
Before Republicans won control of the Texas state legislature in 2002, Democrats had a 17-15 edge in the Congressional delegation.

After flexing their majority to change the district maps, Republicans won 21 seats to the Democrats 11 in 2004 – a six seat swing from 2002.1



The Supreme Court later ordered the redrawing of one district which resulted in the current delegation of 20 Republicans to 12 Democrats.




