Take those, please, just one u Well, I will just give you my little piece here that nobody has said, or seems to take any note of the sacrifices that these women made for 10 these children over all of these years. These 11 ladies were good ladies. They were trying to do 12 the best they could. Some were extremely 13 intelligent women. Others were not that 14 intelligent and they were operating according to 15 their intelligence, so if some of them made 16 mistakes it was understandable. Some of them 17 were poor farm girls off the farm up in Quebec 18 that went in the convent and might not have had 19 any great, certainly not any great child care 20 skills or something, so maybe they made some mistakes, but those women also sacrificed. Those 21 22 23 girls, those nuns would be up late at night; if a child was sick, they would stay with the child as 24

a mother would, and they also gave up time from their families, when families would come to visit them here, so they could be with the children. I just feel that these women did a wonderful job over all of these years; certainly there were mistakes, but they did wonderful work. My view was that they took very good care of these

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Certainly there could have been, I don't like to keep coming back, some bad things could children. have happened, because that happens in every institution, that is the world. That is the family of the world. It happens in every family. So I just want to pay tribute to these good women who had given up their lives to take care of these children, and I think somebody should say something about that somewhere along the line, because they did. They gave of themselves and of their talents, and of their physical strength. And, yes, they may have floundered at times; but I have never met anyone in my life who hasn't. So I want that a little bit on the record that, the good care the Sisters gave. They gave the best care they could; the best care they knew how to give, and they asked nothing in return.

And another thing I want to say is the quality of some of the children who were brought in here is something that hasn't really been stated too much; that many of these children were taken out of courts, because they were juvenile offenders and so forth; and they are difficult to deal with. I am not going to dwell on that.

So with all of these accusations I feel very badly because nobody says the wonderful work these Sisters made for over a hundred years to the children of this state, that the state was not taking care of, incidentally. So I guess that is where I am going to end. I want to pay a big tribute to these Sisters.

The Sisters of Providence are a wonderful group, not only here, but they run the largest mental institution in Canada; outside of Montreal, St. John of God, its name is. Marvelous hospitals in Western Canada. Marvelous youth center in, in DesPlaines. Marvelous places in the state of Washington, big hospitals. And I just think it is not right, and many of the Sister who were here had served in those institutions, too, they had been transferred around.
