MOTION TO WITHDRAW CORRECTED EMERGENCY MOTION FOR REDUCTION IN SENTENCE PURSUANT TO 18 U.S.C. § 3582(c)(1)(A)(i)

TO THE HONORABLE LEE YEAKEL, UNITED STATES DISTRICT JUDGE:

Mr. George Lewis Escamilla, Sr. moves to withdraw his Corrected Emergency Motion for Compassionate Release, Doc. 1293. Because Mr. Escamilla passed away on May 8, 2020, his motion for compassionate release is now moot.

Could Mr. Escamilla's death have been avoided? Was Mr. Escamilla's demise a necessary consequence of his incarceration at FCI Oakdale? Is such a fatal outcome to be expected for future medically compromised inmates in B.O.P custody as Covid-19 spreads throughout the inmate population? Mr. Escamilla's children hope that their father's death will serve the purpose of preventing other needless inmate deaths.

When Mr. Escamilla became infected with Covid-19, he was afflicted with pre-existing conditions that made a poor outcome likely. He suffered from diabetes, high blood pressure, and anemia. He was a double amputee and wheel-chair bound. FCI Oakdale, the facility where Mr. Escamilla contracted Covid-19, had become one of the Bureau of Prisons facilities most affected by the COVID-19 pandemic.¹

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Prior to becoming infected, FCI Oakdale found Mr. Escamilla eligible to be released to home confinement. The BOP scheduled him to go home May 6, 2020. *See* Exhibit 1, p. 2; Declaration of K. Maxey, BOP Executive Assistant and Camp Administrator at the BOP's Federal Correctional Complex in Oakdale, Louisiana (FCC Oakdale). Although the precise date the BOP made this decision was not disclosed, counsel knows from his son, Michael, that Mr. Escamilla phoned him March 18, 2020, to report he expected to be released soon. Doc. 1293 at p. 3. Counsel further knows that on March 27, 2020, the US Probation Office denied the BOP's request to allow Mr. Escamilla to participate in their federal location monitoring program because it ran contrary to the USPO's policies and because Mr. Escamilla was a double amputee (making ankle monitoring impossible).² Counsel also knows from family that staff from the Austin Reentry Center paid them a visit in early April 2020 to inspect their home and found it acceptable to serve for Mr. Escamilla's place of home confinement.

But the BOP acted without the necessary urgency to release Mr. Escamilla. With Covid-19 spreading through the facility, the BOP kept Mr. Escamilla locked up inside. On April 15, 2020, Mr. Escamilla went into respiratory failure. *See* Exhibit 2, BOP Press Release. On April 18, 2020, he tested positive for Covid-19. *See* Exhibit 1, p. 2. On April 22, 2020, he was taken to a local hospital. *See* Exhibit 1, p. 2. On April 30, 2020, he was placed on a ventilator. On May 8, Mr. Escamilla was pronounced dead.

What is also heartbreaking about Mr. Escamilla's passing is that his family was kept in the dark about his diagnosis and treatment. Counsel learned from BOP that Mr. Escamilla was hospi-

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talized on April 22. The news came in response to counsel's request for help obtaining Mr. Escamilla's signature on a medical release form. The BOP told counsel that Mr. Escamilla's hospitalization made this impossible. Citing rules and regulations, the BOP would not provide counsel with any details concerning Mr. Escamilla's condition or prognosis. Mr. Escamilla's family was stunned when counsel reported the news to them. Surprisingly, the BOP did not deem Mr. Escamilla's hospitalization a serious condition that warranted notifying them.

The family remained in the dark about Mr. Escamilla's medical condition until all that remained was for them to help doctors decide if he should be kept alive artificially. Counsel learned this from his family on May 8. By then, of course, it was too late for the family to say their goodbyes.

CONCLUSION

For the reasons stated above, Mr. Escamilla moves to withdraw his Corrected Emergency Motion for Reduction in Sentence Pursuant to 18 U.S.C. § 3582(c)(1)(A)(i).

DECLARATION OF K. MAXEY

In accordance with 28 U.S.C. § 1746, I, K. Maxey, make the following unsworn declaration, under penalty of perjury, pertinent to the above styled and numbered cause:

 I am employed by the United States Department of Justice, Federal Bureau of Prisons (BOP). I am the Executive Assistant and Camp Administrator at the BOP's Federal Correctional Complex in Oakdale, Louisiana (FCC Oakdale).

2. The statements I make hereinafter are made based on my review of the official files and records of the BOP, my personal knowledge, and information acquired by me through the performance of my official duties. As the Executive Assistant, I am a key advisor to the Warden on matters of policy, programs, and operations. I provide direct administrative support to the Warden through continuing assignments and special projects as well as assistance to institution department heads in achieving specific program management objectives. As the Camp Administrator, part of my official duties and responsibilities include planning, organizing, supervising and evaluating diversified programs within FCC Oakdale directed toward the institution's mission.

3. I have access to and use of the BOP's SENTRY computer database. SENTRY contains information regarding inmates incarcerated within the BOP. Through the FCC Oakdale Case Management Coordinator, I have access to the BOP's Business Process Management System (BPMS) that tracks an inmate's request for Reduction in Sentence / Compassionate Release (RIS).

4. I have reviewed SENTRY for information concerning inmate George Lewis Escamilla, Sr., federal register number 43385-080. Escamilla is currently incarcerated at FCI Oakdale 1. See Attachment 1, a true and correct copy of Escamilla's Inmate Profile from the SENTRY database system. Escamilla has a projected release date of May 14, 2022, via Good Conduct Time release. Id.

Escamilla tested positive for COVID-19 on April 18, 2020. See Id. at 2. On
April 22, 2020, Escamilla was transported to a local hospital for care related to his positive COVID-19 test. Id. To date, Escamilla remains there for treatment related to COVID-19. Id.

6. Through the Case Management Coordinator, I have reviewed BPMS to determine if Escamilla filed a RIS request with the Warden. The BPMS system indicates Escamilla filed a RIS request with the Warden on February 1, 2019. *See* Exhibit 2 at 1, a true and correct copy of Escamilla's RIS filing. The Warden denied the request on February 15, 2019. *Id.* at 2. The RIS database does not show any other requests submitted by Escamilla.

7. Escamilla appealed the denial of his RIS request through the BOP's administrative remedy system. *See* Exhibit 3, a true and correct copy of Escamilla's administrative remedy filings. A review of Exhibit 3 reveals Escamilla filed an administrative remedy request with the FCC Oakdale Warden and the Regional Director of the BOP's South Central Region (SCRO) (FCC Oakdale is under the oversight of the SCRO). Further examination of the remedies reveals Escamilla failed to file an administrative remedy appeal with the BOP's Office of General Counsel. *Id.* Thus, Escamilla did not exhaust his administrative remedies regarding the Warden's denial of his RIS request.

 FCC Oakdale Unit Management evaluated Escamilla for Home Confinement and determined he is eligible. Escamilla is currently scheduled to go to Home Confinement on May 6, 2020. Upon Escamilla's return to the institution from the local hospital, he will undergo a 14-day

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quarantine. Upon completion of the 14-day quarantine, it is anticipated the BOP would still place Escamilla on Home Confinement. This in contingent on FCC Oakdale Health Services' determination Escamilla has made a full recovery and further determination he is no longer infectious.



This is in response to your Inmate Request to Staff Member received on February 1, 2019, at the Federal Correctional Complex (Satellite Camp Prison), Oakdale, Louisiana, in which you request a Reduction in Sentence/Compassionate Release based on your status as an Elderly Inmate with Medical Conditions.

Program Statement 5050.50, Compassionate Release/Reduction in Sentence: Procedures for Implementation of 18 U.S.C §§ 3582 and 405(g), outlines the following criteria for consideration of a Compassionate Release based on an Elderly Inmate with Medical Conditions, "age 65 and older, suffer from chronic or serious medical conditions related to the aging process, experiencing deteriorating mental or physical health that substantially diminishes their ability to function in a correctional facility, conventional treatment promises no substantial improvement to their mental or physical condition, and have served at least 50% of their sentence." You state you are a double amputee as a result from chronic diabetes and suffer from high blood pressure and are anemic. These medical conditions are not solely related to the aging process and you are able to function in a correctional setting. In addition, you were at a Medical Center and due to your health progress you were released to return to FCC Oakdale. Furthermore, you failed to provide reasoning why conventional treatment promises no substantial improvement to your mental or physical condition. As such, your request for a Compassionate Release is denied at this time.

I trust this response adequately addresses your concerns.

Inmate Death at FCI Oakdale I Satellite Camp

WASHINGTON, D.C.: On Wednesday, April 15, 2020, inmate George Escamilla went into respiratory failure at the Satellite Prison Camp (SPC) in Oakdale, Louisiana. He was evaluated by institutional medical staff and transported to a local hospital for further treatment and evaluation. While in the hospital, Mr. Escamilla tested positive for COVID-19. On Thursday, April 30, 2020, his condition declined and he was placed on a ventilator. On Friday, May 8, 2020, Mr. Escamilla, who had long-term, pre-existing medical conditions which the CDC lists as risk factors for developing more severe COVID-19 disease, was pronounced dead by hospital staff.

Mr. Escamilla was a 67 year-old male who was sentenced in the Western District of Texas to a 192-month sentence for Possession with Intent to Distribute 5 kilograms or more of Cocaine and Aiding and Abetting. He had been in custody at Federal Correctional Complex (FCC) Oakdale since May 9, 2018.

SPC Oakdale is a Minimum security facility adjacent to the Federal Correctional Institution I Oakdale and currently houses 71 male offenders.
