In addition to the records requested above, we also request records describing the processing of this request, including records sufficient to identify search terms used and locations and custodians searched, and any tracking sheets used to track the processing of this request. If your agency uses FOIA questionnaires or certifications completed by individual custodians or components to determine whether they possess responsive materials or to describe how they conducted searches, we also request any such records prepared in connection with the processing of this request.

The timeframe for this request is December 12, 2017 through the date that searches are conducted for records responsive to this FOIA request.

We ask that you search for records from all components of the Census Bureau that may be reasonably likely to produce responsive results.

EXPEDITED PROCESSING REQUEST

We request that you expedite the processing of this request pursuant to 5 U.S.C. § 552(a)(6)(E) and 15 C.F.R. § 4.6(f)(iii), (iv). This request meets the criteria for expedited processing because there is "[a]n urgency to inform the public about an actual or alleged Federal Government activity" and this request is "made by a person who is primarily engaged in disseminating information," and because this request concerns "[a] matter of widespread and exceptional media interest in which there exist possible questions about the government's integrity that could affect public confidence."

The addition of a citizenship question to the 2020 decennial census is, without a doubt, a matter of widespread and exceptional media interest, with coverage especially focusing on the

decision-making process.¹ In November, a widely publicized internal Census Bureau report exposed a recent increase in respondents expressing concerns about confidentiality of data related to immigration, especially among Spanish-speaking respondents.² Subsequent media reports have highlighted the risk that certain immigrant communities will simply not respond to the decennial census.³ And, in the memorandum announcing his decision, Secretary Ross noted that Census Bureau leadership "expressed concern that Option B, which would add a citizenship question to the decennial census, would negatively impact the response rate for noncitizens."⁴ Secretary Ross overruled career officials at the Census Bureau, who believed that a citizenship question should not be added to the decennial census.⁵ The addition of the question is, or will soon be, the subject of several high profile lawsuits involving a dozen states, which themselves are receiving media coverage.⁶

An accurate and unpoliticized decennial census is critical to our democracy: census data provides the basis for not only congressional apportionment but also billions of dollars of federal spending, including critical programs like Medicaid.⁷ An undercount resulting from the addition

of a citizenship question impacts all Americans, and public confidence in the government particularly in the Department of Commerce and the Census Bureau—is at stake. In addition, the public has an urgent need to know whether there were objective and compelling reasons to not include such a question—including the alleged overruling of career professionals at the Census Bureau. Secretary Ross submitted the citizenship question to Congress on March 29, 2017,⁸ and the Census Bureau must begin preparing census materials soon. Time is of the essence.

The Protect Democracy Project intends to disseminate the information obtained in response to this request. As the District Court for the District of Columbia "easily" determined in recent litigation in a separate FOIA request, "Protect Democracy satisfied these standards" of being "primarily engaged in disseminating information." Protect Democracy Project, Inc. v. U.S. Dep't of Def., 263 F. Supp. 3d 293, 298 (D.D.C. 2017). The Protect Democracy Project operates in the tradition of 501(c)(3) good government organizations that qualify under FOIA as "news media organizations." Like those organizations, the purpose of The Protect Democracy Project is to "gather information of potential interest to a segment of the public, use its editorial skills to turn the raw materials into distinct work, and distribute that work to an audience." Nat's Sec. Archive v. Dep't of Defense, 880 F.2d 1381, 1387 (D.C. Cir. 1989). Indeed, The Protect Democracy Project has routinely demonstrated the ability to disseminate information about its FOIA requests to a wide audience.⁹ The Protect Democracy Project will disseminate information and analysis about this request-and any information obtained in response-through its website (protectdemocracy.org); its Twitter feed (@protetdemocracy), which has more than 13,000 followers; its email list of approximately 20,000 people; and sharing information with other members of the press.

Because it concerns a subject of intensive media interest implicating public confidence, and about which there is an urgent need to inform the public, this request meets the requirements of 5 U.S.C. 552(a)(6)(E) and 15 C.F.R. 4.6(f)(iii), (iv). It is therefore incumbent upon your
