include a study to consider incorporating it into the 2028 General Election.

In contrast, South Carolina passed SB 108 in 2021-22, which addresses two election integrity objectives with the help of Senator Chip Campsen. Although the bill has loopholes, LAA believes that it is better to have a law in place with loopholes that legislators can close later as opposed to nothing in place at all.

It should also be noted that Denise Bolognese of New Jersey and Lori Boddy of South Carolina undertook the enormous tasks of bringing these to their respective state senators and should be commended for their work. Even if a bill fails, it is now in the public sphere and consciousness, as seen with the New Jersey bill reintroduced with greater potentiality of becoming law as the ideas behind the bill(s) get traction. Additionally, they serve as potential templates and reference legislation for other states considering introducing similar measures.

Arizona no longer leads the pack that meet our election integrity objectives passed into law, as the Election Integrity Unit formed under former Attorney General Mark Brnovich has since pivoted focus from election integrity to expanded voting rights under the current Governor and



former Secretary of State's direction Katie Hobbs. This underscores the reason for making such units enshrined into law, as Florida did, and with which it is tied at two bills each.

That said, Look Ahead Arizona led the effort to get these reforms introduced and passed; the 2022 Arizona session passed HB 2492, using public policy objective #2 language almost verbatim for example. If any other states incorporated a Look Ahead America division within them just as Arizona did from 2021-22, then LAA would be able to the state successfully pass a significantly larger number of election integrity laws.

## Takeaways from the Data

Upon reviewing, updating, and incorporating the legislative data since 2020 it appears that five things stood out with the revised data and presentation:

- (1) Most states from 2020-22 targeted private funds and NGO funds to prevent a repeat of "Zuckerbucks" (Mark Zuckerberg donated over \$300 million to states to influence the 2020 election, which LAA reported in <a href="https://LookAheadAmerica.org/Rigged">https://LookAheadAmerica.org/Rigged</a>). One can see this reflected in the high incidence of bills regarding election objective #6 from 2020-22.
- (2) Starting in 2023, the legislatures have shifted their focus to laws that clarify, regulate, and mandate use of shared interstate databases and official tools to clean up the voter rolls. This reflects in the higher number of bills in 2023 regarding election objective #2.
- (3) LAA researchers also observed the introduction of bills approximating objective #4 for the first time this year. Previously, no states had addressed this, whereas this year New Mexico and Pennsylvania are leading the way.
- (4) LAA researchers also observed the introduction of bills on a Federal and national level involving public policy objectives #2 and #3 specifically. Should these pass into law, then this would essentially bypass the need to pass them on a state level, at least as far as Federal elections are concerned. Of course, for ideal and uniform election integrity from top to bottom, states should pass these objectives for their state and local elections.
- (5) As mentioned previously, Arizona lost a previously awarded objective as it was not made into law. Specifically, the Election Integrity Unit was funded but not made into a formal office nor division, nor were its aims and goals enshrined into law. For this reason, new administrations can either dissolve them or modify them for their own agendas. States such as Texas and Virginia are at risk of losing these should they fail to become official and defined by the state legislatures. Furthermore, the power they currently wield has been challenged as unconstitutional. Fortunately, some states like Ohio are working to pass this item into law.

#### **Election Integrity Objectives Review**

#### 1. Thumbprint Authentication of Absentee Ballots.

A single machine-readable thumbprint on the affidavit envelope of an absentee ballot will limit the ability of an individual other than the voter of record to cast that ballot. Multiple ballots cast by a single individual will be easily detectable.

Pairing a thumbprint requirement with an absentee ballot request or as part of the voter registration process would practically eliminate fraudulent absentee ballots as well as problems with ballot signature verification, witness signatures, and unscrupulous ballot harvesting.

The state would encrypt the captured thumbprints as alphanumeric values with a one-way hash using a secure key and would be prohibited from sharing raw thumbprint data with any other government agency.

## 2. Mandated and Public Voter List Hygiene.

The state will be required to engage in several processes to ensure only those legally eligible to cast ballots are on voter registration lists and lists remain current.

Further, whether or not these processes result in a voter record's removal, the findings of these processes will be reflected in the publicly available voter list (not applicable to Social Security numbers). This will allow citizens or organizations to use this information to take additional steps to ensure only legal ballots are cast.

These processes will include, but are not limited to:

Shared Interstate Residency Databases. The state will cooperate with other states to build a secure, transactional database to detect when an individual has registered in another state or taken other steps that would indicate a loss of residency and therefore voter privileges. This



database will rely on a match of name, date of birth and the last four digits of the Social Security number. Any records matched through this process must be publicly flagged in the state's voter database.

Non-Citizen Matching Using the USCIS's SAVE Database. The state will take advantage of the USCIS's SAVE database to flag non-citizens and remove them from the voter list. Any records matched through this process must be publicly flagged in the state's voter database.

National Change of Address, Social Security Death Index, and Master Death File Matching. The state will match the voter list against the NCOA permanent moves, SSDI, and MDF on a monthly basis. Any matches will require a follow-up to ensure whether the voter is still eligible to cast a ballot and, if not, they will be removed from the voter list. Any records matched through this process must be publicly flagged in the state's voter database.

#### 3. Ban on the Use of "Black Box" Voting Equipment.

"Black Box" voting equipment uses proprietary, non-public software and hardware designs. According to a study by Princeton University, this equipment is highly susceptible to undetected hacking and manipulation.

The alternative is to mandate that all election equipment use open-source software and design that is available for inspection and review by the public and technology organizations to ensure the validity and accuracy of vote counting.

Open-source election software and hardware, paired with paper ballots, will remove the potential for tampering as well as the suspicion of tampering.

# 4. Appointment of a Citizens Elections Supervisory Committee.

The public must have mechanisms through which they are assured elections are conducted in accordance with the law to facilitate trust in election officials and to confirm the integrity of election officials.

The committee shall consist of trusted citizens who represent various political parties as well as non-partisan organizations. Each committee member will be granted access to the election process equivalent to the state's election director and any county election director. These representatives will have the responsibility of documenting the lawful execution of the election at every level.



# 5. Creation and Sufficient Funding for a Dedicated Voter Fraud Investigation Division within the State's Attorney General's Office.


Many states have little to no standing effort to investigate voter fraud. Dedicating sufficient staffing and funding to a permanent division within the state's attorney general's office will help defend the integrity of our elections.

# 6. Equitable Distribution of Private Contributions to Election Operations.

While private individuals and corporations may choose to sponsor improvements to election operations with direct donations of funding or material to government election agencies, these contributions may not be geographically targeted and must be equitably distributed throughout a state based on voter populations.

This restriction will only be applicable to liquid contributions to allow incidental contributions to continue, such as a club allowing its headquarters to be used as a polling place.
