Dear FOIPA public liaison,

I recently received the attached letter regarding FOIA Request # 1433883-000, which Benjamin Wittes and I submitted on April 4, 2019. In this letter, David Hardy, the Section Chief of the Record/Information Dissemination Section, informed us that our request triggered "unusual circumstances" and then provided us the opportunity to reduce the scope of our request. Below is an image of the relevant portion of that letter (which is also attached in full):

Dear Mr. Anderson:

Please be advised that "unusual circumstances" apply to the processing of your request. See 5 U.S.C. § 552 (a)(6)(B)(iii). "Unusual circumstances" include one or more of the following scenarios:

There is a need to search for and collect records from field offices and/or other offices that are separate from the FBI Record/Information Dissemination Section (RIDS).

There is a need to search for, collect, and examine a voluminous amount of separate and distinct records.

There is a need for consultation with another agency or two or more DOJ components.

These "unusual circumstances" will delay our ability to make a determination on your request within 20 days (excluding weekend and legal public holidays). Additionally, the payment of pertinent fees may apply to your request. See 5 U.S.C. § 552 (a)(4)(A)(viii).

The application of "unusual circumstances" is not a determination of how the FBI will respond to your substantive request, this letter provides notice that these "unusual circumstances" apply to processing and delay the determination of your request. <u>See</u> 5 U.S.C. §§ 552 (a)(6)(A)(viii); (a)(6)(B).

You have the opportunity to reduce the scope of your request; this will accelerate the process and could potentially place your request in a quicker processing queue. This may also reduce search and duplication costs and allow for a more timely receipt of your information. The FBI uses a multi-queue processing system to fairly assign and process new requests. Simple request queue cases (50 pages or less) usually require the least time to process.

We are confused about the basis for this "unusual circumstances" determination. We drafted our request as narrowly as possible in order to expedite a response. Specifically, as we are asking for a discrete set of documents that the FBI has publicly disclosed in the past in relation to prior climate surveys. Moreover, as the climate survey is administered by and only relates to the FBI, it is unclear why a response would require coordination with any other Department of Justice components. Below is an excerpt of the relevant portion of our request (also attached in full):

 Any documents reflecting the results of the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) Field Office and Headquarters Climate Survey for 2019.

We understand that this survey is generally administered between February and March of each year. You have disclosed the results of prior climate surveys at https://vault.fbi.gov/. We are requesting the same types of documents for the 2019 survey.

The full link for the previously disclosed documents is https://vault.fbi.gov/FBI%20Field%20Office%20and% 20Headquarters%20Climate%20Survey%20Results/FBI%20Field%20Office%20and%20Headquarters%20Climate% 20Survey%20Results%20%282017%29/view.

Note that we received a similar "unusual circumstances" notification regarding an identical request we filed last year for the 2018 climate survey results. When we inquired as to the basis for this determination, we were told that our request

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was not overly broad and that there was no need to reach out to reduce the scope. Below is a relevant excerpt (again attached in full):
