

Our family moved here from San Francisco in 2014 and our decision to live on the North Shore was based solely on the opportunity for our kids to attend New Trier. I am committed to ensuring that we use our privilege to help others who have not had the good fortune to be born into circumstances where they have access such resources. That is why I am supportive of your efforts to expose our New Trier students to others' experiences outside our insulated, wealthy, easy North Shore bubble. The All School Seminar day is an excellent step in what I hope is an ongoing effort. In fact, I would love for our whole family to have the opportunity to hear the speakers. I want to applaud you on the "All-School Seminar" scheduled for this year. A discussion on race is not only important from a historical perspective, but could not be more timely in today's world. A program like this can only serve to enrich New Trier students and cause them to reflect on the experience of many Americans which is, most likely, very different from their own. Only good can come from New Trier students getting out of the "bubble" of the North Shore and engaging in varied conversations and fresh perspectives they may not have otherwise been exposed to. It is the job of our educational system to provide thought-provoking curriculum and you are doing just that.

In 10th grade at Andover High School in Bloomfield Hills, Michigan, my social studies class studied the neo-Nazi March in Skokie in 1977. A vigorous debate ensued on the meaning of the United States Constitution and the First Amendment guarantee of free speech. The arguments on both sides were fierce, heartfelt and varied. It was not until that exposure that I truly understood the value of our First Amendment and the rights of all to "speak" whether we agreed with the speech or not. This was a pivotal moment in my education and ignited a passion for Constitutional law. I went on to major in political science at the University of Michigan and from there law school at Northwestern University. That thought-provoking curriculum at Andover High School is no different than the thought-provoking curriculum you seek to unmask for your students. Perhaps this program will ignite passions in some students just as I experienced myself long ago. If it does, you have done your job and effected change. Even if it does not, there is always value in new revelations and introspection which will most certainly occur through the program you propose.







prohibit, nor should we prohibit, the free speech of Breitbart or any person or group, we should be
overwhelmingly prepared to respond. I very much look forward to identifying those that would protest
something like a "diversity day" as it is embarrassing to the community and is something that (I believe) a vast
majority of our populace would invite and encourage. One of the glaring downsides of our community is the
very lack of diversity that a small group of people seem to enjoy. I view it as a major detriment to our kids and
something that my wife and I have thought long and hard about. How do we show them the "real world" living
in Winnetka, despite all the amazing attributes of our village. I truly hope you and those in a position to
represent our community make it unequivocally clear what our community will represent going forward. My



Dear Principal Dubravec,

As an alumni of the Class of and someone with three generations invested in education at New Trier (myself-Class of my mother-Class of 1960-something, my grandfather- teacher), I am beyond disappointed to learn about the closed-minded community backlash and hatred towards your upcoming All School Seminar. I commend you and your staff for remaining firm on moving forward with this important seminar to help prepare and educate students for the "real world" which is vastly different that what they may be accustomed to growing up on the North Shore.

My New Trier education was amazing and I am so grateful to have had four years in an environment of tolerance and acceptance for all, even if the majority of the student body was comprised of white, upper/upper-middle-class, heterosexual, Christian classmates. No one cared about race or religion or sexual orientation - it was a non-issue. And when Dr. Reed, the now-retired Principal from Avoca/Marie Murphy Junior High declared intent to transition from male to female one summer, yes the Wilmette community expressed concern and curiosity, but Dr. Reed's credentials spoke for themselves and Dr. Reed successfully continued in the role for until recent retirement -- without further controversy from the community. This tolerant place is where I grew up and this is how I was raised - we are all individuals and equal -- and the world today is full of even more diversity. Without exposure or awareness of diversity, how are students today going to succeed in the outside world, outside of the North Shore "bubble" that is often described as sheltered and protective?

I've had a successful career living and working abroad in 6 major cities in 5 countries on 4 continents (in addition to living/working in 3 major US cities), and have traveled to 93 countries to date (for both work and personal). I speak varying amounts of 4 languages (2 of which started at NT) and have been exposed to diversity on all levels around the world. While a lot of students and alumni may/will not be in a position to see the world as I have, I am a firm supporter of diversity and environments of free thinking.

I wanted to email you and commend you and the school on establishing Seminar Day, which I understand will be held on February 28. I am a 2005 alum of New Trier. In the time since I graduated, I have pursued academic research surrounding implicit bias and race, ultimately earned a JD from UCLA Law focused in Critical Race Theory, the study of how law shapes racial meaning.

As a student at New Trier, I knew that the school was, for better or for worse, situated in a bubble. I had teachers at the Jr High level and at New Trier who sought to shed light on this. A transformative moment for me was reading Their Are No Children Here as an 8th grader at Wilmette Jr High. I didn't have the opportunity to fully engage in understanding how race functions on a political, social and economic level, and how our society normalizes the white experience of history until I was in college, and then law school. I wish I had the experience that you are offering to the students.

I read that some parents are upset that the seminar will teach "one perspective". It saddens me that they perceive hearing another perspective as a sort of threat. However, I feel strongly that the school is doing the right thing. Seminars such as these provide a framework for understanding other perspectives and reconciling our countries history. I'm also a bit jealous: I would love to hear Colston Whitehead and Andrew Aydin speak, Underground Railroad and March were two of my favorite books last year.

Dear Principal Dubravec,

I was reluctant to share my thoughts with you since I know so many of my former classmates (class of '99) are writing and it sounds like you are prepared to go ahead with this session despite the detractors. One of them with whom I shared my concerns urged me to go ahead anyway since mine is a perspective you may not otherwise hear.

I should start by saying that I used to be embarrassed and would often conceal that I attended NT precisely because of its lack of diversity and what I found to be a general ignorance (if not hostility) around issues of race and class. As a Baha'i, I was fortunate to have a diverse social circle outside of New Trier and the perception (grounded largely in reality, I think) is that the school reeked of privilege and exclusion (you may have heard that we even had our fair share of elitist and racist chants at sporting events). I often felt marginalized and like I needed to keep my mouth shut when it came to issues affecting POCs, with classmates even asking outright, "why are you always talking about your black friends??"

These days I'm thrilled (although shocked, I'm sad to say) that so many of my NT peers have been so vocal about racial equality and social justice on social media, but I find myself with a nagging pain that asks where all these people were when I was in high school - when I felt like these were not popular discussions and I was often othered.

I'm trying to be happy with what I see as a positive evolution in the increased awareness of my peers (and it sounds like the school more broadly), but I cannot help but feel like NT is precisely one of the institutions that has implicitly represented these things we are struggling against.

In truth, I hope NT can break from its stereotype as a perfect embodiment of inequality, injustice and white privilege, especially if it goes beyond symbolic gestures like spending a day thinking about race. (The notion that there's no space even for that is nauseating, frankly!)

I feel genuinely torn - back when I was a student we had some events related to diversity that I seem to remember people ridiculing and calling a waste of time, and did I think that changed the nature of the school as a perpetuator of white privilege? Not really. But maybe those were seeds that were planted at a critical time that allowed us all to be woke adults. It's entirely possible that, even with the relatively unsophisticated approach schools were able to take back in those days, those efforts laid the foundation for consciousness and normalized these kinds of discussions and articulation of these concerns in the long-run.

The one thing I hope you can take away from this note is the need for a broader transformation, of which days like the seminar form a necessary albeit insufficient part. I applaud your efforts to create discursive space around issues of race, especially on the North Shore where I trust its existence is still rare.

One thought I had is perhaps it could be useful to engage students as well as the broader community in some self-reflection using texts like Kozol's Savage Inequalities and see how much has really changed. I think it would be truly impactful, in addition to making space for other voices to be heard, for the NT community to

assess what role it plays in these problematic systems and what it would look like for it to be an actual force for justice. I worry that much like when I was at NT, students may have a hard time relating to experiences of people they are unlikely to encounter under normal circumstances and won't know how to act on this information nor what role they can play.

I apologize for the meandering nature of this note - please also excuse me if you have already considered the kinds of issues I raise above. I have in many ways left my NT days behind and abandoned any notion that something meaningful can be done to avoid the kinds of experiences that I had - which is why I am so heartened to see what looks to me to be a genuine and good-faith effort to change attitudes and effect racial harmony at my nearly all-white high school. Please keep it up - we are rooting for you!

I grew up in a poor rural farming community where a third of my classmates lived in trailer parks. Even though it was an all Caucasian community, the cultural differences between our working poor and the middle class were significant. Growing up in this environment made me realize that so much of what I considered to be "true" or "fact" was really "point-of-view."

I love Wilmette and the New Trier district. I love my town and my community. But one of my biggest fears in moving here was that we'd be missing out on diversity. Consequently, my husband and I have committed to doing things to help expose our kids to economic and racial diversity to help balance out their experience, broaden view worldview, develop empathy for those with a different reality, and foster gratitude for the privileges they were born with.

I absolutely applaud NT for offering this seminar. Our kids need to hear what life is like for someone who looks differently than them. Our kids need to hear about challenges and struggles others deal with every day that our kids may never have had to think about. Given what is going on in the news today, we desperately need opportunities to meet people who are different than us. We need the chance to understand another's point-of-view.

I am writing in support of the planned Diversity Seminar. As a New Trier alumnus and current Winnetka resident, I believe that this seminar and the critical thinking it requires are integral components of every high school students' education, and fitting responses to NT's motto to commit "minds to inquiry and hearts to compassion."

I was a senior at NT when 9/11 occurred, and the school held a similar seminar helping students to understand the attack. One breakout session I attended was called "Muslims in the Movies," which hosted an ageappropriate exercise of watching famous film clips featuring Muslims. Viewing these helped us to identify stereotypes and cautioned us against falling victim to these inaccurate media portrayals. This session led to my more nuanced understanding of how minorities can be depicted, a lifeskill that I feel has not only made me a more compassionate human being and teacher, but also helped me in my studies in college. Because of the 9/11 seminar day, I was more prepared to discuss race and religion than many of my university peers, and I found myself performing better in many history, political science, and English classes. (And, it was a heck of a lot easier for me to make friends!)

department, and then I taught at a smaller Catholic school, and most recently at a public high school in San Diego. The school in San Diego happened to be most diverse, and I feel this greatly benefitted their education; they were better able to identify the underlying racial tensions in The Great Gatsby and thus had a deeper, more multilayered appreciation of the book; they had richer discussions about literature because their backgrounds and interpretations were so wildly variant; and they felt more comfortable reading literature from authors who were different from them, whether that writer was Thoreau, Plath, or Toni Morrison. Contrasted with the students at the more homogeneous Catholic school, and even New Trier, it was clear as a teacher that these San Diegan students had stronger literacy skills, interpretive skills, and a stronger background with which to read and discuss. It is important to remember that these are the students who will be NT students' peers at the university level, and depriving NT students of even this one day to have a discussion that happens so naturally across the rest of the country is harmful to their academic and personal futures.

I know firsthand both from having been a student and staff member at New Trier how hard the faculty works, how committed they are to facilitating student growth, and how professional and nonjudgmental they are with their students. I know they wouldn't invite anybody to the school who would harm students or present them with material that isn't age appropriate. I have also known minority students who claim their time at NT was "absolutely the worst" and another whose family moved across the country seeking a more inclusive educational environment, which shows how needed this seminar is.

Feel free to share my words with anyone who you think needs to hear from my experience and perspective. Please send my deepest support to the wonderful faculty and staff, whom I trust completely and look forward to having be my children's teachers when they reach that age.

I am writing to commend New Trier on the amazing step forward it is taking in combating racism. I attended New Trier for three years and I care deeply about the community. I feel incredibly gratified to see the efforts of students, administrators, and Voices in Equity coming to fruition.

As I'm sure you all know, there is a vocal group of parents who oppose the day. They suggest inviting more conservative speakers to promote a "diversity of opinions." I think the missing piece here is that the North Shore lacks a diversity of opinions--both the student body and staff of New Trier are predominantly white. This should not be a source of shame or guilt, but rather a reason to listen to people of color and other folks who are underrepresented in our school.

I am extremely impressed with your range of seminar topics--they are thought-provoking, contemporary and intersectional. Your speakers are renowned in their field. My sister has a degree in African American history, and when she heard Colson Whitehead was coming, she was amazed (and a little jealous).

All this to say that I enthusiastically support the work you are doing, and I hope this kind of work will continue with the collaboration of the entire community. This is a fantastic way to show students how they can commit their lives to the service of humanity.

I have attached the letter I wrote to Parents of New Trier, addressing the points on their page and citing sources that are pertinent to the topic. Please excuse any typos; I wrote this at 11pm after three hours in the library.

Dear Parents of New Trier,

I attended New Trier for three years and am now at Wellesley College. I recently heard about your response to the February Seminar Day, "Understanding Today's Struggle for Racial Civil Rights." I am not contacting you to attack you personally; I wish to create a dialogue about something that I feel is incredibly important. I would like to respond to the main points on your website:

1. Parents were overtly excluded from input into the Seminar Day despite attempts by many parents to be constructively included. This is our community. This is our school. These are our kids. Parent input is essential.

I agree that this is "our community"--I love this school, and even though I no longer attend, I want to do my best to make it a better place for future students. But to the best of my knowledge, New Trier parents do not have much input on regular school curricula--teachers, administrators, and the state of Illinois are responsible for structuring lessons. This includes assemblies, extracurricular activities and other types of learning we may not think of as "regular class." Why should this day be different?

2. The 2017 Seminar Day almost duplicates an "MLK Seminar Day" held in 2016, when only 58 percent of children attended the regular school day vs. the usual 95 percent (the fact it was Rev. Martin Luther King Day should not be assumed to be the reason this).

First of all, the fact that it was MLK Day is (I think) very relevant, for two reasons: 1) families may have made plans for vacation or college visits in advance, which could increase absences, and 2) I think it is important to note that only 58% of students attended a seminar on the legacy of Dr. King and modern civil rights on a day honoring him. This seems disrespectful and close-minded--the day was about education, yet so many students and parents were (and still are) unwilling to listen. Second of all, this level of absence cannot be attributed solely to the school. Parents/students make the decision to bring their children/go to school every single day; some of the responsibility must rest on their shoulders: why are they choosing to avoid confronting their own biases and learning about racism from people who face it (and fight it) every day?

- 3. The diversion of resources: Over \$533,000 is being diverted from other uses instruction, more constructive programming, etc. to present Seminar Day; (This is the estimated operating costs for the school campuses for that day, based on answers to FOIA requests. All staff are directly involved or impacted.)
- 4. The hundreds or more staff resource hours spent preparing for this day. (A FOIA request to the school has asked for an estimate.) An official involved in the process described the staff preparation process to the Board of Education as "a lot of work" and even "exhausting."

I will respond to these two points together, because they both express a similar idea: that the Seminar Day is wasteful. This speaks to some serious bias. Why is confronting racism, hearing the experiences of people of color, and learning about black history not considered "constructive programming"? Is it more constructive than learning the names of various generals in the War of 1812? Or the difference between harmonic and chromatic scales? The topics discussed in the seminars affect people *today*, *right now*-even if they don't affect the majority of our community. If we want to commit our lives to the service of humanity, we need to learn about the issues affecting our country.

5. There is no mechanism requiring that parents be informed of the panel discussions their children select, nor one to approve those choices, unlike regular course work which does require parental

approval. At the very least, such a mechanism would ensure parents would have more tools to talk to their children about their experiences that day.

While parents are required to sign the syllabi from their children's classes, teachers are not obligated to discuss the curriculum with parents or change it to suit their agenda. There are other schools on the North Shore that tailor curricula to the wishes of parents rather than what the administration thinks is best for students, such as Loyola or NSCD.

6. Peer review studies (e.g., from the Harvard Business Review in 2016) increasingly show that diversity programs like this create more harm than they do good, because they reinforce racial stereotypes and resentments. In contrast, activities or work with people from different racial backgrounds can enhance relationships. (For ideas of what this might look like for your family or the school community, see "Alternative suggestions for Seminar Day."

I read this article, and there are a few problems with the analogy. First of all, this study looks at businesses, not schools. The main difference here is that businesses are structured to make the highest possible profit, whereas schools are designed to encourage learning. "Diversity programs that get results" are not applicable in most cases: college recruitment, mentoring (sponsor and protege) and managing/task forces are not possible or appropriate in the school environment.

HBR suggests that contact is an effective method of fostering diversity and striking down bias. By inviting people of color to lead panels and speak to students, New Trier is allowing a predominantly white student body to interact with nonwhite academics and activists. The study also attacks the "dos and don'ts" approach that most office diversity programs take; however, it seems like New Trier is trying to encourage discussion rather than telling students what to do. Many seminars involve the phrases "group discussion" and "interactive"--students are given a voice to share their own experiences.

7. Worst of all, opportunity is squandered to consider different viewpoints and real solutions to problems facing the African American community, and to overcome black/white disparity.

I object to the wording here: what are "real solutions" and why can't speakers or seminar leaders offer them? New Trier has invited two award-winning authors, experts in their field, who have devoted much of their lives to finding constructive solutions to racism and prejudice. My sister has a degree in African American history, and she was astonished (and giddy) when she heard Colson Whitehead would be speaking. He is a leader in his field.

8. Murder rates are skyrocketing just a few miles south of us, and almost all victims are African American. There are profound reasons for this, as well as racial divisions around the country which might be intensifying. But in a half-million-dollar-day set aside to focus on race relations, New Trier students will be talking about their feelings, including guilt, related to things like "microaggressions;" "systemic racism" in higher education admissions; the inherent bias of the "gender binary;" or Colin Kaepernick's pursuit of "social justice for people of color in America."

This is where racism starts: with small admissions of bias, hurtful words that reinforce the idea that racism is okay in our conversations, as long as it isn't overt. From these seemingly unimportant interactions stem greater problems: violence against people of color, poverty, housing discrimination and police brutality. These issues affect not only black people, but American Indian people, trans people, and other oppressed groups. All of these prejudices are related. Your website claims that some seminar topics are irrelevant to civil rights, but the concept of intersectionality tells us that oppression cannot be separated out: a black woman is not discriminated against just because she is black, or just because she

is a woman; her identity has multiple facets and all must be considered in fighting for her rights. This fight should not be fueled by guilt or shame, but an accountability for our actions that drives us to justice.

A note on your seminar comments: racism is happening, it is real, and there is no point in hiding it. If we ignore something, it will not go away; it will only continue to fester beneath the cover of ignorance and inappropriate optimism. "Racism" is not a dirty word and should not be considered "divisive" or "biased"; confronting our racism is the first step to eradicating it. Here are a few sources that cite issues of racism in contemporary America:

Why racism is a systemic issue (Washington Post)
Racism among young people (PBS)
Race in mass incarceration (written by a Stanford Law graduate)
Encyclopedia article on police brutality (Encyclopedia Brittanica)

You can also peruse the <u>sources at the bottom of this Wikipedia article</u> (more reliable than the actual article).

Finally, a message on representation: New Trier students listen to white people *every day*. The overwhelming majority of students and teachers are white. Is it not important for these students--your children--to be exposed to the perspectives of others? You claim that the speakers are not diverse, but neither is New Trier. We must take steps to remedy this by listening to people with different experiences.

The Seminar Day is not silencing white voices; it is uplifting the underrepresented voices of people of color.

I hope you will take my input into account and support this amazing step forward in confronting racial bias in our places of learning. Do not hesitate to contact me with any follow-up questions.

New Trier prepared me so well for success in college, and I am incredibly grateful for the education I received and the opportunities NT offered me. I have one brother who graduated in 2014, and another brother who is a current junior, and care deeply about the continuation of New Trier's tradition of providing one of the best public educations in the country. It was highly distressing to hear about parents pulling their children out of school during Martin Luther King Jr. Day last year lest they be exposed to discussions surrounding the realities of race relations and civil rights, and the sources cited in the Parents of New Trier opposition materials are laughable. I do not believe you hold these viewpoints at all; I just urge you to keep pushing forward and advancing conversations surrounding bias, race, violence, and inclusivity at New Trier. <u>First - I have to say that I think New Trier High School is the best school in the country.</u> With 5 very different kids (one with significant special needs), we feel extremely fortunate to be a part of this school. It's honestly the sole reason we have stayed in Winnetka. Linda Yonke - you will truly be missed, thank you for everything you have built.				
Second - I'm all for Diversity Day. I just wish it wasn't only about skin color. As the parent of an African-American son I can honestly say that he has never been teased or ridiculed because of his skin color. At the age of almost 13, most of the kids he has grown up with, as well as the friends of his older siblings (ages 15 - 21) really don't see skin color.				
If you ask he will tell you that his skin color has never been an issue, however, he has been bullied for being small, a theatre kid, not into sports, non-athletic, called gay, etc. Fortunately, he has a ton of confidence and is quite capable of dealing with all of this. But skin color and being black - not an issue.				
Third - Subjects discussed on Diversity Day, including Affirmative Action. I'm all for it, but let's be real. When we mark the "African American " box for the has a decent chance of getting into the Ivy League schools his older sister (with a 5.0 GPA) was rejected from. Some of these same parents who are "all for" our kids listening to controversial speakers telling us about Affirmative Action and fairness are the same parents whose kid is at Princeton because he/she can row or at Georgetown because they are an alum and can afford give a ton of money every year. Also, some of these parents who try and make us feel bad about questioning the appropriateness of one or two of the Diversity Day speakers are the same parents who chose to send their kids to NORTH SHORE COUNTRY DAY - because New Trier was too big?!?

<u>Finally</u>, when will they realize it is not about color or skin around here? A major part of the Diversity Day discussion should focus on SOCIOECONOMIC differences. Diversity isn't just black and white, and prejudice isn't limited to skin color. We are all extremely fortunate to live where we live and our children are benefiting

from our good fortune. We all worked hard to get here - but, as in our family's case, our fathers grew up poor and worked even harder. They have instilled in us a great respect for all people regardless of socioeconomic income level, nationality, religion, skin color, sexual orientation, etc.

Unfortunately, socioeconomic bias, discrimination and stereotyping is exceedingly prevalent and should be addressed on Diversity Day. Just ask the students; if you were walking down the street and you were walking toward a group of black high school athletes who looked like typical New Trier students - would you cross the street? Heck No! If, however, you were walking toward a group of white boys who looked like they didn't "belong" around here - would you cross the street? 99.9% would say absolutely. I've done this with some of my daughter's friends.


It's amazing to me how many around here feel that it is ok to make fun and/or disrespect the working class or middle class, many of whom are white and hispanic, in addition to black.

Education regarding Tolerance and Diversity is about more than just race and skin color.

Do I think our two daughters who are presently at New Trier will benefit from Diversity Day? Sure, but I think that a realistic portrayal of Diversity would be more beneficial. I don't think would want to attend Diversity Day at New Trier if the focus is just on skin color. He doesn't really think he is different, at least not because of his skin - so why create and perpetuate more divisiveness-especially when it really isn't there to begin with?

I write to express my support and appreciation for the NT faculty and students' efforts to put together such an impressive set of speakers and seminars for Feb 28. Contrary to the opinions of a handful of noisy detractors, I do not think that white privilege or learning about what is it like to be black in the US is a left-wing concern. It is important for all NT kids, regardless of the political leanings of their parents, to gain some perspective on life outside our bubble. It is insulting to the kids for the detractors to suggest that they can be "brainwashed" by one day of seminars. And provoking introspection and thinking about what it is like to be non-white and affluent is not brainwashing; it is an important part of educating kids to be responsible world citizens.

Thank you for your peaceful organizing efforts here at civil dialogue. I am a graduate of NTHS. Class of 1988. I grew up in Glencoe. My father was a teacher at Evanston Township H.S. I am African-American.

There is one sentiment repeated a couple of times in Today's article in the Tribune I think betrays your intentions:

"I just don't think there's racism in the New Trier area."

Is it possible that the very fact that one can safely harbor such a notion, while others live a different reality altogether, might tell us there is some learning to do?

Being a 3rd generation African-American male raised in Glencoe, I can promise you that there is no possible way that I could have *possibly* made a fact-based statement such as the one above. Nor could have my father. Nor could his. From being pulled over by police for stealing (my very own) cars time after time after time, to having to sit thru a class reacting with applause to the news over the loudspeaker that Mayor Harold Washington had just died unexpectedly, to being followed around stores, to just plain being called "nigger" (a very rare occurrence albeit), overt actions like this manage to covertly shape the world view of NTHS students, and to the extent they go unexamined, they fester.

I'm <u>proud</u> to see NTHS finally make a concerted effort towards trying to understand each other. Understanding is what makes our young people sharper, smarter, and more ready for the future. Growing up on the North Shore was a bounty and a blessing for which I'm most grateful. For every instance of overt racism I had maybe ten of overt love an inclusion. And maybe that's partly why I'm a productive, vibrant, member of my Bronzeville community on Chicago's south side.

Love and inclusion always produces better results than cynicism and exclusion.


Dear New Trier School Board Members,

We love the Winnetka community and feel very fortunate to live here. We also recognize that we have to work hard to create a set of diverse experiences for our children so they understand that this homogenous community is just a tiny corner of the globe, and the experience and opportunities here that shape their perspectives are unique and not readily available to all.

We feel it's our responsibility to raise children who are global citizens, grateful givers and self-sufficient critical thinkers. And since our children spend more time in school during the week than they do home with us, we look to our schools to reenforce these positive messages when they are younger and to create a safe and open environment for more challenging discussion as they mature. When they are young the message is one of kindess and gratitude and the importance of being a good community member. When they are in middle school the message is one of inclusion, acceptance and self-reliance. I read with interest your plans for a seminar on race relations Feb. 28. You say that race "is one of the most difficult things to talk about." What if you were of color *and went to New Trier?*

I wrote a book published by the History Press, available at Amazon:

35,000 words on people of color who went through the Glencoe schools, then New Trier. Why isn't that the focus of your seminar rather than famous names from afar? Just what does John Lewis offer New Trier?

I spoke to a group of faculty and counselors several years ago about race at New Trier, a group assembled by Anne O'Malley. As archivist at the time, Anne was most helpful to me in preparing my book. Why was there no followup to our meeting?

I would be happy to talk to you about real, live, *local* African Americans -- New Trier grads just like the ones you encounter every day.

Seminars and workshops that tackle these important issues help to educate our students in compassion, empathy, and understanding – qualities that appear to be sorely lacking for many in our country today. As a parent of a 2016 New Trier graduate and an incoming student in the class of 2021, I appreciate your efforts to help our students see the world beyond the very insulated context of the North Shore. in 2014 and our decision to live on the North Shore was based Our family moved here from solely on the opportunity for our kids to attend New Trier. Our older son's great experience at New Trier and our younger son's excitement about being a New Trier student have validated that decision. My primary concern with living in the New Trier district has been the apparent lack of diversity on just about any index – racial/ethnic, religious, and, in particular, socioeconomic, and I worry that such lack of diversity leads to (among other things) a very self-centered world view and a lack of understanding for the experiences of anyone who is not straight, white, and privileged. I struggle with the fact that we had the resources to choose to live in the New Trier district to access a top-notch education for our children yet this meant placing them in an environment where the majority of the students are just like them. 
