Dear Mr. Evers:

This is the electronic final response to your Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) request to the Department of Homeland Security (DHS), dated and received by this office on January 25, 2019. You are seeking (1) all email communications (including emails, email attachments, and calendar invitations) with Congressman Steve King or any staffer or representative of Congressman King, including, but not limited to, all communications with the following email addresses: (a) steve.king@mail.house.gov; (b) hunter.king@mail.house.gov; (c) sarah.stevens@mail.house.gov; (d) suanne.edmiston@mail.house.gov; (e) john.kennedy@mail.house.gov; (f) joe.barry@mail.house.gov; and (g) jared.culver@mail.house.gov; and (2) the applicable files of the following agency custodians in The Office of the Secretary: (a) the Secretary; (b) Deputy Secretary; (c) the Chiefs of Staff to the foregoing officials, anyone performing these functions in an acting capacity, and anyone acting on their behalves, such as an executive assistant or scheduler; and (3) within The Office of Legislative Affairs: (a) the Assistant Secretary, (b) the Principal Deputy Assistant Secretary; (c) the Deputy Assistant Secretary for the House of Representatives; (d) the Chiefs of Staff to the foregoing officials, anyone performing these functions in an acting capacity, and anyone acting on their behalves, such as an executive assistant or scheduler; and (4) within The Office of the Citizenship and Immigration Services Ombudsman: (a) the Ombudsman; (b) the Deputy Director; (c) the Chiefs of Staff to the foregoing officials, anyone performing these functions in an acting capacity, and anyone acting on their behalves, such as an executive assistant or scheduler.

A search of DHS's Office of Chief Information Officer (OCIO) documents responsive to your request produced a total of 33 pages. Of those pages, I have determined that one page of the records is releasable in their entirety, 23 pages are partially releasable, and nine pages are withheld in their entirety pursuant to Title 5 U.S.C. § 552 (b)(5), and (b)(6), FOIA Exemptions 5 and 6.



Enclosed are 33 pages with certain information withheld as described below.

**FOIA Exemption 5** protects from disclosure those inter- or intra-agency documents that are normally privileged in the civil discovery context. The three most frequently invoked privileges are the deliberative process privilege, the attorney work-product privilege, and the attorney-client privilege. After carefully reviewing the responsive documents, I determined that portions of the responsive documents qualify for protection under the Deliberative Process Privilege. The deliberative process privilege protects the integrity of the deliberative or decision-making processes within the agency by exempting from mandatory disclosure opinions, conclusions, and recommendations included within inter-agency or intra-agency memoranda or letters. The release of this internal information would discourage the expression of candid opinions and inhibit the free and frank exchange of information among agency personnel.

**FOIA Exemption 6** exempts from disclosure personnel or medical files and similar files the release of which would cause a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy. This requires a balancing of the public's right to disclosure against the individual's right to privacy. The privacy interests of the individuals in the records you have requested outweigh any minimal public interest in disclosure of the information. Any private interest you may have in that information does not factor into the aforementioned balancing test.

You have a right to appeal the above withholding determination. Should you wish to do so, you must send your appeal and a copy of this letter, within 90 days of the date of this letter, to: Privacy Office, Attn: FOIA Appeals, U.S. Department of Homeland Security, 245 Murray Lane, SW, Mail Stop 0655, Washington, D.C. 20528-0655, following the procedures outlined in the DHS FOIA regulations at 6 C.F.R. Part 5 § 5.8. Your envelope and letter should be marked "FOIA Appeal." Copies of the FOIA and DHS FOIA regulations are available at www.dhs.gov/foia.

Provisions of FOIA allow DHS to charge for processing fees, up to \$25, unless you seek a waiver of fees. In this instance, because the cost is below the \$25 minimum, there is no charge.

Additionally, you have a right to seek dispute resolution services from the Office of Government Information Services (OGIS) which mediates disputes between FOIA requesters and Federal agencies as a non-exclusive alternative to litigation. If you are requesting access to your own records (which is considered a Privacy Act request), you should know that OGIS does not have the authority to handle requests made under the Privacy Act of 1974. 

Here are the questions/topics we would like to see information on regarding DACA applicants:

- 1) What years the accepted applicants initially entered the United States?
- 2) Information showing the different countries that accepted applicants were born in and the number of accepted applicants from each country.
- 3) How many of the accepted applicants left the United States during their "period of continuous residence"? How many returned to their country of birth during such travel?
- 4) The number of male vs. female accepted applicants.
- 5) Information showing the age of accepted applicant at the time of initial entry to the United States.



- 6) Information showing what types of documents were used to prove accepted applicant identity and how often.
- 7) Information showing the different types of education levels of accepted applicants (high school diploma vs. GED vs. college degree, etc.).
- 8) What percentage/number of accepted applicants required an interpreter to complete the DACA application (Form I-821D)?
- 9) What percentage/number of <u>all</u> applicants (both accepted and rejected) answered "Yes" to question 1 in Part 4 ("Criminal, National Security, and Public Safety Information") of the DACA application (Form I-821D).
  - a. This question asks "[h]ave you ever been arrested for, charged with, or convicted of a felony or misdemeanor[...]?"
- 10) Out of those who answered "Yes" to question 1 in Part 4, how many of those applicants were accepted? How many were rejected?

- 12) How many of the accepted applicants had a criminal history check conducted in their country of birth?
- 13) Information showing the average time needed to approve an initial application.





Specifically, non-identifying information that answers the questions or addresses the topics listed below. I really appreciate your help on this and let me know if you need anything from me or if you have any questions. Again, thank you.

Here are the questions/topics we would like to see information on regarding DACA applicants:

- 1) What years the accepted applicants initially entered the United States?
- Information showing the different countries that accepted applicants were born in and the number of accepted applicants from each country.
- 3) How many of the accepted applicants left the United States during their "period of continuous residence"? How many returned to their country of birth during such travel?
- 4) The number of male vs. female accepted applicants.
- 5) Information showing the age of accepted applicant at the time of initial entry to the United States.



- 6) Information showing what types of documents were used to prove accepted applicant identity and how often.
- 7) Information showing the different types of education levels of accepted applicants (high school diploma vs. GED vs. college degree, etc.).
- 8) What percentage/number of accepted applicants required an interpreter to complete the DACA application (Form I-821D)?
- 9) What percentage/number of all applicants (both accepted and rejected) answered "Yes" to question 1 in Part 4 ("Criminal, National Security, and Public Safety Information") of the DACA application (Form I-821D).
- a. This question asks "[h]ave you ever been arrested for, charged with, or convicted of a felony or misdemeanor[...]?"
- 10) Out of those who answered "Yes" to question 1 in Part 4, how many of those applicants were accepted? How many were rejected?
- 11) How many accepted applicants had a domestic criminal history check conducted before their application was approved? If a service other than NCIC was used to conduct these criminal history checks, please indicate what service was used.
- 12) How many of the accepted applicants had a criminal history check conducted in their country of birth?
- 13) Information showing the average time needed to approve an initial application.
