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EXAMINER PARROT: Thank you for coming today. It is just past 12:30. I think we get started. I will start by calling the case.

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We are here today for a local public hearing in Case No. 13-2385-EL-SSO, which is captioned In the Matter of the Application of Ohio Power Company for Authority to Establish a Standard Service Offer Pursuant to Section 4928.143, Revised Code, in the Form of an Electric Security Plan.

As well as case No. 13-2386-EL-AAM, which is captioned In the Matter of the Application of Ohio Power Company for Approval of Certain Accounting Authority.

My name is Sarah Parrot. I am one of the attorney examiners assigned by the Commission to these cases. The other examiner on the case is Greta See. She is also with us today in the audience. As well we have some of the Commission staff present today. We have in the first row Holly Karg and Matt Schilling with the Public Affairs Department, as well as some of the staff in the hallway that greeted you today. They are with the Service Monitoring and

Enforcement Department of the Commission.

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Also presiding with me today is

Commissioner Lynn Slaby, who is seated here to my

right, and I think he has a few brief words to share
with you today.

COMMISSIONER SLABY: Thank you. I just want to welcome everybody here and tell you that we are certainly open to all testimony, opponents and proponents. Anybody that wants to speak is perfectly welcome to speak.

We do listen. Sometimes people don't think we listen, but we do. We all try to get through all the testimony that is presented to us in some form or another before we finally make a decision on behalf of the Commission, so it is important that we do hear from you because the more information we get, the better our decisions will be

So I thank you for participating today.

Doesn't look like we have but three, but if there is anybody else that wishes at the end to say something, please feel free to do so.

Thank you for attending today.

EXAMINER PARROT: Thank you.

I should say as well our staff is available following our hearing if you have questions

about a utility matter other than the application that is the subject of our hearing this afternoon. They will be available following the hearing to answer your questions,

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At this time, though, let's get rolling with appearances of the parties, and we will start with counsel for Ohio Power Company.

MR. NOURSE: Thank you, your Honor. On behalf of the Ohio Power Company, Steven T. Nourse, One Riverside Plaza, Columbus, Ohio 43215.

And also with me is Mr. Spitznogle, if you want to introduce yourself, and the other Ohio Power folks that are here.

MR. SPITZNOGLE: Gary Spitznogle with AEP Ohio, Gahanna, Ohio, 850 Tech Center Drive. I'm the regulatory and finance vice president.

Also here is Michele Jeunelot.

Thank you.

EXAMINER PARROT: Thank you.

On behalf of OCC.

MR. SERIO: Thank you, Your Honor. On behalf of the Residential Utility Customers of AEP Ohio, Bruce Weston, Consumers Counsel, by Joseph P. Serio.

EXAMINER PARROT: Thank you.

Are there any other parties present in the room today?

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All right. Seeing none, I would just note there are a number of other parties that have intervened in these proceedings. We have intervenors representing residential consumers, industrial customers, as well as commercial customers and other consumer advocate groups, and each of these parties is participating in these cases on behalf of their various constituents.

I would also note that on December 20, 2013, Ohio Power Company filed an application with the Commission to establish a Standard Service Offer in the Form of an Electric Security Plan, or what we refer to as an ESP, which would be in effect from June 2015 through May 2018.

We have five local public hearings scheduled in these cases, and those cases are one aspect of the process before the Commission.

We also have an evidentiary hearing that is scheduled to commence on June 3, 2014, which will take place here in the Commission offices in Columbus.

The purpose of this afternoon's public hearing is to receive comments from the public

regarding Ohio Power Company's application. It is not a question—and—answer session, but is your opportunity to let the Commission know what you think about the Ohio Power Company's application.

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Our hearing today is being transcribed by a court reporter. If you do plan to testify, please speak clearly so she can accurately reflect your comments on the record, and if you have a prepared written statement, it would be helpful if you could provide a copy of that to the court reporter.

When you arrived today, you were offered the opportunity to sign up to testify. After I finish with our introduction, I will begin calling witnesses forward that have signed on the sheet that they wish to testify.

I will ask each witness to come up to the podium and face the court reporter. Before you give your statement, I will ask that you provide your name and address for the record, and before you present your testimony, I will ask that you take an oath or affirmation that what you are about to say is the truth.

Your testimony will be considered part of the official record in these cases and will be reviewed by the Commission before a final decision is

made on AEP's application.

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Additionally, the parties to the case, as well as myself and Commissioner Slaby, will be permitted to ask questions about your statement.

Should you decide that you do not wish to testify when I call your name, simply pass to the next witness, and once you testify and finish with your statement or if you are just here to observe today, of course, you may leave at any time.

We do appreciate your participation in today's hearing and we wish that anyone who is here and wishes to make a statement, that you have the opportunity to do that, so when we get through the list of witnesses that have signed the sign-in sheet, we will see if there are others in the room that wish to offer testimony as well.

At this time let's get started with our first witness, and we have -- and I'm sorry if I mispronounce names. I believe it's Darcy Hager.

(Witness sworn.)

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DIRECT TESTIMONY

MS. TYLER LEE: Commission Slaby,
Ms. Parrot, Commission staff, guests, thank you for
this opportunity to provide comments on behalf of
United Way of Central Ohio, president and CEO, Janet
Jackson, to share some of the ways AEP has been an
excellent corporate citizen and steadfast supporter
of the work of the United Way of Central Ohio.

Each year AEP conducts a strong United Way campaign. Through those campaigns, AEP employees have invested almost \$19 million over the past ten years. Not only does AEP provide financial resources to our work, they provide human resources as well.

AEP and AEP Ohio's senior management provide a tremendous support and service for United Way. The 2014 campaign cochairs are Nick Akins, chairman, president and CEO, and his wife Donna. Pablo Vegas, president and COO of AEP Ohio, serves on our Board of Trustees. Past AEP campaign chairs include: Former chairman, president and CEO, Mike Morris, and former vice chairman, Carl English.

In addition, AEP consistently supports

our campaign by also providing executives to sit on the Campaign Cabinet, which supports our annual fundraising efforts, and the Resource Development Committee, which helps us develop long-range, multiyear development plans.

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AEP has also been a long-time sponsor of our annual Celebration of Excellence, which recognizes the organizations that have worked to raise money for the campaign.

MS. Di BELLA: Thank you so much for the opportunity to provide testimony on behalf of AEP.

community.

Further, AEP's energy efficiency programs will be extremely usual in our newly renovated building.
