CARE AND SUPPORT FOR STUDENTS WHO REPORTED SEXUAL ASSAULT — 2011–2014

After the university receives a report of sexual assault, the university will implement interim measures designed to care for and support the student.

Interim measures are available

- even if the student does not want to report the incident to law enforcement;
- even if the student has requested confidentiality or that the university not pursue an investigation or discipline and the university has determined that it can respect a student's request for confidentiality. (The university may be able to take measures to protect the student while keeping the identity of the student confidential, such as providing support services to the student; changing living arrangements or course schedules, assignments, or tests; and providing increased monitoring, supervision, or security at locations or activities where the sexual assault occurred);
- prior to or during an investigation of the sexual assault, and prior to a final determination that sexual assault occurred; and
- as needed and ongoing while the student is enrolled at the university.

The following data is based on students' acceptance of interim measures offered by the university following a report of sexual assault from 2011 to 2014. The university credits the growth in acceptance of interim measures in 2014 with the growth of students' willingness to report and understanding that they do not have to make a police report to receive care and support from the university. During the first contact with the university, students are made aware of all interim measures and reporting options, including assistance filing a report with police and/or the Office of Student Conduct and Community Standards

For the purposes of the data below, the most common interim measures were tracked. A student may receive as many interim measures as he or she accepts. Medical services other than referrals to counseling are not tracked, but medical services are always offered and facilitated for the student by the Sexual Assault Response Team.
