Your request was sent to the Office of the Chief Information Officer for a search for responsive records. Accordingly, please find enclosed 495 pages of responsive records. Two (2) additional pages were forwarded to the Office of the Secretary (OS), Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) for consultation on those pages that originated within those offices. Some of the information on the disclosed pages has been withheld under the FOIA exemptions (b)(5) and (b)(6).

The FOIA exemption (b)(5) protects inter-agency or intra-agency memoranda or letters which would not be available by law to a party other than an agency in litigation with the agency. The exemption protects agency deliberations, both internal and with agency contractors and consultants, attorney-client privileged records and attorney work product.

Exemption (b)(6) permits the withholding of records which, if released, would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy.

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The Health Consequences of Sex Trafficking and Their Implications for Identifying Victims in Healthcare Facilities

INTRODUCTION

[W]hen I turned 13 I'd had enough of the abuse in home and I ran away. I didn't know where to go so I went to the center of town and stood by the town hall. A man saw me hanging around there and he said that he was looking for a 'protégé.' I didn't know what it was but it sounded fine to me. He said that I could stay at his house if I didn't have a place to stay. . . . When we got to his house he pulled out a bottle of gin and had me drink and drink. The next thing I remember is waking up drunk in his bed all wet and hurt. He took me out on the street and told me what to do . . . During that time I saw 10 to 20 men a day. I did what he said because he got violent when I sassed him. I took all kinds of drugseven though I didn't really like most of them . . . Over the years I had pimps and customers who hit me, punched me, kicked me, beat me, slashed me with a razor. I had forced unprotected sex and got pregnant three times and had two abortions at [a clinic]. Afterward, I was back out on the street again. I have so many scars all over my body and so many injuries and so many illnesses. I have hepatitis C and stomach and back pain and a lot of psychological issues. I tried to commit suicide several times.

Kayla's story is typical of women and girls trafficked for commercial sex

in the United States. Experiences like the ones she describes were reported by trafficking survivors who answered questions about their trafficking experience in a series of focus groups. Her story represents not the worst that occurs in sex trafficking, but rather, the common experience of women and girls trafficked into commercial sex by a criminal industry that generates an estimated \$33.9 billion per year worldwide.²

This paper explores the health consequences and healthcare experiences of women and girls trafficked in the United States for commercial sex. The paper is based on an original study of over one hundred domestic sex trafficking victims and survivors. It provides evidence that women and children who are trafficked into prostitution are physically, mentally, and emotionally devastated by the crime, and this devastation is lasting - with injuries, illnesses, and impairments continuing for decades. It illustrates how our healthcare system is failing trafficked women and children. It makes the case that health care providers of all kinds – in emergency wards, healthcare clinics, and private practices – are seeing trafficking victims but failing to identify them, thereby unwittingly contributing to continuing criminal activity and exacerbating both public and private physical and mental health problems for this segment of the population. It offers recommendations on ways that public policy and healthcare practice can combat sex trafficking by more readily identifying victims and catalyzing rescues. Finally, it argues that law, policy, and protocols must change in order to adequately address the health consequences of sex trafficking.

Section I briefly summarizes previous studies on health and human trafficking and puts the current study in context. Section II describes the current study, including methodology used to collect information from survivors. Section III presents the results of the study, detailing findings on survivors' physical and mental health issues. In addition, it describes victims' contact with healthcare providers during the time they were trafficked. Section IV summarizes critical issues in the provision of health care for sex trafficking victims, with particular attention to reproductive health care. Finally, Section V sets forth recommendations for legislators, policymakers, and healthcare professionals.

I. Previous Literature and Context

The current study fills a gap in the growing body of literature on health and violence in the context of sex trafficking. A majority of trafficking-

related studies have focused on trafficking outside of the United States. These studies have often concentrated narrowly on one or two aspects of sex trafficking, such as the prevalence of sexually transmitted diseases/infections (STDs/STIs)³ or mental health issues,⁴ though a few took a more comprehensive approach to examining the health and violence-related experiences of women in the commercial sex industry.⁵ International studies established that trafficking victims are subject to a myriad of physical and psychological symptoms stemming from extensive abuse.⁶

Recently, some researchers have undertaken domestic studies on sex trafficking as well.⁷ Three early studies surveyed 100 or more women and

touched on the problems that the instant study examines, but were each limited to a single city and examined a comparatively small number of health consequences.⁸ The most comprehensive early study interviewed victims in five U.S. regions and discussed violence at length while touching on both physical and mental health consequences.⁹ However, it was small and somewhat narrow in focus.¹⁰

While other studies have been conducted, 11 two Minnesota-based studies

are especially relevant. A 2010 survey of 117 Minneapolis women examined the impact of victims' age of entry into commercial sex on substance abuse and HIV risk. Because of these emphases, however, it discussed physical and emotional health consequences only at a high level of generality, such as whether participants "ever had an STD" or "ever experienced emotional violence." Another 2011 study of 105 Native American women engaged in commercial sex in Minnesota covered a substantial range of violent experiences, physical and health symptoms, and drugs, as well as Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD). The study contains some discussion of other mental health symptoms, but primarily in the context of determining whether the victims suffered from PTSD.

These studies set the stage for our current, more expansive study, which looks at over 200 health issues in more detail and across a broader geographic and ethnic spectrum. As far can be determined, our study is the first to examine many of the reproductive health issues experienced by sex trafficking victims, including birth control usage, pregnancies, miscarriages, and forced and elective abortions. In addition, it analyzes health care access and interactions and collects data on symptoms experienced both during and after trafficking.

II. METHODS

This study collected data from female sex trafficking survivors.¹⁶ The study used a mixed-methods approach, combining qualitative data collection from focus groups and structured interviews with quantitative analysis. An initial feasibility study using a single focus group was conducted in November of 2011. Following this initial focus group, a

series of eleven similar focus groups were conducted in cities across the United States from January 2012 to December 2012.¹⁷ Local leaders in the anti-trafficking movement, often survivor-led service providers, were asked to assist in locating survivors in their cities who wished to participate in the study. The focus groups included 107 participants, all domestic survivors of sex trafficking, ranging in age from fourteen to sixty. During these focus groups, participants commented on and discussed a range of topics, including subjects such as any early childhood trauma, the age at which they were trafficked, how they were recruited, how long they were held in captivity, and the overarching health issues they experienced. Following the focus group sessions, survivors completed an extensive health survey.¹⁸

The health survey included three components. In the first component, survivors reported on more than one hundred discrete health conditions drawn primarily from the World Health Organization's Statistical Classification of Diseases and Related Health Problems. ¹⁹ These health problems ranged from neurological and gastrointestinal symptoms to respiratory, cardiovascular, and dermatological conditions. Survivors answered questions about conditions in categories including, general health, communicable and non-communicable diseases, dental health, substance abuse, as well as nearly thirty psychological symptoms and disorders. The first component also asked about a range of sexually transmitted infections, gynecological and urinary tract conditions, birth control usage, pregnancy, and pregnancy outcomes.

Because of the ubiquity of violence in sex trafficking,²⁰ the first component also sought information about violence that the trafficking victim endured. The questionnaire asked whether the victim had been

subjected to physical abuse, such as being beaten, punched, kicked, raped, penetrated with foreign objects, threatened with a weapon, burned with cigarettes, strangled, stabbed, slashed, or forced to have unprotected sex. In addition to physical violence, victims indicated whether they were violated in other ways, such as being asked to participate in pornography, recreate a scene from pornographic material, or submit to abuse by a person in authority.

The second component of the survey consisted of a series of open-ended questions about health care. It asked such questions as whether and how long the victim used birth control during the time she was trafficked, where the birth control was obtained, who escorted the victim to the facility where birth control was obtained, and the type of birth control used. Because previous studies have identified health care providers as critical potential identifiers of trafficking victims, ²¹ the second component also asked what types of facilities survivors had visited to receive medical treatment and whether the healthcare provider asked or knew about their situations. Each victim also answered more detailed reproductive health questions, including her history of pregnancies, miscarriages, abortions and live births, where the abortions and/or births occurred, and whether she maintained custody of any children she had. With respect to abortion, the victim indicated how many abortions she had undergone, at what stage of pregnancy, and whether the abortion was coerced.

The final component of the questionnaire asked victims about the symptoms they experienced after escaping trafficking. This component covered the same range of physical and psychological symptoms as the first component. A full copy of a completed questionnaire is included in this article's Appendix.

Answers from the questionnaires were coded and entered in a spreadsheet. For questions in the first and third components where survivors circled symptoms to indicate that they had experienced them, a binary coding system (1 if circled, 0 if not) was used. For the open-ended second component, common answers were assigned a number and for questions where survivors gave an unwieldy variety of answers, the least common answers were grouped into a single "other" category.²² When

survivors did not answer a question, the response was coded as "N/A."

This coding system allowed the spreadsheet program to count how many survivors gave each response by counting how many cells in a column were filled with a given number. The totals were then calculated as percentages both of all survivors and of those who answered the particular question. The results section analyzes the frequency with which individual symptoms and experiences were reported by the survivors in this study as well as the percentages of victims who reported at least one symptom or experience in a given category.

III. RESULTS

A. Physical Health Symptoms

I am telling you that you have to not be in your sober mind to run these tricks—you just can't do it straight so everyone on the street is hooked on some drug. I've done drugs so long I have really hurt my body. I have kidney disease, liver problems, hepatitis C, high blood pressure, polymyositis [an inflammatory muscular disease], and fibroid tumors.

Survivors suffered tremendously, virtually without exception. Out of 106 survivors, ²³ 105 (99.1%) reported at least one physical health problem during trafficking. The most frequently reported physical problems were neurological—91.5% of respondents²⁴ reported at least one neurological symptom and 82.1% specifically reporting memory problems, insomnia, or poor concentration. Headaches or migraines (53.8%) and dizziness (34.0%) were also common symptoms. The trafficking experience ravaged the general health of victims as well, with 85.7% reporting at least one symptom in the general health category. In particular, the respondents' dietary health was often poor. Severe weight loss (42.9%), malnutrition (35.2%), loss of appetite (46.7%), and eating disorders (36.2%) were especially common; 71.4% of respondents reporting at least one of these diet-related symptoms.

The toll of constant commercial sexual exploitation and physical abuse on the victims led to a range of additional conditions. Physical injuries

were rampant, with nearly 70% of victims reported physical injuries, most commonly to the head or face. Symptoms not conventionally associated with sexual abuse were only slightly less common: 67.9% of respondents experienced some type of cardiovascular or respiratory difficulty and 61.3% suffered from gastrointestinal symptoms while being trafficked. More than half of the survivors (54.3%) reported dental problems, with tooth loss the most common problem (42.9%). The only major health category in which less than half of respondents reported a symptom was dermatological issues, which were nonetheless reported by 27.4% of respondents. This study's findings of widespread physical health consequences are generally consistent with the results of previous domestic studies and build on their findings by revealing a more comprehensive picture of the health issues that plague trafficking victims.²⁵

B. Psychological Symptoms

"The mental health problems are the worst and most long lasting. I was diagnosed with chronic depression, have anxiety, post-traumatic stress syndrome, nightmares, flashbacks, disorientation. I've been suicidal at

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times. I don't think anyone is out on the street without having these long lasting effects."

Survivors were overwhelmingly traumatized not only physically, but also mentally. The brutal treatment they endured created ongoing psychological and mental conditions in many of these victims and exploited existing mental instability in others. All but two of those who responded to the survey (104/106, 98.1%) reported at least one psychological issue during their captivity and survivors noted an average of more than a dozen (12.11). The most frequently reported problems included depression (88.7%), anxiety (76.4%), nightmares (73.6%), flashbacks (68.0%), low self-esteem (81.1%), and feelings of shame or guilt (82.1%). The picture painted by these surveys and the personal interviews that accompanied many of them is one of complete mental devastation. A substantial number of survivors suffered from other psychological disorders, including acute stress (38.7%), bipolar (30.2%), depersonalization (19.8%), multiple personality (13.2%), and borderline personality (13.2%) disorders.

Two additional and particularly chilling reporting rates confirm the extent of mental trauma that survivors suffered: 41.5% had attempted suicide (one victim reported 9 such attempts) and 54.7% suffered from Post Traumatic Stress Disorder. The psychological consequences that the trafficking victims in these focus groups reported were wide-ranging, severe, and in some cases nearly universal. As with physical symptoms, the findings on the psychological consequences of trafficking are consistent with other studies.²⁷

Even the escape from their trafficking circumstances was far from a remedy for the psychological suffering of survivors. When reporting on their health experiences after trafficking, 96.4% of survivors reported at least one psychological symptom and an average of 10.5. As the table below indicates, there were only minor improvements in the number of psychological problems experienced when the victims escaped from their trafficking situations. Sex trafficking took a lasting mental and emotional as well as physical toll on nearly every survivor in the study.

C. Reproductive Issues

If I hadn't had my children when I was young, I wouldn't be able to have them because I have had so many STDs and gynecological problems—including pelvic inflammatory disease, cervical infections, gonorrhea, herpes, chlamydia—I can't have children now.

Not surprisingly, survivors also reported significant numbers of reproductive health problems while they were being trafficked. Most notably, more than two-thirds of these women (67.3%) contracted some form of sexually-transmitted disease or infection (STD/STI). Survivors reported significantly higher rates of chlamydia (39.4%) and gonorrhea

(26.9%) than the next most common disease (Hepatitis C, 15.4%). Well over half of survivors (63.8%) reported at least one gynecological symptom other than STDs/STIs, with pain during sex (46.2%), urinary tract infections (43.8%), and vaginal discharge (33.3%) among the most common such symptoms. The extent of reproductive health issues that survivors reported is hardly surprising due to the extreme levels of sexual abuse these women endured. On average, the respondents reported being used for sex by approximately thirteen buyers per day, ²⁹ with a median response of ten. Some respondents reported typical days of as many as thirty to fifty buyers.

Reporting problems complicated the data regarding pregnancies and their results, with some respondents answering related questions inconsistently. While these reporting issues make precision impossible, the data merits concluding with confidence that pregnancy, miscarriage, and abortion were all common experiences for survivors in the study. Even without accounting for possible underreporting, forty-seven of the sixty-six women (71.2%) who gave an answer for the number of pregnancies they had during trafficking reported at least one pregnancy while being trafficked; fourteen of these (21.2% of respondents) reported five or more pregnancies. Of the

For example, thirty-four respondents circled "pregnancy" as something they experienced during trafficking in the survey's first component, but an additional nineteen women gave a number of one or greater to the open-ended question "How many pregnancies did you have while being trafficked?" in the second component of the survey despite not having circled "pregnancy" earlier, bringing the total to fifty-three. There is reason to believe, however, that even the combined total of fifty-three women may underreport the number who experienced a pregnancy because many of the victims may have had different standards for what counted as a pregnancy. In some cases, the victims appeared not to count pregnancies that ended in abortion or miscarriage, reporting for example, two pregnancies, two live births, two miscarriages, and one abortion. Thus, women whose pregnancies all ended in miscarriage or abortion may not be reflected even in the combined total of fiftythree. Similar discrepancies occurred on a smaller scale with regard to miscarriages (thirtytwo subjects circled, ten more did not circle but reported one or more, and two subjects who had circled nonetheless reported zero as the number they had) and abortions (thirty-nine subjects circled, three additional subjects did not circle but reported having one or more). There were additional inconsistent sequences of answers about pregnancies and pregnancy outcomes. Thirty-nine subjects reported numbers of births, miscarriages, and abortions that totaled a different number than the subject reported as her total number of pregnancies or gave otherwise conflicting answers. In most of these cases, there was no obvious explanation that accounted for the difference. Possible explanations include varying standards of what counts as a pregnancy, multiple-child births (twins, triplets, etc.), and answering different questions with reference to different periods of time (i.e., counting only pregnancies occurring during trafficking but counting all miscarriages, births, or abortions whether before, during, or after trafficking).

sixty-four respondents who gave an answer for the number of miscarriages they experienced, thirty-five (54.7%) had at least one miscarriage and nineteen (29.7%) had more than one.³¹ Similarly, more than half (55.2%) of the sixty-seven respondents who answered reported at least one abortion, with twenty respondents (29.9%) reporting multiple abortions. Without accounting for possible underreporting, this subset of responding survivors reported a total of 114 abortions.

The prevalence of forced abortions is an especially disturbing trend in sex trafficking. Prior research noted that forced abortions were a reality for many victims of sex trafficking outside the United States³² and at least one study noted forced abortions in domestic trafficking.³³ The survivors in this study similarly reported that they often did not freely choose the abortions they had while being trafficked. While only thirty-four respondents answered the question whether their abortions were of their own volition or forced upon them, more than half (eighteen) of that group indicated that one or more of their abortions was at least partly forced upon them.³⁴ One victim noted that "in most of [my six abortions,] I was under serious pressure from my pimps to abort the babies." Another survivor, whose abuse at the hands of her traffickers³⁵ was particularly brutal, reported

seventeen abortions and indicated that at least some of them were forced on her. Notably, the phenomenon of forced abortion as it occurs in sex trafficking transcends the political boundaries of the abortion debate, violating both the pro-life belief that abortion takes innocent life and the pro-choice ideal of women's freedom to make their own reproductive choices.

D. Violence, Abuse, and Humiliation

I've had a hard life during this time—16 years on the street, 10 to 20 customers per day. I've been hit, punched, kicked, beaten, whipped with a belt, forced to have sex, threatened with a weapon, shot at, and had my head split open. . . . One of my regulars got together with some friends and kidnapped me. They held me against my will, put a belt around my neck, and forced me to do all kinds of horrible things. When I said I didn't want to they said they would kill my family.

The survey asked survivors if they had experienced violence or abuse, listing twelve possible forms.³⁶ These included being threatened with a weapon, shot, strangled, burned, kicked, punched, beaten, stabbed, raped, or penetrated with a foreign object. The survey also asked about other kinds of abuse such as threats, intimidation, verbal abuse and humiliation. Nearly all the survivors (92.2%) reported being the victim of at least one form of physical violence. Many survivors had suffered more than half of these experiences. Respondents reported an average of 6.25 of the 12 forms of violence. Likewise, most of these abuses were the rule rather than the exception—eight of the twelve were reported by half or more of the respondents, including behaviors as extreme as strangulation. In their interviews, survivors described additional ways they were abused. One survivor was whipped and had bleach poured on her, while another was forced to eat feces and was hung by her arms in a closet. As another survivor describes, "[my pimp] had his girls out on the streets every night. It was either you made the [money] for him or you got beat." In addition to the abuses detailed below, almost all survivors reported serious verbal

abuse, including repeatedly being called derogatory names, treated as less than human, and being deprived of basic physical and emotional needs such as food, sleep, and a caring environment.

In addition to physical mistreatment, some victims were subjected to other forms of degradation, such as recreating scenes from pornography (29.3%) or being forcibly recorded for pornographic purposes (17.1%). Other studies confirm the prevalence of violence against trafficking victims.³⁷

E. Substance Abuse

I started doing drugs, specifically cocaine down at the local go-go bar, and eventually I tried heroin. I was a mess, wrecked my life, wasted it on drugs because I'd been raped and I didn't think I mattered to anyone. When I was 31 years old I started dating a . . . guy who was a drug dealer. We dealt together, did crack together, and he started prostituting me to close drug deals.

Many survivors were dependent on drugs or alcohol while they were

trafficked either because the substances were forced on them as a control mechanism by their traffickers³⁸ or because substance use was a means of coping with the immense abuse they suffered. 84.3% used alcohol, drugs, or both during their captivity and more than a quarter (27.9%) said that forced substance use was a part of their trafficking experience. More than a quarter of victims reported injected drugs and overdoses (27.2% and 26.0% respectively). As the following table indicates, alcohol, marijuana, and cocaine were the most common substances but others were prevalent as well.

Overwhelmingly, survivors were the objects of repeated and extreme violence and were frequently driven to substance abuse either by force or by their dire circumstances.

IV. CRITICAL ISSUES IN PROVISION OF HEALTH CARE FOR VICTIMS OF SEX TRAFFICKING

During the time I was on the street, I went to hospitals, urgent care clinics, women's health clinics, and private doctors. No one ever asked me anything anytime I ever went to a clinic. . . . I was on birth control during the 10 years I was on the streets—mostly Depo-Provera shots which I got at the Planned Parenthood and other neighborhood clinics. I also got the morning-after pill from them. I was young and so I had to

have a waiver signed in order to get these—one of the doctors (a private doctor I think) signed this waiver when my uncle took me to see him.

Despite their abusive situations, most survivors did receive medical treatment at some point during their trafficking. Of those who answered the questions about their contact with healthcare (N=98), 87.8% had contact with a healthcare provider while they were being trafficked. By far the most frequently reported treatment site was a hospital/emergency room, with 63.3% being treated at such a facility. Survivors also had significant contact with clinical treatment facilities, most commonly Planned Parenthood clinics, which more than a quarter of survivors (29.6%) visited. More than half (57.1%) of respondents had received treatment at some type of clinic (urgent care, women's health, neighborhood, or Planned Parenthood).

Since pimps and traffickers⁴⁰ generally exercise nearly complete control of

their victims,⁴¹ these points of contact with healthcare represent rare opportunities for victim identification and intervention.⁴² In addition, because of the hearsay exception in the Federal Rules of Evidence for statements made for medical treatment (regardless of whether the declarant testifies),⁴³ statements by victims to healthcare professionals should usually be admissible in a trafficking prosecution.⁴⁴

These opportunities have largely been missed as even those healthcare professionals who recognized that victims might have been "on the street" rarely understood that they had a pimp/trafficker. Just over half (51.9%) of respondents who answered (N=81) said that at least some of the time the doctor knew they were "on the street," while the remaining respondents did not believe doctors were aware of their situations. Almost half of survivors (43.1%) (N=58) said the doctor asked them something about their lives, but only 19.5% of those who answered (N=41) reported that the doctor knew they had a pimp. At least two prior studies have demonstrated that medical care providers are woefully unprepared to identify trafficking

victims.47

As noted above, pregnancy, miscarriage, and abortion were all experienced by half or more of survivors who answered questions about them. Several other survivors said that they had hysterectomies or tubal ligations either during or after trafficking and another two survivors were sold specifically for sodomy in order to avoid pregnancy. Healthcare providers who specialize in these types of care are therefore particularly likely to have opportunities for identification and intervention. Clinics that perform abortions must be especially vigilant in efforts to recognize possible trafficking victims. Roughly two-thirds (67.6%) of survivors who specified a location (N=37) identified a clinic as the site of their abortion(s), far outpacing hospitals (16.2%) and other sites (13.5%). One survivor described her situation:

I got pregnant six times and had six abortions during this time. Several of them were from a doctor who was a client—he did them 'back door'—I came in the back door after hours and paid him off the books. This kept my name off any records.... I think he felt like he was helping. At least one of my abortions was from Planned Parenthood because they didn't ask any questions. But they were expensive and on the street you didn't want to pay \$250, \$300, or more. So you went 'back door' where the charge was more like \$150. I had so much scar tissue from these abortions because there was no follow-up and in a couple of cases I had bad infections, so bad that I eventually lost my fallopian tubes [and had to have a hysterectomy].⁴⁸

Survivors also interacted with medical professionals for purposes of obtaining birth control. A large majority (80.9%) of those who answered the question (N=73) indicated that they had used some form of birth control for some portion of their time being trafficked. Of those who specified where they obtained the birth control (N=59), approximately half (51.7%) said they had obtained it from a doctor or clinic. More than half (65.2%) of respondents said that they went alone to the doctor or other source where they obtained birth control. Together, these responses indicate that a significant number of trafficking victims see healthcare providers (especially clinics and doctors) to obtain birth control without trafficker supervision, suggesting that medical staff have a rare opportunity to communicate one-on-one with victims.⁵⁰

VI. RECOMMENDATIONS

A. General Awareness: Common Symptoms and Warning Signs

Medical professionals must be made aware of critical signals for identifying trafficking victims. An important part of this training should be to help the health care professional understand the coercive dynamic of trafficking, especially the extreme degree of control exercised by traffickers, and the prevalence of this criminal exploitation of women and girls. Setting up internal protocols, procedures and regulations can further

these goals and assist medical care providers in their vital role as identifiers of trafficking victims.

Based on the reported symptoms of survivors, a number of particularly widespread health-related consequences of trafficking should serve as warning signs to medical professionals. The most suggestive physical symptoms are injuries from physical violence, since this was a nearly universal experience for the survivors in the study. Signs of being kicked, punched, or beaten, all of which at least two thirds of respondents reported, should be a major "red flag" along with any signs of forced sex (reported by 81.6%), and head or facial injuries (each reported by more than half of survivors). While these may also be signals of domestic violence, their presence in patients seeking multiple abortions or treatment for sexually transmitted or serious communicable diseases may help healthcare providers to distinguish possible sex trafficking situations. Indications of extreme forms of violence (such as strangulation, stabbing, cigarette burns or gunshot wounds) also may be important clues for identification since these would have far fewer alternate explanations. One researcher notes that tattoos identifying the victim as the "property" of a particular trafficker could also alert care providers, 52 though these may be difficult to recognize.

In addition, those psychological symptoms that were particularly common among trafficking victims should be useful warning signs. Depression was the most common symptom for survivors (88.7%) and anxiety, irritability, nightmares, low self-esteem, and feelings of shame/guilt were all reported by more than 70% of survivors as well. The combination of these symptoms should therefore arouse suspicion when displayed by patients who repeatedly require reproductive health services, when an older or controlling male figure is present with the patient, and when the patient also presents signs of physical abuse. The well-documented rates of PTSD in trafficking victims, ⁵³ (54.7% of survivors in this study) make it another important clue to identifying trafficking victims. Indications of attempted or repeated self-harm would likewise be a reason for considering trafficking as a possibility in these context, since 46.2% of respondents reported suicide ideation and 41.5% had attempted suicide.

The presence of sexually transmitted diseases or infections is another major identifier because nearly two-thirds (67.3%) of survivors reported having at least one such disease. Multiple or serial cases of such diseases or

infections is a particularly strong signal that should immediately raise the possibility of a trafficking situation in the minds of healthcare providers. Because of the overwhelming rate of substance abuse (84.3%) that survivors reported, signs of alcohol and/or drug abuse could also be a significant warning sign when observed in patients who require reproductive health services at a young age, appear to be controlled by another person, or also exhibit the physical and psychological symptoms detailed above.

Clinics and other abortion providers should be especially attentive to warning signs particularly with regard to younger patients. Multiple abortions and evidence of coercion (such as the presence of a significantly older or controlling "boyfriend," or the physical and psychological symptoms discussed above) in these patients should prompt the healthcare provider to seek more information about the patient's situation. More than half (52.9%) of survivors (N=34) indicated that at least one abortion was partly or wholly forced on them, making this concern especially grave.

These warning signs are not intended to be exhaustive or authoritative, but they build on and refine the suggestions of prior research.⁵⁴ To be sure, there are myriad other physical and psychological symptoms that could alert medical staff to the possibility that a patient is a victim of trafficking and many other contexts in which victims seek medical services. Nonetheless, the symptoms and service contexts most mentioned by survivors should prove particularly relevant to the problem of victim identification by medical professionals and may also lead to conversations that could later assist prosecutors because of their likely admissibility under the Federal Rules of Evidence.

B. Protocols for Identifying Victims and Catalyzing Rescues

Interaction between medical care providers and victims is an extraordinarily delicate situation. Because some victims may come alone, the health provider has an opportunity, if trust level and other considerations allow, to ask questions about the possible victim's situation and to provide her with resources like contact information for rescue and other services. Existing literature and this study both provide some guidance for carefully making the most of these opportunities.

Building trust with possible victims is a critical first step and requires patience and cultural sensitivity on the part of medical professionals:

Building trust with trafficking victims may be a slow process and requires patience and determination. Taking the time to build rapport is critical. . . . The [health care provider] must have the humility to accept and acknowledge that there may be much about the victim's culture they do not understand, and that the impact of such taboos may be significant in that culture. Many small steps are needed to build trust, such as openended questions, few interruptions, and a private area to talk. Often more than one visit is needed, and the victim may need to be told to return to the clinic to reevaluate a health care issue when the HCP strongly suspects trafficking and further assessment and questioning is desired to get a patient to open up. Messages for the HCP to convey in private with a suspected victim include a focus on safety, getting healthy, and that the victim's welfare is the highest priority. ⁵⁵

Because traffickers often accompany victims to treatment and their presence may prevent truthful answers, victims should be interviewed in private if at all possible.⁵⁶ Separation should be done discreetly,⁵⁷ perhaps by requesting that the male figure assist with paperwork or remain in the waiting room while staff obtain specimens.⁵⁸

Asking directly whether the patient is a victim of trafficking may be meaningless and directly asking about the most traumatic aspects of trafficking is also "ill-advised." Rather, a serious of "sensitive probing questions" can help uncover or unpack the underlying trafficking situation. For example, the health care sector can borrow from the law profession. Legal aid attorneys working on custody cases noted that when gathering the facts about an abusive husband or boyfriend to help a client gain custody of her child, facts patterns emerged that made it clear that the client was a victim of sex trafficking. The victim did not come through the door self-identifying as a trafficking victim, but slowly over the course of conversation, understood her victimization and was able to seek help from law enforcement to emerge from the trafficking situation. Gradually working with the victim's identifiable health problems to elicit important facts about their over-arching situation is likely to be most effective and

least intrusive.60

Additionally, where a translator is needed, care needs to be taken to identify someone the right translator to avoid the possibility of complicity with a trafficker.⁶¹ Especially in tight-knit communities, that someone unconnected translates is critical. In addition, other language considerations are key to creating trust and communication. Using informal language (sometimes even slang) rather than formal or clinical terminology may improve communication with victims, bridging conceptual or definitional gaps about trafficking generally, as well as with specific issues like violence and rape. Specific suggested questions include asking about the patient's freedom to contact family and friends, her eating and sleeping conditions (whether basic needs are being met), her ability to come and go freely, who lives with her, and whether she feels happy and cared for.⁶² Sometimes it is possible for the provider to ask direct and specific questions about whether the patient has been drugged, raped, coerced, or hurt and get honest answers.

Regardless of the patient's comfort level and degree of cooperation, if a provider strongly suspects the patient is a victim of sex trafficking, he (or she) should call the National Trafficking Hotline. Calls can be made anonymously if necessary. Providers need to have strategies and preparation for how to address potential sex trafficking cases, including coordination with law enforcement and with local NGO service providers. Healthcare providers can play a crucial role in the trafficking rescue process by identifying possible victims and following up on those suspicions with careful, strategic questions, and actions that catalyze rescues or help create exit strategies.

B. Regulations: Training for Healthcare Professionals and Hotline Posting Requirements

Legislators and policymakers also have an important role to play in increasing health care providers' recognition and identification of trafficking victims. State legislators should draft and pass laws that require healthcare providers to undergo training on trafficking generally, including the basic warning signs and indicators for victim identification, techniques

for communicating effectively with possible victims to assess their situations and determine victim status, and appropriate actions to take when a victim is identified. The Obama administration has recognized the need for additional trafficking-related training for federal social service employees and law enforcement.⁶⁵ Likewise, medical professionals need training to recognize and appropriately respond to trafficking victims.

New Jersey recently adopted a statute that may serve as a baseline model for such training requirements. Under the new law, the New Jersey Department of Health will "develop, approve, and provide for a one-time training course on the handling and response procedures of suspected human trafficking activities for employees of every licensed health care facility." In order to maintain their licenses, health care facilities must verify completion of the course by a subset of its employees to be defined by regulation. Other states should follow New Jersey's lead by making trafficking-related training a requirement for licensing with a comprehensive definition of the facilities affected. Additionally, other states can build on the New Jersey statute by providing for ongoing trainings, expanding the scope of training to include recognition of victims as well as protocols for handling and response of potential victims, and by requiring that all employees participate in the training course.

Another measure that can be instituted is to require that medical facilities post information about the National Human Trafficking Resource Center

Hotline, a toll-free phone number that connects callers to law enforcement as well as other services⁷⁰ An earlier proposed version of the 2013 TVPRA would have required the Secretary of Health and Human Services and the Attorney General to "make reasonable efforts to encourage [s]tates to adopt legislation" that requires posting of information about the hotline at a variety of establishments, including hospitals and urgent care centers.⁷¹ Measures like this in future federal legislation could be a catalyst to statelevel posting requirements. Posting laws improve victim access to the hotline and could even spur otherwise hesitant victims to share their situation with medical staff. In fact, California⁷² and Georgia⁷³ have already adopted posting laws. Other states should follow suit and expand the range of medical facilities covered by the statutes to include abortion and women's health clinics.⁷⁴ Some survivors have that while posting laws and brochures are important, even better (or in addition) is a small business card with the hotline number as well as shelter and rescue information on it. A business card can be slipped into a handbag or even a shoe and concealed for use later on.

Finally, both federal and state governments must commit to providing resources to aid survivors of sex trafficking regardless of age. Although the Violence Against Women Reauthorization Act of 2013 provided significant resources for the care of trafficking victims, it only targeted these resources at victims who are minors. These resources need to be extended to cover adult trafficking victims and adult survivors, as their physical and mental health needs are just as great as those of minor sex trafficking victims. Federal and state funding of medical care and other related survivor needs should recognize this reality by eliminating age-based restrictions on funding.

VII. CONCLUSION

Victims of sex trafficking suffer severe physical and psychological health consequences as a result of their trafficking. Victims frequently have contact with medical professionals in a variety of health care settings, including hospital emergency wards, neighborhood clinics, women's health clinics, and Planned Parenthood clinics, as well as private practices. Violence-related injuries, serious illness or disease, pregnancy, birth control, and abortion, substance abuse, addiction and overdose, as well as serious psychological problems, are all reasons why substantial numbers of victims seek treatment.

Because they are "first responders" health care providers have unique opportunities to intervene on behalf of trafficking victims. Health care institutions must develop protocols for training, identifying, and treating sex trafficking victims. Medical personnel must increase efforts to understand the nature and scope of the problem of sex trafficking in the United States in order to improve their capacity to identify victims. This is especially true when they have the ability to speak privately with victims in a context where their statements may be admissible in a later prosecution of their traffickers. To this end, medical staff, particularly in hospital emergency rooms and local clinics should be alert for the most common physical and psychological conditions and symptoms these victims experience, especially in the context of reproductive health. By doing so, the medical community can play a vital role in the ongoing fight to eliminate modernday slavery.



We noted that ACF provided information about how general drug abuse by a parent had increased to 34 percent in FY 2016 leading to approximately 92,000 children being removed from their home in FY 2016 because of one parent had a drug abuse issue.

ACF will be providing a formal response to the letter that you submitted on September 29. In the meantime, we reiterate that the information provided in past reports is incomplete and, therefore, not fully responsive to the grant requirements.

The information collection required for the grantees includes the following specific information:

- Names of the entities providing medical services; and
- Amount of money expended on each type of medical service provided, by entity.

The "entity" is the health care institution directly providing the medical service. A grantee or sub-recipient is not the "entity" unless the grantee or sub-recipient is directly providing the medical service.

Also, there must be sufficient detail in the grantees' categorization of "medical service" to allow for a full understanding of the specific medical services received by victims, potential victims, and family members served by the program. The report language requires the collection of "specific information regarding the types of services provided or referred."

The information should not be aggregated. If a client received multiple medical services, or more than one client received services from one entity, report each service received by each client, including the name of the entity and the amount of money expended per instance of service. Personally identifiable information should not be submitted.

This information collection has a current and valid OMB number and is included in the requirements for the grant in the FOA and cooperative agreement. The collection is required to ensure compliance with appropriation funding restrictions and requirements and to report information to Congress.

With Deadline Looming, Eight Carriers in Five States Still Provide No Information About Whether Their Obamacare Plans Cover Abortion

Today the national prolife group Susan B.
Anthony List (SBA List) and its research arm the Charlotte Lozier
Institute (CLI) sent letters to U.S. Department of Health and Human
Services Acting Secretary
Eric Hargan and Inspector
General Daniel Levinson to share their findings on

health insurance carriers who, less than two weeks before the December 15 enrollment deadline, have not complied with Affordable Care Act ("Obamacare") regulations requiring disclosure of abortion coverage in their Summary of Benefits and Coverage (SBC) plan documents.

The letters ask HHS to review the carriers and take steps to bring them into compliance, ensure that current enrollees of these plans are informed when updates are made, and provide an extended enrollment deadline to consumers in the affected states.

Since open enrollment began on November 1, CLI and Family Research Council (FRC) research staff have been performing an ongoing examination of healthcare.gov and state-based exchanges, looking for information on abortion coverage and the accessibility of that information.

The lack of transparency on abortion coverage affects at least 151 exchange plans in five states. The noncompliant carriers are:

- Bright Health in Colorado (6 plans)
- Elevate by Denver Health Medical in Colorado (6 plans)
- Health Alliance Medical Plans, Inc. in Illinois (61 plans)
- Independent Health in New York (21 plans)
- Fidelis Care in New York (9 plans)
- Sendero Health Plans, Inc. in Texas (4 plans)
- Boston Medical Center HealthNet Plan in Massachusetts (5 plans)
- MVP Health Plan in New York (39 plans)

Since October of 2013, CLI has <u>reported</u> on the lack of transparency and generally <u>confusing</u> nature of the exchange plans. In 2014, after the non-partisan Government Accountability Office (GAO) released a <u>report</u> identifying 1,036 taxpayer-subsidized Obamacare plans that covered elective abortion, CLI and FRC launched <u>Obamacareabortion.com</u> to inform consumers about which Obamacare plans include elective abortion coverage. The groups' 2018 <u>fact sheet</u> with detailed information and an <u>interactive map</u> are available online at <u>Obamacareabortion.com</u>.





I am writing to you because we desire your engagement on the question of the proper housing and care of Unaccompanied Alien Children in the United States. My name is Shannon Royce, and I serve as Director of the Center for Faith and Opportunity Initiatives at the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. On behalf of the Department, I am pleased to invite you to participate in a day-long engagement focused on the Department's Unaccompanied Alien Children (UAC) program, with tours of UAC grantee facilities to follow.

We at the Partnership Center seek to further engage the faith community in an ongoing discussion regarding the UAC program. Our aim is to educate our nation's faith leaders and engage them in a constructive dialog concerning how the government and the faith-based community can better cooperate to serve these children and our nation.

To that end, the Partnership Center, in collaboration with the Administration for Children and Families (ACF), will host an all-day engagement with appointed leadership from the Department and senior staff of the Unaccompanied Alien Children program on February 12, 2019, here in Washington, DC. 





I. Introduction

The purpose of this report is to share insights and information on the social services provided by the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops/Migration and Refugee Services (USCCB/MRS) and the Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Service (LIRS) in response to the family separation crisis. USCCB/MRS and LIRS provided services on a charitable basis to assist the U.S. federal government in its reunification and release of 1,112 families who had been separated at the U.S./Mexico border due to the implementation of the Department of Justice's (DOJ) April 6, 2018 "Zero Tolerance" memorandum and were initially eligible for reunification.¹

From July 2nd through July 29th, LIRS and USCCB/MRS worked in partnership to assist both the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) and the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) in their work reunifying separated families. This report provides additional information about the reunited and released families who endured separation. It includes new and original data points collected by LIRS and USCCB/MRS, through their on-the-ground Catholic Charities and Lutheran service providers, regarding where the reunited families came from (countries of origin), where the reunited families were headed (destination cities), and where they were

processed for reunification.

Further, this report highlights the ongoing work of US-CCB/MRS in partnership with Catholic Charities USA (CCUSA) and Catholic Charities members, and LIRS to provide, on a charitable basis, post-release services for every reunited and released family that was served by USCCB/MRS and Catholic Charities partners and LIRS. Finally, this report provides recommendations for policymakers, elected officials, and child welfare experts. In part, these recommendations aim to: (i) ensure that family unity and safety is a primary consideration in future immigration policy decisions impacting migrant families; (ii) prevent and mitigate future large-scale family separation; (iii) encourage use of alternatives to detention, namely post-release services and case management services, as these are vital policy tools to address asylum-seeking families arriving at the U.S./Mexico border; and (iv) ensure asylum-seeking families understand and comply with their immigration requirements and responsibilities.

II. Origins of Family Separation at the U.S./Mexico Border

In recent years, the demographics of migrants encountered at the U.S./Mexico border have shifted from a ma-

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jority of adult males, often from Mexico and seeking seasonal employment, to families and unaccompanied children, primarily from Central America, fleeing to seek protection in the United States.2 While this change in the composition of those crossing the U.S./Mexico border can be attributed to many different factors, including the improved economic conditions of the Mexican economy,³ a primary factor is the endemic violence that the residents of Northern Triangle countries of El Salvador, Guatemala, and Honduras are facing due to gang infiltration and corruption. Increasingly, families and children in poorer neighborhoods throughout the Northern Triangle are being targeted, threatened, and extorted by gangs and armed criminal groups. This is occurring more frequently as gangs expand their reach and control over neighborhoods, moving from solely urban and suburban communities to rural and agrarian communities as well.4 Additionally, situations of domestic and family violence pervade many homes and often are met with impunity and inaction due to the corruption within the law enforcement system and the weak civil protection scheme. As a result of these conditions, many of the families and children who arrive at the U.S./Mexico border have often been internally displaced in their own country several times in search of protection and have migrated north as a last resort.5

Due to the extensive protection issues in the Northern Triangle, the known dangers of the migration journey north, as well as the vulnerable nature of children traveling unaccompanied and family units traveling with children, the arriving families and unaccompanied children are often deeply traumatized and at increased risk of exploitation. These families and children consequently present a unique challenge to the U.S. government and the departments that are tasked to apprehend, maintain custody, and adjudicate their cases.

In recent years, 6 several Administrations have attempted to address the increasing number of arriving family units with a variety of responses,7 including family detention,8 alternatives to detention,9 and in some instances, family separation. Indeed, the practice of separating families arriving at the U.S./Mexico border is not a new one.10 During the George W. Bush and the Obama Administrations, DHS separated families, both nuclear and extended, at the U.S./Mexico border. Yet, while separation of families did occur, a majority of these separations were due to child welfare concerns that had been flagged by DHS officers.11 The end of the Obama Administration and into the beginning of the Trump Administration marked a significant increase in the number of families separated at the U.S./Mexico border by DHS's Customs and Border Protection (CBP). Between October 2016 and February 2018, DHS separated an estimated 1,768 children from their parents, rendering them "unaccompanied."12 Both LIRS and USCCB/MRS, who are national providers of residential care and family reunification services for unaccompanied children, observed increased reports of family separation by the children they served during this same time period, particularly in late 2017 and into 2018.¹³ It was later learned that part of the increase in separation cases seen during this time was due to a pilot of the zero-tolerance policy, operated by the Trump Administrations in the El Paso border sector between July and October 2017.¹⁴

A. Zero-Tolerance Policy

The number of separated families continued to increase in the spring and early summer of 2018 after implementation of the "zero-tolerance policy" by the DOJ. In April 2018, U.S. Attorney General Jeff Sessions notified all U.S. Attorneys' offices along the Southwest Border via memo of a new zero-tolerance policy for prosecution of those entering the U.S. without authorization. DOJ in relation to the policy, stating that it would refer all individuals who cross the U.S. border without authorization for criminal prosecution, including adult members of family units. The zero-tolerance policy relates to crimes of illegal entry under 8 U.S.C. § 1325(a), or an individual's act of crossing the border between official ports of entry without authorization.¹⁷ For first-time offenders, illegal entry is a federal misdemeanor punishable by up to six months in prison or fines (or both). 18 Under the new policy, the DOJ has sought to prosecute all individuals who cross the U.S. border without authorization, to the extent feasible. The policy does not make exceptions, even for families who willingly turn themselves over to CBP's Border Patrol seeking protection.¹⁹ Further, in its review of the policy, the DHS Office of Inspector General (DHS-OIG) noted: "[W]hile the Government encouraged all asylum-seekers to come to ports of entry to make their asylum claims, CBP managed the flow of people who could enter at those ports of entry through metering, which may have led to additional illegal border crossings."20

DHS's facilitation of the zero-tolerance policy, specifically its referral for prosecution of adult members of arriving family units, resulted in large-scale family separation. After encountering a family between ports of entry at the U.S./Mexico border, Border Patrol officers would typically either transfer individuals over age 18, in this case parents, into the custody of the DOJ's U.S. Marshals Service or keep them in DHS custody to await prosecution; it would then designate any accompanying children who were traveling as part of the family unit as "unaccompanied." As a result, the newly separated children would then be transferred to the custody of HHS's Office of Refugee Resettlement (ORR). Accordingly, as a result of the zero-tolerance policy, family units arriving to the U.S./Mexico border were separated and placed into two different department's care and custody: HHS/ORR for the children and typically DHS or DOJ for the parents. In large part due to this separation, the year-to-date FY 2018

number of referrals of children to ORR custody grew by 76% from March to May 2018.²¹

B. Executive Order on "Affording Congress an Opportunity to Address Family Separation" and the U.S. District Court for the Southern District of California's Preliminary Injunction

After extensive national and international opposition to the implementation of the zero-tolerance policy, on June 20, 2018, President Trump issued an Executive Order (EO) on family separation, entitled "Affording Congress an Opportunity to Address Family Separation."²² The EO

limits the widespread separation of families at the U.S./Mexico border. It does so by instructing DHS to, where possible, keep families detained together

through the pendency of any criminal entry or immigration case.²³ In conjunction, it instructs the Department of Defense and other agencies to provide or construct facilities that can be used for expanded family detention.²⁴ It also instructs DOJ to seek exceptions to the temporal limitations placed on detention of children in unlicensed facilities, such as the existing family detention centers, as set forth in the Flores Settlement Agreement of 1997 and subsequent litigation.²⁵ The EO does not halt prosecutions under the zero-tolerance policy; DHS, however, subsequently noted that it would suspend referrals of families until it has capacity to detain families together.²⁶

The EO is also silent as to the 2,654 children²⁷ who had

already been separated from their parents under the zero-tolerance policy.²⁸ It provides no requirement or method for their reunification. Days later, however, on June 26th, the U.S. District Court for the Southern District of California in *Ms. L., et al. v. U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement, et al.* issued a class-wide preliminary injunction halting the practice of family separation and requiring that separated families be reunified, absent certain extenuating circumstances.²⁹ The court defined the applicable class as all adult parents who enter the U.S. at or between official ports of entry, have been or are detained in immigration custody, and have a minor child who was

or will be separated from them and detained in DHS or ORR custody, absent a determination that the parent is unfit.³⁰

The court directed the government to

reunify all parents within the class unless there was a determination that the parent is unfit or the parent voluntarily declined to be reunited with the child.³¹ Parents with children under the age of 5 were required to be reunified by July 10th (Phase 1), and parents with children ages 5-17 had to be reunified by July 26th (Phase 2).³²

III. Overview of the Reunifications

As of September 27, an estimated 2,296 families had been reunited.³³ Some of the reunified families remained in family detention facilities after reunification, some were reunited in their countries of origin after a parent's deportation, and some were released after their reunification

Father and Daughter Reunite and Work to Recover and Integrate in Los Angeles

Cristina, * a 12-year old girl from El Salvador fled her country with her father to the United States in early 2018 to escape violence and seek safety and protection.. With the "zero-tolerance" policy in effect, she and her father experience the trauma of separation at the U.S./Mexico border upon apprehension by U.S. Border Patrol. Christina experienced an 88day period of separation from her father before she could establish initial contact with her father in detention. Cristina reported that she was told her father would be deported to El Salvador, and her father reports that he was encouraged to sign deportation paperwork, being told that his daughter would be adopted and there was no possibility of reunification. Ultimately, father and daughter were able to reunite and passed through one of USCCB/MRS' reception sites. Currently, they reside with family in the Los Angeles area and are receiving social service support through Catholic Charities of Los Angeles, Cristina's social worker reports that Cristina continues to experience trauma and separation anxiety, and that she was initially fearful of going to school as she did not want to be separated from her father again. In addition, Cristina's father has exhibited physical symptoms, including back and neck pain, believed to be a result of his own trauma experience. Catholic Charities is working to support the family in connecting with counseling services to address this issue. Currently, Cristina and her father are doing well with the support of Catholic Charities. Cristina is enrolled in school and doing well academically. The family has been connected with immigration legal services and are closely engaged with their attorney as they have expressed an eagerness to ensure compliance with all DHS and immigration reporting requirements. and allowed to reunite with family and friends in final destinations throughout the United States. As discussed below, USCCB/MRS and LIRS served a combined 1,112 families that were reunified and released in July 2018.

A. Reuniting "Phase 1" Children Under Age Five: July 2nd - July 12th

On July 2nd, HHS contacted USCCB/MRS about possible assistance for separated families with children under age five that the government planned to reunite by the court's July 10th deadline. HHS leadership at the Office of the Secretary and ORR expressed concern about the well-being of the families upon release and noted a desire to ensure that the families would have access to social services. These families were believed by HHS to number approximately 100 at the time; it was later determined that the Phase 1 class was comprised of 103 of the children separated and in ORR care, although not all of these children were immediately eligible for reunification.³⁴

On July 5th, DHS contacted both LIRS and USCCB/MRS to similarly discuss reunification operations for the Phase 1 families. While neither DHS nor HHS had a clearly developed plan for reunification at the time, both departments wanted to ensure that families had support upon release.

As a follow up to the conversations with both departments, LIRS and USCCB/MRS began to engage their extensive national networks of primarily Catholic Chari-

ties and Lutheran service providers to ensure capacity and readiness to assist the families.³⁵ Planning for post-release services was not without its challenges. During subsequent conversations between LIRS and USCCB/MRS and both HHS and DHS, it appeared that there were some inter-agency miscommunications on how to oversee the first steps of family reunification for the Phase 1 families. Namely, it seemed unclear which agency was in charge of deciding how and where the family reunifications would occur. Further, as reported by the DHS Office of Inspector General, "lack of integration between CBP's, ICE's, and HHS's respective information technology systems hindered efforts to identify, track, and reunify parents and children."³⁶

Finally, on July 9th, DHS conducted a call with LIRS and USCCB/MRS during which it informed the two service providers that the reunification of the separated families from Phase 1 would take place at 15 sites³⁷ across the country (see map below). DHS explained that the children were already located at these 15 sites and that DHS's Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) would transport the separated parents who were eligible for release to these sites for the reunifications beginning the morning of July 10th. The departments also informed LIRS and USCCB/MRS that there were 55-60 children who would be reunified and released with their parents and would be needing assistance.³⁸

LIRS and USCCB/MRS, through their on-the-ground

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partners, stood ready to provide direct services to these reunified families. USCCB/MRS set up 13 Catholic Charities reception sites, and LIRS set up two reception sites. Initial services available included immediate shelter, a hot meal, change of clothes, shower, and assistance with making travel arrangements from the designated family reunification site to the reunified family's intended destination in the United States.³⁹ The reunifications and reception operations began early in the morning of July 10th and were ongoing into July 12th. After being reunified, the families were provided with a list of the 15 sites where they could go to receive post-release services. Of the 57 children initially reunified, USCCB/ MRS, Catholic Charities, Bethany Christian Services, ⁴⁰ and LIRS served a combined 18 families. USCCB/ MRS served nine families at two of its 13 available reception sites, and LIRS served nine families between its two reception sites. USCCB/MRS and LIRS surmise that some of the families reunified did not seek services due to confusion or uncertainty over what services were being offered and whether the provision of services required additional engagement with law enforcement. It is also unclear as to the extent to which DHS verbally communicated this information about services to those parents who were illiterate or did not read English or Spanish.

In addition to the relatively low number of families seeking services during this phase, the reception centers faced the consistent challenge of having families dropped off at the centers very late in the evening. These late drop offs made it difficult for the centers to secure sufficient staff capacity; they also were very taxing on children, who had to then stay up to hours well past their bed times.

Despite the challenges, both LIRS and USCCB/MRS welcomed the opportunity to provide for the immediate service needs for the 18 families. LIRS and USCCB/MRS have also committed to providing social services and case management to these families for up to three months in their final destination cities.

B. Reuniting "Phase 2" Children Ages 5-17: July 12th - July 30th

On July 12th, DHS called USCCB/MRS and LIRS to discuss the possibility of their charitable engagement and assistance with the reunification of Phase 2 families (those with children ages 5-17). The estimated number of children for this phase was originally 2,551, although it was anticipated that not all would be immediately eligible for reunification.⁴¹

For Phase 2, ICE had pre-determined the mechanism for reunification and release prior to speaking to LIRS and USCCB/MRS; it conveyed those plans on the July 12th call. For those families deemed eligible for reunification, the government decided that the children in ORR custody would be transported by ORR to certain adult immigrant detention facilities operated by ICE. These facilities, located primarily along the U.S./Mexico border in Texas and Arizona, were the sites at which identified separated parents who were eligible for reunification and release were detained. Once ORR transported a separated child to the immigrant detention facility where his or her parent was detained, ORR officials would conduct an interview with the parent; pending a positive interview result, the child would then be reunited with his or her parent at the detention facility and formally released from ICE custody. From that point of reunification, the family would board a bus operated by MVM. Inc., a transport company and contractor with ICE, that would take them to one of five reception centers operated by Lutheran and Catholic partners in nearby communities.

Table 1 shows the detention centers from which families were reunited at and released, as well as the corresponding Catholic and Lutheran service providers assisting the families.

Beginning the evening of July 13th, MVM Inc. dropped off the first eight reunified and released families to Catholic Charities of the Rio Grande Valley in McAllen, Texas. Over the next 17 days, Catholic Charities and Lutheran reception sites coordinated with DHS leadership in

Reflections on Phase 1 from Catholic Charities of the Archdiocese of San Antonio

On the morning of July 10th, Catholic Charities of the Archdiocese of San Antonio received notification that several children under age five would be reunified and released in the area that day. Catholic Charities secured food, clothing, and housing for the families. It was not until 11:00 PM, however, that the reception center received the official count – five families would be released and in need of services. Even then, the families did not arrive to the hotel until approximately 2:00 AM the next day. They were personally received by Catholic Charities - San Antonio's CEO and several staff members. After the families had an opportunity to rest, Catholic Charities staff helped them to contact family members and secure travel arrangements to their final destinations.

Washington, DC, USCCB/MRS and LIRS, as well as local ICE field offices to serve 1,112 reunited and released families. As with Phase 1 families, USCCB/MRS and LIRS partners provided families with immediate shelter, a hot meal, change of clothes, shower, and assistance with making travel arrangements to the reunified family's intended destination in the United States.

The Phase 2 process was not without its challenges. For example, one obstacle faced by some of the families related to their travel documents. In certain airports, the Transportation Security Administration (TSA) officers refused to initially accept the families' identification documents provided by ICE. Ultimately, some families missed flights due the confusion surrounding these papers.

Another challenge faced by all of the reception sites was that many of the newly reunified and released families arrived at the reception centers with their immigration paperwork, such as the Notice to Appear (NTA) and the ICE check-in information, completed with the wrong address. Rather than listing their final destination, the documents would list the address of the particular reception site or the immigrant detention facility itself. Upon elevating this issue, ICE attempted to change the addresses of those families who were to be reunified and released prospectively. Some of the reception centers, however, received NTAs for families that had already moved on to their final destinations in other cities. Efforts are ongoing to ensure that when such NTAs are incorrectly sent to the initial reception site, the information is subsequently sent on to the families' service providers in their final destination cities.

While the experience was a chaotic and fast moving, it was also a positive one. Local groups assisted the Catholic and Lutheran reception sites, and LIRS and USCCB/MRS worked in close coordination, to the extent possible, with the DHS Washington office and the local ICE field offices in El Paso, San Antonio, and Phoenix.

Lupe's Experience

Lupe* and her daughter, recently reunified and served by a USCCB/MRS affiliate during Phase 2, had an exceptionally difficult travel experience due to questions with their DHS-supplied documentation. Lupe was stopped by TSA agents in the Columbus, Ohio airport and told that she could not board her connecting flight due to questions about her identification documents. After having to spend the night in the airport due to the misunderstanding, Catholic Social Services Columbus offered to step in and care for the family until alternative arrangements could be made. Lupe ended up calling family members in her final destination city and asking them to make the long journey to Columbus to come get her and her daughter. Lupe and her family were accompanied by Catholic Charities staff while they waited for their family to arrive (*Name changed to protect confidentiality. Story provided by Rachel Lustig, Executive Director of Catholic Charities, Columbus, Ohio.)

IV. LIRS and USCCB/MRS Family Reunification Services and the Catholic and Lutheran Direct Service Providers

LIRS and USCCB/MRS are proud to assist the federal government in aiding the reunified and released families. Both organizations have expertise in this area, developed through years of service and partnership with the federal government in family reunification and child protection services for unaccompanied children. Additionally, the national character of the Catholic and Lutheran networks allow for service provision in most areas of the United States.

A. USCCB's & LIRS's Long Tradition of Serving Immigrant Children and Families

USCCB/MRS's Programs. USCCB/MRS has operated programs, working in a public/private partnership with the U.S. government, to help protect unaccompanied children from all over the world for nearly 40 years. Since 1994, USCCB/MRS has operated the "Safe Passages" program. This program serves undocumented immigrant children apprehended by DHS and placed in the custody and care of ORR. Through cooperative agreements with ORR, and in collaboration with community-based social service agencies, the Safe Passages program provides community-based residential care (foster care and smallscale shelter placements) to unaccompanied children in ORR custody, as well as family reunification services (pre-release placement screening and post-release social services for families). In fiscal year 2017, the USCCB/ MRS Safe Passages program served 1,294 youth who arrived as unaccompanied children—1,042 through the family reunification program and 252 through the residential care programs.

Additionally, the Catholic Church in the United States has long worked to support immigrant families who have experienced immigrant detention, providing legal assistance and pastoral accompaniment and visitation within immigrant detention facilities, as well as social assistance upon release.

LIRS's Programs. For more than 40 years, LIRS has provided child welfare services to refugee and migrant children who are unaccompanied or separated from family. These children have typically fled war, civil conflict, persecution, trafficking, extreme poverty, or maltreatment. Some children come to join family, while others know only that they must leave their homes in order to survive.

LIRS began providing family reunification services including post release services in the 1990's as a protective measure for children at risk of trafficking, extortion and abuse by smugglers connected to organized criminal groups. Today, LIRS's family reunification services provide screening, assessment, and support services to ensure safe and healthy reunifications for migrant children with relatives in the U.S. LIRS's local partners screen and assist parents and relatives prior to reunification, and

then provide follow-up services and monitoring after reunification (helping with school enrollment, legal service referrals, medical and mental health referrals, etc.). LIRS and its local partners help to ensure children's safety, support family unity, and develop connections that promote community integration and family well-being. Through risk assessment, action-planning with families around areas of need and concern, systems advocacy with community providers, and culturally-appropriate services and community referrals, post-release services strengthen families and protect children.

> B. Phase II Catholic and Lutheran Reception Sites.

Catholic Charities of the Rio Grande Valley (CCRGV). CCRGV is the charitable branch of the Diocese of Brownsville, with projects that provide assistance to the most vulnerable in the community. The mission of CCRGV is to help improve the quality of life for those in its community by providing help and creating hope to individuals and families experiencing an emergency crisis in their lives. In the summer of 2014, CCRGV responded

to the influx of immigrants arriving at the U.S./Mexico border by establishing the Humanitarian Respite Center at which immigrant families are provided with food, clothing, medicine, a phone call, and any other basic need they might have. Through the Humanitarian Respite Center, CCRGV has significant experience working with newly arrived

families. Since opening the Humanitarian Respite Center, it has welcomed and served more than 100,000 individuals. During Phase 2, CCRGV partnered with the USCCB/MRS to serve the largest number of families, those who were reunited in the Port Isabel Detention Center. Led by Executive Director Sister Norma Pimentel, the recently reunited and released families were warmly welcomed.

Annunciation House. Annunciation House is an organization that, for the past 40 years, has been providing hospitality to arriving refugees and immigrants on the U.S./ Mexico border in El Paso, Texas. The work of hospitality at Annunciation House includes shelter, meals, legal assessment and orientation, reunification with families in the U.S., and border advocacy. In addition to its three houses of hospitality, Annunciation House partners with local churches to increase capacity whenever the flow of arriving refugees requires it. Annunciation House is an adamant advocate for the non-detention of refugees and asylum seekers. For the past several years, Annunciation House has been arranging hospitality for over 20,000 asylum seekers annually, most of whom come from the

Northern Triangle and Mexico. Rooted in the Catholic social justice Gospel tradition, Annunciation House is an independent organization staffed primarily with volunteers who live and work in the houses of hospitality. Led by Founder/Director Ruben Garcia, Annunciation House partnered with USCCB/MRS during Phase 2 to serve families who were reunified and released from the El Paso Processing Center, Otero County Processing Center, and the West Texas Detention Center.

Catholic Charities of the Archdiocese of San Antonio. Catholic Charities of the Archdiocese of San Antonio's mission is to provide for the needs of the San Antonio community through selfless service under the sign of love. Helping people in need since 1941, Catholic Charities of the Archdiocese of San Antonio is the largest Catholic social services agency in San Antonio, serving over 297,000 people last year from birth to natural death. The agency preserves families and promotes self-sufficien-

cy through 45 programs and five agencies that include: Family and Children's Services, Family Self-Sufficiency Programs, Refugee Resettlement, Caritas Legal Services,

Senior Services, and Housing Services. Led by Executive Director J. Antonio Fernandez, Catholic Charities San Antonio partnered with USCCB/MRS during Phase 1 and Phase 2 to serve families who were reunified and released in the San Antonio area and from the South Texas Detention Center.

"Catholic Charities of the Rio Grande Valley had the privilege of serving 600 families under the family reunification program. On the first night we welcomed families, I recall walking a mother and daughter to their room. The little girl, who was about seven years old, turned around and told me: 'Hoy no voy a llorar' (Tonight I am not going to cry). 'Why, I asked. She said: 'I have been crying every night for the past month, but tonight I sleep with mom.'"

Lutheran Social Ser-

vices of the Southwest (LSS-SW). Since 1970, LSS-SW has responded to Arizona's changing needs by offering quality services and resources that contribute to a stronger and healthier Arizona for all people. Today, a staff of almost 500 work in 10 Arizona counties and serve 1 out of 90 Arizonans. LSS-SW partners with other nonprofit organizations (such as Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Service) and government agencies to ensure that their cumulative efforts are maximized. Led by Director for Refugee and Immigration Services Dragan Subotic, LSS-SW operated a response based out of its Phoenix office to welcome reunified and released families from the Eloy Detention Facility during Phase 2.

Lutheran Family Services Rocky Mountains, Albuquerque. Founded in 1948 to provide adoptive placement for babies, over time Lutheran Family Services Rocky Mountains has grown to provide programs to meet new community needs, including: birth parent counseling, foster care, aging services, international adoptions, services to refugees, aid following disasters, and parent education. With offices located in Denver, Colorado Springs, Fort

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Collins, Cote ley/Evans and Fort Morgan, CO, and Albuquerque, NM, as well as services provided in Wyoming, Montana and Western Nebraska, Lutheran Family Services Rocky Mountains responds to critical social and emotional needs of approximately 30,000 people annually. Led by Vice President of Refugee & Community Services, James Horan, Lutheran Family Services Rocky Mountains organized a team out of its Albuquerque office to serve reunified and released families from the El Paso Processing Center, Otero County Processing Center, and the West Texas Detention Center during Phase 2.

V. Data on the Reunited and Released Families Served by LIRS and USCCB/MRS


During the Phase 1 and 2 reunifications, USCCB/MRS and LIRS requested that the local Catholic Charities and Lutheran partners conduct intakes of every family served by the reception sites. These intakes, or "needs assessments," were comprised of a series of questions that included the family's initial biographical information, final destination in the U.S., social service and medical needs, and, where possible, immigration status information. LIRS and USCCB/MRS collected this information for two reasons: (1) to ensure that the two organizations could refer the families served at the Catholic and Lutheran reception centers for social services and limited legal assistance in their final destination cities, if the families so desired; and (2) to help gather data and get a better snapshot of the reunified and released families.

Catholic and Lutheran reception sites worked quickly to efficiently manage the high volume of families arriving daily in need of immediate services and support. Given the urgent needs of the families, staff and volunteers collected what information they could without further burdening the families. Below are some of the key findings and statistics from the data that USCCB/MRS and LIRS collected.

A. Countries of Origin


The vast majority of separated and reunified families that USCCB/MRS and LIRS served in Phases 1 and 2 were from the Northern Triangle. Of the Phase 1 families served by USCCB/MRS and LIRS, the majority (56%) were from Honduras. The next largest population served was from Guatemala (33%), and the smallest population was from El Salvador (11%).

In comparison, the majority of Phase 2 families served by USCCB/MRS and LIRS were from Guatemala (51%). The next largest Phase 2 populations were from Honduras (34%) and El Salvador (8%). Phase 2 was also comprised of a small number of families from countries in North and South America, Asia, and Europe.


Figure 2.2 – Countries of Origin for Reunified and Released Families Served by USCCB/MRS and LIRS During Phase 2




B. Gender of Parents and Children

USCCB/MRS and LIRS data shows that the majority of Phase 1 reunified and released families were composed of male parents and male children. Of these parents, 61% were male and 39% were female. Similarly, of Phase 1 children, 67% were male and 33% were female.


Figures 3.1 & 3.2 – Gender of Parents and Children Served by USCCB/MRS and LIRS Reception Centers During Phase 1






Data on the gender of Phase 2 parents and children were similar to the findings on gender in Phase 1. The data collected indicates that, during Phase 2, a majority of the families were composed of male parents and male children. Of these parents, approximately 52% were male, while 35% were female. A small percentage (13%) did not report their gender. Of the Phase 2 children separated from their parents at the border, approximately 52% were male and 41% were female. Gender was not reported for 7% of Phase 2 children. 43

Figures 3.3 & 3.4 - Gender of Parents and Children Served by USCCB/MRS and LIRS Reception Centers During Phase 2






C. Where Families Were Processed

As discussed in Section III, USCCB/MRS and LIRS worked with several different reception centers during Phases 1 and 2. While all 15 sites stood ready to assist, not all of the sites received families during Phase 1. Amongst the Phase 1 families served, 39% were processed through the reception center in New York City; 33% were processed in San Antonio, Texas; 16% were processed in Grand Rapids, Michigan; and 11% were processed in Baltimore, Maryland.

The greatest number of Phase 2 families were received and processed through CCRGV. CCRGV received 50 % of Phase 2 families. Annunciation House and LSS-SW also received large numbers of families, serving 24% and 16% of Phase 2 families, respectively. Catholic Charities of the Archdiocese of San Antonio received 7% of Phase 2 families, and Lutheran Family Services Rocky Mountains, Albuquerque received 3% of Phase 2 families.





Figure 4.2 – Number of Families Processed and Served by each Reception Center During Phase 2

D. Final Destinations in the U.S.

Lastly, the data compiled from USCCB/MRS and LIRS for both Phase 1 and Phase 2 families indicate that the top five final destination states were: Florida (14%), Texas (13%), California (12%), New Jersey (5%), and New York and Virginia (4.41%).

VI. Ongoing Needs and Addressing Trauma

As a result of their previous separation, the reunified families served by USCCB/MRS (in collaboration with Catholic Charities) and LIRS demonstrate an acute need for ongoing support services. Little is yet known about the extent of the traumatic impact of the recent forcible separation of children from their parents at the border. Initial reports from local service provides indicate that families are experiencing symptoms of trauma, including separation anxiety.

Existing literature provides insights on assessing and understanding the unique experiences and needs of separated children and their families. There has been extensive study exploring the short- and long-term effects of trauma and toxic stress on children, including analyses of the effects of Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs) over time. At Researchers have found that the impact of trauma can be compounded and that children can experience the effects of trauma long-term, across various domains in their lives (education, physical health, mental health, relationally, etc.). There have been additional explorations of the impact of trauma on recently arrived unaccompa-

nied immigrant children, and recent studies indicate that detention by DHS of immigrant children is a potential threat to their health and well-being. 46

Current tools used to identify and categorize traumatic experiences in children are

often inadequate in capturing immigrant children's experiences of trauma,⁴⁷ and this will be no different in assessing the traumatic experiences of separated children. As such, when assessing the traumatic events that can negatively affect migrant children's well-being, all four stages in the arc of migration (pre-migration, migration, detention, and post-release) must be considered.⁴⁸ In the case of separated children, their experiences during the period of time after apprehension and before release might deviate markedly from their recent migrant peers. Further, aside from the voluntary programming being provided by USCCB/MRS in partnership with Catholic Charities and LIRS, there are no post-release services available to the most vulnerable and highest-needs separated and reunified families.⁴⁹

A further key distinction may be made between separated children and unaccompanied immigrant children - while these separated children were treated as unaccompanied after their apprehension and separation, they did not arrive to the United States unaccompanied. These children arrived to the U.S. believing that they would continue to remain under their parents' care, which made their forced separation even more jarring. Literature has found that

relational trauma negatively affects brain development and the mental health of infants, 50 which is even more relevant given that 103 of the separated children were under the age of five. Young children are at heightened risk of experiencing negative outcomes when separated from an incarcerated caregiver or when separated from caregivers in the context of foster care. 52 Moreover, researchers contend that immigrant children who have experienced prolonged separation from their parents experience layered post-reunification challenges and that unaccompanied immigrant children experience a myriad post-reunification integration challenges. 54

Consequently, services and support are critical to ensure these children's and families well-being after reunification and release. USCCB/MRS and LIRS recognize the trauma caused by the unexpected rupture of attachment and will take this into account in addressing challenges that arise when families are back together. Given the trauma that children have experienced, extended post-release services for children provided by the government and implemented by child welfare experts would help mitigate some of the difficulties that families are encountering in integrating into their final destination cities and also complying with

their immigration proceedings. For example, providing post-release services in these months subsequent to family reunification can ensure that families are informed of their immigration obligations and ensure that no family breakdowns occur.

"While Catholic Charities is very much saddened by this whole situation of breaking up families, we are willing to do whatever we can to heal the families that have been broken." VII. Looking Forward: Alternatives to Detention and Asylum-Seeking Families

As the reunification efforts for separated families in the U.S. winds down, LIRS and USCCB/MRS, as well as other legal- and social-service providers, pivot to identifying future needs of formerly separated families and presenting programmatic and policy-based solutions that ensure these and future arriving families' humane treatment, as well as their compliance with our immigration laws. One such solution is alternatives to detention (ATDs). A spectrum of ATDs have long existed as an option the government can use in place of mass detention.55 Such alternatives are often preferable as they avoid inflicting unnecessary and long-lasting trauma on children and families.⁵⁶ Additionally, detaining families that do not present a flight or safety risk is an unnecessary use of limited DHS resources. 57 As demonstrated by the data in Section V above, many of the reunited families have intended destinations in U.S., with family and friends at those destinations. These strong community ties, as well as credible asylum claims, 58 create strong incentives for compliance with immigrant requirements and make many

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Serving Separated and Reunited Families

Jose* was one of the thousands of parents who had to watch their children being taken from them as a result of the zero-tolerance policy. He stated it was the worst experience of his life and described the heart break of seeing his son crying and scared. After the family's eventual reunification, Jose remained worried that his son would be taken from him again. In addition, he faced the challenges of adjusting to life in a new community, buying basic necessities, finding an attorney, and enrolling his son in school. Thankfully, LIRS and its affiliates were able to assist Jose and his son with these concerns. LIRS provided provide the family with school supplies, including a backpack, folders, and other materials. They also gathered donated clothing for the family, which was essential since Jose's son only owned one change of clothes. The family was also thankful to receive referrals to community resources and a legal services provider, as well as assistance with the school enrollment process. The staff member providing these post-release services noted of the experience: "I saw the smiles and happiness in their eyes; it just made the visits so worthwhile." arriving families viable candidates for alternatives to detention.

Both LIRS and USCCB/MRS have experience with ATD programming. Religious groups have long been involved in hospitality, accompaniment, and hosting immigrants.⁵⁹ Most recently, from 2013-2015, both USCCB/MRS and LIRS operated ATD pilot programs in partnership with ICE. The USCCB/MRS pilot program operated in Baton Rouge, Louisiana and Boston, Massachusetts, while LIRS's program operated in Chicago, Illinois and San Antonio, Texas. Building from this work, in FY 2016 and FY 2017, ICE used several ATD programs that went beyond traditional forms of release (such as parole, bond, or order of supervision), to include case management in the Family Case Management pilot program. 60 This program, which ran from late 2015 until it was canceled in June 2017, focused solely on families and operated in five cities. The Family Case Management pilot program had compliance rates of 99% with immigration court hearings and cost only \$36 per day/ per family.⁶¹ Approximately 994 families were served in the program. Catholic Charities and LIRS community service providers participated in the Family Case Management Program (FCMP) within the five cities.

Critics of alternatives to detention have suggested that the FCMP was not effective in terms of removal rates and long-term costs. ⁶² These arguments, however, are unsupported by comprehensive data due to the government's decision to end the FCMP in June 2017, only approximately a year and half into what was supposed to be a five-year program cycle. It is no surprise that removal rates were low during the period of operation given that most of the enrolled families' cases were still ongoing at the time of program closure. A full data set is required in order to fully understand the long-term effectiveness and cost of the FCMP.

From USCCB/MRS's and LIRS's varied experiences

with ATDs, as well as with family reunification, the organizations believe that alternatives to detention for arriving asylum-seeking families would be both an effective and humane option. Consequently, LIRS and USCCB/MRS have made the commitment to provide to each of the reunified families they have served, in their final destination city, with up to three months of post-release services, which includes social services, a legal orientation, and a referral to a qualified and trustworthy low or pro bono legal services provider. These services will also help ensure families are educated on DHS and immigration court requirements. They further will provide families with referrals for their immediate needs, as well as support to help ensure they will be self-sufficient after the service period ends. USCCB/MRS and LIRS are driven to provide such services by the belief that they will help support the separated families, reduce their ongoing trauma, and help ensure positive compliance outcomes.

VIII. Recommendations

Generally, absent child protection concerns, the U.S. government should not be separating children from their parents.

- A. To Administrative Departments of the Federal Government (DHS and HHS) on Oversight, Data Collection, Information Sharing, and Provider Training
- 1. Delineate Administrative Responsibility on Family Unity and Separations. An official "Family Unity" Ombudsman should be appointed to lead coordination of the remaining family reunifications and monitor future incidences of family separation. This position should be within DHS as it is the agency with the greatest visibility at the point of separation.

2.

- Create a Standing Interagency Task Force. The Family Unity Ombudsman should lead the creation of an interagency task force on family separation that meets quarterly with NGO and government stakeholders. The task force should be required to provide DHS-OIG, DHS-CRCL, and Congress with annual reports on family separation. It should also be responsible for monitoring monthly reports by DHS and ORR on family separation rates and cases. In the event that that the monthly number of family separation cases increases by more than 20% from the previous month, the Family Unity Ombudsman should be required to issue a report to Congress, as well as a corresponding public press release, within 30 days. This report and press release should discuss the increase in separated families, suspected causes, and any remedial actions being taken. Finally, the task force should issue a one-time report to Congress on: (i) the number of separated children released from ORR's care during FY 2017 and FY 2018 prior to the court's preliminary injunction during; (ii) the percent of such children released to category one, two, and three sponsors, respectively; and (iii) the percent of these children that are receiving government-funded post-release services.
- 3. Increase Data Collection. DHS should ensure that it documents family relationships for all individuals traveling with family, including extended family. In addition, DHS should issue guidance on family tracing for all pertinent staff.

Similarly, both ICE and ORR should have ready access to CBP's data on family separations to track parents and children referred to their care that may have been newly subject to family separation. ORR should also add another data requirement in the ORR UAC ("unaccompanied alien child") portal. Data on family separation needs to be updated every week and be accessible to ORR UAC care providers. ORR's tracking of separated children in its care should be electronically available and searchable by facility.

4. Document Justification for Separation.

Every incidence of family separation should be clearly recorded and the explanation for separation, including specific criminal charges (whether the crime was immigration-related, child abuse-related, etc.) should also be documented. This information needs to be readily shared and accessible to all component agencies of DHS, as well as ORR. Additionally, DHS policy guidance should denote that even if family relationships are questioned, the alleged relationship must be documented.

5. Streamline Information Sharing. There should be a secure database that family members and their

attorneys and advocates can access that has information (location of members, reason for separation, etc.) about individual cases of family separation. This should be information that DHS is collecting that has been scrubbed of any DHS-proprietary/national security information.

6. Improve Training for Care Providers. ORR

should create training material for UC providers that addresses family separation and train them on how to review paperwork, and record and report incidences of family separation to ORR and to the Family Unity Ombudsman.

- B. To Administrative Departments of the Federal Government (DHS and HHS) on Any Future Operations Relating to Family Reunification
- 1. Release Reunited Families During Business Hours. Families should not be delivered to service providers or reception centers outside of agreed upon business hours. Reuniting families during the night can increase their stress and add to children's confusion; it is also very difficult for providers to adequately staff facilities during off-hours. Future operations should make an effort to drop children off during normal but extended business hours, with 6am and 8pm being the outliers with which families can safely and humanely be transported.
- 2. Ensure Travel Document Guidance and Notification. DHS needs to pay special attention to the issuance of travel documentation, and it should educate all CBP and TSA officers about individuals who may be traveling during reunification operations. If there are questions with a family member's travel documents, DHS officials should ensure that the family member has an opportunity to explain his or her special circumstances and also to call any family/friends in his or her final destination, as well as contact any NGO advocates and legal counsel who may be able to assist them.
- 3. Ensure Immigration Paperwork Reflects Families' Final Destination Cities. As a general practice, DHS should issue NTAs and other discharging immigration paperwork with a family's final destination address, rather than the address of the reception site or the site of the immigration detention facility court. Failing to put the correct address on immigration paperwork makes it difficult for families to attempt to comply with their proceedings. In the family detention context, ICE already lists the final destination address of the individual that they release. We urge ICE ensure the appropriate address is listed for all arriving families.

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- B. To Administrative Departments of the Federal Government (DHS and DOJ) on Access to Justice, Immigration Compliance, and Legal Education
- Improve and Expand Discharge Guidance. DHS should augment its existing detention and processing center discharge guidance to include: (i) a clear explanation of how ICE and the Executive Office for Immigration Review (EOIR) are two separate agencies with distinct sets of procedures for address updates, communications, and hearings; (ii) instructions on how to update an address with ICE and with EOIR, including a blank standardized form for each; (iii) the 800 number for the EOIR immigration court hotline and guidance on how to use the hotline to obtain information about an individual's case; and (iv) instructions on requirements and responsibilities of being released on bond or parole, on an alternatives to detention program, or on one's own recognizance. This information should also be provided verbally for individuals who are illiterate, in a language they can fully understand.
- dure. DOJ should streamline the process for noncitizens to change their address and move to change their venue for immigration hearings. EOIR should collaborate with DHS to formulate a single unified change of address form (available in Spanish and other languages) that, when submitted physically or electronically to EOIR or any ICE office or contractor, would automatically trigger an update of a noncitizens address with all relevant immigration agencies and EOIR. This unified form would streamline the process, reducing the burden for not only the noncitizen but also for DHS and EOIR.
 - D. To Administrative Departments of the Federal Government (DHS, DOS, and DOJ) on Future Policy-Making for Asylum-Seeking Families Arriving to the U.S. Border
- 1. Reinstate the Family Case Management Program. DHS should reinstate the Family Case Management Program for the duration of the five years initially contemplated by the pilot program. This would allow a more accurate analysis of the program's cost effectiveness, immigration compliance rates, and ability to effectuate removals.
- 2. Expand Programs Addressing Root Causes of Migration. The Department of State should work to expand and further implement gang and internal displacement prevention programming that looks to address the increased targeting not just of youth but of entire family units by gangs.

- 3. Rescind the Zero-Tolerance Policy. DOJ should formally rescind its April 6th memorandum on "Zero-Tolerance for Offenses Under 8 U.S.C. § 1325(a)." This is not to suggest that prosecutions could not be brought for such offenses, but it would restore federal prosecutors' ability to utilize their discretion and balance various factors when determining whether it is appropriate to bring such a case forward. At a minimum, exceptions should be explicitly made to the memorandum to address families seeking protection.
 - E. To Congress on Existing Protections, Oversight, Post-Release Services, and ATDs
- 1. Invest Robustly in All Forms of Alternatives to Detention. Congress should fund more robustly alternatives to detention in the DHS budget. Congress should also ensure that DHS is working to undertake and pilot diverse alternatives to detention programming in the form of the Intensive Supervision Appearance Program (ISAP) as well as alternative to detention programming that utilize case management and, in some cases, NGO participation.
- 2. Require Reporting on ATD Outcomes and Costs. Congress should instruct DHS to publicly report on the outcomes of ATD programs and ensure that a continual pilot period is undertaken to secure transparent and viable data on the effectiveness of such programs. It should also mandate reporting by DHS about the costs of family detention compared to alternatives to detention, including the Family Case Management Program.
- 3. Maintain Existing Protections for Unaccompanied and Accompanied Children. Given the long-lasting physical and mental consequences of detention on children, proposals seeking to alter existing safeguards relating to such detention (such as those in the Flores Settlement Agreement of 1997) must be firmly rejected. Immigrant children should be viewed as children first and foremost.
- 4. Ensure Oversight of Continued Reunification Efforts and Detention. Congress should utilize its oversight power to ensure the remaining eligible families are promptly reunified and that DHS is able to articulate clear and individualized justification for its decision to place certain reunified families in detention.
- 5. Support Robust Funding for Post-Release Services. Congress should also ensure, through the appropriations process, that separated children released to non-parent sponsors receive post-release services from ORR to address their trauma. It

should also ensure that federal funding is dedicated to providing additional support services to the re-unified and released families.

- Outcomes for Asylum-Seeking Families. Congress should further invest in augmenting the capacity of the immigration courts by hiring more judges and providing additional funding for new courtroom facilities. Additionally, Congress should ensure robust funding for legal information programs such as the Legal Orientation Program and the Information Help Desk, which do not fund immigration counsel but help provide information to detained and released immigrants to ensure that they know more about compliance requirements.
 - F. To the Northern Triangle Governments on Collaboration and Communication
- 1. Increase Communication with Direct Service Providers and Local Consular Offices. The Northern Triangle country governments should increase their communication with UC service providers (including residential care, social service, and legal service providers) and local consular offices to ensure more direct communication on separation cases. Such engagement can lead to easier identification of separated children, technical assistance in family tracing and family reunification, and a more expeditious way for the foreign governments' respective child welfare agencies to become involved in individual cases.
- 2. Map Existing Consular and Legal Services. The Northern Triangle governments should create a tool to map the existing consular and legal services that each respective government operates in the United States. This tool should then be shared that with immigration social and legal service providers to facilitate coordination with the consulates.

G. To NGOs on Coordination of Service

Improve Coordination to Serve Separated Families. Numerous NGOs have generously expressed interest in and many have initiated services for reunited families in various locations across the U.S. Improved coordination and national communication among legal and social services providers would facilitate NGOs ability to address families' ongoing needs and fill geographic gaps to ensure all families are covered. NGOs should coordinate to develop a centralized location to share pro bono resources available to reunited families - legal, medical, mental health, trauma, etc. This coordination is

to ensure NGO resources are most effectively being utilized and to avoid overwhelming the released families.

IX. Conclusion

USCCB/MRS and LIRS urge the Administration to ensure that family unity remains a primary concern during all future immigration enforcement operations at the U.S./Mexico border. USCCB/MRS and LIRS further encourage the Administration to commit to immigration policies that are humane and uphold each individual's human dignity. Such policies should also ensure compliance with immigration requirements and be fair to the U.S. taxpayer. As always, USCCB/MRS and LIRS stand ready to work with the Administration to help develop policies that meet these goals.

Keep immigrant families together, bishops plead at border

McAllen, Texas, Jul 2, 2018 / 06:27 pm (CNA).- Immigration reform requires seeing the faces of immigrants, and hearing their stories, according to five U.S. bishops who have completed a two-day pastoral visit to the U.S. border with Mexico in Texas' Rio Grande Valley.

The bishops spoke at a press conference Monday night, reflecting on their experiences with immigrants, among them children separated from their parents and held in federal custody, during their pastoral visit.

"Our faith is not just a system of concepts," said Cardinal Daniel DiNardo of Houston, president of the US bishops' conference, during the July 2 press conference. "Our faith is in a person, the person of Jesus Christ."


DiNardo told the story of a Honduran man he met during a visit to a Catholic-run respite center for immigrants. The man told the cardinal that he entered the United States illegally in order to protect his family, after receiving death threats from gangs in their home country.



"He had his son with him," the cardinal said. "Did he cross the border? He did. That part is illegal. But I am not looking at an abstraction when I look at him. I am looking at a person. And that person is shaken."

"These are all human beings here," DiNardo added.

Bishop Joseph Bambera of Scranton, Pa., affirmed the cardinal's sentiment. Bambera said that talking with immigrant families reshapes perceptions about illegal immigration, and challenges political preconceptions.



"When you have the opportunity to sit down with a family...labels melt away," Bambera said.

"When you talk to somebody whose deepest desire is not to exploit a country and take everything they can, but to provide for their children, and keep their children safe, then labels melt away."

Archbishop Jose Gomez of Los Angeles, vice-president of the bishops conference, told reporters that immigration is "not just a matter of politics. It's a matter of humanity."

The immigration discussion, he said, "is really talking about men and women, parents and children, brothers and sisters."

"It's a global reality...we all are participating in the same humanity and we are together trying to find the solution to this situation," Gomez added.



The bishops called Catholics to advocate for immigration reform. DiNardo said that call should begin with prayer.

"I certainly think that praying is more sufficient than people even imagine," DiNardo said.

"Prayer is important. But in addition to prayer, we have to petition Congress. We have to talk to them, we have to make it really intense. Not nasty, but really intense. My hope would be to write, to call, to include Congress, in calling for an integral immigration reform."

Gomez said that families should be prioritized in legislative efforts.

"If we want something from the administration and from congress, it's family unity. Because that's essential for the human person. And we are willing to do whatever we can to help make it happen."

"The way they came here-we can address the legal requirements of our country to make the decisions that are correct- but with family unity," he added.

DiNardo was grateful that policies seperating children from their parents at the border have come to an end, but said the bishops "have some concerns about family detention."

The cardinal called for the use of case-management programs as a "cost-effective alternative" to family detention, and said that Catholic-run charities would be glad to assist the government in case-management initiatives.

Undocumented immigrants waiting legal proceedings "need to be accounted for." he said.

Through case-management programs, families, many of whom want to find employment quickly, are "able to live with a little more. I call it hope. When you go through this kind of thing, whether you're a family or an unaccompanied minor, there's an element of real trauma that happens to you, and you can see it on their faces."

DiNardo said that he doesn't believe U.S. officials intend to traumatize immigrants, but said that "case management gives them some chance to breathe, and some hope."

The delegation of bishops visiting the border, which also included Bishop Robert Brennan, auxiliary bishop of Rockville Centre, toured two federal facilities, along with



the Humanitarian Respite Center in McAllen, Texas, run by Catholic Charities of the Rio Grande Valley.

DiNardo said the visit was a prayerful and pastoral visit.

"We have had a full 2 days and they have been a very beautiful 2 days," DiNardo said.

"Some parts painful, but very beautiful."

DiNardo praised the hospitality of federal officials and local Church leaders, especially singling out Bishop Daniel Flores of Brownsville, a member of the delegation and its local host, along with Sister Norma Pimentel, executive director of Catholic Charities of the Rio Grande Valley.

"There are lots of challenges here, there are lots of things we found, but we have found is that we have received incredible cooperation at every site we visited," DiNardo said.

"All of the people who are involved in this were incredibly helpful. I want to make sure everyone knows that," he added.

DiNardo said that the bishops are especially calling for the reunification of families separated at the border.

"The children who were separated from their parents need to be reunited- that's already begun, but it's not finished yet. It must be done, and it's urgent," he said.

Gomez reiterated that point.

"I think it is so important that these children be reunited with their parents," he said. "I think it is important [for the Church] to really help in that process of reunification. To make sure that we are there and to participate as much as possible in that process."

For his part, Flores emphasized the gravity of situations that motivate Central American to flee to the United States.

"We have spoken to mothers in Guatemala or in Honduras who have told me 'my son will be killed here, they will shoot him. He's 16. What am I supposed to do?"

"Many people would much prefer to stay home if they didn't feel that their children's lives were at stake," he said.

I don't think we have gotten the message out how dire it is in certain parts of Central America...and a wider conversation to address the hemispheric situation is part of our

responsibility, as a Church and as a nation."

Gomez, who said that he asked children to pray for his native Mexico's squad in the World Cup, said that comprehensive immigration reform, addressing the complexity of

the situation, is possible.

"What we all need to understand- our government and administration officials- is that it's

possible to address the needs of immigration reform. You just need to make the decision

that we can do it. Once we do that, with everyone working together—we can find a

solution...that the borders be protected, and that the people who are already here become

very productive."

"There are ways to move people around and respect the border and the laws of every

country," he added.

"Our country is a country of immigrants," Gomez said. "It's a great country."

The senior Trump administration official overseeing Medicaid is leaving the federal government to become the incoming Florida governor's health secretary after less than three months on the job.

Mary Mayhew, who previously ran Maine Gov. Paul LePage's health department and oversaw major cuts to the state's safety net, will lead the Florida Agency for Health Care Administration under Gov.-elect Ron DeSantis, an ally of President Donald Trump and critic of the Affordable Care Act.

DeSantis campaigned on opposing Medicaid expansion while promising to strengthen the state's safety net to protect the most vulnerable. His decision to hire Mayhew signals he could pursue tighter eligibility standards for Medicaid and other social benefits.

"With decades of experience and service throughout various leadership roles in both the private and public sectors, Mary Mayhew is a proven innovator and an effective leader in the field of health care," DeSantis said in a statement to POLITICO. "Mary will be an outstanding secretary who will bring bold and tested leadership to the agency."

During six years as Maine health commissioner, Mayhew helped lead the crusade against Medicaid expansion. She also led efforts to add work requirements to the food stamp program and tighten the state's eligibility standards.

In her failed bid for the Republican nomination in Maine's gubernatorial race last year, she touted a 70 percent decrease in enrollment in the state's food stamp program and a 24 percent decrease in Medicaid enrollment.

Mayhew joined the Trump administration in mid-October. CMS Administrator Seema Verma announced Mayhew's resignation in an email Friday afternoon.

"I've enjoyed working with Administrator Verma and the entire team at CMS," Mayhew said In a statement posted by CMS. "It is this vision for state flexibility that excites me about returning to the state level to help Governor-elect DeSantis partner with Administrator Verma to serve the citizens of Florida."





Instructions for Completing the OGE Form 278-T

Who Must File

You must file a periodic transaction report if:

- you are in a position that requires you to file an annual or termination public financial disclosure report (OGE Form 278), and
- you have a reportable transaction as discussed below.

You are not required to file a negative report if you have no reportable transactions.

What to Report

Report any purchase, sale, or exchange by you, your spouse, or dependent child of stocks, bonds, commodity futures, and other securities if the amount of the transaction exceeded \$1,000. You do not need to report: (1) mutual funds and other excepted investment funds; (2) certificates of deposit, savings or checking accounts, and money market accounts; (3) U.S. Treasury bills, notes, and bonds; (4) Thrift Savings Plan accounts; (5) real property; and (6) transactions that are solely by and between you, your spouse, or dependent child.

For each reported transaction:

OVERSIGHT

- Identify the security (e.g., "Central Airlines Co.").
- Mark a column to indicate the type of transaction.
- Provide the date that the transaction occurred.
- If you received notification of the transaction more than 30 days ago, mark the column labeled "Notification Received More Than 30 Days Ago." (Extensions of the due date should be noted in the "Notice of Extension" section.)
- Mark a column to indicate the amount of the transaction.

Voluntary Reporting of Annual/Termination Information

You do not need to report a transaction in an annual or termination report (OGE Form 278) if you have already reported the transaction in a periodic transaction report (OGE Form 278-T). Annual and termination reports, however, also require you to report purchases, sales, or exchanges of: (1) mutual funds and other excepted investment funds; and (2) real property (excluding your personal residence). If you prefer to report such transactions in your periodic transaction report(s) rather than in an annual or termination report, you may do so, unless your agency requires duplicate reporting.

When to File

Periodic transaction reporting is subject to two different deadlines. Under the Ethics in Government Act, you need to file a report:

- within 30 days of receiving notification of a transaction, but
- not later than 45 days after the transaction.

Which deadline applies depends on when you receive notification of the transaction. Normally, you need to disclose a transaction within 30 days of receiving the notification. For example, if you receive online confirmation of a transaction that you ordered earlier today, you will file your report within 30 days.

Sometimes, you might not receive notification right away. In that case, the 45-day deadline can shorten the period for filing your report. For example, if today you receive notification of a transaction that occurred early last month, you will need to be sure to file your report no later than 45 days after the transaction occurred. The 45-day period might end sooner than 30 days from today.

Example 1: You purchase a stock on July 1 and receive notification the same day. You need to report the purchase on or before July 31.

<u>Example 2</u>: You receive a statement on August 10 regarding a purchase that occurred on July 31. You need to report the purchase on or before September 9 because September 9 is 30 days after you received notification of the transaction.

Example 3: You receive a statement on August 10 regarding a purchase that occurred on July 1. You need to report the purchase on or before August 15. Although the 30-day period from notification ends September 9, the 45-day period from the date of the transaction ends earlier.

Note: These deadlines do not apply to any voluntary disclosures of annual and termination report information that you choose to make.

Extensions and Late Filing Fees

Your agency may grant an extension of up to 45 days for good cause shown with the possibility of one additional extension of up to 45 days. If your report is filed more than 30 days after the date the report is required to be filed, or, if an extension was granted, more than 30 days after the last day of the filing extension period, you shall be subject to a \$200 late filing fee. A report is considered to be filed when it is received by your agency. Unless waived by your agency, your agency will collect the fee for deposit with the U.S. Treasury.



Trump seeks to reorganize the federal government

The Trump administration is preparing to release a sweeping plan for reorganizing the federal government that includes a major consolidation of welfare programs — and a renaming of the Health and Human Services Department.

The report, set to be released in the coming weeks by the White House OMB, seeks to movesafety-netprograms, including food stamps, into HHS, two sources with knowledge of the plantold POLITICO. The plan would also propose changing the name of the sprawling department, while separately seeking cuts at USAID and the State Department.

The \$70 billion food stamp program, formally known as the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, is run by USDA and makes up the vast majority of the department's budget. The program helps more than 40 million low-income Americans buy groceries each month.

"You have low-income assistance in a bunch of different shops without one point of oversight and without a whole lot of communication," said one of the people with knowledge of the plan. "Why not have one federal agency responsible for execution?"

The report, which is expected to recommend big changes at many federal agencies, is almost complete and is expected to be introduced this month, according to one administration official. Sources in and outside the government have been told the rollout will happen in late June. The plan is still being finalized and some of the details could change, but one of the people familiar with the report said the proposal to reorganize HHS has widespread buy-in at OMB.

OMB spokesman Jacob Wood declined to comment on the plan.

The biggest changes outlined by the White House are unlikely to be implemented because moving multibillion-dollar programs and renaming federal departments generally require congressional action. But the plan, like the president's annual budget, demonstrates the administration's thinking on a range of domestic policy issues. It also offers a strong political selling point for the Trump White House as it tries to burnish an image of an administration dedicated to conservative principles and smaller government.

"The administration already put a lot of stuff out in this year's budget related to cuts, but that was the easy stuff," the administration official said. "This [report] is the harder stuff."

It's unclear exactly how HHS would be reshuffled, but sources said its new name would emphasize programs that provide assistance to low-income Americans, potentially by adding the term "welfare" to the title of the department. HHS — a sprawling Cabinet-level agency that spends roughly \$1 trillion annually —already oversees the Temporary Assistance for Needy Families program, which provides cash assistance to low-income people, as well as Medicaid, the health coverage program for the poor that insures more than 70 million Americans.

Although "welfare" is often used to describe many programs that provide aid to lowincome people, the vast majority of services provided by HHS are technically considered entitlement programs, such as Medicare and Medicaid, which serve broad swaths of the



public. TANF, however, is a welfare program providing cash assistance to some 1.6 million households.

HHS and USDA referred press inquiries to OMB.

White House officials have been working on their bid to reorganize the government for months — all while keeping an unusually tight lid on the plan. The effort stems from an executive order President Donald Trump signed in March of last year directing OMB to come up with a plan to overhaul the government to make it more efficient. Only recently have some of the ideas begun to circulate outside of OMB.

The plan appears to draw, at least in part, from recommendations made last year by The Heritage Foundation, the conservative think tank that has deeply influenced Trump's agenda in his first year and a half in office.

Heritage recommended that all nutrition functions at USDA — including food stamps, nutrition education and school meal programs that serve some 30 million children each day — be transferred over to HHS.

"[T]he USDA has veered off of its mission by working extensively on issues unrelated to agriculture. This is mostly due to the nutrition programs," Heritage wrote in last year's report about reorganizing the government. "By moving this welfare function to HHS, the USDA will be better able to work on agricultural issues impacting all Americans."

Moving nutrition out of USDA, where it makes up roughly three-quarters of the department's budget, would be regarded as a big blow to the profile of the department.

Conservatives are likely to support moving food stamps over to HHS, in part because HHS has been out front on instituting first-ever work requirements in the Medicaid program. Already, HHS has approved work requirements for Medicaid enrollees in four states.

"Generally speaking, we're in favor of the idea," said Kristina Rasmussen, vice president of federal affairs at the Foundation for Government Accountability, a conservative group that's grown increasingly influential among GOP leaders seeking to spend less on welfare programs. "HHS has been doing some pretty exciting things on the work requirements front for able-bodied adults."

Dear TVAP Grantees:

ACF will be providing a formal response to the letter that you submitted on September 29. In the meantime, we reiterate that the information provided in past reports is incomplete and, therefore, not fully responsive to the grant requirements.

The information collection required for the grantees includes the following specific information:

- Names of the entities providing medical services; and
- Amount of money expended on each type of medical service provided, by entity.

The "entity" is the health care institution directly providing the medical service. A grantee or sub-recipient is not the "entity" unless the grantee or sub-recipient is directly providing the medical service.

Also, there must be sufficient detail in the grantees' categorization of "medical service" to allow for a full understanding of the specific medical services received by victims, potential victims, and family members served by the program. The report language requires the collection of "specific information regarding the types of services provided or referred."

The information should not be aggregated. If a client received multiple medical services, or more than one client received services from one entity, report each service received by each client, including the name of the entity and the amount of money expended per instance of service. Personally identifiable information should not be submitted.

This information collection has a current and valid OMB number and is included in the requirements for the grant in the FOA and cooperative agreement. The collection is required to ensure compliance with appropriation funding restrictions and requirements and to report information to Congress.

Please continue collecting the information that was approved in the attached OMB collection tool and report the information in your next quarterly report.

Dr. Jordan B. Peterson is a professor of psychology at the University of Toronto, a clinical psychologist and the author of the multi-million copy bestseller 12 Rules for Life: An Antidote to Chaos, #1 for nonfiction in 2018 in the US, Canada, the UK, Australia, New Zealand, Sweden, the Netherlands, Brazil and Norway, and now slated for translation into 45 languages.

Raised and toughened in the frigid wastelands of Northern Alberta, Dr. Peterson has flown a hammer-head roll in a carbon-fiber stuntplane, piloted a mahogany racing sailboat around Alcatraz Island, explored an Arizona meteorite crater with a group of astronauts, built a Native American Long-House on the upper floor of his Toronto home, and been inducted into a Pacific Kwakwaka'wakw family (see charlesjoseph.ca). He's been a dishwasher, gas jockey, bartender, short-order cook, beekeeper, oil derrick bit re-tipper, plywood mill laborer and railway line worker. 





Behavioral Trends Among Teens Show Promise and Concern
Minority Youth Show Highest Positive Change

The Centers for Disease Control (CDC) released a *Morbidity and Mortality Weekly Repc Surveillance Summary* on the 2017 *National Youth Risk Behavior Survey (YRBS)*. This valuable national survey is conducted every two years by the CDC and offers important indicators regarding risk behaviors among youth. The new 2017 survey report reveals both encouraging and concerning trends among youth. The CDC's National Center for HIV/AIDs Viral Hepatitis, STD, and TB Prevention used the data to focus on the following priority areas: sexual behavior, high-risk substance use, violence victimization, and mental health and suicide-related behaviors. Summarized data on key areas shows the following:

- "The percentage of youth who have ever had sex decreased (48% in 2007 to 40% 2017), as did the percentage of youth who reported having four or more sexual partners (15% in 2007 to 10% in 2017), reducing the risk for HIV and STDs.
- Condom use among sexually active high school students decreased (62% in 2007 54% in 2017) putting more youth at risk for HIV and STDs.
- Injection drug use and use of select illicit drugs declined (23% in 2007 to 14% in 2017); however, 14%of high school students (nearly 1 in 7)reported non-prescriptic use of opioids, which has been directly linked to increased risk for injection drug us and HIV.
- Students who reported they were physically forced to have sex has not improved (\text{\text{in 2007 to 7% in 2017}}), with females reporting the highest rates (11% in 2007 and 2017) putting them at increased risk for HIV and STDs."

Overall decreases in "ever had sex" and "number of partners" shows an encouraging trend with minority youth showing the largest percentage change decrease in both areas. Ascend is committed to using the most up-to-date data to inform Sexual Risk Avoidance education order to enhance the protective factors that all youth need to thrive. Access the new YRBS (here).

CDC Trend Data on Teens and Sex Shows the Value of Sexual Risk Avoidance Education

Washington D.C. - The CDC's new trend data from the 2017 Youth Risk Behavior Survey (YRBS) offers encouraging news regarding teens and sex and the value of Sexual Risk Avoidance(SRA)education. "According to the results of this survey, more teens are waiting for sex and defying the often-repeated premise that teens are going to have sex anyway. Sexual Risk Avoidance education is a primary prevention approach that seeks to normalize sexual delay among youth and, as survey data indicates, more youth are embracing that message than ever before. Now is the time for SRA educators to continue their work in reinforcing the good decisions teens are making," stated Mary Anne Mosack, President/CE of Ascend.

While overall, teen sex has decreased from 47.8% in 2007 to 39.5% in 2017, the most significant decreases are seen among minority youth with black students who ever had sex decreasing from 66.5% in 2007 to 45.8% in 2017 and Hispanic students showing a decrease from 52.0% in 2007 to 41.1% in 2017. In addition, among sexually active teens, the percentage of students who had sex with four or more partners decreased significantly from 14.9% in 2007 to 9.7% 2017 with equally significant decreases among White, Black and Hispanic youth. Number of partners is an important predictor of the likelihood of contracting an STD. So, while gains in this area are extremely encouraging, there is more work to do as half of the 20 million new STDs reported each year are among young people, between tages of 15 and 24. The survey also underscores the importance of a consistent theme typical in SRA educatio programs of tying the consequences of sexual and other risk behaviors to academic achievement and thus broader life, health and financial impacts into adulthood. Sexual Risl Avoidance programs routinely share the benefits of following the *Success Sequence*as a strong poverty prevention approach that advises a young person to a) graduate b) get a fulltime job and c) wait to be married before having children. Research shows that following this sequence decreases the likelihood of living in poverty to only 2%.[1]¹

Ascend is extremely gratified to see sexual activity among high school age students continuing to fall. We want to thank so many Ascend quality SRA programs and SRA certified instructors for their efforts in contributing to this decline. And we thank, especially, the young people in America who have taken our message to heart since it creates the EXT-19-461-C-000376 opportunity for happier, healthier, and more productive lives.







New 2019 Appropriations Bill Includes \$10 Million Increase for Sexual Risk Avoidanc Education

On Sept 28th, the President signed an Appropriations "minibus" funding bill that includes th Dept. of Defense, the Labor, Health and Human Services (LHHS) and Education Appropriations bill for 2019. Building on the 2018 appropriations bill that increased SRA education to \$25 million, the new bill added an additional \$10 million bringing the total for SRA education programs to \$35 million for 2019.

SRAE grant funding began in 2012 at \$5 million, was increased in 2015 to \$10 million then again in 2017 to \$25 million. "This steady increase in funding for the important sexual risk avoidance approach demonstrates the growing success of SRA programs and the recognition and support from congressional members for such programs," noted Mary Ann-Mosack, President/CEO of Ascend. In addition, the Title V SRA state block grant was increased in 2015 from \$50 million to \$75 million bringing the total funding available for SR programs in 2018-19 to \$110 million.

Ascend is deeply grateful to Senator Roy Blunt (R-MO), Chairman of the Appropriations Subcommittee on Labor, Health and Human Services in the Senate and Chairman Tom Cc (R-OK) in the House who worked to secure this increase for SRA education in the 2019 Appropriations bill. "As funding increases, more and more students throughout the country are able to receive SRA's optimal sexual health message- a message every young person America deserves to hear," added Mary Anne Mosack, President/CEO of Ascend.
