This responds to your Freedom of Information Act request, dated and received in this Office on August 29, 2018, seeking records reflecting communications with our about Stephen Miller or referencing a particular phone number. This response is made on behalf of the Offices of the Attorney General and Deputy Attorney General.

Please be advised that initial searches have been conducted and records responsive to your request have been located. At this time, I have determined that 300 pages containing records responsive to your request are appropriate for release with excisions made pursuant to Exemptions 5 and 6 of the FOIA, 5 U.S.C. § 552(b)(5) and (b)(6). Exemption 5 pertains to certain inter- and intra-agency communications protected by civil discovery privileges. Exemption 6 pertains to information the release of which would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy.

For your information, Congress excluded three discrete categories of law enforcement and national security records from the requirements of the FOIA. See 5 U.S.C. § 552(c) (2018). This response is limited to those records that are subject to the requirements of the FOIA. This is a standard notification that is given to all our requesters and should not be taken as an indication that excluded records do, or do not, exist.

The U.S. Attorney's Office filed federal firearms charges Wednesday against a Saudi national already facing state charges for a January incident in Indianapolis.

Achmed Alaklouk was charged Jan. 31 in Marion County with criminal confinement, intimidation, unlawful possession of a firearm by an alien and battery stemming from an alleged incident at his west side business, Medo Tire Shop.

According to a probable cause affidavit filed in that case, Alaklouk battered a customer and then held him and his daughter at gunpoint with an AR-15-style rifle.

On Wednesday, a criminal complaint was filed against Alaklouk in U.S. district court alleging he was found in illegal possession of a similar rifle, along with six handguns, while staying at the Hyatt Regency in downtown Indianapolis.

During the course of the investigation, police learned that Alaklouk – a native of Tunisia and citizen of Saudi Arabia – was in the country on an expired student visa. Immigration records showed he had requested and been denied multiple extensions within the past year.

Egisto Salerno, a medical doctor, who owns and operates a medical office on El Cajon Boulevard in San Diego, and seven others have been arrested on federal

Doctor Sentenced for Healthcare Fraud, Accepting Kickbacks to Prescribe Highly Addictive Version of Fentanyl ([District of Rhode Island](#)) 3/9/18

Dr. Jerrold N. Rosenberg, 63 of Warren, the operator of a now-defunct pain management practice in Rhode Island, was sentenced today to 51 months in federal prison for committing healthcare fraud and for conspiring to solicit and receive kickbacks in return for prescribing the drug Subsys, a fast-acting, powerful, and highly-addictive version of the opioid drug Fentanyl.

Multiple Defendants Sentenced for Violent Crimes and Drug Trafficking ([Northern District of Mississippi](#)) 3/9/18

A Clarksdale man, the final defendant in a multi-defendant conspiracy, has been sentenced to 400 months in federal prison resulting from his role in a murder and heroin distribution conspiracy in the Northern District of Mississippi. Derrick Jones was sentenced for his crimes in United States District Court Thursday afternoon. Multiple fatal opioid overdoses and hospitalizations in the Mississippi Delta spurred an investigation between the Drug Enforcement Administration, the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives, the Mississippi Bureau of Narcotics, and the United States Attorney's Office.

Twelve Charged in Cincinnati in Connection to Mexico-Based Sinaloa Drug Cartel - More than 45 Additional Defendants Charged in Connection to this Case in Other Cities and Districts ([Southern District of Ohio](#)) 3/8/18

A federal grand jury has charged 12 individuals in a narcotics and money laundering conspiracy in a superseding indictment unsealed here today. Members of the group allegedly distributed fentanyl from Mexico in Middletown, Ohio and sent proceeds back to the Sinaloa Drug Cartel in Mexico.

Mexican National Indicted for Smuggling 53 Aliens in Tractor Trailer ([Southern District of Texas](#)) 3/8/18

A Mexican National on a visitor visa is set to appear in court on charges he attempted to smuggle illegal aliens behind a load of produce, announced U.S. Attorney Ryan K. Patrick. A federal grand jury returned the indictment against Luis Valero-Carrizales, 39, Feb. 28. He is expected to make his initial appearance before U.S. Magistrate Judge Jason Libby at 9:30 a.m. today, at which time the government expects to request his continued detention pending further criminal proceedings.

Mexican citizen sentenced to 5 years in prison for transporting methamphetamine near Monroe ([Western District of Louisiana](#)) 3/9/18

United States Attorney Alexander C. Van Hook announced that a Mexican national was sentenced Tuesday to 60 months in prison for possessing methamphetamine.

Violent Crime

Four East Central Illinois Men Arrested, Charged by Complaint with Possession of Machine Gun - Complaint Affidavit Alleges Criminal Activity Related to Bombing in Minnesota; Attempted Bombing of Champaign, Ill., Women's Clinic, and Other Violence (Central District of Illinois) 3/13/18

This morning, FBI agents arrested four rural east central Illinois men on a criminal complaint that charges them with possession of a machine gun. The men arrested and charged are: Michael B. Hari, 47; Joe Morris, 22; Michael McWhorter, 29; and, Ellis Mack, 18, all of Clarence, Ill., a rural community approximately 35 miles north of Champaign-Urbana.

Three More Members of the Westside Crips Criminal Enterprise Sentenced to Prison for Participation in Racketeering Conspiracy Relating to Sex Trafficking, Drug Trafficking and Other Crimes (Southern District of California) 3/9/18

Two more gang members of the Westside Crips were sentenced today for their participation in a racketeering conspiracy involving sex trafficking, narcotics trafficking and other violent crimes. A mid-level drug dealer who sold narcotics to gang members was also sentenced for his participation in the racketeering conspiracy and for conspiracy to distribute methamphetamine.

Illegal Alien Sentenced To Five Years For Possession Of Loaded Firearms And Felony Assault On A Federal Officer (Middle District of Florida) 3/9/18

U.S. District Court Judge Carlos E. Mendoza today sentenced Oniel Christopher Russell, a/k/a "O G Russell" (40, Jamaican national), to five years in federal prison for possessing two loaded firearms while being in the United States illegally, and for committing a felony assault on a federal law enforcement officer, causing bodily injury. A federal jury found Russell guilty on December 28, 2017, after a two-day trial.

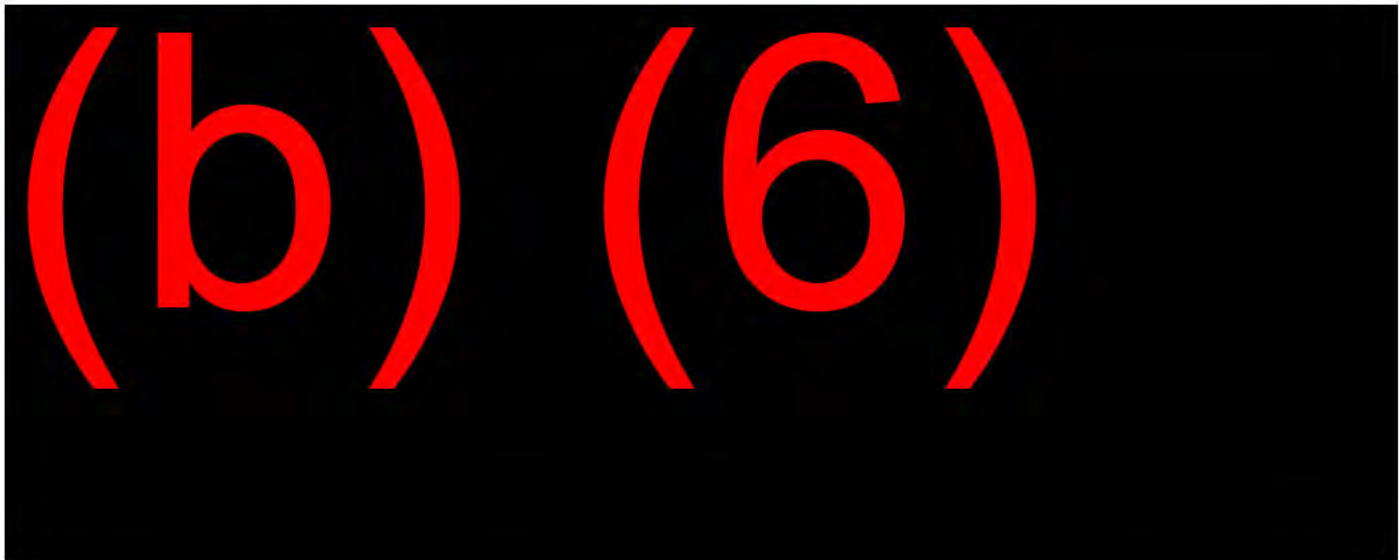

WASHINGTON – The Department of Justice and the City of West Palm Beach announced today that they had reached an agreement regarding Resolution Number 112-17. The Department had been investigating whether West Palm Beach's Resolution Number 112-17 and polices related to the resolution comply with 8 U.S.C. § 1373, which protects information sharing between local law enforcement and the Department of

Homeland Security (DHS).

Following the City's agreement to, and subsequent dissemination of, a memorandum from West Palm Beach to its employees stating West Palm Beach's position that its local laws do not restrict information sharing with DHS, the Department issued a letter to West Palm Beach concluding its section 1373 review. The letter stated, "[i]n light of our ongoing discussions and your agreement to and sending of a memorandum to all employees stating that they are not restricted from sharing information with DHS, we find no evidence that you are currently out of compliance with section 1373."

West Palm Beach also agreed to dismiss its lawsuit requesting a declaration that its Resolution complies with federal law and challenging the Department's authority to impose immigration cooperation-related grant conditions.

Today's settlement protects public safety by providing assurance that West Palm Beach's Resolution, as interpreted by West Palm Beach, does not violate section 1373, and permits DHS to receive the information it may need to take custody of aliens who commit crimes.

(iii) for the repair, maintenance, or construction on the United States border, in areas experiencing high levels of apprehensions of illegal aliens, of structures to deter illegal entry into the United States.

(B) The amounts which are required to be refunded under subparagraph (A) shall be refunded at least quarterly on the basis of estimates made by the Attorney General of the expenses referred to in subparagraph (A). Proper adjustments shall be made in the amounts subsequently refunded under subparagraph (A) to the extent prior estimates were in excess of, or less than, the amount required to be refunded under subparagraph (A).

(C) The amounts required to be refunded from the Immigration Enforcement Account for fiscal year 1996 and thereafter shall be refunded in accordance with estimates made in the budget request of the Attorney General for those fiscal years. Any proposed changes in the amounts designated in such budget requests shall only be made after notification to the Committees on Appropriations of the House of Representatives and the Senate in accordance with section 605 of Public Law 104-134.

(D) The Attorney General shall prepare and submit annually to the Congress statements of financial condition of the Immigration Enforcement Account, including beginning account balance, revenues, withdrawals, and ending account balance and projection for the ensuing fiscal year.

QUEENS IMMIGRATION ATTORNEY CHARGED WITH ASYLUM FRAUD

Andreea Dumitru Knowingly Made False Statements and Representations on More Than 180 Asylum Applications

NEW YORK - Geoffrey S. Berman, the United States Attorney for the Southern District of New York, Angel M. Melendez, the Special Agent-in-Charge of the New York Field Office of U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement's Homeland Security Investigations ("HSI"), and Patricia Menges, Director of the U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services New York Asylum Office, announced that yesterday ANDREEA DUMITRU, a/k/a "Andreea Dumitru Parcalaboiu," an immigration attorney based in Queens, New York, was charged with asylum fraud

immigration attorney based in Queens, New York, was charged with asylum fraud and making false statements. The case has been assigned to U.S. District Court Judge Lewis A. Kaplan.

U.S. Attorney Geoffrey S. Berman said: “Andreea Dumitru, an immigration attorney, is alleged to have submitted fraudulent forms for over 180 clients, each containing statements and representations she knew to be false. She now faces prison time for her alleged crimes.”

HSI Special Agent-in-Charge Angel M. Melendez said: “Dumitru is alleged to have used her trusted position to defraud the government, submitting fraudulent documents to claim asylum. Her alleged actions took up time and resources while those with valid asylum claims waited in line. Now, Dumitru will enter a courtroom as a defendant to face the consequences for her alleged actions.”

Director Patricia Menges said: “U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services is proud of the hard work of our fraud detection officers that leads to important cases like this one, and ensures that those who try to commit immigration fraud will face justice. USCIS is also grateful for the outstanding collaboration with ICE-HSI and our other law enforcement partners.”

According to the allegations in the Indictment[1]:

Between 2012 and 2017, DUMITRU participated in a scheme to submit fraudulent I-589 Forms in connection with applications for asylum. Specifically, DUMITRU submitted over 180 applications in which she knowingly made false statements and representations about, among other things, the applicants’ criminal histories, personal narratives of alleged persecution, and/or locations. Nevertheless, DUMITRU certified each application as true and correct under penalty of perjury.

* * *

DUMITRU, 42, of Queens, New York, is charged with one count of asylum fraud, which carries a maximum sentence of 10 years in prison, and one count of making false statements, which carries a maximum sentence of five years in prison. The maximum potential sentences are prescribed by Congress and are provided here for informational purposes only, as any sentencing of the defendant will be determined by the judge.

The charges contained in the Indictment are merely accusations, and the defendant is presumed innocent unless and until proven guilty.

Mr. Berman praised the outstanding investigative work of HSI and United States Citizenship and Immigration Services, and thanked the Federal Bureau of Investigation for its assistance.

This case is being prosecuted by the Office’s General Crimes Unit. Assistant U.S. Attorneys Alison G. Moe and Robert B. Sobelman are in charge of the prosecution.

FOUR ALLEGED MS-13 GANG MEMBERS CHARGED IN

CONNECTION WITH MURDER

LAS VEGAS, NV – Four alleged MS-13 gang members were charged late Tuesday in connection with the kidnapping and murder of a rival gang member whose body was found on federal property in southern Nevada.

United States Attorney Dayle Elieson of the District of Nevada, Special Agent in Charge Aaron C. Rouse of the FBI's Las Vegas Division, and Special Agent in Charge Joseph Macias for Homeland Security Investigations (HSI) Los Angeles made the announcement.

Josue Diaz-Orellana, 22, Luis Reyes-Castillo, a/k/a "Molesto," 24, David Perez-Manchame, a/k/a "Herbi" and "Walter Melendez," 19, and Miguel Torres-Escobar, 20, all El Salvadoran nationals, are charged with assault with intent to commit murder, kidnapping, and discharging a firearm during and in relation to a crime of violence. The defendants are illegally in the United States and are in federal custody. Reyes-Castillo, Perez-Manchame, and Torres-Escobar are scheduled to make their initial appearance this afternoon at the federal courthouse in Las Vegas before U.S. District Magistrate Judge Cam Ferenbach. A date for Diaz-Orellana has not yet been set.

MS-13 is an identified transnational organized crime group. MS-13, which is short for "La Mara Salvatrucha," is a gang composed primarily of immigrants or descendants of immigrants from El Salvador. In the United States, MS-13 has been functioning since at least the 1980s.

According to allegations contained in the complaint, on January 21, 2018, Diaz-Orellana, Reyes-Castillo, Perez-Manchame, and Torres-Escobar, kidnapped and murdered Arquimidez Sandavol-Martinez. His body was discovered on February 2, on federal property on East Lake Mead Boulevard, near mile marker 12, in rural Clark County, Nevada. Examination of the crime scene indicated that Sandoval-Martinez had been bound and had made some effort to escape his captors before being shot and stabbed to death. Fired 9mm cartridge cases with "Blazer" and "FC" head-stamp markings on them were located within the crime scene.

During the course of the investigation, law enforcement learned that Sandoval-Martinez was last seen on January 21, at Club 2100, located at 2100 Fremont Street. Investigators obtained cell phone records that indicated Diaz-Orellana's phone used cell towers near the club, heading eastbound along Lake Mead Boulevard, and in the area where Sandavol-Martinez's body was found. On March 2, law enforcement stopped Diaz-Orellana who was in a vehicle with Reyes-Castillo, Perez-Manchame, and Torres-Escobar. A large butcher knife, a baseball hat with an apparent bloodstain on it, and three 9mm handguns were recovered in the vehicle.

The maximum statutory penalty is 20 years of imprisonment for the assault charge and life imprisonment for both the kidnapping and the discharging of a firearm count.

A criminal complaint merely contains allegations, and the defendants are presumed innocent unless and until proven guilty beyond a reasonable doubt in a court of law.

The case is a joint investigation by the FBI, HSI, and the Las Vegas Metropolitan Police with the assistance of the DEA. Assistant U.S. Attorneys Phillip N. Smith, Jr. and Frank J. Coumou are prosecuting the case.

ATTORNEY GENERAL ANNOUNCES ZERO-TOLERANCE POLICY FOR CRIMINAL ILLEGAL ENTRY

WASHINGTON – Attorney General Jeff Sessions today notified all U.S. Attorney’s Offices along the Southwest Border of a new “zero-tolerance policy” for offenses under 8 U.S.C. § 1325(a), which prohibits both attempted illegal entry and illegal entry into the United States by an alien. The implementation of the Attorney General’s zero-tolerance policy comes as the Department of Homeland Security reported a 203 percent increase in illegal border crossings from March 2017 to March 2018, and a 37 percent increase from February 2018 to March 2018—the largest month-to-month increase since 2011.

“The situation at our Southwest Border is unacceptable. Congress has failed to pass effective legislation that serves the national interest—that closes dangerous loopholes and fully funds a wall along our southern border. As a result, a crisis has erupted at our Southwest Border that necessitates an escalated effort to prosecute those who choose to illegally cross our border,” said Attorney General Jeff Sessions. “To those who wish to challenge the Trump Administration’s commitment to public safety, national security, and the rule of law, I warn you: illegally entering this country will not be rewarded, but will instead be met with the full prosecutorial powers of the Department of Justice. To the Department’s prosecutors, I urge you: promoting and enforcing the rule of law is vital to protecting a nation, its borders, and its citizens. You play a critical part in fulfilling these goals, and I thank you for your continued efforts in seeing to it that our laws—and as a result, our nation—are respected.”

On [April 11, 2017](#), Attorney General Jeff Sessions announced a renewed commitment to criminal immigration enforcement. As part of that announcement, the Attorney General issued a memorandum to all federal prosecutors and directed them to prioritize the prosecution of certain criminal immigration offenses.

Today’s zero-tolerance policy further directs each U.S. Attorney’s Office along the Southwest Border (i.e., Southern District of California, District of Arizona, District of New Mexico, Western District of Texas, and the Southern District of Texas) to adopt a policy to prosecute all Department of Homeland Security referrals of section 1325(a) violations, to the extent practicable.

SUBJECT: Ending "Catch and Release" at the Border of the United States and Directing Other Enhancements to Immigration Enforcement

Section 1. Purpose. (a) Human smuggling operations, smuggling of drugs and other contraband, and entry of gang members and other criminals at the border of the United States threaten our national security and public safety. The backlog of immigration-related cases in our administrative system is alarmingly large and has hindered the expeditious adjudication of outstanding cases. Border-security and immigration-enforcement personnel shortages have become critical.

(b) In Executive Order 13767 of January 25, 2017 (Border Security and Immigration Enforcement Improvements), I directed the Secretary of Homeland Security to issue new policy guidance regarding the appropriate and consistent use of detention authority under the Immigration and Nationality Act (INA), including the termination of the practice known as "catch and release," whereby aliens are released in the United States shortly after their apprehension for violations of our immigration laws. On February 20, 2017, the Secretary issued a memorandum taking steps to end "catch and release" practices. These steps have produced positive results. Still, more must be done to enforce our laws and to protect our country from the dangers of releasing detained aliens into our communities while their immigration claims are pending.

Therefore, by the authority vested in me as President by the Constitution and the laws of the United States of America, I hereby direct as follows:

Sec. 2. Ending "Catch and Release". (a) Within 45 days of the date of this memorandum, the Secretary of Homeland Security, in coordination with the Secretary of Defense, the Attorney General, and the Secretary of Health and Human Services, shall submit a report to the President detailing all measures that their respective departments have pursued or are pursuing to expeditiously end "catch and release" practices. At a minimum, such report shall address the following:

(i) All measures taken pursuant to section 5(a) of Executive Order 13767 to allocate all legally available resources to construct, operate, control, or modify -- or establish contracts to construct, operate, control, or modify -- facilities to detain aliens for violations of immigration law at or near the borders of the United States;

(ii) All measures taken pursuant to section 5(b) of Executive Order 13767 to assign asylum officers to immigration detention facilities for the purpose of accepting asylum referrals and conducting credible fear determinations and reasonable fear determinations;

(iii) All measures taken pursuant to section 6 of Executive Order 13767 to ensure the detention of aliens

apprehended for violations of immigration law;

(iv) All measures taken pursuant to section 11(a) of Executive Order 13767 to ensure that the parole and asylum provisions of Federal immigration law are not illegally exploited to prevent the removal of otherwise removable aliens;

(v) All measures taken pursuant to section 11(b) of Executive Order 13767 to ensure that asylum referrals and credible fear determinations pursuant to section 235(b)(1) of the INA (8 U.S.C. 1125(b)(1)) and 8 CFR 208.30, and reasonable fear determinations pursuant to 8 CFR 208.31, are conducted in a manner consistent with those provisions;

(vi) All measures taken pursuant to section 6 of Executive Order 13768 of January 25, 2017 (Enhancing Public Safety in the Interior of the United States), to ensure the assessment and collection of all authorized fines and penalties from aliens unlawfully present in the United States and from those who facilitate their unlawful presence in the United States;

(vii) A detailed list of all existing facilities, including military facilities, that could be used, modified, or repurposed to detain aliens for violations of immigration law at or near the borders of the United States; and

(viii) The number of credible fear and reasonable fear claims received, granted, and denied -- broken down by the purported protected ground upon which a credible fear or reasonable fear claim was made -- in each year since the beginning of fiscal year 2009.

(b) Within 75 days of the date of this memorandum, the Attorney General and the Secretary of Homeland Security, in consultation with the Secretary of Defense and the Secretary of Health and Human Services, shall submit a report to the President identifying any additional resources or authorities that may be needed to expeditiously end "catch and release" practices.

Sec. 3. Return of Removable Aliens to Their Home Countries or

~~SEC. 3. REPORT OF MEMORABLE REASONS TO THESE NAME COUNTRIES OF~~
Countries of Origin. Within 60 days of the date of this memorandum, the Secretary of State and the Secretary of Homeland Security shall submit a report to the President detailing all measures, including diplomatic measures, that are being pursued against countries that refuse to expeditiously accept the repatriation of their nationals. The report shall include all measures taken pursuant to section 12 of Executive Order 13768 to implement the sanctions authorized by section 243(d) of the INA (8 U.S.C. 1253(d)), or a detailed explanation as to why such sanctions have not yet been imposed.

Sec. 4. General Provisions. (a) Nothing in this memorandum shall be construed to impair or otherwise affect:

(i) the authority granted by law to an executive department or agency, or the head thereof; or

(ii) the functions of the Director of the Office of Management and Budget relating to budgetary, administrative, or legislative proposals.

(b) This memorandum shall be implemented consistent with applicable law and subject to the availability of appropriations.

(c) This memorandum is not intended to, and does not, create any right or benefit, substantive or procedural, enforceable at law or in equity by any party against the United States, its departments, agencies, or entities, its officers, employees, or agents, or any other person.

(d) The Secretary of State is hereby authorized and directed to publish this memorandum in the *Federal Register*.

**Luchese Crime Family Soldier and Organized Crime Associate Plead
Guilty to Conspiring to Illegally Distribute Oxycodone**

BROOKLYN, NY - Earlier today, at the federal courthouse in Brooklyn, Anthony

Grado, a member of the Luchese organized crime family, and Lawrence Tranesé, an organized crime associate, pleaded guilty to conspiracy to distribute oxycodone. The proceeding was before United States Magistrate Judge Sanket J. Bulsara. Richard P. Donoghue, United States Attorney for the Eastern District of New York, William F. Sweeney, Jr., Assistant Director-in-Charge, Federal Bureau of Investigation, New York Field Office (FBI), and James P. O'Neill, Commissioner, New York City Police Department (NYPD), announced the guilty pleas.

Lawrence Man Pleads Guilty to Heroin and Fentanyl Distribution Conspiracy

CONCORD, NH - United States Attorney Scott W. Murray announced today that Miguel Vasquez, 23, of Lawrence, Massachusetts, pleaded guilty to participating in a drug trafficking conspiracy. According to court documents and statements made in court, from at least January of 2017 through July of 2017, Vasquez made deliveries of heroin and fentanyl to customers of a drug organization working out of a residence on Water Street in Lawrence. Customers, including customers from New Hampshire, would call to order drugs and Vasquez and others would drive to locations in Methuen and Salisbury, Massachusetts to deliver the drugs.

New Haven Man Sentenced to 5 Years in Federal Prison for Distributing Heroin

NEW HAVEN, CT - John H. Durham, United States Attorney for the District of Connecticut, announced that ANDRE MILLER, 27, of New Haven, was sentenced today by U.S. District Judge Jeffrey A. Meyer in New Haven to 60 months of imprisonment, followed by four years of supervised release, for his role in a heroin trafficking ring. According to court documents and statements made in court, the DEA's New Haven Tactical Diversion Squad targeted a New Haven-based heroin trafficking organization led by Bienvenido and Antonio Gonzalez. The investigation, which included court-authorized wiretaps, controlled purchases of narcotics and physical and video surveillance, revealed that the Gonzalez brothers regularly purchased bulk quantities of heroin from suppliers located in the Bronx, New York, and sold the heroin through a network of redistributors, including MILLER, in New Haven and elsewhere.

Violent Crime

Ten Alleged Members Of Surenos Gang Charged With Murder And Related Crimes

SAN FRANCISCO, CA- A federal grand jury indicted ten people alleged to be members of a racketeering enterprise described as "the 19th Street/16th Street Surenos" for their respective roles in seven alleged murders, announced Acting United States Attorney Alex G. Tse and U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement's (ICE) Homeland Security Investigations (HSI) Special Agent in Charge Ryan L. Spradlin. The indictment, filed March 20, 2018, was unsealed today following the arrest of six defendants. A seventh defendant was taken into custody from the Santa Clara County Jail. Three other defendants are currently in the custody of the U.S. Bureau of Prisons, and are expected to make their appearances in court in the coming weeks.

MS-13 Gang Member Pleads Guilty To Retaliation Murder On Long Island

NEW YORK, NY - Earlier today, at the federal courthouse in Central Islip, Edwin Amaya-Sanchez (“Strong”), a member of the Guanacos Little Cycos Salvatruchas clique of La Mara Salvatrucha, also known as the MS-13, a transnational criminal organization, pleaded guilty to firearms-related murder charges in connection with his participation in the July 14, 2014 murder of Jose Lainez-Murcia, who was shot and killed while sitting in a car outside his home in Brentwood. The guilty plea was entered before United States District Judge Joseph F. Bianco.

Gila River Man Sentenced to 25 Years in Prison for Murder

PHOENIX, AZ – On April 6, 2018, Philip Anthony Osife, 28, a member of the Gila River Indian Community, was sentenced by U.S. District Judge John J. Tuchi to 25 years in prison. Osife had previously pleaded guilty to second-degree murder. On March 23, 2017, Osife shot one victim twice in the face, and he shot a second victim in the neck, killing them both. Osife took the one victim’s car and left the victims there near a canal bank. A passing motorist found the victims two days later and then called the police.

Immigration

Sinaloa Cartel Trafficker Sentenced; Jesus Manuel Salazar-Nunez Sent Tractor-Trailers Packed With Methamphetamine, Cocaine And Heroin Into The United States

SAN DIEGO, CA – Sinaloa Cartel drug trafficker Jesus Manuel Salazar-Nunez was sentenced to 135 months in prison today and 5 years of supervised release for his role in a drug trafficking cell responsible for shipping methamphetamine, cocaine, and heroin from Mexico for importation into San Diego. According to court records, in 2015, Drug Enforcement Administration agents intercepted the communications of Salazar-Nunez and other high-level Sinaloa Cartel members making arrangements for tractor-trailers to travel from Sinaloa, Mexico to Baja California, Mexico, carrying methamphetamine, cocaine, and heroin hidden among canned food and drinks, frozen shrimp and vegetable boxes and other household goods. Once they arrived at a Tijuana warehouse, the narcotics were unloaded, distributed to couriers and smuggled into San Diego, California.

MS-13 Leader Who Illegally Entered The United States Sentenced To 19 Years In Prison

BOSTON, MA – A leader of MS-13’s Enfermos Criminales Salvatrucha clique was sentenced yesterday in federal court in Boston. Rafael Leoner Aguirre, a/k/a “Tremendo,” 22, a Salvadoran national, was sentenced by U.S. District Court Judge F. Dennis Saylor IV to 19 years in prison and three years of supervised release, which he will begin serving after completion of the state prison sentence for which he is currently incarcerated. Leoner Aguirre will also be subject to deportation upon the completion of his federal sentence. In November 2017, Leoner Aguirre was convicted by a federal jury after a multi-week trial of conspiracy to conduct enterprise affairs through a pattern of racketeering activity, more commonly referred to as RICO conspiracy.

Truck Driver Sentenced for Alien Smuggling Resulting in Death

CORPUS CHRISTI, TX – A 45-year-old Weslaco man has been ordered to federal prison following his conviction of human smuggling which resulted in the death of an undocumented alien trapped inside a toolbox, announced U.S. Attorney Ryan K. Patrick. Juan Enrique Escobedo-Moreno pleaded guilty Jan. 5, 2018, admitting he smuggled the victim in his tractor trailer. The victim died after being trapped

He straggled the victim in his tractor trailer. The victim died after being trapped in a toolbox measuring only 30 inches long, 26 inches wide and 16 inches deep.

JUSTICE DEPARTMENT SECURES DENATURALIZATION OF CHILD SEXUAL ABUSER AND FOUR SOMALIA-BORN INDIVIDUALS WHO FALSELY CLAIMED TO BE A FAMILY AND WERE ADMITTED TO THE UNITED STATES ON DIVERSITY IMMIGRANT VISAS

WASHINGTON – On April 11, the Department of Justice secured the denaturalization of two individuals – one convicted of engaging in sexual contact with a minor, and the other who fictitiously created a family to secure a Diversity Immigrant Visa. Judge Joe Fish of the U.S. District Court for the Northern District of Texas entered an order to revoke the U.S. citizenship of Emmanuel Olugbenga Omopariola, and Judge Susan Richard Nelson of the U.S. District Court for the District of Minnesota entered an order to revoke the U.S. citizenship of Fosia Abdi Adan.

The court found that prior to naturalizing, Omopariola, 61, engaged in sexual contact with a seven-year-old minor, which he admitted and for which he was later convicted. This prior conduct rendered Omopariola ineligible for applying for U.S. citizenship because he did not show the moral conduct necessary for naturalization. Additionally, throughout his naturalization proceedings Omopariola misrepresented and hid his unlawful activity.

During litigation, Adan, 51, conceded that she had procured her U.S. citizenship by willful misrepresentation and concealment of material facts, including the fraudulent nature of her relationship to individuals she claimed to be her children. In light of that admission, the court found that Adan had unlawfully procured her U.S. citizenship.

The denaturalization of Adan marks the culmination of the government’s case against four individuals—a purported husband, wife, and two sons—who unlawfully, knowingly, and fraudulently represented to immigration officials that they were a family in order to gain admission to the United States through the Diversity Immigrant Visa Program, which they later used to obtain U.S. citizenship. Judge Nelson entered orders revoking the naturalized U.S. citizenship of Adan’s purported husband, Ahmed Mohamed Warsame aka Jama Solob Kayre, 53, on Feb. 27, 2018, and her purported sons, Mustaf Abdi Adan aka Mohamed Jama Solob, 33, and Faysal Jama Mire aka Mobarak Jama Solob, 31, on March 19, 2018. All four individuals consented to the entry of orders of denaturalization.

“The current immigration system is too often abused by fraudsters and nefarious actors. These cases are prime examples of the unfortunate fraud that is all too common within our immigration system,” said Attorney General Jeff Sessions. “The Department will continue to investigate and prosecute others who conceal their heinous crimes, and those who seek to rely on fraudulent

relationships to become naturalized United States citizens.

The Omopariola matter was referred to the Department of Justice by U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) Homeland Security Investigations (HSI). The other four cases, *United States v. Fosia Abdi Adan*; *United States v. Ahmed Mohamed Warsame*; *United States v. Mustaf Abdi Adan*; and *United States v. Faysal Jama Mire*, were referred to the Department of Justice by the U.S. Department of State's Diplomatic Security Service (DSS) and ICE, with investigative support from HSI and U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services' (USCIS) Fraud Detection and National Security Directorate.

"The integrity of our consular processes is a core element of U.S. national security," said Assistant Secretary of State for Consular Affairs Carl Risch. "The Department of State works closely with the Justice Department efforts to detect, deter, and combat fraud related to U.S. travel documents. These denaturalizations demonstrate the value of this important interagency collaboration; a partnership that allows us to facilitate travel by qualified individuals in the context of ensuring a strong and secure U.S. border."

The Texas case was investigated by HSI and the Civil Division's Office of Immigration Litigation, District Court Section (OIL-DCS). The case was handled by OIL-DCS's National Security and Affirmative Litigation Unit and the U.S. Attorney's Office for the Northern District of Texas, with support from ICE's Office of the Principal Legal Advisor.

These Minnesota cases were investigated by DSS, ICE, USCIS, and the OIL-DCS. The cases were prosecuted by Senior Litigation Counsel Anthony D. Bianco and Trial Attorney Kathryne M. Gray of OIL-DCS, with support from Senior Attorney Lucia A. Fiorentino and former Attorney Sarah Mazzie of ICE's Office of the Principal Legal Advisor, and DSS.



WASHINGTON--The Department of Justice today [filed](#) criminal charges against eleven different suspected members of the so-called "caravan" in the United States District Court for the Southern District of California, announced Attorney

General Jeff Sessions and U.S. Attorney for the Southern District of California Adam Braverman. All defendants are alleged to have illegally entered the country in violation of 8 U.S.C § 1325, and one defendant is also alleged to have been previously deported and was charged with 8 U.S.C § 1326 (illegal reentry).

“When respect for the rule of law diminishes, so too does our ability to protect our great nation, its borders, and its citizens,” said Attorney General Jeff Sessions. “The United States will not stand by as our immigration laws are ignored and our nation’s safety is jeopardized. U.S. Attorney Adam Braverman and his team should be commended for quickly filing illegal entry charges for individuals apprehended along the southwestern border. We will continue to work with our partners in each U.S. Attorney’s Offices to aggressively pursue prosecutions of criminal illegal entry.”

“The American Dream has beckoned immigrants from across the globe because of the promise that prosperity and success are within reach for all,” said United States Attorney for the Southern District of California Adam L. Braverman. “Those immigrants have contributed their voices and perspectives to make up our uniquely American experience. But the foundation for the American Dream, and what allows our democracy to flourish, is commitment to the rule of law. These eleven defendants face charges now because they believed themselves to be above the law. Those seeking entry into the United States must pledge fidelity to the law, not break them, or else face criminal prosecution.”

According to the complaints, defendants were apprehended by Border Patrol in the following areas known as: Goat Canyon, 35 Draw, Eucci Grove, and W-8. Goat Canyon, 35 Draw, and Eucci Grove are approximately four miles west of the San Ysidro, California Port of Entry, and W-8 is approximately two miles west of San Ysidro.

The complaints allege that the defendants knowingly and willingly entered into the United States at a time and place other than as designated by Immigration Officers, and eluded examination and inspection by Immigration Officers.

A complaint contains allegations, and a defendant is presumed innocent unless and until proven guilty beyond a reasonable doubt in a court of law.

JUSTICE DEPARTMENT ANNOUNCES ADDITIONAL PROSECUTORS AND IMMIGRATION JUDGES FOR SOUTHWEST BORDER CRISIS

WASHINGTON – Attorney General Jeff Sessions today announced the dedication of additional prosecutors to handle the prosecutions of improper entry, illegal reentry, and alien smuggling cases, and additional immigration judges to handle the adjudication of immigration court cases that result from the crisis at the Southwest border.

Thirty-five new Assistant United States Attorney (AUSA) positions have been allocated to U.S. Attorney’s Offices along the Southwest border. The breakdown of those positions is as follows:

- [Southern District of Texas](#): Eight (8);
- [Southern District of California](#): Eight (8);
- [Western District of Texas](#): Seven (7);
- [District of Arizona](#): Six (6); and,
- [District of New Mexico](#): Six (6).

“The American people made very clear their desire to secure our borders and prioritize the public safety and national security of our homeland,” said Attorney General Jeff Sessions. “Promoting and enforcing the rule of law is essential to our republic. By deploying these additional resources to the Southwest border, the Justice Department and the Trump Administration take yet another step in protecting our nation, its borders, and its citizens. It must be clear that there is no right to demand entry without justification.”

Due to a recent increase in the number of apprehensions at the Southwest border, the new AUSA positions announced today will assist in the

border, the new AUSA positions announced today will assist in the prosecutions of illegal reentry (8 U.S.C. § 1326), alien smuggling (8 U.S.C. § 1324), and improper entry (8 U.S.C. § 1325) pursuant to the Justice Department’s “Zero-Tolerance Policy” [announced](#) by Attorney General Sessions on April 6, 2018 and its prior April 11, 2017 directive to AUSAs to prioritize charging immigration offenses.

In addition to the new AUSA positions, Attorney General Sessions and [Executive Office for Immigration Review \(EOIR\)](#) Director James McHenry announced the utilization of 18 current supervisory immigration judges to adjudicate cases in immigration courts near the southwest border. The supervisory immigration judges will hear cases in-person and use video conferencing (VTC) to handle cases at immigration courts and represent a roughly 50 percent increase in the current number of immigration judges:

“The Justice Department, under Attorney General Jeff Sessions, has made significant reforms and progress in tackling the overwhelming backlog in the immigration court system,” said EOIR Director James McHenry. “We must not let attempts to undermine our lawful immigration system deter that progress, and the men and women at EOIR are proud to play a small role in the Attorney General’s response to the crisis at our Southwest border.”

Between March and September 2017, EOIR mobilized over one hundred immigration judges to Department of Homeland Security detention facilities across the country, including along the Southwest border. In October, EOIR [projected](#) that the mobilized immigration judges—hearing both in-person and VTC cases—completed approximately 2,700 more cases than expected if the immigration judges had not been detailed.

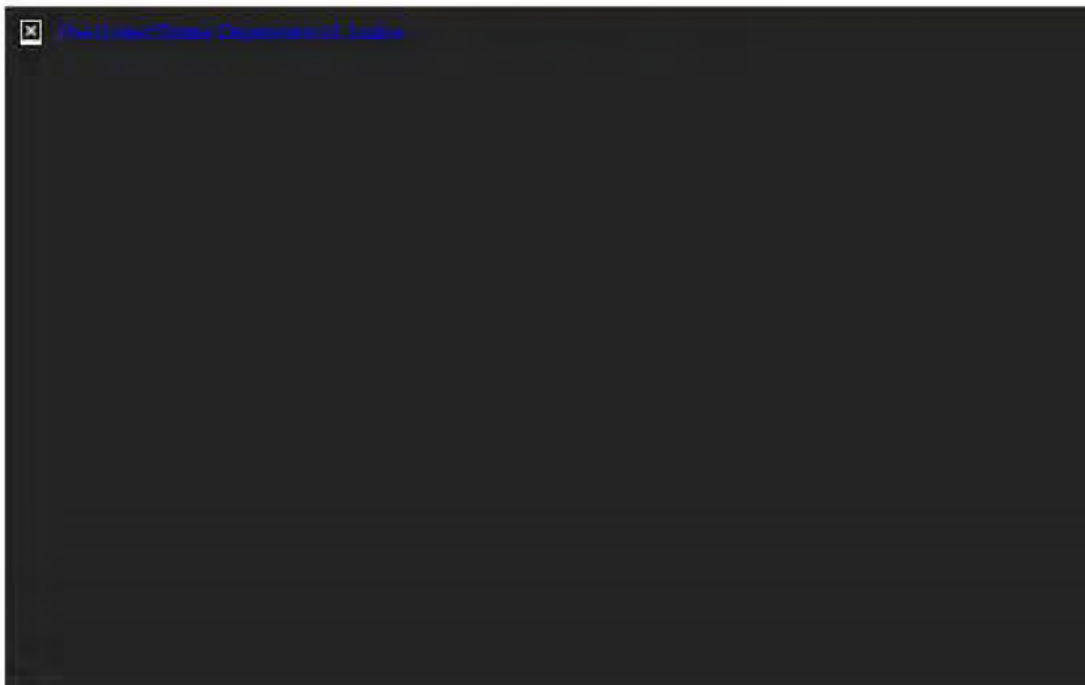

Local authorities plan to hold **Press Conference on Monday**. 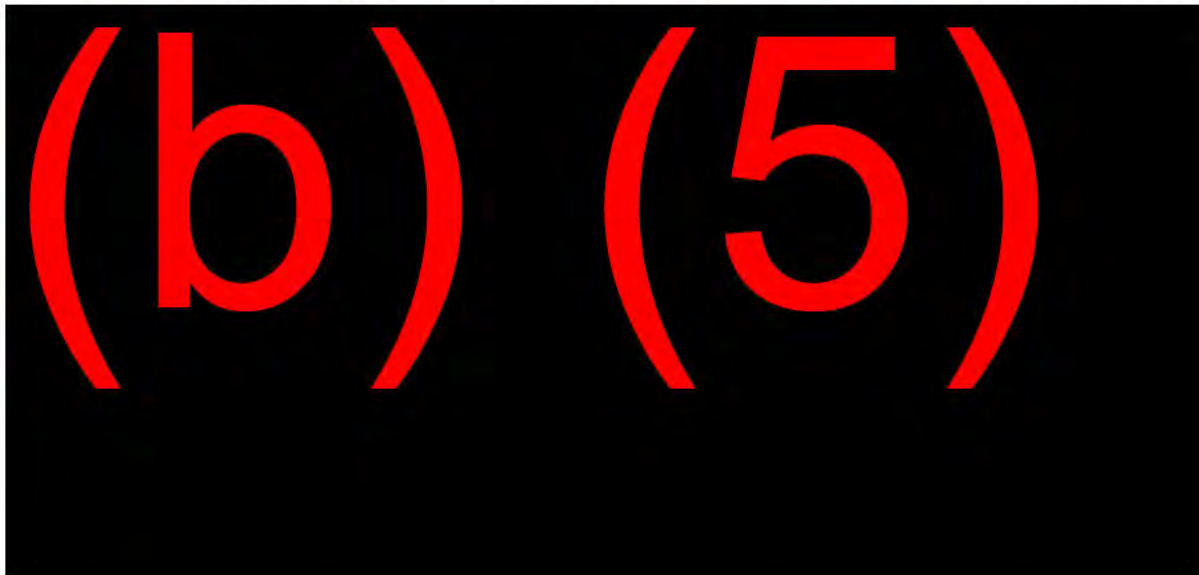

Attorney General Jeff Sessions today signed his order and opinion in the *Matter of Castro-Tum*. Please attribute the following statement to Justice Department spokesman [Devin O'Malley](#):

“Starting in 2012, immigration judges began increasingly to rely on administrative closures, which suspended cases indefinitely rather than actually rendering a final decision. Congress never granted such broad authority to immigration judges, nor had the Attorney General delegated it. This process—where immigration court cases were put ‘out of sight, out of mind’—effectively resulted in illegal aliens remaining indefinitely in the United States without any formal legal status. Today’s opinion by Attorney General Sessions promotes the rule of law in the immigration system and eliminates the unfettered use of administrative closures.”

Background:

- On June 17, 2011, Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) issued a [memo](#) that provided “guidance on the exercise of prosecutorial discretion to ensure that the agency’s immigration enforcement resources are focused on the agency’s enforcement priorities.”
- Two years later, the Executive Office for Immigration Review (EOIR) issued a [memo](#) promoting the use of administrative closures and continuances.
 - The ICE memo informed their attorneys that they “may exercise prosecutorial discretion in any immigration removal proceeding before EOIR...”
- From October 1, 2011 through September 30, 2017, 215,285 cases were administratively closed. This represents 76% of the total cases that were administratively closed in the 31-year period between FY80 and FY11.
- On January 4, 2018, Attorney General Jeff Sessions [directed](#) the Board of Immigration Appeals (BIA) to refer its decision in the Matter of Castro-Tum to him for review, an authority provided to the Office of the Attorney General by [8 C.F.R. § 1003.1\(h\)\(1\)\(i\)](#).
 - The following chart represents the number of cases that have been administratively closed, but have yet to be recalendared. This total is not counted in the total pending caseload, which sits at approximately 690,000.

Key Excerpts:

- “Immigration judges and the Board have come to rely upon administrative closure without thoroughly explaining their authority to do so. Unlike the power to grant continuances, which the regulations expressly confer, immigration judges and the Board lack a general authority to grant administrative closure. No Attorney General has delegated such broad authority, and legal or policy arguments do not justify it. I therefore hold that immigration judges and the Board lack this authority except where a previous regulation or settlement agreement has expressly conferred it.”
(Section III; page 9)
- “This certified case demonstrates how administrative closure particularly undermines the INA’s mandate to swiftly adjudicate immigration cases when the respondent fails to appear.” (page 2)
 - “The current practice of administrative closure lacks a valid legal foundation, and I do not believe it would be appropriate to delegate such authority.” (Section III.B; page 17)
 - “In the other administratively closed cases, immigration judges and the Board ordered administrative closure without the authority to do so. I am cognizant of the need to return these cases to the active docket so that these matters can proceed expeditiously. Requiring recalendaring of all of these cases immediately, however, would likely overwhelm the immigration courts and undercut the efficient administration of immigration law.”
(Section IV; page 17)
 - “Consequently, I now order that all cases that are currently administratively closed may remain closed unless DHS or the respondent requests recalendaring.” (Section IV; page 17)

Additional EOIR Background:

- If you are reporting on the backlog, you can use the following statement from DOJ spokesman Devin O'Malley: "Many of the policies in recent years have contributed to a three-fold increase of the immigration courts' pending caseload. This massive increase necessitated the Justice Department's 'Strategic Caseload Reduction Plan,' a series of common-sense reforms that aim to reduce the so-called 'backlog' by realigning the agency towards completing cases, increasing both productivity and capacity, and changing policies that lead to inefficiencies and waste."
 - For your background on the Strategic Caseload Reduction Plan:
 - A streamlined hiring plan for immigration judges that reduces the hiring time from 762 days to 6-8 months. Under Attorney General Sessions's leadership, we have already reached a reduction to 10 months, and we are confident we will hit the 6-8 month goal this year.
 - Requested—and received—funding that decreases the ratio of judges to clerks from 2:1 to 1:1, which will increase efficiency and productivity.
 - EOIR is actively working with GSA to identify new space and to expedite build-outs of existing space.
 - EOIR is planning to pilot Video Conferencing (VTC) immigration adjudication centers (IACs), where IJs will adjudicate cases from around the country.
 - EOIR is working to replace an antiquated paper filing system to an electronic filing system, and a pilot program for that will soon be established.

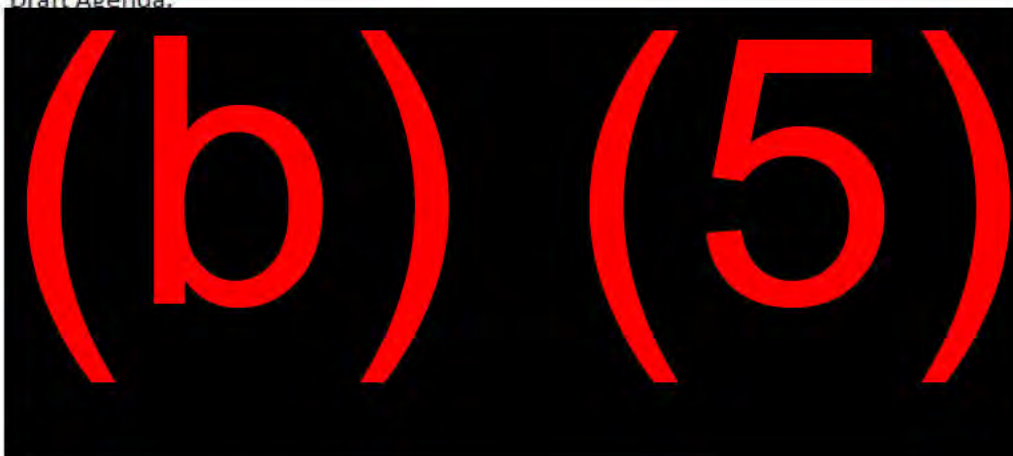

Two Dozen Ms-13 Gang Members Indicted on Federal Racketeering Charges

Fifth Superseding Indictment Adds Eight Additional Defendants and New Charges Relating to Three 2016 Murders on Long Island, as well as Attempted Murders, Assaults, Arson, Drug Trafficking and Firearms Offenses

A 73-count fifth superseding indictment was unsealed today in the United States District Court for the Eastern District of New York in Central Islip, New York, charging two dozen members of La Mara Salvatrucha, also known as the MS-13, a transnational criminal organization, with racketeering and related offenses. This indictment adds eight additional defendants, seven of whom are in custody, and offenses in connection with the April 29, 2016 murder of Oscar Acosta in Brentwood, the July 18, 2016 attempted murder of two suspected rival gang members in Brentwood, the August 10, 2016 attempted murder of rival gang members in Brentwood, the September 12, 2016 arson of two vehicles in Brentwood, the October 10, 2016 murder of Javier Castillo in Freeport, the October 13, 2016 murder of Dewann Stacks in Brentwood, the

December 18, 2016 assault outside Super Taco restaurant in Brentwood, and a conspiracy to distribute marijuana. In total, 15 murders committed by MS-13 members have been charged in the fifth superseding indictment and underlying indictments in this case.

Seven of the newly added defendants are scheduled to be arraigned this afternoon before United States District Judge Joseph F. Bianco at the federal courthouse in Central Islip, and the previously charged defendants will be arraigned at their next scheduled court appearances.

Attorney General Jeff Sessions, Richard P. Donoghue, United States Attorney for the Eastern District of New York, William F. Sweeney, Jr., Assistant Director-in-Charge, Federal Bureau of Investigation, New York Field Office (FBI), Geraldine Hart, Commissioner, Suffolk County Police Department (SCPD), and Patrick J. Ryder, Commissioner, Nassau County Police Department (NCPD), announced the charges.

“The Department of Justice will not allow MS-13 to terrorize our citizens or control our communities,” said Attorney General Jeff Sessions. “With more than 10,000 members across 40 states, MS-13 is one of the most dangerous groups in America. The day that I was sworn in as Attorney General, President Trump ordered me to focus on dismantling transnational criminal organizations like MS-13, which is based in El Salvador. We have followed that order, working with our allies to arrest or charge thousands of MS-13 members across the Western Hemisphere since then. When I visited Long Island last year, people told me about how the MS-13 threat was inflicting violence and fear on the community. And so I want to thank our Assistant U.S. Attorneys John Durham, Paul Scotti, Michael Keilty, and Raymond Tierney as well as our state and local law enforcement partners in New York for all of their hard work on this case and so many other MS-13 cases. Today’s indictment is our next step toward taking this despicable gang off the streets for good.”

“The charges in this indictment further demonstrate the utter brutality of the MS-13 and the havoc the gang inflicts on our communities,” stated United States Attorney Donoghue. “This Office and our law enforcement partners will continue to combat the MS-13’s violence with relentless perseverance until the gang is dismantled and its

members are brought to justice.” Mr. Donoghue expressed his sincere thanks to all the members of the FBI’s Long Island Gang Task Force, as well as the Drug Enforcement Administration for their outstanding work on the investigation.

“The charges and arrests detailed here show our relentless efforts to dismantle and eradicate MS-13 in communities on Long Island,” stated FBI Assistant Director-in-Charge Sweeney. “The unbelievable partnerships and relationships we’ve built with the law enforcement agencies on our Long Island Gang Task Force have allowed us to make a huge dent in the havoc created in recent years by MS-13. Our work isn’t over, and we won’t stop our pursuit until the community no longer fears the violence and deadly attacks by this gang.”

“MS-13 gang activity and the accompanying senseless acts of violence will not be tolerated in Suffolk County, and these developments ensure that these dangerous individuals will no longer be a threat to our communities,” stated SCPD Commissioner Hart. “The Suffolk County Police Department will continue its partnership with the FBI’s Long Island Gang Task Force as part of its multi-pronged approach and unrelenting pursuit to dismantle MS-13.”

“This Indictment is another clear example of how the members of MS-13 have disrupted the communities that they live in,” stated NCPD Commissioner Ryder. “So many lives have been negatively affected and the loss of life at their hands will never be tolerated. I would like to congratulate all of the investigating agencies and their members for their dedication and professionalism. Every member of MS-13 that is involved in criminality and is eventually incarcerated, is another step to creating a safer environment for our residents and their children.”

As set forth in court filings, including a detention memorandum filed earlier today, a majority of the new charges pertain to a series of crimes committed by members of the Sailors Locos Salvatruchas Westside (“Sailors”) clique during 2016, including the murders of Oscar Acosta, Javier Castillo and Dewann Stacks.

Kevin Torres, the leader of the Sailors clique in New York, and Alexi Saenz, the leader of the Brentwood chapter of the Sailors clique, authorized Acosta’s murder because he was suspected of being a rival 18th Street gang member. On April 29, 2016, Nelson

Argueta-Quintanilla and other MS-13 members encountered Acosta, beat him with tree limbs, tied him up, and called co-defendants Alexi Saenz, Jairo Saenz, Jonathan Hernandez and others, who met them. The gang members loaded Acosta into the trunk of a car, drove to a more isolated wooded area in Brentwood, stabbed and slashed Acosta to death with a machete and buried his body, which was not recovered until September 2016.

On October 10, 2016, Alexi Saenz, Jairo Saenz, Wilber Adalberto Fernandez-Vasquez, Frank Alexander Ventura-Ramirez, and other MS-13 members murdered Javier Castillo, who they also suspected of being a rival 18th Street gang member. The defendants lured Castillo, who lived in Central Islip, to Cow Meadow Park in Freeport, where they attacked and killed him with a machete and buried his body in a shallow grave near a saltwater marsh. Castillo's body was not recovered until October 2017.

On October 13, 2016, only three days after the Castillo murder, Alexi Saenz, Jairo Saenz, Enrique Portillo, Ever Flores and other MS-13 members murdered Dewann Stacks, who they suspected was a rival gang member. While Alexi Saenz and other members of the gang conducted surveillance from one car, Portillo, Flores and another MS-13 gang member attacked and killed Stacks with a baseball bat and machetes before returning to the getaway vehicle driven by Jairo Saenz.

Various members of the Sailors clique are newly charged with four non-fatal violent crimes that occurred during 2016. On July 18, 2016, Alexi Saenz, Jairo Saenz and Portillo attempted to murder two rival gang members in Brentwood. One of those men was shot, and the other man was both shot and repeatedly slashed with a machete, leaving him permanently disfigured. On August 10, 2016, Alexi Saenz, Jairo Saenz, Argueta-Quintanilla, Hernandez and Marlon Serrano attempted to murder rival gang members in Brentwood, where numerous shots were fired, but no one was wounded. On September 12, 2016, Alexi Saenz, Jairo Saenz, Portillo and Serrano set fire to two vehicles at the residence of an individual who had a dispute with the MS-13. On December 18, 2016, Jose Suarez and Flores assaulted two men who were disrespectful toward the MS-13 outside a Super Taco restaurant in Brentwood.

Finally, the fifth superseding indictment adds marijuana and cocaine conspiracy charges against Suarez. Argueta-Quintanilla. Fernandez-Vasquez. Flores. Hernandez.

Serrano, Torres and Ventura-Ramirez, and separate marijuana conspiracy charges against Jerlin Villalta, a member of the Freeport Locos Salvatruchas clique of the MS-13.

In addition to the three new murders, 12 other murders previously were charged in this case, including, the May 26, 2013 murder of Derrick Mayes, the May 28, 2013 murder of Keenan Russell, the July 14, 2014 murder of Jose Lainez-Murcia, the June 30, 2015 murder of Jonathan Cardona-Hernandez, the June 3, 2016 murder of Jose Pena, the September 13, 2016 murders of Kayla Cuevas and Nisa Mickens, the January 30, 2017 murder of Esteban Alvarado-Bonilla, and the April 11, 2017 murders of Justin Llivicura, Michael Lopez, Jorge Tigre and Jefferson Villalobos, as well as numerous attempted murders and assaults.

The charges in the fifth superseding indictment are merely allegations, and the defendants are presumed innocent unless and until proven guilty.

Today's superseding indictment is the latest in a series of federal prosecutions by the United States Attorney's Office for the Eastern District of New York targeting members of the MS-13, a violent international criminal organization. The MS-13's leadership is based in El Salvador and Honduras, but the gang has thousands of members across the United States, comprised primarily of immigrants from Central America. With numerous branches, or "cliques," the MS-13 is the largest and most violent street gang on Long Island. Since 2003, hundreds of MS-13 members, including dozens of clique leaders, have been convicted on federal felony charges in the Eastern District of New York. A majority of those MS-13 members have been convicted on federal racketeering charges for participating in murders, attempted murders and assaults. Since 2010, this Office has obtained indictments charging MS-13 members with carrying out more than 45 murders in the Eastern District of New York, and has convicted dozens of MS-13 leaders and members in connection with those murders. These prosecutions are the product of investigations led by the FBI's Long Island Gang Task Force, comprising agents and officers of the FBI, Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives, U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement – Homeland Security Investigations, SCPD, NCPD, Nassau County Sheriff's Department, Suffolk County Probation, Suffolk County Sheriff's Department, Rockville Centre Police Department and the New York State Police.

The government's case is being prosecuted by the Office's Long Island Criminal Division. Assistant United States Attorneys John J. Durham, Paul G. Scotti, Michael T. Keilty and Raymond A. Tierney are in charge of the prosecution.

I hope that the data below is helpful to you. Please do not attribute it to me or to the Department of Justice—I've put these together based upon a variety of sources, and some of this data is not publicly available—but I am certain that it will help to provide some context for you:

Points and Data re: Crisis at the Southwest Border

[NOTE: DATA SOURCES ARE PROVIDED WHERE AVAILABLE. SOME DATA SOURCES ARE INTERNAL TO THE UNITED STATES GOVERNMENT]

- **Our immigration system has no integrity if those who are ordered removed are not ultimately removed from the United States.**
 - The appropriate metric for success is not how many aliens appear for their hearings in immigration court.
 - Instead, the ultimate measure of success is our ability to remove those aliens who have been ordered to leave the United States.
 - Because of limitations on our ability to detain family units and

unaccompanied alien children, we are removing a statistically insignificant number of family units and unaccompanied alien children.

- **Illegal aliens and criminal organizations are exploiting loopholes in our immigration system, which is clearly demonstrated by the increasing number of apprehensions at the southwestern border:**
 - Family Unit Apprehensions at the SWB (between Ports of Entry) by Fiscal Year (source) (this does not include Family Units encountered at Ports of Entry, which is a large number):
 - FY 2013: 14,855
 - FY 2014: 68,445
 - FY 2015: 39,838
 - Note: Judge Gee's order limiting ICE's ability to detain children who came with their parents was issued in Calendar Year 2015.
 - FY 2016: 77,674
 - FY 2017: 75,622
 - FY 2018 YTD (source): 59,113 through May. Average apprehensions between POEs per month = 7,389. Forecasted rate = 88,868 by the end of FY 2018 (and this does not include the total encountered at POEs = 34,650 YTD).
 - **Total FY2013-FY2018YTD: 335,547 members of Family Units apprehended between POEs.**
 - Unaccompanied Alien Children (UAC) Apprehended at the SWB (between Ports of Entry) by Fiscal Year (source) (this does not include UAC encountered at Ports of Entry, which is a large number):
 - FY 2010: 18,411
 - FY 2011: 15,949
 - FY 2012: 24,403
 - FY 2013: 38,759
 - FY 2014: 68,541
 - FY 2015: 39,970
 - FY 2016: 59,692
 - FY 2017: 41,135
 - FY 2018 TYD (source): 32,372 through May. Average apprehensions between POEs per month = 4,046. Forecasted rate = 48,552 by the end of FY 2018 (and this does not include the total encountered at POEs = 6,319 YTD).
 - **Total FY2010-FY2018YTD: 339,232 UAC apprehended between POEs.**
- **We are removing a statistically insignificant number of family units and UAC every year because of our limited ability to detain them and effectuate their ultimate removal from the United States:**
 - Family Unit Removals by Fiscal Year (this counts only family units removed from family residential centers, which functionally equates to nearly all removals of family units) (source is internal ICE data):
 - FY 2014 (after 7/6/2014): 472
 - FY 2015: 1,186
 - FY 2016: 1,902
 - FY 2017: 2,605
 - FY 2018 (through 5/19/2018): 1,915
 - Although not an apples-to-apples comparison (cases can take time to complete), the total number of family unit apprehensions from FY2015-FY2018YTD=173,169. **The total number of family unit removals from FY2015-FY2018 YTD=7,608. Over roughly the same period, there were 252,247 Family Unit apprehensions.**

- There may be a small number of family units who self-deport, and who are Mexican nationals or are otherwise expeditiously removed immediately after apprehension that are not counted in the removal figure. But it is clear that there is a statistically insignificant number of family units removed each fiscal year.
 - Cases can take months or years to complete, but using rough numbers, measuring the total number of removals against the total number of apprehensions, *the total number of Family Units removed from FY2015-FY2018YTD=roughly 2% of total apprehensions over the same period.*
- Unaccompanied Alien Children Removals by Fiscal Year (source is internal ICE data)
- FY 2013: 1,868
 - FY 2014: 1,901
 - FY 2015: 2,065
 - FY 2016: 2,545
 - FY 2017: 3,598
 - FY 2018YTD: 1,151
 - The total number of UAC removals from FY2013-FY2018=13,128. Over roughly the same period, there were 280,649 UAC apprehensions.
 - Cases can take months or years to complete, but using rough numbers, measuring the total number of removals against the total number of apprehensions, *the total number of UACs removed=roughly 4.6% of total apprehensions over the same period.*
- **A growing number of aliens fail to appear for their removal hearings and are removed *in absentia* (these numbers include *all* aliens who failed to appear for their removal hearings—border apprehensions and interior apprehensions—and were ordered removed) (source)**
 - FY 2013: 18,345
 - FY 2014: 22,952
 - FY 2015: 34,686
 - FY 2016: 32,149
 - FY 2017: 40,579
 - FY 2018: 32,278 (through June 15)
 - *The total number of in absentia removal orders from FY 2013-FY 2018=180,989 total in absentia removal orders.*
 - *This number includes aliens from the border and the interior.*
 - **Over 90% of the removals that ICE effectuates each year are from a detained setting (source is internal ICE data). Ankle monitors and other programs may have varying degrees of success at ensuring aliens appear for immigration court proceedings, but they do not ensure the removal of an alien the way that detention does:**
 - *Some have asserted that the “Family Case Management Program” administered during the Obama Administration was a model for success because it helped to ensure that aliens appeared for immigration court hearings, and should be adopted going forward.*
 - **It was an abject failure:**
 - U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement began the Family Case Management Program (FCMP) pilot in September 2015 to increase the rates of compliance with immigration court proceedings by family units encountered at the Southwest Border. The program involved the connection of family units with what amounted to social

workers, with the goal of ensuring that families appeared in immigration court.

- After reviewing the FCMP last year, ICE decided to discontinue the program. The rates of compliance for FCMP were consistent with other monitoring options ICE exercises under Alternatives to Detention (ATD), which proved to be far less expensive. Since the inception of FCMP, **there were only 15 removals** from this program, as opposed to **more than 2,200 from ATD** (which is an equally absurdly low number).
- By discontinuing FCMP, ICE will save more than \$12 million a year - money which can be used to further expand equally effective utilized for other programs which more effectively allow ICE to discharge its enforcement and removal responsibilities.
 - Similarly, the ATD program does not result in the actual removal of aliens from the United States—as evidenced by the total number of actual removals of Family Units and UACs outlined above.
- **Most aliens who are apprehended and pass the initial “credible fear” screening ultimately do not actually file applications for asylum in immigration court proceedings ([source](#)). See the column on the right of the chart below:**
 - Arguably, aliens who have legitimate asylum applications would promptly file asylum applications and seek relief as quickly as possible to ensure their own protection.

The president is racist and is therefore not allowed to follow immigration laws passed by Congress. And a group of largely illegal immigrants have the right to sue the president for not making an elective and temporary relief program passed by Congress mandatory and permanent.

That is the gist of Judge Denise Casper's opinion allowing a group of aliens to go forward with a lawsuit against Trump for ending temporary protected status (TPS) for people from some countries at the designated time it expired.

"This Court finds that the combination of a disparate impact on particular racial groups, statements of animus by people plausibly alleged to be involved in the decision-making process, and an allegedly unreasoned shift in policy sufficient to allege plausibly that a discriminatory purpose was a motivating factor in a decision," wrote Casper in a 42-page ruling. She also cited Trump's pardoning of Joe Arpaio as reason to prohibit him from enforcing immigration law!

Yup, this is another example of how a judge is saying the president must follow the lawless executive actions of past administration and not duly passed statutes because, supposedly, he's a racist.

Bogus TPS is just like bogus asylum

TPS was designed as a temporary relief from deportation. It was never designed as an amnesty program for illegal aliens or as a mass migration scheme for those from impoverished or even dangerous Third World countries. It was a very limited program intended for a tiny population of people who happen to be here legally on vacation, work, or as a student while a natural disaster or armed conflict occurs in their home countries, making it difficult for them to return. Only in those limited cases can the secretary of Homeland Security grant temporary legal status to remain in the country. And of course, this status is discretionary, not mandated by law.

Since 1990, when Congress initiated this limited program, past administrations have offered over 430,000 people status. More than half of them were from El Salvador alone. No, we didn't have tens of thousands of impoverished people who happened to be vacationing in Disney World when a natural disaster hit. Whether

it was the earthquakes in El Salvador and Haiti or hurricanes in Guatemala and Honduras, a number of people who came here illegally or overstayed their visas used these natural disasters as an opportunity to claim TPS. They were erroneously granted such status. Furthermore, whereas the statute only grants the status for 6-18 months, past administrations extended the policy indefinitely.

According to law (INA §244 (b)(1)), TPS may not be designated if the DHS secretary finds that allowing migrants to temporarily stay in the United States is against the national interest or for individuals with criminal convictions. Yet past administrations categorically extended this program without any regard for the effects on Americans and the fact that many of these people should never have been eligible in the first place.

In comes the Trump administration and initially extends most of the TPS designations and then finally ends some of them, while continuing others. Now, Judge Casper, an Obama-appointed federal judge in Boston, has granted standing to TPS recipients from Honduras, Haiti, and El Salvador to sue Trump for following the actual TPS law. Much like those foreign nationals who were granted standing to challenge the "travel ban," these seekers of permanent protected status charge that Trump cannot follow the law because, in their view, he has shown a "dislike and disregard for Latino and black immigrants" and has called their countries "\$#!#holes." Amazingly, yet not surprisingly, this liberal judge ruled that plaintiffs "allege plausibly that a discriminatory purpose was a motivating factor in a decision."

A judge and a ruling without a shred of legitimacy

Although this ruling is not on the merits, the fact that she is allowing such a lawsuit to proceed is astounding on many levels:

- The Supreme Court's [ruling in *Trump v. Hawaii*](#), once again, has been proven impotent in reining in lower courts. Writing for the majority, Chief Justice John Roberts categorically rejected the notion that the president's power to enforce immigration laws can be abridged because of subjective allegations about how nice or mean his political views are to immigrants. This case demonstrates that moving the Supreme Court to the right will do nothing to deter these lower court judges from coming back for more bites at the apple, [as Justice Thomas warned](#).
- These individuals are predominantly illegal aliens and should never get standing to sue. El Salvador was given TPS in 2001 due to an earthquake and Honduras was given TPS due to Hurricane Mitch in 1998. TPS for Haiti was granted because of an earthquake in 2010. There is no way anyone can say with a straight face that the natural disasters are still preventing people from these countries from returning. And no, the fact that these are otherwise miserable countries does not qualify these people for TPS. Either way, these people are mainly illegal aliens who were never stranded here because of natural disasters, and the entire policy is discretionary.
- By far, El Salvador is the home country of most of these bogus TPS claims. It is also the home to MS-13. As [Jessica Vaughn of the Center for Immigration Studies](#) has warned, by liberal judges conferring official status on these people, they have ensured that MS-13 gangsters here illegally are not deported. This is a classic example of how, much as with asylum and unaccompanied alien children, the liberal judges and past administrations have interpreted a statute in the exact opposite manner of its intended purpose. TPS, precisely because it's not an immigration or amnesty program but rather a temporary dwelling, doesn't require the applicants to show "good moral character." Yet the Left has turned it into a permanent amnesty program but still, of course, does not require a showing of good character, which makes it much harder to get rid of the bad guys.

As Vaughn warned, such tragedy already played out in the state of Massachusetts as a result of a judge. "A judge in Massachusetts blocked ICE efforts to remove a Salvadoran MS-13 member who had been convicted of relatively minor crimes, noting that because of his nationality and date of illegal arrival, the offender was eligible for TPS, even though he had not applied for it. ICE did get a second chance, as the gangster later participated in one of the most horrifying crimes in the Boston area at the time, the gang rape of two deaf girls in a public park, one of whom had cerebral palsy and was in a wheelchair."

Finally, there is one important factor we must not overlook. Normally, I'd use this case as another opportunity to call on Congress to kick the courts out of immigration. But on TPS, Congress *already did so*: 8 U.S.C. § 1254a(b)(5)(A) states unambiguously, "There is no judicial review of any determination of the [secretary of Homeland Security] with respect to the designation, or termination or extension of a

designation, of a foreign state under this subsection.”

As the Supreme Court said this past term ([Patchake v. Zinke](#)), “When Congress strips federal courts of jurisdiction, it exercises a valid legislative power no less than when it lays taxes, coins money, declares war, or invokes any other power that the Constitution grants it.”

The president should order the DOJ not to even show up in court and waste resources. This judge has no authorization, and in fact, explicit non-authorization to grant such a frivolous claim.

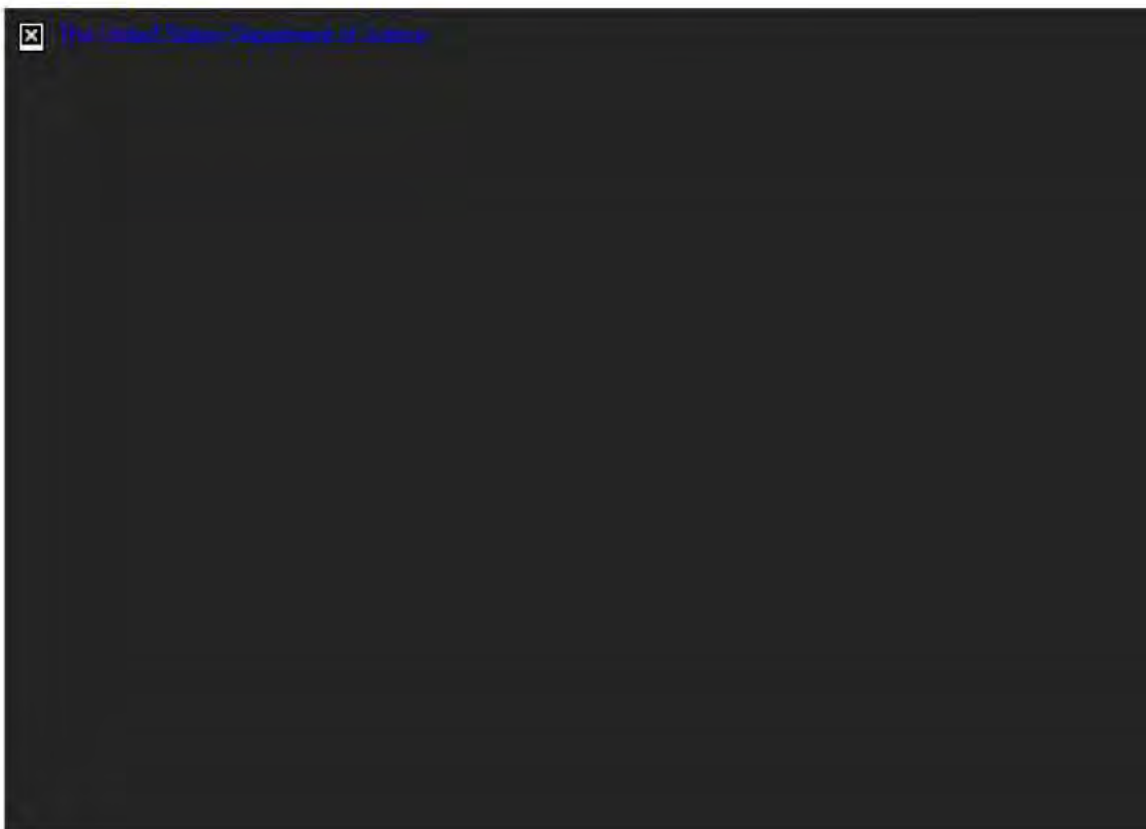

CAMBRIDGE MAN ARRESTED FOR THREATENING ICE AGENTS USING TWITTER

BOSTON, MA – A Cambridge man was arrested and charged today in connection with tweeting a murder-for-hire solicitation to kill ICE agents for \$500.

Brandon J. Ziobrowski, 33, of Cambridge, was charged in an indictment unsealed today with one count of use of interstate and foreign commerce to transmit a threat to injure another person. Ziobrowski was arrested this morning in New York and will appear in Boston at a later date.

According to court documents, in 2009 Ziobrowski created a Twitter account registered under the username @Vine_II. Over time, Ziobrowski's tweets became more violent and threatening. For instance, it is alleged that he repeatedly tweeted his desire to "slit" Senator John McCain's throat. Then, beginning around February 2018, Ziobrowski allegedly began posting tweets that promoted violence against law enforcement. For example, a Feb. 24, 2018, tweet read: "Guns should only be legal for shooting the police like the second amendment intended."

In March 2018 Ziobrowski allegedly started tweeting threatening messages against federal law enforcement agents that work for U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE).

On March 1, 2018, in response to a tweet from the ICE Field Office stating that ICE officers put their "lives on the line to arrest criminal aliens," Ziobrowski posted a message that read: "Thank you ICE for putting your lives on the line and hopefully dying I guess so there's less of you?"

On July 2, 2018, Ziobrowski allegedly tweeted: "I am broke but will scrounge and literally give \$500 to anyone who kills an ice agent. @me seriously who else can

pledge get in on this let's make this work." It is alleged that Ziobrowski's tweet was designed as a threat to encourage violence and the murder of federal law enforcement agents. At the time of the tweet, Ziobrowski had 448 Twitter followers.

The charge of use of interstate and foreign commerce to transmit a threat to injure another person provides for a sentence of no greater than five years in prison, three years of supervised release and a fine of \$250,000. Sentences are imposed by a federal district court judge based upon the U.S. Sentencing Guidelines and other statutory factors.

United States Attorney Andrew E. Lelling; Harold H. Shaw, Special Agent in Charge of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, Boston Field Division; and Peter C. Fitzhugh, Special Agent in Charge of Homeland Security Investigations in Boston made the announcement today. The FBI's Joint Terrorism Task Force in Boston and New York assisted with the investigation. The U.S. Attorney's Office would like to acknowledge the assistance of the Texas Department of Public Safety. Assistant U.S. Attorneys B. Stephanie Siegmann and Brian Perez-Daple of Lelling's National Security Unit are prosecuting the case.

The details contained in the indictment are allegations. The defendant is presumed innocent unless and until proven guilty beyond a reasonable doubt in a court of law.

Tucson Refugees Arrested For Immigration Fraud

TUCSON, Ariz. - On August 8, 2018, a federal grand jury in Tucson returned an eleven-count indictment against Mohamed Abdirahman Osman, 28, and Zeinab Abdirahman Mohamed, 25, both living in Tucson, Ariz., for violations of false swearing in an immigration matter and false statements to a government agency.

The indictment alleges that Osman and Mohamed, while living in China, applied for and were granted refugee status in 2014. The husband and wife entered the United States and have been living in Tucson since the time of their entry. In June 2015, Osman and Mohamed submitted applications for Legal Permanent Residence Status to U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services. The indictment further alleges that material submitted in support of their refugee applications and their applications for Legal Permanent Residence Status contained false, fictitious, and fraudulent statements. The alleged fraudulent statements included Osman's true name and nationality and denial of his association with members of a designated terrorist organization. Both defendants were arrested on Aug. 10, 2018.

Organization. Both defendants were arrested on Aug. 10, 2016.

An indictment is simply a method by which a person is charged with criminal activity and raises no inference of guilt. An individual is presumed innocent until competent evidence is presented to a jury that establishes guilt beyond a reasonable doubt.

The investigation in this case was conducted jointly by the Federal Bureau of Investigation and the Department of Homeland Security through the Joint Terrorism Task Force.

The prosecution is being handled by Beverly K. Anderson, Assistant U.S. Attorney, District of Arizona, Tucson.

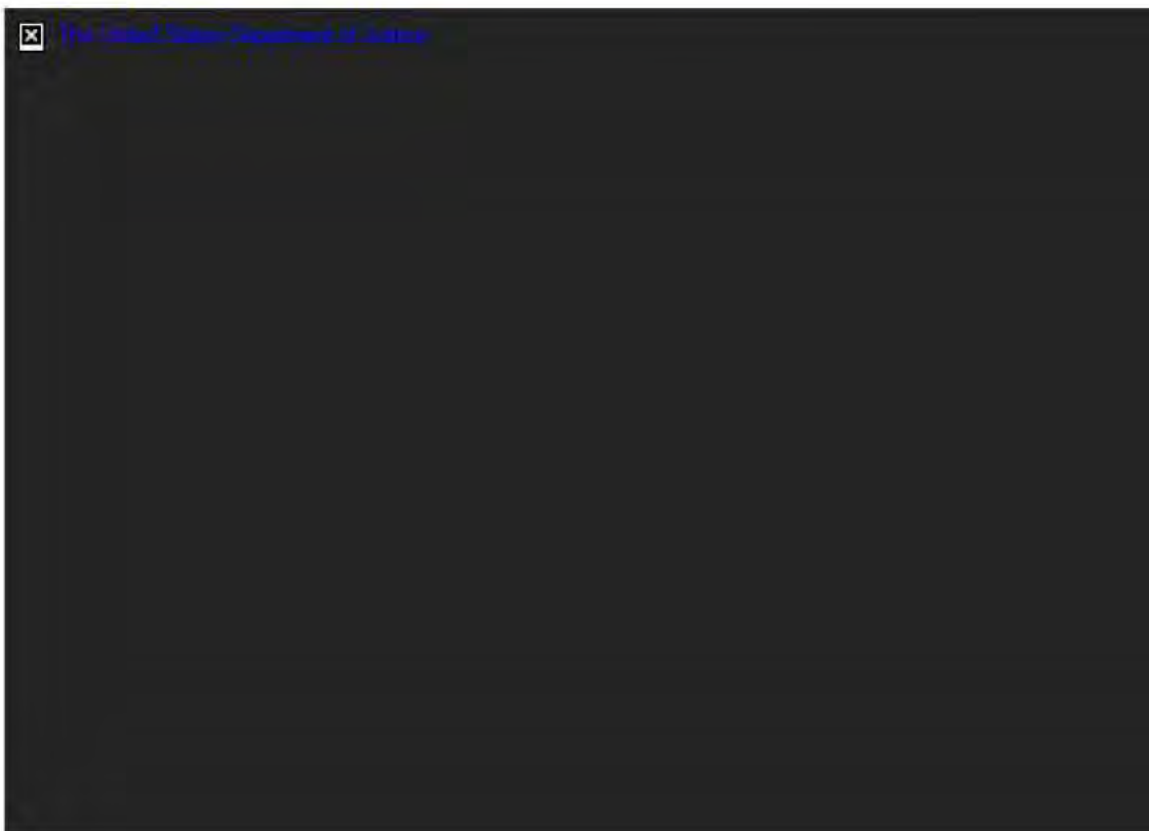

ETHIOPIAN HUMAN RIGHTS ABUSER ARRESTED FOR FRAUDULENTLY OBTAINING U.S. CITIZENSHIP

Indictment alleges series of lies in naturalization process, including failure to disclose participation in persecution during the Red Terror period in Ethiopia

WASHINGTON — A naturalized U.S. citizen residing in Alexandria, Virginia, was arrested today by special agents of U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement's Homeland Security Investigations (HSI) after being indicted on a felony charge of having fraudulently obtained U.S. citizenship.

Assistant Attorney General Brian A. Benczkowski of the Justice Department's Criminal Division, U.S. Attorney G. Zachary Terwilliger of the Eastern District of Virginia, and Special Agent in Charge Patrick J. Lechleitner of HSI Washington, D.C made the announcement.

Mergia Negussie Habteyes, 58, is charged in an indictment, which was returned by a grand jury for the Eastern District of Virginia on Aug. 14, alleging that Negussie told a series of lies to U.S. immigration authorities in the course of obtaining authority to enter the United States as a refugee, subsequently obtaining lawful permanent-resident status, and ultimately obtaining U.S. citizenship. Specifically, the indictment asserts that, when he applied for naturalization in the United States, Negussie falsely stated that he never persecuted persons because of their political opinion, and he failed to disclose that he had committed a crime or offense for which he was not arrested. In fact, according to the indictment, Negussie served as a civilian interrogator in the Higher 3 prison in Ethiopia in the late 1970s, during a period known as the Red Terror. In that role, Negussie is alleged to have participated in the persecution, through brutality, of individuals imprisoned because of their political opinion. Additionally, Negussie falsely stated that he never gave false or misleading information to any U.S. government official while applying for any immigration benefit and that he never lied to U.S. immigration authorities to gain entry or admission into the United States and to obtain immigration benefits.

Negussie's initial court appearance is at 2:00 p.m. before U.S. Magistrate Judge Michael S. Nachmanoff of the Eastern District of Virginia.

"Negussie allegedly concealed his role in persecuting Ethiopian prisoners for their political opinions during that country's so-called Red Terror period when he

persecution during that country's 1975-1976 period that he applied for, and ultimately obtained, U.S. citizenship," said Assistant Attorney General Benczkowski. "As this case demonstrates, the Justice Department will not allow the United States to become a safe haven for human rights violators, and we will continue to aggressively prosecute those who seek to exploit our immigration system through fraud and deceit."

"Negussie sought to outrun his past by allegedly employing deception to fraudulently obtain United States citizenship," said U.S. Attorney G. Zachary Terwilliger. "This indictment reflects the government's dedication to investigating and prosecuting criminal immigration cases, including those involving alleged human rights violators."

"The persecution of individuals for their political opinion and expression violates one of our most basic and foundational tenets as a nation," said HSI Special Agent in Charge Lechleitner. "We will not allow human rights violators to use lies, fraud and deceit to exploit our laws."

If convicted, Negussie faces up to 10 years in federal prison. Conviction would also result in automatic revocation of Negussie's U.S. citizenship as well as likely removal to Ethiopia.

The charges in the indictment are merely accusations, and the defendant is presumed innocent until proven guilty beyond a reasonable doubt in a court of law.

The case is being investigated by HSI with the support of the Human Rights Violators and War Crimes Center (HRVWCC). Established in 2009, the HRVWCC furthers the government's efforts to identify, locate and prosecute human rights abusers in the United States, including those who are known or suspected to have participated in persecution, war crimes, genocide, torture, extrajudicial killings, female genital mutilation and the use or recruitment of child soldiers. The HRVWCC leverages the expertise of a select group of agents, lawyers, intelligence and research specialists, historians and analysts who direct the government's broader enforcement efforts against these offenders. The HRVWCC is comprised of ICE HSI's Human Rights Violators and War Crimes Unit, ICE's Human Rights Law Section, FBI's International Human Rights Unit and DOJ's Human Rights and Special Prosecutions Section (HRSP).

The case is being jointly prosecuted by Trial Attorney Jamie Perry of the Criminal Division's Human Rights and Special Prosecutions Section (HRSP) and Assistant U.S. Attorney Alexander Blanchard of the Eastern District of Virginia.

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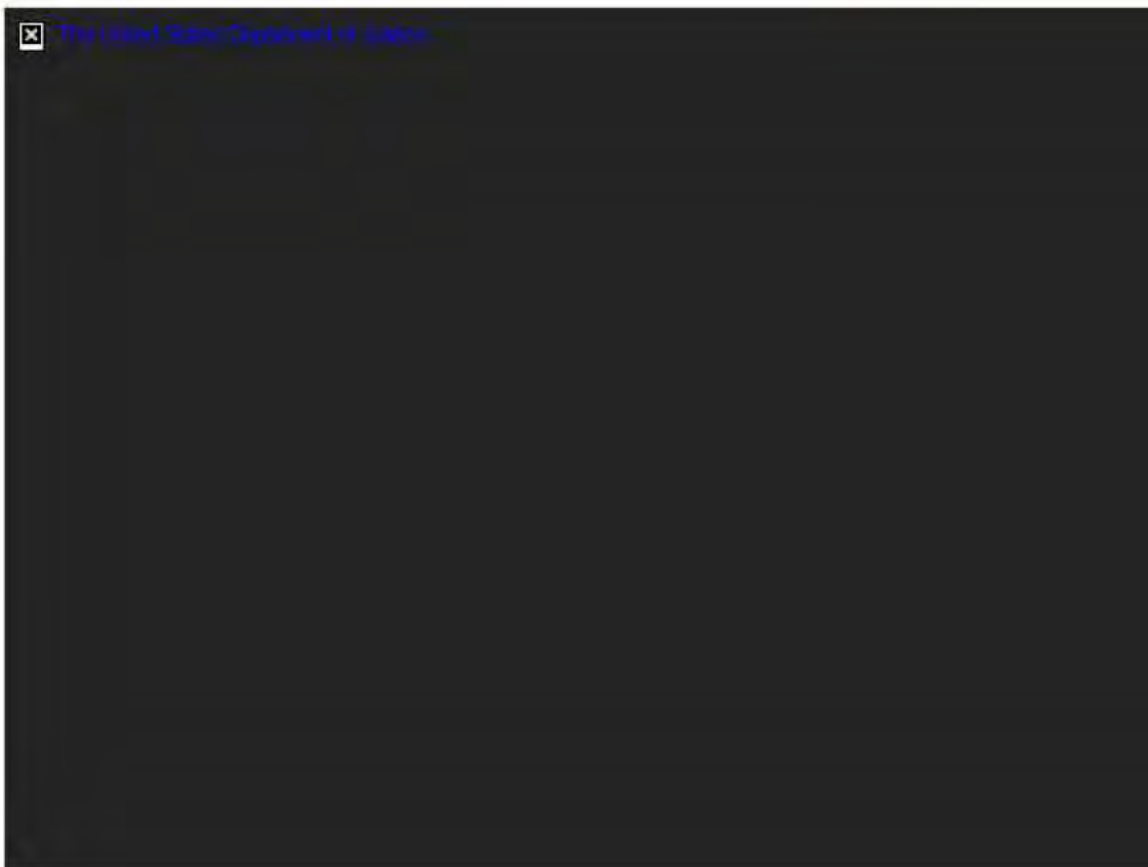

**12 Alleged Members Of MS-13 In California Charged Federally With
Racketeering Conspiracy, Murder, Arson, Extortion, And Other
Crimes**

SAN JOSE, CA - A federal grand jury indicted twelve South Bay residents for a broad range of racketeering crimes including murder, arson, extortion by force, and drug trafficking, announced United States Attorney Alex G. Tse and Homeland Security Investigations (HSI) Special Agent in Charge Ryan L. Spradlin. The Second Superseding Indictment handed down today amends the charges previously brought against the defendant in April of this year. The defendant all are alleged to be MS-13 gang members and the new charges now specifically include allegations that certain defendants conspired to commit, attempted to commit, and ultimately succeeded in committing murder.

“MS-13 has presented a violent threat in the Santa Cruz area for years,” said U.S. Attorney Tse. “The gang targeted many, including other immigrants from El Salvador, and they instilled fear in everyone who experienced or witnessed their brutality.”

The indictment alleges the following defendants conspired to engage in racketeering activities:

Velarmino Escobar-Ayala (aka Meduza)
Tomas Rivera (aka Profugo, aka Caballo)
Ismael Alvarenga-Rivera (aka Casper)
Willfredo Ayala-Garcia (aka Chino)
Jose David Abrego-Galdamez (aka Largo)
Melvin Lopez (aka Sharky)
Alexander Martinez-Flores (aka Pocar)
Gerber Morales (aka Choco, aka Chuki)
Emilio Escobar-Albarnga (aka Diablo)
Josue Alcedis Escobar-Cerritos (aka Penguino, aka Chui)
Erick Escalante-Torres (aka Deceptico, aka Problematico)
Jose Noe Ramirez-Avelar (aka Chepito, aka Sparky)

According to the indictment, the defendants all engaged in racketeering for the purpose of preserving the power, territory, reputation, and profits of the MS-13 gang. The indictment describes how members of MS-13 met regularly to discuss issues such as disciplining members and planning crimes. The indictment provides a list of dates on which the defendants allegedly met and conspired to commit a broad array of crimes, including murder, to further the purposes of the gang.

According to the indictment, differing members of the enterprise met at times to discuss targeting rival gang members for murder and deciding which gang members had an interest in murdering the targets. For example, the indictment alleges Escobar-Ayala, Rivera, Lopez, Martinez-Flores, Escalante-Torres, and Ramirez-Avelar conspired to commit a murder, and that all these defendants, except Lopez, actually committed the murder. Similarly, the indictment alleges Escalante-Torres attempted to commit the murder of a separate victim. In addition, the indictment describes how some members met to create plans to commit murder while other members actually attempted or succeeded in committing murder, and how still others attempted to destroy proof of the gang's crimes by burning evidence.

The indictment also describes how certain defendants conspired to extort property from drug dealers in Santa Cruz by threatening violence against the dealers and other persons close to them. According to the indictment, from February 2013 through at least February of 2017, Escobar-Ayala, Rivera, Alvarenga-Rivera, Ayala-Garcia, Abrego-Galdamez, Lopez, and Martinez-Flores engaged in the extortion and threatened force, violence, and fear to obtain money that was demanded.

Also, the indictment alleges all the defendants were engaged in a conspiracy engage in drug trafficking. According to the indictment, from April 2012 until the present, the defendants conspired to possess with intent to distribute 50 grams of more of a mixture of substance containing methamphetamine.

According to additional court papers filed by the government, the current charges in this case stem from a multi-year investigation into the activities of a violent Santa Cruz street gang known as Santa Cruz Salvatrucha Locos 13 (SCSL13). The government's papers state that "SCSL13 is a subset of the larger Mara Salvatrucha 13 (MS-13) gang organization." According to the government, the defendants all are alleged to be either active members or recruits performing criminal tasks on behalf of SCSL13.

An indictment merely alleges that crimes have been committed, and the defendants are presumed innocent until proven guilty beyond a reasonable doubt.

In addition, any sentence following conviction would be imposed by the court only after consideration of the U.S. Sentencing Guidelines and the federal statute governing the imposition of a sentence, 18 U.S.C. § 3553.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Joseph Alioto is prosecuting the case. The prosecution is the result of an investigation by the HSI.

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Maryland MS-13 Member Ordered To Serve Two Consecutive Life Sentences For Federal Racketeering Conspiracy, Murder, And Other Violent Crimes

Also Pleaded Guilty to Illegal Reentry After Deportation and Sentenced to Six Months in Prison

WASHINGTON – Raul Ernesto Landaverde-Giron, aka “Humilde,” and “Decente,” 28, of Silver Spring, Maryland, was sentenced today by U.S. District Judge Peter J. Messitte to two consecutive sentences of life in prison for conspiracy to participate in a racketeering enterprise in connection with his gang activity as a member of La Mara Salvatrucha, or MS-13, and other violent crimes, namely murder in aid of racketeering; conspiracy to commit murder in aid of racketeering; using, carrying and discharging a firearm during a crime of violence; and murder resulting from the use, carrying and discharging of a firearm during a crime of violence. A federal jury convicted Landaverde-Giron of those charges on

March 14, after a three-week trial.

The conviction was announced by Attorney General Jeff Sessions; Assistant Attorney General Brian A. Benczkowski of the Justice Department's Criminal Division; U.S. Attorney Robert K. Hur for the District of Maryland; Acting Special Agent in Charge Cardell T. Morant of U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement's (ICE) Homeland Security Investigations (HSI); Chief Henry P. Stawinski III of the Prince George's County, Maryland Police Department; Prince George's County State's Attorney Angela D. Alsobrooks; Captain Amal Awad, Interim Chief of the Hyattsville City Police Department; Chief Edward Hargis of the Frederick Police Department; Frederick County State's Attorney J. Charles Smith; Chief J. Thomas Manger of the Montgomery County Police Department; and Montgomery County State's Attorney John McCarthy.

MS-13 is a national and transnational gang composed primarily of immigrants or descendants from El Salvador. Evidence presented at trial showed that branches or "cliques" of MS-13, one of the largest street gangs in the United States, operate throughout Prince George's County, Montgomery County, and Frederick County, Maryland. Landaverde-Giron was a member of the MS-13 Normandie Locos Salvatrucha Clique.

According to evidence presented at the trial, from at least 2012 through at least 2016, MS-13 members planned and committed numerous crimes, including murders and attempted murders in Prince George's County and Frederick County. Gang members also extorted owners of illegal businesses, among other crimes. Witnesses testified that MS-13 members are required to commit acts of violence to maintain membership and discipline within the gang. One of the principal rules of MS-13 is that its members must attack and kill rivals, known as "chavalas," whenever possible. Serious violations of MS-13 rules, such as cooperating with law enforcement, could result in the issuance of a "greenlight," or order to be killed. Participation in violent acts directed at rival gangs, or as directed by gang leadership, increased the respect accorded to that member.

Trial evidence showed that on Nov. 30, 2013, Landaverde-Giron, along with two other Normandie Clique members, murdered an individual in Frederick, Maryland, who had fled El Salvador to escape a greenlight imposed by MS-13 members in El Salvador. After a co-conspirator recognized the victim in Frederick, Normandie Clique members called an MS-13 leader in prison in El Salvador to confirm the greenlight was still in effect. A co-conspirator then lured the victim to a wooded area in Frederick, where he shot the victim in the head and Landaverde-Giron and another co-conspirator stabbed the victim in the face and neck. Landaverde-Giron was promoted within the Normandie Clique for his participation in this murder.

Landaverde-Giron pleaded guilty today to illegally reentering the United States after having been deported, and was sentenced to six months in prison. Landaverde-Giron has been detained since his arrest.

This case is part of Project Safe Neighborhoods (PSN), a program bringing together all levels of law enforcement and the communities they serve to reduce violent crime and make our neighborhoods safer for everyone. Attorney General Jeff Sessions reinvigorated PSN in 2017 as part of the Department's renewed focus on targeting violent criminals, directing all U.S. Attorney's Offices to work in partnership with federal, state, local, and tribal law enforcement and the local community to develop effective, locally-based strategies to reduce violent crime.

The investigation was conducted by HSI Baltimore, Frederick Police Department, Prince George's County Police Department, Hyattsville City Police Department, and Montgomery County Police Department, and the Prince George's County State's Attorney's Office. The case was prosecuted by Trial Attorney Francesca Liquori of the Criminal Division's Organized Crime and Gang Section and Assistant U.S. Attorneys William D. Moomau and Lindsay Eyler Kaplan of the District of Maryland.

Long Island MS-13 Gang Members Face Additional Racketeering Charges, Including Murder And Attempted Murder

Sixth Superseding Indictment Charges an Additional Defendant in a 2016 Murder in Freeport, and Adds a 2015 Murder in Babylon, a 2009 Attempted Murder in Brentwood and Drug Trafficking Charges

BROOKLYN, NY – Five members of La Mara Salvatrucha (also known as MS-13), Ruendy Jhonatan Hernandez-Vasquez, Jhonny Contreras, Reynaldo Lopez-Alvarado, Jeffrey Amador and Ronald Catalan, are scheduled to be arraigned this morning before United States District Judge Joseph F. Bianco, at the federal courthouse in Central Islip, New York. The 75-count sixth superseding indictment was unsealed on August 8, 2018 and charges more than two dozen members of MS-13, a transnational criminal organization, with racketeering and related offenses.

Richard P. Donoghue, United States Attorney for the Eastern District of New York, William F. Sweeney, Jr., Assistant Director-in-Charge, Federal Bureau of Investigation, New York Field Office (FBI), Geraldine Hart, Commissioner, Suffolk County Police Department (SCPD), and Patrick J. Ryder, Commissioner, Nassau County Police Department (NCPD), announced the charges.

The superseding indictment adds one new defendant. Hernandez-Vasquez. in

connection with the October 10, 2016 murder of Javier Castillo in Freeport, and a conspiracy to distribute cocaine and marijuana. The indictment also adds racketeering offenses and related charges of murder and conspiracy to commit murder in aid of racketeering against previously charged defendants Contreras, Lopez-Alvarado and Amador in connection with the November 19, 2015 murder of Cesar Rivera-Vasquez in Babylon, and racketeering offenses against Catalan for a June 23, 2009 shooting in Brentwood. In total, 16 murders committed by MS-13 members have been charged in this superseding indictment and underlying indictments in this case.

In addition, INTERPOL issued a Red Notice for Hernandez-Vasquez relating to an arrest warrant for a murder he allegedly committed in El Salvador before he illegally entered the United States.

“The MS-13’s mission to commit senseless and vicious acts of violence, terrorizing our communities in the process, is evident from the charges announced today,” stated United States Attorney Donoghue. “This Office and our law enforcement partners will continue our unyielding pursuit to ensure that all members of this brutal gang are held accountable for every crime they have committed and that neighborhoods on Long Island are kept safe and free from gang violence.” Mr. Donoghue expressed his sincere thanks to all the members of the FBI’s Long Island Gang Task Force for their work on the investigation.

“MS-13 members feed on brutal, ruthless attacks threatening the safety of our communities,” stated FBI Assistant Director-in-Charge Sweeney. “With such a violent gang tormenting the neighborhoods of Long Island, it is essential that we work closely with our fellow law enforcement agencies to continue to round up the individuals committing these violent crimes. The persistence of the FBI’s Long Island Gang Task Force will never weaken—our investigations into MS-13 will not cease until this gang is eradicated.”

“The Suffolk County Police Department continues to work with all our partners and serves on the Long Island FBI Gang Task Force to eradicate MS-13,” stated SCPD Commissioner Hart. “This indictment sends another strong message to MS-13 members that their actions will not be tolerated and justice will be served. We applaud the Eastern District of New York for their ongoing and relentless commitment to prosecute violent gang members and will continue to work together to ensure that our communities are safe.”

“Today’s indictment of MS-13 member Ruendy Jhonatan Hernandez-Vasquez on charges of murder, conspiracy to commit murder and distribution of cocaine and marijuana clearly shows how the work of our law enforcement agencies is a constant in our relentless efforts to remove gang members from our streets,”

stated NCPD Commissioner Ryder. "Our determined and dedicated approach keeps our communities safe and I would like to thank all involved in the FBI Long Island Task Force for bringing these gang members to justice."

2009 Attempted Murder of John Doe #1 in Brentwood

As set forth in court filings, including a detention memorandum filed earlier today, on June 23, 2009, Catalan and two other MS-13 members, all of whom were new members of the Brentwood Locos Salvatruchas clique, armed themselves with handguns and drove through Brentwood, hunting for rival gang members to attack and kill in order to increase their standing and solidify their membership in the MS-13 gang. They observed a group of males on Barleau Street, whom they believed to be members of the Bloods street gang. The MS-13 members got out of their car, approached the group and started firing. John Doe #1 was struck in the armpit and back as he tried to run. Catalan and the others ran back to the car and fled the scene. John Doe #1 underwent surgery and ultimately survived the attack.

2015 Murder of Cesar Rivera-Vasquez in Babylon

Contreras, Lopez-Alvarado and Amador are charged in this indictment with the November 19, 2015 murder of Cesar Rivera-Vasquez, who was killed because the MS-13 members suspected that he was a member of a rival Mexican gang, Raza Loca. The MS-13 members convinced the victim to go with them to a secluded area adjacent to the Long Island Railroad station in Babylon to smoke marijuana. Once there, Contreras, Lopez-Alvarado, Amador and two other MS-13 members attacked Rivera-Vasquez with knives and a baseball bat before Lopez-Alvarado took a knife and cut the victim's throat. The MS-13 members buried his body near a large mound of dirt, and the body was not discovered until April 2018.

2016 Murder of Javier Castillo in Freeport

Hernandez-Vasquez has been added to previously charged offenses in this case in connection with the October 10, 2016 murder of Javier Castillo. The MS-13 members suspected Castillo of being a member of the rival 18th Street gang and convinced him to go with them to Cow Meadow Park in Freeport. Once there, they attacked and killed him with a machete and buried his body in a shallow grave near a saltwater marsh. Castillo's body was not recovered until October 2017. The sixth superseding indictment also adds marijuana and cocaine conspiracy charges against Hernandez-Vasquez.

In addition to the Rivera-Vasquez and Castillo murders, 14 other murders previously were charged in this case, including, the May 26, 2013 murder of Derrick Mayes, the May 28, 2013 murder of Keenan Russell, the July 14, 2014

murder of Jose Lainez-Murcia, the June 30, 2015 murder of Jonathan Cardona-Hernandez, the April 29, 2016 murder of Oscar Acosta, the June 3, 2016 murder of Jose Pena, the September 13, 2016 murders of Kayla Cuevas and Nisa Mickens, the October 13, 2016 murder of Dewann Stacks, the January 30, 2017 murder of Esteban Alvarado-Bonilla, and the April 11, 2017 murders of Justin Llivicura, Michael Lopez, Jorge Tigre and Jefferson Villalobos, as well as numerous attempted murders and assaults.

The charges in the indictment are allegations, and the defendants are presumed innocent unless and until proven guilty.

Today's superseding indictment is the latest in a series of federal prosecutions by the United States Attorney's Office for the Eastern District of New York targeting members of the MS-13. The MS-13's leadership is based in El Salvador and Honduras, but the gang has thousands of members across the United States, comprised primarily of immigrants from Central America. With numerous branches, or "cliques," the MS-13 is the largest and most violent street gang on Long Island. Since 2003, hundreds of MS-13 members, including dozens of clique leaders, have been convicted on federal felony charges in the Eastern District of New York. A majority of those MS-13 members have been convicted on federal racketeering charges for participating in murders, attempted murders and assaults. Since 2010, this Office has obtained indictments charging MS-13 members with carrying out more than 45 murders in the Eastern District of New York, and has convicted dozens of MS-13 leaders and members in connection with those murders. These prosecutions are the product of investigations led by the FBI's Long Island Gang Task Force, comprising agents and officers of the FBI, SCPD, NCPD, Nassau County Sheriff's Department, Suffolk County Probation, Suffolk County Sheriff's Office, Rockville Centre Police Department, New York State Police and Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives.

The government's case is being handled by the Office's Long Island Criminal Division. Assistant United States Attorneys John J. Durham, Paul G. Scotti, Michael T. Keilty and Raymond A. Tierney are in charge of the prosecution.

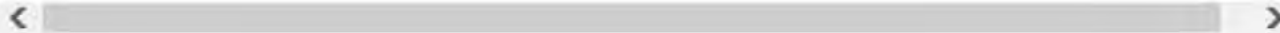

**12 Alleged Members Of MS-13 In California Charged Federally With
Racketeering Conspiracy, Murder, Arson, Extortion, And Other
Crimes**

SAN JOSE, CA - A federal grand jury indicted twelve South Bay residents for a

SANTA CRUZ, CA - A federal grand jury indicted twelve Santa Cruz residents for a broad range of racketeering crimes including murder, arson, extortion by force, and drug trafficking, announced United States Attorney Alex G. Tse and Homeland Security Investigations (HSI) Special Agent in Charge Ryan L. Spradlin. The Second Superseding Indictment handed down today amends the charges previously brought against the defendant in April of this year. The defendant all are alleged to be MS-13 gang members and the new charges now specifically include allegations that certain defendants conspired to commit, attempted to commit, and ultimately succeeded in committing murder.

“MS-13 has presented a violent threat in the Santa Cruz area for years,” said U.S. Attorney Tse. “The gang targeted many, including other immigrants from El Salvador, and they instilled fear in everyone who experienced or witnessed their brutality.”

The indictment alleges the following defendants conspired to engage in racketeering activities:

Velarmino Escobar-Ayala (aka Meduza)
Tomas Rivera (aka Profugo, aka Caballo)
Ismael Alvarenga-Rivera (aka Casper)
Willfredo Ayala-Garcia (aka Chino)
Jose David Abrego-Galdamez (aka Largo)
Melvin Lopez (aka Sharky)
Alexander Martinez-Flores (aka Pocar)
Gerber Morales (aka Choco, aka Chuki)
Emilio Escobar-Albarnga (aka Diablo)
Josue Alcedis Escobar-Cerritos (aka Penguino, aka Chui)
Erick Escalante-Torres (aka Deceptico, aka Problematico)
Jose Noe Ramirez-Avelar (aka Chepito, aka Sparky)

According to the indictment, the defendants all engaged in racketeering for the purpose of preserving the power, territory, reputation, and profits of the MS-13 gang. The indictment describes how members of MS-13 met regularly to discuss issues such as disciplining members and planning crimes. The indictment provides a list of dates on which the defendants allegedly met and conspired to commit a broad array of crimes, including murder, to further the purposes of the gang.

According to the indictment, differing members of the enterprise met at times to discuss targeting rival gang members for murder and deciding which gang members had an interest in murdering the targets. For example, the indictment alleges Escobar-Ayala, Rivera, Lopez, Martinez-Flores, Escalante-Torres, and Ramirez-Avelar conspired to commit a murder, and that all these defendants, except Lopez, actually committed the murder. Similarly, the indictment alleges Escalante-Torres attempted to commit the murder of a separate victim. In addition, the indictment describes how some members met to create plans to commit murder while other members actually attempted or succeeded in committing murder, and how still others attempted to destroy proof of the gang's crimes by burning evidence.

The indictment also describes how certain defendants conspired to extort property from drug dealers in Santa Cruz by threatening violence against the dealers and other persons close to them. According to the indictment, from February 2013 through at least February of 2017, Escobar-Ayala, Rivera,

Alvarenga-Rivera, Ayala-Garcia, Abrego-Galdamez, Lopez, and Martinez-Flores engaged in the extortion and threatened force, violence, and fear to obtain money that was demanded.

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Assistant U.S. Attorney Joseph Alioto is prosecuting the case. The prosecution is the result of an investigation by the HSI.

Further Information:

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MS-13 is a national and transnational gang composed primarily of immigrants or descendants from El Salvador. Evidence presented at trial showed that branches or “cliques” of MS-13, one of the largest street gangs in the United States, operate throughout Prince George’s County, Montgomery County, and Frederick County, Maryland. Landaverde-Giron was a member of the MS-13 Normandie Locos Salvatrucha Clique.

According to evidence presented at the trial, from at least 2012 through at least 2016, MS-13 members planned and committed numerous crimes, including murders and attempted murders in Prince George’s County and Frederick County. Gang members also extorted owners of illegal businesses, among other crimes. Witnesses testified that MS-13 members are required to commit acts of violence to maintain membership and discipline within the gang. One of the principal rules of MS-13 is that its members must attack and kill rivals, known as “chavalas,” whenever possible. Serious violations of MS-13 rules, such as cooperating with law enforcement, could result in the issuance of a “greenlight,” or order to be killed. Participation in violent acts directed at rival gangs, or as directed by gang leadership, increased the respect accorded to that member.

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a June 23, 2009 shooting in Brentwood. In total, 10 murders committed by MS-13 members have been charged in this superseding indictment and underlying indictments in this case.

In addition, INTERPOL issued a Red Notice for Hernandez-Vasquez relating to an arrest warrant for a murder he allegedly committed in El Salvador before he illegally entered the United States.

“The MS-13’s mission to commit senseless and vicious acts of violence, terrorizing our communities in the process, is evident from the charges announced today,” stated United States Attorney Donoghue. “This Office and our law enforcement partners will continue our unyielding pursuit to ensure that all members of this brutal gang are held accountable for every crime they have committed and that neighborhoods on Long Island are kept safe and free from gang violence.” Mr. Donoghue expressed his sincere thanks to all the members of the FBI’s Long Island Gang Task Force for their work on the investigation.

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As set forth in court filings, including a detention memorandum filed earlier today, on June 23, 2009, Catalan and two other MS-13 members, all of whom were new members of the Brentwood Locos Salvatruchas clique, armed themselves with handguns and drove through Brentwood, hunting for rival gang members to attack and kill in order to increase their standing and solidify their membership in the MS-13 gang. They observed a group of males on Barleau Street, whom they believed to be members of the Bloods street gang. The MS-13 members got out of their car, approached the group and started firing. John Doe #1 was struck in the armpit and back as he tried to run. Catalan and the others ran back to the car and fled the scene. John Doe #1 underwent surgery and ultimately survived the attack.

2015 Murder of Cesar Rivera-Vasquez in Babylon

Contreras, Lopez-Alvarado and Amador are charged in this indictment with the November 19, 2015 murder of Cesar Rivera-Vasquez, who was killed because the MS-13 members suspected that he was a member of a rival Mexican gang, Raza Loca. The MS-13 members convinced the victim to go with them to a secluded area adjacent to the Long Island Railroad station in Babylon to smoke marijuana. Once there, Contreras, Lopez-Alvarado, Amador and two other MS-13 members attacked Rivera-Vasquez with knives and a baseball bat before Lopez-Alvarado took a knife and cut the victim's throat. The MS-13 members buried his body near a large mound of dirt, and the body was not discovered until April 2018.

2016 Murder of Javier Castillo in Freeport

Hernandez-Vasquez has been added to previously charged offenses in this case in connection with the October 10, 2016 murder of Javier Castillo. The MS-13 members suspected Castillo of being a member of the rival 18th Street gang and convinced him to go with them to Cow Meadow Park in Freeport. Once there, they attacked and killed him with a machete and buried his body in a shallow grave near a saltwater marsh. Castillo's body was not recovered until October 2017. The sixth superseding indictment also adds marijuana and cocaine conspiracy charges against Hernandez-Vasquez.

In addition to the Rivera-Vasquez and Castillo murders, 14 other murders previously were charged in this case, including, the May 26, 2013 murder of Derrick Mayes, the May 28, 2013 murder of Keenan Russell, the July 14, 2014 murder of Jose Lainez-Murcia, the June 30, 2015 murder of Jonathan Cardona-Hernandez, the April 29, 2016 murder of Oscar Acosta, the June 3, 2016 murder of Jose Pena, the September 13, 2016 murders of Kayla Cuevas and Nisa Mickens, the October 13, 2016 murder of Dewann Stacks, the January 30, 2017 murder of Esteban Alvarado-Bonilla, and the April 11, 2017 murders of Justin Llivicura, Michael Lopez, Jorge Tigre and Jefferson Villalobos, as well as numerous attempted murders and assaults.

The charges in the indictment are allegations, and the defendants are presumed innocent unless and until proven guilty.

Today's superseding indictment is the latest in a series of federal prosecutions by the United States Attorney's Office for the Eastern District of New York targeting members of the MS-13. The MS-13's leadership is based in El Salvador and Honduras, but the gang has thousands of members across the United States, comprised primarily of immigrants from Central America. With numerous branches, or "cliques," the MS-13 is the largest and most violent street gang on Long Island. Since 2003, hundreds of MS-13 members, including dozens of clique leaders, have been convicted on federal felony charges in the Eastern District of New York. A majority of those MS-13 members have been convicted on federal racketeering charges for participating in murders, attempted murders and assaults. Since 2010, this Office has obtained indictments charging MS-13 members with carrying out more than 45 murders in the Eastern District of New York, and has convicted dozens of MS-13 leaders and members in connection with those murders. These prosecutions are the product of investigations led by the FBI's Long Island Gang Task Force, comprising agents and officers of the FBI,

SCPD, NCPD, Nassau County Sheriff's Department, Suffolk County Probation, Suffolk County Sheriff's Office, Rockville Centre Police Department, New York State Police and Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives.

The government's case is being handled by the Office's Long Island Criminal Division. Assistant United States Attorneys John J. Durham, Paul G. Scotti, Michael T. Keilty and Raymond A. Tierney are in charge of the prosecution.

TWO INDIVIDUALS CHARGED FOR ACTING AS ILLEGAL AGENTS

WASHINGTON – An indictment was returned today charging Ahmadreza Mohammadi-Doostdar, 38, a dual U.S.-Iranian citizen, and Majid Ghorbani, 59, an Iranian citizen and resident of California, with allegedly acting on behalf of the government of the Islamic Republic of Iran by conducting covert surveillance of Israeli and Jewish facilities in the United States, and collecting identifying information about American citizens and U.S. nationals who are members of the group Mujahedin-e Khalq (MEK).

The charges were announced by Assistant Attorney General for National Security John Demers, U.S. Attorney Jessie K. Liu for the District of Columbia, and Acting Executive Assistant Director Michael McGarrity of the FBI's National Security Branch.

“The National Security Division is committed to protecting the United States from

individuals within our country who unlawfully act on behalf of hostile foreign nations,” said Assistant Attorney General Demers. “Doostdar and Ghorbani are alleged to have acted on behalf of Iran, including by conducting surveillance of political opponents and engaging in other activities that could put Americans at risk. With their arrest and these charges, we are seeking to hold the defendants accountable.”

“This indictment demonstrates the commitment of the Department of Justice to hold accountable agents of foreign governments who act illegally within the United States, especially where those agents are conducting surveillance of individuals and Constitutionally-protected activities in this country,” said Jessie K. Liu, United States Attorney for the District of Columbia.

“This alleged activity demonstrates a continued interest in targeting the United States, as well as potential opposition groups located in the United States,” said Acting Executive Assistant Director McGarrity. “The FBI will continue to identify and disrupt those individuals who seek to engage in unlawful activity, on behalf of Iran, on US soil.”

The indictment charged Doostdar and Ghorbani with knowingly acting as agents of the government of Iran without prior notification to the Attorney General, providing services to Iran in violation of U.S. sanctions, and conspiracy. Both defendants were arrested on Aug. 9, pursuant to criminal complaints issued by the U.S. District Court for the District of Columbia. Those complaints were unsealed today.

According to the indictment, in or about July 2017, Doostdar traveled to the United States from Iran in order to collect intelligence information about entities and individuals considered by the government of Iran to be enemies of that regime, including Israeli and Jewish interests, and individuals associated with the MEK, a group that advocates the overthrow of the current Iranian government.

On or about July 21, 2017, Doostdar is alleged to have conducted surveillance of the Rohr Chabad House, a Jewish institution located in Chicago, including photographing the security features surrounding the facility.

On or about Sept. 20, 2017, Ghorbani is alleged to have attended a MEK rally in New York City, during which he photographed individuals participating in the protest against the current Iranian regime. In or about December 2017, Doostdar returned to the United States from Iran and made contact with Ghorbani in the Los Angeles area. During the meeting, Doostdar paid Ghorbani approximately \$2,000 in cash and Ghorbani delivered to him 28 photographs taken at the September 2017 MEK rally, many of which contained hand-written annotations identifying the individuals who appeared in the photos. These photographs, along with a hand-written receipt for \$2000, were found concealed in Doostdar’s luggage as he transited a U.S. airport on his return to Iran in December 2017.

The indictment also alleges that Ghorbani traveled to Iran in or about March 2018, after informing Doostdar that he would be going to Iran to conduct an “in-person briefing.” Thereafter, on or about May 4, Ghorbani attended the MEK-affiliated 2018 Iran Freedom Convention for Human Rights in Washington, D.C. During the course of the conference, Ghorbani appeared to photograph certain speakers and attendees, which included delegations from across the United States. On May 14, Doostdar called Ghorbani to discuss clandestine methods Ghorbani should use in order to provide this information to Iran.

Ghorbani is scheduled to appear for a detention hearing in the U.S. District Court

for the District of Columbia at 9:30 a.m. on Tuesday, Aug. 21, before the Honorable G. Michael Harvey.

The charges in an indictment are merely allegations, and every defendant is presumed innocent unless and until proven guilty beyond a reasonable doubt. The maximum penalty for conspiracy is five years; the maximum penalty for acting as an agent of a foreign power is ten years; and the maximum penalty for a violation of the International Emergency Economic Powers Act is 20 years. The maximum statutory sentence is prescribed by Congress and is provided here for informational purposes. If convicted of any offense, a defendant's sentence will be determined by the court based on the advisory Sentencing Guidelines and other statutory factors.

The investigation into this matter was conducted by the FBI's Washington Field Office and Los Angeles Field Office. The case is being prosecuted by the National Security Section of the U.S. Attorney's Office for the District of Columbia and the Counterintelligence and Export Control Section of the National Security Division of the Department of Justice.

Missing college student Mollie Tibbetts found dead

Authorities give an update on the investigation into the death of Iowa college student Mollie Tibbetts (Reuters)

Authorities have announced a first-degree murder charge against Christian Rivera, 24, in the death of Iowa college student Mollie Tibbetts.

Rivera is an undocumented immigrant and led detectives to her body in rural Poweshiek County, according to Iowa investigators.

The charge was filed more than month after Tibbetts went out for a jog and disappeared — and days after investigators searching for the missing Iowa college student said they were focusing their efforts on five locations.

For 34 days, federal, state and local authorities had scoured Poweshiek County for Tibbetts, and sifted through electronic data from her Fitbit, cellphone and social media accounts for any clue about what happened to the woman who was last seen

alive while going for an evening run. They'd also interviewed nearly 1,500 people.

Authorities, who had narrowed their search to a carwash, Tibbetts's boyfriend's home, a truck stop and two farms.

The University of Iowa student's last known communication was a July 18 Snapchat message she sent to her boyfriend, Dalton Jack, for whom she was house sitting, [according to the Register](#). Jack, who was out of town, looked at it but didn't immediately reply.

His "good morning" text the next day received no answer, and Tibbetts didn't pick up her phone when someone at the day-care center where she worked called to ask why she didn't show up. Every call went straight to voice mail.

Assistant Director of DCI Field Operations Mitchell Mortvedt [told NBC affiliate WHO-DT](#) that Tibbetts's family members and her boyfriend have been cleared of suspicion.

Her family and dozens of volunteers in the small town of Brooklyn, population nearly 1,500, have been combing ditches, cornfields and empty buildings for any sign of Tibbetts. [CBS News affiliate KCCI reported](#) that authorities have also searched pig farms in the area, and last week authorities announced they were narrowing the search.

"It's frustrating. It's powerless. We're racking our brains, thinking what can we think of to tell the investigators," Kim Calderwood, Tibbetts's aunt, [told the Des Moines Register](#). "It's the worst thing — to want to fix something you can't fix."

Mollie's brother, Jake Tibbetts, [told the newspaper](#) the family went "through stages of scared and sad. And now we're anxious and confused."

"Mollie has the biggest heart of anyone we ever knew," he said. "She was never

shy. . . . She had room in her heart for everyone.”

Our thoughts continue to be with Mollie Tibbetts’ family and friends. Mollie went missing from her hometown of Brooklyn, Iowa last week. Please contact authorities if you have any information: <http://spr.ly/6015DSlec>

Tibbetts was born in San Francisco and moved to Brooklyn with her mother when she was in second grade. She won state speech competitions, was involved in theater and ran cross-country. She was studying psychology, as her mother did.

As people searched, those closest to Tibbetts asked everyone to hold on to hope — and keep sharing information about her.

“We remain in awe and indebted to the help, creativity, outreach and love that you have shown Mollie and all of us,” Sandi Tibbetts Murphy, a cousin, wrote on the wall of the Finding Mollie Tibbetts Facebook page. “Please keep sharing Mollie’s information so we can bring our girl safely home.”

Greg Willey, of Crime Stoppers of Central Iowa, told the AP that \$400,000 raised for information leading to Tibbetts’ safe return will instead go to the person who helps police catch anyone responsible for her death.

“Once they catch their breath, this will turn into a weapon going the other direction to catch the person who did it,” he said.

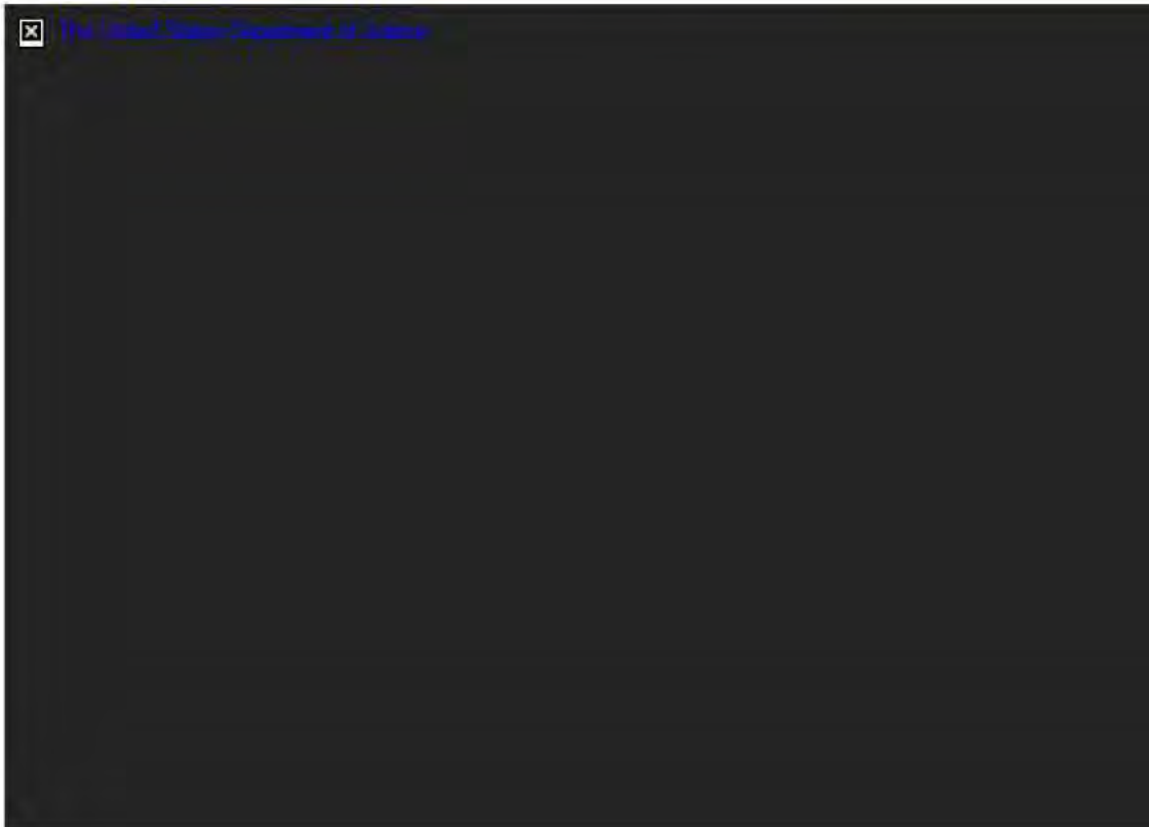

NINETEEN FOREIGN NATIONALS CHARGED FOR VOTING IN 2016 ELECTION

Multiple Defendants Voted In More Than One Election

WILMINGTON, NC – Robert J. Higdon, Jr., United States Attorney for the Eastern District of North Carolina today announced that nineteen foreign nationals were charged with, among other crimes, voting by alien for their actions prior to and on November 8, 2016. A twentieth defendant was charged with aiding and abetting a fellow defendant in falsely claiming United States citizenship in order to register to vote.

A federal grand jury in Wilmington, North Carolina returned Indictments charging the following foreign nationals with false claim of United States citizenship in order to register to vote, and voting by an alien:

- Jose Cruz Solano-Rodriguez, age 41, of Mexico;
- Guadalupe Espinosa-Pena, age 63, of Mexico;
- Sarah Emilia Silverio-Polanco, age 35, of the Dominican Republic;
- Elizabeth Nene Amachaghi, age 44, of Nigeria;
- Maria Rufina Castillo-Boswell, age 31, of Philippines;
- Dora Maybe Damatta-Rodriguez, age 64, of Panama;
- Elvis David Fullerton, age 54, of Grenada;
- Olive Agatha Martin, age 71, of Guyana; and
- Kaoru Sauls, age 54, of Japan.

Separately, criminal charges of voting by an alien were filed against the following

foreign nationals:

- Jose Jaime Ramiro-Torres, age 52, of El Salvador;
- Juan Francisco Landeros-Mireles, age 64, of Mexico;
- Alessandro Cannizzaro, age 46, of Italy;
- Dieudonne Soifils, age 71, of Haiti;
- Hyo Suk George, age 69, of Korea;
- Merius Jean, age 54, of Haiti;
- Rosemarie Angelika Harris, age 60, of Germany; and
- Daniel Tadeusz Romanowski, age 39, of Poland.

Additionally, a federal grand jury in Wilmington has returned an Indictment charging an eighteenth defendant, Diana Patricia Franco-Rodriguez, age 26, of Mexico, with fraud and misuse of visas, permits, and other documents, and voting by an alien.

Also, a federal grand jury in Wilmington has returned an Indictment charging Denslo Allen Paige, age 66, with aiding and abetting Espinosa-Pena in falsely claiming United States citizenship in order to register to vote.

Separately, on August 14, 2018, Ramon Esteban Paez-Jerez, age 58, of the Dominican Republic, was charged and pleaded guilty to a two-count Criminal Information charging him with passport fraud and voting by an alien.

According to the Criminal Information, Paez-Jerez in 1988 was ordered deported from the United States and failed to appear for his scheduled removal. According to court records, Paez-Jerez assumed a fraudulent identity and applied for amnesty. Paez-Jerez in 1989 was granted lawful permanent status under the false identity and in 1999 was naturalized contrary to law as a United States citizen. On July 7, 2007, Paez-Jerez registered to vote in North Carolina under his fraudulent identity.

On September 16, 2009, Paez-Jerez made a false statement in an application for a United States passport when he applied under the fraudulent identity and failed to disclose his real name.

On November 8, 2016, Paez-Jerez illegally voted in the General Election of 2016 in Wake County, North Carolina, knowing he had illegally obtained United States citizenship.

Paez-Jerez faces maximum penalties of eleven years' imprisonment, a \$350,000

fine, and a term of supervised release following any term of imprisonment. Sentencing is scheduled for the term of court commencing on December 11, 2018, in New Bern, North Carolina.

If convicted of false claim of United States citizenship in order to register to vote, and voting by an alien, Amachaghi, Castillo-Boswell, Damatta-Rodriguez, Espinosa-Pena, Fullerton, Martin, Sauls, Silverio-Polanco, and Solano-Rodriguez, would face maximum penalties of six years' imprisonment, a \$350,000 fine, and a term of supervised release following any term of imprisonment.

If convicted of voting by an alien, Cannizzaro, George, Harris, Jean, Landeros-Mireles, Ramiro-Torres, Romanowski, and Soifils would face maximum penalties of twelve months imprisonment, a \$100,000 fine, and a term of supervised release following any term of imprisonment.

If convicted of fraud and misuse of visas, permits, and other documents, and voting by an alien, Franco-Rodriguez would face maximum penalties of twenty-six years imprisonment, a \$350,000 fine, and a term of supervised release following any term of imprisonment.

If convicted of aiding and abetting in falsely claiming United States citizenship in order to register to vote, Denslo Allen Paige would face a maximum imprisonment term of five years, a \$250,000 fine, and a term of supervised release following any term of imprisonment.

The charges and allegations contained in the Indictments and Criminal Informations are merely accusations. An Indictment is a formal written accusation originating with the United States Attorney and issued by a Grand Jury against a party charged with a crime. A Criminal Information is a formal written accusation filed directly by the United States Attorney. All defendants are presumed innocent until proven guilty beyond a reasonable doubt in a court of law.

The cases are being investigated under the newly created framework of the Document and Benefit Fraud Task Force (DBFTF) in the Eastern District of North Carolina lead by Immigration and Customs Enforcement - Homeland Security Investigations, and assisted by Enforcement Removal Operations, and the Department of State - Diplomatic Security Service. The investigation as to voting fraud is ongoing.

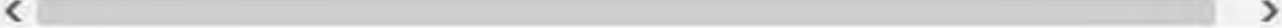

CEO of Two Bellevue Information Technology Companies Arrested on Visa Fraud Charge

Criminal Complaint Alleges that CEO Led Multi-Year Scheme Involving Forged and Fraudulent Documents to Get Visas for Specialty-Occupation Employment

The CEO of two Bellevue, Washington information-technology firms was arrested yesterday afternoon at Sea-Tac Airport on a charge relating to a multi-year visa-fraud scheme, announced U.S. Attorney Annette L. Hayes. PRADYUMNA KUMAR SAMAL, 49, a citizen of India, was taken into custody as he arrived from an international flight. The criminal complaint describing the visa-fraud scheme was filed under seal in April 2018, soon after SAMAL fled the United States while the investigation was ongoing. SAMAL remained out of the country until yesterday when he was arrested by law enforcement. SAMAL will make his initial appearance on the charges in U.S. District Court in Seattle at 2:00 PM today.

The criminal complaint describes how two companies incorporated by SAMAL in 2010 and 2011, engaged in a scheme sometimes referred to as a “bench-and-switch” scheme, to exploit foreign-national workers, compete unlawfully in the market, and defraud the U.S. government. According to the investigation that began in 2015, SAMAL served as the Chief Executive Officer of ‘Divensi’ and ‘Azimetry.’ Both companies were in the business of providing information-technology workers, such as Software Development Engineers, to major corporate clients. The complaint alleges that SAMAL submitted, and directed his employees to submit, forged and false application materials to the United States government, making it appear as if two corporate clients already had agreed to use several foreign-national employees named in the applications. In fact, neither client had agreed to do so. The forged documents included forged letters and fraudulent statements of work, which appeared as if they had been signed by senior executives at the two clients. After USCIS relied on the false representations and approved the applications, SAMAL’s companies “benched” the foreign nationals – i.e., the companies left those foreign nationals unpaid – until and unless they were able to place those employees at actual end clients.

Nearly 200 workers may have been brought in under the phony applications. The employees were forced to pay SAMAL’s companies a partially-refundable “security deposit” of as much as \$5,000 for the visa filings, regardless of whether they were assigned to any projects that provided them with income.

Visa Fraud is punishable by up to ten years in prison and a \$250,000 fine.

The charges contained in the complaint are only allegations. A person is presumed innocent unless and until he or she is proven guilty beyond a reasonable doubt in a court of law.

The case is being investigated by the U.S. State Department’s Diplomatic Security Service (DSS). The case is being prosecuted by Assistant United States Attorney Siddharth Velamoor.

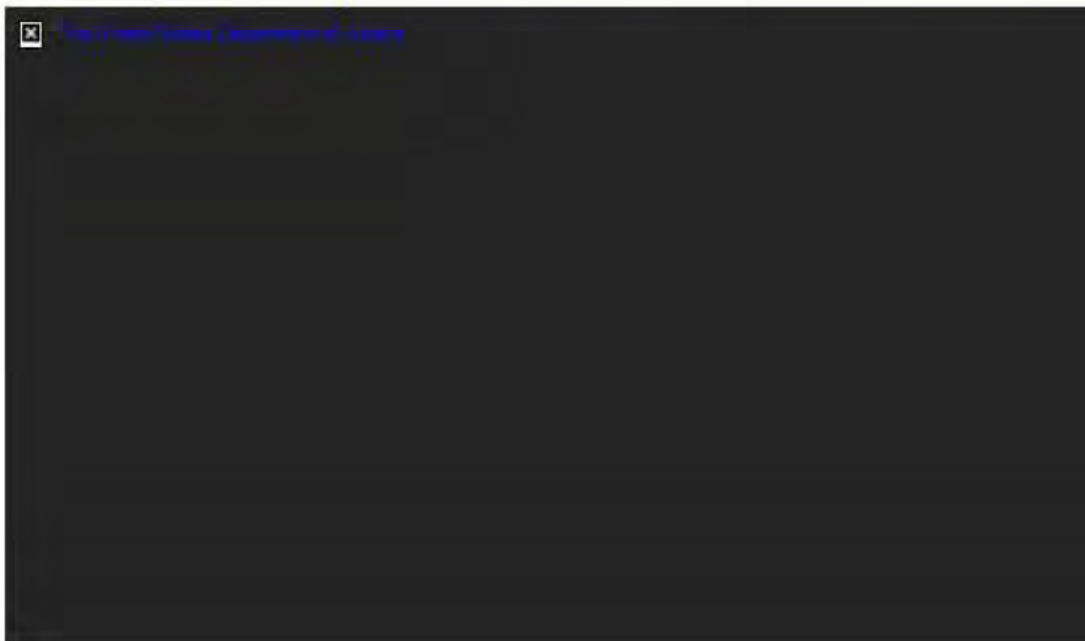

OVER 20 MS-13 GANG MEMBERS ARRESTED IN CALIFORNIA FOR ASSAULT AND DRUG TRAFFICKING

Murder, Kidnapping, and Assault Indictments against MS-13 Members also Unsealed; Seven Firearms, More Than 60 Machetes and Knives, and 270 Rounds of Ammo Seized

WASHINGTON — As part of a multi-agency operation, more than 20 individuals associated with Mara Salvatrucha (MS-13) were arrested in Mendota and Los Angeles, California on federal and state charges in connection with their gang activities, including assault with a dangerous weapon in aid of racketeering and conspiracy to distribute and possess with intent to distribute controlled substances. Additionally, two federal indictments were unsealed today: one charging two MS-13 members with kidnapping and murder in aid of racketeering and another charging three MS-13 gang members with conspiracy and assault with a dangerous weapon in aid of racketeering.

The charges were announced by Assistant Attorney General Brian A. Benczkowski of the Justice Department's Criminal Division, U.S. Attorney McGregor W. Scott for the Eastern District of California, California Attorney General Xavier Becerra, Special Agent in Charge Sean Ragan of the FBI's Sacramento Field Office, Fresno County District Attorney Lisa Smittcamp, Fresno County Sheriff Margaret Mims, and Special Agent in Charge Ryan L. Spradlin of U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement's Homeland Security Investigations (HSI) for northern California and northern Nevada.

The investigation leading to yesterday's arrests began following reports that MS-13 had established a presence in Fresno County, California. The investigation centered in and around the City of Mendota, a Central Valley town 35 miles west of Fresno. Investigators found evidence of broad criminal activity, including murder, assault, firearms possession and drug trafficking activity.

"MS-13 is a brutal transnational criminal organization that has wreaked havoc in communities across the United States," said Assistant Attorney General Benczkowski. "The gang engages in indiscriminate and senseless acts of violence, as demonstrated by the charges announced today, which allege murder, attempted murder, and drug trafficking in the State of California. Dismantling MS-13 and other violent gangs that terrorize our streets will remain a top priority of the Department of Justice. Today's announcement is the result of

comprehensive and coordinated federal, state, and local law enforcement action, and I commend the Eastern District of California and all of our partners for their hard work on this case. It is precisely this kind of coordinated effort that allows us to most effectively protect our communities and hold MS-13 members accountable for their heinous crimes.”

“The operation leading to today’s arrests reflects the incredible teamwork between our federal, state, and local law enforcement partners, and our shared commitment to keeping our communities safe from violent criminal gangs like MS-13, said U.S. Attorney Scott. “This investigation had a strong impact not only in Fresno County, but across the state and country as we were able to provide information and leads to law enforcement in Los Angeles, Nevada, Texas, New York, and elsewhere to help prevent and solve serious crimes, including murder. Criminal enterprises like MS-13 will not be tolerated in any of our towns, no matter how small.”

“Global criminal organizations like the MS-13 strike fear into our local communities here in the United States by committing violent and often brutal crimes in our backyards; but by all levels of law enforcement working together, their vicious and dangerous acts will not go unpunished,” said HSI Special Agent in Charge Spradlin. “While transnational gangs may have tentacles that reach globally, Homeland Security Investigations does as well and is well-equipped to intercept these threats to our national security.”

“The FBI is committed to aggressively investigating and disrupting gang activity,” said FBI Special Agent in Charge Ragan. “Through the Safe Streets Task Force and the Transnational Anti-Gang Initiative, the FBI leverages resources to target MS-13--the first and only street gang to be designated by the U.S. government as a transnational criminal organization--by focusing on the gang’s structure and leadership. To ensure success, the FBI is committed to working in close cooperation with federal, state, local and foreign law enforcements partners to coordinate operations and share information.”

The first federal charges filed as a result of the investigation were filed in January but were not unsealed until today. That indictment alleges that on Dec. 18, 2017, two MS-13 gang members operating out of Mendota – Israel Rivas Gomez and John Doe, aka, “Marcos Castro,” “Seco,” “Calakas,” and “Flaco,” – kidnapped and murdered a man in Fresno County in furtherance of MS-13’s criminal gang enterprise. Another indictment filed in April and unsealed today alleges that on May 5, 2017, Luis Reynaldo Reyes Castillo, aka “Molesto,” Jose Audon Reyes Barrera, aka “Calacas,” and Nilson Israel Reyes Mendoza, committed an assault with dangerous weapons for the purpose of maintaining MS-13’s presence in the community and to gain status within MS-13.

Several other MS-13 gang members were arrested yesterday based on a complaint filed this week and unsealed today. The complaint charges 16 individuals affiliated with MS-13 in Fresno County with various crimes, including two separate, gang-related assaults and drug trafficking activity to support the gang’s activity. Those documents allege that on Aug. 12, Lorenzo Amador, aka

Catracho, along with two others, stabbed a rival gang member in the back at an intersection in Mendota. The victim was transported to the hospital, underwent surgery, and survived. Court documents also allege that on May 14, Denis Barrera-Palma, aka Gunner, Ever Membreno, aka Canecho, and Edgar Torres-Amador, participated in a gang-related assault of a man walking near an elementary school, which ended after school employees arrived on the scene while one gang member beat the victim with a metal pipe.

Additionally, the complaint alleges that between May 2017 and August 2018, 16 members of the MS-13 enterprise participated in a drug trafficking conspiracy in both Fresno County and Los Angeles. These defendants allegedly obtained, sold, and profited from street level drug dealing, and used the proceeds to further MS-13's criminal objectives.

As part of this operation, 19 federal and four state search warrants were served in Mendota, Kerman, and Los Angeles. Additionally, California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation conducted searches of 37 cells in 11 state prisons in California on individuals related to this investigation. Among the items seized were cellphones, drugs and weapons.

Amongst the 21 charged federally include:

- Henry Castro aka "Marcos," 20, of Mendota, is charged with kidnapping and murder;
- Israel Rivas Gomez, aka "Pirra," 23, of Mendota, is charged with kidnapping and murder;
- Ever Membreno, aka, "Canecho," 18, of Mendota, is charged with assault with a dangerous weapon – a pipe and drug conspiracy;
- Edgar Torres-Amador, 21, of Mendota, is charged with assault with a dangerous weapon – a pipe;
- Lorenzo Amador, aka, "Catracho," 20, of Mendota, is charged with assault with a dangerous weapon – a stabbing instrument and drug conspiracy;
- Denis Barrera-Palma, aka "Gunner," 24, of Mendota, is charged with assault with a dangerous weapon – a pipe and drug conspiracy;
- Luis Reyes, aka Molesto, 24, of Mendota, is charged with conspiracy to commit and commission of assault with a dangerous weapon;
- Jose Audon Reyes-Barrera, 21, of Mendota, is charged with conspiracy to commit and commission of assault with a dangerous weapon;
- Nelson Hernandez, 20, of Mendota, is charged with conspiracy to commit and commission of assault with a dangerous weapon;
- Mario Garcia-Villanueva, aka "Ton," 31, of Mendota, is charged with drug conspiracy;
- Francisco Lizano, aka, "Javi," and "Activo," 24, of Mendota, is charged with drug conspiracy;
- Jefferson Cuervo, aka "Chino," 19, of Los Angeles, is charged with drug

- Jefferson Guevara, aka "Chino," 19, of Los Angeles, is charged with drug conspiracy;
- Jose Wilson Navarette-Mendez, aka "Wilson," 21, of Mendota, is charged with drug conspiracy;
- Denis Alfaro-Torres, aka Payin, 22, of Mendota, is charged with drug conspiracy;
- Santos Bonilla, aka Cuervo, 26, of Mendota, is charged with drug conspiracy;
- Henry Bonilla, aka "Repollo" and "Repollin," 18, of Mendota, is charged with drug conspiracy;
- Marvin Villegas-Segovia, aka, "Chaparro," 21, of Mendota, is charged with drug conspiracy;
- Christian Hidalgo, aka "Guero," "Hero," "Werito," and "White Boy," 21, of Mendota, is charged with drug conspiracy;
- Brenda Yajaira Morales, aka "Yari," 25, of Mendota, is charged with drug conspiracy;
- Claudia Lizaola, aka "Maniaka," 39, of San Bernardino, is charged with drug conspiracy; and
- Oscar Reyes, aka "Tamagas," 29, of Mendota, is charged with drug conspiracy.

Six additional MS-13 members were charged with state crimes.

The investigation was conducted by the California Department of Justice and California Highway Patrol Special Operations Unit, the Multi-Agency Gang Enforcement Consortium (MAGEC), the FBI, HSI, the Fresno County District Attorney's Office, the Fresno County Sheriff's Office, and the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation Special Services Unit (SSU). The CHP Special Operations Unit is a collaborative investigative effort between the California Department of Justice and California Highway Patrol that provides statewide enforcement to combat violent career criminals, gangs, and organized crime groups, along with intrastate drug traffickers.

Assisting in the arrests were the U.S. Marshals Service; the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration; the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives; and the Clovis Police Department.

Trial Attorney Marianne Shelvey of the Criminal Division's Organized Crime and Gang Section of the Justice Department, Assistant U.S. Attorneys Kimberly A. Sanchez, Kathleen A. Servatius, Ross Pearson and Angela Scott of the Eastern District of California and Senior Deputy District Attorney Dennis Lewis are handling the prosecutions.

The charges are only allegations; the defendants are presumed innocent until proven guilty beyond a reasonable doubt in a court of law.

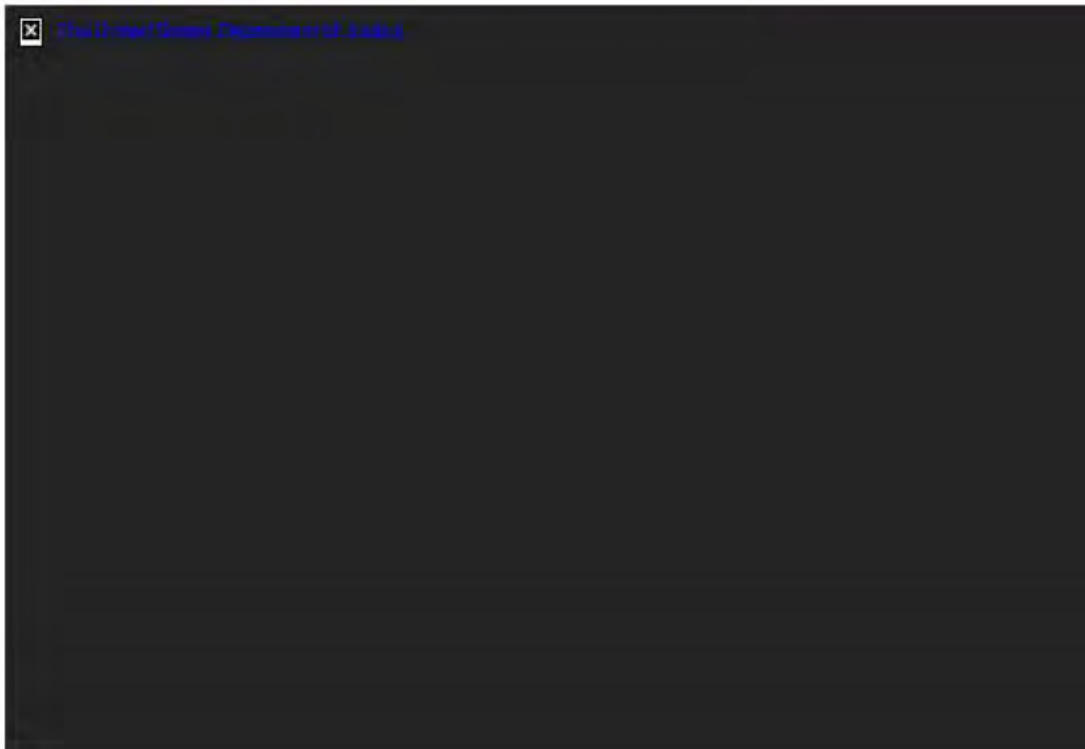

Evelyn Rodriguez, mother of girl allegedly killed by MS-13, fatally struck by car, cops say

Evelyn Rodriguez, whose 16-year-old daughter was killed in 2016 allegedly by MS-13 gang members was fatally struck by a vehicle Friday before a memorial service for her child, Suffolk County Police Chief of Department Stuart Cameron said.

"Evelyn Rodriguez was struck by a vehicle on Stahley Street in Brentwood at approximately 4:10 p.m. today," police said in a statement. "She was transported to Southside Hospital in Bay Shore where she was pronounced dead."

Rep. Peter King (R-Seaford), who was on his way to the memorial, tweeted on Friday evening that Rodriguez had died. In a separate tweet, he said: "Prayers for Evelyn Rodriguez the mother of MS-13 victim Kayla Cuevas. Evelyn was struck by vehicle this afternoon at her daughter's memorial."

Rodriguez, mother of Kayla Cuevas, became a vocal youth advocate after her daughter's death and met with President Trump. She also attended his State of the Union address earlier this year as a White House guest.

A law enforcement source said Rodriguez and a man got into an argument with a driver on Friday afternoon on Stahley Street. Rodriguez was struck by the vehicle after the dispute and died as a

result of her injuries, the source said. The driver, a woman, stayed at the scene and has not been arrested, but the incident is under investigation by the police department's homicide squad to determine the motorist's intent, the source said.

King said he was on his way to the memorial when he received a call from one of Rodriguez's friends who said she had been struck and had died. King had been talking to Rodriguez all week because she had just filmed a campaign commercial for him, he said.

Authorities have said that Cuevas and her 15-year-old friend Nisa Mickens, both of whom were students at Brentwood High School, were bludgeoned to death with bats and machetes by MS-13 gang members. Their bodies were discovered less than a day apart in Brentwood in September 2016.

Elizabeth Alvarado, mother of Nisa Mickens, arrived at the scene after the crash. She desperately tried to get past the crime scene tape, but family members held her back. A few minutes later, she broke down in tears and had to be led away from the scene.

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Magaly Rivera, who said she had been friends with Rodriguez since Kayla and her son were small, said she was on the way to the memorial when she got a call from Rodriguez's daughter.

"The only thing I know is my friend is dead," she said. "And at the same place where she lost her daughter."

Federal prosecutors said Cuevas was involved in a series of disputes with members and associates of MS-13, including disputes over social media. The more than a half-dozen alleged gang members who have been indicted in the girls' slayings were supposedly hunting for rival gang members to kill when they happened to come across Cuevas and Mickens.

Rodriguez last year filed a \$110 million federal suit against the Brentwood schools, claiming that the district failed to protect her daughter against MS-13 gang members and ignored warnings about repeated threats to the teen.

JUSTICE DEPARTMENT ANNOUNCES FOURTH SETTLEMENT

PROTECTING U.S. WORKERS FROM DISCRIMINATION

WASHINGTON – The Justice Department today reached a settlement agreement with Palmetto Beach Hospitality LLC (Palmetto), a company that provides housekeeping services to hotels in the Myrtle Beach, South Carolina area. The agreement resolves the Department’s investigation into whether Palmetto unlawfully denied employment to qualified and available U.S. workers because it preferred to hire temporary foreign workers with H-2B visas. It is the fourth settlement under the Civil Rights Division’s Protecting U.S. Workers Initiative, which is aimed at targeting, investigating, and taking enforcement actions against companies that discriminate against U.S. workers in favor of temporary visa workers.

The Department’s investigation determined that Palmetto failed to consider applications from qualified U.S. workers for its housekeeper positions, even though employers are required to recruit and hire available and qualified U.S. workers before they receive permission to hire temporary foreign workers under the H-2B visa program. After ignoring applications from U.S. workers, Palmetto represented to the U.S. Department of Labor (DOL) that it could not find qualified U.S. workers and obtained authorization to employ temporary visa workers.

“The Department of Justice will fight to ensure that U.S. workers are not denied jobs because an employer has a discriminatory preference for hiring temporary visa workers,” said Acting Assistant Attorney General John Gore of the Civil Rights Division. “I commend Palmetto for its cooperation with the Department’s investigation, and its agreement to engage in domestic recruitment efforts far surpassing the minimal recruiting requirements to participate in the H-2B visa worker program.”

Failing to consider or hire qualified U.S. workers based on their citizenship status violates the anti-discrimination provision of the Immigration and Nationality Act (INA), regardless of whether an employer has complied with other rules governing the use of temporary employment-based visa programs.

Under the settlement, Palmetto must engage in several types of enhanced recruiting and job advertising efforts to attract qualified U.S. workers, far beyond those required by the H-2B visa rules. Palmetto also must set aside \$35,000 to pay any wages lost by U.S. workers whose applications it improperly rejected or ignored, pay \$42,000 in civil penalties to the United States, and be subject to departmental monitoring.

Under the Protecting U.S. Workers Initiative, the Civil Rights Division has opened dozens of investigations, filed one lawsuit, and reached settlement agreements with four employers. Since the Initiative’s inception, employers have agreed to pay or have distributed over \$320,000 in back pay to affected U.S. workers. The Division has also increased its collaboration with other federal agencies, including a new [formalized partnership](#) with DOL to combat discrimination and abuse by employers using foreign visa workers.

The Division’s Immigrant and Employee Rights Section (IER) is responsible for enforcing the anti-discrimination provision of the INA. Among other things, the statute prohibits [citizenship status and national origin discrimination](#) in hiring, firing, or recruitment or referral for a fee; [unfair documentary practices](#); and [retaliation and intimidation](#).

(1) Consistent with *Matter of Castro-Tum*, 27 I&N Dec. 271 (A.G. 2018), immigration judges have no inherent authority to terminate or dismiss removal proceedings.

(2) Immigration judges may dismiss or terminate removal proceedings only under the circumstances expressly identified in the regulations, see 8 C.F.R. § 1239.2(c), (f), or where the Department of Homeland Security fails to sustain the charges of removability against a respondent, see 8 C.F.R. § 1240.12(c).

(3) An immigration judge's general authority to "take any other action consistent with applicable law and regulations as may be appropriate," 8 C.F.R. § 1240.1(a)(1)(iv), does not provide any additional authority to terminate or dismiss removal proceedings beyond those authorities expressly set out in the relevant regulations.

(4) To avoid confusion, immigration judges and the Board should recognize and maintain the distinction between a dismissal under 8 C.F.R. § 1239.2(c) and a termination under 8 C.F.R. § 1239.2(f).

Dear Attorney General Sessions:

I write to you concerning the rise of white supremacist movements in the United States. This past weekend in Charlottesville, our nation bore witness to what happens when a hateful ideology morphs into violence. I applaud your announcement that the actions of white supremacists this past weekend constituted “domestic terrorism” under 18 U.S.C. § 2331 and are being investigated as such. I remain concerned, however, that white supremacists find a home in the White House, including at the highest levels of President Trump’s staff.

The President’s Chief Strategist Stephen Bannon has published articles lauding white supremacist groups and White House Deputy Assistant Sebastian Gorka has ties to a Hungarian Nazi group.¹ White House Senior Advisor Stephen Miller has used language linked to white supremacist groups in press briefings.² While the Constitutional rights of these individuals must be protected, the increasing violence tied to extremist groups requires swift action. I urge you to investigate Bannon, Gorka, Miller and anyone else in the White House who may have ties to the KKK, Neo-Nazis, and other white supremacist groups across the country.

The Southern Poverty Law Center – an organization that tracks domestic terrorist groups and hate groups – has reported a significant rise in hate groups in the last two years.³ According to the Center, the largest spike in hate groups is among anti-Muslim groups; relatedly, hate crimes against Muslims have jumped by 67% since 2015.⁴ The Anti-Defamation League cautions against determining the prevalence of white nationalist based on group membership, because “[m]ost white supremacists do not belong to

organized hate groups, but rather participate in the white supremacist movement as unaffiliated individuals.”⁵ Generally speaking, there has been a rise in white supremacist violence since 2009.⁶

White supremacy is more than just a twisted ideology, it is a violent movement:

September 15–Oct. 4, 2001. Mark Stroman – a member of the Aryan Brotherhood – shot three South Asian men. Mr. Stroman believed that they were from the Middle East and described his crimes as retaliation for the attacks on 9/11.⁷

December 8, 2003. Steven Bixby and his father, Arthur –members of the white supremacist Sovereign Citizens movement - killed two police officers in Abbeville, South Carolina during a dispute over the state's use of a 20-foot strip land adjacent to the Bixbys’ property to widen a highway.⁸

May 24, 2004. Wade Lay and his son Christopher Lay killed a bank security guard in Tulsa, Oklahoma, as a part of a botched bank robbery – the goal of which was to obtain money to pay for weapons they could use to kill the Texas officials who played a part in the standoff at Waco, Texas.⁹

October 13, 2004. Ivan Duane Braden was arrested after telling counsellors at a mental health facility that he planned to blow up a synagogue and a National Guard Armory. Braden possessed neo-Nazi literature at the time of his arrest.¹⁰

June 10, 2005. Daniel J. Schertz - a former member of the KKK – was arrested after selling pipe bombs to an undercover informant who told him he would use the bombs to kill Mexican and Haitian immigrants.¹¹

April 26, 2007. Members of the Alabama Militia were arrested after authorities discovered a “cache of 130 homemade hand grenades, an improvised grenade launcher, a Sten Mark submachine gun, a silencer, 2,500 rounds of ammunition and almost 100 marijuana plants.”¹²

June 8, 2008. Members of the Pennsylvania Citizens Militia were arrested; authorities found stacks of assault rifles and homemade explosives. The Militia members who were arrested described plots to shoot black people from rooftops and assassinate the governor of Pennsylvania.¹³

July 27, 2008. Jim David Adkisson shot and killed two people and wounded seven others during a children’s musical performance at a Unitarian Universalist church in Knoxville, Tennessee. Adkisson told authorities that he targeted liberals because he believed that they were ruining the country and that he hated LGBTQ people and black people.¹⁴

January 21, 2009. Neo-Nazi Keith Luke shot and killed three black immigrants in Massachusetts – killing two of them. He also had plans to attack a synagogue to “kill as many Jews as possible.” Luke carved a swastika into his own forehead using a razor in advance of a court appearance.¹⁵

April 4, 2009. Richard Andrew Poplawski, a frequent poster on white supremacist websites, shot four Pittsburgh police officers – killing three – who responded to a domestic violence incident at his home. Poplawski feared that a nation-wide “gun ban” was imminent.¹⁶

April 25, 2009. Joshua Cartwright shot and killed two sheriff's deputies in Florida who were attempting to arrest him on domestic violence charges. Cartwright's wife told police that he was "extremely disturbed" by Barack Obama's election.¹⁷

May 30, 2009. Shawna Forde, Albert Gaxiola, and Jason Bush posed as border patrol offices and murdered a Latino man and his nine-year-old daughter inside their home in Arivaca, Arizona. Forde had belonged to the Minuteman Civil Defense Corps. They planned the robbery to raise funds for their splinter group, Minutemen American Defense.¹⁸

May 31, 2009. Scott Roeder killed Dr. George Tiller, an abortion provider, in a Wichita, Kansas Lutheran church. Roeder has ties to the white supremacist Sovereign Citizens movement.¹⁹

June 10, 2009. White supremacist James von Brunn shot and killed a security guard at the Holocaust Museum in Washington D.C. A note in his car read: “The Holocaust is a lie. Obama was created by Jews. Obama does what his Jew owners tell him to do. Jews captured America’s money. Jews control the mass media.”²⁰

June 25, 2009. Dennis and Daniel Mahon, brothers with ties to the neo-Nazi group, White Aryan Resistance, injured three people with a mail bomb sent to a diversity office in Scottsdale, Arizona.²¹

March 25, 2010. Brody James Whitaker – a member of the white supremacist Sovereign Citizens movement – shot two Florida state troopers during a routine traffic stop.²²

May 10, 2010. Sandlin Matthew Smith planted a pipe bomb at a mosque in Jacksonville, Florida. Smith reportedly wanted to “show Muslims that they were vulnerable too.”²³

May 20, 2010. Jerry and Joseph Kane – father and son, both members of the white supremacist Sovereign Citizen movement – shoot and kill two West Memphis, Arkansas police officers with an AK-47.²⁴

January 17, 2011. Neo-Nazi Kevin William Harpham planted a bomb along the route of the Martin Luther King Day parade in Spokane, Washington. Authorities discovered the bomb and were able to defuse it.²⁵

August 24, 2011. Cody Seth Crawford firebombed the Salman Alfarisi Islamic Center in Corvallis, Ore.²⁶

September 26–Oct. 3, 2011. In a multi-state rampage, white supremacists David Joseph Pedersen and Holly Ann Grigsby murdered Pedersen's father and stepmother, a man they believed to be Jewish, and a black man. Grigsby told authorities that they “were on their way to Sacramento to kill more Jews.”²⁷

August 5, 2012. A white supremacist named Wade Michael Page murdered six people and wounded three others at a Sikh temple in Oak Creek, Wisconsin.²⁸ Page believed that he was killing Muslims; he was a long-time Neo-Nazi.²⁹

August 16, 2012. Seven members of the white supremacist Sovereign Citizens movement murdered two Louisiana sheriff's deputies in an ambush.³⁰

September 4, 2012. Christopher Lacy, who sympathized with the white supremacist Sovereign Citizens Movement, murdered a California Highway Patrol officer.³¹

April 13, 2014. Frazier Glenn Miller, an anti-Semitic white supremacist, murdered three people in the area of a Jewish community center and Jewish retirement community in Overland Park, Kansas.³²

June 8, 2014. Jerad and Amanda Miller murdered two police officers at a pizza restaurant in Las Vegas and then murdered a customer at a nearby Walmart. The Millers left a swastika on one of the bodies.³³

November 28, 2014. White supremacist Larry Steve McQuilliams fired more than a hundred rounds into a police station and a Mexican consulate in Austin, Texas. He also attempted to burn down the consulate.³⁴

June 17, 2015. Dylann Roof murdered nine parishioners at a historic black church in Charleston, South Carolina. Roof cited white supremacist Council of Conservative Citizens as inspiration for his attack.³⁵

July 24, 2015. John Russell Houser, a neo-Nazi and white supremacist, murdered two women at a screening of the Amy Schumer comedy *Trainwreck* in Lafayette, Louisiana.³⁶

November 24, 2015. Four men with ties to white supremacist groups shot and wounded five Black Lives Matter protesters in Minneapolis.³⁷


March 20, 2017. A 28-year-old white supremacist named James Harris Jackson stabbed a 66-year-old black stranger to death in midtown Manhattan. Jackson described the attack as a “practice run” for more killings and believe that the “white race is being eroded.”³⁸

May 26, 2017. White supremacist Jeremy Joseph Christian stabbed two men to death who were protecting two Muslim women that Christian attempted to attack.³⁹

I fear that this violence will continue unabated unless the Department of Justice takes immediate action against those who seek to use violence in pursuit of their twisted worldview. I therefore urge you to direct the Department of Justice to open an investigation into the rise of white supremacist violence, including: whether any White House staff are coordinating with members of hate groups in any way that may constitute incitement of violence; how deep the influence of white supremacy exists in the White House; and most swift ways to rid our federal government of white supremacists.

As you know, the Department of Justice has historically led efforts to eradicate violence fueled by race hatred and extremist ideologies. In the middle of the 20th Century, many crimes against African-Americans who fought for their civil rights would have gone unpunished, but for prosecution by the federal government. Indeed, the Department continues to prosecute cold cases from the civil rights movement and to prosecute individuals who engage in acts targeted at religious, ethnic, and racial minorities. In the years since 9/11, the DOJ created a “backlash discrimination team,” prosecuted those who targeted members of Muslim, Middle Eastern, or South Asian communities and conducted risk assessments to prioritize issues and communities that needed protection. Now, the DOJ must build on this legacy of protecting Americans’ civil rights. The victims of violent white supremacy deserve action and our nation demands it now.

This is our second interim response to your Freedom of Information Act request, dated and received in this Office on August 29, 2018, seeking records reflecting communications with our about Stephen Miller or referencing a particular phone number.

Previously, we provided you with one interim response, on June 26, 2020. At this time, I have determined that an additional 208 pages containing records responsive to your request are appropriate for release with excisions made pursuant to Exemptions 5 and 6 of the FOIA, 5 U.S.C. § 552(b)(5) and (b)(6). Additionally, 128 pages are being withheld in full pursuant to Exemption 5 of the FOIA. Exemption 5 pertains to certain inter- and intra-agency communications protected by civil discovery privileges. Exemption 6 pertains to information the release of which would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy. Lastly, two pages of material were determined to concern purely personal matters. Because these pages constituted personal records, they are not subject to the FOIA and are not included herein.

For your information, Congress excluded three discrete categories of law enforcement and national security records from the requirements of the FOIA. See 5 U.S.C. § 552(c) (2018). This response is limited to those records that are subject to the requirements of the FOIA. This is a standard notification that is given to all our requesters and should not be taken as an indication that excluded records do, or do not, exist.

There is a public GAO report from 2011 that contains a section on post-9/11 international terrorism and terrorism-related convictions that breaks down the NSD statistics as follows:

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Forty-Three Percent of Individuals Convicted as a Result of Terrorism-Related Investigations Were Aliens

In March 2010, DOJ's National Security Division reported information on convictions resulting from international

terrorism investigations conducted since September 11, 2001. According to DOJ, the convictions represent cases where defendants were directly linked to international terrorism as well as those who at the time of charging appeared to have a connection to international terrorism. To determine if any of the individuals convicted in these terrorism-related cases were aliens, we requested that U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) provide us the immigration or citizenship status, if known, of these individuals.

Based on USCIS information, 173 (43 percent) of the 399 individuals included in DOJ's list of convictions resulting from international terrorism-related investigations were, at the time of charging, aliens with or without legal immigration status. The remaining 226 individuals (57 percent) were either U.S. citizens²¹, naturalized U.S. citizens, aliens brought into the United States for prosecution, or unknown. Of the 105 aliens with legal immigration status, 68 (65 percent) were lawful permanent residents. Table 3 shows the immigration or citizenship status related to these individuals.

²¹ See DOJ, *Introduction to National Security Division Statistics on Unsealed International Terrorism and Terrorism-Related Convictions* (Washington, D.C. March 2010). DOJ included individuals identified and detained in the course of a nationwide investigation conducted after September 11, 2001, and subsequently charged with a criminal offense, as well as additional defendants who, at the time of charging appeared to have a connection to international terrorism even if they were not charged with a terrorism-related offense. About 20 Percent of Individuals Convicted under Statutes Directly Related to Terrorism Were Aliens

According to DOJ, some of the defendants on the DOJ list were charged with violations of federal statutes that are directly related to international terrorism, such as hostage taking and bombings of places of public use.

Twenty-two individuals (21 percent) of the 107 individuals convicted of statutes identified by DOJ as directly related to terrorism were aliens with or without legal immigration status, as shown in table 4. The remaining 85 individuals (79 percent) were either U.S. citizens, naturalized U.S. citizens, aliens brought into the United States for prosecution, or unknown. Of the 107 individuals, 62 individuals were also convicted under other statutes not directly related to terrorism.

About 50 Percent of Individuals Convicted under Other Statutes Were Aliens

DOJ also included on its list defendants where the investigation involved an identified link to international terrorism but they were charged with violating other statutes, including fraud, immigration, drugs, false statements, and general conspiracy charges. Of the 292 individuals convicted under other statutes, 151 individuals (52 percent) were aliens with or without legal immigration status. The remaining 141 individuals (48 percent) were either U.S. citizens, naturalized U.S. citizens, aliens brought into the United States for prosecution, or unknown, as shown in table 5.

Three of the Individuals on DOJ's List Received U.S. Citizenship after Their Conviction

An individual applying for naturalization must demonstrate good moral character for a statutory period of time—from 5 years preceding the application up to admission to citizenship. This includes not having been convicted of crimes, such as murder, rape, drug trafficking, or other aggravated felonies prior to or during that period, as well as not having been convicted of other crimes during that period, such as certain drug offenses or convictions that led to 180 days or more of prison time.

Based upon our analysis of USCIS and DOJ data, three of the individuals on the DOJ list received U.S. citizenship after their convictions. Two were convicted of unlawful production of an identity document and one was convicted of transferring funds out of the country in violation of U.S. sanctions.

According to USCIS documentation, in all three cases

- the convictions were outside of the statutory period, were not aggravated felonies, and resulted in no prison time for the defendants;
- all required background checks were conducted and resolved with appropriate law enforcement agencies; and
- no national security, public safety, or other grounds of ineligibility existed.

As a result, USCIS determined that each of these

individuals were able to demonstrate good moral character within the required period of time and met all other requirements for naturalization.

"This is a new era. This is the Trump era," Attorney General Jeff Sessions declared from the U.S.-Mexico border last week.

Since he became the nation's top law enforcement officer, the former Alabama senator has been carrying out many of President Trump's campaign promises — and he has done so perhaps the most smoothly of any administration official.

Sessions may have had a rocky confirmation, but he has been "moving very quickly to do the things he said he would," John Malcolm at the conservative Heritage Foundation told the Washington Examiner. And he's carrying out his mission without a team in place.

Trump has yet to nominate hundreds of lower-level officials throughout the Justice Department, all of whom must be confirmed by the Senate. And yet, he is carrying out his agenda.

Here are some of the ways Sessions has done just that:

Immigration

Sessions has directed all U.S. attorneys to step up prosecutions of illegal immigrants, especially those who have crossed the border more than once.

He also has ended the Obama-era policy of "catch and release," which sends back illegal immigrants at the border instead of holding them for breaking federal law.

"Pursuant to the president's executive order, we will now be detaining all adults who are apprehended at the border. They will not be released," Sessions said.

Though the nation's backlog of immigration cases will undoubtedly grow with the new policies, Sessions announced a new hiring bump to help speed up the process. And for immigrants who need to be sent to jail, Sessions has rescinded guidance from former President Barack Obama's administration that directed the Bureau of Prisons to phase out private prison contracts.

Sessions also has threatened to crack down on jurisdictions that don't comply with federal immigration detention requests. Cities that continue to adhere to "sanctuary" policies could lose billions in federal grant funding, Sessions has said.

For groups such as the Federation for American Immigration Reform, simply having the administration say it will take up immigration enforcement has made a big difference.

Ira Mehlman, FAIR's media director, said the biggest results — fewer illegal border crossings and arrests at the border — have come by "projecting the idea that we are serious about immigration enforcement."

"People are responding rationally to the signals that we send," Mehlman said, adding that ending catch and release was one of the best concrete moves Sessions has done.

Next up, he said FAIR hopes Sessions deals with the immigrants in the country illegally and gives companies incentives not to hire illegal immigrants, which would be the "biggest deterrent," as it is the reason why so many people cross the border without documentation in the first place.

Law enforcement and crime

Sessions is what Jim Pasco, the executive director of the National Fraternal Order of Police, calls a "career civil servant" who has always been "a go-to guy for law enforcement."

"He's always the same unabashed supporter of justice that he's always been," Pasco said of the former top Republican on the Senate Judiciary

Committee, revealing that his union has met with Sessions, Trump and Vice President Mike Pence in publicly and privately announced meetings.

In every major public speech since being sworn in, Sessions has brought up an increase in crime and has promised the Justice Department will become tougher on crime and help boost public safety.

"These first few months have been a successful opening chapter in what will be a long story about restoring public safety in America," said Justice Department spokesman Ian Prior. "Over the next few months, that story will continue to develop as the department announces new initiatives and renews its commitment to keep our communities safe."

The agency is reviewing any existing or possible consent decrees, which are court-binding agreements that bring in the federal government to help police with reforms. Sessions recently ordered a sweeping review of them, making clear his belief that "it is not the responsibility of the federal government to manage non-federal law enforcement agencies."

Pasco and the police union, which was the only police organization which to testify in support of Sessions' confirmation, say they like such an approach.

"He does not see himself as the police chief of every city. He sees himself as an asset, as someone who can facilitate federal assistance in addressing crime problems — but he isn't trying to take any place over," Pasco said.

Pasco says he hopes the next item Sessions' tackles is the so-called militarization of police. The 1033 Program, which gives excessive military equipment to civil law enforcement agencies, was rolled back under Obama.

Beefing up that program is something Pasco says he discussed with Sessions, Trump and Pence, and they are "actively reviewing that now, with a view to ensuring that police officers get and have the assets they need to protect themselves as they protect their cities."

Civil rights

Civil rights were heavily emphasized under Obama Attorney General Loretta Lynch.

One of Lynch's biggest civil rights actions was issuing federal guidance that required schools receiving federal funds to allow transgender students to use the bathroom facility in accordance to their gender

identity. Failing to do so would violate federal civil rights law, Lynch said.

In February, the Justice Department and the Department of Education said schools are no longer obligated to follow that guidance, which sparked backlash from LGBTQ groups.

"Congress, state legislatures and local governments are in a position to adopt appropriate policies or laws addressing this issue," Sessions said. "The Department of Justice remains committed to the proper interpretation and enforcement of Title IX and to its protections for all students, including LGBTQ students, from discrimination, bullying and harassment."

The National Center for Transgender Equality charges that since the administration withdrew the Obama guidance in February, "the administration has begun a sweeping attack on civil rights in the workplace, schools, housing, healthcare and the ballot box."

"The transgender community — comprised of over 1.5 million Americans — is just one of many communities being callously targeted by the administration's actions and rhetoric. Congress and the American people must recognize this threat for what it is and stand up for the dignity and equality of all Americans," said Executive Director Mara Keisling.

On Friday, the Justice Department also withdrew its lawsuit — brought by the Obama administration last year — against North Carolina over its "bathroom bill." The decision to dismiss its lawsuit comes after Gov. Roy Cooper and Republican lawmakers reached a compromise last month and repealed the legislation — House Bill 2 — requiring transgender people to use public restroom facilities that corresponded to their birth gender.

However, despite the repeal, LGBTQ groups are critical of the new law, saying it still allows for discrimination.

Vanita Gupta, the head of the Justice Department's Civil Rights Division under Obama, tweeted against the lawsuit being dropped: "Sadly predictable. They can dismiss but they cannot erase. The fight for LGBTQ justice is strong."

Sentencing laws

Though Sessions has yet to move on sentencing laws, his hiring of Steven H. Cook, a former federal prosecutor, signals that changes could be coming.

Cook, who has been the president of the National Association of

Assistant U.S. Attorneys, was recently appointed to be one of Sessions' top advisers — though it has not been publicly announced — on criminal justice.

"When you put criminals in jail, crime goes down," Cook told the Knoxville, Tenn., News Sentinel last year. "That's what incapacitation is designed to do, and it works."

Known as being a hardliner on sentencing laws like Cook, Sessions has been vocal in his support of mandatory minimum sentences.

During the Obama administration, former Attorney General Eric Holder issued a memo allowing prosecutors the flexibility for no longer having to pursue the mandatory minimum for certain low-level drug offenses. That memo could be in jeopardy not just under Sessions' new Task Force on Crime Reduction and Public Safety, but under Cook as well. The National Association of Assistant U.S. Attorneys, under Cook's leadership, opposed Obama's efforts to reform sentencing laws.

"When mandatory minimums are either eliminated or reduced substantially, it reduces the ability of law officers to negotiate and protect the public," Sessions said at a Senate hearing in 2015. "I've been there, I've prosecuted cases."

ATTORNEY GENERAL JEFF SESSIONS PREPARED REMARKS TO THE UNITED STATES SENATE SELECT COMMITTEE ON INTELLIGENCE

WASHINGTON, D.C.

Thank you Chairman Burr and Ranking Member Warner for allowing me to publicly appear before the committee today.

I appreciate the Committee's critically important efforts to investigate Russian interference with our democratic process. Such interference can never be tolerated and I encourage every effort to get to the bottom of any such allegations.

As you know, the Deputy Attorney General has appointed a special counsel to investigate matters related to Russian interference in the 2016 election. I am here today to address several issues that have been specifically raised before this committee, and I appreciate the opportunity to respond to questions as fully as I am able to do so. But as I advised you, Mr. Chairman, and consistent with long-standing Department of Justice practice, I cannot and will not violate my duty to protect confidential communications with the President.

Now, let me address some issues directly: I did not have any private meetings nor do I recall any

conversations with any Russian officials at the Mayflower Hotel. I did not attend any meetings at that event. Prior to the speech, I attended a reception with my staff that included at least two dozen people and President Trump. Though I do recall several conversations I had during that pre-speech reception, I do not have any recollection of meeting or talking to the Russian Ambassador or any other Russian officials. If any brief interaction occurred in passing with the Russian Ambassador during that reception, I do not remember it. After the speech, I was interviewed by the news media, which had gathered as I remember in a different room, and then I left the hotel.

But whether I ever attended a reception where the Russian Ambassador was also present is entirely beside the point of this investigation into Russian interference with the 2016 campaigns. Let me state this clearly: I have never met with or had any conversations with any Russians or any foreign officials concerning any type of interference with any campaign or election. Further, I have no knowledge of any such conversations by anyone connected to the Trump campaign. I was your colleague in this body for 20 years, and the suggestion that I participated in any collusion or that I was aware of any collusion with the Russian government to hurt this country, which I have served with honor for over 35 years, or to undermine the integrity of our democratic process, is an appalling and detestable lie.

Relatedly, there is the assertion that I did not answer Senator Franken's question honestly at my confirmation hearing. That is false. This is how it happened. He asked me a rambling question that included dramatic, new allegations that the United States intelligence community had advised President-elect Trump that "there was a continuing exchange of information during the campaign between Trump's surrogates and intermediaries for the Russian government." I was taken aback by these explosive allegations, which he said were being reported in breaking news that day. I wanted to refute immediately any suggestion that I was a part of such an activity. I replied, "Senator Franken, I'm not aware of any of those activities. I have been called a surrogate at a time or two in that campaign and I didn't have – did not have communications with the Russians, and I'm unable to comment on it."

That was the context in which I was asked the question, and in that context, my answer was a fair and correct response to the charge as I understood it. It simply did not occur to me to go further than the context of the question and list any conversations I may have had with Russians in routine situations, as I had with numerous other foreign officials.

Please hear me now. It was only in March of this year that a reporter asked my spokesperson whether I had ever met with any Russian officials. This was the first time that question had been posed. On the same day, we provided that reporter with the information related to the meeting I and my staff had held in my Senate office with Ambassador Kislyak, as well as the brief encounter in July after a speech that I had given during the convention in Cleveland, Ohio. I also provided the reporter a list of all 25 foreign ambassador meetings I had held during 2016. In addition, I provided supplemental testimony to the Senate Judiciary Committee to explain this. I readily acknowledged these two meetings. Certainly nothing improper occurred.

Let me also explain clearly the circumstances of my recusal from the investigation into the Russian interference with the 2016 election. I was sworn in as Attorney General on Thursday, February 9th. The very next day, I met with career Department officials, including a senior ethics official, to discuss some things publicly reported in the press and that might have some bearing on the issue of recusal. From that point, February 10th, until I announced my formal recusal on March 2nd, I was never briefed on any investigative details and did not access information about the investigation; I received only the limited information that the Department's career officials determined was necessary to inform my recusal decision. As such, I have no knowledge about this investigation beyond what has been publicly reported, and I have taken no action with regard to any such investigation. On the date of my formal recusal, my Chief of Staff sent an email to the heads of the relevant departments, including by name to Director Comey of the FBI, to instruct them to

inform their staffs of this recusal and to advise them not to brief me or involve me in any such matters. And in fact, they have not. Importantly, I recused myself not because of any asserted wrongdoing on my part during the campaign, but because a Department of Justice regulation, 28 CFR 45.2, required it. That regulation states, in effect, that Department employees should not participate in investigations of a campaign if they have served as a campaign advisor.

The scope of my recusal, however, does not and cannot interfere with my ability to oversee the Department of Justice, including the FBI, which has an \$8 billion budget and 35,000 employees. I presented to the President my concerns, and those of Deputy Attorney General Rod Rosenstein, about the ongoing leadership issues at the FBI as stated in my letter recommending the removal of Mr. Comey along with the Deputy Attorney General's memorandum, which have been released publicly by the White House. It is a clear statement of my views. It is absurd, frankly, to suggest that a recusal from a single specific investigation would render an Attorney General unable to manage the leadership of the various Department of Justice law enforcement components that conduct thousands of investigations.

Finally, during his testimony, Mr. Comey discussed a conversation he and I had about a meeting Mr. Comey had with the President. I am happy to share with the committee my recollection of the conversation I had with Mr. Comey. Following a routine morning threat briefing, Mr. Comey spoke to me and my Chief of Staff. While he did not provide me with any of the substance of his conversation with the President, Mr. Comey expressed concern about the proper communications protocol with the White House and with the President. I responded to his comment by agreeing that the FBI and Department of Justice needed to be careful to follow Department policies regarding appropriate contacts with the White House. Mr. Comey had served in the Department of Justice for the better part of two decades, and I was confident that Mr. Comey understood and would abide by the Department's well-established rules governing any communications with the White House about ongoing investigations. My comments encouraged him to do just that and indeed, as I understand, he did. Our Department of Justice rules on proper communication between the Department and the White House have been in place for years. Mr. Comey well knew them, I thought, and assumed correctly that he complied with them.

I will finish with this. I recused myself from any investigation into the campaigns for President, but I did not recuse myself from defending my honor against scurrilous and false allegations. At all times throughout the course of the campaign, the confirmation process, and since becoming Attorney General, I have dedicated myself to the highest standards.

The people of this country expect an honest and transparent government and that is what we are giving them. This President wants to focus on the people of this country to ensure they are treated fairly and kept safe. The Trump agenda is to improve the lives of the American people. I know some have other agendas, but that is his agenda and it is one I share.

Importantly, as Attorney General I have a responsibility to enforce the laws of this Nation, to protect this country from its enemies, and to ensure the fair administration of justice. I intend to work every day with our fine team and the superb professionals in the Department of Justice to advance the important work we have to do. These false attacks, the innuendo, and the leaks, you can be sure, will not intimidate me. In fact, these events have only strengthened my resolve to fulfill my duty to reduce crime, and to support our federal, state, and local law enforcement officers who work our streets every day. Just last week, it was reported that overdose deaths in this country are rising faster than ever recorded. The murder rate is up over 10 percent—the largest increase since 1968. Together, we are telling the gangs, the cartels, the fraudsters, and the terrorists—we are coming after you. Every one of our citizens, no matter who they are or where they live, has the right to be safe in their homes and communities. And I will not be deterred, and I will not allow this great Department to be deterred from its vital mission.

MR. MILLER: Hello, everybody. So were just going to do a very quick on-the-record about the MS-13 event. It's a short flight. We're going to be starting our descent soon, so I'm just going to talk real quick, answer a few questions, give you some color for you stories, and then I'm going to go back.

So our big focus on MS-13 is getting the resources we need to accomplish to the mission. What does that mean? It means we need more ICE officers. We've got Tom Homan, who you heard from yesterday -- he's just sitting a few rows away from me, right over there -- and we have about 5,000-plus enforcement and removal officers in the country. That's not nearly enough to police an immigration system as large and expansive as ours, or to deal with the fact that you have tens of thousands of folks from the recent wave of Central America who've disappeared. We don't know where they are. We have to send people out to find them. It's an enormous burden. And 5,000 EROs is just not enough to do it.

We also need to get expedited removal for illegal migrants from Central America, so you don't have a situation where you show up, you get an NTA -- a notice to appear -- and then you just sort of disappear. That also means we need to get the court backlog down; it's about 6,000 cases right now. So we need more immigration judges, and of course you need more prosecutors so you can actually put MS-13 and other cartels in jail.

And, finally, we need the border wall and other border infrastructure -- sensors, towers, you name it.

So those are the big legislative pieces. But obviously, administratively, we talked about this in the last couple days -- To talk about it too -- but if you're a gang member, we're going to find you and we're going to remove you. You don't have to have to additional items on your record. If you're a gang member and you're here illegally, then you're going home. That is a major policy change, and that's one of the reasons why we're having so much success in depleting the ranks of the cartels and the gangs. But obviously we're going to need Congress in both parties to step up and provide these extra resources.

So that's all I have to say, and then I'll take any questions you have about this.

Q So, today, in Geneva, the International Organization for Migration held a briefing and said that the impact of this "get tough" approach, without deterrent measures, is pushing migrants, pushing illegal immigrants into more dangerous routes and actually fueling the coffers of gangs and transnational organizations. And I'm wondering if you're concerned about that as well, and if there are, sort of, initiatives that you're going to be taking that deal

with deterrence in that aspect, as well.

MR. MILLER: I would associate myself closely with the comments that Tom Homan gave at the press briefing yesterday, which is that a message of tolerance toward illegal immigration is the number-one boon to smugglers and traffickers. And we've seen the results of that over the last eight years in terms of massive human rights violations associated with the Central American migrant surge, in terms of a humanitarian catastrophe playing out across the region.

And so that permissive approach, we've seen the results, and the results have been deadly and horrific. By sending a message that you won't tolerate illegal immigration, it will shut down the smugglers. We've already seen a huge increase in the price that people have to pay to get smuggled, which, in and of itself is an enormous deterrent. And Secretary Kelly has worked to go into the region and to send the message that it's not safe to come; that if you will come, you will be returned. And he's working cooperatively with the governments in the region to help make sure that message is sent to migrants. And, ultimately, that is the most humanitarian approach.

Q With all this focus on measures that the administration can do -- take towards immigration, has the President gotten closer to a decision on DACA?

MR. MILLER: Right now, as you know, there's an ongoing threat of litigation about DACA. And Secretary Kelly is working with the Justice Department on dealing with that. I don't have any news to make about it today, but I would say that our administration, from a policy standpoint, remains resolutely focused on protecting jobs, wages, and security for American citizens. And when we have further announcements on that, we will make them.

Q Nikki Haley I think is traveling here. What is her role in this? Is she going to be giving any remarks ahead of the President? Or is she just here to, sort of, make a show about the U.N.'s role in migration?

MR. MILLER: Well, I mean, in addition to any role -- and there of course, is some with respect to the United Nations and global migration issues -- obviously, the President of the United States, at all times of the day, is working on the many different foreign policy issues facing our country, and I'm sure that they're discussing those on a variety of different fronts.

Q Given the challenges of healthcare, trying to get legislation through, have you given any new thought to the strategy for how you're going to get through funding for a wall, or money for new ICE agents, given that Democrats are united in opposition to that kind of legislation?

MR. MILLER: That's a great question. That's actually -- that's a good one to end on, so I can make a really strong statement for

everybody.

If Senate Democrats try to block the funding we need to protect our nation from criminals, drug dealers, cartels, and terrorists, it will cause an uproar from the American people. And they will pay a steep political price.

Good Afternoon,

I have been working on a policy proposal for Congressman Brooks called the *Arrest Statistics Reporting Act*. As you may know, this proposal was worked on extensively by my predecessor and your colleague, Peter White. The general idea is to have the FBI's yearly crime reports include the best known immigration status of an arrestee and either their country of origin or nationality. This information would be useful to achieve other objectives of President Trump, including combating sanctuary cities and opening the factual dialogue regarding the impact immigration has on state and local law enforcement.

While this bill was introduced last Congress as [HR 3151](#), Congressman Brooks has not reintroduced this legislation because he is hoping to gain more traction and support from the Trump Administration first. The underlying policy goals and intent of the legislation can be more easily and speedily achieved through the Executive. Simply put, using existing authority the President could issue an Executive Order requiring the FBI, DHS, and ICE to work in collaboration in order to openly report and make this information publicly available.

We need some help from the White House because, despite numerous letters and outreach, we have not made any progress within FBI or DOJ to have them compile the information voluntarily. Unfortunately, the bureaucrats within FBI and CJIS insist that accounting for the immigration status, country of origin, and the offense that the immigrant has committed is logistically impossible for them right now. I chalk this up to typical mindset of bureaucratic employees avoiding enacting any new conservative policies. This is why I believe that the Trump Administration can help by taking some Executive Action on its own to direct these agencies to work together to compile the information to make the data publicly available.

Let me know if this is something that you or someone else in your office would consider working on. I would

be willing to provide all of the work as needed. However, as you know, it's important that we put together as much information on the criminal tendencies of immigrants to effectively counter mainstream narratives.

Security (DHS) officials today announced the results of stepped up efforts by U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) and the department to target and dismantle MS-13 – culminating in the arrest of 267 in the United States and overseas.

I want to thank the Department of Homeland Security, our federal law enforcement agents and prosecutors from the U.S. Attorneys’ Offices and the Criminal Division’s Organized Crime and Gang Section as well as Treasury, BOP, DOJ’s OCDETF task force members, and all of our state and local law enforcement partners for their hard work. However we are now combating the gang with renewed focus and an unprecedented level of cooperation among DHS’s components and our domestic and international partners,” said Thomas Homan, ICE Deputy Director and Senior Official Performing the Duties of the Director. “ICE has the ability to pursue complex criminal cases using our statutory authorities and to prevent crime by using our administrative arrest authorities to remove gang members from the country. We will not rest until every member, associate, and leader of MS-13 has been held accountable for their crimes, and those in this country illegally have been removed.”

The operation was conducted in two phases, targeting dangerous gang members and their global financial networks. The first phase of the operation which was announced previously, netted 53 arrests in El Salvador at the conclusion of an 18-month investigation in September. The second phase was conducted across the United States from Oct. 8 to Nov. 11, and concluded with 214 MS-13 arrests nationwide.

HSI received significant operational support, including intelligence sharing and collaboration, from ICE’s Enforcement and Removal Operations (ERO), U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP), U.S. Border Patrol, U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS), the U.S. Department of Treasury, U.S. Department of Justice’s Bureau of Prisons (BOP), as well as state, local, federal, and international law enforcement partners. The Organized Crime and Gang Section of the Justice Department’s Criminal Division, with funding from the Organized Crime Drug Enforcement Task Forces, along with the U.S. Attorneys’ Offices in the Districts of Arizona, Maryland, Massachusetts, Northern District of California, Southern District of Iowa and Southern District of Texas, and are prosecuting the cases.

“Securing the homeland is a critical piece of the USCIS mission,” said USCIS Director L. Francis Cissna. “We are committed to supporting and providing intelligence to our law enforcement colleagues on public safety initiatives like Operation Raging Bull. We will

bring all of our agency's resources to bear in helping protect the American public from violent crime, and in the pursuit of those who seek to endanger the security of our nation."

"This joint effort is not new. It is something we all do as law enforcement," said Border Patrol Deputy Chief Scott Luck. "I look forward to continue working with my partners here at Headquarters as well as the field to address not just this threat but all threats."

"The Bureau of Prisons is proud to have supported our local, state, and federal law enforcement partners in this successful effort to enhance public safety," said Assistant Director Frank Lara for the Federal Bureau of Prisons Correctional Programs. "The Bureau of Prisons will continue to work collaboratively to combat the threat violent gangs pose inside prisons and in the community."

Of the total 214 arrests made in the United States, 93 were arrested on federal and/or state criminal charges including murder, aggravated robbery, Racketeering Influenced Corrupt Organization (RICO) offenses, Violent Crime in Aid of Racketeering (VICAR) offenses, narcotics trafficking, narcotics possession, firearms offenses, domestic violence, assault, forgery, DUI and illegal entry/reentry. The remaining 121 were arrested on administrative immigration violations.

Sixteen of the 214 arrested were U.S. citizens and 198 were foreign nationals, of which only five had legal status to be in the United States. Foreign nationals arrested were from El Salvador (135), Honduras (29), Mexico (17), Guatemala (12), Ecuador (4) and Costa Rica (1).

Sixty-four individuals had illegally crossed the border as unaccompanied alien children; most are now adults.

Examples of the federal prosecutions during this operation include:

- In Baltimore, Maryland, the arrest and [indictment](#) of four MS-13 members on charges that include violent crimes in aid of racketeering and conspiracy to commit murder in aid of racketeering;
- In Greenbelt, Maryland, the arrest and [indictment](#) of eight MS-13 members on charges that include conspiracy to participate in a racketeering enterprise, conspiracy to distribute and possession with intent to distribute controlled substances and conspiracy to interfere with interstate commerce by extortion; and
 - MS-13 members and associates were arrested in East Boston and Chelsea, Massachusetts; Falfurrias, Hidalgo and Laredo, Texas; Nogales, Tucson and Yuma, Arizona; Council Bluffs, Iowa; Annapolis, Baltimore, Clinton, Beltsville, Upper Marlboro, Centreville and Jessup, Maryland; and San Jose, California and charged with various federal offenses including illegal alien in possession of a firearm and illegal re-entry after deportation.

Following this operation, ICE has added six MS-13 fugitives to its list of "most wanted" individuals, including one fugitive wanted for homicide in Montgomery County, Texas, and five others wanted for their involvement in the homicide and attempted homicides of El Salvadoran police officers. All are suspected of being somewhere in the U.S.

Individuals are confirmed as gang members if they admit membership in a gang; have been convicted of violating Title 18 USC 521 or any other federal or state law

criminalizing or imposing civil consequences for gang-related activity; or if they meet certain other criteria such as having tattoos identifying a specific gang or being identified as a gang member by a reliable source.

Gang associates are individuals who exhibit gang member criteria but who are not formally initiated into the gang. Law enforcement officers encountering these individuals will determine whether indications of gang association are present by referring to the gang membership criteria.

DENATURALIZATION SOUGHT AGAINST FIVE CHILD SEXUAL ABUSERS IN FLORIDA, ILLINOIS, AND TEXAS

WASHINGTON – Today, the U.S. Department of Justice filed denaturalization lawsuits against five individuals who, according to the Department’s complaints, unlawfully procured their U.S. citizenship by concealing sexual abuse of minor victims during the naturalization process. The civil complaints were filed in federal court in the Southern District of Florida, the Northern District of Illinois, the Northern District of Texas (two cases), and the Southern District of Texas.

“Committing fraud in any immigration matter undermines the integrity of our immigration system, and is a betrayal of the American people’s generosity,” said Attorney General Jeff Sessions. “It is especially appalling when it also involves the sexual abuse of children. The Department of Justice has a duty to prosecute these crimes vigorously, particularly so for individuals who commit fraud in the naturalization process. I am confident that justice will be done in these cases, and I want to thank ICE, CBP, USCIS, our Civil Division, and our U.S. Attorneys’ offices for their hard work. This Department will continue to fight to denaturalize immigration fraudsters and to protect the American people from sex offenders.”

The cases were referred to the Department of Justice by the Department of Homeland Security’s U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement and U.S. Customs and Border Protection with investigative support from U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services.

“I commend the DHS personnel working diligently to remove dangerous criminals from our streets,” said Acting Secretary of the Department of Homeland Security Elaine Duke. “Those who unlawfully procured citizenship by concealing crimes – especially sexual abuse of minors – should have their citizenship revoked.”

Under the Immigration and Nationality Act, the citizenship of a naturalized U.S. citizen may be revoked, and his or her certificate of naturalization canceled, if naturalization was illegally procured or procured by concealment of a material fact or by willful

misrepresentation.

The five defendants committed crimes of sexual abuse of minor victims prior to naturalizing. As the civil complaints allege, such crimes rendered the defendants ineligible for citizenship from the start. By willfully concealing child sexual abuse crimes, the defendants also independently rendered themselves subject to denaturalization.

A description of each of the five cases and the allegations of the United States follows:

Jorge Luis Alvarado

Jorge Luis Alvarado, 56, a native of Mexico, naturalized on March 9, 2000. Shortly before filing his naturalization application, Alvarado made unlawful sexual contact with a sixteen-year-old child. In March 2007, he pleaded guilty in Texas state court to committing indecency with a child by sexual contact, a second-degree felony. Alvarado was ordered to community supervision and to register as a sex offender. He has been residing in southern Texas. *United States of America v. Jorge Luis Alvarado* (S.D. Tex.).

Alberto Mario Beleno

Alberto Mario Beleno, 64, a native of Colombia, naturalized on Feb. 26, 2001. Before Beleno naturalized as a U.S. citizen, he committed lewd and lascivious acts on a six-year-old child. In 2001, less than three months after he naturalized, Beleno was arrested and ultimately pleaded guilty/nolo-contendere in Florida state court to committing felony lewd and lascivious exhibition and felony lewd and lascivious molestation on a minor in 1993 and 1994. Beleno was ordered to register as a sex offender for his conduct. His last known residence in the United States is in Miami, Florida. *United States of America v. Alberto Mario Beleno* (S.D. Fla.).

Eleazar Corral Valenzuela

Eleazar Corral Valenzuela, 49, a native of Mexico, naturalized on June 15, 2000. Prior to applying to naturalize, he sexually abused a minor child. In November 2000, after he had naturalized, Corral pleaded guilty in Illinois state court to aggravated criminal sexual abuse, a Class 2 felony. He was ordered to register as a sex offender. He has been residing in Aurora, Illinois. *United States of America v. Eleazar Corral Valenzuela* (N.D. Ill.).

Moises Herrera-Gonzalez

Moises Herrera-Gonzalez, 55, a native of Mexico, naturalized on Sept. 25, 1999. On Jan. 1, 1996, before he filed his naturalization application, Herrera-Gonzalez sexually assaulted and injured a six-year-old child. He filed his naturalization application in September 1996, nine months after the sexual assault. On July 8, 2002, after he naturalized, Herrera-Gonzalez pleaded guilty in Texas state court to committing bodily injury to a child, a third-degree felony. He was sentenced to five years in prison. He has been residing in Arlington, Texas. *United States of America v. Moises Herrera-Gonzalez* (N.D. Tex.).

Emmanuel Olugbenga Omopariola

Emmanuel Olugbenga Omopariola, 60, a native of Nigeria, naturalized on July 1, 2004. Before he filed his naturalization application in May 2003, Omopariola made unlawful sexual contact with a seven-year-old child. In 2015, after he naturalized, Omopariola pleaded guilty in Texas state court to Indecency with a Child – Sexual Contact, a second-degree felony. He was ordered to five years of community supervision and placed on the sex offender registry. He has been residing in Grand Prairie, Texas. *United States of America v. Emmanuel Olugbenga Omopariola* (N.D. Tex.).

These cases were investigated by ICE, CBP, and USCIS, and the Civil Division's Office of Immigration Litigation, District Court Section (OIL-DCS). These cases are being prosecuted by OIL-DCS and its National Security and Affirmative Litigation Unit (NS/A Unit) with support from the U.S. Attorney's Offices for the Southern District of Florida, Northern District of Illinois, Northern District of Texas, and Southern District of Texas.

The claims made in the complaint are allegations only, and there has been no determination of liability.

JOSE INEZ GARCIA-ZARATE TO FACE FEDERAL FIREARM CHARGES IN THE NORTHERN DISTRICT OF CALIFORNIA

Grand Jury Indicts Garcia-Zarate for Being a Felon in Possession of a Firearm and Ammunition and for Being an Illegal Alien In Possession of a Firearm and Ammunition

SAN FRANCISCO – A federal grand jury indicted Jose Inez Garcia-Zarate today for being a felon in possession of a firearm and ammunition, and for being an illegally present alien in possession of a firearm and ammunition, announced United States Attorney General Jefferson B. Sessions; United States Attorney Brian J. Stretch from the Northern District of California; and Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms, and Explosives (ATF) Special Agent in Charge Jill Snyder.

According to the indictment, on July 1, 2015, Garcia-Zarate, a citizen of Mexico who reportedly is 47 years old, possessed a semi-automatic pistol and multiple rounds of ammunition in violation of 18 U.S.C. § 922(g)(1) (felon in possession of a firearm) and 18 U.S.C. § 922(g)(5) (unlawfully present alien in possession of a firearm).

An indictment merely alleges that a crime has been committed and Garcia-Zarate, like all defendants, is presumed innocent until proven guilty beyond a reasonable doubt. Garcia-Zarate currently is in state custody on other charges. If convicted of either violation of 18 U.S.C. § 922(g), Garcia-Zarate faces a maximum statutory penalty of 10 years in prison. However, any sentence will be imposed by the court only after consideration of the U.S. Sentencing Guidelines and the federal statute governing the imposition of a sentence, 18 U.S.C. § 3553.

Assistant United States Attorneys Hallie Hoffman and Shiao Lee are prosecuting this case. This case is the result of an investigation by the ATF.

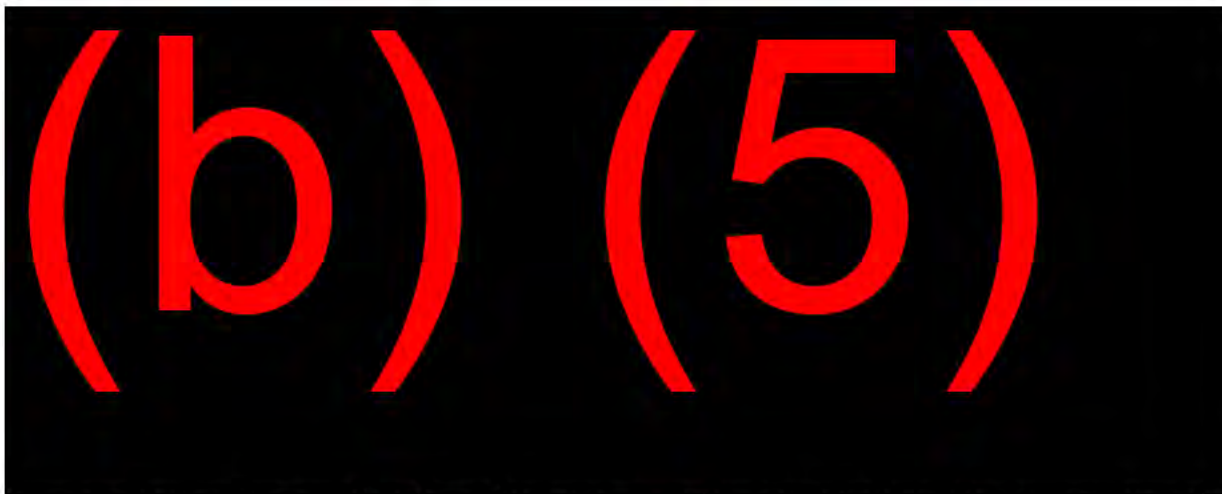

WASHINGTON – A Bosnian Serb residing in North Carolina pleaded guilty today lying to obtain lawful permanent resident status by concealing his military status and criminal activity during the war in Bosnia. Attorney General Jeff Sessions, Acting Assistant Attorney General John P. Cronan and Special Agent in Charge Nick Annan of U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement’s Homeland Security Investigations (HSI) Atlanta made the announcement.

Milan Trisic, 54, most recently residing in Charlotte, North Carolina, pleaded guilty to a single count of obtaining a Permanent Resident Card, commonly referred to as a “green card,” by making materially false claims and statements. Trisic entered his plea before Magistrate Judge David S. Cayer in the U.S. District Court in Charlotte.

“Those who seek to come to this country must respect our laws,” said Attorney General Sessions. “Entering this country on the basis of fraud is unacceptable. The American people can be assured that this Department is working every day to protect them from the threat posed by criminals who seek to take advantage of our generous immigration system. I want to commend our Homeland Security Investigators and DOJ attorneys for achieving justice in this case.”

According to the admissions made in connection with his plea, Trisic, an ethnic Serb with Bosnian citizenship, is a lawful permanent resident of the United States living in North Carolina. On Nov. 3, 2016, Trisic possessed a green card that was unlawfully obtained. In response to questions on his legal permanent resident application, Trisic knowingly concealed his military service in the Bratunac Brigade, a unit in the Army of the Serb Republic; concealed his criminal activity in Bosnia and Herzegovina, and lied about his whereabouts during the war in Bosnia and Herzegovina in the early and mid-1990s.

As part of his plea of guilty, Trisic admitted that he served in the Army of the Serb Republic as a member of the Bratunac Brigade during various tours of

duty between April 1992 and January 1996, at a time when Bosnia and Herzegovina was in the midst of a civil war. Due to its proximity to Serbia, in 1992 forces both aligned with and from Serbia began an ethnic cleansing campaign against the non-Serbian population in and around Bratunac. Trisic admitted that he engaged in various unlawful activities while serving with the Bratunac Brigade, such as the unlawful beating, detention and transportation of Muslim prisoners. Additionally, Trisic admitted that the Bratunac Brigade, operating primarily in eastern Bosnia and Herzegovina, was one of the military units responsible for the July 1995 Srebrenica massacre that resulted in the deaths of between 7,000 and 8,000 Bosnian Muslim men.

Trisic also admitted that he knowingly lied about his whereabouts during the war in Bosnia. In order to obtain refugee status, Trisic falsely claimed that he resided in Serbia during the war, when in fact he actually resided in Bratunac, Bosnia, where he served as part of the Bratunac Brigade. Trisic later used his illegally obtained status as a refugee to unlawfully obtain permanent resident status in the United States.

Sentencing is not yet scheduled. As part the plea agreement, Trisic will be ordered removed from the United States upon completion of his sentence.

This case is the result of an investigation conducted by HSI.

Trial Attorneys Frank G. Rangoussis and Ann Marie Ursini of the Criminal Division's Human Rights and Special Prosecutions Section and Assistant U.S. Attorney Kenneth Smith from the Western District of North Carolina are prosecuting the case.

IRAQI REFUGEE SENTENCED FOR ATTEMPTING TO PROVIDE MATERIAL SUPPORT TO ISIL

HOUSTON – Omar Farai Saeed Al Hardan, the 25-year-old refugee who was born in

10001011 - On the day, Al Hardan, an Iraqi refugee who had been in Iraq and resided in Houston, has been ordered to federal prison for 16 years following his conviction of attempting to provide material support or resources to a designated foreign terrorist organization. He pleaded guilty Oct. 17, 2016.

Acting U.S. Attorney Abe Martinez, Acting Assistant Attorney General for National Security Dana Boente, Special Agent in Charge Perrye K. Turner of the FBI's Houston Division and Special Agent in Charge Mark Dawson of Immigration and Customs Enforcement's Homeland Security Investigations (HSI) in Houston made the announcement.

"Any person who provides material support to a foreign terrorist organization will be investigated and prosecuted to the fullest extent of the law," said Martinez. "Al Hardan's actions were treacherous and completely antithetical to the freedoms we as U.S. citizens value. The sentence imposed today reflects the Department of Justice's resolve to seek out and punish all violators who would give aid and comfort to international terrorists."

Today, U.S. District Judge Lynn Hughes, who accepted the guilty plea, handed Al Hardan a 192-month sentence. He will also be on supervised release for the rest of his life.

At the time of his plea, Al Hardan had admitted he attempted to provide material support – specifically himself – to the Islamic State of Iraq and the Levant (ISIL). Al Hardan entered the United States as a refugee on or about Nov. 2, 2009. Prior to entering the country, Al Hardan was in at least two refugee camps in Jordan and Iraq. After being admitted into the U.S. as an Iraqi refugee, he was granted legal permanent residence status on or about Aug. 22, 2011, and had resided in Houston.

In 2013, federal agents began investigating Al Hardan who had been communicating with a California man whom he understood was associated with the Al-Nusrah Front. In those communications, the individual had told Al Hardan that he had previously traveled to Syria to fight for Al-Nusrah and discussed plans to return to Syria with Al Hardan to fight for Al-Nusrah.

Beginning in June 2014 and continuing through 2015, Al Hardan also developed a relationship with a Confidential Human Source (CHS). During that time, they discussed traveling overseas to support ISIL in fighting jihad and various ways to assist ISIL. Al Hardan also said he wanted to be trained in building remote transmitter/receiver detonators for improvised explosive devices, wanted to learn to use cell phones as the remote detonators and wanted to build remote detonators for ISIL. Al Hardan indicated he taught himself how to make remote detonators by accessing online training videos and other resources he found online and showed the CHS a circuit board he built to be used as a transmitter for a detonator.

On Nov. 5, 2014, Al Hardan took an oath of loyalty to ISIL. Two days later, Al Hardan and the CHS participated in approximately one hour of tactical weapons training with an AK-47 that Al Hardan indicated he wanted.

During the investigation, Al Hardan had also posted many statements on social media in support of ISIL. One of those included a photo of a Humvee with an ISIL flag. Above the photo, Al Hardan posted, "ISIS yesterday in Iraq, today in Syria and Allah willing, tomorrow in Jerusalem." He also made numerous statements about his plans to travel to Syria and fight alongside ISIL and become a martyr. In one instance he said "I want to blow myself up. I want to travel with the Mujahidin. I want to travel to be with those who are against America. I am against America."

Upon his arrest in January 2016, investigators discovered training CDs on how to build remote detonators, electronic circuitry components, tools used to build circuitry, multiple cell phones (that had not been activated), a prayer list for committing Jihad and

becoming a martyr and the ISIL flag.

Al Hardan has been and will remain in custody pending transfer to a U.S. Bureau of Prisons facility to be determined in the near future.

The FBI's Joint Terrorism Task Force and HSI conducted the investigation with the assistance of the Houston Police Department. Assistant U.S. Attorneys Ted Imperato, Carolyn Ferko and S. Mark McIntyre prosecuted the case.

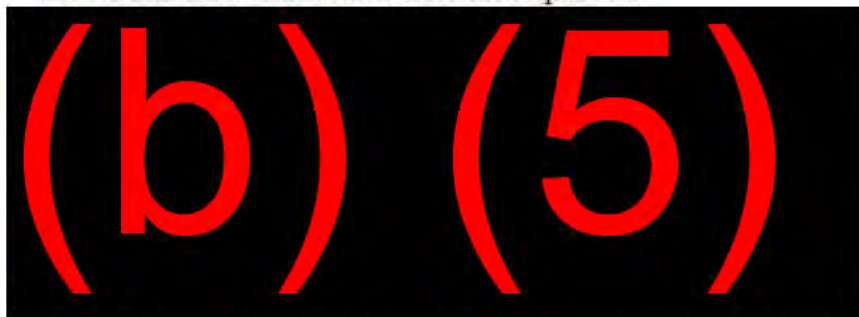

**JUSTICE DEPARTMENT SEEKS TO OBTAIN
DENATURALIZATION OF MAN WITH ALLEGED
PARTICIPATION IN EXTRAJUDICIAL KILLINGS DURING
THE BALKANS CONFLICT**

WASHINGTON - The United States today filed a civil denaturalization complaint in the Northern District of Iowa against a 51-year old man who allegedly obtained his naturalized U.S. citizenship by fraud, the U.S. Department of Justice and U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) announced.

Eso Razic, a native of the former Yugoslavia and subsequently a citizen of the Republic of Bosnia and Herzegovina, allegedly concealed his service in multiple paramilitary organizations during the conflict in the Balkans in the early 1990s. The United States alleges that while serving as a member of those combatant groups, Razic participated in the extrajudicial killing of three individuals, including a wounded prisoner of war. The complaint alleges that Razic fraudulently obtained permanent resident status and citizenship by misrepresenting and concealing his membership in and conduct with these groups.

“The Department of Justice is committed to ensuring that our immigration system serves the national interest,” said Acting Assistant Attorney General Chad Readler of the Justice Department’s Civil Division. “When our immigration system and public safety are undermined by fraudsters, the Justice Department will prosecute them and use civil denaturalization to protect the integrity of our nation’s immigration system and defend the security of our nation.”

“Laws that regulate access to United States citizenship must be respected,” said U.S. Attorney Peter E. Deegan, Jr. for the Northern District of Iowa. “Our office will work vigorously with our enforcement partners to ensure that naturalization is reserved for qualified individuals and that the rule of law is upheld.”

“This denaturalization filing demonstrates the U.S. government’s enduring commitment to identify and bring to justice those who have committed human rights violations in any part of the world,” said ICE Homeland Security Investigations Deputy Executive Associate Director Derek Benner. “The United States will not serve as a safe haven for those who have committed such atrocities and then fled from justice. We will identify, locate, and work to prosecute and/or remove human rights violators in the U.S. regardless of their nationality, ethnicity, or religious background.”

The case was investigated by ICE’s Homeland Security Investigations (HSI) Human Rights Violator and War Crimes Unit (HRVWCU) and the Civil Division’s Office of Immigration Litigation, District Court Section (OIL-DCS), with support from ICE’s Office of the Principal Legal Advisor (OPLA) Human Rights Law Section (HRLS). The case is being jointly prosecuted by Counsel for National Security Aaron Petty of OIL-DCS’s National Security and Affirmative Litigation Unit (NS/A Unit) and Assistant U.S. Attorney Jacob Schunk of the U.S. Attorney’s Office for the Northern District of Iowa, with support from Assistant

Chief Counsel Abby Meyer of ICE OPLA, Omaha Office.

The claims made in the complaint are allegations only, and there have been no determinations of liability.

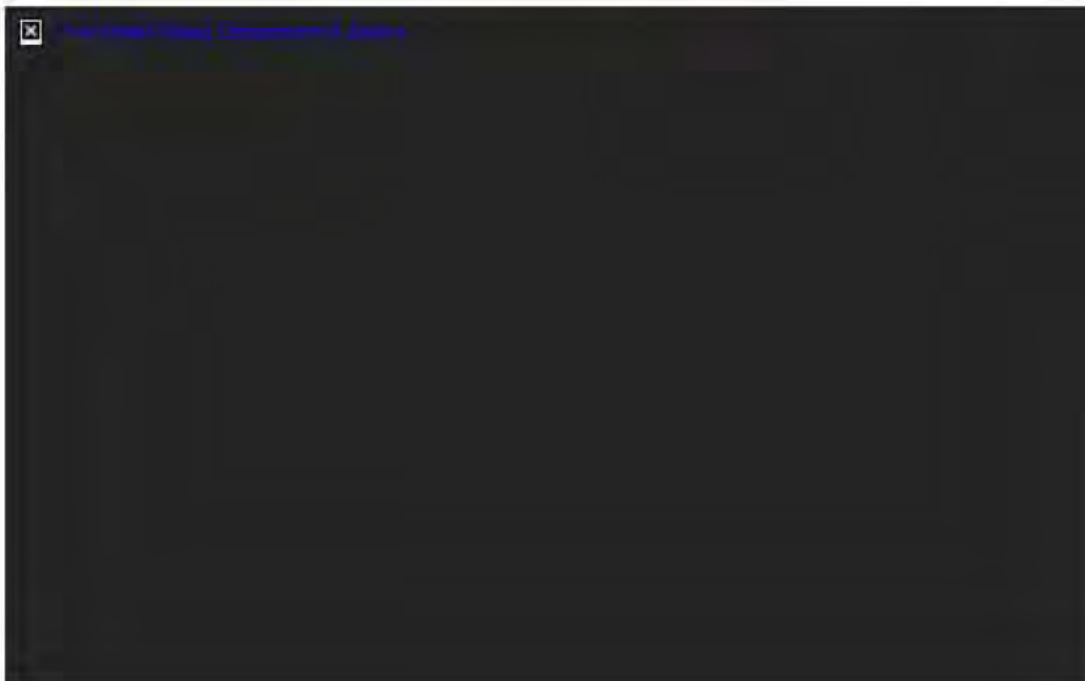

MINKLER ANNOUNCES FEDERAL IMMIGRATION CHARGES AGAINST ILLEGAL ALIEN INVOLVED IN I-70 MOTOR VEHICLE ACCIDENT

INDIANAPOLIS – United States Attorney Josh J. Minkler today announced federal charges against an illegal alien from Guatemala. Manuel Orrego-Zavala 37, was charged by a criminal complaint with illegal re-entry of a previously deported alien.

“The defendant in this case allegedly re-entered the country illegally for the second time before he put the public safety of Indianapolis at risk and took the lives of two innocent men early Sunday morning,” said Minkler. “In April, Attorney General Sessions directed all federal prosecutor to prioritize charging aliens that illegally re-enter the country, especially if they are a risk to public safety or there is a criminal history present. Following the rule of law is the foundation of our American democracy, and my office is committed to fulfilling the Attorney General’s directive.”

According to the criminal complaint, Orrego-Zavala was encountered by law enforcement in Indianapolis, Indiana, on Feb. 4, 2018, when he was arrested after being involved in a fatal motor vehicle accident on Interstate 70. At the time of his arrest, Orrego-Zavala provided law enforcement authorities with the alias, “Alex G. Cabrera,” but Homeland Security agents soon learned—through cooperation and information sharing with the Indianapolis Metro Police Department—his true identity was Manuel Orrego-Zavala, a citizen of Guatemala.

The complaint further states Orrego-Zavala was arrested by Immigration and Customs Enforcement and Removal Operations (ICE ERO) in October 2006, and removed from the United States to Guatemala in January 2007. At that time, Orrego-Zavala was prohibited from returning to the United States for 10 years. In March 2009, he was arrested by ICE ERO and in May 2009, removed to Guatemala and prohibited from returning for 20 years.

Orrego-Zavala will remain in custody while the case is investigated by the Indiana

State Police and the Marion County Prosecutor's Office. The immigration charges will remain pending until the conclusion of all state matters.

A criminal complaint is only a charge and not evidence of guilt. All defendants are presumed innocent until proven otherwise in federal court.

According to Assistant United States Attorney William McCoskey who is prosecuting this case for the government, Orrego-Zavala faces up to 10 years of imprisonment if convicted.

In October 2017, United States Attorney Josh J. Minkler announced a Strategic Plan designed to shape and strengthen the District's response to its most significant public safety challenges. This prosecution demonstrates the office's firm commitment to utilize and partner with law enforcement agencies to prosecute illegal immigration cases. DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE FILES DENATURALIZATION COMPLAINT AGAINST DIVERSITY VISA RECIPIENT WHO TRANSFERRED NON-PROFIT FUNDS TO SPECIALLY DESIGNATED GLOBAL TERRORIST

TRANSFERRED NON-PROFIT FUNDS TO SPECIALLY DESIGNATED GLOBAL TERRORIST

WASHINGTON – The Department of Justice today filed a complaint in the U.S. District Court for the Western District of Missouri to revoke the naturalization of a Sudan native—who entered the United States on an F-1 student visa and gained lawful permanent resident status through the diversity visa lottery program—for violating and conspiring to violate sanctions imposed against Iraq under the International Emergency Economic Powers Act (IEEPA), as well as obstructing Internal Revenue laws.

According to the complaint, Mubarak Ahmed Hamed violated and conspired to violate sanctions imposed against Iraq under the IEEPA from 1997 through July 21, 2000, the date of his naturalization. As the CEO of a non-profit organization, the Islamic American Relief Agency (IARA), Hamed regularly authorized and transferred tax-exempt funds from IARA accounts in the United States to an account in Jordan controlled by Khalid Al-Sudanee, a/k/a Khalid Ahmad Jumah Al-Sudani, knowing that Al-Sudanee would transport such funds into Iraq.

In 2004, both Al-Sudanee and IARA were designated by the U.S. Department of the Treasury's Office of Foreign Assets Control (OFAC) as Specially Designated Global Terrorists (SDGT). During this time, the IARA implemented projects that were funded by USAID, however there are no specific allegations that such funding was siphoned to Iraq or in violation of the IEEPA.

On June 25, 2010, Hamed pleaded guilty to conspiring to illegally transfer more than \$1 million to Iraq in violation of federal sanctions, and to obstructing administration of the laws governing tax-exempt charities. Hamed was sentenced to four years and 10 months in federal prison on January 11, 2012.

On Jan. 16, 2018, the Departments of Justice and Homeland Security jointly released the "Section 11 Report," which shined a light on the nation's current immigration system and how it can be used to undermine national security and public safety. The report revealed—among other statistics—that nearly three out of every four individuals convicted of international terrorism-related charges in U.S. federal courts between Sept. 11, 2001 and Dec. 31, 2016 were foreign-born.

"This alleged denaturalization case is indicative that America needs this reform to our broken immigration system now more than ever. Under the guise of running a non-profit to assist in the famine crises in Africa, a 'Diversity Visa' recipient allegedly transferred funds on a regular basis to a known terrorist, undermining our nation's lawful immigration system, public safety, and national security," said Attorney General Jeff Sessions. "Immigration is a national security issue, and a merit-based immigration system would better serve our national interest because it would benefit the American people."

"The defendant has pleaded guilty to despicable crimes, including the funneling of money to a known terrorist organization, from 1997 through his naturalization as a U.S. citizen in July 2000, all while conveniently failing to disclose his nefarious activities," said Thomas Homan, Deputy Director of U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement. "Plain and simple, if you defraud the U.S. government during the naturalization process, you risk having your citizenship revoked."

"Every visa decision is a national security decision that affects individual Americans. We commend the work of the Department of Justice and look forward to continued coordination with the Department of Homeland Security and the intelligence and law enforcement communities to protect our nation's borders," said Assistant Secretary Carl Risch of the Department of State Bureau of Consular Affairs. "Continued efforts to

improve interagency security vetting for visa applicants will enhance our ability to identify persons who mean us harm and prevent their entry into the United States.”

U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) Homeland Security Investigations (HSI), ICE Office of the Principal Legal Advisor (OPLA), and Civil Division’s Office of Immigration Litigation, District Court Section’s (OIL-DCS) National Security and Affirmative Litigation Unit (NS/A Unit) investigated the case. The case is being litigated by the NS/A Unit with support from ICE OPLA and the U.S. Attorney’s Office for the Western District of Missouri.

The claims made in the complaint are allegations only, and there have been no determinations of liability.

THREE INDIVIDUALS INDICTED FOR VISA FRAUD SCHEME FOR PROFIT

Defendants Allegedly Provided Armenian Nationals with Fake Dance Certificates and Staged Photos in Traditional Costumes to Qualify for P-3 Visa Program for Entertainers

WASHINGTON – Three individuals were indicted in the Eastern District of New York for their alleged roles in a multi-year visa fraud scheme that brought Armenian citizens into the United States for profit.

Acting Assistant Attorney General John P. Cronan of the Justice Department's Criminal Division; U.S. Attorney Richard P. Donoghue of the Eastern District of New York and Principal Deputy Assistant Secretary Christian J. Schurman for U.S. Department of State Diplomatic Security and Director for Diplomatic Security Service (DSS), made the announcement.

Stella Boyadjian, 47, of Rego Park, New York; Hrachya Atoyian, 30, of Glendale, California; and Diana Ghisemian, aka "Dina Abraham," 44, of the Republic of

California; and Diana Grigoryan aka Діана АКОРОВА, 41, of the Republic of Armenia, were charged in a 15-count indictment unsealed yesterday in federal court in Brooklyn with multiple counts of visa fraud and with conspiracy to defraud the United States, commit visa fraud, and illegally bring aliens into the United States. Boyadjian and Grigoryan are also charged with related money laundering charges, and Boyadjian is charged with aggravated identity theft.

Boyadjian was arraigned yesterday before U.S. Magistrate Judge James Orenstein. Atoyan's initial appearance for removal proceedings to the Eastern District of New York is scheduled for later today, in the Central District of California.

"Fraudsters who undermine our immigration system threaten our public safety and our national security," said Acting Assistant Attorney General John P.

Cronan. "The Justice Department will not tolerate abuses of our nation's immigration laws like those alleged in the indictment unsealed today. We will root out immigration fraud and bring those responsible to justice."

"As alleged in the indictment, the defendants choreographed their fraud scheme by dressing visa applicants in traditional dance costumes and creating fake concert flyers in order to deceive a government program that allows foreign nationals to temporarily enter the United States as artistic performers," said U.S.

Attorney Donoghue. "As a result of outstanding investigative work and commitment to protecting the integrity of the immigration process by this Office and our law enforcement partners, the defendants will now face the music for their alleged crimes."

"The Diplomatic Security Service is firmly committed to protecting the integrity of all U.S. visas and travel documents -- especially those, like the P-3 visa, which allow for entertainers to visit the United States to perform in culturally unique events and deepen our understanding of different cultures," said Principal Deputy Assistant Secretary Schurman. "This case is the result of a strong partnership among federal law enforcement agencies and DSS' global network of special agents working together to stop visa and passport crimes and stop criminals from earning illegal income by exploiting U.S. visas, passports, and foreign workers."

According to the indictment, unsealed today upon the arrest of Boyadjian and Atoyan, Boyadjian led a transnational network of co-conspirators who engaged in a widespread visa fraud scheme to bring Armenian citizens into the United States by fraudulently claiming to the U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) that the Armenians were members of folk performance groups, and thus qualified for P-3 "Culturally Unique Artist" visas. The P-3 nonimmigrant visa classification allows foreign nationals to temporarily travel to the United States to perform, teach or coach as artists or entertainers, under a program that is culturally unique. A U.S. employer or sponsoring organization is required to submit a USCIS Form I-129 Petition for a Non-Immigrant Worker, along with supporting documentation, attesting that the performances in the United States are culturally unique.

As alleged in the indictment, Boyadjian ran a non-profit organization called Big Apple Music Awards Foundation, based in Rego Park, New York. Boyadjian used the Big Apple Music Awards Foundation as well as formal and informal Armenian music industry contacts in the United States and Armenia to perpetuate the scheme. Boyadjian and others solicited Armenian citizens who wanted to come to the United States and charged them between \$3,000 and \$15,000 to be included on the Form I-129 Petitions. Boyadjian and other associates in Armenia acquired fraudulent performer certificates and organized staged photo sessions where the

aliens wore traditional Armenian folk outfits to make it appear as though they were traditional Armenian performers. After being trained how to defeat U.S. visa interviews, the individual aliens presented these certificates and photos to U.S. consular officers during their visa interviews. Once the Armenians entered the United States, some would pay Boyadjian and her associates additional money to be included in another fraudulent petition asking for P-3 visa extensions. Some aliens have overstayed their visas and remain unlawfully in the United States.

This case was a joint investigation by the DSS's Criminal Fraud Investigations and Overseas Criminal Investigations Divisions with assistance from the USCIS Fraud Detection and National Security, Center Fraud Detection Operations in Vermont.

Trial Attorney Sasha N. Rutizer of the Criminal Division's Human Rights and Special Prosecutions Section and Assistant U.S. Attorney David Gopstein of the Eastern District of New York are prosecuting the case.

An indictment is merely an allegation. All defendants are presumed innocent until proven guilty beyond a reasonable doubt in a court of law.

Undocumented immigrants who came to the United States as children and serve in the military will not be deported even if current legal protections expire, Defense Secretary Jim Mattis announced today.

Mattis told reporters he spoke with Homeland Security Secretary Kirstjen Nielsen today to confirm that any so-called "DREAMers" on active duty or in the active reserves — as well as those who have signed papers to join but are waiting to go to boot camp — will not be subject to any kind of deportation.

Mattis' promise of protection also extends to veterans who left the military with an honorable discharge.

"We would always stand by one of our people," he said.

There are only two exceptions in which someone could be deported, Mattis noted: if he or she committed a serious felony, or if a federal judge signed a final order of deportation.

The Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals program, or DACA, which provides renewable visas to those brought to the country illegally as children, will expire March 5 if Congress does not act.

OREGON MAN PLEADS GUILTY TO FORCED LABOR AND RELATED CRIMES IN CONNECTION WITH SCHEME TO COERCE THAI NATIONALS TO WORK

Defendant used debts, fraud, threats of financial and reputational harm, and other means to compel victims to work long hours for minimal pay at restaurants in Oregon and Washington

WASHINGTON – Paul Jumroon, also known as Veraphon Phatanakitjumboon, 54, of Depoe Bay, Oregon, and a naturalized citizen originally from Thailand, pleaded guilty yesterday in a U.S. District Court in Portland, Oregon, to forced labor, visa fraud conspiracy, and filing a false federal income tax return, announced Acting Assistant Attorney General John Gore of the Justice Department’s Civil Rights Division, U.S. Attorney Billy J. Williams of the District of Oregon, Special Agent in Charge Renn Cannon of the FBI in Oregon, and Special

Agent in Charge Darrell Waldon of IRS Criminal Investigation's Seattle Field Office. Jumron waived indictment by a federal grand jury and pleaded guilty to an information filed by the United States Attorney's Office and the Civil Rights Division.

According to the defendant's plea agreement and admissions in court, between 2011 and 2014, the defendant and his associates fraudulently obtained E-2 visas to bring Thai nationals into the United States to provide cheap labor at his restaurants, Curry in a Hurry in Lake Oswego, Oregon and Teriyaki Thai in Ridgefield, Washington. E-2 visas are granted to foreign nationals who invest substantial money in a U.S. business and direct its operations, and to employees who have special qualifications that make their services essential to that business.

Jumron used the fraudulently obtained visas to entice four forced labor victims to come to the United States by making false promises to them. According to court documents, the first victim arrived in the United States in June 2012, and the second victim arrived in April 2013. Jumron used inflated travel expenses, debt manipulation, threats of deportation, serious financial and reputational harm, verbal abuse, and control over identification documents, among other means, to compel the victims to work 12 hours a day, six to seven days a week, for minimal pay, until they managed to leave in October 2013 and 2014, respectively.

As part of the defendant's guilty plea, Jumron agreed to pay all four victims a combined \$131,391.95 in restitution for their unpaid labor in connection with his forced labor scheme.

The defendant further admitted to filing multiple false tax returns with the Internal Revenue Service, failing to report cash income earned from his restaurants between 2012 and 2015. As part of the plea agreement, Jumron agreed to pay tax due and owing in the amount of \$120,384 to the IRS.

"Combatting human trafficking is a priority for Attorney General Sessions and the Justice Department," said Acting Assistant Attorney General Gore of the Civil Rights Division. "Securing a guilty plea today is just another example of this commitment and the work of the Civil Rights Division, in coordination with the U.S. Attorney's Office, to hold those who choose to exploit vulnerable individuals accountable for their actions."

"Human trafficking is a degrading crime that undermines our nation's most basic promise of liberty. This defendant preyed on the hopes of vulnerable workers, using fear to compel them to work long hours for little pay. He turned a promise of employment and a better life into a human tragedy for his own financial gain," said U.S. Attorney Billy J. Williams for the District of Oregon. "This case demonstrates our firm commitment to holding traffickers accountable and restoring the rights, freedom and dignity of victims. It should also serve as a reminder that these types of crimes happen all around us and often in plain sight. We encourage all Oregonians to remain watchful for signs of human trafficking and to notify law enforcement immediately when something seems amiss."

"The American dream is built on the belief that hard work can bring about a better life. For the victims in this case, that dream turned into a nightmare of false promises, forced labor and abuse," said Renn Cannon, Special Agent in Charge of the FBI in Oregon. "These cases are very difficult to identify and work, so we are thankful the courageous victims in this case were able to reach out for help through trusted community contacts."

"Forced labor schemes, such as the one employed by Paul Jumron, are

deplorable crimes that have no place in today's society," said Darrell Waldon, Special Agent in Charge of IRS Criminal Investigation's Seattle Field Office. "Falsely reporting income and expenses associated with such schemes will continue to be vigorously investigated by IRS-CI Special Agents."

Jumroon faces a maximum of 20 years in prison for forced labor, five years in prison for visa fraud conspiracy, and three years in prison for filing a false tax return. His sentencing is scheduled for May 24 before United States District Judge Anna J. Brown.

Attorney General Sessions recently issued a proclamation commemorating January as National Slavery and Human Trafficking Prevention Month, and the Justice Department recently hosted a Human Trafficking Summit where both the Attorney General and Associate Attorney General Rachel Brand gave remarks.

The District of Oregon is one of six districts designated through a competitive, nationwide selection process as a Phase II Anti-Trafficking Coordination Team (ACTeam), through the interagency ACTeam Initiative of the Departments of Justice, Homeland Security and Labor. ACTeams focus on developing high-impact human trafficking investigations and prosecutions involving forced labor, international sex trafficking and sex trafficking by force, fraud or coercion through interagency collaboration among federal prosecutors and federal investigative agencies.

This prosecution is the result of the joint investigation by the Federal Bureau of Investigation, Homeland Security Investigations, Internal Revenue Service Criminal Investigation and Department of State's Diplomatic Security Service, with assistance from the Department of Labor's Wage and Hour Division and Portland Police Bureau. The case is being prosecuted by Assistant U.S. Attorneys Hannah Horsley and Scott Bradford of the District of Oregon, and Lindsey Roberson of the Civil Rights Division's Human Trafficking Prosecution Unit.

**DENATURALIZE DIVERSITY VISA RECIPIENT WHO OBTAINED
NATURALIZED CITIZENSHIP AFTER FAILING TO DISCLOSE TWO
PRIOR ORDERS OF REMOVAL**

WASHINGTON – The Department of Justice yesterday filed a complaint in the Eastern District of Michigan to revoke the naturalized U.S. citizenship of Humayun Kabir Rahman fka Md Humayun Kabir Talukder aka Ganu Miah aka Shafi Uddin. The case was referred to the Department of Justice by U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) and identified as a part of [Operation Janus](#).

The complaint alleges Humayun Kabir Rahman arrived in the United States in February 1992 at John F. Kennedy International Airport, claiming his true name was Ganu Miah while in possession of a passport that did not belong to him. He was paroled into the United States so he could seek asylum, and his application was referred to the immigration court where an immigration judge ordered him removed in 1998. In 1994, while Ganu Miah's proceeding was underway, Rahman sought asylum under a different name, Shafi Uddin. That application was also referred to the immigration court, and he was ordered to be removed in 1997. Later in 1997, using his third identity, Md Humayun Kabir Talukder, Rahman applied for and received an immigrant visa through the diversity visa program, claiming he had entered the United States by car from Canada. In 2004, he applied for and was granted permanent resident status, which he ultimately used to become a naturalized U.S. citizen in 2004. Throughout his immigration and naturalization proceedings, Rahman concealed that he had twice been ordered removed and lied about his identity and immigration history under oath. Rahman was also never lawfully admitted to the permanent resident status upon which he naturalized.

"As our country's leaders debate the future of our immigration system, this alleged case of a decade of defrauding the United States to obtain citizenship is particularly alarming," said Acting Assistant Attorney General Chad A. Readler for the Justice Department's Civil Division. "In this instance, the suspect allegedly lied to the government as he twice sought to secure asylum under different identities, but was rebuffed and ordered removed both times before being randomly selected for a diversity visa. While the United States Senate assesses whether to continue the diversity visa program, the Justice Department will find the program's fraudsters and hold them to account, to protect our national security."

"This case illustrates the kind of fraud that we have discovered, and I hope today's announcement sends a clear message that attempting to fraudulently obtain U.S. citizenship will not be tolerated," USCIS Director Francis Cissna said in a statement. "We are grateful to our partners who are working to bring these cases to justice and protect the integrity of our immigration system."

This case was investigated by USCIS and the Civil Division's Office of Immigration Litigation, District Court Section (OIL-DCS). The case is being prosecuted by OIL-DCS's National Security and Affirmative Litigation Unit (NS/A Unit), with support from USCIS Office of the Chief Counsel, Central Law Division.

The claims made in the complaint are allegations only, and there have been no determinations of liability.

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THREE MS-13 GANG MEMBERS SENTENCED TO LENGTHY SENTENCES IN BROOKLYN FEDERAL COURT FOR MURDER OF 19-YEAR OLD MAN

Defendants Lured Victim from Queens to Long Island and Then Shot Him, Believing Victim Was Cooperating with Law Enforcement

Earlier today, in federal court in Brooklyn, defendants Milton Contreras, Oscar Welman Espinoza-Merino and Jose Osmin Rubio were each sentenced by United States District Judge Margo K. Brodie following their convictions for the murder of a 19-year-old victim on Long Island in 2014. Contreras was sentenced to 27 years' imprisonment, while Espinoza-Merino and Osmin Rubio were each sentenced to more than 24 years' imprisonment. After serving their sentences, all three defendants will face deportation from the United States.

Richard P. Donoghue, United States Attorney for the Eastern District of New York; Angel M. Melendez, Special Agent-in-Charge, United States Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE), Homeland Security Investigations (HSI) New York; Ashan M. Benedict, Special Agent-in-Charge, Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives, New York Field Division (ATF); and James P. O'Neill, Commissioner, New York City Police Department, announced the sentences.

Mr. Donoghue also expressed his appreciation to the Suffolk County Police Department for their assistance during the investigation.

"Today's sentence marks the final chapter in the pursuit of justice against these three MS-13 gang members who brutally murdered a teenager execution-style when they suspected him of cooperating with law enforcement," stated United States Attorney Donoghue. "This prosecution is part of the ongoing mission of this Office to protect the residents of this district from the violence and lawlessness of MS-13, and we will not rest until the MS-13 criminal organization is entirely dismantled."

"It is not a secret that MS-13 gang members are violent for the sake of being violent, and in this particular case exhibited their murderous ways by executing a teenager in Long Island," stated HSI Special Agent-in-Charge Melendez. "As they use violence to seek power through instilling fear into the neighborhoods in which they live, we will be relentless working with our partners to dismantle this vicious gang and bring peace back to the communities."

"The individuals that committed this heinous act of violence are rightfully where they belong. While in prison, they can reflect on the terror and pain they inflicted on their community. Gangs like MS-13 that seek to terrorize the community putting citizens at fear for their lives should know that law enforcement is committed to rooting this evil from our society and making the streets safe for everyone," stated ATF Special Agent-in-Charge Benedict. "I would like to express my gratitude to the United States Attorney for prosecuting the case. I also would like to thank the Special Agents and Task Force Officers of the ATF's Joint Firearms Task Force and our counterparts at HSI and the NYPD for diligently pursuing this case until justice was served."

As detailed in the superseding indictment, the three defendants—along with a fourth defendant convicted of the murder, Byron Lopez, who has not yet been sentenced—are members of the Jamaica, Queens and/or Brentwood, Long Island chapters of the violent street gang La Mara Salvatrucha, also known as "MS-13." On February 25, 2014, Lopez, Espinoza-Merino, Contreras and Rubio directed the victim, fellow gang member Sidney Valverde, to travel to Long Island under the false pretense that they needed him to assist in gang business there. In fact, the co-conspirators planned to kill Valverde because they believed that he was providing information about the gang's activities to law enforcement. After Valverde arrived in Long Island, the co-conspirators shot him in the back of the head and left his body on Miller Place Beach in Suffolk County where it was

...discovered by a beachcomber approximately two weeks later.

This case is the latest in a series of federal prosecutions by the United States Attorney's Office for the Eastern District of New York targeting members of the MS-13, a violent international criminal organization. The MS-13's leadership is based in El Salvador and Honduras, but the gang has thousands of members across the United States. With numerous branches, or "cliques," the MS-13 is the largest and most violent street gang on Long Island. Since 2003, hundreds of MS-13 members, including dozens of clique leaders, have been convicted on federal felony charges in this district. A majority of those MS-13 members have been convicted on federal racketeering charges for participating in murders, attempted murders, and assaults. Since 2010 alone, this Office has obtained indictments charging MS-13 members with carrying out more than 40 murders in the Eastern District of New York and has convicted dozens of MS-13 leaders and members in connection with those murders.

The government's case is being handled by the Office's Organized Crime and Gangs Section. Assistant United States Attorney Alixandra Smith is in charge of the prosecution.
