Thank you for your inquiry regarding the status of your Freedom of Information Act/Privacy (FOIPA) request. A review of your request has determined the following:

The request is being handled under FOIPA request number 1429177-000 and is presently in Initial Processing, where the assigned analyst is searching for, retrieving and reviewing potentially responsive records.

Requests are processed in the order in which they are received through our multi-track processing system. Requests are divided into two primary tracks--simple (under 50 pages of potentially responsive documents) and complex (over 50 pages of potentially responsive documents). Complex requests are further divided into medium, large, and extra-large sub-tracks based upon request size. Simple track requests typically require the least amount of time to process. Currently, simple track cases average approximately 138 days from the date of receipt for processing. Our complex requests in the medium processing track are currently averaging 571 days, large processing track are currently averaging approximately 1,289 days, and extra-large processing track are currently averaging 1,649 days for processing.

The search for responsive records is ongoing for your request, so we do not yet know into which track it will fall. The estimated date of completion is therefore based on the average processing time of complex requests in the large processing track. Accordingly, the estimated date on which the FBI will complete action on your request is 1,289 days from the date the FBI opened your request. Once the search has been completed, you may request an estimated date of completion.

Dear FOIA officer,

This is a request under the Freedom of Information Act, 5 USC 552.

I am a journalist working on behalf of BuzzFeed, reporting on the emerging science and practice of investigative genealogy.

I request the following records:

- a) Communications between Steve Kramer, Melissa Parisot, or any other staff of the Los Angeles FBI Field Office *and* Bennett Greenspan or any other employee of Family Tree DNA (https://www.familytreedna.com/) or Gene by Gene (https://www.genebygene.com/), including but not limited to email correspondence, from Jan 2018 to present.
- b) Communications between Steve Kramer, Melissa Parisot, or any other staff of the Los Angeles FBI field office *and* any employee of MyHeritage (https://www.myheritage.com/), including but not limited to email correspondence, from Jan 2018 to present.
- c) Communications between Steve Kramer, Melissa Parisot, or any other staff of the Los Angeles FBI field office *and* any employee of Parabon NanoLabs (https://parabon-nanolabs.com/), including but not limited to email correspondence, from Jan 2018 to present.
- c) Contracts or purchase orders for services between FBI field office and Family Tree DNA, Gene by Gene, or Parabon NanoLabs, from Jan 2018 to present.
- d) Documents describing the commercial services available to process crime scene samples for submission to genetic genealogy services, and describing available genetic

genetic genealogy services, compiled by Steve Kramer of the Los Angeles FBI Field Office and distributed to other law enforcement agencies, from Jan 2018 to present.

Please ensure that you search both investigative *and* non-investigative record keeping systems and databases. Some of the records above will be located in the Los Angeles FBI field office, and in the email accounts of Steve Kramer and Melissa Parisot.

Reasonably Foreseeable Harm. The FOIA Improvement Act of 2016 amended the FOIA as follows (5 USC 552(a)(8)):

- (A) An agency shall—
- (i) withhold information under this section only if—
- (I) the agency reasonably foresees that disclosure would harm an interest protected by an exemption described in subsection (b); or
- (II) disclosure is prohibited by law; and
- (ii) (I) consider whether partial disclosure of information is possible whenever the agency determines that a full disclosure of a requested record is not possible; and
- (II) take reasonable steps necessary to segregate and release nonexempt information. .

FBI should not fail to meet the requirements of Section 552(a)(8) when processing my request and release responsive records to me in full or at least in part.

In the event some portions of the requested records are properly exempt from disclosure, please disclose any reasonably segregable non-exempt portions of the requested records. If it is your position that a document contains non-exempt segments, but that those non-exempt segments are so dispersed throughout the document as to make segregation impossible, please state what portion of the document is non-exempt, and how the material is dispersed throughout the document. If a request is denied in whole, please state specifically that it is not reasonable to segregate portions of the record for release.

As a member of the media, I am entitled to be placed in the "news media, educational, or scientific requesters" category. As such, I should only be charged for duplication fees beyond the first 100 pages. Further, I assert that this request is in the public interest, because it is likely to contribute significantly to public understanding of the operations and activities of the government, and therefore request a fee waiver.

As I am making this request as a journalist and this information is of timely value, I would appreciate your communicating with me by telephone or email, rather than by mail, if you have questions regarding this request.

I look forward to your reply within 20 business days, as the statute requires.
