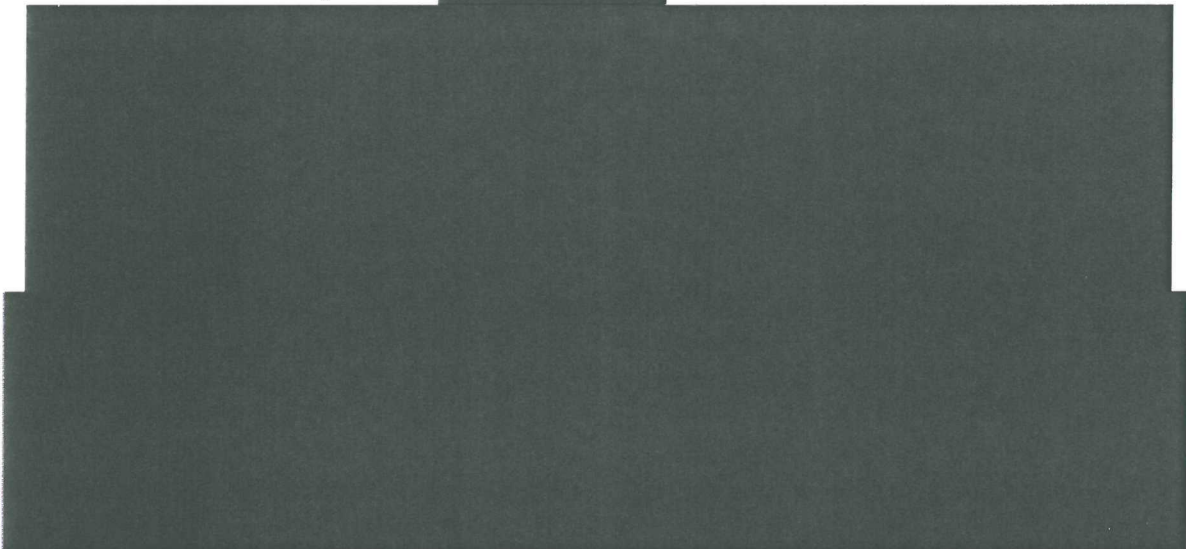



Dear Congressman Poe:

This is in response to your letter of April 19, 2007 to the President concerning [REDACTED] who was convicted in the Western District of Texas and sentenced to imprisonment for one year and one day. You suggested that the President should grant a pardon to [REDACTED]. Under §1.2 of the Rules Governing Petitions for Executive Clemency, a copy of which I am enclosing for your reference, [REDACTED] will not become eligible to apply for a full pardon until five years have elapsed after he completes the service of his sentence.

Nevertheless, if he is not appealing his conviction or sentence in the courts, through an appeal or other judicial proceeding, [REDACTED] would be eligible to apply for a commutation (reduction) of his sentence. Requests for executive clemency generally are entertained only upon formal application by the person for whom clemency is sought. At this point, [REDACTED] has not applied for clemency. Applications for commutation of sentence are generally available at federal correctional facilities and Bureau of Prisons staff can advise him as to the procedure for applying. Forms are also available on our website, www.usdoj.gov/pardon. If [REDACTED] has difficulty locating a form, he may contact this office to obtain one.

[REDACTED] and his supporters should be aware that commutation of sentence is an extraordinary remedy that is very rarely granted. However, all applications are carefully considered.
