This is the final response to your July 31, 2019 Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) request to U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) requesting any video and/or audio of your client, Mr. Kelly James Eiswerth, at the Andrade Port of Entry on March 26, 2019.

We conducted a comprehensive search of CBP databases, within the San Diego Field Office, for records that would be responsive to your request. Unfortunately, we were unable to locate or identify any responsive records, based upon the information you provided in your request. Please note: the retention period for video or audio footage is 90 days from the date of the incident.

This completes the CBP response to your request.
