Preliminary Investigative Narrative:

In May 2015, Deputy District Attorney (DDA) [REDACTED] was assigned Case No BA424247, People VS [REDACTED] which involved the detention and arrest of Deft [REDACTED] by 77th Street Gang Enforcement Detail (GED) officers on April 29, 2014.

In receiving the administrative reports and Digital In-Car Video System (DICVS) footage from the Los Angeles Police Department (LAPD), [REDACTED] discovered that the account of events memorialized in the official arrest report and testimony obtained from a transcribed record of the preliminary hearing, substantially differed from video and audio footage captured by the officer's own DICVS. DDA [REDACTED] opined the totality of the discrepancies reviewed raised serious legal concerns into the credibility of Police Officer II Kevin Gaines, Serial No. 40210, 77th St GED.

DDA [REDACTED] believed that while none of the discrepancies changed the fact the defendant illegally possessed a gun on April 29, 2014, they did call into question the credibility of Officer Gaines, which was vital in proving key elements of the incident that occurred off-camera.

This complaint came to the Department's attention on June 30, 2015, when Sergeant I Jeffrey Vach, Serial No. 32811, Criminal Investigation Division (CID) - South Section, Internal Affairs Group (IAG), received a complaint package from the Los Angeles County District Attorney's Office, Justice System Integrity Division.

The Complaint Investigation, CF No. 15-001941, resulted in six allegations of misconduct against two Department employees:

Police Officer II Kevin Gaines
Serial No. 40210

77th Street Area

The allegations are listed below with the recommendations for classification and supporting rationale.

CLASSIFICATION

It is recommended that Allegations 1 and 2 be classified as **UNFOUNDED**.

RATIONALE

This classification is best supported by the statement of Deputy District Attorney [REDACTED], who prosecuted and convicted [REDACTED] for illegal possession of a handgun. [REDACTED] stated, "...none of the discrepancies changed "the fact" that [REDACTED] illegally possessed a gun on the date of incident..." [REDACTED] is the only person who disputes the fact that he had a handgun. [REDACTED] credibility, as a felon and known gang member with a prior arrest for the same crime, is suspect at best. Although [REDACTED] denied to the investigator that he had the gun, he had already pled guilty to possession of the gun. Further, [REDACTED] repeatedly misidentified the arresting officers, yet insisted that he knew each officer by sight. There is no dispute that the officers recovered a gun from the location and that [REDACTED] was the person arrested and convicted for the crime. There is also no question that [REDACTED] is the person who the officers immediately focused upon and chased into the building where the gun was recovered. Therefore, it is recommended that Allegations 1 and 2 be classified as **UNFOUNDED**.



CLASSIFICATION

It is recommended that Allegations 3 and 4 be classified as **SUSTAINED**.

RATIONALE

There is no question that the arrest report differs from the DICVS recording of the incident. Specifically, the initial physical movements of [REDACTED] and whether or not Officer Gaines immediately gave chase to [REDACTED] or stopped to search others beforehand, are inconsistent and therefore inaccurate. Both officers acknowledged in their interviews that these differences exist. Therefore, it is recommended that Allegations 3 and 4 be classified as **SUSTAINED**.

ALLEGATION 5. The Department alleges that on June 3, 2014, Officer Gaines, while on-duty, made false statements in his testimony in Los Angeles Superior Court, Department 33.

CLASSIFICATION

It is recommended that Allegation 5 be classified as **SUSTAINED**.

RATIONALE

When Officer Gaines testified in court he had an obligation to be completely factual. If he did not remember certain details he should have said so. While the inconsistencies are not especially relevant to the crime in question, when uttered under oath they are nonetheless false.

Officer [REDACTED] clearly saw something that led him to believe that [REDACTED] had a gun but it is doubtful that Officer Gaines interpreted it this way as he casually walks up to the group. Instead of testifying to his own observations he apparently adopted his partner's observations as his own.

Officer Gaines is currently facing unrelated allegations of a similar nature that are pending before a Board of Rights. This weighs on this adjudicator and these findings. Officer Gaines' credibility is questionable at best. Therefore, it is recommended that Allegation 5 be classified as **SUSTAINED**.



CLASSIFICATION

It is recommended that Allegation 6 be classified as **EXONERATED**.

RATIONALE

Officer Gaines admits that he did not fully stop for each of the stop signs while approaching the park. He did, however, clear each intersection before proceeding. A complete and thorough review of the video reveals that there are no pedestrians or other moving vehicles in sight at any of the three stop signs. Further, Officer Gaines is driving at a speed that appears to be at, or below, the speed limit of 25 mph in each instance. For the record, it was daylight and visibility was excellent. This was not casual driving, it was a tactical operation. The investigation indicates that he and Officer [REDACTED] were planning to surprise the group at the gym. Officer Gaines clearly explained his knowledge of the area around the park and how the gang lookouts operate. This is a well-established countermeasure employed by gangs throughout the city. The vehicle code specifically authorizes such driving during active emergency situations, which the Department has long interpreted as applying to tactical operations. This adjudicator has been present at countless tactical operations where officers did not fully stop at a stop sign while approaching the location and further finds no evidence of any kind in the investigation to indicate that there was anything "unsafe" about Officer Gaines' driving. In fact, they achieved their objective of surprise and recovered a gun from a known gang member, possibly preventing loss of life or another felonious crime from happening. Therefore, it is recommended that Allegation 6, as amended, be classified as **EXONERATED**.

DIGITAL IN-CAR VIDEO/BODY WORN VIDEO/AUDIO RECORDINGS

DICVS was instrumental in both sustaining and unbounding allegations in this investigation. It was also relevant to the criminal prosecution of [REDACTED]

EMPLOYEE DEVELOPMENT PLAN, OFFICER GAINES

Officer Gaines will be directed to formal training with the 77th Training Unit on report writing. This is where he went wrong in this investigation and where a better report would have prevented this investigation from ever arising. The importance of viewing video before writing the report will be impressed upon him and he will be trained on the Body Worn Video as well.

PENALTY

The allegations that are sustained here are serious in nature. Inaccuracies in reporting can endanger both officers' careers and the freedom of the public. Sometimes it is the little details that make or break a case and therefore it must be impressed upon Officer Gaines that he cannot allow this to happen again. Therefore, in accordance with the Department Penalty Guide, I recommend that Officer Gaines be directed to a Board of Rights.

WORK HISTORY ANALYSIS

A complete and thorough review of Officer Gaines' TEAMS report was conducted. Officer Gaines has been employed by the Department for eight years. Officer Gaines has no sustained complaints. However, he is currently pending a Board of Rights for an unrelated case, with a different partner, where the allegations also include false testimony. This factored into the recommendation for a Board of Rights in this matter.

WORK PERMIT REVIEW

A review of Officer Gaines' work permit history revealed that he does not have any current work permits; therefore, no conflict of interest concerns, or impairment of performance or efficiency issues were identified.

RELIEF FROM DUTY RECOMMENDATIONS

None.

EMPLOYEE DEVELOPMENT PLAN OFFICER [REDACTED]

None. Officer [REDACTED] left LAPD during this investigation and is now a law enforcement officer with another agency in another state.

PENALTY

The allegations that are sustained here are serious in nature. Inaccuracies in reporting can endanger both officers' careers and the freedom of the public. Therefore, in accordance with the Department Penalty Guide, I recommend that Officer [REDACTED] be directed to a Board of Rights.

WORK HISTORY ANALYSIS

No TEAMS or personnel files were available to review as Officer [REDACTED] resigned from the Department effective October 22, 2016.



1 **INVESTIGATIVE RESPONSIBILITY:** The Investigating Officer (I/O) for this case was
2 Detective II Carrie A. Katsumata, Serial No. 30832, Internal Affairs Group (IAG), Criminal
3 Investigation Division (CID), South Section. She can be contacted at (213) 996-4151. Requests
4 for a supplemental investigation must be approved by the CID commanding officer (C/O) via an
5 Intradepartmental Correspondence, Form 15.02.

6
7 **STATUTE DATE:** The original statute date was June 30, 2016. The case was tolled from its
8 inception due to a possible criminal filing. On February 14, 2017, Head Deputy District
9 Attorney (DDA) James W. Garrison, Justice System Integrity Division (JSID) rejected the
10 criminal case due to insufficient evidence. The new statute date is February 14, 2018.

11
12 **Note:** The below investigation, pages 1-15, document the Criminal investigation
13 presented to JSID for filing consideration. The remaining pages document the
14 Administrative investigation. Some additions/corrections/changes to the *Criminal*
15 portion of the investigation were made by Detective III Barbara S. Moulton,
16 Serial No. 25985, CID South Section, upon final review and submission to CID. The
17 changes to the Criminal investigation were marked in brackets, [].

18
19 **BACKGROUND:** On April 29, 2014, Police Officer II Kevin Gaines, Serial No. 40210, and
20 Police Officer II [REDACTED] 77th Street Gang Enforcement Detail (GED),
21 arrested [REDACTED] for possession of a gun by a felon at the St. Andrews Recreation
22 Center.¹ According to the arrest report Gaines wrote, he and [REDACTED] were driving northbound on
23 St. Andrews Place passing 88th Street and they conducted a westbound turn into the recreation
24 center's parking lot. As Gaines and [REDACTED] continued to drive toward a group of male blacks
25 outside the recreation center's gym, [REDACTED] suddenly stood up, reached for the front waistband of
26 his shorts with his right hand, and then ran into the gym. [REDACTED] chased after [REDACTED] into the gym
27 and observed [REDACTED] throw a gun, which [REDACTED] subsequently directed Gaines to recover
28 (Addendum 1).²

29
30 On June 3, 2014, Gaines testified in [REDACTED] preliminary hearing and [REDACTED] was held to answer.
31 [REDACTED] did not testify.³ Representing the people was Deputy District Attorney (DDA) [REDACTED]
32 and the defense attorney was Deputy Public Defender (DPD) [REDACTED]. On June 9, 2015,
33 [REDACTED] pled nolo contendere and he was convicted for a lesser charge of carrying a concealed
34 firearm. He was sentenced to 32 days in Los Angeles County Jail and placed on formal
35 probation for 12 months. The initial charge of a felon with a gun was dismissed due to a plea
36 negotiation.

37
38 **SUMMARY:** On June 12, 2015, DDA [REDACTED] wrote a memorandum to Head Deputy
39 James Garrison, JSID, regarding Gaines' testimony in the above preliminary hearing.
40 DDA [REDACTED] noted that footage from the officers' Digital-in-Car Video System (DICVS) was
41 inconsistent with the arrest report and with Gaines' testimony (Addenda 2-3).

1 DDA [REDACTED] noted that Gaines wrote in the arrest report:

2
3 "As my partner and I continued our approach toward the group while still in our vehicle,
4 we observed a male/black (later ID as susp [REDACTED]) who was wearing a plain white
5 muscle shirt suddenly stand-up and while facing in our direction began to walk
6 backwards. [REDACTED] appeared startled and had a very nervous gait [sic] on his face. As my
7 partner and I were approx. 10 feet away from the group, [REDACTED] began looking left and
8 right and then turned his head to look behind him. It was at this point [REDACTED] reached for
9 the front waistband of his shorts with his right hand and immediately turned around and
10 began to run N/B an[d] then quickly W/B into the gym."

11
12 DDA [REDACTED] additionally noted that Gaines testified as above at the preliminary hearing on
13 June 3, 2014. He also testified that he immediately followed [REDACTED] into the gym, chasing after
14 [REDACTED]. Gaines further testified that he and [REDACTED] ran into the gym after [REDACTED]. When asked if
15 Gaines could tell who else was present outside the recreation center, he testified that he could not
16 tell who was out there as his attention was directed to [REDACTED] and he did not have time to talk to
17 anyone else.

18
19 DDA [REDACTED] wrote that the "problem with the report and the testimony concerning this matter is
20 that it is inconsistent with the police officers' own" DICVS. She listed the following key
21 discrepancies:

- 22
- 23 1. The officers were far down the parking lot when [REDACTED] stood up;
 - 24 2. [REDACTED] never looks in the officer's direction;
 - 25 3. [REDACTED] never grabs his waistband;
 - 26 4. [REDACTED] never walks backward;
 - 27 5. [REDACTED] did not run prior to entering the gym;
 - 28 6. Gaines did not immediately follow [REDACTED] into the gym, instead he stopped to talk to several
29 unidentified men seated outside and checks them for weapons. He remains outside of the
30 recreation center for about 1.5 minutes.

31
32 DDA [REDACTED] believed none of the discrepancies changed "the fact" that [REDACTED] illegally
33 possessed a gun on the date of incident, but the discrepancies did question Gaines' credibility,
34 which was vital to prove key elements of the incident, which occurred off-camera. }

35
36 Head Deputy Garrison subsequently forwarded DDA [REDACTED] memorandum to IAG on
37 June 30, 2015 (Addendum 4).

38
39 **Note:** The above DICVS footage also depicted tactical issues of Department concern,
40 which will be addressed in the IAG investigation. Also, the DICVS footage did not
41 depict the recovered gun, an old Colt "Police Positive" .38 revolver, as it was not visible
42 in either officer's hands.
43

1 [REDACTED] was interviewed and advised he never had a gun. He claimed to never have seen the
2 gun that Gaines and [REDACTED] recovered in the gym. Butler believed the officers "made up" his
3 arrest.]
4

22 **ALLEGATION 5. The Department alleges that on June 3, 2014, Officer Gaines, while**
23 **on-duty, made false statements in his testimony in Los Angeles Superior Court,**
24 **Department 33.**

25
26 DDA [REDACTED]⁴ was the Calendar Deputy for Department 134 on June 17, 2014,
27 when [REDACTED] case was sent to her for court arraignment. [REDACTED] was previously held to
28 answer at a preliminary hearing on June 3, 2014.
29

30 [REDACTED] noted several issues delayed prosecution of [REDACTED] case. In particular, the
31 prosecution requested but was not provided with the DICVS until several months later.
32 When [REDACTED] reviewed the DICVS, she noted several inconsistencies between Gaines'
33 written report, his testimony, and what the DICVS depicted. Therefore, she notified JSID
34 via her chain of command.
35

36 [REDACTED] noted the inconsistencies with Gaines in her memorandum and she ordered a
37 stop-action video from the DICVS footage via her organization's sound department,
38 which freeze-framed several of [REDACTED] actions. None of [REDACTED] actions that Gaines
39 described in his report and testimony were depicted in the video.
40

1 On June 5, 2015, the defense filed a motion to suppress evidence, which was scheduled to
2 be heard on June 9, 2015.⁵ The motion challenged the probable cause for [REDACTED] arrest.
3 [REDACTED] met and interviewed [REDACTED] to prepare for the motion to suppress. [REDACTED] thought
4 [REDACTED] would "regurgitate" what Gaines wrote in the police report.

5
6 [REDACTED] recollection was that [REDACTED] separated himself from the group outside the
7 recreation center. [REDACTED] clarified that [REDACTED] did not run from him, it was he who ran after
8 [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] chased [REDACTED] through the recreation center's doors and once inside, [REDACTED]
9 followed the sound of running footsteps. All of a sudden, footsteps from the ongoing
10 basketball game stopped as the sound of other running of footsteps continued. [REDACTED]
11 chased the running footsteps, identified as [coming] from [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] ran past the
12 stage and threw a gun into a closet where mats were stored. [REDACTED] later told Gaines to
13 retrieve the gun from the closet.

14
15 [REDACTED] believed [REDACTED] statement was credible, as he could describe what he heard and
16 how he heard it, compared to what Gaines wrote and what was depicted in the DICVS.
17 [REDACTED] told [REDACTED] that Gaines carried the gun out of the gym in one of his pants pockets.⁶

18
19 [REDACTED] confirmed [REDACTED] case was disposed for a lesser, misdemeanor, charge of
20 carrying a concealed firearm and informal probation. She could not prove the higher
21 charge of a felon with a gun, due to Gaines' credibility was called into question.

22
23 **Witness** [REDACTED]⁷ was outside the recreation center's gym as he waited to play in a
24 basketball tournament occurring inside the gym. He estimated there were over 50 people
25 inside. [REDACTED] walked into the gym through the double doors and stood to the left of the
26 stage. He was surprised when a police officer, later identified as [REDACTED] stopped him inside
27 the gym 20 seconds later. [REDACTED] did not see the police before he entered the gym.

28
29 [REDACTED] ordered [REDACTED] to stop and put his hands up and [REDACTED] complied as he held a mini
30 iPad in one of his hands. [REDACTED] grabbed [REDACTED] by one of his arms and escorted him further
31 into the gym to a secluded area toward the back of the gym. [REDACTED] escorted [REDACTED] away
32 from other people, where [REDACTED] could turn his back and no one was behind him. [REDACTED] then
33 handcuffed [REDACTED] and pat-down searched him three times.⁸

34
35 [REDACTED] called for an additional officer and when one arrived, [REDACTED] did not recognize the
36 officer, who the investigation later identified as Gaines, as he only saw the officer from
37 far away. [REDACTED] did not know Gaines until Gaines got on the stand and stated his name
38 for [REDACTED] case.

1 screen shot from the video on his cell phone, which depicted [REDACTED] as the arresting
2 officer. However, [REDACTED] could not locate his cell phone.
3

4 **TRANSCRIPTS**
5

6 I/O Katsumata obtained and reviewed a copy of transcripts from Gaines' June 3, 2014 testimony
7 at the preliminary hearing. She noted the following:

8 Direct Examination [of Gaines]:
9

- 10 • [REDACTED] was sitting down on a curb with other male blacks outside of a basketball
11 gymnasium. The officers approached within 10 feet, [REDACTED] stood up and looked in the
12 officers' direction. [REDACTED] looked extremely nervous, immediately grabbed his front
13 waistband with his right hand, and proceeded to back away from the group
14 (Page 6; 8-25).
- 15 • [REDACTED] "eyes lit up" as soon as he made eye contact with the police vehicle. As the
16 officers continued their approach, [REDACTED] stood up and walked backwards "looking in his
17 left and right direction." He reached for his waistband. The officers formed the opinion
18 that [REDACTED] may have a gun or drugs, they exited their vehicle and [REDACTED] immediately
19 began to run into the gymnasium (Page 7; 1-19).
- 20 • "My partner and myself" engaged in a foot pursuit of [REDACTED] "We entered the
21 gymnasium" and observed [REDACTED] run down the side line of the basketball court,
22 continuously looking in all directions (Page 7; 22-28).
- 23 • [REDACTED] was still holding his front waistband with his right hand the entire time while he
24 was running down the left side of the court. When [REDACTED] came upon a break in the wall,
25 "he removed a silver revolver that my partner and myself observed." [REDACTED] threw it
26 inside that storage area, proceeded to run a little further, about six feet, and stopped and
27 put his hands up (Page 8; 2-10).
- 28 • Gaines said he was a few feet away when he observed [REDACTED] throw the revolver into the
29 storage area. Gaines ultimately recovered the loaded silver .38 special revolver
30 (Page 8; 11-24)
31

32 Cross Examination [of Gaines]:
33

- 34 • As they drove up, Gaines observed approximately six to seven males sitting/loitering
35 outside the gymnasium (Page 10; 7-15).
- 36 • Gaines said he could not confirm or deny if he had ever seen any of the individuals that
37 night in the area before. Gaines could not recall who all was in the group. Gaines'
38 attention was directed toward [REDACTED] Gaines said he did not interview the individuals
39 sitting outside, as they remained outside when he and his partner chased after [REDACTED]
40 (Page 11; 1-24).
- 41 • Gaines claimed to call for back up (Page 11; 25-26).
- 42 • Gaines was asked if he identified additional gang members at the time of this incident.
43 He claimed he "Didn't have time to talk to anybody else at that point" (Page 15; 16-17).
44

1 **DICVS**

2
3 I/O Katsumata reviewed Gaines and [REDACTED] DICVS, which was time/date stamped. She noted the
4 following in elapsed time utilizing the video timer in the bottom left corner:

- 5
6 • 00:48 [REDACTED] stands from a seated position on a concrete curb abutting a planter and
7 turns counter-clockwise away from Gaines and [REDACTED]
8 • 00:49 [REDACTED] disappears momentarily behind a tree and a bush.
9 • 00:52 [REDACTED] reappears, still facing away from the officers.
10 • 00:53 [REDACTED] raises his left arm toward his face/upper torso, not toward his waistband.
11 His right arm remains at his side.
12 • 00:54 [REDACTED] raises his right arm and walks into the recreation center. He does not
13 appear to run.
14 • 00:55 [REDACTED] is out of view.
15 • 00:56 [REDACTED] enters the camera view from the passenger side, with his back toward the
16 camera. He runs toward the gym's door.
17 • 00:59 Gaines enters camera view from the driver's side. [REDACTED] has entered the gym and is
18 out of view.
19 • 01:02 Gaines goes Code 6 via his radio microphone. Gaines walks up to four unknown
20 male blacks sitting on the above concrete curb where [REDACTED] was sitting. Gaines asks "No
21 guns, right?" Gaines tells them to stand up and searches them, but does not search the
22 unknown male black directly behind him seated on a bench near the flag pole wearing a
23 white shirt with black ¾ length sleeves and a backpack.
24 • 01:50 Gaines walks away from the males in front of gym and walks into the gym.
25 • 03:33 [REDACTED] walks a handcuffed [REDACTED] by his left arm, out of the gym as [REDACTED] carries
26 [REDACTED] mini iPad in his left hand. Gaines walks behind them and out of camera view.
27 • 03:54 [REDACTED] tries to pull from [REDACTED] and tries not to walk toward the police vehicle.
28 [REDACTED] attempts to get the attention of the unknown male black wearing the backpack still
29 seated on the bench. [REDACTED] is seen wearing a blue baseball cap turned backwards with a
30 "T" on the front, indicating "83 Trey Gangster Crip."
31 • 03:58 [REDACTED] attempts to get the attention of the male wearing the backpack, who was
32 still seated on the bench in front of the recreation center. This unknown male was not
33 searched by Gaines during his initial contact.
34 • 04:00 Gaines is still out of camera view, but can be heard telling arriving units that
35 [REDACTED] ran from them and had a gun. Gaines asks them to search the unknown male black
36 on the bike.
37 • 04:02 [REDACTED] says something while he is walking past the unknown male black wearing
38 the backpack, who begins to use his phone to video [REDACTED] [REDACTED] continues to struggle
39 with [REDACTED] who uses a wrist lock on [REDACTED]
40 • 04:11 The male wearing the backpack walks toward the center of the camera and still
41 appears to be recording the incident. [REDACTED] is out of the camera view.

- 1 • 04:20 [REDACTED] tells [REDACTED] to relax and act like an adult. The male wearing the backpack
2 walks toward the passenger side of the black and white vehicle with his hands extended,
3 he then walks out of the camera view.
- 4 • 04:28 The male wearing the backpack walks back into camera view and is holding in his
5 right hand what appears to be [REDACTED] blue baseball cap.
- 6 • 04:34 Gaines stated, "Backpack. Backpack." The male wearing the backpack
7 voluntarily places it on the ground and backs away and out of camera view. He tells an
8 officer, later identified as Police Officer [REDACTED] that he
9 can search the backpack.
- 10 • 04:42 [REDACTED] searches the backpack and leaves it on the ground in front of the
11 black and white vehicle.
- 12 • 05:05 The male who was once wearing the backpack, walks back into the camera view
13 now wearing what appeared to be [REDACTED] blue baseball cap turned backwards with a "T"
14 on the front.
- 15 • 06:30 [REDACTED] instructs Gaines to give his mini iPad to the male wearing the backpack.
- 16 • 06:46 Gaines gives [REDACTED] mini iPad to the male black wearing the backpack in front
17 of the black and white vehicle.

18
19 **Note:** [REDACTED] later told I/O Katsumata that he instructed the male black wearing
20 the backpack to return the iPad to his girlfriend who was inside the gym. [REDACTED]
21 later claimed he did not know the male black wearing the backpack.

- 22
23 • 07:10 [REDACTED] tells Gaines which items he wishes to keep on his person and the rest of his
24 belongings be given to the male [who had been] wearing the backpack. The items were
25 given to the male [who had been] wearing the backpack, [who] is seen on camera
26 carrying a black plastic bag [at 08:35].

27
28 The DICVS rear seat camera recording was 11:07 minutes long and it was not time/date
29 stamped. During [REDACTED] transportation to 77th Street Community Police Station, [REDACTED] sat in
30 [the] rear seat with [REDACTED]. There was no partition between the front and rear seats. [REDACTED] asked
31 [REDACTED] when he was last arrested. [REDACTED] told [REDACTED] he was arrested on August 31, 2012 for the
32 same kind of [charge]. He told [REDACTED] that he fought the charge and the jury acquitted him. [REDACTED]
33 continued to complete a Field Interview (FI) card for [REDACTED].

34
35 **INVESTIGATOR'S NOTES:**

- 36
37 1. I/O Katsumata and Sergeant Harris showed [REDACTED] a screen capture from Gaines and
38 [REDACTED] DICVS, but he could not identify any additional witnesses. He [REDACTED] told them
39 [Katsumata and Harris] that his girlfriend, [REDACTED] was present at the gym, but
40 [REDACTED] could not provide her new cell phone number. [REDACTED] also viewed the DICVS
41 screen capture to identify the aforementioned male black in the "T" cap and backpack.
42 [REDACTED] asked Gaines to give [REDACTED] mini iPad to the male for safe keeping. [REDACTED]
43 claimed he did not know the male and he only told him to return the mini iPad to
44 [REDACTED]

- 1 2. On December 21, 2015, I/O Katsumata responded to 77th Street Property and
2 photographed the revolver and ammunition booked into custody by [REDACTED]. She took
3 15 photographs of the revolver and ammunition, DR No.1412-11343 (Addendum 6).
4
- 5 3. On December 23, 2015, I/O Katsumata reviewed the Communications Division broadcast
6 recording of the incident and she identified units at scene: 12G22W6, Gaines and [REDACTED]
7 12A3W2, [REDACTED] and Police Officer [REDACTED]
8 12G23W6, Police Officer [REDACTED] and Police Officer II
9 [REDACTED] 12G110W6, Sergeant II [REDACTED]
10 [REDACTED] and 12G20, Sergeant I [REDACTED] who was not
11 listed on the incident recall report but was at scene. Additionally, it was [REDACTED] who made
12 the additional unit request not Gaines.
13
- 14 4. I/O Katsumata also reviewed DICVS footage for the above additional units from the
15 incident. The primary unit, Gaines and [REDACTED] was the only unit that activated their
16 DICVS.
17
- 18 5. On December 29, 2015, I/O Katsumata spoke to Detective II [REDACTED]
19 [REDACTED] Firearms Analysis Unit, Gang and Narcotics Division, regarding a gun
20 trace of ownership for the revolver Gaines and [REDACTED] booked on April 29, 2014. [REDACTED]
21 found:
22
 - 23 • The revolver was older than 1968, which precluded it from record keeping
24 requirements that exist today. [REDACTED] forwarded the subsequent report,
25 Department of Justice Bureau of ATF National Tracing Center,
26 Trace No. T20140145072 (Addendum 7).
 - 27 • [REDACTED] was also listed in two other traces. On August 31, 2012, [REDACTED] was
28 arrested for ex-convict with a gun by Officer [REDACTED] and Police Officer II
29 [REDACTED] 77th Street GED. The second trace, on
30 October 17, 2013, listed [REDACTED] as an associate not an arrestee, which was not
31 relevant to this case (Addendum 8).
32
- 33 6. On December 29, 2015, I/O Katsumata and Sergeant Harris responded to the
34 St. Andrews Recreation Center. They met [REDACTED] a park employee, who allowed
35 them inside the gym. A camera posted above the eastside entrance door was noted, but
36 [REDACTED] advised that it had not worked for years. I/O Katsumata took 18 photographs of
37 the inside and outside the gym (Addendum 9).
38
- 39 7. I/O Katsumata and Sergeant Harris also evaluated the recreation center's north/south
40 parking lot. Gaines' report and testimony stated his and [REDACTED] police vehicle were
41 approximately 10 feet away from [REDACTED] when [REDACTED] ran into the recreation center.
42 I/O Katsumata compared Gaines' estimate with the DICVS footage and with a *Google*
43 *maps* aerial view of the recreation center. There were two entrances to the parking lot,
44 one toward the north and one toward the south. Gaines specified he drove N/B

1 St Andrews Place and passed 88th Street then W/B turn into the recreation parking lot,
2 which concurred with the DICVS footage that indicated the officers entered the parking
3 lot through the southern entrance. The actual distance between Gaines and [REDACTED] police
4 vehicle and [REDACTED] was approximately 97 feet (Addendum 10).

- 5
6 8. I/O Katsumata and Sergeant Harris checked the park's picnic tables just south of the
7 gym, where [REDACTED] mentioned an unknown male black who video-recorded when police
8 were in the park. I/O Katsumata and Sergeant Harris spoke to [REDACTED] who told
9 them he possibly had video footage of [REDACTED] arrest on April 29, 2014, but he needed to
10 review his "video library" at his home. I/O Katsumata obtained [REDACTED] identification
11 information and cell phone number. She gave him a business card and requested he call
12 her when he reviewed his videos. However, [REDACTED] later called I/O Katsumata and told her
13 he did not record the incident.
14
15 9. On December 30, 2015, I/O Katsumata obtained a copy of the aforementioned arrest
16 report from August 31, 2012, when [REDACTED] was arrested as an ex-convict with a gun.
17 Review of the report and case disposition revealed that the jury found [REDACTED] not guilty
18 and he was acquitted on December 26, 2012 (Addendum 11).
19
20 10. Although DDA [REDACTED] JSID, approved a compelled interview with [REDACTED]
21 I/O Katsumata submitted the investigation to JSID beforehand to avoid exposure to any
22 compelled information. I/O Katsumata will compel [REDACTED] afterward and submit a revision
23 upon JSID's request.

38 10. *Google maps* of an aerial view of the St. Andrews Recreation Center.
39 11. Arrest/Property Report, DR No. 1212-20865, dated August 31, 2012.
40

41 **On March 23, 2016, the above investigation was submitted to JSID for filing consideration**
42 **and assigned to DDA [REDACTED] Prior to making a filing determination, [REDACTED]**
43 **requested that [REDACTED] be compelled and his paraphrased statement be provided for review.**
44 **[REDACTED] statement was submitted to [REDACTED] on July 8, 2016, as a Supplemental Investigation.**

1 For purposes of the Administrative investigation, it will be added here. What was initially
2 listed as Investigator's Note 1 on the Supplemental Investigation will now be referred to as
3 Investigator's Note 11.

4
5 **SUPPLEMENTAL INVESTIGATION (Presented to JSID)**

6
7 [REDACTED]¹² was partnered with Gaines when they arrested [REDACTED]. Though [REDACTED]
8 had more seniority with the Department, Gaines had more time in 77th Street GED by
9 approximately eight months.

10
11 [REDACTED] was the passenger officer as Gaines drove northbound through the parking lot of
12 St Andrews Park. From approximately 30 yards away, [REDACTED] observed a male, later
13 identified as [REDACTED] in a white tank/undershirt, [stand] up and distance himself from the
14 rest of a group in front [of] the St Andrews Recreation Center as Gaines and [REDACTED]
15 approached in their police vehicle. [REDACTED] walked briskly toward the entrance of the gym
16 portion of the recreation center. [REDACTED] quickly exited the police vehicle and ran after
17 [REDACTED]

18
19 [REDACTED] learned from training and experience in the gang unit to attempt to detain similar
20 persons based upon the person's actions and the circumstances, i.e., [REDACTED] standing up
21 and distancing himself from the rest of the group. [REDACTED] also knew the park and recreation
22 center was a known gang location with multiple shootings. Additionally, [REDACTED] was aware
23 handguns were recovered from the location by other units on prior occasions.

24
25 **Note:** [REDACTED] described a foot pursuit as chasing after someone while maintaining a
26 constant line of sight. [REDACTED] did not consider himself in foot pursuit of [REDACTED]
27 because he lost sight of him when [REDACTED] went inside the gym. After [REDACTED]
28 reviewed the DICVS, he acknowledged he was in foot pursuit after [REDACTED]

29
30 [REDACTED] did not recall if he told Gaines that he was going to follow [REDACTED] into the gym. He
31 only assumed Gaines watched him run after [REDACTED] into the gym and assumed Gaines
32 would follow.

33
34 [REDACTED] ran into the lobby of the gym where he heard the sound of [basketballs bouncing]
35 from inside the gym, which then stopped. [REDACTED] recalled, "It's quiet inside, so it sounded
36 funny to me. I go inside to the basketball courts of the gym and see [REDACTED] trying every
37 door of the interior perimeter to exit. I verbally ordered him to come towards me. People
38 are standing around, holding basketballs, and watching both of us."

39
40 As [REDACTED] walked back toward [REDACTED], [REDACTED] ducked into a cut-out storage area. [REDACTED]
41 distinctly recalled [REDACTED] turned perpendicular to [REDACTED] and removed a handgun from his

¹² I/O Katsumata and Sergeant II Don Byeon, Serial No. 30929, [CID South Section], conducted the interview. Katsumata later uploaded the interview recording to CMS under [REDACTED] and [REDACTED]

1 waistband area. [REDACTED] believed he drew and exhibited his handgun at [REDACTED] but he was
2 not sure.

3
4 [REDACTED] believed [REDACTED] was present when [REDACTED] removed the handgun from his waistband
5 area, but [REDACTED] was not sure as his attention was focused in front and not behind him.
6 [REDACTED] put the handgun down on the floor, underneath some stacked mats within the
7 storage area, and walked toward [REDACTED]
8

9 [REDACTED] gave commands to [REDACTED] but he did not remember the specific commands. [REDACTED]
10 handcuffed [REDACTED] but he did not recall if he placed [REDACTED] into a prone, standing, or
11 kneeling position. [REDACTED] first noticed Gaines was inside the gym when he took [REDACTED] into
12 custody and placed handcuffs on [REDACTED]
13

14 [REDACTED] told Gaines to recover the handgun that was a few feet away from where [REDACTED] was
15 handcuffed. [REDACTED] saw Gaines recover the handgun, but he did not see Gaines render it
16 safe. [REDACTED] was busy dealing with [REDACTED] and he did not see what Gaines did with the
17 handgun, but he assumed Gaines placed it in one of his uniform's back pockets.¹³ [REDACTED]
18 walked [REDACTED] out of the gym as Gaines followed behind him. They placed [REDACTED] in the
19 back of their police vehicle. [REDACTED] presumed Gaines put the handgun in the trunk of their
20 police vehicle, but he did not see Gaines do so.
21

22 Gaines and [REDACTED] transported [REDACTED] to 77th Street Community Police Station (CPS). [REDACTED]
23 did not recall how they divided their responsibility for processing [REDACTED] arrest.
24

25 **Note:** During the interview, I/O Katsumata showed [REDACTED] a completed copy of
26 [REDACTED] arrest report. [REDACTED] reviewed the report and refreshed his memory.
27

28 [REDACTED] completed the face sheet of the arrest report, as he recognized in his own
29 penmanship. He also completed the Property Report, Property Receipt, Investigative
30 Action/Statement Form, the Booking Approval, and queried [REDACTED] criminal history as
31 well as the gun's records.
32

33 [REDACTED] was certain he only completed the face sheet portion of the arrest report and Gaines
34 wrote the arrest report narrative. [REDACTED] did not recall if he completed the Probable Cause
35 Disclosure (PCD) Declaration. He theorized that Gaines might have typed [REDACTED] last
36 name on the PCD and also cut and pasted the arrest narrative on to the PCD.
37

38 [REDACTED] was not sure how he and Gaines decided who would write the arrest report. Though
39 [REDACTED] made the majority of the observations that led to [REDACTED] arrest, he did not write the
40 arrest report. Also, [REDACTED] did not recall if he went end of watch (EOW) earlier than Gaines

¹³ It was common practice in the gang unit to render a gun safe and to place it in one of their uniform's back pockets, to have both hands free.

1 on the date of incident.¹⁴ Further, [REDACTED] could not explain why he did not review the arrest
2 report before it was submitted to the watch commander:
3

4 I didn't review this (arrest report) because I didn't feel I needed to. I mean my
5 partner had more time in the gang unit and I was one of the newer officers in the
6 gang unit. So, I trusted him (Gaines) to write a complete narrative. So, I didn't
7 read it.
8

9 I am learning from this now, but working with peers as a P2 (Police Officer II) in
10 the gang unit and special problems unit (SPU) it was not done regularly; and it's
11 probably not the best practice and I've learned from it. But, unless I am working
12 with someone who has a lot to learn, a lot of times I don't review their report and
13 vice versa, but that is just from my experience. I don't do this anymore.¹⁵
14

15 [REDACTED] read the arrest report for the first time when the I/O emailed him a copy.¹⁶ [REDACTED] did
16 not read the report before he received the email. He also only first reviewed the DICVS
17 as instructed in the I/O's email. After [REDACTED] reviewed the DICVS, he believed it was
18 consistent with what he independently recalled of the incident. [REDACTED] did not know if
19 Gaines reviewed the DICVS and Gaines did not tell [REDACTED] if he reviewed it.
20

21 Before [REDACTED] reviewed the DICVS he did know he was alone while in foot pursuit after
22 [REDACTED] recollection was that Gaines was not as far behind him as the DICVS
23 indicated. After [REDACTED] watched the DICVS, he was surprised to see Gaines took so much
24 time talking to and searching the unidentified males outside the gym.¹⁷
25

26 [REDACTED] assumed that if Gaines saw him run, Gaines would run too, "I thought Gaines was
27 behind me the whole time, but obviously, he wasn't." [REDACTED] did not know if Gaines saw
28 [REDACTED] throw" the gun into a recessed/cut out storage area where mats were stored. [REDACTED]
29 recalled it was the first time he was inside that gym and the west doors were either locked
30 or did not work because he saw [REDACTED] try unsuccessfully to open them
31 (Investigator's Note 11).
32

33 Before Gaines wrote the arrest report, [REDACTED] and Gaines' common practice was to discuss
34 what they observed. In [REDACTED] case, they specifically talked about when [REDACTED] removed
35 a handgun from his waistband area. [REDACTED] and Gaines specifically talked about where

¹⁴ According to the Daily Worksheet for the incident date, Gaines and [REDACTED] were scheduled to work from 1200 hours to an EOW of 2200 hours. According to their log, they went EOW at 2232 hours. 1 inside the gym it occurred. They did not talk about specific distances as they approached
2 the front of the gym.

3
4 **Note:** In the arrest report, Gaines wrote that the gun was approximately 10 feet
5 away. Attorney Quan interjected that the distance was Gaines' perspective and
6 what he saw. [REDACTED] and Quan acknowledged there were discrepancies with the
7 DICVS and the arrest report.

8
9 [REDACTED] cited the specific inconsistencies he noted between the DICVS and the arrest report
10 narrative:

- 11
12
- Suspect walking backwards
 - Appearing startled with a nervous gait on his face
 - Suspect looking left and right
 - Turning his head to look behind him
 - Reaching for the front of his waistband
- 13
14
15
16
17

18 **Note:** The above reflect the similar discrepancies as noted in a memo by
19 DDA [REDACTED] which prompted the IAG investigation.

20
21 [REDACTED] did not recall if he or Gaines activated the DICVS in their police vehicle, but he
22 speculated either one of them could have activated it by pressing the microphone button,
23 or activating the vehicle's overhead light bar switch. The DICVS microphone for Gaines
24 was clearly activated as the DICVS displayed as "M1" on the screen. However, [REDACTED] did
25 not know why his DICVs microphone, "M2," was not activated at the beginning of the
26 incident, but it began to record toward the end as [REDACTED] was placed in the back seat of
27 their police vehicle.

28
29 **Note:** The video timer in the bottom left corner of the DICVS screen indicated
30 approximately 04:35 minutes elapsed during the incident before [REDACTED]
31 microphone activated.

32
33 [REDACTED] was not present in court during any testimony for [REDACTED] case. He did not recall
34 why he was not present and speculated he may have been out of town or on vacation.
35 [REDACTED] did not recall why he did not have to testify for [REDACTED] case. [REDACTED] did not hear any
36 portion of Gaines' testimony, nor did he know what Gaines testified to on [REDACTED] case.

37
38 [REDACTED] did not testify at [the] preliminary hearing, but recalled "I was subpoenaed by the
39 DA (district attorney) for a follow-up meeting and that is when [REDACTED] took a deal."¹⁸
40 [REDACTED] was asked similar questions by DDA [REDACTED] regarding his observations and his

¹⁸ DDA [REDACTED] subpoenaed [REDACTED] in preparation for a motion to suppress evidence filed by the defense. The motion challenged the probable cause for [REDACTED]'s arrest. [REDACTED] confirmed [REDACTED] case was disposed for a lesser misdemeanor charge.

1 recollection of [REDACTED] arrest.¹⁹ Before his meeting with DDA [REDACTED] [REDACTED] did not
2 review the arrest report and DICVS.
3

4 **INVESTIGATOR'S NOTE**
5

6 11. The I/O accompanied DDA [REDACTED] for a site visit to St Andrews Recreation Center on
7 May 19, 2016. During their site visit they identified park employees [REDACTED] and
8 [REDACTED] who advised that the west and north facing gym doors are unlocked when the
9 gym is in use to allow emergency exits only. Gym patrons cannot use the doors as
10 entrances as they are locked on the outside. Access into the gym is through the east
11 facing door, the front entrance into the recreation center. [REDACTED] noted numerous exit
12 points before entering the basketball courts inside the gym
13

14 **Deputy DA [REDACTED] completed the final review of the criminal allegations against Gaines.**
15 **On February 14, 2017, [REDACTED] declined to file charges against [REDACTED] and Gaines stating**
16 **Code B, Insufficient Evidence (Addendum 12).²⁰ Below is the Administrative investigation.**
17

18 During a review of the DICVS, Detective Moulton observed that Gaines drove through three
19 posted stop signs, failing to come to a full and complete stop.²¹ Two of the stop signs were
20 directly in front of the recreation center; West 88th Street and St Andrews Place, and
21 West 87th Street and St. Andrews Place. The other stop sign was at West 89th Street and
22 St. Andrews Place. All three the stop signs were in a residential area.²²
23

24 [REDACTED]
25 [REDACTED]

28 **Note:** Although Katsumata allowed Gaines to view the DICVS prior to his
29 interview, she did not play it *during* the interview and ask specific questions or
30 address discrepancies noted between the video and Gaines' responses to some of
31 her questions. In addition, some discrepancies noted by [REDACTED] were not
32 appropriately addressed and the vehicle code violations were not addressed.
33 Moulton re-interviewed Gaines for clarification. The interviews were combined
34 and paraphrased below.
35

¹⁹ [REDACTED] did not identify [REDACTED] by name but the investigation identified her.

²⁰ The investigation was submitted with CF No. 14-003455. As such the declination combined information from both cases. The information specific to CF No. 14-003455 was redacted.

1 **Gaines**²³ had some recollection of [REDACTED] arrest on April 29, 2014. He worked as a
2 gang officer with 77th Street GED and his partner that day was [REDACTED]. Although they were
3 not assigned partners, Gaines worked with [REDACTED] before on prior occasions. Gaines wrote
4 the arrest report and testified in the preliminary hearing. Gaines did not review the
5 DICVS prior to writing the arrest report as he could not gain access to the DICVS. He
6 could speak for 77th Street Area, but the DICVS was not downloaded and it was not
7 accessible when the report was written/finalized.²⁴ He was aware the DICVS could be
8 accessed from inside the police vehicle once the buffering process was completed. It was
9 common practice for him to review the DICVS before he wrote his reports, as it assisted
10 his recollection. However, in the past Gaines experienced difficulties with the DICVS
11 uploading into the system.
12

13 **Note:** A request was submitted to Information Technology Bureau (ITB) Tactical
14 Technology Section, to determine if [REDACTED] or Gaines accessed/viewed the DICVS
15 on the date of the arrest. The ITB advised they were only able to track major
16 outages within their systems, including DICVS. The outage could occur at the
17 main server, which could affect the system City-wide or at a divisional level. The
18 outage could create issues with uploading and accessing DICVS. There was no
19 major system-wide outage on April 29, 2014, but ITB could not definitively state
20 the officers could or could not watch their videos at a divisional level.
21

22 The video logs revealed that [REDACTED] accessed the video on **April 29, 2014 at**
23 **10:15:22 PM; May 1, 2014 at 11:13:00 PM; and May 1, 2014 at 11:16:05 PM.**
24 Gaines accessed the video on **April 29, 2014 at 10:07:31 PM** (Addendum 13). A
25 follow-up call to ITB by Moulton affirmed the above entries could indicate
26 *attempts* to access the system and not necessarily indicate full access.
27

28 The officers' vehicle, Shop No. 87994, was equipped with first-generation
29 equipment that recorded a limited amount of information on the log. It was
30 unknown if the accesses were made from the vehicle or on a Department
31 computer, how much video was played, if the video was accessed, or an attempted
32 access was made. Per the officers' DFAR, they were end of watch at (EOW)
33 2233 hours (Addenda 14-15).²⁵
34

35 Gaines authored the report approximately two to four hours after the arrest. He wrote it
36 from memory per his perception of the incident at the time he authored the report.

1 **Note:** Moulton reviewed the DICVS with Gaines. He addressed the issues in
2 chronological order as they occurred on the video. The observations were
3 compared to what he documented in the arrest report. The elapsed time from the
4 counter clock in the left corner of the DICVS was referenced during the interview
5 to indicate specific actions observed.

6
7 Gaines and █████ discussed driving to the recreation (rec) center prior to pulling up to it.
8 The conversation was not captured on DICVS. At approximately 00:19 into the video,
9 Gaines drove through the first stop sign at West 89th Street and St. Andrews Place
10 without stopping. He also drove through the stop sign at St. Andrews Place and
11 West 88th Street (00:33) without stopping.

12
13 Gaines knew the area and the local gang, the Eight Trey Gangster Crips. His training and
14 experience taught him the gang would have lookouts on the street (indicating
15 St. Andrews Place between West Manchester Avenue and West 89th Street). The
16 lookouts would warn of oncoming police presence. Gaines cleared the intersections at
17 both stop signs before driving through them, checking for oncoming vehicles,
18 pedestrians, etc. His goal was to reach the rec center as quickly as possible without being
19 noticed by the gang members to gain the upper hand by surprising them and possibly see
20 them engaged in any type of (illegal) activity.

21
22 Gaines drove in to the south end of the rec center parking lot (00:43). The police vehicle
23 faced forward and █████ and other persons were directly ahead of Gaines and █████ At
24 approximately 00:45 to 00:48 seconds, Gaines first observed █████ and a group of men
25 seated on concrete slabs in front of the rec center.²⁶ The officers were about four to five
26 car lengths from the curb in front of the rec center.

27
28 There were two men sitting next to █████ on the concrete border, south of █████ and to
29 his right. It was difficult to see on the DICVS, but as █████ sat on the concrete border,
30 he looked behind the other two men in the direction of the officers. This action occurred
31 before █████ came into focus on the DICVS recording.

32
33 Although Gaines wrote that █████ then stood up and “began to walk backwards,” the
34 action did not appear on the DICVS. █████ stood up, turned to his left and then walked
35 westbound into the gymnasium. Gaines’ perception at the time █████ stood up was there
36 was a backwards motion. After he reviewed the DICVS, it appeared █████ turned and
37 walked behind the area from where he was seated. Gaines’ perception at the time he
38 wrote the report, several hours later, was that █████ had walked backwards.

39
40 The report stated █████ appeared startled and had a “very nervous gait (sic) appearing on
41 his face.” By “gait,” Gaines meant when █████ looked in the officers’ direction, before

²⁶ There was a raised, concrete border around a greens area in front of the rec center. The area was depicted in previously referenced Addenda 5a.

1 he stood up, [REDACTED] had a heightened sense in his eyes; they became more enlarged.
2 [REDACTED] looked shocked, surprised.²⁷
3

4 The report stated as the officers were approximately 10 feet from the group, [REDACTED]
5 began to look left and right and then turned his head to look behind him. The action was
6 not visible on the DICVS. The 10 feet was Gaines' perception at the time he wrote the
7 report. However, upon viewing the DICVS, Gaines realized they were much farther
8 away. The 10 feet was an estimate, Gaines did not intend to write a misleading distance
9 in the report. It was a fluid motion and the police vehicle moved continuously forward.
10 The 10 feet was the distance Gaines' remembered/perceived when he wrote the report.
11

12 The report stated [REDACTED] began to look left and right and turn his head behind him. The
13 actions were not apparent on the DICVS. Gaines explained per the DICVS, when [REDACTED]
14 stood up and turned, [REDACTED] looked eastbound. As [REDACTED] continued his turn, [REDACTED]
15 body was "bladed," facing northbound and Gaines could see [REDACTED] looking straight
16 (northbound) then [REDACTED] turned and looked westbound where he made his entry into the
17 gymnasium. Gaines described [REDACTED] made his turn as a fluid motion; it was grainy on
18 the DICVS, but Gaines' perception was [REDACTED] looked eastbound and then northbound
19 which Gaines opined that [REDACTED] looked for possible avenues of escape. Gaines advised it
20 was very difficult to see on the DICVS.
21

22 The report stated [REDACTED] reached for the front waistband of his shorts with his right hand
23 and immediately turned around. The action was not visible on the DICVS. Gaines
24 explained when [REDACTED] initially stood up, his right hand favored his waistband. The
25 officers saw the action as they drove up (north towards [REDACTED]).
26

27 **Note:** The forward-facing camera was stationary and focused toward the center
28 of the windshield. Gaines drove up and stopped directly to the south of [REDACTED]
29 and his group. There was a tree in the walkway directly in sight of the camera.
30 Gaines explained that his and [REDACTED] viewing angles were different than what was
31 captured by the forward-facing camera. From where Gaines sat, he was at an
32 angle where he could see [REDACTED] hand favor the waistband as [REDACTED] stood up.
33

34 Although the audio portion of the DICVS did not start until Gaines exited the vehicle, he
35 and [REDACTED] spoke to each other about their observations as they pulled into the rec center
36 parking lot. Gaines did not recall the exact conversation they had, three years prior, but it
37 would have been something like, "white shirt, right hand, waistband." Gaines and [REDACTED]
38 used cues between partners to notify each other.
39

40 The report continued and stated [REDACTED] "...immediately turned around and began to run
41 N/B and then quickly into the gymnasium building." [REDACTED] walked into the gymnasium
42 on the DICVS. [REDACTED] was depicted as he ran into the view of the camera from the

²⁷ In his preliminary hearing testimony, Gaines used the term "gaze" instead of "gait."

1 passenger side of the police vehicle. [REDACTED] entered the gym and went out of camera view.
2 Gaines' perception at the time was [REDACTED] moved at a faster pace than depicted in the
3 DICVS. Per the DICVS, as [REDACTED] entered the rec center doorway threshold, [REDACTED]
4 leaned forward with his upper body. What was not on the DICVS and Gaines
5 remembered distinctively, when [REDACTED] reached the threshold of the door, he leaned
6 forward in a motion to engage in a sprint.

7
8 Gaines wrote that he and [REDACTED] engaged [REDACTED] in a foot pursuit. However, [REDACTED] was the
9 only officer depicted in foot pursuit on the DICVS. Gaines walked out of the vehicle and
10 approached the group of men [REDACTED] had been with. Gaines explained that as soon as he
11 entered the gymnasium, [REDACTED] informed Gaines via the radio that he was in the basketball
12 court. Gaines quickly made his way into the gymnasium and observed [REDACTED] as he ran
13 after [REDACTED] down the basketball court.

14
15 Gaines omitted from the report the part where he stopped the group of men outside the
16 gymnasium. It did not change the events or actions that occurred. The timeline of events
17 did shift from what he observed on the DICVS. When he wrote the report, Gaines
18 recalled he stopped the men "out front" for officer safety. His perception was the stop
19 was short and brief. Gaines then immediately went inside (the gym) and assisted [REDACTED]
20 who actively searched for the suspect. As soon as Gaines entered the gymnasium, he met
21 with [REDACTED] and they both engaged in a foot pursuit after [REDACTED]. When Gaines wrote the
22 report, he did not think about the brief stop with the other men at all.

23
24 Among the individuals outside the gym was a man with a backpack. Gaines did not
25 search the man during his preliminary stop and pat-down search for weapons. As
26 Gaines' response for separating from [REDACTED] was for tactical reasons, Gaines explained he
27 engaged the man with the backpack quickly in a verbal conversation. Gaines sized him
28 up very quickly. The man with the backpack wore loose basketball shorts. He was
29 sitting down in a t-shirt that exposed parts of his waistband as well as his underwear.
30 With exception of the backpack, Gaines did not perceive the man as an immediate threat
31 as Gaines visually cleared any of the man's pockets or waistband. At the time, Gaines
32 did not check the backpack; it was a fluid motion. To take something out of the
33 backpack, the man would have to remove it from his back. That motion alone would
34 definitely draw Gaines' attention. Gaines wanted to minimize the time he was
35 separated from [REDACTED] who was inside the gym with a possibly armed suspect.

36
37 While Gaines was outside speaking to the individuals, approximately 48 to 50 seconds
38 elapsed before Gaines entered the gym. The basketball court was roughly 80 feet long
39 and 48-50 seconds was a long time for [REDACTED] to be in foot pursuit of [REDACTED] down an
40 80-foot sideline. Gaines explained that once he crossed the threshold to the gym, [REDACTED]
41 relayed he was inside the lobby and lost sight of [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] observed some doors and
42 briefly checked both the men's and women's restrooms and a storage closet off the main
43 lobby.

1 [REDACTED] then went inside the basketball court area where he saw [REDACTED]²⁸ [REDACTED] notified
2 Gaines of his position via radio and Gaines entered and proceeded to the basketball
3 courts. When he entered the courts, Gaines observed [REDACTED] as he chased [REDACTED] at
4 approximately mid-court. Gaines immediately went in foot pursuit to close the distance.
5 Gaines did not intend to omit from the report [REDACTED] clearing of the lobby area before he
6 entered the basketball court. By the time Gaines entered the basketball court, [REDACTED] just
7 began his foot pursuit. In Gaines' mind, the foot pursuit was a continuous, fluid motion
8 from when [REDACTED] first exited the police vehicle.
9

10 Gaines further wrote that [REDACTED] removed a silver revolver. During his interview with
11 Katsumata, Gaines advised he did not know what the object was at the time [REDACTED]
12 removed it. When Gaines wrote the report, he knew what the object was, so he referred
13 to it as the "silver revolver." During [REDACTED] interview, [REDACTED] stated [REDACTED] tossed the gun
14 *under* some mats. Gaines recovered the gun and he strongly recalled he recovered it from
15 *on the top* of the mats. [REDACTED] was within a few feet of Gaines when he recovered the gun,
16 but was actively engaged in handcuffing [REDACTED] at the time. The mats were
17 approximately three feet high from the ground, no more than four feet high.
18

19 Gaines did not view the DICVS before he wrote the report. He had no idea if [REDACTED]
20 viewed the DICVS, although it was common practice for Gaines and his partner to try to
21 access the DICVS. Regarding the transcripts of the preliminary hearing, Gaines did not
22 view the DICVS before he testified. He had his police report with him and reviewed it
23 before he testified. It did not occur to Gaines to view the DICVS before he testified.
24

25 **Note:** Gaines addressed his testimony at the preliminary hearing. For reference,
26 the transcript page and line numbers were listed below.
27

28 Direct

29 Page 6, Line 8. Gaines testified to what he wrote in the report, that he was 10 feet away
30 when he first observed [REDACTED]. He addressed the discrepancy earlier in his statement.
31 Gaines had no intent to provide false testimony regarding this issue.
32

33 Page 7, line 1. Gaines testified observed a nervous *gaze* on [REDACTED]'s face as soon as
34 [REDACTED] made eye contact with the police vehicle. Gaines wrote "*gait*" in the report, but
35 his testimony referred to the same action by [REDACTED].
36

37 Line 4. Gaines testified that [REDACTED] immediately stood up and began to walk *backwards*
38 looking in his left and right direction. Gaines testified to what he wrote in his report and
39 what his perception was when he wrote the report a few hours later. He explained the
40 discrepancy earlier in his statement.
41

1 Line 9. Gaines testified as soon as [REDACTED] reached for his waistband, the looking in all
2 directions continued. Gaines addressed the discrepancy earlier in his statement. He and
3 [REDACTED] had different views of [REDACTED] and the surrounding area, other than what was visible
4 on the DICVS' forward-facing camera. Gaines explained the discrepancy earlier in his
5 statement. He advised the testimony of his observations was accurate.
6

7 Line 17. Gaines testified as soon as he and [REDACTED] exited their vehicle, [REDACTED] began to run
8 from the location and ran into the gymnasium. Gaines testified to his arrest report which
9 was his perception at the time [REDACTED] ran from the onset. The discrepancy was explained
10 earlier in his statement; that [REDACTED] ran once inside the gymnasium. Gaines had no intent
11 to provide false testimony regarding the issue.
12

13 Line 22. Gaines and [REDACTED] engaged in a foot pursuit of [REDACTED]. Gaines testified to what he
14 wrote in his arrest report, based on his perception at the time he wrote it. The
15 discrepancy was explained earlier in Gaines' statement. There was no intent to provide
16 false testimony.
17

18 Line 25. Gaines testified as he and [REDACTED] entered the gymnasium, [REDACTED] ran to the
19 basketball court and proceeded to run down the sideline, continuously looking in all
20 directions. The discrepancy was explained earlier in Gaines' statement; there was a "lull"
21 when [REDACTED] searched the lobby area for [REDACTED]. It was not Gaines' intent to provide false
22 testimony regarding the issue.
23

24 Page 8, Line 5. Gaines testified [REDACTED] ran to a gap in the wall, at which time he removed
25 a silver revolver that both he and [REDACTED] observed. During his prior statement with
26 Katsumata, Gaines stated he did not know the object was a gun at the time [REDACTED] threw
27 it. Gaines clarified that at the time he wrote the report and later testified, he knew the
28 object was a gun and referred to it as a "gun" rather than an "unknown object." The
29 discrepancy was explained earlier in his statement. If Gaines was specifically asked
30 during his testimony at what point he knew the object was a revolver, Gaines would have
31 indicated when he observed it on the mats.
32

33 Line 11. Gaines was specifically asked if he saw [REDACTED] discard the *revolver*. Gaines
34 responded he did. Again, Gaines already knew the item was a revolver at the time he
35 testified. It was not his intent to provide false testimony; he answered the question in the
36 manner it was asked.
37

38 Cross

39 Page 11, Line 12. The defense asked if the males seated with [REDACTED] were interviewed.
40 Gaines responded they were not interviewed. Gaines did not consider his brief pat-down
41 for weapons as an "interview." It was for officer safety, for weapons only. Gaines
42 considered an interview to involve more lengthy conversation.
43

1 Page 13, Line 10. Gaines responded to a question and stated it was [REDACTED] who stood up
2 and ran from the group. He explained the discrepancy earlier in his statement; Gaines
3 testified to what he wrote in the report which was based on his perception at the time.
4 [REDACTED] did not run from the group until he was inside the lobby threshold. It was not
5 Gaines' intent to provide false testimony.
6

7 Page 15, Line 7. Gaines testified that the stop was *continuously fluid*. He meant to
8 articulate that the actions occurred very quickly.
9

10 Lines 10-17. Gaines was asked if he identified any other gang members beside [REDACTED]
11 and he responded he did not have time to talk to anyone. Gaines did not consider the
12 short pat-down search as an interview or an inquiry into gang affiliation, etc. He did not
13 spend that much time with the men. It was not Gaines' intent to provide false testimony.
14

15 Page 17, Line 23. Gaines responded to further questions about [REDACTED] actions and stated
16 [REDACTED] backed away from the group and continued to look left and right over his shoulder.
17 Gaines addressed the discrepancy earlier in his statement. It was not his intent to provide
18 false testimony. If the defense had asked him to clarify his response, he would have. The
19 defense did not ask Gaines to clarify his response to the question.
20

21 Page 33, Line 1. The court asked if [REDACTED] turned and looked in Gaines' direction.
22 Gaines responded that [REDACTED] turned and looked in the officers' direction, looked forward
23 again, and that was when the revolver was removed from his [REDACTED] front waistband
24 with his right hand. Gaines had no recollection of the testimony at the time of his
25 interview with Detective Moulton. Again, Gaines testified the object was a revolver after
26 the fact and he already knew what the object was.²⁹
27

28 **Note:** The transcripts contained information that was repetitive. Moulton opted
29 not to address each line with Gaines if the information was already addressed in
30 his interview.
31

32 Regarding the DICVS, at 10:13 into the video, [REDACTED] was already arrested and sat in the
33 rear seat of the police vehicle with Yeh. Gaines drove out of the rec center parking lot
34 and drove through the posted stop sign at South St. Andrews Place and West 87th Street.
35 Gaines did not recall that he ran that stop sign. However, he pointed out that once he
36 pulled out of the parking lot and turned left, north, the stop sign was only a few feet from
37 the subsequent turn. Gaines already cleared the area of traffic and pedestrians when he
38 pulled out of the parking lot. He believed that to stop his vehicle at that point would
39 expose his (police) vehicle to oncoming lanes so Gaines proceeded forward. Gaines did
40 not intend to violate the CVC when he drove through any of the three posted stop signs
41 (Addendum 17).

1 Gaines noted in his experience that certain officers get delegated to certain duties.
2 Gaines was a better writer than [REDACTED] so he wrote the report though [REDACTED] made most of the
3 observations. Gaines told Sergeant Harris during his first interview that [REDACTED] got up
4 (off the concrete slab) *because he saw the police*. Gaines meant to say he *thought* [REDACTED]
5 stood up once he observed the police and then walked into the gym.



1 **INVESTIGATIVE RESPONSIBILITY:**

2 The Investigating Officer (I/O) for this case was Detective II Carrie A. Katsumata,
3 Serial No. 30832, Internal Affairs Group (IAG), Criminal Investigation Division (CID),
4 South Section. She can be contacted at (213) 485-9851. Requests for a supplemental
5 investigation must be approved by the CID commanding officer (C/O) via an Intradepartmental
6 Correspondence, Form 15.02.

7
8 **STATUTE DATE:** The statute date is **June 30, 2016**. However, the administrative statute date
9 has been tolled pending completion of the criminal investigation and subsequent filing
10 determination.

11
12 **BACKGROUND:** On April 29, 2014, Police Officer II Kevin Gaines, Serial No. 40210, and
13 Police Officer II [REDACTED] 77th Street Gang Enforcement Detail (GED),
14 arrested [REDACTED] for possession of a gun by a felon at the St. Andrews Recreation
15 Center.¹ According to the arrest report Gaines wrote, he and [REDACTED] were driving northbound on
16 St. Andrews Place passing 88th Street and they conducted a westbound turn into the recreation
17 center's parking lot. As Gaines and [REDACTED] continued to drive toward a group of male blacks
18 outside the recreation center's gym, [REDACTED] suddenly stood up, reached for the front waistband of
19 his shorts with his right hand, and then ran into the gym. [REDACTED] chased after [REDACTED] into the gym
20 and observed [REDACTED] throw a gun, which [REDACTED] subsequently directed Gaines to recover
21 (Addendum 1).²

22
23 On June 3, 2014, Gaines testified in [REDACTED] preliminary hearing and [REDACTED] was held to answer.
24 [REDACTED] did not testify.³ Representing the people was Deputy District Attorney (DDA) [REDACTED]
25 and the defense attorney was Deputy Public Defender (DPD) [REDACTED]. On June 9, 2015,
26 [REDACTED] pled nolo contendere and he was convicted for a lesser charge of carrying a concealed
27 firearm. He was sentenced to 32 days in Los Angeles County Jail and placed on formal
28 probation for 12 months. The initial charge of a felon with a gun was dismissed due to a plea
29 negotiation.

30
31 **SUMMARY:** On June 12, 2015, DDA [REDACTED] wrote a memorandum to Head Deputy
32 James Garrison, Justice System Integrity Division (JSID), regarding Gaines' testimony in the
33 above preliminary hearing. DDA [REDACTED] noted that footage from the officers' Digital-in-Car
34 Video System (DICVS) was inconsistent with the arrest report and with Gaines' testimony
35 (Addenda 2-3).

36
37 DDA [REDACTED] noted that Gaines wrote in the arrest report:

38
39 "As my partner and I continued our approach toward the group while still in our vehicle,
40 we observed a male/black (later ID as susp [REDACTED]) who was wearing a plain white
41 muscle shirt suddenly stand-up and while facing in our direction began to walk

1 backwards. [REDACTED] appeared startled and had a very nervous gait [sic] on his face. As my
2 partner and I were approx. 10 feet away from the group, [REDACTED] began looking left and
3 right and then turned his head to look behind him. It was at this point [REDACTED] reached for
4 the front waistband of his shorts with his right hand and immediately turned around and
5 began to run N/B an then quickly W/B into the gym.”

6
7 DDA [REDACTED] additionally noted that Gaines testified as above at the preliminary hearing on
8 June 3, 2014. He also testified that he immediately followed [REDACTED] into the gym, chasing after
9 [REDACTED] Gaines further testified that he and [REDACTED] ran into the gym after [REDACTED] When asked if
10 Gaines could tell who else was present outside the recreation center, he testified that he could not
11 tell who was out there as his attention was directed to [REDACTED] and he did not have time to talk to
12 anyone else.

13
14 DDA [REDACTED] wrote that the “problem with the report and the testimony concerning this matter is
15 that it is inconsistent with the police officers’ own” DICVS. She listed the following key
16 discrepancies:

- 17
18 1. The officers were far down the parking lot when [REDACTED] stood up;
19 2. [REDACTED] never looks in the officer’s direction;
20 3. [REDACTED] never grabs his waistband;
21 4. [REDACTED] never walks backward;
22 5. [REDACTED] did not run prior to entering the gym;
23 6. Gaines did not immediately follow [REDACTED] into the gym, instead he stopped to talk to several
24 unidentified men seated outside and checks them for weapons. He remains outside of the
25 recreation center for about 1.5 minutes.

26
27 DDA [REDACTED] believed none of the discrepancies changed “the fact” that [REDACTED] illegally
28 possessed a gun on the date of incident, but the discrepancies did question Gaines’ credibility,
29 which was vital to prove key elements of the incident, which occurred off-camera.

30
31 Head Deputy Garrison subsequently forwarded DDA [REDACTED] memorandum to IAG on
32 June 30, 2015 (Addendum 4).

33
34 **Note:** The above DICVS footage also depicted tactical issues of Department concern,
35 which will be addressed in the IAG investigation. Also, the DICVS footage did not
36 depict the recovered gun, an old Colt “Police Positive” .38 revolver, as it was not visible
37 in either officer’s hands.
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7 **ALLEGATION 5. The Department alleges that on June 3, 2014, Officer Gaines, while**
8 **on-duty, made false statements in his testimony in Los Angeles Superior Court,**
9 **Department 33.**

10
11 DDA [REDACTED]⁴ was the Calendar Deputy for Department 134 on June 17, 2014,
12 when [REDACTED] case was sent to her for court arraignment. [REDACTED] was previously held to
13 answer at a preliminary hearing on June 3, 2014.

14
15 [REDACTED] noted several issues delayed prosecution of [REDACTED] case. In particular, the
16 prosecution requested but was not provided with the DICVS until several months later.
17 When [REDACTED] reviewed the DICVS, she noted several inconsistencies between Gaines'
18 written report, his testimony, and what the DICVS depicted. Therefore, she notified JSID
19 via her chain of command.

20
21 [REDACTED] noted the inconsistencies with Gaines in her memorandum and she ordered a
22 stop-action video from the DICVS footage via her organization's sound department,
23 which freeze-framed several of [REDACTED] actions. None of [REDACTED] actions that Gaines
24 described in his report and testimony were depicted in the video.

25
26 On June 5, 2015, the defense filed a motion to suppress evidence, which was scheduled to
27 be heard on June 9, 2015.⁵ The motion challenged the probable cause for [REDACTED] arrest.
28 [REDACTED] met and interviewed [REDACTED] to prepare for the motion to suppress. [REDACTED] thought
29 [REDACTED] would "regurgitate" what Gaines wrote in the police report.

30
31 [REDACTED] recollection was that [REDACTED] separated himself from the group outside the
32 recreation center. [REDACTED] clarified that [REDACTED] did not run from him, it was he who ran after
33 [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] chased [REDACTED] through the recreation center's doors and once inside, [REDACTED]
34 followed the sound of running footsteps. All of a sudden, footsteps from the ongoing
35 basketball game stopped as the sound of other running of footsteps continued. [REDACTED]
36 chased the running footsteps, identified as from [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] ran past the stage and
37 threw a gun into a closet where mats were stored. [REDACTED] later told Gaines to retrieve the
38 gun from the closet.
39

1 [REDACTED] believed [REDACTED] statement was credible, as he could describe what he heard and
2 how he heard it, compared to what Gaines wrote and what was depicted in the DICVS.
3 [REDACTED] told [REDACTED] that Gaines carried the gun out of the gym in one of his pants pockets.⁶
4

5 [REDACTED] confirmed [REDACTED] case was disposed for a lesser, misdemeanor, charge of
6 carrying a concealed firearm and informal probation. She could not prove the higher
7 charge of a felon with a gun, due to Gaines' credibility was called into question.
8

9 [REDACTED]⁷ was outside the recreation center's gym as he waited to play in a
10 basketball tournament occurring inside the gym. He estimated there were over 50 people
11 inside. [REDACTED] walked into the gym through the double doors and stood to the left of the
12 stage. He was surprised when a police officer, later identified as [REDACTED] stopped him inside
13 the gym 20 seconds later. [REDACTED] did not see the police before he entered the gym.
14

15 [REDACTED] ordered [REDACTED] to stop and put his hands up and [REDACTED] complied as he held a mini
16 iPad in one of his hands. [REDACTED] grabbed [REDACTED] by one of his arms and escorted him further
17 into the gym to a secluded area toward the back of the gym. [REDACTED] escorted [REDACTED] away
18 from other people, where [REDACTED] could turn his back and no one was behind him. [REDACTED] then
19 handcuffed [REDACTED] and pat-down searched him three times.⁸
20

21 [REDACTED] called for an additional officer and when one arrived, [REDACTED] did not recognize the
22 officer, who the investigation later identified as Gaines, as he only saw the officer from
23 far away. [REDACTED] did not know Gaines until Gaines got on the stand and stated his name
24 for [REDACTED] case.
25

26 **Note:** [REDACTED] repeatedly misidentified Gaines as "Officer [REDACTED]" and misattributed
27 [REDACTED] actions as those of Gaines, or "[REDACTED]". He described [REDACTED] as bald with a
28 muscular build. [REDACTED] noted he knew [REDACTED] from past contacts and he was
29 familiar with [REDACTED] build compared to Gaines.' He further distinctly
30 remembered he looked at the officer's name tag to verify it was [REDACTED] and not
31 Gaines who arrested him on the incident date. The investigation confirmed [REDACTED]
32 was the first officer that contacted [REDACTED] inside the gym. There was no
33 "Officer [REDACTED] involved in [REDACTED] April 29, 2014 arrest.
34

35 During [REDACTED] case, he requested a copy of the DICVS, which did not match Gaines'
36 arrest report and testimony.⁹ [REDACTED] was not aware that officers pursued him into the
37 gym. The officers told him at the station that he was arrested for a gun and he told them
38 he was searched three times and he did not have anything. [REDACTED] admitted to a charge of

1 possession of a firearm and took a misdemeanor conviction though he did not have a
2 firearm.

3
4 **Note:** [REDACTED] also claimed he told his first defense attorney, DPD [REDACTED] that he
5 wanted to tell the judge that the "real" officer who arrested him was "[REDACTED]" not
6 Gaines. He claimed it was "a switch off," that [REDACTED] arrested him and handed him
7 off to Gaines.

8
9 [REDACTED] added that he had been through a similar experience before. He noted that "the
10 weird part" in his April 29, 2014 arrest was that he never saw a photo of the gun Gaines
11 and [REDACTED] claimed he had in his possession. Therefore, [REDACTED] believed Gaines and [REDACTED]
12 made up his arrest.

13
14 [REDACTED] also added that he was arrested as an ex-convict with a gun on August 31, 2012 by
15 Police Officer [REDACTED]¹⁰ [REDACTED] fought that case and won.
16 However, [REDACTED] thought it was odd that [REDACTED] was in the court room on
17 June 3, 2014, observing the preliminary hearing. [REDACTED] was not involved in the case.
18 [REDACTED] believed [REDACTED] attended the preliminary hearing to coach Gaines, who was
19 less experienced and so [REDACTED] could not attach a Pitchess motion to Gaines. [REDACTED]
20 believed Gaines was never in the gym, as he kept getting crossed up by DPD [REDACTED] and
21 Gaines could not recall the bleachers, the stage, or the layout of the gym.¹¹ [REDACTED]
22 believed Gaines lied on the stand. [REDACTED] reasoned that if he had a gun as Gaines stated,
23 he could have easily run out of the gym through the two other doors.

24
25 **Note:** [REDACTED] claimed an "older" black man, in his 40's, who frequently loitered
26 near the picnic tables at the recreation center, recorded video of [REDACTED]
27 April 29, 2014 arrest and many other incidents. [REDACTED] also claimed he had a
28 screen shot from the video on his cell phone, which depicted [REDACTED] as the arresting
29 officer. However, [REDACTED] could not locate his cell phone.

30
31 **TRANSCRIPTS**

32
33 I/O Katsumata obtained and reviewed a copy of transcripts from Gaines' June 3, 2014 testimony
34 at the preliminary hearing. She noted the following:

35
36 **Direct Examination:**

- 37
38 • [REDACTED] was sitting down on a curb with other male blacks outside of a basketball
39 gymnasium. The officers approached within 10 feet, [REDACTED] stood up and looked in the
40 officers' direction. [REDACTED] looked extremely nervous, immediately grabbed his front

1 waistband with his right hand, and proceeded to back away from the group
2 (Page 6; 8-25).

- 3 • [REDACTED] "eyes lit up" as soon as he made eye contact with the police vehicle. As the
4 officers continued their approach, [REDACTED] stood up and walked backwards "looking in his
5 left and right direction." He reached for his waistband. The officers formed the opinion
6 that [REDACTED] may have a gun or drugs, they exited their vehicle and [REDACTED] immediately
7 began to run into the gymnasium (Page 7; 1-19).
- 8 • "My partner and myself" engaged in a foot pursuit of [REDACTED] "We entered the
9 gymnasium" and observed [REDACTED] run down the side line of the basketball court,
10 continuously looking in all directions (Page 7; 22-28).
- 11 • [REDACTED] was still holding his front waistband with his right hand the entire time while he
12 was running down the left side of the court. When [REDACTED] came upon a break in the wall,
13 "he removed a silver revolver that my partner and myself observed." [REDACTED] threw it
14 inside that storage area, proceeded to run a little further, about six feet, and stopped and
15 put his hands up (Page 8; 2-10).
- 16 • Gaines said he was a few feet away when he observed [REDACTED] throw the revolver into the
17 storage area. Gaines ultimately recovered the loaded silver .38 special revolver
18 (Page 8; 11-24)

19
20 Cross Examination:

- 21
22 • As they drove up, Gaines observed approximately six to seven males sitting/loitering
23 outside the gymnasium (Page 10; 7-15).
- 24 • Gaines said he could not confirm or deny if he had ever seen any of the individuals that
25 night in the area before. Gaines could not recall who all was in the group. Gaines'
26 attention was directed toward [REDACTED] Gaines said he did not interview the individuals
27 sitting outside, as they remained outside when he and his partner chased after [REDACTED]
28 (Page 11; 1-24).
- 29 • Gaines claimed to call for back up (Page 11; 25-26).
- 30 • Gaines was asked if he identified additional gang members at the time of this incident.
31 He claimed he "Didn't have time to talk to anybody else at that point" (Page 15; 16-17).

33 **DICVS**

34
35 I/O Katsumata reviewed Gaines and [REDACTED] DICVS, which was time/date stamped. She noted the
36 following in elapsed time utilizing the video timer in the bottom left corner:

- 37
38 • 00:48 [REDACTED] stands from a seated position on a concrete curb abutting a planter and
39 turns counter-clockwise away from Gaines and [REDACTED]
- 40 • 00:49 [REDACTED] disappears momentarily behind a tree and a bush.
- 41 • 00:52 [REDACTED] reappears, still facing away from the officers.
- 42 • 00:53 [REDACTED] raises his left arm toward his face/upper torso, not toward his waistband.
43 His right arm remains at his side.

- 1 • 00:54 [REDACTED] raises his right arm and walks into the recreation center. He does not
- 2 appear to run.
- 3 • 00:55 [REDACTED] is out of view.
- 4 • 00:56 [REDACTED] enters the camera view from the passenger side, with his back toward the
- 5 camera. He runs toward the gym's door.
- 6 • 00:59 Gaines enters camera view from the driver's side. [REDACTED] has entered the gym and is
- 7 out of view.
- 8 • 01:02 Gaines goes Code 6 via his radio microphone. Gaines walks up to four unknown
- 9 male blacks sitting on the above concrete curb where [REDACTED] was sitting. Gaines asks "No
- 10 guns, right?" Gaines tells them to stand up and searches them, but does not search the
- 11 unknown male black directly behind him seated on a bench near the flag pole wearing a
- 12 white shirt with black $\frac{3}{4}$ length sleeves and a backpack.
- 13 • 01:50 Gaines walks away from the males in front of gym and walks into the gym.
- 14 • 03:33 [REDACTED] walks a handcuffed [REDACTED] by his left arm, out of the gym as [REDACTED] carries
- 15 [REDACTED] mini iPad in his left hand. Gaines walks behind them and out of camera view.
- 16 • 03:54 [REDACTED] tries to pull from [REDACTED] and tries not to walk toward the police vehicle.
- 17 [REDACTED] attempts to get the attention of the unknown male black wearing the backpack still
- 18 seated on the bench. [REDACTED] is seen wearing a blue baseball cap turned backwards with a
- 19 "T" on the front, indicating "83 Trey Gangster Crip."
- 20 • 03:58 [REDACTED] attempts to get the attention of the male wearing the backpack, who was
- 21 still seated on the bench in front of the recreation center. This unknown male was not
- 22 searched by Gaines during his initial contact.
- 23 • 04:00 Gaines is still out of camera view, but can be heard telling arriving units that
- 24 [REDACTED] ran from them and had a gun. Gaines asks them to search the unknown male black
- 25 on the bike.
- 26 • 04:02 [REDACTED] says something while he is walking past the unknown male black wearing
- 27 the backpack, who begins to use his phone to video [REDACTED] [REDACTED] continues to struggle
- 28 with [REDACTED] who uses a wrist lock on [REDACTED]
- 29 • 04:11 The male wearing the backpack walks toward the center of the camera and still
- 30 appears to be recording the incident. [REDACTED] is out of the camera view.
- 31 • 04:20 [REDACTED] tells [REDACTED] to relax and act like an adult. The male wearing the backpack
- 32 walks toward the passenger side of the black and white vehicle with his hands extended,
- 33 he then walks out of the camera view.
- 34 • 04:28 The male wearing the backpack walks back into camera view and is holding in his
- 35 right hand what appears to be [REDACTED] blue baseball cap.
- 36 • 04:34 Gaines stated, "Backpack. Backpack." The male wearing the backpack
- 37 voluntarily places it on the ground and backs away and out of camera view. He tells an
- 38 officer, later identified as Police Officer [REDACTED] that he
- 39 can search the backpack.
- 40 • 04:42 [REDACTED] searches the backpack and leaves it on the ground in front of the
- 41 black and white vehicle.

- 1 • 05:05 The male who was once wearing the backpack, walks back into the camera view
2 now wearing what appeared to be [REDACTED] blue baseball cap turned backwards with a "T"
3 on the front.
- 4 • 06:30 [REDACTED] instructs Gaines to give his mini iPad to the male wearing the backpack.
- 5 • 06:46 Gaines gives [REDACTED] mini iPad to the male black wearing the backpack in front
6 of the black and white vehicle.

7
8 **Note:** [REDACTED] later told I/O Katsumata that he instructed the male black wearing
9 the backpack to return the iPad to his girlfriend who was inside the gym. [REDACTED]
10 later claimed he did not know the male black wearing the backpack.

- 11
12 • 07:10 [REDACTED] tells Gaines which items he wishes to keep on his person and the rest of his
13 belongings be given to the male wearing the backpack. The items were given to the male
14 wearing the backpack, which is seen on camera carrying a black plastic bag.

15
16 The DICVS rear seat camera recording was 11:07 minutes long and it was not time/date
17 stamped. During [REDACTED] transportation to 77th Street Community Police Station, [REDACTED] sat in rear
18 seat with [REDACTED]. There was no partition between the front and rear seats. [REDACTED] asked [REDACTED]
19 when he was last arrested. [REDACTED] told [REDACTED] he was arrested on August 31, 2012 for the same kind
20 of arrest. He told [REDACTED] that he fought the charge and the jury acquitted him. [REDACTED] continued to
21 complete a Field Interview (FI) card for [REDACTED].

22
23 **INVESTIGATOR'S NOTES:**

- 24
25 1. I/O Katsumata and Sergeant Harris showed [REDACTED] a screen capture from Gaines and
26 [REDACTED] DICVS, but he could not identify any additional witnesses. He told them that his
27 girlfriend, [REDACTED] was present at the gym, but he could not provide her new cell
28 phone number. [REDACTED] also viewed the DICVS screen capture to identify the
29 aforementioned male black in the "T" cap and backpack. [REDACTED] asked Gaines to give
30 [REDACTED] mini iPad to the male for safe keeping. [REDACTED] claimed he did not know the
31 male and he only told him to return the mini iPad to [REDACTED].
- 32
33 2. On December 21, 2015, I/O Katsumata responded to 77th Street Property and
34 photographed the revolver and ammunition booked into custody by [REDACTED]. She took
35 15 photographs of the revolver and ammunition, DR No.1412-11343 (Addendum 6).
- 36
37 3. On December 23, 2015, I/O Katsumata reviewed the Communications Division broadcast
38 recording of the incident and she identified units at scene: 12G22W6, Gaines and [REDACTED],
39 12A3W2, [REDACTED] and Police Officer [REDACTED],
40 12G23W6, Police Officer [REDACTED] and Police Officer II
41 [REDACTED]; 12G110W6, Sergeant [REDACTED],
42 [REDACTED] and 12G20, Sergeant [REDACTED] who was not
43 listed on the incident recall report but was at scene. Additionally, it was [REDACTED] who made
44 the additional unit request not Gaines.

- 1 4. I/O Katsumata also reviewed DICVS footage for the above additional units from the
2 incident. The primary unit, Gaines and [REDACTED] was the only unit that activated their
3 DICVS.
4
- 5 5. On December 29, 2015, I/O Katsumata spoke to Detective [REDACTED]
6 [REDACTED] Firearms Analysis Unit, Gang and Narcotics Division, regarding a gun
7 trace of ownership for the revolver Gaines and [REDACTED] booked on April 29, 2014. [REDACTED]
8 found:
9
 - 10 • The revolver was older than 1968, which precluded it from record keeping
11 requirements that exist today. [REDACTED] forwarded the subsequent report,
12 Department of Justice Bureau of ATF National Tracing Center,
13 Trace No. T20140145072 (Addendum 7).
 - 14 • [REDACTED] was also listed in two other traces. On August 31, 2012, [REDACTED] was
15 arrested for ex-convict with a gun by Officer Fernandez and Police Officer II
16 [REDACTED], 77th Street GED. The second trace, on
17 October 17, 2013, listed [REDACTED] as an associate not an arrestee, which was not
18 relevant to this case (Addendum 8).
19
- 20 6. On December 29, 2015, I/O Katsumata and Sergeant Harris responded to the
21 St. Andrews Recreation Center. They met [REDACTED], a park employee, who allowed
22 them inside the gym. A camera posted above the eastside entrance door was noted, but
23 [REDACTED] advised that it had not worked for years. I/O Katsumata took 18 photographs of
24 the inside and outside the gym (Addendum 9).
25
- 26 7. I/O Katsumata and Sergeant Harris also evaluated the recreation center's north/south
27 parking lot. Gaines' report and testimony stated his and [REDACTED] police vehicle were
28 approximately 10 feet away from [REDACTED] when [REDACTED] ran into the recreation center.
29 I/O Katsumata compared Gaines' estimate with the DICVS footage and with a *Google*
30 *maps* aerial view of the recreation center. There were two entrances to the parking lot,
31 one toward the north and one toward the south. Gaines specified he drove N/B
32 St Andrews Place and passed 88th Street then W/B turn into the recreation parking lot,
33 which concurred with the DICVS footage that indicated the officers entered the parking
34 lot through the southern entrance. The actual distance between Gaines and [REDACTED] police
35 vehicle and [REDACTED] was approximately 97 feet (Addendum 10).
36
- 37 8. I/O Katsumata and Sergeant Harris checked the park's picnic tables just south of the
38 gym, where [REDACTED] mentioned an unknown male black who video-recorded when police
39 were in the park. I/O Katsumata and Sergeant Harris spoke to [REDACTED] who told
40 them he possibly had video footage of [REDACTED] arrest on April 29, 2014, but he needed to
41 review his "video library" at his home. I/O Katsumata obtained [REDACTED] identification
42 information and cell phone number. She gave him a business card and requested he call
43 her when he reviewed his videos. However, [REDACTED] later called I/O Katsumata and told her
44 he did not record the incident.

- 1 9. On December 30, 2015, I/O Katsumata obtained a copy of the aforementioned arrest
2 report from August 31, 2012, when [REDACTED] was arrested as an ex-convict with a gun.
3 Review of the report and case disposition revealed that the jury found [REDACTED] not guilty
4 and he was acquitted on December 26, 2012 (Addendum 11).
5
6 10. Although DDA [REDACTED], JSID, approved a compelled interview with [REDACTED]
7 I/O Katsumata submitted the investigation to JSID beforehand to avoid exposure to any
8 compelled information. I/O Katsumata will compel [REDACTED] afterward and submit a revision
9 upon JSID's request.



SUMMARY: On March 23, 2015, the above IAG investigation was submitted to the Justice System Integrity Division (JSID) by the I/O, Detective Katsumata, on March 23, 2015. The investigation looked into the actions of Police Officer II Kevin Gaines, Serial No. 40210, and [REDACTED] regarding their arrest of [REDACTED] on April 29, 2014.¹ Gaines and [REDACTED] arrested [REDACTED] for possession of a gun by a felon. On June 3, 2014, Gaines testified in [REDACTED] preliminary hearing and [REDACTED] was held to answer. [REDACTED] did not testify.

[REDACTED] was not interviewed by any known Department personnel or before the IAG investigation was submitted to JSID.

Concerns

DDA [REDACTED] requested that IAG interview [REDACTED] so that the information could be added to the investigation before JSID made a filing determination. I/O Katsumata conducted a compelled interview of [REDACTED] on June 28, 2016.² Below is a paraphrased statement of [REDACTED] interview:

[REDACTED]³ was partnered with Gaines when they arrested [REDACTED]. Though [REDACTED] had more seniority with the Department, Gaines had more time in 77th Street GED by approximately eight months.

[REDACTED] was the passenger officer as Gaines drove northbound through the parking lot of St Andrews Park. From approximately 30 yards away, [REDACTED] observed a male, later identified as [REDACTED], in a white tank/undershirt, stood up and distanced himself from the rest of a group in front the St Andrews Recreation Center as Gaines and [REDACTED] approached in their police vehicle. [REDACTED] walked briskly toward the entrance of the gym portion of the recreation center. [REDACTED] quickly exited the police vehicle and ran after [REDACTED]

¹ The officers were assigned to 77th Street Gang Enforcement Detail (GED) at the time. [REDACTED] since transferred to Metropolitan Division (METRO).

² [REDACTED] was represented by Attorney Randal Quan during the interview.

³ I/O Katsumata and Sergeant II Don Byeon, Serial No. 30929, IAG, conducted the interview. Katsumata later uploaded the interview recording to CMS under [REDACTED]

learned from training and experience in the gang unit to attempt to detain similar persons based upon the person's actions and the circumstances, i.e., standing up and distancing himself from the rest of the group. also knew the park and recreation center was a known gang location with multiple shootings. Additionally, was aware handguns were recovered from the location by other units on prior occasions.

Note: described a foot pursuit as chasing after someone while maintaining a constant line of sight. did not consider himself in foot pursuit of because he lost sight of him when he went inside the gym. After he reviewed the DICVS, he acknowledged he was in foot pursuit after

did not recall if he told Gaines that he was going to follow into the gym. He only assumed Gaines watched him run after into the gym and assumed Gaines would follow.

ran into the lobby of the gym where he heard the sounds of a couple of bounces of basketballs from inside the gym, which then stopped. recalled, "It's quiet inside, so it sounded funny to me. I go inside to the basketball courts of the gym and see trying every door of the interior perimeter to exit. I verbally ordered him to come towards me. People are standing around, holding basketballs, and watching both of us."

As walked back toward ducked into a cut-out storage area. distinctly recalled turned perpendicular to him and removed a handgun from his waistband area. believed he drew and exhibited his handgun at but he was not sure.

believed Gaines was present when removed the handgun from his waistband area, but was not sure as his attention was focused in front and not behind him. put the handgun down on the floor, underneath some stacked mats within the storage area, and walked toward

gave commands to but he did not remember the specific commands. handcuffed but he did not recall if he placed into a prone, standing, or kneeling position. first noticed Gaines was inside the gym when he took into custody and placed handcuffs on

told Gaines to recover the handgun that was a few feet away from where was handcuffed. saw Gaines recover the handgun, but he did not see Gaines render it safe. was busy dealing with and he did not see what Gaines did with the handgun, but he assumed Gaines placed it in one of his uniform's back pockets.⁴

⁴ It was common practice in the gang unit to render a gun safe and to place it in one of their uniform's back pockets, to have both hands free.

█████ walked █████ out of the gym as Gaines followed behind him. They placed █████ in the back of their police vehicle. █████ presumed Gaines put the handgun in the trunk of their police vehicle, but he did not see Gaines do so.

Gaines and █████ transported █████ to 77th Street Community Police Station (CPS). █████ did not recall how they divided their responsibility for processing █████ arrest.

Note: During the interview, I/O Katsumata showed █████ a completed copy of █████ arrest report. █████ reviewed the report and refreshed his memory.

█████ completed the face sheet of the arrest report, as he recognized in his own penmanship. He also completed the Property Report, Property Receipt, Investigative Action/Statement Form, the Booking Approval, and queried █████ criminal history as well as the gun's records.

█████ was certain he only completed the face sheet portion of the arrest report and Gaines wrote the arrest report narrative. █████ did not recall if he completed the Probable Cause Disclosure (PCD) Declaration. He theorized that Gaines might have typed █████ last name on the PCD and also cut and pasted the arrest narrative on to the PCD.

█████ was not sure how he and Gaines decided who would write the arrest report. Though █████ made the majority of the observations that led to █████ arrest, he did not write the arrest report. Also, █████ did not recall if he went end of watch (EOW) earlier than Gaines on the date of incident.⁵ Further, █████ could not explain why he did not review the arrest report before it was submitted to the watch commander:

I didn't review this (arrest report) because I didn't feel I needed to. I mean my partner had more time in the gang unit and I was one of the newer officers in the gang unit. So, I trusted him (Gaines) to write a complete narrative. So, I didn't read it.

I am learning from this now, but working with peers as a P2 (Police Officer II) in the gang unit and special problems unit (SPU) it was not done regularly; and it's probably not the best practice and I've learned from it. But, unless I am working with someone who has a lot to learn, a lot of times I don't review their report and vice versa, but that is just from my experience. I don't do this anymore.⁶

⁵ According to the Daily Worksheet for the incident date, Gaines and █████ were scheduled to work from 1200 hours to an EOW of 2200 hours. According to their log, they went EOW at 2232 hours. The I/O verified via Fiscal Operations Division that neither █████ nor Gaines submitted an overtime report on the incident date.

⁶ █████ was aware Department policy required officers to review their DICVS when practicable before they prepared reports to refresh their recollection.

█████ read the arrest report for the first time when the I/O emailed him a copy.⁷ █████ did not read the report before he received the email. He also only first reviewed the DICVS as instructed in the I/O's email. After █████ reviewed the DICVS, he believed it was consistent with what he independently recalled of the incident. █████ did not know if Gaines reviewed the DICVS and Gaines did not tell █████ if he reviewed it.

Before █████ reviewed the DICVS he did know he was alone while in foot pursuit after █████. █████ recollection was that Gaines was not as far behind him as the DICVS indicated. After █████ watched the DICVS, he was surprised to see Gaines took so much time talking to and searching the unidentified males outside the gym.⁸

█████ assumed that if Gaines saw him run, Gaines would run too, "I thought Gaines was behind me the whole time, but obviously he wasn't." █████ did not know if Gaines saw █████ "throw" the gun into a recessed/cut out storage area where mats were stored. █████ recalled it was the first time he was inside that gym and the west doors were either locked, or did not work because he saw █████ try unsuccessfully to open them (Investigator's Note 1).

Before Gaines wrote the arrest report, █████ and Gaines' common practice was to discuss what they observed. In █████ case, they specifically talked about when █████ removed a handgun from his waistband area. █████ and Gaines specifically talked about where inside the gym it occurred. They did not talk about specific distances as they approached the front of the gym.

Note: In the arrest report, Gaines wrote that the gun was approximately 10 feet away. Attorney Quan interjected that the distance was Gaines' perspective and what he saw. █████ and Quan acknowledged there were discrepancies with the DICVS and the arrest report.

█████ cited the specific inconsistencies he noted between the DICVS and the arrest report narrative:

- Suspect walking backwards
- Appearing startled with a nervous gait on his face
- Suspect looking left and right
- Turning his head to look behind him
- Reaching for the front of his waistband
- Beginning to run.

⁷ On June 21, 2016, the I/O emailed █████ and told him to review the DICVS and the email's attached documents, the arrest report and incident recall printout prior to our scheduled interview.

⁸ █████ exited police vehicle and ran after █████ at 00:56 inside the gym alone. Gaines walked away from the males in front of the gym and into the gym at 01:50.

Note: The above reflect the similar discrepancies as noted in a memo by DDA [REDACTED] which prompted the IAG investigation.

[REDACTED] did not recall if he or Gaines activated the DICVS in their police vehicle, but he speculated either one of them could have activated it by pressing the microphone button, or activating the vehicle's overhead light bar switch. The DICVS microphone for Gaines was clearly activated as the DICVS displayed as "M1" on the screen. However, [REDACTED] did not know why his DICVs microphone, "M2," was not activated at the beginning of the incident, but it began to record toward the end as [REDACTED] was placed in the back seat of their police vehicle.

Note: The video timer in the bottom left corner of the DICVS screen indicated approximately 04:35 minutes elapsed during the incident before [REDACTED] microphone activated.

[REDACTED] was not present in court during any testimony for [REDACTED] case. He did not recall why he was not present and speculated he may have been out of town or on vacation. [REDACTED] did not recall why he did not have to testify for [REDACTED] case. [REDACTED] did not hear any portion of Gaines' testimony, nor did he know what Gaines testified to on [REDACTED] case.

[REDACTED] did not testify at preliminary hearing, but recalled "I was subpoenaed by the DA (district attorney) for a follow-up meeting and that is when [REDACTED] took a deal."⁹ [REDACTED] was asked similar questions by DDA [REDACTED] regarding his observations and his recollection of [REDACTED] arrest.¹⁰ Before his meeting with DDA [REDACTED] [REDACTED] did not review the arrest report and DICVS.

INVESTIGATOR'S NOTE

1. The I/O accompanied DDA [REDACTED] for a site visit to St Andrews Recreation Center on May 19, 2016. During their site visit they identified park employees [REDACTED] and [REDACTED], who advised that the west and north facing gym doors are unlocked when the gym is in use to allow emergency exits only. Gym patrons cannot use the doors as entrances as they are locked on the outside. Access into the gym is through the east facing door, the front entrance into the recreation center. [REDACTED] noted numerous exit points before entering the basketball courts inside the gym.


